# MEETING OF MAY 22, 1915.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in the city of Chicago, at 12.00 m., on Saturday, May 22, 1915, pursuant to the following notice which was sent out by the Secretary on May 15, 1915:

On the call of the President, Mr. W. L. Abbott, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, at 12 o'clock noon, on Saturday, May 22, 1915, to consider such matters as the committees of the board and the President of the University may submit, and such other matters as may be duly presented.

When the board convened, the following members were present: President Abbott, Mr. Carr, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Henrotin, Mr. Hoit, Mr. Ward, Miss

President James was present, and, during a part of the afternoon, Mr. W. B. Castenholz, Comptroller.

#### RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING MR. J. K. HOPKINS.

The death of Mr. James K. Hopkins, President of the State Board of Agriculture, and a member of the board, ex officio, having been announced, the following resolution was adopted on motion of Mrs. Evans:

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has learned of the death of Mr. James K. Hopkins, President of the State Board of Agriculture and ex officio a member of the Board of Trustees, be it

\*Resolved\*, That the board express its sincere regret at this great loss to the interests of education and of agriculture in the State of Illinois, and that the board tender its sympathy to the members of the bereaved family.

President Abbott and Mr. Hoit were appointed a committee to represent the board at the funeral of Mr. Hopkins on Sunday.

#### MINUTES APPROVED.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of April 21, 1915, and of the adjourned session of April 27, 1915, and also for record the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of April 27, 1915. On motion of Mrs. Evans, the minutes were approved and received for record as printed above on pages 230 to 271, inclusive.

#### COMPTROLLER INTRODUCED.

The President of the University presented Mr. W. B. Castenholz, recently elected Comptroller of the University, who indicated briefly certain ways in which he thought the system of accounting of the University could be improved, and announced that he would shortly submit a detailed plan for the consideration of the board.

At this point, Mr. Abbott, being called from the room, asked Mrs. Henrotin to preside over the meeting.

# MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

President James presented the following matters for the consideration of the board:

#### PARTIAL PAYMENT FROM J. R. WALSH ESTATE.

(1) Letters from the Comptroller and from the University Counsel relating to the judgment against the John R. Walsh estate: May 7, 1915.

DBAR SIR: We this day received from Judge Harker a check [for \$5,064.20] as indicated in my acknowledgment to him. This is in part payment of a judgment against the John R. Walsh estate, because of rents to the University of Illinois from the now defunct Ft. Dearborn Medical School. I have taken the liberty of crediting this receipt to our general fund.

Dear Sir: I beg to report with reference to the above matter that a dividend of 40 per cent has been authorized by the Probate Court of Cook County on the judgment which the University recovered against the Walsh estate on January 24, 1913, for \$11,372.16. This judgment was recovered on a claim against the estate by reason of Mr. Walsh being guarantor on a lease executed by the Board of Trustees to the Dearborn Medical College. The judgment was recovered before Judge Cummings, after something of a contest with other creditors.

I have received the dividend in the shape of a check for \$5,064.20, which I have turned over to the Comptroller of the University.

I am unable at this time to express any great confidence in a further collection of this claim. There is some pending litigation and some uncollected claims of doubtful character. The local attorney associated with me in the trial of the cause expresses the opinion that there will not be any considerable collection of the claims now in the hands of the administratrix, due the estate.

#### COMPANY OF ENGINEERS IN BRIGADE.

(2) A letter from Maj. F. D. Webster, Professor of Military Science, enclosing a communication from the Cadet Colonel and Brigade Commander, Joseph N. Greene, concerning the formation of a Company of Engineers in the Cadet Brigade. April 28, 1915.

Dear Sir: I am enclosing you a letter written by Cadet Col. J. N. Greene after consultation with myself and members of the Engineering Faculty. His suggestion is in line with my own recommendation for the establishment of an Engineer Company next year but goes more into detail.

My idea is ultimately to make this a Company of Engineer Militia like the Battery in order to get the full equipment for engineers issued by the War Department to such companies in the State. The organization of an Engineer Company will assist the State in organizing its auxiliary units and will help us along the lines of training in field engineering and topographical work.

It will increase the interest in military work at the University and probably help toward the establishment of the degree of B.S. in Military Science and Tactics. These suggestions are respectfully offered for your consideration.

Subject: Formation of a Company of Engineers.

1. I have the honor to recommend that there be formed at the University of Illinois a pioneer Company of Engineers to be attached to the Cadet Brigade.

2. The members of this company would be undergraduates of the College of Engineering, Departments of Mechanical, Civil, and Electrical Engineering. In order that the men of this company might be better equipped and trained for the work required of them each man should have had at least one semester's work in infantry drill. infantry drill.

