MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

September 25, 1923



The Quarterly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Drake Hotel, in Chicago, at 10 o'clock a. m. on Tuesday, September 25, 1923.

The following members were present: President Noble, Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr.

Trees, Mr. Trimble.

President Kinley was present; also, during part of the day, Professor J. M. White, Supervising Architect, and Dean H. W. Mumford.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of July 11, 1923. On motion of Mr. Trees, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 229 to 289 above.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

President Noble, as chairman of the Executive Committee, reported the following actions of the Committee:

On September 15, 1923, a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in Chicago.

FARM MECHANICS BUILDING

The following bids were received by the Supervising Architect for the General Work

The general contract was awarded to G. A. Applegate for \$19,291, plus \$165 for additional work not included in the specifications.

The estimated total cost of the building on the basis of this award is \$26,534.30. The sum of \$15,000 was appropriated toward the expense of this construction out of the \$380,000 appropriated by the last Legislature for Agricultural buildings.

MEDICAL RESEARCH BUILDING

The contract for the furnishings of the Medical Research Laboratory and Library Building was awarded to Benbrook, Monroe, & Co. of Chicago on the basis of the low bid, at \$22,694.

DAIRY SILOS

The contract for the silo walls for the Dairy Barns was let to the Kalamazoo Tank & Silo Company of Kalamazoo, Michigan, at a cost of \$3450 for which an appropriation was made from the sum of \$380,000 appropriated by the Legislature for Agricultural Buildings.

On motion of Mr. Trimble, this report was received for record, and the actions of the Executive Committee were approved.

INVESTIGATION OF BREEDING GOATS

President Noble made a statement concerning the breeding of goats and the use of goats' milk.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this matter was referred to the President of the University for investigation and report.

MUTUAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

President Noble made a statement concerning the opinion of the Legal Counsel on the powers of the Board with respect to the proposed plan for cooperation with the Mutual Benefit Association (Minutes, March 12, 1923, page 139). Mr. Trimble withdrew his motion of March 13, 1923 (page

141), for the adoption of the plan of cooperation.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Trimble was appointed a special committee to draw up a new plan for a system of death and disability benefits and retiring allowances, to be presented to the Board as soon as it may be convenient.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT KINLEY

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

TILE WALLS FOR DAIRY BARN

(1) A recommendation that the contract for tile walls for the dairy barn be awarded to the Kalamazoo Tank and Silo Company, and that \$4500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be appropriated for this purpose from the \$380,000 appropriated by the General Assembly for agricultural buildings.

On motion of Mrs. Evans, this recommendation was approved. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Trimble; no. none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Small.

TORNADO INSURANCE ON STADIUM

(2) A recommendation that the Memorial Stadium be insured for \$500,000 against damage by tornado, for a period of five years, and that \$4500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be appropriated from the Reserve and Contingent fund for the payment of the premium.

On motion of Mrs. Evans, this recommendation was concurred in. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Trimble; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Small.

PURCHASE OF LOT 109 IN COLLEGE PLACE

(3) A recommendation that Lot 109 in College Place Addition, with house thereon, be purchased for \$7500, and that an appropriation of \$7500 be made from the Reserve and Contingent Fund for this purpose.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this purchase was ordered. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Trimble; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Small.

PURCHASE OF LOT 162 IN COLLEGE PLACE

(4) A recommendation that Lot 162 in College Place be purchased for \$2250, the University to assume the taxes and lighting assessments for 1923.

On motion of Mrs. Blake, this purchase was ordered. The appropriation was made from the Reserve and Contingent fund by

the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Trimble; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Small.

ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTOR IN PSYCHOLOGY

(5) A report that by misunderstanding, a position requested by the Department of Psychology and approved by the Dean of the College was left out of the Budget. Inasmuch as there was to be no meeting of the Board until September, the President of the University authorized the Dean to fill the want with an instructorship at a salary of \$1800 for one year.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this action was approved.

BAKER PRIZE FUND

(6) The following letter with accompanying documents has been received from Professor Baker, in accordance with his promise presented to the Board at the meeting of July 11.

In accordance with my promise of June 7 to make provision for two prizes for Civil Engineering Seniors, I herewith present to the University the following se-

Bonds No. K207 and K208 of the Whalen Paper and Pulp Co., each for \$1,000, due in 1930, bearing 6% interest, payable May 1 and November 1, and having the November 1923 and subsequent coupons

attached. \$2,000.00

Bonds No. C159, C310, and C314 of the Vancouver Lumber Co., due on May 1, 1937, each for \$100, bearing 7½% interest, payable May 1 and November 1, and having the November 1923 and subsequent coupons attached¹.....

