# MINUTES APPROVED

On motion of Dr. Noble, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 1 to 98 above.

# MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT CHASE

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

#### REPORT OF REGISTRATION

(1) A preliminary report on the results of the registration of students for the first semester. This report showed a decrease of approximately 12 per cent in enrollment as compared with the first semester of last year.

This report was received for record.

#### C.P.A. CERTIFICATES

# APPOINTMENT OF DR. ERNST GELLHORN AS PROFESSOR OF PHYSIOLOGY IN THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

(3) A report of the appointment of Dr. Ernst Gellhorn, formerly Professor of Physiology at the University of Oregon, as Professor of Physiology in the College of Medicine for one year beginning September 1, 1932, at a salary of \$5,000.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this appointment was confirmed.

REPORT ON ACCIDENT OF J. A. MORROW AND S. E. GRIFFITH (4) A report on the automobile accident on August 22, 1932, which resulted in the death of J. A. Morrow, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, and scrious injuries to S. E. Griffith, Janitor Foreman:

The accident occurred at the intersection of State Routes Nos. 25 and 121 near Tuscola, Illinois, shortly before eleven o'clock in the morning of August 22, 1932. Mr. Morrow and Mr. Griffith were on their way to southern Illinois to purchase coal for the Power Plant. They were in a Chevrolet Sedan, 1931 model, owned by the University, with Mr. Griffith driving. They were driving south on Highway No. 25, which is a through highway (that is, traffic on east and west roads crossing it is required to stop at intersections), when a car driven by Mr. James S. Huse, of Sioux City, Iowa, driving east on Highway No. 121, and which, according to witnesses, failed to stop at the crossing, struck the right front side of the University car, causing it to swerve to the left and strike an electric light pole. Both cars, according to witnesses, were traveling at a rate of between forty and forty-five miles an hour. There is a corn field west of No. 25 and north of No. 121, which, at the time of the accident, made it impossible for the driver of a car driving south on No. 25 to see the east bound traffic on No. 121 until he was within about fifty feet of the intersection; the same was true of cars driving east on No. 121 with respect to cars driven south on No. 25. The corn has been topped since the accident. The responsibility for the accident rests on the driver of the east-bound car because he failed to stop before crossing.

Mr. Morrow was killed almost instantly, Mr. Griffith suffered a scalp wound, minor face cuts, three broken ribs, and a fractured knee and is still confined to the hospital. The occupants of the car from Iowa were Mr. and Mrs. James S. Huse and their daughter, Doris. Mr. Huse and his daughter died from injuries and Mrs. Huse recovered. The University car was completely wrecked.

I recommend that the University Counsel be authorized and directed to take what steps he deems advisable to protect the University's interests in this matter and to institute such legal proceedings as may be necessary. The damages in which the University is interested are whatever amount it will be required to pay the estate of Mr. J. A. Morrow under the compensation law, compensation to Mr. Griffith for his injuries, and for property damage to the car. So far the University Counsel has not been able to determine the extent of the insurance coverage on the Iowa car.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this matter was referred to President Chase and Judge Johnson, with authority to take such steps as are necessary to protect the interests of the University.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, the Comptroller was authorized to make payment of \$2500 death benefit to the designated beneficiary of Mr. Morrow, in accordance with the rules of the Board and the terms of employment of the deceased. The appropriation from the Reserve and Contingent fund was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mr. Emmerson.

On motion of Mr. Trees, the President of the Board was requested to appoint a special committee to consider the liability of the University in cases where both death benefits and workmen's compensation may be involved. President Barrett appointed Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, and Mr. Williams to serve on this committee.

# APPOINTMENT OF ACTING SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS

(5) A recommendation that Mr. T. J. Showers, Assistant Superintendent of Buildings, who was retired under the rules of the Board effective September 1, be continued in service for another year and that he be appointed Acting Superintendent of Buildings at a salary of \$4200 a year, vice Mr. Joseph A. Morrow, deceased.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this recommendation was approved.

#### DEATH BENEFIT OF DEAN CLARK

(6) As Dean Clark's death occurred shortly after the July meeting and as the Board was not to have another meeting until September, I authorized the Comptroller to make payment of the death benefit due in accordance with the rules of the Board and the terms of Dean Clark's employment, to avoid a two-months delay. I request that my action be confirmed and that an appropriation of \$2,000 be made from the Reserve and Contingent Fund for this purpose.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this action was approved and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr.

