Meeting of March 13, 1906.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, March 13, 1906.

The members present were Messrs. Abbott, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, Lehman, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber and Bayliss. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the regular meeting of December 19, 1905, and the special meeting of January 30, 1906. These were approved as presented.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Election of officers for the ensuing year being in order, on motion of Mrs. Evans, Mr. Bullard was elected President.

On motion of Mr. McLean, W. L. Pillsbury was elected Corresponding and Recording Secretary and Registrar.

Mr. Lehman and Mrs. Alexander were elected to constitute, with the President of the Board, the Executive Committee.

Professor Shattuck was elected Comptroller.

O. E. Staples was elected Chief Clerk.

BOND OF PURCHASING AGENT.

The bond of Mr. Nathaniel Hay, Purchasing Agent, in the sum of \$10,000.00, by the American Surety Company of New York, was presented by Mr. McLean, chairman of the Finance Committee, with the recommendation that it be approved and filed with the Secretary.

The recommendation was adopted.

AUDITORIUM.

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President James submitted letters from Mr. C. H. Blackall, the architect of the Auditorium, and Olmstead Brothers, who were invited by the authority of the Board of Trustees to inspect the campus of the University and make suggestions as to plans for the present and the future.

Mr. Lehman moved to concur in their recommendations.

Mr. Bullard offered the following substitute:

WHEREAS, the law making the appropriation for an auditorium building for the University states that the money cherein appropriated is for a complete auditorium building; and

WHEREAS, this Board is asking \$200,000.00 of the Legislature for an auditorium and music building had in view a single building so constructed that the music department could be accommodated in the building; and

WHEREAS, in appropriating \$100,000.00 for an auditorium it is evident that it was not made clear to the Legislature that a single building was desired but that two buildings were wanted so connected as to promote the interests and usefulness of both, one of which could readily be erected without the other; and,

WHEREAS, for the appropriation of \$100,000.00 only an incomplete auditorium can be erected, as evidenced by the proposals we have received from published calls for the erection of such a building; and,

published calls for the erection of such a building; and, WHEREAS, the building which has been planned and on which proposals have been received is not large enough for the purposes of an auditoruim in this University, the greatest seating capacity being 2,600 persons when it should be 3,500 persons; and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board in the erection of this building to conform to the law making the appropriation which calls for a complete building, and it is further good policy for this Board in all its actions to keep absolute good faith with the Legislature; and again it seems necessary to erect a larger building than our plans call for now; therefore,

It is hereby ordered that the erection of this building be postponed for fifteen months and until the next Legislature shall express its will upon the construction of this auditorium.

That the President of the University and the Board ask the Legislature to re-appropriate the \$100,000.00 already appropriated and appropriate \$150,000.00 more for the purpose of erecting a larger and complete building.

That in the event the Legislature refuses to enlarge the appropriation that it be asked to authorize this Board to erect this incomplete building as contemplated by the present plans.

That the contractor, who is the lowest bidder, be asked to enter into bonds for \$5,000 that he will take the building within fifteen months at his proposition now submitted, with the mutual privilege of increasing or decreasing the amount of the proposal by the increase or decrease of the cost as compared and made known by a *bona fide* schedule of his proposal which he is requested to present with his bond.

On motion of Mr. Abbott, the substitute was laid on the table by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Abbott, Davison, Kerrick, Lehman and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; no, Mr. Bullard; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber and Bayliss

Mr. Bullard offered the following substitute:

Ordered, that the architect be asked to restudy the scheme for an auditorium and present to this Board additional sketches for a complete auditorium as required by the law, and recommend a location for it on our campus.

For this Mr. Lehman offered the following substitute, which was adopted:

Ordered, that the architect be requested to restudy the scheme for the auditorium as to its south side, to be within the limit of appropriation, and to report forthwith.

The Board then took a recess until 2:00 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon Session March 13, 1906.

When the Board met after the recess, the same members were present as during the forenoon session.

On motion of Mr. Abbott, it was voted that when the Board adjourned for the day it adjourn until 9:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, and that the question of the Auditorium be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with instructions to report at that time.

STREET RAILWAY CROSSING CAMPUS.