I have from time to time given the Purchasing Agent checks for the following bills:

Chicago Architectural Bronze Co., 4740 N. Clark St., Chicago, the bronze tablet.....

Rounds-Truman Co., 64 W. Randolph St., Chicago, engraving copper plate

University Carpenter Shop, for labor and material in installing the tablet and the framed certificate..... Expressage on tablet and certificate.....

I desire that the income of the remainder of said bonds shall be used to pay: (1) a first prize of \$75 and a second prize of \$25 to the persons named by the Dean and Heads of Departments of the College of Engineering in accordance with my letter submitted herewith: (2) to purchase and place annually upon the tablet a bronze plate bearing the names of the successive winners of the prizes; and (3) to insert the name of the winner of the first prize on the certificate referred to above. Apparently the second item above will be about \$5.50 per annum and the third about \$1. Therefore the total annual charge against the fund will probably be \$106.50.

The Dean and the Heads of Departments, College of Engineering, Gentlemen:

Shortly before the last Commencement I wrote to President Kinley saying that I would present to the University \$2,500, the income of which is to be used for two prizes having a total value of one hundred dollars to be awarded annually to Civil Engineering Seniors, and for the installation and maintenance of a bronze tablet upon which shall be announced the successive annual winners of the aforementioned prizes, and for the engraving of a certificate to be given to the winner of the first prize and the printing and lettering such a certificate annually. In that communication I said that I hoped the award of the prizes would be under the direction of the Dean and the Heads of the Departments of the College of Engineering. Later the Board of Trustees accepted the offer.

I have secured the tablet and had it placed upon the wall immediately east of the door to room 203 Engineering Building, at a cost of \$140 for the tablet and \$6.39 for placing upon the wall. Professor C. C. Williams has in his possession the copper-plate engraving of the certificate and thirty copies of the certificate printed on bond paper. Adjacent to the tablet is a framed copy of the certificate. The cost of the plate and thirty certificates was \$65.75. Therefore the entire expense of the tablet and the certificate is \$212.14. I have given to the University the cash with which to pay the bills for the above, and in addition I have given to the University \$2,000 of 6% bonds due in 1930 and \$300 in 7½% bonds due in 1937.

It is estimated that the total cost of casting the two names for the tablet will be

\$3.50 and the cost of inserting the slip on the tablet \$2.00 and the cost of engrossing the certificate less than \$1.00. Therefore the total annual charge against the fund will probably be \$106.50.

In my communication to President Kinley I said that I desired to make my gift such that you gentlemen should have unrestricted powers over details in awarding the prizes, as I think it entirely unwise to attempt the rule of the dead hand for either the near or the remote future. However, as I have had this matter on my mind for several years past, I hope that a statement of my views on the subject may not be inappropriate.

1. It seems to me that the prizes will be useful in stimulating scholarship and interest in allied activities, and will in a measure help to neutralize the divert-

ing influence of social and athletic activities.

2. My thought is that the tablet will be a means of calling the attention of students to the fact of such a prize and of publishing the names of the successive winners. I hope the certificate will be appreciated by the winner as tangible evidence of the honor, and that possibly he may frame it and hang it in his office or home.

3. I think the one hundred dollars prize money should be divided into a first prize of seventy-five dollars and a second prize of twenty-five dollars. I am aware that in somewhat similar matters the first prize is often made sixty per cent. and

the second prize forty per cent.; but it is my belief that a first prize of seventy-five dollars will do more to stimulate interest in the purpose of the prize than a lesser sum, and that a second prize of twenty-five dollars will serve as an additional

stimulus to contestants.

The present rate of interest of the \$2,300 in securities which I have turned over will produce for several years to come an income of over \$141, which is considerably more than enough for the two prizes and to pay for inserting the names on the tablet and for engrossing the certificate; but I think it wise to allow this excess to accumulate against the time when, owing to the probable decrease in rate of interest, the annual income on the original \$2,300 may not be sufficient to meet the charges against the fund.

4. For somewhat obvious reasons it seems to be wise that the prize should be limited to Civil Engineering Seniors, and should also be limited to students who

have been in attendance at the University for their junior year.

