Meeting of September 10, 1907.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University in Urbana, September 10, 1907.

When the board met the following members were present: Messrs. Davison, Hatch, Lehman, and McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen, and Messrs. Abbott, Blair, and Madden. President James was present.

President Abbott being absent the board was called to order by Mr. McLean, who was elected president *pro tem*.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the special meeting of June 4, 1907; of the regular meeting of June 10, 1907; of the meeting of the Executive Committee of June 28, 1907; of the special meeting of July 6, 1907; of the adjourned session of the same held July 12, 1907; of the special meeting of July 20, 1907; and the special meeting of August 21, 1907. These minutes were approved as presented, except that it was ordered that the yea and nay vote taken on the proposition to condemn the Bronson block (see page 172) should be entered of record as follows: Yeas, Messrs. Abbott, Lehman, and Madden and Mrs. Evans. Nays, Messrs. Hatch and McLean and Mrs. Busey.

Appropriations for State Entomologist.

The secretary stated that the Auditor of Public Accounts had decided that money appropriated for the State Entomologist's office would properly be paid into the treasury of the University and disbursed under the direction of the Board of Trustees of the University. He said that some \$5,000 of this appropriation had already teen transmitted to the treasurer of the University.

The plan for the administration of the fund presented from Professor Forbes at the meeting of July 20th (see page 165) is as follows:

July 19, 1907.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

I respectfully request that the following assignments be made from appropriations made by An Act to provide for the office of the State Entomologist, to define its duties, and to extend its equipment, passed by the State Legislature at its last session.

For expenses incurred by the State Entomologist under An Act to Prevent the introduction and spread in Illinois of the San Jose scale and other dangerous insects and contagious diseases of fruits, \$5,000.00.

For an addition to the insectary wings of the State Entomologist's building on the University campus, \$500.00.

Also the following allowances for salaries of assistants for the year beginning July 1, 1907:

Charles A. Hart, \$1,000.00; an additional \$500.00 of his salary to be paid from the funds of the State Laboratory of Natural History.

James A. West, \$1,200.00.

John J. Davis, \$1,100.00.

For the salaries of additional assistants, for furniture and equipment, for the expenses of field, laboratory, and office operations, and for the preparation, publication and illustration of bulletins and reports, the sum of \$4,100.00 for the quarter ending September 30, 1907.

EXAMINATION OF THE ELECTRIC PLANT.

President Abbott, in a communication to the board, stated that in his judgment the recent fatal accident in which Mr. L. H. Carter lost his life, made it desirable that there should be a thorough examination of the electric plant and asked that an appropriation of \$50.00 be made for that purpose, and that he be authorized to appoint the inspector of the Edison Company, in Chicago, to make the examination.

Authority was given and an appropriation of \$50.00 was made.

SITE FOR PHYSICS LABORATORY.

The secretary also presented a communication from President Abbott with regard to the site of the physics laboratory, recommending that no steps be taken to condemn the Bronson block and that the Y. M. C. A. lot be chosen for the site.

At this time the secretary was excused from further attendance at the meeting of the board in order that he might look after registration affairs which were pressing.

Mr. Lehman was appointed secretary, pro tem.

President Abbott's recommendations were both adopted on motion of Mr. Lehman.

NEW BUILDINGS.

On motion of Dr. Davison it was voted that no further steps be taken in the erection of the new buildings until after the adjourned meeting of the Legislature.

On motion of Dr. Davison it was voted that the Board of Trustees of the University shall request the Legislature to grant exemption from the operation of the law regarding the State Architect, and his duties, and that the special committee appointed at a previous meeting of the board on legislation be instructed to urge this matter upon the Legislature.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

FENCING HORTICULTURAL GROUNDS.

1. At a previous meeting of the Board the question of fencing the horticultural grounds was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act. Through a misunderstanding Professor Blair, upon the authority of the president of the University; gave directions to close a contract for the purchase of said fence for the sum of \$4,569.65. The board at its meeting on July 20th appropriated for this purpose only \$4,000.00.

Dr. Davison moved that the matter be referred to the Agricultural Committee with power to act. On motion a consideration of the matter was postponed until the afternoon session.

NUTRITION INVESTIGATIONS.

