Meeting of December 13, 1904.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the Uni-

versity at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, December 13, 1904.

The members present were Messrs. Hatch, Kerrick, McLean and Nightingale and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Abbot and Mrs. Evans; absent Governor Yates, and Messrs. Bayliss, Dickirson and McKinley. Mr. Bullard came in later. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the Board meetings held September 27, 1904, and November 9, 1904, and these were approved

as presented.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT JAMES.

The President of the University presented the following matters for consideration:

1. A recommendation from the Council of Administration that the High School Visitor be added to the Senate by virtue of his office.

The recommendation was approved.

2. A letter from Colonel E. G. Fechét, head of the military department of the University, requesting that a two-story addition be built to the Armory for the necessary storage of guns and ammunition.

Communication referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act and instructions to report.

3. A communication from Vice President Burrill suggesting the name of Watcheka Hall for the Woman's building.

It was voted to postpone the selection of a name for the Woman's building for future consideration.

4. A request from the Director of the Men's Gymnasium that a piano be placed in the gymnasium, and a person be employed to play it, in connection with the gymnasium drill. The estimated expense was \$15 for the rent of the piano for five months, at \$3 per month, and \$72 for the services of a musician, at \$1 a day for four days a week for eighteen weeks; total, \$87.

The matter was referred to the President with power to act.

5. A request from the Director of Physical Training for an addition to the regular appropriation to the department of physical training.

One hundred and fifty dollars was added to the appropriation.

6. A recommendation from Dean Ricker that Robert Clayton Mathews' salary be fixed at \$90 a month from January 1, 1905, and that Hammond William Whitsitt's salary be fixed at \$85 a month for the same period.

The recommendation was approved.

7. Miss Katharine L. Sharp, the Librarian of the University, requests the sum of \$150 to pay for clerical work and other assistants, in connection with completing an historical sketch of the libraries of Illinois which she is at present compiling and which is to be published by the University.

The appropriation of \$150 for this purpose was made.

8. Communications from Dean Kinley, Chairman of the University Committee on Accountancy, relating to various suits which certain persons had threatened to bring against the University; in the one case, for rejecting an application to be registered as Certified Public Accountant under the waiver clause; in another, for the return of the \$25 fee to an applicant whose application for registration under the waiver clause was refused; in the third, a notice of intention to bring a suit to compel the University to give to the applicant a copy of the examination papers used in an examination for Certified Public Accountant.

It was voted that the University should request the opinion of the Attorney General as to the legality of the position taken by the University through its Committee on Accountancy. If the Attorney General held that the action taken was legal, the action of the committee should be approved by the Board. If the Attorney General should hold that the action was illegal, the committee should take such action as he might indicate. In case a suit should be brought against the University, the Attorney General should be requested to represent the University in the proceedings.

9. A statement from the Dean of the College of Science that the faculty of the College of Science had voted to request the Trustees to provide for a course in human anatomy as a part of the preliminary medical course.

Voted that the Board approve the application in principle, and that a definite plan should be submitted, indicating the scope of the instruction, the number of hours to be given, the cost of the necessary equipment and teaching force, definite action upon the subject, however, being postponed until it was evident what resources would be at the University's disposal for the ensuing biennium.

10. A statement concerning the fire at the Agricultural building on December 8, from which it appeared that, in the opinion of Professor Brooks, the fire arose from defective wiring connected with the Home Telephone Company.

On motion of Mr. Nightingale it was

Resolved, That every emergency in connection with the electrical wiring in any part of the University be placed in the hands of Professor Brooks to be attended to at once, and that the general matter of electrical wiring in the University be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds in conjunction with Professor Brooks for investigation and report; and further, that in the future the installation of all wires in the University be under the supervision of the head of the electrical engineering department and that his written approval must be on file before such work be accepted or such wires used.

Voted to present the sum of \$25 to the two volunteer fire companies in Champaign and Urbana for their efficient services in connection with extinguishing the above mentioned fire, and that a vote of thanks be tendered, in the name of the University, through the chiefs of these companies, for their coöperation.

Voted that the Board of Trustees express its appreciation of the efficient and prompt services of the night watchman and the fire brigade of the University in connection with the same fire.

Voted that the question of fire protection should be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with authority to make such emergency provisions as might be necessary to protect the buildings against the immediate danger of fire, and that they present a plan for the more efficient protection of the University.

11. A request from the Dean of the College of Agriculture that a scholarship be granted to Martha Matthews.

In this connection a scholarship was granted Sallie Abbott, and a scholarship previously granted George H. Cheny but not accepted because of illness was renewed.

12. A request from Professor S. W. Parr for an appropriation of \$200 to enable him to complete a piece of investigation work into the subject of Illinois coals.

The appropriation was made.

13. A statement as to the subject of extending the privileges of the scholarships in domestic science, now available in the College of Agriculture, to the College of Science, with a suggestion that the matter be postponed for further consideration.

The suggestion was approved.

