

Adjourned Session, September 27, 1915.

Pursuant to the adjournment taken at the afternoon session of September 23, 1915, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met in the Trustees' Room, at the University, in Urbana, on Monday, September 27, 1915, at 2.00 p. m.

The following members were present: Mr. Abbott, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Henrotin, Miss Watson.

President James was present, and, also during a part of the session, Miss Martha J. Kyle, Acting Dean of Women, and Mr. H. D. Oberdorfer, Assistant to the Supervising Architect.

RECORDS OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

The Secretary presented for record the following minutes of meetings of the Executive Committee held on August 17 and 28, and September 7, 1915; also the minutes of a meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds held on August 28, 1915; and also the minutes of meetings of the Committee on the College of Medicine held on August 17 and September 7, 1915.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, AUGUST 17, 1915.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at Hotel La Salle, in Chicago, at 1.00 p. m., on Tuesday, August 17, 1915.

Mr. W. L. Abbott, Chairman, and Mr. O. W. Hoit, member of the committee, and President James were present.

The President of the University presented the following matters for consideration:

APPOINTMENT OF DR. R. G. PEARCE.

(1) A recommendation that Dr. Roy G. Pearce, now at Western Reserve University, be appointed Assistant Professor of Physiology in the College of Medicine for three years beginning September 1, 1915, or as soon thereafter as he reports for duty, with salary at the rate of twenty-seven hundred and fifty dollars a year.

This recommendation was approved.

SALARY OF PROF. J. M. MATHEWS.

(2) Owing to a clerical mistake in the budget [page 797] the salary of Assistant Prof. J. M. Mathews of the Department of Political Science was fixed at twenty-one hundred dollars a year. It was intended that the recommendation should be twenty-three hundred dollars a year for the term of his appointment.

The salary of Dr. Mathews was fixed at twenty-three hundred dollars a year for the term of his appointment.

PURCHASE OF AUTOMOBILE.

(3) A request from the College of Agriculture for the purchase from Agricultural Funds of a seven passenger automobile, at a cost of about fifteen hundred dollars, to be in charge of the Department of Agricultural Extension and to be used for three purposes:

1. To transport members of the faculty who have University business to the South Farm and other distant points.
2. To facilitate the handling of visitors on the grounds.
3. To be available in case of necessity for other University purposes, all subject to the direction of the President of the University.

This request was granted and the corresponding appropriation made.

APPROPRIATION FOR SUMMER SESSION.

(4) A recommendation that the appropriation for the Summer Session of the present year be increased by five hundred dollars to meet unexpected expenditures, including three hundred dollars for administrative services—one hundred and fifty dollars for Mr. Miller, and one hundred and fifty dollars for Prof. W. C. Bagley.

This appropriation was made.

APPOINTMENT OF MR. H. F. HARRINGTON.

(5) A recommendation that Mr. H. F. Harrington, now Assistant Professor of Journalism in the University of Kansas, be appointed Associate in Journalism for the term of two years from September 1, 1915, at a salary of two thousand dollars a year.

This appointment was made.

EQUIPMENT FOR COURSES IN JOURNALISM.

(6) A request for an appropriation of twenty-five hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to provide equipment for the courses in journalism.

This request was granted and the appropriation made to include such items of equipment as may be requested by the Department of Journalism and approved by the President of the University.

BUDGETS, COLLEGES OF MEDICINE AND DENTISTRY.

(7) The itemized budget for salaries and expenses of the College of Dentistry and the College of Medicine within the limits set by the budget already approved; namely, two hundred thousand dollars.

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The President of the University was authorized to arrange the details of the budget as to salaries and expenses of the College of Medicine and the College of Dentistry within the limits set by the budget.

BELGIAN RELIEF COMMISSION.

(8) A request from the Belgian Relief Commission that the University of Illinois send some member of its staff to help distribute relief among the Belgians.

Prof. Thomas E. Oliver is willing to undertake this task. It will be necessary, if the Trustees are willing that this should be done, to give him leave of absence until the beginning of the second semester of the academic year 1915-16, that is until February 9, 1916.