The following letter was received with regard to allowing the street railway to cross the University campus:

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., March 2, 1906.

To the Trustees of the University of Illinois:

GENTLEMEN: In connection with the building of the new auditorum verbal communications have been carried on about our building a line for street cars across the University grounds between Daniel street on the west and California avenue on the east, passing between the Chemical and Agricultural buildings, and north of the Woman's building.

I submit herewith plat of the grounds at that point, showing the proposed line, and ask that the Board of Trustees authorize the President of the Board of Trustees to execute with us a contract giving permission to us to construct and operate this line for a period of twenty (20) years. The tract to be maintained in the manner of the tract now on Green street. It is important that this should have prompt action, therefore I will

ask that you give it such consideration.

With regard to this request, President James recommended that permission to cross the campus at the point indicated be granted. He further submitted certain recommendations as to the conditions on

1906]

which such permission should be granted; which after full discussion and after being amended in various particulars were adopted in the following form:

1. That prior to the construction of the track across the campus from California avenue to Daniel street the interurban road shall remove its tracks, poles, etc., from the present right of way across the campus to Springfield avenue, and it shall grade and sod the present right of way as the University may direct.

2. That the street car company as soon as its track across the campus from California avenue to Daniel street is available for use shall take up the rails' at present on Green street and resod the track from Matthews avenue to Wright street, provided that upon the demand of the Board of Trustees of the University the company shall restore the tracks upon Green street.

3. That the street car company in constructing its line across the campus from California avenue to Daniel street shall thereby admit the correctness of the claim always made by the University and indorsed by the Attorney General of the State that said street car company in crossing the campus is a "mere tenant at will" of the University and occupies said right of way at the discretion of the University; and that it hereby promises to vacate any crossing at the demand of the Board of Trustees of the University, especially that at any time after five years, upon six months' notice, it will change its line from California avenue to Daniel street to a point further south on the campus which may be designated by the Board of Trustees.

4. That the street car company shall erect within the University property at points to be designated by the Trustees, two neat and comfortable waiting rooms, one on each of the lines crossing the campus, the plans to be agreed upon between the company and the University.

5. That the company shall use trolley wire and poles of ornamental design approved by the University.

6. That the company shall issue such form of rules as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

7. That the company hereby agrees to accept and comply with such regulations as to signals, rate of speed in crossing the campus, points of stopping within the campus, etc., as the Board of Trustees of the University may determine.

8. That the company shall operate its cars on the ten-minutes interval at least up to 11:30 p.m. in such a way that the last cars from the campus for Urbana and Champaign respectively shall leave at least as late as 11:30 p.m.

President James and Mr. Abbott were appointed a committee to confer with the street car company with regard to this matter.

MATTERS SUBMITTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

The President submitted the following matters for the consideration of the Board.

1. The Head of the Department and the Dean of the Engineering School unite in nominating John Charles Thorpe as Assistant Professor of Stem Engineering, in place of Professor Randall, resigned, at a salary of \$1,700.00 per year, work and salary to begin Sept. 1, 1906.

Voted to adopt this recommendation.

2. The Head of the Department of Physical Culture urges that the salary of Mr. Hana, Assistant Director of Physical Training, be fixed for the coming year at \$1,000.00, to begin Sept. 1, 1906.

It was voted to adopt this recommendation.

3. The Professor of Psychology urges that an instructorship in Physiological Psychology be created in his department, with a salary not to exceed \$1,000.00 per year.

It was voted to adopt the recommendation, and that the President be authorized to select a suitable candidate for the place.

4. The Faculty of the College of Science recommends that an Administrative Board of Museums be created, consisting of the curators of the various collections now in the possession of the University, with general responsibility for the supervision and care of these collections.

It was voted to adopt the recommendation, and that the President be authorized to nominate the members of such board for the ensuing year.

5. The University Senate recommends that a new grade of instructor be established in the University, to be known as Associate, and of a rank between instructor and assistant professor, and that associates be appointed for a definite term of two years or more.

Voted that such recommendation be adopted.

6. The University Senate recommends that the Senate be enlarged so as to include all the full professors in the University.

Voted that such recommendation be adopted.

