#### MEETING OF DECEMBER 11, 1900.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois meet in the Trustees' Room, Library Building, Urbana, Ill., at 9:00 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, Dec. 11, 1900.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Fulkerson, Hatch, McKay, McLean, Nightingale and Smith, and Mrs. Flower, Mrs. Carriel and Mrs. Abbott; absent, Governor Tanner. President Draper was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of Sept. 21 and Nov. 9, 1900, and they were approved as presented.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

#### Io the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

1. Last spring Miss Elizabeth Sprague was appointed instructor in household science, but has never entered upon the position, because of ill health. It has been expected, all along, that in a little time she would be ready to commence work, but circumstances now seem to make it necessary for her to be released from the engagement altogether, and she has so requested.

I therefore recommend the appointment of Miss Cornelia Elizabeth Simon as assistant in household science for seven months, commencing Dec. 1, 1900, at \$70 per month.

Miss Simon is a graduate of the Lewis Institute, Chicago, and has served one year as assistant in the household science work of that institution.

- 2. I transmit two letters on behalf of students in the College of Law, asking that they be given free scholarships, or that their fees be remitted.
- 3. I transmit a communication from Professor Walter Howe Jones in reference to his salary.
- 4. The reports of the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station are herewith transmitted, with the recommendation that the appropriations asked for for the quarter ending March 31, 1901, be made as follows:

The Secretary presented the Registrar's reports of fees due from University students for the quarters ending June 30, September 30, and December 31, 1900; from Preparatory School students for the same time; from School of Pharmacy student for the four months ending April 30, 1900; from College of Medicine students for the four months ending April 30, for the two months ending June 30, and for the quarter ending September 30, 1900.

These reports were referred to the Finance Committee.

President Draper's bill of expenses for the six months ending December 1, 1900, amounting to \$65.55, was ordered paid upon recommendation of the Finance Committee.

A communication with regard to the rental, after April 30th, of the premises now occupied by the School of Pharmacy was referred to the Committee on the School of Pharmacy, with instructions to report to the Board thereon.

Upon the request Mr. Hatch, Mrs. Abbott was appointed chairman of the Committee of the School of Pharmacy in his stead.

A communication from the Central Union Telephone Company was referred to the Finance Committee.

PURCHASE OF THE WEST DIVISION HIGH SCHOOL PROPERTY.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago:

CHICAGO, Nov. 15, 1900.

Mr. W. L. Pillsbury, Secretary of the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois,

DEAR SIR: The following is a copy of part of the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago, held November 10, 1900, relating to the authorization received by the Board of Directors from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for the purchase of the West Division High School property. The part of the minutes in regard to this matter is as follows:

"A communication was presented by the President from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois authorizing the purchase of the West Division High School property as applied for by the College of Physicians and Surgeons. This communication was read and on motion and second was accepted and placed on file.

On motion and second the Secretary was instructed to notify the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois of the receipt of the approval given by the Board of Trustees to the application of the Board of Directors of the College of Physicians and Surgeons for authority under the contract with the University of Illinois to purchase the West Division High School property at a cost not to exceed \$186,000.00.

He was futher instructed to notify the Board of Trustees that the Board of Directors of the College of Physicians and Surgeons proposes to act upon the authorization." Yours truly,

#### LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS.

The committee on legislative appropriations appointed at the September meeting presented the following report:

URBANA, Dec. 11, 1900.

To the Board of Trustees.

Your Committee appointed at the September meeting to consider and report upon applications to the next Legislature for University appropriations makes the following report:

The University has many very urgent needs, but the one which is supreme has been occasioned by the destruction of the Wood Shops, Hydraulic Laboratory, Testing Laboratory, and Gymnasium, by fire, in June last. The complete destruction of the building which housed these different interests has made it necessary to abandon a considerable part of the University work for the present year. In the opinion of your Committee this fire loss should be made good by the Legislature immediately upon assembly. If this is done it is likely that the needs of the different departments referred to can be provided for by the opening of the University year in 1901, The Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds has made careful estimates of the amount of money needed to meet these needs, and advises us that \$76,000.00 will suffice for the construction. This should be asked for as an emergency appropriation, and in the hope of securing it in time to finish construction by the first of September. To accomplish this it will be necessary to have the plans go forward rapidly in anticipation of the appropriation. We recommend that immediately upon the assembling of the Legislature an application be made for an emergency appropriation of \$76,000.00 to accomplish this purpose.