#### DEATH BENEFIT OF MRS. EMMA PORTER

(7) I recommend that \$270 be appropriated from the Reserve and Contingent Fund to pay the death benefit of Mrs. Emma Porter, laborer in the Physical Plant, whose death occurred on August 15, 1932, and that the Comptroller be authorized to make payment to the designated beneficiary in accordance with the rules of the Board and the terms of employment of the deceased.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this payment was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mr. Emmerson.

## APPROPRIATION FOR HOSPITAL EQUIPMENT

(8) A report that the Comptroller was authorized to spend \$2300 from the Reserve and Contingent Fund for the purchase of supplies and furniture replacements for the McKinley Hospital. These supplies and equipment had to be ordered in the summer so that they would be available for the opening of the Hospital in the fall. I request that this action be confirmed and that an appropriation of \$2300 be made from the Reserve and Contingent Fund for this purpose.

On motion of Dr. Noble, the President's action was confirmed and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mr. Emmerson.

#### SPECIAL APPROPRIATION FOR THE COLLEGE OF LAW

(9) A recommendation that \$400 be appropriated from the Reserve and Contingent Fund to the College of Law, to provide for the use of space for student notes and comments in the journal of the Illinois Bar Association for the current year, contingent on the raising of a like amount by the College of Law from private sources.

On motion of Mr. Blair, this arrangement was authorized but without the condition requiring the raising of funds from outside sources, and an appropriation of \$800 was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mr. Emmerson.

# LABORATORY FEE IN CHEMISTRY

(10) A recommendation that a laboratory fee of 6.00 be established in Chemistry 7, a new general survey course in chemistry, beginning September 1, 1932.

On motion of Mrs. Hopkins, this fee was authorized.

### AUTOMOBILE PERMIT FEES

(11) A recommendation that a fee of \$2.00 be charged each undergraduate filing an application for permission to drive an automobile. The purpose of the fee is to cover the cost of license plates, clerical help, and incidental expense in handling the applications for automobile permits.

On motion of Dr. Noble, this fee was authorized.

#### FEES FOR COURSES IN UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL

(12) A recommendation that the following fee be established for students in the University who register for work in the University High School:

Students registered in the University who also register for work in the University High School shall pay, in addition to their regular fees in the University,

ten dollars for each half-unit of credit taken in the High School; provided, however, that the total additional charge for such instruction in the High School shall not exceed the regular fee of twenty-five dollars per semester charged regular students in the High School.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this recommendation was adopted.

# REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION IN AGRICULTURE AND EDUCATION

(13) The University Senate Committee on Educational Policy recommends that, effective September 1, 1932, the total number of semester hours required for graduation in the Colleges of Education and Agriculture be changed to 120 hours and the prescribed courses in military and physical education.

The first meeting of the Senate will be held on October 3 so that it was impossible to get action by that body before the Board meeting today. Since the recommendations involve no change from the newly established policy in this matter, I recommend that they be approved subject to similar action by the University Senate.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this recommendation was adopted.

#### CHANGE OF HEADQUARTERS OF THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

(14) A request from the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association that it be authorized to change its headquarters from the present location on the third floor in the Administration Building to the Illinois Union Building, so that its offices will be more accessible to students and visiting alumni.

The Union has previously rented the space which the Alumni Association wishes to occupy for \$2,000 a year. The Union owes the University about \$6,500 for work done on its building by the University, which the Board of Trustees agreed to allow the Union to pay in installments (Minutes, July 23, 1930, p. 31). The Illinois Union proposes that instead of repaying this debt in cash it be permitted to repay it in terms of furnishing quarters for the Alumni Association, charging off \$1,200 a year for this purpose (which is a reduction of \$800 a year in the amount of rental derived by the University would not be necessary, since the annual rental charge would be written off for the next five years against the amount due the University from the Union.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this request was approved.

# STAFF APPOINTMENTS IN RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(15) In accordance with the terms of the agreement between the University and the State Department of Public Welfare (Minutes, April 20, 1932, page 565) the University is required to nominate a managing officer of the Research and Educational Hospitals, and also a Director of the Institute for Juvenile Research, and to join with the State Department of Public Welfare in the appointment of members of the staff of the Institute for Juvenile Research.

