# Meeting of July 23, 1913.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the La Salle Hotel, in the city of Chicago, on Wednesday, July 23, 1913, beginning at 10 A.M., pursuant to the following notice which was sent out by the secretary on July 15, 1913:

Upon the call of the president, Mr. W. L. Abbott, a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois will be held at the LaSalle Hotel, in the city of Chicago, on Wednesday, July 23, 1913, beginning at 10:00 A.M., to consider such matters as the committees of the Board and the President of the University may submit and such other matters as may be duly presented.

When the board convened, the following members were present: Mr. Abbott, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Henrotin, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Moore, Mr. Trevett. Miss Watson. President James was present.

## MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

President James presented the following matters for consideration:

### BILL FROM UNIVERSITY TREASURER FOR OFFICE EXPENSES.

(1) A bill from Mr. M. W. Busey, Treasurer, for clerk hire and office expense for the period from April 1, 1913, to July 1, 1913, amounting to one hundred fifty dollars (\$150); it appears that the Board of Trustees has never thus far made an appropriation for this purpose, although there is a precedent for the payment of such office expenses of the University treasurer.

## PROPOSED EXHIBIT AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC EXPOSITION.

(2) A request that the University of Illinois send an exhibit to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915; with the recommendation that this request be referred to the supervising architect for a report as to the desirability of such an exhibit and an estimate of the cost. There being no objection, it was so ordered.

# PROPOSED INCREASE OF ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS OF THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

(3) The following letter from Mr. W. B. Day, Acting Dean of the School of Pharmacy transmitting a recommendation of the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy that the entrance requirements of the school be gradually increased until the requirement of high school graduation is reached.

### PETTY CASH FUNDS ESTABLISHED.

(5) The following letter from Professor George E. Frazer, Comptroller, concerning the establishment of certain petty cash funds:

# REGULATIONS WITH RESPECT TO BILLS FOR TRAVELING EXPENSES.

(6) A recommendation based upon a request from Professor George E. Frazer, Comptroller, that the following rules be established with reference to the auditing and passing of vouchers for traveling expenses:

1. Itemized bills in the form prescribed by the comptroller shall be presented to the comptroller for payment within thirty days following the completion of the trip for which the expense was incurred. In the case of University employees whose duties require a large amount of traveling within the State, it shall be deemed sufficient if bills are presented monthly.

2. Traveling expense bills presented by members of the faculties of the several colleges, members of the Experiment Station saffs, and employees of the administration offices of the University, must be approved by the dean of the college, the director of the station, or the officer in charge of the administrative office, and endorsed by the comptroller.

3. Traveling expense bills for deans, directors and officers in charge of administrative departments must be approved by the President of the University and endorsed by the comptroller.

endorsed by the comptroller.

4. Traveling expense bills of the President of the University and of the members of the Board of Trustees must be approved by the Finance Committee of the board and endorsed by the comptroller.

On motion of Mrs. Henrotin, it was voted that the foregoing rules be adopted.

## CONTRACT FOR COMPLETION OF THE ARMORY.

(7) A communication from the supervising architect in regard to the steel work necessary for the completion of the Armory, naming bids and recommending as follows:

(These bids are all based on making the two end bays 30 feet each, and all in accordance with the original framing plans by Mr. J. M. Heuser, Engineer, with certain exceptions indicated in the bids. The State Architect is willing that this work go on under the immediate supervision of the supervising architect, owing to the fact that all plans, etc., were drawn by the preceding State Architect.

#### RECOMMENDATION.

That the offer made by the Morava Construction Company for completing the steel work of the end bays of the Armory, being the low bid, be accepted, and that the officers of the board be authorized to enter into a contract with the Morava Construction Company on the basis of this bid of thirty-one thousand nine hundred twenty dollars (\$31,920).

(8) A request from Professor James M. White, Supervising Architect, for an appropriation of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for improvements in the shops of the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

No action was taken with reference to this matter.

#### EXTENSION OF TIME ON THE FLORICULTURAL AND PLANT BREEDING BUILDINGS.

(9) A request from Messrs. English Brothers, Contractors, of Champaign, for an extension of time for the completion of their contract for the erection of the floriculture and plant breeding buildings from June 28, 1913, to September 1, 1913; with a recommendation from Professor J. M. White, Supervising Architect, that this request be granted.

On motion of Mr. Montgomery, it was voted to grant the request as recommended.

#### SYSTEM OF FRESHMAN ADVISERS; APPROPRIATIONS.

(10) The following request from Dr. K. C. Babcock, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, for an appropriation of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) to carry out a system of freshman advisers; accompanied by the recommendation that the plan be tried as an experiment for the coming year: URBANA, ILL., July 9, 1913.

