The secretary reported that the president of the board had notified him of the appointment of Mr. Lehman as Chairman of the Committee on Finance in place of Mr. McLean, deceased, and of the appointment of Mrs. Busey as a member of the committee.

#### STUDENT'S FEES.

The registrar presented a statement of the fees due from students attending the University summer session in 1907 and the College of Medicine summer session in 1907. These reports were referred to the Finance Committee.

The following report of the Finance Committee was adopted on motion of Mr. Lehman:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, December 10, 1907.

To the Board of Trustees.

Your Committee on Finance recommends-

1. That the registrar be authorized to give students leaving the University for good reason, before the middle of the semester, rebate checks for half of any incidental fees paid, or of fees paid as special or conditioned students, provided such rebates are asked for before the end of the semester.

2. That a student entering the University after the middle of the semester be charged but half the incidental fee, and but half of the condition or special

fee, if he be a special or conditioned student.

3. That adjustments of fees for any semester shall, after the close of the semester, be made by the business office.

#### FILIPINO STUDENTS.

It was voted that the Filipino students in attendance at the University by direction of the Government, to the number of twelve, be granted exemption from the payment of tuition fees.

#### BOND FOR RIFLES.

The secretary presented a letter from Colonel Fechet asking for the execution by the University of a bond in the penal sum of \$216.00 to cover the issue to the University by the War Department of six gallery practice rifles, and it was voted, on motion of Mr. Madden, that the president of the board be authorized to execute such a bond.

DEAR SIR—Agreeably with your instructions, we have examined the books and accounts of the comptroller's office for the period January 1, 1907, to June 30, 1907, and submit the following statements as reflecting their condition:

The vouchers for all disbursements were carefully examined and compared with warrant register, and found to have been properly made out and entered and were all duly authorized for payment with one exception as noted on our exhibit E, which exhibit also gives a list of vouchers which were not on file at date of this audit.

The receipts for students' fees and deposits, for first and second semesters of 1906 and 1907, were compared with the records of the registrar and were also checked against the cash book entries, the exceptions and errors being noted on our exhibits F, G, H and I.

At the commencement of our audit we found the chief clerk's cash \$719.28

in excess of the balance called for by the cash book.

This surplus in cash was reduced to \$93.12 and this amount charged up on the cash book August 2d to balance cash on hand with cash book balance. (See exhibit C.)

We would suggest in this connection that the cash be balanced every day. In this manner errors could be promptly detected, while at present the cash differences keep increasing and causing a considerable amount of worry and work to adjust.

We would suggest that a new form for students' fees and deposit receipts be used.

As outlined to your chief clerk, Mr. O. E. Staples, this receipt should be made with two stubs, one to remain in the receipt book, thus retaining the alphabetical arrangement of students' names; the second stub to be detached and become the record for the daily cash receipts.

In this manner, each day's receipts can be proven with the cash book entries, obviating the necessity of checking five thousand receipts in order to detect an error.

The labor entering warrants in the warrant register could be materially lessened by making one entry for the aggregate of each pay roll, instead of entering in detail the names appearing on each roll.

These suggestions are made to minimize the possibility of error and to lessen

the clerical labor of your accounting force.

#### REPORT ON UNIVERSITY EXPENDITURES.

The comptroller presented copies of reports made to Governor Deneen by F. D. Whipp, Department and Institution Auditor.

On motion of Mr. Lehman it was voted to return to the State Treasury the unused balance of the appropriation made for payment of taxes on Minnesota lands.

On motion of Mr. Madden it was voted to return to the State Treasury the balance of appropriations made for the support of a vaccine laboratory, \$2,429.73.

It was also voted that the comptroller prepare a uniform blank to be used for expense reports.

Mr. Whipp's reports and the accompanying papers were then referred, on motion of Mr. Lehman, to the Committee on Finance.

#### BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND METHODS.

The president of the board presented the following communication:

CHICAGO, December 12, 1907.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

The existing business organization and methods of the University were, in a great measure, fixed by regulation and by custom long before the business of the University attained anything like its present magnitude, and while these methods may have been satisfactory at one time, their inefficiency in some respects at the present time is made manifest by numerous complaints and criticisms which have come both from within and from without the University organizations regarding the practical operation of our present system.

wersity organizations regarding the practical operation of our present system. This board could, from time to time, make changes in these regulations which would effect an improvement in some directions, but I am of the opinion that better results and more immediate relief would be obtained by referring to a special committee, appointed for the purpose, the whole question of revising our business organization and regulations; the committee to make a thorough examination of our methods and report to the board a recommendation for a complete system of organization and rules governing same.

I, therefore, recommend the appointment of such a committee, consisting of the President of the Board, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the President of the University, the Secretary of the Board and the Comptroller of the University; and that an appropriation of \$250.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be placed at the committee's disposal for the purpose of employing expert advisers, or for any other purpose which may properly come within the scope of the proposed investigation.

#### APPROPRIATIONS.

On motion of Mr. Lehman appropriations were made as recommended by the comptroller in paper "I" above.

# BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD; STATUTES.

On motion of Mr. Lehman it was voted that a committee be appointed to revise the by-laws of the board and also the University statutes. President Abbott appointed on this committee Messrs. Lehman and Hatch and Mrs. Evans, President James, and Mr. Pillsbury.

#### LAWS REGARDING THE UNIVERSITY.

On motion of Mrs. Busey the secretary was directed to prepare a new edition of the United States and State laws with regard to the University.

#### ELECTRIC TEST CAR.

On motion of Mrs. Busey, the Committee on Engineering was directed to see about getting the use of interurban tracks by the University test car.

#### RULES WITH REGARD TO THE WOMAN'S BUILDING.

Mrs. Busey from the Committee on Student's Welfare reported that it was advisable to make some changes in the rules regarding the use of the Woman's Building. She therefore moved that the present rules with regard to the use of the building be suspended, and that the Committee on Students' Welfare, with the Dean of Women, be authorized to revise said rules, and the motion was adopted.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

The president submitted the following matters for consideration:

#### COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

1. A recommendation from the dean of the College of Agriculture and director of the Agricultural Experiment Station that the comptroller be authorized to draw a warrant of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) against the State college fund in favor of the funds for dairy investigation, in order to reinburse the latter fund for expenditures incurred by the expenditure on the house and barn authorized for experiments in intensive dairying on the south farm.

Voted on motion of Mr. Lehman that said recommendation be approved.

2. A recommendation from the live stock advisory committee that Professor Mumford, head of the department of animal husbandry, be authorized and directed to visit other beef producing regions, especially South America, and to make upon the ground the most exhaustive study possible of conditions both present and prospective, under which these countries are producing or are likely to be able to produce meats to compete with American beef, and that the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary be set aside for this purpose out of the funds for live stock investigation.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Alexander that said recommendation be referred to the Agricultural Committee of the board for report.

3. A recommendation from the dean of the College of Agriculture that the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) be appropriated from the special appropriation for domestic science made by the last legislature for the purpose of fitting up two rooms in the basement of the household science wing as a kitchen, primarily for the use of the school for housekeepers in January, and a further recommendation that one thousand dollars (\$1,000) be appropriated from the same fund for equipment in the way of fabrics and other illustrative materials, charts, models, tables for drafting and cutting, sewing machines, etc.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Alexander that said appropriations be made.

4. A request from the animal husbandry department, approved by the dean of the College of Agriculture, for authority to purchase one or two Shire mares at from five to six hundred dollars, the same to be used for class room purposes in the teaching of judging draft horses.

Voted on motion of Dr. Davison that said recommendation be approved and the necessary appropriation made.

#### AUDITORIUM.

5. A recommendation from the University architect that two or more dressing rooms be constructed under the stage of the Auditorium. The plan involves concreting that portion of the basement under the stage of the Auditorium, the erection of a corridor running from one door to the other, and the construction of dressing rooms opening into this corridor. It was also recommended that the corridors running around the Auditorium building in the basement be concreted. The estimate of expense is between four and five hundred dollars.

Voted that said recommendation, with power to act in the premises, be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

#### GRADUATE SCHOOL.

6. It is proposed to hold a formal opening of the graduate school of the University during the first week in February and at that time to hold a conference of educators and experts to discuss the subject of the best organization of graduate school work. It is recommended that the University invite certain heads of colleges in the State of Illinois to attend this conference at the expense of the University.

Voted that said plan be approved and the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) be appropriated for the traveling expenses of said heads of colleges.

#### OFFICERS FOR REGIMENT.

7. The University regiment has reached such a size that it is impossible for a single officer to do the necessary work connected with efficient military instruction and drill. I recommend that the President of the University be

authorized to ask the war department to detail two additional officers as assistants to the commandant. This will involve a certain amount of expense. We are paying at present the sum of four hundred and twenty dollars (\$420) a year as quarters to the commandant. Some similar payment might be necessary in the case of other officers.

Voted that the recommendation of the president be approved.

8. The salary of Miss Sue W. Ford, clerk in the college of engineering, was fixed by the Board at its session in the summer, at nine hundred dollars (\$900) for twelve months. Miss Ford was offered a considerable increase of salary to leave the University for another position, and I assured her that I would recommend to the Board that her salary be increased by one hundred dollars (\$100) for the year. I therefore make said recommendation.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Evans that the recommendation of the president be approved.

#### NEW BUILDINGS; ARCHITECT.

9. The Board of Trustees at a previous meeting voted that the preparations necessary for the erection of the two buildings for which money was granted by the last legislature be postponed until after the adjournment of the present

session of the legislature.

It looks now as if this adjournment might be delayed indefinitely. The University stands in great need of these buildings and I recommend, therefore, that the state architect be requested to proceed with the preparation of plans for the physics laboratory and for the addition to the natural history building and in consultation with the President of the University and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds prepare and submit plans for these buildings to the Board of Trustees for their approval as soon as possible.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

#### DAIRY BUSINESS.

Mrs. Alexander moved that the Committee on Agriculture investigate and report to the board the commercial aspects of the dairy business as conducted by the University, and the motion was adopted.

The board adjourned.
