

**MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**  
**OF THE**  
**UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS**

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**November 19, 1920**

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A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, at 10 o'clock a.m. on Friday, November 19, 1920, pursuant to the following notice which was sent out by the Secretary on November 10, 1920.

On the call of the President, Mr. Robert F. Carr, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, in Urbana, at 10 a.m. on Friday, November 19, 1920, to consider matters submitted by the President of the University and the Committees of the Board, and such other matters as may be duly submitted.

It is very desirable that a full attendance be secured for this meeting, as matters pertaining to the Legislative Budget will be presented.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Carr, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Hoit. Mr. Abbott and Mr. Blair came later.

President Kinley was present.

## LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR DIRECTOR J. L. ERB

(2) A recommendation that the President of the University be authorized to grant leave of absence with full pay to Director J. L. Erb of the School of Music from November 25 to January 3, on account of ill health.

On motion of Mrs. Busey, this recommendation was approved.

## ANNUAL REGISTER

(3) Recommendation from the Committee on Catalog, approved by the Council of Administration:

1. That the total number of copies for the 1920-21 edition be made 16,500.
2. That 13,000 copies, to include all material except the student lists, be scheduled for publication on February 15.
3. That the remaining 3,500 copies be held with the printer until it is possible to furnish copy for the complete student lists including registrations for the second semester, and that these copies be scheduled for publication on May 1.
4. That except for the regular official mailing list, which includes the Board of Trustees, members of the General Assembly, the University Senate, libraries, colleges and universities, high schools, etc., a nominal charge be made for the catalogs which include the student lists.

On motion of Mrs. Busey, recommendation 1 was approved, and it was voted that in the opinion of the Board the Annual Register should be published in the same form as before, but that the President of the University might authorize the publication in February of a limited number of advance copies without the list of names if in his judgment that seemed necessary.

#### COMMISSION ON THE COLLEGE OF LAW

(4) The following statement:

#### APPROPRIATION FOR ADDITIONAL FRESHMEN IN MEDICINE

(5) A recommendation that \$650 be appropriated from the Reserve and Incidental Fund to provide for additional student assistants and additional lockers in the Chemistry laboratory of the College of Medicine, caused by the fact that 112 freshmen were admitted, while accommodations for only 100 were provided.

#### UPPERCLASSMEN EXCUSED FROM PHYSICAL EDUCATION

(7) A recommendation from Council of Administration that our present graduation requirements be amended by the addition of a provision that men and women students transferring to the University with junior or senior standing may be relieved from the requirement in Physical Education.

This recommendation was approved.

#### MORTGAGES ON MEDICAL PROPERTY

(8) A statement calling attention to the fact that certain mortgages on the buildings occupied by the College of Medicine fall due next June.

No action was taken in this matter.

(9) A recommendation from the Council of Administration that the following laboratory fees be established, effective February 7, 1921:

#### GENERAL SCIENCE FOR ADMISSION

(10) A recommendation from the University Senate that the subject of general science be included in List B of subjects acceptable for entrance credit for one-half to one unit, subject to the following conditions for accrediting:

That the subject matter taught be of a character such as to enable the pupils to interpret their obvious environment, both natural and mechanical, in terms of the fundamental principles of science involved;

That the work necessary to earn a full unit of credit be conducted as a laboratory science with double periods for unprepared work;

That the teachers employed to teach this subject shall have had at least one year each of biological and physical science in a standard college or university, or shall show a fairly equivalent preparation for teaching such a course.

On motion of Mr. Hoit, this recommendation was approved.

#### CONTRACTS FOR LOANS OF MACHINERY

(11) A recommendation that the following form of lease be approved for use by the Division of Farm Mechanics in the Department of Agronomy in borrowing farm machinery from manufacturers for use in instruction. This has been pronounced satisfactory by the Legal Counsel.

In consideration of the sum of one dollar, the Company agrees to loan to the  
University, for uses stipulated below, farm machinery and other goods, from  
..... to .....subject to.....  
the following conditions:

The type, size, and quantity of goods to be loaned will be determined by mutual  
agreement between a representative of the Company and a member of the staff of  
the Division of Farm Mechanics, University of Illinois.

The goods will be housed in the Farm Mechanics Building of the University of  
Illinois, subject to the order of the Company, whose representatives may have access  
to the same during University office hours.

The University agrees to pay the transportation charges from and to the nearest  
branch office or warehouse of the Company, except in case of the removal of the goods  
at the initiative of the Company within the time specified above, in which case the  
Company will pay the transportation charges incurred by moving the goods, except  
when special arrangements are made to which both parties mutually agree.