2. I present herewith for printing in the minutes a brief report from Professor H. S. Grindley in regard to the progress of the nutrition investigations: *President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:*

Sir—I respectfully submit herewith a report of the progress of our nutrition investigations for the last two months. Detailed plans for the curing of all the meats used in the saltpeter investigation have been perfected. The plans so devised meet the approval of the best practical authorities in the country on the subject, and the plans have also received the approval of the commission appointed by yourself to assist in this work. We have already with the assistance of Mr. L. D. Hall of the animal husbandy department cured 1,500 pounds of meat products in our own cold storage rooms here with success. The meats so cured are to be used in our experiments.

The details for the medical examination, the bacteriological work, and the chemical investigations have been worked out in full, and they have been duly approved by the members of the commission.

Houses numbers 1106 and 1108 Illinois street have been rented, and are now being overhauled and furnished in a cheap but substantial way for the housing of the twenty-four men of the Nutrition Club. These quarters when equipped will be excellently well suited to our purpose, since they give us ample room and are so close to the Chemical Laboratory and Agricultural Building, where the scientific studies connected with this research will be made.

At present we are busy attempting to select from the seventy-five men who have made application to become members of the Nutrition Club, a club of twenty-four men of average health and development. It is our present intention to be able to select these men finally by the 17th to 20th of September, and as fast as they are finally selected they will be given rooms in the above houses. However, it will not be possible actually to start the boarding of these men until probably about the first of October.

We have arranged to have a matron in charge of the houses and a chef in charge of the kitchen. In addition, three or four of the men connected with the management of the investigation will room and board at the Nutrition Club, in order that the work may be carried on with the greatest degree of accuracy.

It was ordered that the report be printed in the minutes.

3. Professor J. H. Pettit of the College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station requests leave of absence without pay from the University for the year beginning October 1, 1907, for the purpose of studying in Germany.

Voted that such leave be granted.

4. The board at its meeting on July 6th authorized the appointment of an associate in philosophy at a salary of \$1,500.00. After extensive canvassing of the field it was found that by increasing the title from associate to that of assistant professor, the services of Dr. Guy Tawney could be secured for this sum. I have therefore offered the position of assistant professor of philosophy at a salary of \$1,500.00 to Dr. Guy Tawney, subject to the approval of the board.

On motion of Mrs. Evans this recommendation was concurred in.

5. Professor S. A. Forbes requests that the Trustees shall make an appropriation of \$1,000.00 to enable the State Laboratory of Natural History to print its accumulated bulletins and reports. In return for this grant the State Laboratory of Natural History will assume a portion of the salary of Professor Frank Smith to the extent of \$500.00 per annum for the present and the succeeding academic year, namely: from September 1, 1907, to August 31, 1909. Professor Smith will do certain investigation work for the Natural History survey.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander the recommendation was approved.

SUMMER SESSION, 1907.

6. I present a brief report of the work of the summer session by the director:

President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:

SIR-I wish respectfully to submit below a report of the work of the summer session for 1907:

In December, 1906, the Board of Trustees made an appropriation of \$15,000.00 for the conduct of the summer session. They voted, also, to award free scholarships to all high school teachers in Illinois, and to all other teachers in the State who could matriculate in the University. Of the amount appropriated something over \$12,000.00 has been used. This amount has been divided approximately as follows:

 Salaries for instruction
 \$10,000 00

 Special lecturers
 800 00

 Circulars, bulletins, postage, etc.

The general plan and arrangement for the conduct of the session was under the control of a committee, consisting of Professors Barton, Hollister, Barto, Dexter and myself as chairman. This committee decided upon the departments to be represented in the session, and the amount of money to be expended in each. Twenty-five departments were this year represented, and 119 courses were offered by fifty-seven instructors. Daily lectures were offered by prominent men outside of the University during the first six weeks, and a series of twelve special lectures was given by members of our own faculty. The total registration was 555. About 350 of these were teachers of whom 273 availed themselves of the free scholarships, and practically every county in Illinois was represented. This year about twenty-five teachers from the Chicago schools were in attendance, which has not occurred before. The registration in the various departments is indicated below:

It is interesting to note the very large registration in mathematics modern

It is interesting to note the very large registration in mathematics, modern languages and English. There is an indication, also, that we might very well increase the work offered in history, economics, and political science.

