Meeting of December 19, 1905.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the

University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, December 19, 1905.

The members present were Messrs. Bullard, Davison, Lehman, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Abbott, Barber, Bayliss, and Kerrick. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the regular meeting of September 12, 1905, and the special meetings of October 17, 1905, and October 27, 1905. These minutes were approved as presented.

The vacancy on the Executive Committee, because of Mr. McKin-

ley's resignation, was filled by the election of Mr. Lehman.

Mr. Bullard announced that he had appointed Mr. Lehman in place of Mr. McKinley on the following committees: Buildings and Grounds, College of Medicine, and Engineering, and that he had made Mr. Abbott chairman of the Committee on Engineering.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

1. The Dean of the College of Literature and Arts approves a request of Professor Frederick, of the Department of Art and Design, for an appropriation of \$50 for the expenses of the public school drawing exhibit which is regularly held in the spring.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

2. The Dean of the College of Literature and Arts requests an appropriation of from three to five hundred dollars for the cost of a course in accounting in the College of Literature and Arts, of two hours a week from six to ten weeks during the second semester of the current academic year, the amount to be charged to the appropriation for instruction in commerce.

Voted that the President be given authority to make such appointment, and that the appropriation be made.

3. The Dean of the College of Engineering requests an appropriation of \$750 for general college expenses for the years 1905 to 1907, to be charged to the appropriation for Engineering College equipment.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

4. The Dean of the College of Engineering recommends the appointment of Mr. Edward L. Wenger as instructor in electrical engineering at a salary of \$130 per month, from December 1, 1905, to July 1, 1906.

Voted that such appointment be made.

CO-OPERATION WITH STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

5. The Acting Dean of the College of Science recommends a proposal of the Director of the State Water Survey, Professor Bartow, for a plan of coöperation between the State Board of Health and the State Water Survey. The State Board of Health agrees to appropriate \$1,000 to the University to pay the salary of an assistant in the State Water Survey department who shall undertake chemical and bacteriological investigations for the State Board of Health. It is understood that the University shall select and appoint the said chemist and bacteriologist. In case this arrangement is approved, the Director of the Water Survey asks authority to engage a chemist at a salary of \$1,000 to act as bacteriologist and chemist. The \$60 a month already allowed for a second assistant in the Water Survey, which place has not yet been filled, will be used for obtaining additional equipment, and in paying the transportation and traveling expenses of the representative of the Water Survey in a thorough study of the municipal water supply of the State.

Voted that this matter be referred to the President of the University with power to act.

MEDICAL STUDY AT THE UNIVERSITY.

6. The following communication in regard to the combined course in science and medicine is submitted by the faculty of the College of Science: "To the Faculty of the College of Science:

The undersigned committee, appointed by the Dean, in accordance with an action of the general committee of this College, and instructed to report to the College faculty upon the relations of medical study at the University, respectfully reports as follows:

Whereas, the combined course in science and medicine offered by this University, consisting of three years' prescribed work in the College of Science and three years' work in the College of Medicine, is and always has been one continuous six years' course intended throughout as a thorough and liberal preparation for the student for the practice of medicine: and

and liberal preparation for the student for the practice of medicine; and WHEREAS, it contains all the scientific and professional matter of the ordinary four years' course at the Medical College, and much additional study of physics, chemistry, biology, and physiology prescribed because of their relations to the professional medical studies, together with modern language, rhetoric, mathematics, military, and physical training not required at the Medical College but regarded by us as useful to the physician and necessary to graduation with the liberal degree.

Resolved, that in our judgment this course unquestionably affords a much better general education and a materially better preparation for the practice of medicine than the four years' course of the Medical College, and that any discrimination against it as compared with this four years' course is unjust to the University, unfair to the student, and detrimental to the progress of medical education.

We consequently advise that this course be henceforth be called a medical course, and that students registering in it with a view to graduation from a medical college be classed as medical students.

We further recommend that such students be registered as members of the College of Medicine from the beginning of the third year of this six years' course, and that they be carried on the register of the University as candidates for the bachelor's degree in science during the fourth year of this course, at the end of which they become entitled to that degree.

We advise that University instructors who give instruction to students in this medical course in subjects required for the medical degree be regarded as instructors in the Medical College, and listed accordingly in the University publications.