We have very carefully considered the financial conditions and pressing needs of the University. Having in mind the rapid growth of recent years,

and the continuance thereof, and at the same time desiring to reduce our askings to the lowest point consistent with the continued development of the University, we recommend that the following items be asked for in the regular appropriation bill:

- 1. For the payment of taxes accruing in the years 1900 and 1901 on lands owned by the University in the State of Minnesota, and held for the use of the University, the sum of \$1,000.00 per annum.
- 2. For the payment of salaries, for the care of buildings and grounds, and for ordinary operating expenses, the sum of \$175,000.00 per annum.
  - 3. For additions to library, \$15,000.00 per annum.
  - 4. For additions to apparatus and appliances, \$3,000.00 per annum.
  - 5. For materials for shop practice, \$2,000.00 per annum.
  - 6. For increase of scientific cabinets and collections, \$1,000.00 per annum.
  - 7. For fire protection, \$1,500.00 per annum.
  - 8. For laying pavements and walks, \$6,000.00 per annum.
  - 9. For the maintenance of the Vaccine laboratory, \$1,200.00 per annum.
- 10.. For the maintenance and extension of engineering equipment, \$10,-000.00 per annum.
- 11. For painting and repairs on buildings, and improvements to grounds, \$5,000.00 per annum.
  - 12. For carrying on the State water analyses, \$3,000.00.
- 13. For draining, fencing, and repairs on the experiment farms, \$3,000.00 per annum.
- 14. For expenses of a summer term of the University, \$5,000.00 per annum.
- 15. For providing additional teachers in the College of Agriculture, in order to meet the demands for instruction at farmers' institutes, the sum of \$6,000.00 per annum.

Your committee recommends that application for the following additions to the plant be made:

- 1. For payment for deficit in the construction of the Agricultural Building \$10,000.00.
  - 2. For furnishing and equiping the Agricultural Building, \$5,000.00.
  - 3. For the construction of a chemical laboratory, \$150,000,00.
  - 4. For the construction of a woman's building, \$100,000.00.
  - 5. For completing the water plant of the University, \$10,000.00.
- 6. For reconstructing the old Chemical Laboratory so as to make it available for the College of Law or the School of Music, \$10,000.00.
- 7. For the purchase of small parcels of land, surrounded by lands of the University, and needed to make the holdings of the State complete within the general boundary of the University grounds, \$20,000.00.
- 8. For equipment for the Wood Shops, Hydraulic Laboratory, and Men's Gymnasium, destroyed by fire, \$15,000.00.
- 9. For additions to the Central Heating and Lighting Plant to meet the demands of the Agricultural Buildings and a new Gymnasium, Wood Shops, and Testing Laboratory, etc., \$12,000.00.

#### Respectfully submitted.

S. A. BULLARD, THOMAS J. SMITH, ALFRED BAYLISS, This paper was gone over item by item and the several items were approved except the following:

Mr. McKay moved to increase item 10, for maintenance and extension of the engineering equipment, by making the amount \$25,000.00.

This amendment was defeated by the following vote: Yeas—Mrs. Carriel, Messrs. McKay, Hatch and Nightingale; nays—Messrs. Fulkerson, Bayliss, McLean, Bullard, and Smith and Mrs. Flower and Mrs. Abbott.

It was then moved to make the amount \$20,000.00, and then to amend this motion by substituting \$15,000.00 for \$20,000.00, and the substitute prevailed by the following vote: Yeas—Messrs. Fulkerson, Bayliss, Bullard, McLean, and Smith and Mrs. Flower and Mrs. Abbott; nays—Mrs. Carriel and Messrs. McKay, Hatch, and Nightengale.

It was ordered that instead of \$10,000.00 in item 1, deficiency on Agricultural Building, the amount of the deficiency, as ascertained by the Business Manager, should be inserted.

Mr. Fulkerson moved to amend item 2, for furnishing and equipping the Agricultural Building, by making the amount \$25,000.00.

It was moved as a substitute for this to ask for \$10,000.00 for the year beginning July 1, 1901, and for \$5,000.00 for the year beginning July 1, 1902, and the substitute prevailed by the following vote: Yeas—Messrs. Bayliss, McLean, Bullard, McKay, Smith, Hatch and Nightingale, and Mrs. Flower and Mrs. Carriel; nays—Mr. Fulkerson and Mrs. Abbott.

It was voted that the amount of item 8, for equipment of wood shops, etc., should be added to the \$76,000.00 to be asked for as an emergency appropriation, and that the asking accordingly include not only the amount needed for the buildings, but also the amount needed for equipment.