I believe that more *esprit de corps* was shown by the members of the summer session than ever before. The literary societies held regular meetings Saturday evenings; there was an interest manifested in all kinds of athletics; and the social and intellectual energy shown was unusual. Every teacher to whom I talked expressed himself as thoroughly well pleased with the University and the work that was offered.

In think we might enlarge our influence if it seemed advisable to offer scholarships to all teachers who could matriculate, whether they come from Illinois or not.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

7. Recommendations from Dean Eugene Davenport.

(a) That Mr. A. C. Beal be made first assistant in florticulture in the Experiment Station at a salary of \$1,600.00 for one year.

On motion of Mr. Hatch this recommendation was approved.

(b) That Professor Leonard Hegnaur's time be divided between his present duties and extension work.

On motion of Mr. Hatch this recommendation was approved.

(c) That Mr. A. J. Bill be engaged as a lecturer in the extension work.

Voted to postpone the consideration of this item.

(d) That the president be authorized to appoint a successor to Miss Ruth A. Wardall, resigned, in the department of domestic science.

On motion of Mrs. Evans this recommendation was approved.

(e) That five deputy sheriffs be appointed for the protection of University property and that the expense of the bonds amounting to \$7.50 be paid by the University.

On motion of Mrs. Busey this recommendation was approved.

(f) That the temporary employment of Mr. J. K. Plummer as assistant in the Experiment Station in the place of E. K. Nelson, resigned, be authorized.

This recommendation was approved.

8. Prof. Victor T. Wilson and Mr. R. B. Otis, both of the department of General Engineering Drawing, have resigned since the last meeting of the board. It is necessary, therefore, to reorganize this department. The dean of the College of Engineering makes the following recommendations: That Mr. C. L. McMaster be appointed associate in charge of the department at a salary of \$1,200.00 per annum, work and salary to begin September 1, 1907; that Mr. C. B. Gibbons be appointed instructor at \$800.00 per annum; that Mr. C. R. Dick be appointed instructor at \$800.00; Mr. Sherwood Hinds, instructor at \$900.00 per annum; and Mr. F. M. Porter, assistant, at \$750.00 per annum.

On motion of Mrs. Busey this recommendation was concurred in.

9. Letter from the Registrar recommending Miss Hulda C. Witte for a University scholarship.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander, Miss Witte and Francis A. Cline were granted scholarships for one year; and it was voted that hereafter attendance at the summer session shall be considered attendance at the University.

10. Request from Professor Shattuck for an increase in salary.

On motion of Mrs. Evans Prof. Shattuck's salary was increased by \$500.00.

Recess until 2 p. m.

Afternoon Session, September 10, 1907.

When the board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning.

The following resolution offered by Mr. McLean was adopted:

Resolved, That all matters referred to a committee of this board shall be fully set forth and that they shall report in regular form their action, said report to be signed by the members of such committee agreeing thereto.

The following resolution offered by Mr. McLean was adopted:

Resolved, That our records hereafter shall show by whom any motion was made and action had thereon.

FENCE ON HORTICULTURAL GROUNDS.

The Committee on Agriculture reported as follows:

The Committee on Agriculture report that they do not approve of committees letting contracts without authority from the board and they make no recommendations as to-what shall be done with the fence contracts.

On motion of Mr. Hatch the sum of \$569.65 was appropriated to cover the cost of the fence around the horticultural grounds, Mrs. Busey voting no.

MATTERS SUBMITTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

11. The opportunity of purchasing a good working classical collection for the library at a reasonable price is now offered to the University. The library of the late Professor Doctor Dittenberg of the University of Halle is offered to the University by Rudolph Haupt, a bookseller of Leipsic, for the sum of 10,000 marks. The bookseller offers to pack and ship the books at the expense of the University. This may cost \$500.00 more. Deans Kinley and Greene and Professors Moss and Barton unite in recommending that this library be purchased.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander it was voted that \$2,500 or so much thereof as may be necessary be appropriated for the purchase of this collection.