We also recommend that authority be requested for the publication of a new circular concerning medical education at the University which shall be drawn up in accordance with the facts here recited and the views here presented, and that a sufficient edition of such a circular be printed to reach every physician in the State, and every member of the graduating class of the current year from Illinois high schools.

Voted that the recommendations contained in the above communication be approved.

A resolution offered by Dr. Davison with regard to conferring degrees upon such graduates was referred to the President.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR CHEMISTRY.

7. The following communication from Professor Grindley, approved by the Dean of the College of Science and by Professor Parr, requesting the assignment of the balance of the fund appropriated by the last Legislature for equipment and improvements in the chemical laboratory is herewith submitted:

"URBANA, ILL., November 25, 1905.

Dean E. J. Townsend, Natural History Building.

My Dear Sir—I respectfully request that the Trustees of the University be asked at their next meting to appropriate \$15,000 of the \$20,000 which was granted by the last Legislature for equipment and improvements in the chemical laboratory.

The first \$5,000 of this amount has been used under the direction of Dean White in putting in additional desks and fixtures in the chemical building.

It is desired to expend the \$15,000 as follows:

First, \$5,000 is to be used for making improvements in the laboratories of applied chemistry and in purchasing supplies for Professor Parr's work in technical chemistry.

Second, \$5,000 is to be used to continue the building of additional necessary desks, hoods, shelves, and for necessary plumbing in connection with

the same in the several laboratories of the department.

Third, the remaining \$5,000 is to be used in purchasing permanent apparatus for the use of the several lines of work in the department. The apparatus referred to is as follows: Analytical balances, electrical appliances for physical chemistry such as thermostats, ammeters, galvanometers, voltmeters and motors, lecture apparatus, combustion furnaces, etc.

It is desirable that this money be made available at present although we do not expect, of course, to spend it during the current year. However, if it be made available now we can properly plan to spend it judiciously and to

better advantage than we could otherwise.

Voted that the balance of the appropriation, amounting to \$15,000 be hereby assigned to be expended on the recommendation of the professors in chemistry approved by the President of the University.

8. The following request for an appropriation for additional microscopes and accessories in the physiological laboratory, made by the professor of physiology and approved by the Dean of the College of Science, is herewith submitted:

"Students for physiology 4 have been registering along until the class now shows a registration nearly double that of last year. We shall be short fifteen microscopes and accessories. The actual cost of the microscope outfits alone will be \$660. The accessories will be about \$30.00. We shall therefore absolutely require, say, \$700 for the outfits. If provision can be made for an extra hundred dollars to be used in case more students come it would be advisable.

I have tried to borrow microscopes from botany and from Zoölogy, but they will have all theirs in use,—except possibly a half dozen old stands, which are not in order, and repairs on these will not pay. Two students cannot use a microscope at once so I can not 'double.'

Very respectfully yours,

Voted that an appropriation of \$800 be made for the purchase of the desired miscroscopes and microscopic outfits in the physiological laboratory.

9. The Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station has requested that Professor Rietz of the department of mathematics, be permitted to do certain work in statistics for the Agricultural Experiment Station. He proposes to offer to Professor Rietz an opportunity for two months' service in the summer, to be exclusively devoted to this work. The Department of Mathematics joins in this request. The remuneration for the extra work in the summer would be \$300, which, added to the \$1,500 which Professor Rietz now receives as Assistant Professor of Mathematics, would make his total remuneration \$1,800 for eleven months' work. The departments join in the recommendation that Professor Reitz' salary be fixed at this sum, and that \$600 be charged to the Agricultural Experiment Station fund and \$1,200 to the general University fund.

Voted that Professor Rietz be permitted to do the work described and that his salary be \$1,800 a year from January 1, 1906, distributed as recommended.

10. Profesor Stebbins requests that authority be given to let the contract for a small building and dome to cover the 4-inch telescope at the observatory.

Voted to refer to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, with power to act.

"The Director of the Experiment Station requests that authority be given to proceed with the construction of plans and the location of the farm mechanics building, which it is proposed to erect during the coming year, and which was authorized by a vote of the Board June 23, 1905. The building should be completed and ready for ocupancy at the opening of the next college year in September.

Voted that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Committee on Agriculture be requested to prepare and submit to the Board at its next meeting, proposals for the location of this building and plans for its construction.