MY DEAR PRESIDENT JAMES: In compliance with your request some of the details of the system of advisers which we discussed last week are set forth in the following statement. The plan has been discussed also with Dean Clark and with Assistant Dean Warnock.

## Advisers for Freshmen in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

1. The system proposed is confined to the men of the freshman class for the

present.

2. It is in the nature of a supplement to the admirable work now carried on by the dean of men and to the formal relations necessarily arising from supervision of study lists, etc., which will be continued.

3. It contemplates the assignment of each male freshman to some member of the faculty for the purpose of establishing helpful, friendly, inspiring relations

3. It contemplates the assignment of each male freshman to some member of the faculty, for the purpose of establishing helpful, friendly, inspiring relations between them.

4. The selection of the members of the faculty will have to be made with extreme care to secure those who are at once mature, sympathetic, scholarly men, who can understand the student point of view, and who are willing to give some time and thought to bettering the present relations between the students and the faculty of the University. Not more than ten or twelve freshmen should be assigned to each adviser.

5. The method of assignment is as important to the success of the plan as is the selection of the advisers. It is hoped to reduce the number of assignments made in a purely arbitrary, perfunctory, or merely official manner by giving large consideration wherever possible to

a. Suggestions of secondary school teachers who know members of the faculty as well as the freshmen, especially teachers who are alumni of the University.

b. Suggestions of members of the family and friends of the freshman, especially

brothers or sisters who have attended the University.

c. Preferences of the student based on fortunate experiences of his intimates in the University.

d. Preferences of the advisers themselves for certain students whom they know

or whose families they know.

e. Special assignments would probably reach 60 per cent.
6. These suggestions and preferences should be obtained through organized correspondence, which in itself would evidence the increasing interest of the University in the individual welfare of the incoming student as well as its pur-

Correspondence, which in itself would evidence the increasing interest of the incoming student as well as its purpose to instruct and guide him in matters academic.

7. While some of the heads of large departments have signified their desire to cooperate in this scheme, the larger number selected will naturally be from among those of the rank of assistant professor, associate, and instructor. These are men on moderate salaries; there will probably be some expense connected with cultivating the desired relationship; the service will be over and above that which has hitherto been expected of instructors. Furthermore, it is desirable to emphasize the special rather than the incidental nature of this service, and at the same time to secure a little special leverage on the advisers.

8. A payment of \$50 to each of the advisers is accordingly suggested, such payment to be made in two installments, one at the end of each semester.

9. Occasional conferences of advisers would be a means of coordinating their efforts and comparing notes on the working of the system.

The total number of men in the freshman class of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will probably be about 420. This would seem to require some thirty-five advisers. I request, therefore, that the sum of \$1,800 be appropriated for this experiment in "humanizing the machine" during the coming year.

# LETTERS FROM EDUCATORS WITH REFERENCE TO THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION BUILDING.

(10) Letters from President John W. Cook, of the Northern Illinois State Normal School at DeKalb, President L. C. Lord, of the Eastern Illinois State Normal School at Charleston, President W. P. Morgan, of the Western Illinois State Normal School at Macomb, Principal J. Stanley Brown, of the Joliet Township High School, and Superintendent J. G. Moore, of Streator, urging that the Board of Trustees proceed at once with the erection of a special building for the School of Education.

These letters were received to be filed.

# STATEMENT WITH REFERENCE TO THE FEASIBILITY OF HOUSING THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY IN THE DENTAL COLLEGE BUILDING.

(12) A communication from Mr. W. B. Day, Acting Dean of the School of Pharmacy, and Dr. Frederick B. Moorehead, stating that in their opinion there is sufficient space in the old Dental College Building at the corner of Honore and Harrison streets to house the School of Pharmacy and the College of Dentistry in a satisfactory manner, provided the space can be properly distributed.

This statement was received for record.

At this point, on motion of Mrs. Henrotin, a recess was taken until 2:15 р.м.

## RULE IN REGARD TO THE NON-EMPLOYMENT OF RELATIVES REPEALED.

Reports of committees being called for, Dr. Montgomery, as chairman of the special committee authorized at the meeting of June 25, 1913 (page 272) to consider proposed revisions of the rule in regard to the nonemployment of relatives, presented the following report:

#### RESOLUTION.

Whereas, It has been strongly urged upon the attention of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the rigid enforcement of the present rule concerning the appointment of relatives of the University staff to positions under the board may at times work serious injury to the University by excluding from its staff men of unusual distinction and merit or men especially well qualified for some particular piece of work in teaching, investigation, or administration.