It was also voted to ask for \$5,000.00 per annum for maintenance of the School of Music.

Mr. McKay moved an extension of the College of Literature and Arts by the establisment of a school of social and political science and commerce, and that an appropriation of \$16,000 00 per annum be asked for for this purpose, and the motion prevailed.

Mr. McKay moved that the Legislature be asked to appropriate to the University, in addition to other amounts, \$35,000.00 a year, in order that the University might thereafter collect no fees from University students.

Before action was taken upon this motion, Mr. Nightingale presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The University of Illinois is an integral part of the public school system; and,

WHEREAS, In all the public schools below the University tuition is free; therefore, be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, That on and after the opening of the college year, September, 1901, tuition in all the regular academic departments of the University (not including the Preparatory School or the professional schools) be free, and that the Legislature be asked to appropriate for the use of the University a sufficient amount, in addition to the usual appropriations, to make good any loss of income hitherto accruing from tuition.

Both the motion and the resolution were referred to the committee of the whole for consideration at a special meeting of the Board, to be called by the President some time prior to Jan. 31, 1901.

The report upon appropriations was then adopted as amended.

The Illinois State Horticultural Society, which was holding its annual meeting in the Agricultural Building at the University, sent an invitation to the Board to visit the Society, and the invitation was accepted for 3:00 o'clock p. m.

Mr. J. R. Scott and Mr. Spencer were heard upon Mr. Scott's claim for additional compensation for hauling coal for the University last year.

After the hearing the Board voted to pay Mr. Scott \$150.00 more.

One hundred dollars was appropriated to complete the payment for the new boilers which had been purchased.

On motion of Mrs. Carriel, it was voted that Professor Burrill's salary be \$4,000.00 a year from Jan. 1, 1901.

#### STATE GEOLOGIC SURVEY.

The following report of the special committee appointed at the November meeting of the Board was adopted:

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Committee appointed to consider ways and means for the establishment of a geological survey of Illinois, submits the following report of progress:

Your Committee arranged a conference in Chicago with representatives of the other leading universities of the State. Dean Forbes represented this University at the conference, and the suggestions which follow are largely based upon its results.

We believe that conditions are favorable for asking the Legislature to establish a survey of the State so broadly organized as to cover all its geological resources; that this survey should be the creation of the State and not be subjected to special or partisan influence; that political methods should not be used to secure its establishment or support; that in the organization and administration of such survey the interests of geologic science should take precedence of all other considerations; that the work of the survey should be so organized and distributed that all competent geologists connected with the educational institutions of the State may have a share in its prosecution, and that such disposition be made of the results of the survey as will best promote educational ends and subserve the economic interests of the State, and that the principal laboratories of the survey shall be located at the State University.

This action can only be accomplished through legislation, and we recommend that if these suggestions be approved by you, the committee be continued with power to prepare a bill, and take such action as shall seem most likely to secure its passage.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION, DEC. 11, 1900.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the forenoon, except Messrs. Bayliss and McKay.

The importation of supplies for the chemical laboratory to the amount of \$2,000.00 was authorized.

A petition was received from the young women of the University asking that there be included in the legislative appropriations a request for an amount sufficient to build and equip a woman's hall and a woman's gymnasium.

#### MEMORIAL TO PROFESSOR MORROW.

### Mr. Smith presented the following preamble and resolutions:

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., Nov. 14, 1900.

WHEREAS, The Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association is perpetually mindful of the long and efficient service rendered Illinois agriculture by the late Professor George E. Morrow; and,

WHEREAS, It is desirous that some fitting and permanent memorial be placed to his name; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it be requested of the Trustees of the University of Illinois, that the Assembly Room of the Agricultural Building be known as Morrow Hall, and that a suitable tablet be erected to his memory at the entrance of said room.

## The following resolution was then offered by Mr. Smith:

Resolved, That in memory and in honor of the long and faithful services of George Espy Morrow, as Professor of Agriculture in the University, the assembly hall in the new Agricultural Building be hereafter known and called Morrow Hall, and that a suitable tablet be placed in said hall with the name of Professor Morrow and with appropriate representations of the facts concerning him.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Agriculture, to report at the next meeting of the Board.

On motion of Mr. McLean, Miss Ethel A. Hampton was granted a scholarship in the University.

Mr. E. E. Chester and Dean Davenport were then heard with regard to a memorial for Professor Morrow, and after the hearing and remarks by President Draper in support of the same, the motion to refer Mr. Smith's resolution was reconsidered and the resolution was adopted.