12. The Director of the Experiment Station requests that the expense of making the Wright street extension and grading the grounds to be thrown into the general University campus should be charged to other than the Agricultural funds.

Voted that, inasmuch as this grading was an incident to the grading and preparation of the grounds and buildings intended especially

for the College of Agriculture and the Experiment Station, it is proper that the entire expense should be charged to the agricultural funds.

13. Robert Clinton Lloyd has tendered his resignation as Superintendent of the Soil Survey in the Agricultural Experiment Station, to take effect

November 30, 1905, which resignation has been accepted.

14. The University Librarian requests that the following titles be used for the positions indicated, namely: Instead of the term Loan Desk Assistant, Loan Desk Librarian; instead of the term Order Assistant, Order Librarian; instead of the term Catalog Assistant, Catalog Librarian.

Voted that such changes in title be approved.

15. The University Librarian requests the appropriation of \$150 for a reviser in the Library School for three months at \$50 per month.

Voted that the President be authorized to appoint such reviser.

16. The University Librarian requests the addition to the Library staff an assistant whose work it shall be to provide for keeping up a continuation list. The duties of such person, among others, would be to keep track of all public documents, National, State and local, and such other reports of societies, organizations, etc., as may be of value to the Library. She estimates that such an assistant may be obtained for a salary of \$60 a month.

Voted that an appropriation of \$60 a month be made for a continuation assistant, and that the President be authorized to appoint such assistant.

17. The University Librarian requests that an appropriation of \$1,200 be made for shelving in the east reading room, east tower room, east basement room, and Library School room, and for a moving platform to connect the stack room on the main floor with the work room in the basement.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

18. The University Librarian requests that \$100 be appropriated to the library for student help in filing the Library of Congress catalog cards.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

19. The University Librarian requests the appropriation of \$150 for the final expenses of preparing the History of Illinois Libraries, upon which she has been working for three years.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

20. The University Librarian requests leave of absence from the University for three or four months, beginning January 1, 1906. It is understood that this in lieu of any claim for leave of absence on the ground of a "sabbatical" year, and that such leave of absence is conditional upon the Librarian finding and paying for a suitable substitute who shall be satisfactory to the President of the University.

Voted that the leave of absence be granted on conditions named.

21. The University Librarian recommends that the College Library be kept open Friday and Saturday evenings until 10:30 p.m. This recommendation is in answer to requests from the faculties of the College of Literature and Arts and of the College of Science that the Library be thus kept open. It is estimated that the extra cost would be about \$30 a month.

Voted that the Library be kept open each week day evening until 10:00 o'clock p. m., and the necessary appropriation be made for the extra cost involved.

HISTORY OF LIBRARIES OF ILLINOIS.

22. The Director of the *University Studies*, Dean Kinley, requests authority to write to the various libraries of the State and other libraries throughout the country, asking them to subscribe for the History of Libraries in

Illinois which the University Librarian has been preparing for the past three years, and, if a sufficient number of subscriptions be obtained to bring the cost of publication down to the average cost of one number of the *Studies*, that he be authorized to accept the volume as one of the *Studies* in the series and to proceed with the printing.

Voted that such authority be granted.

23. The Director of the Music School requests authority to canvass for a subscription to a fund for the purchase of a practice organ for the School of Music.

Voted that the subject of purchasing a practice organ for the School of Music be referred for report to the Committee on Students' Welfare.

24. The Director of the Department of Physical Training requests an appropriation of \$471.94 for the purchase of 144 gymnasium lockers.

Voted that such an appropriation be made.

A recess was then taken until 2:30 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon Session, December 19, 1905.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning, and President James presented further matters for consideration.

PRINTING PROCEEDINGS OF INSTALLATION WEEK.

25. The chairman of the Commitee on Installation Exercises estimates that the total cost of publishing the proceedings of the various conferences will be about \$1,200.

Voted that Dean Kinley be made chairman of the publishing committee and that a sum not to exceed \$1,200 be hereby appropriated for publishing said proceedings, the vote being as follows: Yeas, Messrs. Bullard, Davison, Lehman, McLean, and Mrs. Busey and Mrs. Evans; present and not voting, Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber, Bayliss, Abbott and Kerrick.

