The September quarterly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, at 10 o'clock a. m. on Friday, September 22, 1922.

The following members were present: President Abbott, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Herbert.
President Kinley was present.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of July 12, 1922, and of the meeting of the Executive Committee of July 17-18, 1922.

The minutes were approved and received for record as printed on pages 1 to 21 above.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, SEPTEMBER 1, 1922

The Secretary presented also for record the minutes of a meeting of the Executive Committee, held in Chicago on September 1, 1922.

A meeting of the Executive Committee was held in Chicago September 1, 1922. There were present O. W. Hoyt and W. L. Abbott. Supervising Architect James M. White was also present.

Business was transacted as follows:

(1) The Executive Committee of the University of Illinois Memorial Stadium appeared and presented a written request (see accompanying letter) that the Board of Trustees approve the action of that Committee in directing the Athletic Association to award certain contracts for the construction of the Stadium, and also requesting that the Committee be given permission to run a temporary construction spur track from the Illinois Central right-of-way, across University property, to the Stadium site.

The Executive Committee of the Board granted authority to the Athletic Association to enter into contracts as specified. The Executive Committee also gave the Stadium Committee permission to lay a spur track across University property, as requested, but subject to a contract to be drawn by the University Counsel, in which the University's rights would be safeguarded.

DEAR MR. ABBOTT:

As Secretary of the Executive Committee of the University of Illinois Memorial Stadium, I wish to advise that at a meeting of such committee, held in Chicago on this date, the following action was taken:

(1) Accepted and approved the report of the Building Committee of such Stadium Executive Committee, a copy of which I hand you herewith.

(2) Recommended to the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois that, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, it enter into contracts for the building of the Stadium with the following contractors, who were the lowest bidders on their respective work:

(2) Mr. C. H. Meyer, representing Schmidt & Garden, Architects for the Medical Research Laboratory, appeared before the Executive Committee with two bids for excavating and pile driving for the Medical Research Library and Laboratory building. These bids were opened and found to be as follows:

Geo. W. Jackson & Fitzpatrick Co.:

Excavation, \$1.45 per yard.

Piles, .46 per lineal foot.

Central Dredging Co.:

Lump sum bid of \$10,192.00.

As it will not be possible to award contracts for the remainder of the work on the building for another month, and as the bids received were considered to be reasonable the Architect was directed to "award the contract to that firm whose bid, under the circumstances, is most advantageous to the progress of the building."

(3) A communication was received from Dr. A. H. Daniels, Dean of the Graduate School, recommending that the requirement that a candidate for the Doctorate deposit a bond as an alternative guarantee of the publication of his thesis be discontinued, and that a cash deposit of \$75 be made an absolute requirement. Dr. Daniels stated that this matter had been discussed with President Kinley and had received his approval, but, owing to the absence of the President and the Vice-President, he was presenting it for the President as a matter on which immediate action is desired.

The Committee approved the recommendation.

The meeting adjourned.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR BOGART

This report was received for record.

SALARIES IN THE COLLEGE OF LAW

(13) A request for (a) authority to add not to exceed \$1000 to the salary budget in the College of Law to adjust the salaries of certain professors, not to exceed \$500 in any one case; and (b) that the tenure of Professor Pomeroy be changed from one year to the indefinite basis.

AFTERNOON SESSION, SEPTEMBER 22, 1922

When the Board convened for the afternoon session on September 22, 1922, the same persons were present as during the morning session.

NEEDS OF DEPARTMENTS PRESENTED

By request of the President of the University, certain representatives of the colleges were present and presented the needs of their departments as follows:

Dean Ketchum, Professor Talbot, Professor Stoek, and Professor Carman, for the College of Engineering; Dean Babcock, Professor Greene, and Professor Quirke, for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences; and Assistant Dean Rankin and Professor Rusk, for the College of Agriculture.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT KINLEY

The Board resumed its consideration of matters presented by the President of the University.

RESIGNATION OF PROFESSOR J. G. MOSIER

(18) The following letter from former Vice-President Davenport:

MY DEAR PRESIDENT KINLEY:

During your absence, I have approved for you the resignation of Professor Mosier, which his continued ill health has forced him to present.

Professor Mosier has been for twenty years a teacher in the College of Agriculture, and an agreeable member of the faculty. His great service has been ren-

dered in the classification of the soil types discovered in the survey, as based upon physical and chemical differences. The discriminating care with which, as a geologist, he has made these distinctions has served as a basis from which I am sure the University will not much deviate in the completion of the work.