7. The University Senate recommends that the degree of bachelor of arts be conferred upon John C. Dallenbach at the next annual commencement. Mr. Dallenbach has taken up three years in the six-year medical course of this University and is now taking his fourth year in the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania.

Voted that this recommendation be adopted.

8. The following report, made to the Senate by its committee on educational policy upon the question of granting the bachelor's degree in the six years' medical course, was approved by the Senate March 5, 1906:

"Your committee has been asked by the Council of Administration to report to this body upon the inquiry whether it is sound educational policy for the University to decline to give its bachelor's degree to students who have taken here three years of our six years' medical course and have fulfilled the requirements for the fourth year of that course at some other medical college than the College of Physicians and Surgeons in Chicago. Your committee has carefully considered this question, and believes that it would be an injurious policy so to limit the University action in respect to this degree. The six years' course leading to two degrees was organized and offered for the primary purpose of inducing as large a number of prospective physicians as possible to take a sound scientific college training in connection with their professional studies. The effect of the suggested restriction would be to discourage from taking this course with us all those who do not intend to graduate in medicine at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and would thus defeat in a measure the purpose of the offering.

"According to our present system, a student who has taken his three years of medical work here, and a fourth year of work equivalent to that prescribed by us at a medical school of high standing, has earned his bachelor's degree and should not be deprived of his right merely because he has chosen one medical college rather than another. As the professional school itself cannot grant this degree, it must be given by the University or not at all."

9. The Director of the School of Music recommends that the salary of Mr. Van den Berg, instructor in piano, be fixed at \$1,500.00 for the academic year, 1906-07, beginning Sept. 1, 1906.

Voted to adopt this recommendation.

10. The Head of the Department of Modern Languages and the Dean of the College of Literature and Arts recommend that a position be created for the teaching of Spanish, the rank not to exceed Assistant Professor, at a salary not to exceed \$1,500.00.

Voted that the recommendation be adopted and that the President be authorized to nominate candidates for such position. 11. The Department of Physical Culture submits a petition that the old agronomy warehouse on the south campus, which has been abandoned by the Agricultural College, be assigned to the use of the athletic department and that the instructor of physical culture be authorized to make such changes in the building as are indicated in the schedule herewith submitted.

Voted to refer this subject to the Buildings and Grounds Committee with power to act.

12. Mr. Fred Atkinson, Superintendent of Grounds, has submitted his resignation to take effect as soon as may be convenient.

Voted that the President may accept the resignation as soon as he thinks best.

13. A suggestion has been made that it will be well to call a national conference to discuss the subject of fraternities and their place and function in modern university life.

It was voted that the President of the University be authorized to call such a national conference to meet at the University of Illinois during the latter part of October, 1906.

14. The Secretary of State, Mr. Elihu Root, has invited the President of the University to accept an appointment as one of the Government Commissioners to attend the Pan-American Congress to be held in Rio Janeiro, Brazil, beginning July 21, 1906. He states that it is not anticipated that the delegates will be kept away from this country later than the month of September.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to accept this appointment.

15. Mr. George S. Pope, late captain of Company E, University regiment, requests that he be allowed a rebate of one-half of the yearly military scholarship.

Voted that the request be denied.

16. A letter is herewith submitted from Professor Edward Kremers of the University of Wisconsin, on the subject of the School of Pharmacy of the University of Illinois.

Voted to refer the communication to the President of the University for consideration.

17. The Military Department requests permission to award the granting of the contract for military uniforms to the firm of Fred Kaufman of Chicago without further bids.

It was voted that the Comptroller and Commandant should call for bids for furnishing uniforms and report the results, with recommendations, to the Board.

18. The University of Aberdeen sends an invitation to the University to be represented at the celebration of its four hundredth anniversary to be held in the middle of the coming September.

Voted that Dean David Kinley be authorized to represent the University on such occasion.

19. I submit a communication from Dean Davenport as to desired changes in the agricultural building.

Voted to refer to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

20. I submit herewith a request from Professor Charles. C. Pickett of the Law School to be granted leave of absence on half pay during the academic year commencing September 1, 1906.

Professor Pickett has served the University continuously for a period of ten years.

Voted to grant this request.