26. In answer to an inquiry of the President of the University, Professor James M. White states that, in his opinion, the chapel can be properly ventilated for an outlay of about \$800.

Voted that the matter of ventilating the Chapel be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

SCHOLARSHIPS AT SUMMER SESSION.

27. Dean Thomas A. Clark, the Director of the Summer Session, requests authority to make the same proposition in regard to high school scholarships for the coming Summer Session as was made for the last Session, namely: that a free scholarship should be granted to one member of the faculty of each high school in the State, such person being approved by the board of education, the principal of the high school and the superintendent of the school.

Voted that such arrangement may be made.

28. The chairman of the Committee on Installation submits, with his approval, a recommendation from Colonel Fechét, that the names of those juniors who drilled during installation week should be printed in the min-

utes of the Board, with an expression of the thanks of the Board, for their assistance in making the exercises of installation week the great success they were.

Voted that the list of names submitted be printed with the thanks of the Board in the minutes of this meeing.

29. The Board of Examiners of Public Accountants request a reconsideration of the action of the Board in granting a diploma as Certified Public Accountant to Mr. Eric J. Everett.

The Illinois Society of Certified Public Accountants protest, through their secretary, against the issuance of such a certificate to Mr. Everett, on the ground that he has not had the requisite five years' experience, and has not been practicing on his own account at any time.

Voed that this matter be referred to Messrs. Abbott and Davison with a request to examine into the matter and report to this Board; and that, in the meantime, the certificate be not issued to Mr. Everett.

SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET OF COLLEGE OF MEDICINE.

30. Dr. D. A. K. Steele, Actuary of the College of Medicine, University of Illinois, submits herewith a supplementary budget, recommended by the Executive Faculty of the College of Physicians and Surgeons to the Trustees of the University for its adoption.

From the Minutes of the Executive Faculty: "Recommended for the immediate betterment of laboratory teaching, to go into effect this year: the Department of Bacteriology be given a culture media assistant, to receive \$1.00 a day; two graduate assistants for the winter term and one graduate assistant for the summer term, each to receive \$100.00. That the Department of Embryology and Biology be given charts for each subject; that the number of dissecting microscopes be brought up to fifty; that the matter of the salary of the head of the department be referred to the Faculty; that the graduate assistants be paid \$100.00, the student assistants being already provided for. That the Department of Anatomy be given two paid student assistants as demonstrators; that there be built for the preservation of specimens several tanks to take the place of specimen jars, these tanks to be of such size that a large number of specimens or dissections could be kept in each; there should be also provided tables with drains so that the specimens could be used by students for purposes of study. It was considered that in this way the material in the museum could be used to better advantage by the students and at little expense.

That the Department of Histology be given two student assistants at \$50.00 each and one graduate assistant at \$100.00; that a set of charts be provided.

That the Department of Chemistry be given two student assistants, to receive full fees, and four student assistants at one-half fees. There were other recommendations from this department which it was not considered advisable to take up at this time.

That the Department of Clinical Microscopy be given one student assist-

tant, to receive one-half fees.

The Department of Pathology had no recommendations to offer for immediate requirements.

The Committee also wishes to suggest that the supply room be kept open for all laboratories during laboratory periods, and also that the microscopes provided with oil immersion lenses be set aside for use in the laboratories of Bacteriology and Clinical Microscopy only, as the other laboratory courses do not require the use of the 1-12 lenses, and since there are 104 microscopes without 1-12 lenses, there would always be a sufficient number. It was considered advisable that a room be set aside for the stereopticon and projection apparatus, and that this room be at the disposal of the teachers requiring such apparatus in this work; the selection of the room to be left to the building committee; the stereopticon to be repaired and put in working order. This committee further wishes to recommend to the Faculty that the College make some provision for research work. This is the only institution of like size and standing from whose laboratories there comes no original work and the reasons for this condition of affairs are several: (1) The laboratory teachers are so overworked in the routine of teaching as to have no time for original scientific work; (2) lack of equipment; (3) lack of research scholarships, to stimulate interest in recent graduates who are capable of doing this line of work. The committee believes that in no better way could the reputation of the College be enhanced than by providing for work of this kind. That the opportunity for such work could be given at comparatively small expense to start with seems reasonably certain. An outlay of \$2,000.00 for equipment and the doubling of the present cost of running the laboratories would give a fair start. The committee also suggests that the museum be conducted on a plan by which the students would derive more benefit from the material in the museum, by being able to see and handle the specimens. To this end we suggest that the Librarian or some competent person be put in charge to catalogue in card system the specimens, to be present in the museum at certain hours in order that the specimens might be given out for study and to receive and catalogue new material. Also that a preparation man be employed, who shall have the care of the new material, replenishing of fluids, etc. In this way the museum, like the library, could be of great value to the

students. Approved by the Executive Faculty Sept. 29, 1905.