5. In making up an award it seems to me that the items in the following exhibit might properly have consideration and valuation somewhat as stated:

Basis of Award (1) Scholarship of work of the senior year as determined from University
records
(2) Authorship of technical articles or editorial activity on a College technical journal, to be awarded on the judgment of the Dean and the Heads of the
Departments 10%
(3) Activity in technical organizations of the Civil Engineering Students, as officer, committee-man, attendant, or contributor, to be awarded on the recom-
officer, committee-man, attendant, or contributor, to be awarded on the recom-
mendation of the Head of the Civil Engineering Department 10%
(4) General characteristics, such as trustworthiness, pleasing personality, in-
itiative, resourcefulness, judgment, executive ability, breadth of view, promise
of leadership, etc., to be awarded upon the recommendation of the Head of the
Civil Engineering Department
Total100%

6. I believe it would be wise to make the award shortly before Commencement, and that the award should be based upon the work of the senior year of the curriculum. I appreciate that there may be some difficulty in meeting these two somewhat conflicting conditions. In my opinion only students should be eligible who had been graduated in August, October, or February preceding, or who are to graduate

at the approaching Commencement.

7. It is not improbable that in the administration of the above conditions it will be necessary to discriminate between a student who has a smaller number of hours and a higher grade, and another student who has a greater number of hours but a lower grade. Without attempting to fix any hard and fast rules, may I be permitted to say that I think that some credit should be given to the student who carries the greater number of hours, provided the extra hours are taken to broaden the range of his education; but I do not think that a student should have any such credit for extra hours which he carried because he was back in the work of earlier years.

8. I think that a technical article considered in this competition should not have received any other prize, and must have been produced by the author without collaboration with others. Previous presentation before a technical society or previous publication in a College or other technical journal should not make an article in-

eligible.

9. I have given some consideration as to whether or not a student should be required to announce his candidacy for one of the prizes; but on the whole I have concluded that, while such an announcement for some reasons is desirable, it is probably unwise to make it a necessary condition. If a student were known to be a candidate, his activities under items 3 and 4 of the above statement could be more carefully studied than if his candidacy was not known until the time of the award. If in your wisdom you can find some better solution of this phase of the matter than I have implied, I shall be greatly pleased.

10. To give such publicity to this matter as will stimulate the interest of the seniors of the next year in the contest, I hope that your body will authorize the Head of the Civil Engineering Department to call a convocation of the Civil Engineering Students early next fall at which meeting the fact of the establishment of the prizes will be stated and the attention of the students will be directed to the object to be attained in each of the four items of the award.

I think it might be helpful if at the close of cach year a similar convocation were held at which the students should be notified of the winners, and also at which

the prizes and the certificate should be presented.

Possibly after the new names are inserted in the tablet, it would be worth while to take a photograph of it and present each of the winners with a copy. I suggest this only as a means of possibly stimulating greater interest in the prizes and thereby increasing interest in scholarship and some of the important by-products of a college course.

11. A copy of this letter accompanies the deed of gift, and a copy of the deed of gift accompanies this letter; and a copy of both is given to the Head of the Civil Engineering Department.

ADJUSTMENTS IN THE BUDGET

(8) A recommendation that the following adjustments in the Budget for 1923-24 be made.

Pathology and Bacteriology
1. On recommendation of Dr. D. J. Davis and Dean A. E. Eycleshymer, I request that the sum of \$580 be added to the budget of the Department of Pathology and Bacteriology of the College of Medicine, to be distributed as follows:

That the amount \$3500 allowed in the Budget for an assistant professorship

be made \$3800, instead of \$3500.

That the salary of Joseph Lepak, chief technician be made \$1680 instead of

That the salary of S. A. Levinson, one-half time instructor, be made \$1200

instead of \$1000.

2. I also recommend that the salary of Dr. D. J. Davis be made \$7500 instead of \$7,000.

Chemistry 3. On urgent recommendation of Professor S. W. Parr and Professor Roger Adams, Acting Head of the Department of Chemistry, concurred in by Dean Bab-

cock, I recommend the following changes be made in the budget of that department: That the salary of Miner M. Austin, Associate in Chemistry, be made \$2400,

instead of \$2250.

That the rank of Manson J. Bradley, Instructor, be changed to Associate, at the same salary (\$2100).

School of Music.

That the salary of Director Stiven be made \$6000 instead of \$5500.

That the salary of Mr. MacNeill be made \$2000 instead of \$1700.