The Geological Survey, through its director, H. Foster Bain, pro-21. poses that the Geological Survey be authorized to assume a portion of the salaries of Professor Parr and Professor Bartow during the remainder of this year, in return for which the University of Illinois will do certain work for the Geological Survey during the coming year.

Voted that the President of the University may make such distribution of salaries as he deems expedient.

22. Certain citizens of Champaign have submitted a request that the University give the use of thirty-three feet of land lying along the north side of the horticulture tract from Wright street to Fourth street, for a public street.

Voted that the Trustees regret that they can not see their way clear to granting this request.

23. At a meeting of the University Council held March 7th it was voted to request the Board of Trustees to permit the Council to award either two of the fellowships for the coming year with a stipend of \$300, or in their place three scholarships with a stipend of \$200 each.

Voted that this request be granted.

24. The resignation of Professor Charles F. Perry as Assistant Professor of Machine Construction to take effect June 30, 1906, is herewith submitted, with a recommendation from the Dean of the College of Engineering and the Professor of Mechanical Engineering, that such resignation be accepted and that the President be authorized to nominate a suitable man for the position of Assistant Professor of Machine Construction who will have charge of the mechanical shops, at a salary of \$1,800, from July 1, 1906, if a suitable man can be found by that time.

Voted that Professor Perry's resignation be accepted and that the further recommendations be approved.

25. The Department of Geology requests permission to appoint two assistant professors on half time instead of one assistant professor on full time.

Voted that such request be granted, and that the President be authorized to nominate men for such positions.

26. Col. Fechét asks authority to exchange the present cadet rifles for a new rifle proposed by the War Department; and recommends that a new bond be made out by the University covering the value of the entire outfit furnished to the University by the government.

Voted that such exchange of rifles be made, that the bond be made, and that the President of the Board be instructed to sign it on behalf of the University.

27. By authority given me by the Board of Trustees, I have made the following appointments, which are here reported in order that they may be made a matter of record:

Bradley Charles Gardner, student assistant in chemistry, at a salary of \$200.00 for the ten months beginning September 1, 1905.

Miss Helen V. Calhoun has been appointed continuation assistant at a salary of \$60.00 a month, beginning January 1, 1906. Mr. James Renwick Withrow has been appointed instructor in analytical

Mr. James Renwick Withrow has been appointed instructor in analytical chemistry in the place of Mr. Ovitz, transferred to the Engineering Experiment Station, at a salary of \$70.00 a month, beginning February 1 and running to July 1, 1906.

Mr. Perry Fox Trowbridge has been appointed instructor in general chemistry, in place of Mr. Withrow, at a salary of \$70.00 a month, beginning February 1 and running to July 1, 1906.

I have appointed Miss Jessie Jane Bullock as assistant in the department of mathematics to take charge of the class which Mr. Reddick would have taken during the second semester. She is to receive \$30.00 per month from February 1 to July 1, 1906.

The President of the Board was authorized to satisfy on the record a mortgage given by Angus McLennan, conveying the S. W. ¼ of Section 21, Township 19 North, Range 9 East of 3d P. M., to secure the payment of a part of the purchase money upon the sale of said tract of land, the purchase money having now been paid in full.

Your committee, to which was referred the following communications from C. H. Blackall, architect of the Auditorium, and Olmstead Brothers, who had been asked to consult with Mr. Blackall concerning the location of the building and plans of the grounds, submits herewith these communications:

An inspection of the items which I have suggested will show you that none of the changes affects in anywise either the stability of the building or its external appearance. The substitution of tin for the copper roofing is something which I believe would be justified by local conditions here, as I have every assurance that a tin roof would last from 15 to 20 years in your climate.

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I have also considered the possibility of further reductions in cost of building by cutting off the vestibule entirely. If this were practicable it might result in a saving of anywhere from \$12,000 to \$18,000, but this would preclude the possibility of adequate stairs to your balcony; it would necessitate the construction of a brick wall through a portion of the space now devoted to the vestibule, and would make it an expensive operation later on to revert to the original plan if so desired. I felt that this proposed reduction was so unwaranted by the practical considerations that I did not obtain a specific price for this. I would advise the acceptance of the bid of English Bros. on the basis given above.

