Meeting of March 12, 1907.

The regular annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University in Urbana, March 12, 1907.

When the board met, the following members were present: Messrs. Abbott, Blair, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, Lehman, Madden and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Mr. McLean. President James was present.

The minutes of the meetings of December 11, 1906 and January 22, 1907 were presented by the secretary and approved as printed.

Mr. Bullard, the retiring president, then withdrew.

W. L. Pillsbury, secretary, called the board to order. He announced that Mrs. Alexander and Messrs. Hatch and Lehman, who had been elected members of the board at the regular election in November, 1906, had taken the prescribed oath of office and stated that the first business in order was the election of a president for the ensuing year.

Mr. Abbott nominated Mr. Kerrick for president, and, there being no other nominations, the secretary was directed to cast the ballot of the board for Mr. Kerrick. This was done, and Mr. Kerrick took the chair.

W. L. Pillsbury was elected corresponding and recording secretary and registrar for the ensuing year, on motion of Mrs. Busey.

Mr. Helge A. Haugan was elected treasurer for the ensuing two years, and it was voted that his bond should be fixed at one million dollars, the same to be approved by the Finance Committee.

On motion of Dr. Davison, Mr. Lehman and Mrs. Alexander were elected to constitute with the president of the board the Executive Committee.

President E. J. James was elected president of the University for the ensuing two years.

Professor S. W. Shattuck was elected comptroller for the ensuing year.

Mr. O. E. Staples was elected chief clerk in the business office for the ensuing year, at a salary of \$1600. His bond was fixed at \$20,000, the same to be approved by the Finance Committee and paid for out of University funds. 1907]

RESOLUTION REGARDING MR. BULLARD.

Mr. Kerrick offered the following resolution, which, after remarks by the members of the board and President James, was adopted:

WHEREAS, By the expiration of his term of office Hon. Samuel A. Bullard retires from our councils; therefore be it

Resolved, That we record our high appreciation of his eighteen years of faithful, strenuous, and valuable service to the University; that as a fellowworker, as president of the board, and as a friend and companion he has fairly won our lasting esteem and friendship; that his unselfish labors in upbuilding this University entitle him to the gratitude of every citizen of Illinois and of the laborer everywhere in the cause of education; that our good will goes with him and will follow him for aye.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

1. Dr. C. G. Hopkins, head of the department of Agronomy, requests the appointment of Mr. E. K. Nelson as assistant in chemistry at the Experiment Station, with a salary at the rate of \$1,000 a year, work and salary to begin immediately. This request is made with the understanding that if Mr. Nelson's work is successful he will be recommended for the academic year beginning September 1, 1907, at a salary of \$1,200 a year. The director of the Experiment Station approves the request of Dr. Hopkins.

Voted that the president be authorized to make such appointment, if in his judgment it seem best.

2. The University Council begs to submit the following draft of proposed regulations concerning University purchases. These regulations are in pursuance of an action of the board requiring all purchases to be made through the purchasing agent.

Voted that said regulations be referred to the Finance Committee of the board for full consideration and report.

3. The Dean of the College of Science submits certain recommendations for the establishment of a department of bacteriology in the College of Science.

Voted that the full consideration of this matter be postponed until after the legislative appropriations have been made for the coming biennium.

4. Professor W. A. Noyes recommends that Mr. Clarence G. Derick be appointed research and lecture assistant to the Director of the Chemical Laboratory for the year 1907-8 at a salary of \$800 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1907.

Voted that the president of the University be authorized to make such appointment, if in his judgment it seem best.

5. The Dean of the College of Science submits a proposed course in sanitary science, approved by the College of Science and the University Senate.

Voted that the full consideration of this matter be postponed until after the appropriation bills for the ensuing biennium have been passed.

STATE WATER SURVEY.

6. Dr. Edward Bartow, director of the State Water Survey, submits a report of the work of coöperation between this survey and the United States Geological Survey.

Voted that said report be printed in the minutes of the board.

DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of January 9, 1907, to Mr. W. D. Collins, I beg to submit a report of the work of the Illinois Coöperation during the first half of the present fiscal year, a statement of expenditures to January 1, 1907, having been already submitted.

Referring to that part of the contract which indicates the general object of the coöperation work, I will say that:

(Paragraph 9). Twenty-six stations have been established on rivers in Illinois. For their location see page 25, Annual Report of State Water Survey. Daily samples have been r ceived from these stations and 300 analyses of composite samples made by Mr. Collins and assistants.