The University agrees to keep the goods housed and to pay for all repairs and  
shortage occasioned by the goods being in its possession; but the University does not  
assume any responsibility in case of fire.

The goods loaned are to be used for classwork and field demonstrations in con-  
nection with the Farm Mechanics courses, and, unless special permission is given by  
the Company, are not to be used in extensive work upon the University farm or else-  
where for other than instructional purposes.

It is agreed that if goods are no longer desired by the University for instructional  
work, they may be returned after a representative of the University has corresponded  
with the Company in order to secure shipping directions.

**RESOLUTION IN REGARD TO PAYMENTS  
ON CLINICAL INSTITUTE CONSTRUCTION**

On motion of Mr. Hoit, the following was adopted:

WHEREAS, on July 5, 1919, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois entered into an agreement with the State Department of Public Welfare, through its Director, Honorable Charles H. Thorne, for cooperation in the erection of a group of State and University buildings for use as hospitals, clinical institute, and medical buildings;

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University, believing that the erection of said buildings would be more efficiently conducted and the interests of the State and the University better promoted if the enterprise of erection of said buildings were under one management, on July 12, 1919, passed a resolution turning over to said Department of Public Welfare, under the direction of Honorable Charles H. Thorne, the expenditure of the sum of \$300,000 appropriated by the last General Assembly for the erection of a clinical institute for the University, to be one of the buildings of the cooperative group herein referred to, to be expended under the direction of said Director of Public Welfare, for the erection of said buildings, in accordance with the act appropriating said \$300,000;

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees have seen and accepted the architectural plans of said clinical institute,

Now, therefore, in order to facilitate payment for work done on said clinical institute, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby resolves that, in confirmation of the practise already followed, it will pay in the method prescribed by law for expenditures from University funds, bills presented for work on the construction of the University clinical institute heretofore referred to, to the amount of \$300,000 appropriated therefor, and no more, on the presentation of proper certificates for such expenditures, issued by the Department of Public Works, and approved by said Director of Public Welfare and the State Architect;

And in accordance with this resolution, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby authorizes and directs the President of the Board of Trustees and the Secretary of the Board to honor vouchers for this purpose, thus approved, in accordance with the provisions of the law for the payment of expenditures on account of University appropriations to the total mount of said appropriation of \$300,000, and no more.

**BILL OF CONSULTING ARCHITECTS**

At this point, Mr. Carr presented a bill from Holabird and Roche for their services as Consulting Architects up to September 1, 1920, amounting to \$5000.

On motion of Mr. Blair, this bill was ordered paid, the money to be transferred from the Reserve and Incidental fund. The vote was as follows: Aye, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mr. Carr, Mrs. Evans, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Hoit; no, none; absent, Mr. Abbott, Mr. Lowden, Mr. Trimble, Mr. Ward.

The Secretary was directed to ask Holabird and Roche for a statement of their account in full, to be presented at the December meeting.

At this point, Mr. Abbott took his seat with the Board.

#### STUDENT LOAN FUNDS

(12) A memorandum of proposed regulations concerning the collection of loans made from student loan funds.

(a) Loans shall continue to be made under the arrangements now existing, excepting that students receiving loans shall sign their promissory notes at the bank of the University Treasurer, or some local bank designated by him.

(b) Form of note to be hereafter used shall be a judgment note providing for small payments at frequent intervals as follows:

 to pay a reasonable attorney's fee if collection is made without suit, and if suit is

 or the holder thereof for the amount due on this note and reasonable attorney's fees.

And we hereby authorize and empower any attorney of any Court of Record, at  
 any time after the date hereof, to appear in any Court of Record of this State, or the  
 United States, either in term or in vacation, and enter our appearance in any such  
 Court, and for us and in our name and stead, waive process and service of process and  
 confess judgment on this note in favor of the payee or holder thereof, and against  
 such makers for the amount of the principal sum of this note and all interest thereon,  
 less all credits of payment indorsed on the back hereof, and ten per cent of the principal  
 sum of this note to be added as attorney's fees and made a part of the judgment.

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(c) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect these notes when due  
 and to report to the Comptroller and the Deans of Men and Women on the first of  
 each month the collections he has made during the preceding month.

(d) The Treasurer shall call on the Legal Counsel of the University for  
 advice and assistance in the collection of these notes whenever in his judgment it is  
 necessary, provided that he shall first secure the approval of the Dean of Men or the  
 Dean of Women, as the case may be, before instituting such proceedings.

On motion of Mr. Herbert, these regulations were adopted.

