Process and Systems

The University of Illinois Medical Center Comprehensive Approach to Adverse events has been applied to 4000 adverse events and unsafe conditions in FY10. An emphasis on reporting, root cause analysis, and improving systems has resulted in the following:

- 1. 38 Patient and Family Communication Consults
- 2. 3 Clear harm errors with full disclosure
- 3. 30 Process improvements

The number of adverse event reports continues to increase and facilitates immediate communication with patients, families, and care providers along with rapid of review of system

issues in an effort to reduce the incidence of harm to patients. Tracking communication of harm events with patients and provision of benevolent gestures has resulted in positive outcomes with regard to reduction of medical malpractice lawsuits and claims.

Research-Grants and Publications

Timothy McDonald and colleagues were awarded a \$3,000,000 grant from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality to disseminate and evaluate the "Seven Pillars" program for responding to adverse patient incidents to nine Chicago-area hospitals including Resurrection, Vanguard, and Mount Sinai hospitals. This three year project was the top ranked grant in a very competitive field.

David Mayer and his colleagues were awarded \$100,000 from the Anesthesia Patient Safety Foundation to disseminate the proven effective use of lipid rescue to treat local anesthetic toxicity.

Rachel Yudkowsky and colleagues were awarded a \$100,000 grant from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality to evaluate the impact of a virtual reality simulator on Neurosurgery resident training and in-situ performance of ventriculostomy.