This is an unusual opportunity for a member of the Department of Romance Languages. The commission consists of the American Commission for Relief in Belgium, the Spanish Commission for Relief in Belgium, and the Belgian National Committee of Aid and Sustenance. The honorary chairmen are the Spanish Ambassador in London, the Spanish Minister in Brussels, and the American Ambassadors in Brussels, The Hague, London, Berlin, and Paris. Herbert C. Hoover, the chairman of the commission, is a distinguished engineer with offices in London, New York, and San Francisco. The Vice Chairman is Linden W. Bates, another distinguished engineer of New York and London. The bankers are The National City Bank and the Guarantee Trust Company of New York.

The request was made from the London office of the commission, who say that they are in need of five or six men from the United States for the Belgian staff of this commission.

Leave of absence was granted to Prof. Thomas E. Oliver for this service.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. B. E. POWELL.

(9) A recommendation that Dr. Burt E. Powell be appointed for one year from September 1, 1915, to be Editor of the University Press Bullétin, Director of the Information Office, and University Historian, at a salary of twenty-five hundred dollars a year.

This appointment was made.

FUNDS FOR SMITH MUSIC BUILDING.

(10) It will be remembered that Capt. Thomas J. Smith presented certain farms to the University from the proceeds of the sale of which a Music Building was to be erected on the Campus for the use of the University, and authority was given to the Comptroller to sell such of these farms as he may be able to sell at a price not less than the value set upon them by Capt. Smith [page 106].

It may not be possible to sell these farms at such a price in time to permit the erection of this building within the present biennium. Capt. Smith is naturally very desirous of seeing this building erected at as early a date as possible. He would very much like to see it dedicated by February, 1917, the fiftieth anniversary of his marriage to Mrs. Smith, in whose honor the building is erected. We need this building very much to enable us to develop in a more worthy way our musical work. I think it would be feasible to borrow upon these farms a sum sufficient to erect at least a wing of this building by the time suggested by Capt. Smith.

The Executive Committee approved the general idea and the President of the University was authorized to see what arrangements can be made to carry out the project and to present the same for the consideration of the Board of Trustees.

APPROVAL OF SIGNING SECRETARY'S NAME.

The following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, It became necessary for Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, to authorize Mr. W. B. Castenholz, Comptroller, to sign his name to University Warrant No. 13 in the trust funds' account, the Executive Committee hereby approves said action and signature on said University Warrant No. 13, in the trust funds' account.

AUTHORITY TO SIGN WARRANTS.

Mr. Abbott stated that he had given the Comptroller of the University, Mr. W. B. Castenholz, authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees to all warrants drawn on the University Treasurer from August 15 to September 15, 1915. This action of Mr. Abbott was approved.

APPOINTMENT OF PROF. A. V. BLEININGER.

On nomination of President James, Mr. A. V. Bleininger was appointed Professor of Ceramic Engineering and Head of the Department of Ceramic Engineering for the term of five months, from September 1, 1915, to February 1, 1916, at a salary of five hundred dollars a month.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, SEPTEMBER 7, 1915.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the office of Mr. W. L. Abbott, in Chicago, on Tuesday, September 7, 1915.

All the members of the Executive Committee were present; namely, Mr. W. L. Abbott, Chairman, Mr. R. F. Carr, and Mr. O. W. Hoit. Mrs. Laura B. Evans, a member of the board, and President James were present.

SITE FOR THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

The question of the purchase of certain property in the city of Chicago for the use of the School of Pharmacy was carefully considered in conjunction with the report of the Committee on the College of Medicine, which was to the effect that this property should be purchased if it can be bought for what the Board would consider a reasonable figure. Letters from W. B. Day, Acting Dean of the School of Pharmacy of the University of Illinois, indicating that in his opinion the building under consideration could be made usable for the School of Pharmacy by the addition of a structure for the laboratories; a letter from Prof. J. M. White concerning the physical condition of the building with an estimate of the cost of putting it in order for use by the School of Pharmacy; and a letter from Mr. N. Rooneberg, Industrial Engineer, expressing the opinion that the building is throughout in a good state of preservation, were presented.

On motion of Mr. Carr, Mr. Alexander Prussing was authorized to ascertain whether the holders of the first mortgage on this property would accept an offer of fifteen thousand dollars for their rights in the property, provided these rights carried with them the power to give a satisfactory deed, and to report the result of this inquiry to President Abbott.

PRESIDENT'S BILL FOR TRAVELING EXPENSES.