The Executive Committee of the Institute for Juvenile Research. The Executive Committee of the College of Medicine by unanimous vote has recommended the name of Dr. Major H. Worthington as Managing Officer of the Research and Educational Hospitals. He has held this position since 1920, being appointed at that time by joint agreement of the Department and the University and his work in that position has been thoroughly satisfactory to the College of Medicine. The Executive Committee of the College of Medicine further recommends for appointment to the position of Director of the Institute for Juvenile Research Dr. Paul L. Schroeder, who has been Director of that date as First Assistant in the Institute.

I recommend approval of these recommendations and request authority to concur in the appointment by the Department of Public Welfare of the present personnel of the Institute, as provided in the agreement, the complete list to be submitted to the Board for record.

On motion of Mr. Williams these recommendations were approved.

#### WOMAN'S ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUND

(16) The Woman's Athletic Association of the University of Illinois wishes to establish a loan fund of \$200 per year, beginning in September, 1932, and continuing as long as the Association deems advisable, with the provision that the Following special regulations, in addition to the general regulations of the Board of Trustees governing loan funds, shall apply: I. This fund is to be lent only to women students for use during their

2. Applications are to be recommended for approval by a committee consisting of the Head of the Department of Physical Education for Women, as chairman, two members of the staff of the Department of Physical Education for Women, the President of the Woman's Athletic Association, and the Treasurer of the Woman's Athletic Association.

The source of this proposed annual payment of \$200 is the income from bonds owned by the Association representing the investment of its earnings from May Fêtes covering a period of several years. The bonds will be retained by the Association, but the income amounting to approximately \$200 a year will be turned over to the University to be used by it for the purposes indicated.

I recommend acceptance of this offer.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this offer was accepted.

#### CLASS OF 1907 LOAN FUND

(17) The Class of 1907 desires that the loan fund which it presented to the University on June 11, 1932 (Minutes, page 611), be used for the making of loans to students under such general rules as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board of Trustees governing loan funds, with no restrictions except that the identity of the fund be preserved and that in making loans preference be shown to lineal descendants of members of the class.

On motion of Mrs. Hopkins, these conditions were accepted.

#### APPOINTMENTS TO E. A. WALLACE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

(18) A report that the Board of Education of Havana, Illinois, has appointed Messrs. Dale Huff and John Schulte to be the beneficiaries of the E. A. Wallace Memorial Scholarship for the year 1932-1933.

This report was received for record.

#### DRAINING OF LAND WEST OF STADIUM

(19) A report from the Supervising Architect of the following bids received on August 4 for the underdraining of the area between First Street and the Illinois Central tracks:

The contract was awarded to the low bidder, Kent & Co., who agreed to put in the sub-tiling at cost, to provide work for his men. By having this area under-tiled it can be used to good advantage as a dumping ground for selected material and can gradually be built up to the desired grades. Funds were in-cluded in the budget for the cost of this work.

#### SALE OF NEVADA STREET HOUSE

(20) A report that the Noyes house on Nevada Street east of the Residence Halls was advertised for sale and sold to Mr. T. F. Henson of Urbana, the high bidder, for \$150. Under the terms of the sale the buyer has removed the house from the premises.

This report was received for record.

LOAN OF EQUIPMENT TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE (21) A request for authority to lend the Department of Public Welfare dental 1932]

charts and equipment for use in the following state institutions under the juris-diction of the Department: Chicago State Hospital, Lincoln State School and Colony, Dixon State Hospital, East Moline State Hospital, and Anna State Hospital. The expense of transportation, installation, and return of this equip-ment will be borne by the Department of Public Welfare. The College of Dentistry will appoint dental internes to work in these institutions who will use such equipment. chairs and equipment for use in the following state institutions under the juris-

On motion of Dr. Noble, this authority was granted, on condition that the equipment will be returned to the University whenever required.

# **REPORT ON GOURDIER FARM HOUSE**

(22) A report from the Comptroller that the house on the Gourdier Farm (200 acres in Champaign County south of Dewey), which was destroyed by fire, has been rebuilt at a cost of approximately \$2500 from the insurance money received. The University holds a \$10,000 mortgage on this property. At the meeting on April 20, 1932 (Minutes, page 568), authorization was given for the use of the insurance money to rebuild the house.

This report was received for record.