In regard to the location of the building: I discussed it on the ground Saturday with Mr. Olmstead and he concurred with me in the location which I had previously indicated to you, i. e., with the north and south axis of the building on a line midway between the center of the front of the Agricultural Building and a line 50 feet to the west of the avenue of trees on Burrill avenue. The center of the dome would be located on the axis of Nevada street prolonged. This location would not necessitate changing any of the trees on Burrill avenue nor the avenue itself until such time as you would take up the laying out of the grounds on a more studied basis.

The prices which I have named in the statement for plumbing, heating, and electrical work are approximates and are not distinct bids. I believe the work can be done for the price which I have named, but I will revise the specification, putting in a 1-pipe system for heating, a wiring system on 440 volts, and will have prices to report to you later on this basis, but I can not feel it necessary to wait for this if you wish to award the building at once.

My recommendations would therefore be (1) that the contract be given to English Bros. for the general work at \$89,748.78, and (2) that the building be located on the axis of Nevada avenue and a new axis located between the Agricultural Building and Burrill avenue.

There is one point to which I wish to call your atention. In all of my calculations for the proportioning of the foundations, I assumed a fairly even quality of subsoil. I believe no borings have been made to determine the exact nature of the soil; consequently I am unable to say that the foundations are sufficient in case we should meet anything out of the ordinary run. I have no reason to believe, however, that this matter would cause you any added expense. Yours truly,

Dr. Edmund J. James, President University of Illinois.

DEAR SIR—As requested, we submit in advance of a more comprehensive report on the future arrangement of the University buildings and grounds our opinion as to the location proposed by Mr. C. H. Blackall for the new Auditorium.

We note that the Trustees have evidently planned to have two rows of buildings, with an open campus between them extending southward from University Hall. It is not so evident, but we judge that it must have been the idea that this arrangement would extend to the cross row of new permanent farm buildings, a distance of over 2400 feet.

Mr. Blackall proposes to interrupt this extraordinarily long campus by placing the new Auditorium in the middle of it. One justification for thus breaking the long campus in two is found in the low crosswise ridge that breaks the view. This ridge could be eliminated by grading, and it has been suggested that this should be done. The ridge, however, should be preserved, and its presence does justify, from an architectural standpoint, the forming of two quadrangles in place of one.

The Auditorium is designed as a permanent monumental building—one which will be a beautiful object, symmetrical, grand in scale, and sufficiently elaborate in detail to be interesting and effective, when fully completed, from whichever side it is seen. It is manifestly such a building as is thoroughly well adapted to a central symmetrical, commanding position in respect to all other buildings in the vicinity. It is not such a building as can just as well take a place in a miscellaneous row of buildings. In architectural character it will correspond in symmetry and ornamental effect to the great Low Library Building which forms the architectural center of the group of principal buildings of Columbia University, and therefore will probably be located in the middle of the great south campus.

We unhesitatingly approve of the general location proposed.

We have one recommendation as to its location in detail. This is that the center of the dome be placed on the center line (extended) of Nevada street. Heretofore no attention has been paid to relating the University buildings to the axis lines of intersecting streets. This we believe is a great mistake. The University grounds and the surrounding street system should be considered together from the esthetic point of view. The opportunity to place this fine dome so that it will be seen at the end of one street at least should not be lost.

In determining the position of the center of the Auditorium east and west, we advise as follows: Lay out along the east side of the new campus a new avenue with a double row of trees to correspond with Burrill avenue. Burrill avenue is not parallel with the Agricultural Building and the meridian. Therefore the new avenue should converge slightly toward the Auditorium so that it and Burrill avenue will be precisely symmetrical about the meridian line. The position of this avenue we determine arbitrarily by assuming that the east row of trees should be 50 feet from the middle of the west front of the Agricultural Building. The Auditorium should be in the middle of the space between the two avenues with its axis upon the meridian line.

Whenever University Hall is replaced by a larger and better building the new University Hall should center on the axis of the Auditorium building. The end pavilions of this future building should be designed so they will center one on Burrill avenue and the other on the new avenue.

CHANGES IN AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS.

Your committee had also before it the following communication from Dean Davenport, asking for changes in the agricultural buildings:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, March 8, 1906.

Edmund J. James, LL.D., President University of Illinois.