3. To secure the maximum benefit for both the Military Department and the

men of the company the following plan of selection is suggested:
(a) Each man shall have shown that he is a practical engineer and that he has maintained an average for the preceding semester of at least 80 per cent.
(b) The Faculty of the College of Engineering shall recommend to the Military

Department at the beginning of each semester such men as they feel fill the above requirements. Their names shall be arranged on the list in order of their estimated ability

mated ability.

(c) The Commandant of Cadets shall then select from the list the names of a sufficient number to fill the ranks of the company. In this selection the nominee's ability in the school of infantry should be carefully considered.

(d) Promotions and assignments after the first recommendations shall be made by the Commandant of Cadets as provided by the regulations of the University.

4. The Commandant of Cadets and the Dean or Assistant Dean of the College of Engineering shall confer and arrange a schedule of lectures which shall be delivered by such members of the Engineering Faculty who volunteer to instruct the members of the Company upon those types of work which are usually taken up by Engineer Companies.

5. The organization of the company shall be as follows:

1 Cantain.

Captain. 1 Quartermaster Sergeant. 4 Sergeants.

First Lieutenants. Second Lieutenant. 8 Corporals. 54 Privates.

1 First Sergeant.
6. The officers of the company shall be appointed as provided by the regulations

of the University.
7. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees of the University provide at this time the four additional scholarships required by the establishment of this

company, the said scholarships to be available at the beginning of the school year 1915-16. It is believed that the organization of the company will, be greatly facilitated and that, the departments concerned will have a better opportunity to select men if the scholarships are provided for before the close of the present school year.

8. There will be no additional expense in the way of uniforms as the Army regulations prescribe the same uniform for engineers as for the infantry. A small amount of money should be included in the Military Department budget for the school year 1915-16 for the construction of a "spar bridge" of one type or another.

### PROPOSED COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE.

(4) A letter from the American Institute of Architects, addressed to the President and Board of Directors of the University of Illinois, concerning the proper organization of a School of Architecture, urging that Architectural Schools should be governed by an independent faculty. I assume this means that our Architectural Department should be a College of Architecture, instead of a department of the College of Engineering.

This communication was received and placed on file.

#### APPOINTMENT OF MR. ROBERT STEWART.

(5) A recommendation that Dr. Robert Stewart be appointed Associate Professor of Soil Fertility in the College of Agriculture and Associate Chief in Soil Fertility in the Agricultural Experiment Station, at a salary of \$3,000 a year, to begin September 1, 1915. This is to fill the vacancy created by the death of Dr. Pettit. Dr. Stewart is a graduate of the Agricultural College of Utah. He has pursued graduate studies at the University of Chicago and the University of Illinois, having taken the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Agronomy at the University of Illinois in 1909.

On motion of Mr. Hoit, this appointment was made.

#### APPOINTMENT OF MR. R. E. CUSHMAN.

(6) A recommendation that Mr. Robert E. Cushman be appointed Instructor in Political Science for the academic year beginning September 1, 1915, at a salary of \$1,200 a year. This appointment is made to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Prof. Walter F. Dodd. It may be necessary to make another appointment in order to take care of this work satisfactorily.

On motion of Miss Watson, this appointment was made.

#### APPOINTMENT OF DR. R. D. CARMICHAEL.

(7) A recommendation that Dr. Robert D. Carmichael, now Associate Professor of Mathematics at the University of Indiana, be appointed Assistant Professor of Mathematics for a term of three years, beginning September 1, 1915, at a salary of \$2,500 a year.

#### APPOINTMENT OF MR. GILBERT GUSLER.

(8) A recommendation that Mr. Gilbert Gusler, now Assistant Professor of Animal Husbandry in Ohio State University, be appointed Associate in Animal Husbandry in the College of Agriculture, beginning September 1, 1915, at a salary of \$1,800 for 10 months' service.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROF. LLOYD.

(9) A request from Prof. John W. Lloyd, endorsed by Prof. Blair and Dean Davenport, for leave of absence for one year on half pay.

On the recommendation of President James and on motion of Mr. Carr, the President of the University was authorized to grant leave of absence on half pay to Prof. J. W. Lloyd for the year beginning September 1, 1915, provided suitable arrangements can be made for his work.

#### APPOINTMENT OF DR. H. B. LEWIS.

(10) A recommendation that Dr. Howard B. Lewis, now Instructor in Physiological Chemistry in the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania, be appointed Associate in Physiological Chemistry for two years, beginning September 1, 1915, at a salary of \$2,200 a year.

On motion of Mr. Hoit, this appointment was made.

#### APPOINTMENT OF MR. G. F. WHICHER.

(11) A recommendation that Mr. George F. Whicher be appointed Instructor in English for the year beginning September 1, 1915, at a salary of \$1,400 a year. On motion of Mr. Carr, this appointment was made.