It seems to me that so significant a piece of work as this is well worthy of honorable mention to the Board of Trustees, in connection with the acceptance of his resignation. This is the most exhaustive soil survey ever undertaken in the world, and Professor Mosier's connection with it, with respect to identifying types, has been of the highest value to the State and the institution.

I desire to put on record my hearty concurrence in the expression of appreciation in the above letter concerning Professor Mosier's work. He has been industrious, patient, thoro, and successful in his conduct of it, and has rendered a great service to the State, as well as to the University.

This report was received for record.

PROFESSOR W. F. HANDSCHIN

(19) During the summer, the University suffered a great loss in the death of Professor W. F. Handschin on August 2. The news of Professor Handschin's death was a great shock to me, especially as I had not been aware of his illness.

I wish to record my high opinion of him as a man, a teacher, and a scholar. He was with us seven years, and no one could have been more loyal, more industrious, or more interested in his work. Like many other men on the staff of the University of Illinois, he was for a long time overworked. His seven years' service was continuous. During that period he built up the great work of the Department of Farm Organization and Management which, in connection with the Departments of Economics and Accountancy, has made extensive inquiries into the subject matter of this field.

I trust that before long we shall be able to publish a real contribution to this phase of agricultural work and life, as a result of Professor Handschin's labors.

I ask that this appreciation of Professor Handschin, in which former Dean Davenport, his successor, and all other members of the faculty of the College of Agriculture concur, be made a matter of record in the minutes as the expression of opinion of the Trustees also, and that a copy be sent by the Secretary to Mrs. Handschin.

On motion of Mr. Hoit, this recommendation was adopted.

PAYMENT OF PROFESSOR HANDSCHIN'S SALARY

(20) A recommendation from Dean Davenport, in which I concur, that one-half of Professor Handschin's salary for next year be paid to his widow.

On motion of Mr. Hoit, this recommendation was approved.

At this point, Mr. Herbert withdrew.

PLANS FOR PROJECTED NEW BUILDINGS

(21) A request for an appropriation of \$2500 from the Reserve and Contingent fund to the Supervising Architect's office for use in making studies, plans, and specifications, in consultation with Architect C. A. Platt, with regard to designs for a new women's residence hall, the McKinley Hospital, and such other buildings as the Board may decide to ask for from the next legislature.

On motion of Mrs. Evans, this appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Abbott, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Hoit; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Noble, Mr. Small, Mr. Trimble.

CAMPUS PLAN DEVELOPMENT

(22) Suggestions by Architect C. A. Platt, concerning the development of the Campus Plan.

September 20, 1922

President David Kinley, 355 Administration Building

MY DEAR DR. KINLEY:

I have received from Mr. Charles A. Platt a copy of his letter of September 12th to Mr. Abbott with reference to his progress on our campus plan. I am enclosing Mr. Platt's letter and the accompanying drawing to which it refers.

In developing this plan, Mr. Platt has accepted the campus meridian as laid out by Mr. Olmstead in 1906 and the subdivision into general areas recommended by the 1912 Commission. The parade ground remains unchanged together with the avenues to the north and south of it, but the axis of the east and west mall has been moved south twenty feet, throwing it slightly off the axis of the parade ground. Mr. Platt's great contribution has been the working out of the area extending eastward from Sixth Street to Mathews Avenue and from the Auditorium southward to the Cemetery. The proposed buildings within this area cover about twenty-five per cent of the ground area, but are so distributed as to avoid monotony and to introduce the greatest possible variety into the avenues separating the buildings and to reduce the roadways to the minimum. You will note from the blue print that there are no roadways extending north and south between Goodwin Avenue and Sixth Street. In order to make the plan comprehensive, Mr. Platt has had to show a number of details which he has not sufficiently studied and upon which he is not yet ready to make recommendations, but he does request that the west walk be laid out and planted, and that Goodwin Avenue be extended through into the campus. I should also like to see the east walk opened up and planted as far as possible, tho the north end can not be laid out now because of interference with the Morrow Experimental Plots. I think for the present, we need only extend Goodwin Avenue to the avenue on the south border of the Agricultural plots rather than to the avenue in front of the greenhouses as he suggests. While there are advantages in closing Mathews Avenue, I hardly think we are ready to act upon that recommendation at this time.

