BLANKET BOND FOR MILITARY STORES.

The secretary called attention to the request of Major B. C. Morse, commandant, that a blanket bond amounting to eighty thousand dollars be executed, in accordance with a recommendation of the War Department, to cover the military supplies now in the possession of the University and subsequent supplies as they may be ordered. This request was presented at the meeting of the Executive Committe on March 14, and action on it was deferred until this session.

In response to this request, the following resolution was moved by Mr. Hatch:

Shattuck, comptroller of the said board, be and they hereby are authorized to execute for and in the name of the University of Illinois a bond, in the penal amount of \$80,000.00, in the form required by the War Department, to cover the safekeeping and return when required by the Secretary of War, of certain ordnance and ordnance stores already issued, about to be issued, and such as may be issued in the future; the aggregate value of all such issues not to exceed the sum of \$40,000.00.