The Chairman of the committee, Mr. Abbott, presented the bill for the sum of \$4,141.28, for traveling expenses incurred by the President of the University in the course of conducting University business from July 1, 1910, to June 30, 1915, which had been referred to the Executive Committee with power to audit and, if found correct, to order payment [page 810].

After examination and audit, the bill was approved and ordered paid.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE MEETING, AUGUST 28, 1915.

A meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was held in the Trustees' Room, at the University, in Urbana, on Saturday, August 28, 1915.

Mr. W. L. Abbott, Chairman, Mrs. Mary E. Busey, and Mrs. Laura B. Evans, members of the committee were present; also Mr. O. W. Hoit, a member of the board, President James, and Prof. J. M. White, Supervising Architect.

After a careful inspection of sites proposed for new agricultural buildings and an inspection of the progress achieved in the erection of the Ceramics and Vivarium Buildings, the committee took up the following items of business:

ACCEPTANCE OF ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.

A recommendation from the Supervising Architect that the Administration Building be accepted as of the date of July 15, 1915, so far as English Brothers' contracts are concerned, and that the bonus earned by English Brothers, of one thousand and fifty dollars, be paid.

After Mr. English was heard upon the subject, a recommendation was made and referred to the Board of Trustees for final action.

SYSTEM OF ROADWAYS AND PAVEMENTS.

The committee heard Prof. F. H. Newell upon the desirability of making a comprehensive plan for the roadways and pavements of the University and adopting the method of constructing different portions of these roads and pavements of varying construction so that the students in the Department of Civil Engineering might have specimens of various kinds of road construction near at hand for purposes of study.

No action was taken upon this matter.

UNIVERSITY WATER SYSTEM.

Mr. Paul Hansen, Engineer of the State Water Survey, was heard upon the subject of the University water system. He presented a report prepared by Director Edward Bartow and himself containing a study of the needs of the University for water at present, with an estimate of the need for a number of years to come and with certain recommendations.

No action was taken on this matter.

EXTENSION OF TIME, CERAMICS BUILDING.

Mr. A. W. Stoolman, contractor for the Ceramics Building, was heard in regard to a request for an extension of time.

No action was taken on this matter.

FEEDING PLANT.

The Supervising Architect presented a provisional plan for the new feeding plant, with a recommendation that it be located on the back farm on a line east and west from the front of the sheep barn and about two-thirds of the way from the sheep barn to the farm house located on the top of the hill.

The location and the general plan were approved.

AGRONOMY BARN.

The Supervising Architect presented a plan for an agronomy barn, to cost about five thousand dollars, and to be located on or near the site of the present barn on the back farm at the end of the street running into the agronomy fields from the north.

The general plan and the location were approved.

GENETICS BUILDING.

The Supervising Architect presented plans for a Genetics Building, with a recommendation that it be located on the back Campus immediately south of the agronomy plots, extending from Mathews Avenue about 120 feet west.

No action was taken on this recommendation.

No action was taken upon these subjects.

DEANSHIP, COLLEGE OF MEDICINE.

The question of the deanship of the College of Medicine for the coming year was also discussed, and the matter was referred with power to act to the President of the University under the authority already granted by the Board of Trustees.

BUDGET, COLLEGES OF MEDICINE AND DENTISTRY.

The President of the University presented the budget for the Colleges of Medicine and Dentistry, which was referred to the Executive Committee with recommendation that it be approved.

COMMITTEE ON COLLEGE OF MEDICINE, SEPTEMBER 7, 1915.

SITE FOR SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

President James presented a letter from Mr. Alexander Prussing, dated July 15, 1915, saying that in all probability certain property could be acquired by the purchase of the master's certificate which was issued at the time of the foreclosure of a mortgage on the property. The mortgage amounts to something like twenty thousand dollars.

This is the property which has been recommended to the Board of Trustees as a suitable one for housing the School of Pharmacy.

Messrs. Abbott and Hoyt examined the property on occasion of the previous meeting of the Committee on the College of Medicine held at Hotel La Salle, on Tuesday, August 17, 1915. A letter was presented from Prof. J. M. White, expressing his opinion as to the condition of the building, and also a copy of a letter from Mr. N. Rooneberg, Industrial Engineer, concerning the structural condition of the building, in which he states that he found the building throughout in a good state of preservation.

After full consideration of the subject, on motion of Mr. Hoyt, the committee recommended the purchase of this property if it can be bought for what the Board of Trustees would consider a reasonable figure.