**AFTERNOON SESSION, NOVEMBER 19, 1920**

When the Board convened for the afternoon session of November 19, 1920, the following members were present: President Carr, Mr. Abbott, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Hoit.

President Kinley was present; also, during a part of the afternoon, Dean Eugene Davenport, Dean C. R. Richards, Dean C. M. Thompson, Director P. L. Windsor, Professor E. J. Townsend, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and Professor J. M. White, Supervising Architect.

**EXPENSE ACCOUNT OF PRESIDENT JAMES**

Mr. Carr presented a bill for travelling expenses incurred by President Edmund J. James from July 1, 1915, to April 13, 1919, amounting to \$3,918.97.

On motion of Mr. Abbott, this bill was ordered paid, the money to be transferred from the Reserve and Incidental fund. The vote was as follows: Aye, Mr. Abbott, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mr. Carr, Mrs. Evans, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Hoit; no, none; absent, Mr. Lowden, Mr. Trimble, Mr. Ward.

The Board resumed the consideration of matters submitted by President Kinley.

**PARR COKE PROCESS**

(14) A recommendation from the special committee to consider the contract for the licensing of the Parr process for coking bituminous coal (see pages 19 and 72), that the action taken by the Board on October 16, 1918 (page 152), authorizing the Comptroller to enter into a contract, be rescinded.



On motion of Mr. Blair, the action of October 16, 1918, was rescinded, and the matter was referred to the President of the Board and the President of the University for further inquiry.

#### BUDGET ASKINGS, 1921-23

(15) A budget of proposed requests for state appropriations for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, prepared for submission to the General Assembly through the State Department of Finance, and carrying a total of \$10,500,000 for the biennium.

On request of President Kinley, Professor E. J. Townsend, in the absence of Dean Babcock, presented the needs of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences; Dean Thompson, of the College of Commerce; Dean Davenport, of the College of Agriculture; Dean Richards, of the College of Engineering; and Director Windsor, of the Library and the Library School.

On motion of Mrs. Evans, the proposed budget was approved and adopted as the request of the University to the General Assembly.

#### CONTRACT FOR BREEDING EXPERIMENTS WITH HAMPSHIRE SWINE

(16) A copy of a contract, which we have executed under the new regulations in regard to contracts, to undertake certain breeding experiments with Hampshire swine to be furnished to the University for this purpose by Mr. Samuel Patton of Paxton.

#### CONTRACT

*WHEREAS* Samuel Patton of Paxton, Illinois, desires the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to undertake certain breeding experiments with Hampshire swine for scientific purposes; and

*WHEREAS* the said Patton is willing to furnish the animals necessary for such experiments and the said Board through the Animal Husbandry Department of its said University is Willing to conduct such experiments:

It is mutually agreed between the said Samuel Patton, hereinafter called the first party, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, hereinafter called the second party.—

(1) That the first party shall furnish and deliver to the second party at its farm in Champaign County, Illinois, in such numbers, at such times and at such barns as the second party shall designate, all animals necessary for such experiments.

(2) The animals so furnished shall remain the property of the first party, but that all cross-breeds resulting from matings in the experiments shall be the property of the second party.

(3) The first party shall pay for the feed of all animals furnished by him as provided by paragraph (1), the cost of the same to be estimated by an employee in the Animal Husbandry Department of said University and paid by the first party on the basis of such estimate.

(4) The second party shall house and properly care for all animals furnished by the first party, but shall be responsible only for reasonable care.

(5) The data resulting from the experiments so conducted shall be the property of the second party and be published in like manner as are other experiments and investigations made at said University.

**PROFESSOR POMEROY APPOINTED  
TO ACCOUNTANCY COMMITTEE**

(19) A report that Professor John N. Pomeroy had been appointed a member of the University Committee on Accountancy in place of Dean H. W. Ballantine.

This report was received for record.

**CAMPUS COMMISSION**

At this point, Mrs. Blake presented for the Campus Plan Commission the following recommendations for the fixing of basic features of a permanent campus plan.

A. That a central mall be developed from the Auditorium to the cemetery having for its axis the meridian through the center of the Auditorium.

B. That a cross axis practically on the center line of the present Parade Ground be extended from Lincoln Avenue to First Street.

E. That a Parade Ground of approximately the present size be retained south of the Armory.

F. That an Engineering College group be planned west of the Parade Ground between First and Fourth Streets.

H. That the entire area between First Street and the Illinois Central Railroad, and from Armory Avenue south to our present holdings, be reserved for athletic and military activities.

I. That the development west and east of the cemetery be about an east and west axis through the cemetery approximately on its center line.