I hope that Mr. Platt's specific recommendations may receive immediate consideration and that he will be instructed to make further studies and recommendations. If present action be limited to the specific recommendations made by Mr. Platt, the closing of Burrill Avenue need not be settled at this time, but I am heartily in favor of paving the way so that it can be accomplished in the future if necessary.

MY DEAR MR. ABBOTT:

I expect to go abroad for a short trip, leaving here this week and returning about the 15th of November. As questions may arise during my absence on which you might wish my opinion, I have prepared a plan at a scale of 100 feet to the inch showing the main structure of the plan of the south campus which seems practically assured by decisions made by the Board to date. I send you under other cover a copy of this plan.

Roads, Walks and Trees:

As the buildings will come slowly in the development of the south campus I hope that the main streets and walks may be built and trees planted as soon as possible and that the tree planting especially be carried out wherever the grading can be adjusted to the new plan in order to place the trees where they should be in relation to the scheme. I would particularly like to see the trees on the walk which I have

designated as the west walk, put in at the earliest possible moment so that when the time comes for eliminating Burrill Avenue south of the Auditorium there will be an avenue to take its place. Goodwin Avenue and Sixth Street would form the boundary of the area within which the new building program will take place and I advise the building of Goodwin Avenue immediately as far as the drive running east and west in front of the greenhouses. As soon as Goodwin Avenue is constructed I should advise the closing up of Mathews Avenue and carrying through Gregory Avenue to Goodwin Avenue. With Sixth Street carried through to Gregory a great deal of traffic would be removed from the present campus which I believe in every way to be desirable.

Hospital Site:

I looked carefully with Professor White into the question of the hospital site and the best and most available one seemed to be in the present Forestry Reservation, facing on Lincoln Avenue. As this building will possibly eventually compose a group, my suggestion is that the center face Indiana Avenue with the idea of confining the whole structure between Michigan Avenue and Ohio Avenue.

Forestry:

I think it advisable that the University should in the very near future set apart ample acreage for a new Forestry Reservation in which full development of trees will be possible. The present plot of land has probably served its purpose and must in the near future be utilized for other purposes.

Naming of Streets:

I trust that the question of names of streets and walks will be taken up in the near future as this will be a great help to me in correspondence. I have assumed that Gregory Avenue would continue through, but the two new walks which will really be an extension of Burrill Avenue, I have named temporarily east and west walks. There is no name for the proposed street north of the stock building.

Mall Axis:

The position finally determined upon by the Board for the Agricultural Building has necessitated moving the Mall axis 20' 43", as shown on the plan, south of the line shown by markers. This has made it necessary to slightly reduce the width of the Mall itself and the buildings south of the Mall will not be as long as those north of it. I do not think however, this will affect the general effect of the scheme.

The Extension of Auditorium:

The plan shows approximately the basis upon which I think studies should be made for the extension of the Auditorium. I should like to see about 80' between that building and addition to the Music Hall and the future building at the west. This will give an opportunity for well proportioned loggias forming the termini of the two Burrill Avenues that now exist and the beginning of the new south campus scheme.

Stadium:

The position of the Stadium as authorized does not allow of Maple Avenue going through to First Street. I have indicated on the plan a scheme which I do not think is entirely satisfactory, but for the moment I see no other way of getting this connection.

Athletic Field:

The only suggestion that I have made in regard to this field is the planting of some trees which carry out the idea of the Mall. I would advise that no buildings be placed in the center of this field to interfere with the view down the Mall on the main axis. There are no objections to open fields, but the buildings should be grouped at the north and south of the axis.

(24) A recommendation that the Executive Committee be directed to open bids and to award contracts for the superstructure of the new Medical Research Library and Laboratory Building provided the total of the bids comes within the amount appropriated.

On motion of Mrs. Blake, this recommendation was concurred in.

OFFICIAL UNIVERSITY AUTOMOBILE

On motion of Mr. Abbott, the sum of \$5000 or so much thereof as may be necessary was appropriated from the Reserve and Contingent fund for the purchase of an official University automobile. The vote was as follows: Aye, Mr. Abbott, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Hoit; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Noble, Mr. Small, Mr. Trimble.

PETITION TO RENAME UNIVERSITY HALL

Mr. Abbott stated that he had received a petition from some of the alumni asking that the name of University Hall be changed to Gregory Hall.

No action was taken in this matter.

DATE OF OCTOBER MEETING CHANGED

On motion of Mr. Abbott, the date of the October meeting was changed from the eleventh to the eighteenth day of the month.