The existing rule reading as follows: (a) In the opinion of the board, all University positions should be kept upon the merit basis. No officer or employee should be removed except for good cause, and whenever an appointment is made it should be made solely with regard to special fitness. (b) The board stamps with its strongest disapproval any disposition to make patronage out of University appointments. The appointment of a relative of a member of the board, or of any other person occupying an influential position in the University, is wholly disapproved. Political, social, fraternal, or church influences are to be altogether ignored, and every appointment must be made upon the merit basis. The president and other officers of the University are to feel fully assured that the trustees will heartily support them in acting upon this principle; therefore, be it

\*Resolved\*, That that portion of the rule referring to relatives be eliminated

Resolved, That that portion of the rule referring to relatives be eliminated from the rule, as well as all constructions of this rule which have been made by the board since the rule was adopted up to the present time, and that the following rule be substituted for it and read as follows:

(a) In the opinion of the board all University positions should be kept on the merit basis. No officer or employee should be removed except for good cause, and whenever an appointment is made it should be made solely with regard to special fitness.

(b) The board storms with its stormage is a special fitness.

(b) The board stamps with its strongest disapproval any disposition to make patronage out of University appointments. Political, social, fraternal, or church influences are to be altogether ignored, and every appointment must be made upon the merit basis. The President and other officers of the University are to feel fully assured that the trustees will heartly support them in acting upon this participle. principle.

Dr. Montgomery moved the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

President Abbott, the third member of the special committee, having asked Mr. Moore to take the chair, presented the following recommendation as a minority report and moved its adoption as a substitute for the report presented by the majority of the committee.

That the existing rules be modified so that they will not exclude members of the faculty who marry relatives of other members of the faculty.

When, after further discussion, the vote was taken, the motion to substitute the minority report for the report presented by the majority of the special committee was lost, the vote being as follows: Ayes, Mr. Abbott, Mrs. Evans; noes, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Henrotin, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Moore, Mr. Trevett, Miss Watson; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Dunne, Mr. Hoit, Mr. Meeker.

The report of the majority of the special committee as presented by Dr. Montgomery was then adopted, the vote being as follows: Ayes, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Henrotin, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Moore, Mr. Trevett, Miss Watson; noes, Mr. Abbott, Mrs. Evans; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Dunne, Mr. Hoit, Mr. Meeker.

At this point Mr. Abbott resumed the chair.

President James asked permission to have it recorded in the minutes that the President of the University, while favoring the modification proposed in his previous recommendation, had opposed the total repeal of the rule with respect to the non-employment of relatives.

## REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE IN REGARD TO THE PURCHASE OF LAND.

Mr. Moore, as Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the following report and recommendation with reference to the purchase of land:

The Finance Committee begs to report that they have not had sufficient time to examine all of the options and proposed tracts of land, nor to consult with the President of the University and the heads of departments.

Your committee advises, however, that, in view of the liberal appropriation for buildings and land purchases, the board should set aside from the amount \$400,000 for the biennium exclusively for land purchase, to provide for the present and partially for the future needs of the University.

We further recommend that, in view of the expiration of the option on the 160 acres of land known as the "Busey tract" on August 1, at \$1,000 per acre,

which option cannot be renewed, and the desirability of owning the 160 acres adjoining the Busey tract on the south, the option price of same being \$600 per acre, the sum of \$256,000 be appropriated at this meeting for the purchase of these tracts, and that the officers of the board be authorized and instructed to purchase these properties for the University at once.

For the consideration of the other tracts, we ask for further time.

ALLEN F. MOORE, J. R. TREVETT.

Mrs. Busey moved that the report of the Finance Committee be accepted, that the officers of the board be authorized to close the purchase of the tracts of land recommended by the committee to be purchased, and that the committee be given further time for the consideration of other proposed tracts.

President James presented again a recommendation offered at a previous meeting of the board that the board should provide for a special committee, of which the Governor of the State should be a member, to pass upon the question whether the price proposed for these properties is a reasonable price which the Board of Trustees ought to pay, calling attention to the fact that the so-called "options" were nothing more than offers of the property by the owners at the stated prices, and also urging that putting so much money into land at the present time would seriously embarrass the regular budget for operating expense and the program for the building and equipment.

Mrs. Evans moved that the consideration of Mrs. Busey's motion be deferred until the President of the University shall have presented the salary and buildings budgets.

White, Supervising Architect, that five thousand dollars (\$5,000) be appropriated for the extension of electrical conduit and cable, to provide for fifteen ducts from the Physics Building to the Law Building, for the extension of three ducts from the Dairy Barns to the Stock Judging Pavillon, for six ducts from the Dairy Barns to the Horticultural Green Houses, and for six ducts for 300 feet towards the new Armory and four ducts the balance of the way.

This recommendation was approved.

#### AUTHORITY FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR FRECHET.

(2) A request that the President of the University be authorized to appoint Professor Fréchet of the University of Poitiers to be Professor of Mathematics in the University of Illinois for the academic year 1914-15, at a salary of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the year.