(Paragraph 10). Twenty-three samples of water from the East St. Louis district, extending from Alton on the north to Belleville on the south, have been sent in by the State Geological Survey and mineral analyses have been made by the same. Six samples from the Eldorado District. collected by Mr. DeWolfe, and two samples from Peoria, collected by Mr. J. A. Udden, have been sent in by the State Geological Survey and have been analyzed. In addition 51 analyses of the mineral content of waters, mostly from deep wells, have been made.

(Paragraph 11). Very little work has been done on boiler water experiments. This work is now under way and will be carried on during the next six months.

(Paragraph 12). Examinations of water from public water supplies have been made according to standard methods of the American Public Health Association. A series of analyses was made of water in the valley of the Vermilion river, of wells of different depths in Chicago, of various wells in Joliet, and of samples collected along the shore of Lake Michigan from Waukegan to Lake Forest.

Following our preliminary investigation at Waukegan, a report of which has been sent to you, the Corn Products Refining Company has taken up some experimental work in the disposal of waste from their plant. An experimental plant has been erected, which will be ready for test about February 1. Our own experiments would indicate that the waste products which are being passed into the Lake might be profitably treated by the company.

(Paragraph 13). Through the Illinois Coöperation and through the courtesy of Mr. Kellerman of the Bureau of Plant Physiology of the Department of Agriculture, three reservoirs have been treated for algae. One at Bloomington and one at Danville have been treated with entire success, and one at Galesburg with partial success. Complaint as to taste in the water at Kankakee led to investigation of the water from the river which was found to contain Synura. This protozoan was traced up the Kankakee river above Momence. It is our belief that it comes from a recently drained district in northern Indiana; but owing to high water which removed the taste we were compelled to discontinue the investigation. There were also carried on some scientific investigations, of which one, entitled "Chemical Examination of Water Bacteria," has been forwarded to you, and which is to be published in the Proceedings of the American Public Health Association.

(Paragraph 7). Mr. I. Bowman and Mr. C. A. Reeds have made a study of the occurrence and quality of the water in the East St. Louis Quadrangle. Their report is ready, illustrations are being prepared, and it will be issued soon.

Besides the above, 795 sanitary-chemical, and 457 bacteriological analyses have been made in this laboratory.

LABORATORY OF PHYSIOLOGICAL CHEMISTRY.

Professor Mumford, head of the department of Animal Husbandry in the 7. Agricultural Experiment Station, submits the following recommendations:

Dean and Director Eugene Davenport:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, March 11, 1907.

Dean and Director Eugene Davenport: DEAR SIR—I recommend that there be established a Laboratory of Physiological Chemistry in the department of Animal Husbandry. That the Laboratory should have charge of the chemical work naturally arising in the Animal Husbandry department and such other investigations as it may seem wise for the department to undertake. That Dr. H. S. Grindley be appointed chemist of this Laboratory dating from September first next, with a salary of \$2,750 the first year and \$3,000 thereafter; and that his official title be Chief in Animal Chemistry in the Agricultural Experi-ment Station and Professor of Animal Chemistry in the College of Agriculture. That there also be created in this Laboratory the following positions: (1) As-sistant Chief of Physiological Chemistry in the Experimental Station and Assist-ant Professor of Physiological Chemistry in the College, to be filled by the same person at a salary of \$2,000: (2) A Bacteriologist in the College of Science to be paid from the funds of the Experiment Station at a salary of \$1,200. Trusting that these recommendations may meet your approval, I am Verv respectfully yours.

Very respectfully yours, HERBERT W. MUMFORD, Professor of Animal Husbandry.

Voted that said plan be approved in general, and that Professor Grindley be appointed to said professorship at the salary indicated; and that the president of the University be authorized to submit nominations for the other positions created by this act.

Voted further, that the president of the University be authorized to nominate a successor to Professor Grindley in the department of chemistry in the College of Science.

8. Professor Rolfe, head of the Department of Ceramics, recommends that Mr. A. V. Bleininger, assistant professor of ceramics in the Ohio State University, be appointed assistant professor of ceramics in the University of Illinois at a salary of \$2,000 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1907.

Voted that such appointment be made.

BASEBALL GRAND STAND.

9. Mr. George Huff, director of physical training, asks for permission to erect a baseball grand stand on Illinois Field. The stand will be located north and east of the baseball diamond. It is planned to erect a wooden L-shaped structure, which will be approximately 150 feet in length and 60 feet in depth. The cost will be approximately \$5,000.

Voted that such permission be given.

10. Professor John M. Truman has submitted his resignation as assistant professor of dairy husbandry in the University of Illinois, to take effect April 1, 1907.

Voted that said resignation be accepted.