That the salary of Miss Florence E. Street be made \$1800 instead of \$1600.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, these recommendations were approved.

THE RESIGNATION OF MR. M. M. LEIGHTON

(9) On April 19 last Professor Leighton wrote Dean Babcock that he had accepted an appointment as Chief of the Illinois Geological Survey, and wished to tender his "resignation as Assistant Professor of Geology, to take effect not later than June 10th or at such a time before that date as the discharge of my University duties will permit." Later, his resignation was presented and accepted as of June

In my judgment, there is a certain equity in Mr. Leighton's claim, but I do not believe that this equity includes payment for the months of July and August. It seems to me that he will be fairly treated under all the circumstances if he receives salary for the whole month of June, and I so recommend.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, Professor Leighton's resignation was accepted as of June 30, 1923.

RESIGNATION OF DR. MOULTON

(10) A report of the resignation of Dr. Gertrude E. Moulton, Professor of Hygiene and Medical Adviser for Women, to take effect September 1, 1923.

This report was received for record.

PRINTING RULES AND REGULATIONS

(11) A request for an appropriation of \$1000 or so much thereof as may be necessary from the Reserve and Contingent Fund to republish an edition of 3000 copies of the regulations of the Board, including the Statutes of the University and all regulations of the Board concerning the University, the State laws regulating the University, and similar rules and regulations. Many of these are now scattered through the various proceedings and session laws, and it is necessary for orderly administration that they should be assembled.

PURCHASE OF COLLEGE PLACE LOT 64 CONCLUDED

(12) A report from the Comptroller regarding the conclusion of the purchase of Lot 64 in College Place Addition, and house thereon, from Florence and Luella M. Blackburn, at a purchase price of \$7000 cash, subject to tax for 1923 (estimated at \$100) and unpaid lighting assessments of \$146.97.

PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND TAXES ON LAND

1. Audit of Stadium accounts by public accountants, as authorized by the Board last July (see item 15, page 234, minutes of July 11, 1923). \$125.

2. Bond of Stadium Treasurer for one year from June 5, 1923. \$250.

DAVENPORT HOUSE

At this point, Mrs. Evans reported that the special committee appointed November 9, 1922 (page 87), to consider the matter of naming the house purchased from Dean Davenport and used as a residence for women students, recommends that the house be designated "Davenport House."

This report was adopted.

TABLET FOR MEDICAL RESEARCH BUILDING

A design for a bronze tablet for the Medical Research Library and Laboratory building was submitted and approved, with the stipulation that the name of the contractor should be omitted.

LOCATION OF POWER PLANT

On recommendation of President Noble, and on motion of Mr. Trimble, it was voted to request the good offices of the Superintendent of Public Welfare to secure the location of the power and heating plant of the Chicago group of buildings (being erected by the Department and the University) on the state property south of the alley and fronting on Taylor street instead of locating the plant on the main lot.

The Board resumed the consideration of matters presented by

the President of the University.

ASSIGNMENT OF LAND

(18) The Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station demurs to the assignment of the 40 acres of land across the street west of the golf course for golf pur-

poses which was made at the July meeting of the Board.

I understood at the time of making the recommendation that the Director of the Experiment Station concurred with the Superintendent of Business Operations in the view that if the 40 acres just east of the golf course, formerly used by the department of horticulture, were assigned for poultry, the 40 acres across the street, west of the golf course, would be released. Since I was mistaken in this understanding, I recommend that the action of the Board recorded as recommendation number 12 on page 234 of the minutes of the Board, July 11, 1923, whereby the 40 acres east of the golf course was assigned to poultry, and the 40 acres west of the golf course, across the street, assigned for surveying and use for golf when not in use for class purposes, be reconsidered.

On motion of Mr. Trimble, this action was reconsidered.

Dean Mumford and Professor White made statements concerning the assignment of this land.

On motion of Mr. Trimble, the action of July 11 was rescinded.

STUDIES OF NEW BUILDINGS

Professor White presented studies of the new Gymnasium, the Dairy Manufactures, and the Library buildings.

At this point, Mrs. Blake withdrew,

MEDICAL RESEARCH BUILDING

On motion of Mr. Trimble, the amount appropriated by the General Assembly for the Medical Research Library and Laboratory Building (\$500,000) was appropriated for the purposes of the act. The vote was as follows: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mrs. Busey, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Trimble; no, none; absent Mr. Blair, Mrs. Blake, Mr. Herbert, Mr. Small.