12. The following persons have been recommended by the faculty of the Graduate School upon the nomination of the Director of the Engineering \mathbf{Ex}_{i} periment Station for appointments as research fellows, for the academic year beginning September 1, 1907:

13. Dr. T. J. Burrill requests an appropriation of 1,400.00 for expenses in the department of botany.

On motion of Mr. Hatch this amount was appropriated.

14. Professor S. A. Forbes asks for an appropriation of \$585.00 for laboratory assistance in the department of zoölogy.

On motion of Mr. Hatch this sum was appropriated.

15. Request from the editor of University Studies for an appropriation of 1,200.00 per annum for the expense of preparing and printing said Studies.

On motion of Mrs. Evans this sum was appropriated.

16. At its meeting on July 6th the board authorized the appointment of an instructor in the Woman's Gymnasium at a salary of \$800.00. I found that it would be necessary to pay \$850.00 to Miss Gertrude Moulton, whom we desired to obtain. I offered her, therefore, the sum of \$850.00, being an increase of \$50, subject to the approval of the board.

On motion of Mr. Lehman this action was approved.

17. The dean of the Engineering College recommends that Dr. F. R. Watson be appointed assistant to the dean of the College of Engineering, in addition to his present duty as assistant professor in the department of physics, his remuneration as assistant to the dean being at the rate of \$300.00 a year, beginning September 1, 1907.

On motion of Mr. Hatch this recommendation was concurred in.

18. I recommend that the following assignment of funds appropriated for the maintenance of the Graduate School be made:

Incidental expenses in the office of the Dean of the School, \$1,000.00. Expenses for special investigations and research work, to be assigned on approval of the president of the University, \$5,000.00

Request of Mr. F. K. W. Drury, Acting Librarian, for a refund of \$9.15 stolen from his order desk in the library on June 10, 1907. It appears that this money was paid by professors to the librarian for books which had been ordered for them by the librarian.

Voted that the trustees do not consider themselves responsible for funds of this sort, and that any money so accepted by the librarian or paid by professors is entirely at the risk of the parties concerned.

DEATH OF LEIGH H. CARTER.

I submit a brief statement from Dean Eugene Davenport concerning the death of Leigh H. Carter, a student in the Agricultural College.

URBANA, ILL., September 9, 1907.

Edmund J. James, President University of Illinois:

DEAR MR. PRESIDENT—I beg leave to report the circumstances connected with the death of Mr. Leigh H. Carter at the University creamery on the afternoon of August 27th.

Mr. Carter was engaged in cleaning a chandelier in the engine room. The ceiling was high and a ladder was placed against a beam to enable him to reach the upper portion of the work. He had been at work upon the ladder for considerable time, when about 4:30, Mr. Potter, working in another portion of the same wing, heard a cry of distress and hurrying to the engine room found Mr. Carter standing upon the engine, leaning heavily against the chandelier which had been pushed against the ladder by his weight. Mr. Potter, fearing an electric shock, pushed the ladder to one side, intending to catch the body as it fell. This he only partially succeeded in doing, and the body struck heavily upon the cement floor, face down. It seemed rigid at the time of the fall. Mr. Potter thinking perhaps Mr. Carter had fainted dashed some water in his face, and started for help. Drs. Stanley and Bain were upon the ground in a few minutes, and Dr. Lindley of Urbana, a short time afterwards. The doctors worked upon the body for an hour and half, using every known means of restoration of life, but without effect. He neither spoke nor made any noise after the first cry.

The cause of this sad death seems shrouded in mystery. The verdict of the coroner's jury was substantially that Mr. Carter met his death by coming in contact with a live wire while in discharge of his duties; but the physicians would not commit themselves as to the cause of his death. It is true the chandelier was torn from its fastenings, but the test made immediately afterward under the direction of Dean White showed a current of but 236 volts: It is significant that Mr. Carter was standing on the same spot on the engine and doing the same work that had been done many times before, and that he, himself, had done the afternoon previous. The current of the chandelier is turned on and off by a wall button, and of course there is no positive evidence as to the condition of this switch at the time of the accident, though no lights were burning. The engine was unused and had no connection with electric power. He fell from a position of at least four feet above the floor, and the shock in falling must have been severe, for the head which struck first the distance must have been much further.

It is significant in this connection that while the voltage of the lighting system in this building is 220, the highest voltage on the University ground, even for power purposes outside the electrical laboratory is 440.