Recommended that an expenditure of \$500.00 for the maintenance of the quiz class be made. Approved by the Executive Faculty Nov. 2, 1905.

Voted that such supplementary budget, with the appropriations therein recommended, are hereby approved.

31. The Class of 1906 request permission from the Board of Trustees to erect an ornamental gateway at the John street entrance to the campus.

Voted, on motion of Mr. McLean, that the Board of Trustees highly appreciates and commends the good will shown by the senior class in proposing to erect a memorial gate at the John street entrance to the University grounds; that, however, it anticipates that the cost of such a structure would probably be more than the class would wish to meet; and, further, that the plans of the grounds have not as yet been so definitely made as to warrant the erection at present of a memorial gate at the point named; and that, therefore, the Board suggests that the class committee confer concerning a memorial with the chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, Mr. A. S. Bullard.

32. The Director of the staff of the Engineering Experiment Station requests the appointment of Mr. Francis K. Ovitz as Assistant in Chemistry for the Engineering Experiment Station at a salary of \$75.00 per month, from Jan. 1 to July 1, 1906.

Voted that such appointment be made.

33. The Dean of the College of Science requests the appointment of a successor to Mr. Ovitz at a salary of \$70.00 per month, from Jan. 1 to July 1, 1906.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to make such appointment.

34. Mr. Albert R. Curtiss, Instructor in the Woodshop of the Mechanical Engineering Department, has resigned, with the request that his resignation be accepted as soon as possible. The Dean of the College of Engineering recommends that his resignation be accepted, to date from Feb. 1, 1906, and that authority be given to appoint his successor at the same salary for the rest of the year.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to make such appointment.

35. The Helvetia Milk Condensing Company of Highland, Illinois, has offered to give the University the sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a research fellowship in chemistry for a period of two years. The investigation to be made by this fellow is to be upon the value of evaporated cream as a food for infants.

Voted that while the Board of Trustees express their sincere appreciation of this kind offer, they do not see their way clear to accept it at present.

36. Under authority given by the Board of Trustees the following appointments have been made by the President of the University since the last meeting of the Board:

Miss Edith Williams, assistant in Woman's Gymnasium, at \$70.00 for the academic year, filling the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Mary Davison.

Miss Florence Wilson, stenographer in the Vice President's office, at a salary of \$40.00 a month, beginning Nov. 1, 1905, vice Lulu M. Lego resigned. Miss Eleanor Beardsley, instructor of Elementary Voice Students, to re-

ceive 75 per cent of their tuitions as her remuneration.

Frederick Post, Armorer and Administrative Assistant in Military Department, at a salary of \$45.00 a month for seven months, from Nov. 1, 1905.

R. B. Otis, instructor in General Engineering Drawing, for eight months, at a salary of \$80.00 a month, in place of G. W. Eckhard.

Earl D. Finch, stenographer in Law School, at a salary of \$15.00 a month, beginning Dec. 1, 1905.

Truman L. Kelley, stenographer in the Library, full time, from Jan. 1 to Sept. 1, 1906, at \$50.00 a month.

PRINTING AT THE REFORM SCHOOL AT PONTIAC.

37. The attention of the Board is called most earnestly to the fact that the claim made by the State Board of Prison Industries, that the University of Illinois must have all its printing done at the Reform School in Pontiac, is interfering seriously with the efficiency of the University work. It is doubtful whether the law ever contemplated including the University in the list of institutions subject to the provision of this convict labor law. And the question should be raised with the proper authorities whether the law applies to the University at all or not. If it be decided that it does, then an urgent representation should be made to the Board of Prison Industries to give releases from the provisions of the law, as they are authorized to do in all those cases in which insistance upon its provisions would embarrass the work of the University.

