Meeting of September 29, 1908.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, beginning at 9:00 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 29, 1908.

The members present were: Messrs. Abbott, Davison, Grout, Hatch and Lehman, and Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Busey; absent: Governor Deneen, Messrs. Madden, Blair and Meeker. President James was present.

Mr. Grout, who had been appointed by Governor Deneen to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. McLean, had taken the oath of office before the meeting.

Mr. Madden, Mr. Blair and Mr. Meeker, who had been appointed by Governor Deneen to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Kerrick, sent letters stating that they were unavoidably absent.

The secretary presented the minutes of the regular meeting of June 8, 1908, and the special meetings of June 20, 1908, and July 3, 1908. The approval of the minutes was deferred until 2:00 o'clock p. m.

MATTERS SUBMITTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

The president presented the following matters for consideration:

C. P. A.

1. A communication from Professor Robinson, Secretary of the University Committee on Accountancy, concerning the protest made against the

conduct of the examination for certified public accountants in the State of Illinois, held in May, 1908, setting forth the action taken by the University Committee on Accountancy in regard to this protest.

No action was taken on this report, as a further report is to be made later.

VETERINARY COLLEGE.

2. Report of the trip authorized by the Trustees and made by the President of the University during the summer, for the purpose of inspecting the leading veterinary colleges of Europe.

3. A preliminary plan for the building for the veterinary college and research laboratory in Chicago, suggested by the Union Stock Yards Company.

The president closed with a recommendation that a committee be appointed on the veterinary college and research laboratory, and the recommendation was adopted.

NUTRITION INVESTIGATION.

4. A report from Professor H. S. Grindley concerning the progress of the nutrition investigation.

URBANA, ILL., Sept. 22, 1908.

President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:

MY DEAR PRESIDENT JAMES—I transmit herewith a report of the present status of our saltpeter investigation. The nutrition club consisting of twenty-four men was maintained as planned until August 1, 1908. At that time the club was disbanded and the household furniture and other supplies used for the club were stored for the time being.

During the summer I have directed a large force of office workers in calculating and tabulating the results so that they may be properly brought before the commission. At present I have five hundred closely typewritten pages prepared, and I will have in the very near future approximately as much again or more, prepared, all of which will be available for the commission if they so desire.

At present there remains five thousand dollars (\$5,000) of the funds unexpended, twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) of which will be required to pay the members of the commission when they have completed their work. The remainder of the fund, namely twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) will be used as economically as possible in getting the vast amount of information in shape for presentation to the commission and in the publication of their report.

In this connection, I wish to make for your personal information the following statements as to the results of the investigation:

First—The investigation has been completed exactly in accordance with the original plans of the commission. Nothing has been left undone that it was thought would add in any way to the thoroughness, accuracy, and completeness of the investigation or to the value of the results to be derived from the same.

Second—It can be truthfully said with all due modesty that the University of Illinois has made this by far the greatest experiment of its kind. No experiments of this nature, up to this present time, have been made or planned which in any way compare with it in extent, character, thoroughness, and accuracy.

Third—Personally but unofficially until the commission passes upon the results, I fully believe that the investigation will clearly demonstrate without a shadow of doubt that the small amount of saltpeter occurring in the cured meats used in our experiment produced no abnormal or detrimental effects or influence upon the health or the normal metabolism of the members of the nutrition club.

Fourth—At present I expect to be able to get the results of the investigation into complete shape to present to the commission by the Christmas holidays at the latest, and if possible earlier than this date.

Fifth—The publication of the detailed results of the investigation will require several volumes. I am preparing a request to present to the Carnegie Institution at Washington, asking that the complete results of our work be published in full through that channel. This request will be placed in your hands for your approval in the near future. In the meantime much of the data will appear in condensed form in the various scientific journals from time to time.

Mrs. Alexander moved that \$5,000 be appropriated for this purpose from the \$30,000 appropriated by the General Assembly for a veterinary college and research laboratory, provided the approval of the Attorney General for such use of the money should first be obtained. This motion was lost.

On motion of Mr. Davidson, \$5,000 was appropriated from the \$30,000 fund.

