## MEETING OF NOVEMBER 14, 1914.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, at 12.30 p.m., on Saturday, November 14, 1914, pursuant to the following notice which was sent out by the Secretary on November 6, 1914:

Upon the call of the President, Mr. W. L. Abbott, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University, in Urbana, on Saturday, November 14, 1914, beginning at 12.30 p. m., to consider such matters as the committees of the board and the President of the University may submit, and such other business as may be duly presented.

When the board convened, the following members were present: Abbott, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Moore. Mr. Hoit came in a little later and recorded his vote on the actions already taken; and Mr. Dunne and Miss Watson joined the board during the recess.

Prof. J. M. White, Supervising Architect, and Judge O. A. Harker, Legal Counsel, were present during part of the meeting.

#### COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS OF SYMPATHY FOR DR. JAMES.

The death of Mrs. James was announced and it was moved by Dr. Montgomery that President Abbott appoint a special committee to draft resolutions of sympathy for President James. The motion was carried. President Abbott appointed Dr. Montgomery and Superintendent Blair. The members of the committee retired for conference. On their return, Dr. Montgomery presented the following resolutions and moved their adoption. The resolutions were adopted unanimously, by a rising vote.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois learn with sorrow of the death of Mrs. Anna Margarethe James, wife of the honored President of the University of Illinois, who for thirty-five years has been his companion and co-worker, a constant source of counsel, strength, and inspiration in the exacting duties of his high office; be it

Resolved, That the board offer to President James and the members of his family its sincere condolence in this their day of sorrow and express its hope that he and they may find that healing balm which comes down from the Mercy Seat.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT ABBOTT.

President Abbott presented for Dean Eugene Davenport, who was acting for President James, the following matters for consideration:

#### IMPORTATION OF CHEMICALS.

(1) A request from Dr. W. A. Noyes, Director of the Chemistry Laboratory, endorsed by Dean K. C. Babcock, for authority to place an order for the importation of chemicals and appartus for the year 1915-16, with the recommendation that

tion of chemicals and appartus for the year 1915-16, with the recommendation that the desired authority be given.

Dean K. C. Babcock, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

Dean Dean Babcock: The Comptroller has called my attention to the advisability of placing our annual order for importation of chemicals and apparatus from Germany much earlier than usual this year. I would respectfully ask permission from the Board of Trustees to place an order for the importation of chemicals and apparatus to an amount not exceeding \$18,000. In order to be prepared to stock the students' lockers in the new building, and also because of the probability of higher prices on account of the war. I am asking for permission to place a larger order than usual. Permission was given for an order not to exceed \$12.000 last year. \$12,000 last year.

We hope to place the order by the first of February, 1915. It is necessary to place the order a number of months in advance so as to have the goods delivered in time for the beginning of school work next fall. The bills, however, would be paid, for the most part, from our appropriation for the year 1915-16.

#### OPTION ON BRONSON PROPERTY.

Dear Sir: Mr. George Bronson has handed me an option on the Mathews Avenue frontage between Illinois and California Streets, which option he said was

requested by the Finance Committee.

He advised Mr. Moore that the option was ready and Mr. Moore told him to deliver it to Mr. Trevett and Mr. Trevett told him to turn it over to me. I have received it and have advised him that it will be brought to the attention of the board as soon as possible but that there was no chance whatever of the land being taken over before December 1, 1914, at which time the option expires.

The consideration is \$25,000, which is practically \$80 per front foot. He says that, if the Trustees will indicate this month their desire to close at the figure mentioned, the actual transfer of the property can be deferred. I advised him that it was my understanding that there would be no funds available for such a purpose before the first of next July.

DEAR SIR: I beg to submit to you the following report concerning the above entitled cause:

Petition was presented to Judge William G. Spurgin, Judge of the County Court of Champaign County, Illinois, September 26, 1914, and he set the cause for hearing for the 19th of October, 1914. He ordered jury and defendants to be summoned for that date.

Hearing was had beginning on the 19th of October, which was concluded on October 22, resulting in a verdict fixing the value of each one of the three lots at thirty-five hundred dollars (\$\$,500). In view of the fact that the testimony of witnesses introduced by the property owners was for \$4,000 for each lot, the assessment made is satisfactory. In this connection I desire to acknowledge very valuable aid from the Supervising Architect, Prof. James M. White.

The Counsel for the Board of Trustees announced to the court that it would accept the property and requested that time for payment of the compensation and the costs be extended until the 15th of December, 1914. The court granted the request, and, if the property is taken, the compensation and all costs attending the hearing must be paid on or before that date.

#### BOND FOR MILITARY SUPPLIES.

The Secretary reported for record that, inasmuch as there was an immediate necessity for the execution of a bond covering property of the United States Government in the possession of the Military Department of the University, the members of the Executive Committee did communicate with one another and did unanimously approve, on October 21, 1914, the following resolution:

"Resolved, That Prof. George E. Frazer, Comptroller of the Board of Trustees, sauthorized to secure a bond from the American Surety Company of New York in the amount of fifty thousand dollars, covering the ordnance and ordnance stores of the United States deposited with the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and that the Comptroller is authorized to execute such bond in the form required by the Chief of Ordnance of the War Department of the United States Government."

On motion of Superintendent Blair, the action of the members of the Executive Committee was approved and made an act of the board. #### SETTLEMENT OF SUIT OF MISS BREE KELLY.

President Abbott reported that Miss Bree Kelly had obtained judgment of \$750 and costs in a suit against the College of Physicians and Surgeons.