It is not an extreme statement to say that the University cannot be efficiently administered if its publications are to be hampered by the provisions

of this law.

After considerable discussion the following resolutions, presented by Dr. Davison, were adopted:

- 1. Whereas, The Board of Prison Industries of the State of Illinois is classing the University of Illinois as one of the State institutions covered by the "prison labor law" and requiring the purchase of supplies from the penal institutions;
- 2. Whereas, the University of Illinois is not "a State institution owned, managed and controlled by the State of Illinois;"

3. Whereas-

(a) The University of Illinois is a corporate body that has power to make contracts, to sue and be sued, to acquire, hold and convey real and personal property, to make and establish by-laws and to alter or repeal the same for the management of its various departments (Charter),

(b) 'The title for United States land script was vested in the Trustees of

the University of Illinois, and not in the State of Illinois,

- (c) The real estate of the University of Illinois is vested in the Trustees and not in the State of Illinois,
- (d) The State of Illinois is not responsible or liable for financial deficits beyond the appropriations by its Legislature,

(e) The Trustees are elected directly by the people;

- 4. Whereas, The University of Illinois is partially under Federal control—
 (a) Certain departments partially directed by and required to report to the Secretary of Agriculture;
- (b) The Secretary of the Interior is charged with the administration of the Morrill College Act of the United States Congress, under which the University of Illinois enjoys financial support;

(c) The University of Illinois is partly supported by Federal appropriations:

(d) Compulsory military instruction is given by a United States officer paid by the War Department; and,

5. Whereas, The Trustees of the University of Illinois believe that this institution should not be included by the Board of Prison Industries in the list of State institutions covered by the "prison labor law," and that such purchase of supplies is a hardship to the University by reason of excessive prices and loss of time; be it

Resolved, That an opinion of the Attorney General be asked covering the

application of the "prison labor law" to the University of Illinois.

President James, Mr. Bullard and Mr. Lehman were on motion appointed a committee to present the resolution to the Attorney General.

WHEREAS, The College of Physicians and Surgeons, the medical department of the University of Illinois, is conducted as such by certain contractual relations by which it is to be acquired at the end of the period of contract; be it

Resolved, That the opinion of the Attorney General be asked covering the application of the "prison labor law" to the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

TIME FOR PRINTING MINUTES OF BOARD MEETINGS.

On motion of Mr. Lehman the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board hereby renews its instruction to its Secretary to print and distribute the minutes of each Board meeting within ten days after adjournment and sooner, if practicable, in order to facilitate the prompt transaction of University business.

ATHLETICS AT THE UNIVERSITY.

At the suggestion of President James, the following was adopted: Whereas, There have appeared in the public prints charges that many of the larger institutions of learning of the country, this University among others, are using unworthy means of increasing their success in athletics, and thus admitting the spirit of professionalism into such contests; and,

Whereas, It is believed by many people that the dangers from injury to those engaging in the more severe athletic exercises of colleges should be

reduced or the rougher games abolished entirly; therefore,

It is hereby ordered that a committee of five be appointed from this Board, with instructions to examine into and report to this Board upon the condition of athletics in this University, together with any recommendations which the committee may desire to make.

Mr. Bullard was by motion made chairman of the committee, and the committee was filled by the appointment of Mrs. Alexander and Messrs. Abbott, McLean and Davison.

EVENING SCHOOL IN ACCOUNTANCY.

Mrs. Alexander, from the Committee on Evening School in Accountancy, reported progress, and asked for further time. The request was granted.

Purchasing Agent.

It was voted that the salary of the Purchasing Agent, when appointed, should be \$1,800 a year.

ADVISORY BOARD OF THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

A communication was received from the Illinois State Pharmaceutical Association recommending several persons from whom a member of the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy might be chosen. The letter was referred to President James.

Installation Committees.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Bullard was adopted:

Resolved, That the amount of labor involved in preparing and executing the program for the week's exercises in connection with the installation of President James, and the very acceptable manner in which the work was done, make it a duty and pleasure for this Board to acknowledge the gratuitous services rendered by the general committee and the several sub-committees having this work in charge; and especially the efficient work of the chairman of the general committee, Dean Kinley. And this Board hereby expresses its thanks to each member of the several committees and commends them for the unstinted labor given to make the week's exercises the greatest ever held at the University.