#### APPROVAL OF VARIOUS PURCHASES

(23) A report of the approval of the following purchases, amounting to \$1,000

or over, since the last report was made to the Board: Pyrex laboratory glassware, amounting to \$2250, from Schaar and Com-pany, Chicago. This is a non-competitive item, and the order was placed with this company because they give a maximum discount on established prices and because of the service they have rendered on previous orders. Funds have been provided in the Budget for 1032-1933 for this purpose. Printing of soil maps of Vermilion, St. Clair, Wabash, and Pulaski counties

-5,000 copies of each-from A. Hoen and Company, Baltimore, Maryland, the low bidder, at a price of \$3100, f.o.b. Urbana. This concern has printed most of the other soil survey maps. Funds have been appropriated in the budget for this purpose.

A carload of chemically pure and commercial acids for the General Chemical Storeroom from Grasselli Chemical Company of Chicago, the low bidder, at a cost of \$1,255.41, f.o.b. Urbana. (The transportation on the shipment and on the return of empty containers is approximately \$130.)

(24) On March 8, 1927 (Minutes, page 225), the Board of Trustees accepted an assignment from Mr. Hugh A. #### (27) The following quarterly report of the Comptroller as at June 30, 1932:

#### To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

I transmit herewith the quarterly report required of me covering the financial transactions of the University for the quarter ended June 30, 1932

Schedule A is a balance sheet of all assets for which the Board of Trustees is responsible and all commitments and obligations of the University as of June

30, 1032. Schedule B is a statement of the Reserve and Contingent Fund or the working balance of general income for the quarter ended June 30, 1932. Due to our inability to realize on the full amount of state appropriations for current expenses of the year, it has been necessary to use the entire balance of the Reserve and Contingent Fund to meet necessary expenditures for the year. Consequently, no balance remained in this fund at the close of the year.

Schedule C is a summary of the receipts and disbursements of local and state funds for the year. On June 30, 1932, the balance of local funds amounted to 405,504.92. Of this amount the sum of 92,571.18 was in the hands of Hazen S. Capron, former Treasurer, and the sum of \$312,933.74 in the hands of Frank M. Gordon, Treasurer. To secure the last named balance, U. S. Government

M. Gordon, Ireasurer. To secure the last named balance, U. S. Government securities of a market value of \$513,750 have been deposited as collateral. Schedule D is a summary of the income of the University for the year ended June 30, 1932. It is noted from this statement that from a state appro-priation of \$4,940,000 for current expenses, the expenditures and commitments for the year have amounted to only \$4,396,478.24, leaving an unused balance of \$543,521.76 as of the close of the year; that from a special appropriation of \$15,000 for the Cook County Agricultural Experiment Station there was ex-pended only \$9,108.01, leaving an unexpended balance of \$5,891.99 at the close of the year; that from a paperoprior of \$1,400,000 for an additional unit of of the year; that from an appropriation of \$1,400,000 for an additional unit of

or the year; that from an appropriation of \$1,400,000 for an additional unit of the Medical and Dental laboratories there was expended only \$34,861.77. The budget estimate of student fees for the year was \$1,125,000. The ac-tual amount realized was \$1,074,339.57. Schedule E is a summary of all appropriations made by the Board for use during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1932. Of these appropriations the sum of \$473,218.72 was allowed by the various departments of the University to lapse unused at the close of the year. This saving in expenditures made possible the unused balance in the state appropriation already referred to. The balance in the state appropriation remaining unused exceeded the unused balances in in the state appropriation remaining unused exceeded the unused balances in appropriations of the Board to various University departments by \$76,195.03, the difference being represented by the expenditure of the unassigned balance of the Reserve and Contingent Fund.

Schedule F is a summary of transactions of stores and service accounts. The inventory of stock and general storerooms has been decreased \$23,129.80 during the year.

Schedule G is a summary of endowment funds from private sources which, at the close of the year, amounted to \$369,523.82, an increase of \$18,933.08 during the year.

Schedule H is a summary of transactions of current restricted funds (expendable trust funds) for the year.

The figures contained in this report are cumulative for the fiscal year and, therefore, represent the financial operations of the University for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1932, and the financial condition of the University at that date. They will be presented in more complete form in the annual report of the Comptroller to be published at a later date.

This report is subject to audit by the public accounting firm employed by the Board for that purpose. The certificate of audit will be furnished as soon as that audit is completed.

# Board of Trustees, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois DEAR SIRS,

We have audited the books of the University of Illinois for the quarter ended June 30, 1932, and submit the following summary of the work done and the result of the audit.