#### APPOINTMENT OF DR. KENNETH McKENZIE.

(12) A recommendation that Dr. Kenneth McKenzie of Yale University be appointed Professor of Romance Languages at a salary of \$4,000 a year, work, and salary to begin September 1, 1915; and that he be appointed head of the department until further notice.

#### CHARGE FOR CHAIRS AT BAND CONCERTS.

This periodical is edited by Dr. Alvord. It is a valuable publication, and the location of its editorial department at the University is a distinct advantage to our Department of History and to our students and professions. our students and professors.

At this time I should like to have the Board of Trustees express its opinion

At this time I should like to have the Board of Trustees express its opinion as to whether it is desirable to mark this anniversary by exercises of a fitting kind. If so, I shall ask the Senate to appoint a committee to prepare a general plan for the consideration of the board.

It was the opinion of the board that such a celebration should be held.

## AUDIT OF TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS.

M. W. Busey, Treasurer.

On the motion of Mr. Hoit, the Finance Committee was directed to have the usual audit made of the accounts of the retiring Treasurer, Mr. M. W. Busey.

### COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

Mr. Abbott presented the following report of the meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds held May 19, 1915:

A meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was held in the Trustees' Room, at the University, in Urbana, on Wednesday, May 19, 1915.

Mr. W. L. Abbott, Mr. R. F. Carr, and Mrs. Laura B. Evans, members of the committee, and Prof. C. R. Richards, Prof. S. W. Parr, Mr. H. D. Oberdorfer, and Mr. G. B. Rice were present.

The committee took up the consideration of the deterioration of the boilers in the University plant, of what action should be taken to prevent further deterioration of the boilers, and of what was necessary in the way of repairs.

The discussion developed the fact that the University is located in a territory in which the deep-well water supply has been found to be very destructive to boilers and in which numerous cases of boiler failure have been recorded. The condition of the University boilers at this time was found to be very serious. Extensive repairs have been made to the boilers in the old boiler house, and it is known that additional repairs to at least one boiler are necessary. The condition of the boilers in the old boiler house is uncertain, but it is feared that an examination will reveal serious defects. In the new boiler house, two 500 horsepower boilers which have been in use only three years are so badly injured that it is not considered advisable to operate them further until extensive repairs are made.

In view of these facts, your committee recommends:

In view of these facts, your committee recommends:

1. That a temporary treatment for the boiler feed water which will prevent further injury to the boilers be made.

2. That plans be prepared at once for permanent equipment for the treatment

2. That plans be prepared at once for permanent equipment for the treatment of the feed water.

3. That an appropriation of \$4,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be made to replace the four drums of boilers No. 1 and No. 2 with new drums. Mr. Oberdorfer presented for the information of the committee a report made by Prof. Edward Bartow, on request of Prof. White (see minutes, March 9, 1915, page 226), concerning a plant for the purification of the University water supply. Mr. Oberdorfer presented a report of complaints of unsteady lights in the libraries, with a request that a Tirrill regulator be purchased at a cost of \$500.

The committee recommends that such a regulator be purchased and installed. Mr. Oberdorfer presented also a request from the Supervising Architect that, a sump pump be added to the pumping station at a cost of \$134. The committee recommends that such a pump be installed.

The committee took up the consideration of the request of the Urbana and Champaign Railway, Gas, and Electric Company for permission to run a street-car track along the parking east of the Forestry, on Lincoln Avenue (minutes, April 27, 1915, page 246). Upon inspection of the ground, the committee found that the damage incidental to the construction of the track, and the necessary trimming of the trees, did not threaten to be serious. The committee found no particular objection to the granting of the permission requested.

The committee adjourned.

#### STREET CAR LINE ON LINCOLN AVENUE.

The matter of permission to construct a street-car line on Lincoln Avenue was discussed at some length. In this connection President James presented the following letter from Prof. J. M. White, Supervising Architect: May 21, 1915.

President E. J. James, University of Illinois.

DEAR SIR: From my point of view there are two objections to the granting of the Urbana-Champaign Railway's request for permission to lay tracks on the west

side of Lincoln Avenue, along the University's frontage.

The immediate objection is the damage which would result to the trees on the last block to the south. The low-growing branches would have to be trimmed off for the entire length of the block, which would injure their appearance for

three or four years.

The second objection is that the street-car line, as proposed, might very seriously interfere with some desirable future development of the Forestry.

Forestry has practically served the scientific purposes for which it was planted, and its future use we shall probably be called upon to decide in the near future. It seems to me that it is very undesirable to take any step now which may interfere with a development which may prove to be the best when considered from the standpoint of all other conditions. If permission is given to lay the track on the street, we shall have no control over it, nor shall we have any recourse, if we find it objectionable to the University's interests to have it there.

Under these conditions it seems to me unwise to grant the request.