DEAR SIR-I beg to call attention to a matter requiring action of the Trustees.

The increased size of classes and the enlarged demands for laboratory space are making imperative some radical changes in the agricultural buildings. We have no room but Morrow Hall large enough for our largest classes, and we have been obliged this year to limit the numbers in certain laboratory courses.

After thorough discussion with all parties interested, and with Dr. Burrill, who has charge of room assignments, I recommend the following changes:

1. Main building; lower floor-

a. Enlarge N. W. class room by removing partition between that and the office room on the south. b. Move partition so as to put Professor Fraser's office in N. E. corner, deaden wall next to class room, and set entrance to

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dairy office out to end of main hall, saving space. c. Make entrance to agronomy store-room from main hall. d. Throw S. E. and S. W. laboratories together for farm crops work.

2. Main building; second floor—

a. Throw N. E. and N. W. laboratories together for work in soil fertility, making entrance at end of main hall. b. Divide ladies' toilet by partition, so that one-half, opening from the hall, may be available as professors' toilet, the other half to open from the ladies' dressing room, no change in plumbing except to reset one lavatory. c. Abandon present professors' toilet, making the room available for office uses. d. Move partition in ladies' rest room to avoid drip from piping above. e. Make vault next to offices for storage of horticultural records.

3. Dairy wing; second floor, former household science rooms-

a. Move partition dividing laboratories to one side, making the milk testing laboratory larger. This is a board partition and easily moved. b. Remove entry partition, now unnecessary, increasing space.

4. East wing—

Floor the space over stock judging room for class room, to be used for exceptionally large classes, especially in live stock. This is the largest and most expensive change proposed, as it involves flooring a space 44x70 feet, to be supported upon not more than two center columns, in order to obstruct the room below as little as possible.

5. Southwest wing—

Fit up for soil physics on lower floor, and farm crops on second floor.

All this should be done from the building portion of the agricultural funds, and the work should go forward as rapidly as possible consistent with the almost constant use of the building. As it is all small work and likely to be considerably drawn out, and as we need to control its progress with refer ence to noise and other interruptions to class work, I propose that the work be carried out in charge of the Superintendent of Buildings.

The recommendations of the committee with regard to the Auditorium were adopted.

The President of the Board was authorized to contract with English Brothers for the erection of the Auditorium on the basis of the above report.

LOCATION OF THE AUDITORIUM.

President James presented the following:

I recommend that the location of the Auditorium Building proposed by Mr. C. H. Blackall and approved by a representative of Olmstead Brothers as indicated in a letter of March 12th, appended to this recommendation, be hereby approved, and that the Auditorium be located in such a way that the center of the dome be placed on the center line extended, of Nevada street; and that the axis of the Auditorium be upon the meridian line of the space between two avenues, the present Burrill avenue and a new avenue projected on the eastern side of the south campus, whose east row of trees should be fifty feet from the middle of the west front of the Agricultural Building.

The recommendation was approved, and the location described adopted.

SUPERINTENDENT OF AUDITORIUM CONSTRUCTION.

It was voted that Professor J. M. White be allowed to act for Mr. Blackall as superintendent of the construction of the Auditorium.

CHANGES IN AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS.

It was moved to approve the recommendations of the committee as to the agricultural buildings. To this motion Dr. Davison moved as an amendment to omit the floor in the stock judging room. This amendment was lost, and the motion to approve the recommendation of the committee was adopted.

EVENING SCHOOL OF ACCOUNTANCY.

The special committee, appointed to consider the question of establishing an Evening School of Accountancy in Chicago, made the following report, which was adopted:

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

Your special committee on Evening School of Accountancy reports that it finds no funds available for the purpose of such a school, and recommends that action be deferred for the present.

After consideration of recommendations made by Olmstead Brothers, presented by George Gibbs, Jr., of their office, with reference to street car service, on motion of Mr. Lehman the following was adopted:

Voted that there be included in the statement made in reply to a request of the Urbana and Champaign Railway, Gas and Electric Company for permission to cross the University grounds from California avenue to Daniel street that the Board wishes the double service on Wright street, and also that the University campus be crossed on a line south of the proposed Auditorium site, just north of the observatory.