DELEGATES TO INTERNATIONAL TUBERCULOSIS CONFERENCE.

6. Statement that the President of the University had appointed Dr. T. J. Burrill, Dr. W. J. McNeal, and Mr. C. C. Hayden as delegates of the University of Illinois to the International Tuberculosis Congress now in session in the city of Washington, D. C. This was done on the recommendation of the Director of the Experiment Station and Dr. Burrill, representing that the attendance of these delegates at the Tuberculosis Congress would be a very useful element in the tuberculosis investigation now being carried on by the University of Illinois.

CONFERENCE ON TUBERCULOSIS IN CATTLE.

7. A statement by the President that the Director of the Experiment Station had called a conference at the University of Illinois beginning Tuesday evening, October 13, and extending through the next day, to consider the best methods of procedure in view of the great prevalence of tuberculosis among cattle and swine in this country and its greater prevalence in the older countries of Europe.

8. Resignation of Professor Guy Tawney from the University of Illinois, to take effect Oct. 1, 1908.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Busey that said resignation be accepted.

PRIZES FOR LAW STUDENTS.

9. A recommendation that the law faculty be authorized to grant the usual law prize scholarships for the present year.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander it was voted to authorize the granting of these prizes for the current year.

10. Recommendation that William Freeman Myrick Goss be appointed Dean of the College of Engineering and Director of the School of Railway Engineering and Administration for the academic year beginning Sept. 1, 1908.

On motion of Mrs. Evans it was voted that said recommendation be approved.

ADVISORY BOARD OF SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

11. A communication from W. B. Day, Secretary of the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association, that the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association at its annual meeting held at Peoria, June 9 to 11, 1908, nominated the following three persons, namely: Herman Fry of Chicago, S. C. Yeomans of Chicago, and Albert Zimmerman of Peoria, of whom one is to be named by the Board of Trustees of the University as member of the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy to succeed W. K. Forsythe, whose term expired June 30, 1908.

The president stated that he would make a recommendation at a subsequent meeting.

CONTRACTS FOR THE CHRISTMAS CONCERT AND MAY FESTIVAL.

12. A communication from Charles H. Mills, Director of the School of Music, asking that the University authorize the signing of contracts for the musical services in connection with the Christmas concert and May Festival not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

No action was taken on this recommendation.

A recess was taken until 2:00 o'clock p. m.

Session of Tuesday Afternoon, September 29, 1908.

When the board met after the recess the same members were present as at the morning session.

COAL CONTRACT FOR YEAR BEGINNING SEPT. 1, 1908.

URBANA, ILL., Aug. 22, 1908.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

A proposition for hauling was received—from Champaign, twenty cents a ton; from Big Four, Urbana, eighteen cents a ton; and from Wabash tracks, Urbana, sixteen cents a ton.

On motion of Mr. Lehman it was voted that the contract be awarded to the Electric Coal Company provided a contract satisfactory as to details can be made.

The committee authorized the Supervising Architect to make a contract for the construction of fire escapes on University Hall with F. B. Smith of Chicago on his bid of \$1,065.

The appropriation of an additional \$65 for the construction of fire escapes on University Hall was approved.

The consideration of the minutes was then taken up, and after making the following changes and corrections the minutes of the meetings of March 10, 1908; April 3, 1908; April 23, 1908; May 2, 1908; May 29, 1908; June 8, 1908; June 20, 1908, and July 3, 1908, were approved.

Change the second paragraph on p. 422 of minutes of the meeting of March 10, 1908, to read—

“President James called the attention of the board to a communication,” etc.

Add after the third paragraph, same page—

“Dr. Kemp made a brief preliminary statement after which he was excused with the understanding that he would be called again.

The hearing of these gentlemen and the consequent discussion lasted until noon, when a recess was taken until 2:00 p. m.”

On p. 436 change in paragraph 1 “his annual” to “an,” and add at the close of the paragraph—

“And recommended that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby re-affirm their approval of the general university policy thus far developed by the President of the University.”

Change the next paragraph to read—

“Mr. Blair moved the adoption of the recommendation of the President. The Trustees on motion of Mrs. Alexander went into executive session for the consideration of the recommendation.”