The cash receipts were verified by checking all cash receipts vouchers into the cash book and examining a substantial portion of the original departmental records. Cash received as recorded has been duly deposited with the University Treasurer. The warrants drawn on the University Treasurer and those certified to by the State Auditor were checked into the cash book and a substantial portion of the supporting vouchers was examined with respect to the authorization, object of expenditure and receipt of goods or services by the University. A number of payroll vouchers of non-appointees was checked against the original time report on file in the respective departments. Salaries paid to appointees were checked against the Secretary's letters of appointment. The footings of the cash book were proved.

footings of the cash book were proved. The cash balances in the hands of the University Treasurer and the ex-Treasurer of the University at June 30, 1932, were verified by confirmation from the depositories, as follows:

The First National Bank, Champaign, closed its doors January 16, 1932, and is now in process of reorganization. It is expected that loss to depositors, if any, will not be substantial; however, under the proposed plan of reorganization, a portion of the funds on deposit will not be available for some time, pending the sale of certain assets of the bank in a market more favorable than that at the present time. In connection with this account the University holds the personal bond of Mr. Hazen S. Capron and his Co-Sureties.

United States Fourth Liberty Bonds of a par value of \$500,000 have been deposited by Frank M. Gordon, Treasurer, to secure his balance of \$366,496.34. The deposit of this collateral has been confirmed to us by the Trustee.

Petty cash funds were verified by actual count and by confirmations received from the depositories. Of the total petty cash funds, \$31,490.89, an amount of \$15,572.16 is on deposit with the closed First National Bank, Champaign.

The securities as shown by the books of account were verified by actual inspection and by confirmation from the custodian. The following securities were in default at June 30, 1932:

Physical inventories taken by the several stores departments near the close of the fiscal year were re-calculated by us and adjusted to June 30, 1932, by taking into account receipts and issues from the date of the inventory to June 30. A selection of items was verified as to quantities by actual inspection of the material and as to prices by comparison with purchase records. Physical inventories were  $6\frac{2}{3}$ % in excess of the control accounts due to the fact that the credits to the control accounts contain a margin of profit charged to departments upon issue of material.

The departmental accounts of work in process were examined and were found to agree with the controlling account in the general ledger.

Disbursement vouchers representing 62% of additions to fixed assets made during the year were examined and were found to cover proper capital expenditures. The accounts of land, buildings and equipment were checked against the detailed ledgers and card records and were found to agree therewith.

The income for the quarter under audit was verified by extensive detail checking and comparison with the report and files of the Registrar and the files of the various operating departments.

The accounts of the Chicago departments and of the Stadium Fund were audited along the lines indicated above and were found correct.

The records of the meetings of the Board of Trustees of April 20, May 11, and June 11, 1932, were examined and all actions affecting the finances of the University, in so far as they had been consummated at the time of our audit, were checked into the books of account. The records of previous meetings were likewise examined with respect to relative transactions recorded in the books during the quarter under audit.

The records of the purchasing division were inspected and a number of the larger purchase orders issued were compared with relative bids and quotations. Contracts and bids on file in the office of the Supervising Architect were checked against reports made to the Board of Trustees as shown in the minutes of the meetings of the Board.

We hereby certify that, so far as we have been able to ascertain by an extended detail examination,

All income which the University should have received during the quarter ended June 30, 1932, has been received and accounted for.

All disbursements have been made for University purposes and have been properly authorized and the expenditures have been correctly recorded in the books of account.

Subject to our comments on the University's funds at the First National Bank, Champaign, the cash and securities as shown by the books at June 30, 1932, are correct in amount and have been verified by actual inspection, count, or confirmation from the depository.

# LINCOLN AVENUE DRAINAGE PROJECT

At this point, President Barrett stated that he had granted a request for a hearing to Mr. Victor Olander, Secretary of the Illinois Federation of Labor, and others who were interested in the Lincoln Avenue storm drain (Minutes, April 20, 1932, page 570). Mr. Olander, Mr. James Dunn, representing the Twin City Federation of Labor of Champaign and Urbana, Mr. F. T. Carson, representing the Urbana Association of Commerce, Mr. R. E. Winkelmann, Corporation Counsel of Urbana, and Mr. Godfrey Sperling, Champaign County Surveyor, were introduced. Mr. Olander, Mr. Dunn, and Mr. Carson addressed the Board and urged that the University accept the assessment immediately.

Action on this matter was deferred until the October meeting.

#### MARTIN MORTGAGE FORECLOSURE

Mr. Trees, for the Finance Committee, reported that the foreclosure proceedings against Mr. W. B. Martin, *et al.*, were now complete, and that title is now in the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. This property is described as follows:
