# Meeting of March 9, 1909.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, pursuant to call, at 9:00 o'clock a.m. Tuesday, March 9, 1909.

The members present were: Messrs. Abbott, Davison, Grout, Hatch, and Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen, Messrs. Blair, Crebs and Meeker.

Mrs. Evans and Mr. Grout, who had been elected members of the board at the November election, took the oath of office before the opening of the session. Mr. Allen F. Moore, also elected last November, came in a little later and after taking the oath of office took his seat with the board.

President James was present.

The secretary presented the minutes of the board, and later during the session these were approved as presented.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report, which was received for record:

DEAR SIR—Agreeable to our recent conversation on the subject, you are hereby appointed Consulting Architect of the University of Illinois, on the Physics building and the Natural History building, now under construction, It is understood that the Supervising Architect of the University will himself supervise the construction work and pass on and decide all matters of minor detail, and will approve contractors' bills for payment, but that in any emergency which may arise or in matters pertaining to more important changes in design the University will consult with you, for which consultations you are to be paid a reasonable fee.

With regard to the proposition to erect a Museum and Lecture Building in the court of the Natural History building (see p. 95 of the minutes of the meeting of Jan. 15, 1909) the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That we approve a system of direct radiation for heating the building, approximately in accordance with the first plans prepared by the State Architect.

That we approve the plans submitted by the Supervising Architect for ventilating the building and instruct that bids be obtained upon them; also that a separate figure be received on the ducts which must be built into the walls.

Also that the architect be instructed to prepare plans, specifications, and receive bids on the proposed building in the court of the Natural History building, and that he be paid not to exceed two per cent on the cost for his services.

The Executive Committee also presented the following report, which was received for record:

URBANA, March 9, 1909.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

Your Executive Committee begs leave to report that at a meeting held at the Palmer House in Chicago, Friday, Jan. 15, 1909, action was taken as follows upon recommendations presented by President James:

1. A recommendation that Mr. Phineas Lawrence Windsor, librarian at the University of Texas, Austin, Texas, be appointed University librarian and director of the Library School at a salary of \$3,000 per annum.

Voted that the recommendation be approved and said appointment be made, work and salary to begin when Mr. Windsor reports for duty.

2. A recommendation from the President that the graduate faculty be authorized to make the same announcement with regard to fellowships and scholarships for the coming year as was made for the present year, as to number, amount, etc.

Recommendation approved.

Your committee also reports that, since Mr. W. Carbys Zimmerman, who has been engaged as consulting architect for the new buildings, has stipulated that it shall not be his duty to issue certificates to contractors engaged on these buildings, it has, therefore, authorized Supervising Architect James M. White to make estimates of work completed and issue certificates to contractors therefor.

Your committee also reports that in response to a letter from Dr. S. A. Forbes, director of the State Laboratory of Natural History, in which he referred to volume three of the Natural History Survey, and asked authority to distribute the edition of two thousand volumes comprising the report referred to, and made recommendation as to how it should be done, and asked whether the entire report be sent out gratuitously or a portion offered to the public at cost price, it authorized the distribution of the report as suggested by Dr. Forbes, and left it entirely to him to say whether or not a charge should be made for a portion of the edition.

## NATURAL HISTORY BUILDING.

The question of what should be done with regard to the ventilation of the Natural History building and with regard to the building in the court of the Natural History building, a lecture room and museum, was considered at length. Action was deferred with regard to the building until more definite information could be had with regard to the cost for both the ventilation and for the new building.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander, and by the following vote, \$1,060 was appropriated to pay for the ducts for ventilation and heating purposes placed in the walls of the Natural History building, and \$124 for a pent house on the roof: Yeas, Messrs. Abbott, Davison, Grout, Hatch and Moore, and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; nays, none; absent, Governor Deneen, Messrs. Crebs, Blair and Meeker.

On motion of Dr. Davison the question of heating and ventilation was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act, by the following vote: Yeas, Messrs. Abbott, Davison, Grout, Hatch and Moore, and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; nays, none; absent, Governor Deneen, Messrs. Crebs, Blair and Meeker.

## RENT DUE FROM DR. L. BLAKE BALDWIN.

The item "checks and warrants," \$2,016.82, represents checks and warrants received but not deposited. The item "paid and receipted bills," \$1,434.83, represents receipts for cash disbursed and not yet vouched or charged to the various operating accounts.

We examined all vouchers for disbursements made during the period under review and found that all were accounted for, receipted, and properly approved by the Comptroller, and, in addition, approved by the Purchasing Agent, the actuaries, or heads of the various departments.

We compared the vouchers with the sums entered in the various warrant registers, and found all to be correctly entered.

To further verify the correctness of the vouchers paid, we proved the additions of all vouchers covering two or more items or invoices and tested the extensions on many, particularly all payments for coal, freight on coal, and contract coal hauling, and found all computations to be correct and as recorded in the sum total on the voucher.

We compared the Journal entries made from the various warrant register footings at the close of the period, and checked the postings from the Journal and cash book to the ledger and found all correct.

We proved the additions in the ledger and took off a trial balance as at Sept. 30, 1908, as illustrated by Exhibit "C."

# THE CARNEGIE FOUNDATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF TEACHING.

#### 576 FIFTH AVENUE.

#### NEW YORK, Feb. 24, 1909.

My DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of Feb. 22, enclosing the extract from the minutes of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, in which they request the admission of that institution to the accepted list of the Carnegie Foundation, and in addition the joint resolution passed by the Senate and House of the State of Illinois and approved by the Governor. These papers are all in due form and fulfill that part of the requirement which Mr. Carnegie imposed in the case of state institutions relating to the action of the trustees and representatives of the state and governor. The admission of the University is now a matter to be determined by the Executive Committee of the Foundation after full information as to the academic standards of the University and of the relations of its professional schools to it.

All these matters I have no question are in a satisfactory status, but during the next six weeks several members of the staff of the foundation will visit the University in order to complete these details and formal action will probably be taken by the Executive Committee some time in May. Meantime, however, I think that the Executive Committee will be glad to grant customary retiring allowances to any professors in the University who may have had the required service and whom you may wish to recommend. I enclose for that purpose several of the blanks used in that connection, and beg that you will let me know at an early date whether you desire to make such recommendations at the end of the present year.

#### RESIGNATION OF PROFESSOR BRECKENRIDGE.

6. Letter from Professor L. P. Breckenridge, resigning his position as Professor of Mechanical Engineering and Director of the Engineering Experiment Station, University of Illinois, to take effect Sept. 1, 1909.

Dr. Edmund J. James, President of the University of Illinois:

MY DEAR SIR—I herewith tender you my resignation as Professor of Mechanical Engineering and Director of the Engineering Experiment Station of the University of Illinois, to take effect Sept. 1, 1909.

Early last December I was approached by the authorities of Yale University in regard to my succeeding to the chair of Mechanical Engineering at Sheffield Scientific School in the place of Professor C. B. Richards, who, having reached the age limit, retires this coming June. Plans for the further development and extension of the work of the Mechanical Engineering Department were presented and discussed, and I was formally invited to take charge of the department. This invitation to return to my Alma Mater and bring to bear upon its future development the results of twenty-seven years of experience gained by contact, not only with the educational conditions and requirements of institutions in three great states, but also with the industrial and commercial needs of the engineering profession, irresistibly challenged my highest ambitions. After mature deliberation, with a keen sense of the losses involved in the severance of my connection with Illinois, I have deemed it my duty to accept the call.

In tendering my resignation to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, I am confronted by a peculiarly difficult task. In the sixteen years of service rendered to this University, there have grown up around and about me, many strong attachments, the breaking of which affects me deeply. I feel myself a part of the work with which I have been so closely identified. My relations with my own colleagues in the College of Engineering and other officials of the University have been most delightful and agreeable, and any services which I may have been able to render have been made possible by their loyal and generous coöperation and support.

It means much to me to leave my own department, in the upbuilding of which I have centered my interests and ambitions. It means much to me to relinquish the work of the Engineering Experiment Station. I have put into it my best efforts from its inception until the present time when it is fairly launched on a successful career. The preliminary difficulties have been cleared away. Its continued progress is assured if the generous support it has hitherto received is continued.

I shall not expect to relinquish the friendships I have made here. I shall watch with eager interest the further growth of my department and college, and of this whole magnificent University. It cannot help become greater not only in material things, but because it accomplishes great things for the education of the people who support it.

To the trustees, the president and the officers of the University, to my colleagues, associates and students, I wish to express my sincere gratitude for their past confidence, helpfulness and loyal support, and I bespeak their sympathy and interest in my new field of labor.

#### MINING RESCUE STATION.

7. Letter from W. F. M. Goss, dean of the College of Engineering, concerning coöperative work between the University, the State Geological Survey, and the United States Geological Survey in the establishment of a government station for mine rescue and mine accident investigations.

URBANA, ILL., Feb. 22, 1909.

#### President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR—I beg to report that acting with your verbal approval, the College of Engineering, in conjunction with the State Geological Survey, has perfected a plan of coöperation with the United States Geological Survey, whereby a Government station for mine rescue and mine accident investigations has been established at the University.

The conditions under which the establishment has been secured, and upon which the work of the station is to proceed, are as follows:

(1) In the establishment of the station the United States Geological Survey coöperates jointly with the State Geological Survey and the College of Engineering of the University of Illinois.

The College of Engineering is to supply space in the Mechanical Engineering Laboratory for the necessary equipment, and is to furnish, without charge to the Federal government, this space, including heat, light, etc.

The College of Engineering is to supply also a gas-tight room, fitted up to resemble a mine, into which poisonous gases may be introduced.

(2) The United States Geological Survey will supply oxygen, helmets, electric safety lamps, stretchers, dummies, mine-props, oxygen resuscitation cases, and a general line of equipment for use in mine explosion experiments, and in resuscitation work.

The United States Geological Survey will also maintain a mining engineer in charge of the facilities thus brought together, with such assistants as may later be deemed necessary. This mining engineer will have charge of rescue work for the present in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, West Kentucky, Iowa and Missouri, and he or his assistant is to be on duty at the station practically all of the time.

Responding to these general conditions, the College of Engineering in conjunction with the Engineering Experiment Station, has caused to be erected in the Mechanical Engineering Laboratory, a gastight room, 15x25 feet, in which the experiments of the rescue station are to be conducted. This gastight room is regarded as a piece of laboratory apparatus, and the expense of its construction has been borne by the College of Engineering. It has cost to date \$199.40, to which cost it may be necessary, within the next few weeks, to make some slight additions. I estimate that the total expenditure will be \$225.00. This is the extent of the investment that the College of Engineering will make in the working out of the plan of coöperation which has already been made effective.

Mr. R. Y. Williams, Mining Engineer of the United States Geological Survey, has established his headquarters in the office of Dr. Bain, and is in charge of the work of the station.

It is the purpose of the United States Geological Survey to employ the station as a means of demonstration. To this end, mine operators, mine inspectors, and mine bosses, and all others interested in mining, will be invited to visit the station. Each Saturday will be reserved for exhibit purposes, and the balance of the week will be taken up in giving systematic training to mine representatives in the use of the oxygen helmets.

It is my belief that the establishment of the station by the Government, under the conditions set forth, will permit the College of Engineering to render a large service to an important industrial interest of this and other states. I have the honor to be, Very truly yours,

#### MUSEUM MATERIAL.

8. Request from Dean W. F. M. Goss, in the matter of accepting material for the museum.

## URBANA, ILL., Mar. 5, 1909.

#### President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR—The College of Engineering occasionally has opportunity to secure museum material of more or less significance. Such material may be in the form of machines or appliances which, having served their day and generation, will be scrapped or otherwise destroyed, unless some agency intercedes for their preservation. It occasionally happens also that such machines and appliances would, if preserved, be curiosities for the next generation, and their value as museum material would steadily increase as time goes on. By the exercise of a reasonable degree of watchfulness, such materials may usually be secured for the University by the payment of transportation charges, and by an agreement to the effect that the University will exercise the same care in their preservation that is given to its other property. In view of these facts, and because the collector must often act promptly if a desired result is to be accomplished, an important interest of the College of Engineering would be promoted if the Board of Trustees were to adopt a preamble and resolution somewhat as follows:

WHEREAS, Rapid changes are occurring in the forms and types of machines and appliances used in the arts and industries of this country; and,

WHEREAS; Many types of such machines and appliances, which have been extensively used, are in the process of disappearing from practice; and,

WHEREAS, Individual machines of typical designs might properly be preserved by the University as museum material for the information and instruction of coming generations; and,

WHEREAS, It may often happen that such materials may be obtained at little or no expense to the University; be it therefore,

Resolved, That the Dean of the College of Engineering be, and hereby is, authorized to accept gifts of such materials as may seem to him likely to be valuable as museum exhibits, provided that in so doing he shall not involve the University in expense in excess of that which can be met by the college from funds already set apart for its use, or which may hereafter be set aside for its use, and provided that the responsibility assumed for the safe keeping of such materials shall not be greater than that imposed upon the trustees as custodians of the other property of the State.

11. Recommendation that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be authorized to take the necessary steps for completing the stacks in the library, and that the sum necessary, being fifty-five hundred dollars, more or less, be hereby appropriated.