K. That the new Horticultural Building be erected on the proposed location, which is a knoll approximately 1000 feet east of Lincoln Avenue and 500 feet south of the north line of the Horticultural 320 acres.

On motion of Mrs. Blake, these recommendations were adopted.

**QUARTERLY MEETING TO BE HELD IN CHICAGO**

It was voted to hold the next quarterly meeting at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, December 14, 1920.

At this point, President Carr, asking Mrs. Busey to take the chair, withdrew.

The Board continued the consideration of matters presented by President Kinley.

(20) A design for a memorial to Miss Katherine L. Sharp, first Director of the Library School.

#### GIFTS TO THE QUINE LIBRARY

(22) A statement that the Quine Library of the College of Medicine has received the following gifts of importance:

From Dr. Eliza Root, for many years Dean of the Women's Medical College of Chicago, 700 volumes, files of medical journals, reprints, and a collection of pathological and histological slides; also a large framed photograph of Dr. C. W. Earle, one of the founders of the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

From Mrs. George B. Weaver of Wilmette, a daughter of Dr. C. W. Earle, a fine portrait of her father.

From Dr. D. A. K. Steele, 200 volumes of books and journals and a collection of stereoscopic anatomical charts.

From Dr. B. Holmes, 200 volumes of books and journals.

This report was received for record and the Secretary was directed to express to these donors the appreciation of the Board.

#### NASON COLLECTION

(23) The following statement:

In 1908 the University purchased a part of the extensive collections of insects and fossils made by Dr. W. A. Nason of Algonquin, Illinois. Since that time Dr. Nason has died, and his heirs have generously donated to the University the balance of his collections. Mr. F. C. Baker, Curator of the Natural History Museum, reports that these remaining collections are of great value. They represent the work of a generation by Dr. Nason. Much of the material was collected in northern Illinois, all with careful data, and the whole collection, especially the insects, is carefully mounted, with a large proportion in modern insect cases ready for study.

As a whole the collection is one of the most valuable received by the University and its addition to the collections of the Natural History Museum will greatly enhance the value of this department for both exhibition and research.

#### BEQUEST FROM MRS. J. M. GREGORY

**COMPTROLLER'S REPORT**

President Kinley reported for record the report of the Comptroller for the quarter ending September 30, 1920.

MY DEAR PRESIDENT KINLEY:

I beg to transmit herewith the monthly report of the business office which is also the quarterly report of the Comptroller to the Board of Trustees for the three months ending September 30, 1920.

*Realization of Income*

On page 3 appears a statement showing to what extent the estimated budget income was realized to September 30, 1920. From this it will appear that one-half of the interest on the Endowment Fund, the whole of the Morrill and Nelson Funds, one-fourth of the Hatch and Adams Funds and one-half of the Smith-Lever Fund were received by the University during the past quarter and deposited with the Treasurer. It will also be seen that the total amount collected under the 2-3 Mill Tax to meet our appropriations for the present year of \$2,500,000 was at September 30, \$2,323,296.11.

*The University Budget as at September 30, 1920*

This statement, page 134, shows a summary of budget appropriations to the various Colleges and Departments at September 30, 1920, including all appropriations from budget income but exclusive of revolving funds. The total of these appropriations at that date was \$3,389,674.84.

*Income Account*

On page 135 appears an exhibit of the Income Account showing the additions to the original budget as passed by the Board of Trustees in March including additional estimates of income and additional appropriations. From this statement it will appear that the free balance of income at September 30, 1920, which is the balance of the reserve and contingent fund, was according to the books of the Business Office \$143,818.54. I call attention to the fact, however, that there were in process at that time, but not yet entered on our books, additional appropriation items mostly for increases in salaries amounting to approximately \$12,000 so that the real balance in the reserve and contingent fund at September 1, 1920 was, therefore, approximately \$130,000.

*Receipts and Disbursements*

On page 135 appears a summary of the receipts and disbursements from all funds further supported by the detailed schedule of receipts on pages 136-138 inclusive and on disbursements from appropriations on pages 139-147 inclusive. From page 135 it

will be seen that the cash balance in the hands of the University Treasurer on September 30 was \$600,672.61, in petty cash funds \$13,125.00, in State funds \$2,156,461.26. These balances are of course cash or appropriation balances and not free or unencumbered balances.

#### Miscellaneous Statements

Statements of stores and revolving accounts appear on page 148, of trust funds on pages 149 and 150, reconciliations with the University Treasurer and State Auditor on page 151, and a balance sheet showing all the funds and properties of the University on page 152..