CONNECTING UNIVERSITY AND BELL TELEPHONE EXCHANGES.

11. Professor Morgan Brooks recommends that the offer herewith submitted from the Central Union Telephone Company to make a working connection with our University automatic exchange be accepted.

Voted that the same be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

DEAR SIR—Confirming my several conversations with you relative to connecting your branch exchange with the Bell exchange, will say that our rate schedule is \$3.50 per month per line for this class of service. In lieu of your furnishing any automatic equipment, coils, etc., needed in addition to the Bell equipment, we will furnish you five (5) trunk lines at \$3 per month each —total \$180 per year.

MY DEAR MR. ABBOTT—I enclose copy of offer from the Central Union Telephone Company (the Bell Company) proposing a connection with our automatic exchange for \$180 a year, over five trunk lines, which we estimate to be adequate for present needs. As the only office of that company is the one at Champaign, less time is taken in making local connections than would otherwise be the case. The only question I have in regard to the adequacy of five trunk lines lies in the extended use of long distance lines, which hold a trunk busy for some time.

I am sending the original offer to President James, with a strong recommendation for the trustees to accept the offer. It is so very favorable, that I can only think it due to the desire on the part of the new management of 1907]

the Bell Company to do what they can to prevent losing custom upon the inauguration of the new automatic exchange of the Home Telephone Company.

If the offer be accepted, as I hope it will be, all present Bell telephones might be discontinued, as soon as the new service is properly established, but I recommend that the telephone in the president's office be retained, as an independent means of reaching the Bell office, especially in view of the large amount of long distance business transacted from the president's office. Our present payments to the Bell Company for local service amounts to \$258 per year, and their proposal, together with retaining the president's office would be \$234, a saving of \$24, together with the extension of the service to all present or future stations of the University private exchange. Of course if we extend materially, more trunk wires would be needed, but as practically all of important offices are now connected, additional telephones would be of the nature of inter-department service rather than any great extension of the down-town business.

This offer does not exclude our connecting with the Home Company's automatic, although the Bell manager wanted to make this restriction. I believe in as full telephone service as possible, and it will certainly be a great convenience to have but a single instrument on one's desk for communication with both companies. I do not know of any other place where this is allowed. As a trustee's meeting is to come next Tuesday, I hope this may be passed then.

REPORT OF STUDENTS' FEES.

1. Of fees for the summer session of the College of Medicine, 1906.

Of fees of University students at Urbana for the first semester, 1906-7.
 Of fees of Academy students for the same semester.

The report was referred to the Finance Committee.

RUNNING TRACK IN GYMNASIUM.

Mr. Abbott, of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, reported that the weakness in the running track in the gymnasium referred to in Mr. N. S. Spencer's letter received at the meeting of June 12, 1906, (p. 143) had been satisfactorily remedied so that the track might now be safely used for seating spectators.

PETITION FOR EASTER RECESS.

A petition from many students asking for a recess at Easter was referred to the council with the request that it be granted if it can be done consistently.

FURTHER MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

PHYSICS LABORATORY BUILDING.

12. As it appears reasonably certain that the University will obtain an appropriation from the present Legislature for the construction of a physics laboratory, it is desirable that the question of location, general plan of building, etc., be taken up as soon as convenient.

Voted that the president of the board appoint a commission similar to that which was appointed in the case of the Auditorium, consisting of members of the board and members of the faculty and representatives of the alumni, to make a report to the board upon the proper location of the physics laboratory, the general plan for the building, and to submit such other recommendations in regard to this matter as may seem to them wise.

13. Professor Baker, chairman of the executive committee of the Alumni Association, submits a communication, asking for an appropriation in support of the Alumni Quarterly.

Voted that the consideration of said communication be postponed until a later date.

14. Mr. B. W. Breneman, Assistant Professor in the School of Music, requests leave of absence for two years for the purpose of prosecuting further the study of music in Europe.

The director of the music school states that in view of the changes which may take place in such length of time and because of the many contigencies which may arise in connection with the continued growth of the school, it seems to him unwise to grant this request.

Voted that the board cannot see its way clear to granting this request.

15. Mr. Stephen S. Gregory is hereby nominated to the board of trustees as a member of the board of examiners in accountancy.

Voted that such appointment be made.

16. The following persons are nominated for University fellowships for the year 1907-8:

In Economics, H. D. Brownson.

In German, Miss Gertrude Jaeck.

History, Clarence E. Carter.

Voted that these appointments be made and that the president be authorized to fill the other University fellowships by appointing persons recommended by the faculty of the graduate school.