Substitute for paragraph 4, p. 437, and the following paragraph—

“The matter of Dr. Kemp’s communication, which had been left as unfinished business from the last meeting, was called up. Dr. Kemp was not present, not having been notified.”

“After considerable discussion of the case, on motion of Mr. Lehman, a further consideration of the question was postponed until the next meeting of the board.”

The first line of the paragraph near the bottom of p. 516 of the minutes of July 3, 1908, was corrected by substituting for “Mr. Abbott, Chairman,” “Mr. Pillsbury, Clerk.”

On motion of Mr. Hatch, it was voted that the new members of the board be properly assigned to the standing committees by the president.

WALKS AND REPAIRS.

The president presented a communication from the supervising architect with regard to walks and sundry repairs.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

BILL FOR PHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF CADETS.

13. A communication from the Military Commandant, Colonel E. G. Fechet, inclosing a bill from Dr. James H. Finch for seventy-six dollars (\$76) for examining and reporting upon the physical condition of seventy-six cadets referred to him by the Military Commandant, between Sept. 18, 1906, and January 1, 1908, with the recommendation that it be paid.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Alexander that said bill be paid.

14. A recommendation from the Dean of the College of Engineering that Trygve Jensen be appointed student assistant in electrical engineering at a salary of forty dollars per month for nine months, beginning Oct. 1, 1908.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

15. A recommendation that Herbert W. Denio be appointed cataloger in the Library at seventy-five dollars (\$75) per month, work and salary to begin Oct. 1, 1908, and run to Aug. 31, 1909.

Voted on motion of Mr. Lehman that said appointment be made on terms recommended.

16. A recommendation from the Dean of the College of Engineering that two hundred and thirty new lockers be purchased for the shops of the mechanical engineering department and that a sum not to exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) be appropriated for the purchase of these lockers.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Evans that this recommendation be approved and the appropriation of a sum not to exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) for this purchase be made.

COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

17. Recommendations from the Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

First—That the salary of J. M. Barnhart, assistant chemist in the dairy department, be fixed at eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100) for the term of twelve months, beginning Sept. 1, 1908.

Second—That Mr. A. D. Emmett be appointed associate in animal nutrition in the laboratory of physiological chemistry, department of animal husbandry, at a salary of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) per year, work and salary to begin the first of September, 1908, and said appointment is for two years.

Third—That George Goodrich Coale, of Richmond, Indiana, be appointed assistant in animal husbandry for the term of twelve months at a salary of eight hundred and forty dollars (\$840), beginning Sept. 1, 1908.

Fourth—That the President of the University be authorized to appoint an additional assistant in the department of animal husbandry on part time at a salary not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500).

Fifth—That a copy of the Illinois Agriculturist, published by the Agricultural Club, be sent to the high schools in the State, the cost of the same to be charged to the appropriation for college extension.

Sixth—That the Experiment Station be permitted to enter into certain coöperative experiments with the University of Wisconsin to test the efficiency of the so-called "ophthalmic and skin tests for tuberculosis in cattle."

That the question of granting requests for holding livestock sales in the judging pavilion be referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

Seventh—That the following schedule of charges for conducting official butter fat tests of pure bred dairy cattle within the State of Illinois, traveling expenses included, be adopted.

Additional days, \$3.00 a day and tests made outside of the State of Illinois at \$1.00 a day additional.

Voted on motion of Mr. Lehman that said recommendation be approved.

18. Recommendation that Aurora L. Buckner be appointed stenographer in Professor Parr's office at a salary of forty dollars a month, for ten months beginning Sept. 17, 1908.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

19. Communication from the Dean of the Agricultural College accompanied with various communications relating to a call to another institution which had been extended to Professor Mumford.

20. A communication from Professor H. L. Schoolcraft, resigning his position as assistant professor in the University of Illinois to take effect Aug. 31, 1908.

Voted that the resignation be accepted.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

On motion of Mrs. Busey, it was voted that the minutes of the board should be approved when presented.

TAXES ON PHARMACY BUILDING.

Authority was given to the president of the board to pay the taxes on the Pharmacy building, and an appropriation of \$3,301.95 from Pharmacy funds was made therefor.