14. A request from Katharine L. Sharp, Director of the Library School for the appointment of a reviser of cataloging for three months, February to April, 1905, at \$50 a month.

Request was granted, and authority given to the President to appoint said cataloger.

15. Proposed resolution concerning the policy of the State University as to affiliation of other educational institutions.

Whereas, Applications from various institutions of learning have been made to the Trustees of the State University to affiliate the institutions in question: and.

Whereas, It seems desirable to have some general policy in regard to such

affiliations; therefore, be it

Resolved. That it is the sense of this Board that no institution be affiliated with the University unless entire control of such institution be turned over absolutely to the Trustees of the University; and further, that the title to all property owned by such institution be vested in the State, without conditions and without limitations.

The resolution was adopted.

Also a further resolution, as follows:

That no such institution be accepted unless there is ample guarantee on the part of its trustees, faculties and other persons interested in the institution that the requisite funds will be placed at the disposal of the University to conduct the institution in a manner worthy of the University and the State of Illinois until such time as the Legislature of the State assumes the financial support of the same.

Lost by the following vote: Yeas, Messrs. McLean, Hatch, Kerrick, and Mrs. Alexander; nays, Messrs. Bullard, Nightingale, and Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Yates and Messrs. Dickirson. Bayliss and McKinley.

16. That the President of the United States be invited to visit the University of Illinois at some time to suit his convenience.

Approved.

17. A request from the Rev. Mr. Tobie that the use of the chapel or some other suitable room in the University be granted to him and his congregation during the process of the erection of a new church on the present site of the Parks Memorial chapel, from March 1 to November 1, 1905.

It was voted to grant the request under such conditions as to payment for janitor service and heating as the President of the University might prescribe.

18. A statement that Dean T. A. Clark has been approved by the President as Director of the Summer School, and a suggestion that a conference be held during the Summer School upon the problem of the rural school, and that to this conference the school directors, or some representatives chosen by them, be invited.

The suggestion was concurred in.

19. A statement that the Clay Workers' Association of the State was desirous of securing an appropriation from the Legislature for an economic survey of the State, embracing particularly the materials of use by the ceramic industry. They propose to put the survey under the charge of the State University.

Voted to accept the appropriation, if secured, and undertake the work indicated.

20. A statement that certain persons interested in the improvement of charitable and philanthropic conditions of the State were planning to secure an appropriation from the State Legislature to establish a school for training of philanthropic and charitable workers, hoping that the State University would accept the appropriation and undertake the work.

Voted to accept this trust, if conferred by the Legislature and accompanied by adequate appropriations.

21. A statement as to the possibility of a general geological survey of the State and the attitude which the State University should take toward such a survey.

Voted that the President pursue such course with reference to the survey as he should find best.

LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS. -

22. The report of the committee appointed by the Board upon the legislative appropriations for the biennium 1905-1907.

A careful and prolonged discussion followed, in the course of which several items were changed as follows:

17a was added, Mr. Kerrick, at his own request, being recorded as voting no.

18 was raised from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

20 was raised from \$10,000 to \$35,000.

22 was changed from "for purchase of land, \$10,000" to the form in which it appears below.

Item 24 was approved, Mr. Kerrick, at his own request, being recorded as voting no.

The report in the amended form, as given below, was then adopted.

The question of sending the regiment to Springfield January 9, 1905, to attend the inauguration of the Governor was referred to President James with power to act.

The President and Secretary of the Board were given authority to settle with the Hartford Steam Boiler Inspection and Insurance Company for a loss sustained under its policy No. 55,935 by reason of an explosion which occurred October 11, 1904.

FOUNDRY ACCEPTED.

Mr. Bullard, chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, reported that the new foundry was satisfactorily completed and moved that it be accepted, and that the contractor be paid the balance due. It was so ordered.

It was ordered that Professor James M. White be paid \$500 on account for service as architect.

FREE TUITION.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Nightingale was received and it was voted that it be considered at an early date:

WHEREAS, The University of Illinois was established and is maintained by

the people of the State, through public taxation; and,
WHEREAS, The benefits and privileges of the University are intended for
all the young people of the State, who have such a preparation in the way
of mental and moral equipment as will enable them to take advantage of the opportunities afforded; and,
WHEREAS, The State University is in every sense a public school; and,

WHEREAS, All our other public schools, kindergarten, elementary and high,

are free; therefore,

Resolved, That on and after the opening of the college year in 1905 the tuition fee of twenty-four dollars a year for students whose homes are in Illinois be abolished, and that for such students the tutition in the academic departments, including the College of Agriculture, be free.

It was voted that when the Board adjourned it should adjourn to 9:00 o'clock a. m., January 17, 1905.

Treasurer's Reports.

The Secretary presented the Treasurer's report for the quarter ending June 30, 1904, which, by an oversight had not been presented at the meeting of September 27th, and the report for the quaretr ending September 30, 1904. These reports were referred to the Finance Committee.
