FLORICULTURE GREENHOUSES.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., June 6th, 1908.

DEAR SIR: A joint meeting of the Committee on Agriculture and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was held in Chicago May 29th to receive and open bids for the proposed Floriculture Greenhouse. At this meeting the following bids were received for the superstructure:

The bid of A. Dietsch & Co was not accompanied by a certified check when opened, and before such a check was furnished the bid was raised about \$400.00. The committee took no action on the bids at the Chicago meeting, but adjourned to meet at the University June 6th, at which meeting bids for a service building for the greenhouse were received and opened.

The committees rejected the bid of A. Dietsch & Co., for the irregularity above noted and then voted to recommend, with one exception, that the contracts for greenhouse and service building be awarded to the low bidders. The one exception noted was Showers & Loper, who bid on brick instead of concrete for foundation.

FENCES—MILK ROUTE—LEASES OF LANDS.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., June 6, 1908.

Mr. W. L. Pillsbury, *Secretary Board of Trustees, University of Illinois*:

DEAR SIR:—The Committee on Agriculture held a meeting in the library June 6 to consider various matters which had been referred to it by the Board, and begs to report as follows:

Line Fence.—In the matter of the controversy with Mr. Sullivan, the owner of land adjoining the University farm on the south, regarding the location of the line fence between the two properties, Judge Harker reported that he had arranged with Mr. Sullivan for a new survey of the line by neutral surveyors and that both parties had agreed to abide by the decision.

Judge Harker's acts in the matter so far, were approved and he was authorized and directed to proceed along the lines he indicated, to a conclusion.

Fences Around Horticultural Grounds.—Dean Davenport has requested that an iron fence similar to the one now around the horticultural plat on the north farm, be built around the new orchard plats on the south farm.

The committee recommended that such a fence be constructed at a cost not to exceed \$2,600.00, and to be paid for out of the State appropriation for fencing.

Fence Around Soil Experiment Plats.—Dr. Hopkins has requested that an iron fence similar to the one in front of the horticultural building be built around the soil experiment plat directly south of the Astronomical Observatory.

The committee recommends that the fence be built as requested at a cost not to exceed \$2,125.00, and that it be paid for out of the State appropriation for fencing.

University Milk Route.—The committee was directed to investigate and report upon the commercial features of the milk route now operated by the dairy department.

The committee has directed its chairman to ask the advisory committee of the State Dairymen's Association for a recommendation regarding the advisability of continuing the University milk route, and pending a reply to this request your committee asks for further time.

With regard to this report was taken as follows:

Judge Harker's course concerning the line fence was approved.

The recommendation with regard to fence around horticultural grounds was approved and the appropriation therefor made.

With regard to the fence around soil experiment plats the board voted to refer the matter back to the committee with instruction to see whether or not a fence like that on the tennis courts near by would not be sufficient, and if this were found to be so, whether or not the other experiment plats further east might be similarly fenced and to report to the board.

The committee was given further time to investigate the report upon the milk route.

The recommendation of the committee with regard to leases and purchases of experiment lands was adopted.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

The President of the University submitted also the following matters for consideration:

1. I recommend that the degree of Doctor of Laws be conferred at commencement on His Excellency Wu Ting-fang, His Imperial Chinese Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States of America.

On motion of Mrs. Evans it was voted that the degree be conferred.

2. The request is made for free tuition at the Summer Session for Filipinos brought to this country by the government for education.

The request was granted on motion of Mr. Hatch.

3. Recommendations from the Dean of the College of Agriculture:

(a) That Mr. Horace Fairchild Major be appointed assistant in landscape gardening in the College of Agriculture for one year beginning July 1, 1908, at a salary of eight hundred and forty dollars for twelve months.

(b) That Mr. Walter Lee Gaines be appointed assistant in dairy husbandry in the Agricultural Experiment Station for the year beginning July 12, 1908, at a salary of eight hundred and forty dollars for twelve months.

(c) That Miss Pincomb's appointment made at a previous meeting of the Board shall be on the twelve month basis, the same as other members of the experiment station.

(d) That Mr. I. S. Brooks' title shall be assistant in pomology, and that his salary shall be fixed at eight hundred and forty dollars instead of nine hundred dollars as printed in the preceeding minutes, while Mr. C. C. Logan's salary shall be eight hundred and forty dollars instead of seven hundred and twenty.

(e) That Joseph P. Aumer be appointed assistant in chemistry in the Agricultural Experiment Station at a salary of seven hundred and twenty dollars for twelve months from September 1, 1908.

Voted on motion of Mr. Hatch that said appointments be made.

USE OF DYNAMOMETER CAR.

4. A recommendation from the Dean of the College of Engineering that the department of railway engineering be authorized to grant the use of its dynamometer car during the summer vacation to railway companies desiring it, and that the department be authorized to receive the money on account of the University for the use of said car, said money to be paid to the Comptroller of the University. All uses of the car and all accounts growing out of its use to be subject to the approval of the Dean of the College of Engineering.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Busey that said recommendation be approved.

5. A recommendation from the Dean of the College of Literature and Arts that Mr. Joel R. Moore be appointed assistant in economics at a remuneration of \$450 for the academic year, 1908-9, work and salary to begin September 1, 1908.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Busey that said recommendation be approved.

ACOUSTICS OF AUDITORIUM

6. A request from Professor Carman, approved by the Supervising Architect, for an appropriation of \$250 for the purpose of making an investigation into the acoustics of the auditorium.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Evans that said appropriation be made.

Second, that there be constituted a senate standing committee on library administration and policy, consisting of the President and the Librarian and seven members representing the following interests:

1. Agriculture.

2. Engineering.

3. Science.

4. Graduate School.

5. Library.

6. The languages, the literatures, and the arts.

7. The philosophical and social sciences.

Among the duties of this committee shall be:—

1. To prepare for the use of the committee on apportionment, prior to its assignment of the funds, detailed estimates of the library needs of the various colleges, schools, and departments.

2. To consider and recommend to the Trustees the methods of library administration and policy, such as:

Administration and policy.

Ordering and accessions.

Exchange of University publications

Classification and cataloging.
 Shelving, storing, and caring for books.
 Admittance to the stack.
 Home use, or the loan of books.
 Reference use.
 Reserve books.
 Seminary libraries.
 Inter-library loans.
 Relations with the Library School.

3. To have State meetings, the dates to be regularly and publicly announced.

Your Committee also approves the following recommendations made by Mr. Lake and the Librarian and referred to the Committee by President James.

A recommendation from Mr. Lake the curator of the art collection housed at present in the basement of the library building, that the objects there collected be distributed part of them in the auditorium building and part of them in the rooms of the department of art and design.

A recommendation from the librarian that newspaper shelving be placed in the room in which the art collection is now housed, sufficient to take care of the bound volumes of newspapers which we have at present and some slight provision for the regular additions in the next year or two.

Your Committee recommends further that the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars be appropriated for the purchase of newspaper racks in accordance with the plans submitted. This action is taken on condition that it is feasible in the opinion of the Supervising Architect and the library board to protect the volumes properly from the effect of dampness in said room.
