MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

January 25, 1933



The January meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Palmer House, in Chicago, at 10 o'clock a.m. on Wednesday, January 25, 1932.

The following members were present: President Barrett, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams.

President Chase was present; also Judge Johnson, and Mr. Morey.

ACCIDENT COMPENSATION

On motion of Mr. Barr, the regular order of business was suspended and the report of the special committee on accident compensation was presented by Mr. Armstrong:

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ACCIDENT COMPENSATION

Your Special Committee on Accident Compensation unanimously recommends:

1. That Section II of the action taken by this Board in 1925, relating to Retiring Allowances and Death Benefits, be amended by adding thereto the following paragraph:

(f) When death occurs in circumstances making the same compensable under the State Workmen's Compensation Act.

2. Inasmuch as it appears that the Board has no legal authority to pay compensation in any form to employees who may be injured in its employ, that no compensation be paid hereafter to any such employee injured while employed by the University, and that such employees make their claims in accordance with the law.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this report was accepted.

On motion of Mr. Barr, the University Statutes as printed in 1926 were amended by the addition of paragraph (f) to provision II of section 17 (page 11), as recommended above.

On motion of Mr. Trees, the University Statutes as printed in 1926 were amended by the omission of paragraph (h) of section 16 (page 9).

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, the policy recommended in paragraph 2 of the report of the special committee was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Trees, the consideration of the method of expediting the handling of claims for compensation for minor injuries was referred to the special committee for a recommendation.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of December 21, 1932. On motion of Dr. Noble, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 153 to 164 above.

PRESIDENT CHASE'S RESIGNATION

President Chase at this point presented the following letter of resignation:

January 25, 1933

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

I herewith present to you my formal resignation as President of the University of Illinois, to take effect on July I of this year, or as soon thereafter as practicable. At that time I shall assume the duties of the chancellorship of New York University, to which position I was elected on January 23.

It is which position I was elected on January 23. It is with the greatest reluctance that I have come to feel that I should accept the work at New York University. Its unique task and opportunity, its promise of rapidly growing usefulness in the years that lie ahead, in short, the whole picture presented by its life and work, are such that I have not been able to decline the opportunity offered me.

From your Board, as from the faculty, students, alumni, and friends of the University, I have always received the greatest measure of cooperation and understanding. I have valued your personal friendship and your unstinted loyalty to the University.

I have felt that the end of this year, with internal affairs in good shape, and finances stabilized for a two-year period, would be a favorable time for a change in the presidency.

It is an honor to have served the University of Illinois as its President. I shall always cherish the memory of my work here, and the many friendships I have formed.

The University of Illinois is a great institution. Secure in the esteem of the people of the state, and respected throughout the nation, it will, I am convinced, go steadily forward.

On motion of Mr. Barr, the following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, Harry Woodburn Chase, President of the University of Illinois, has today tendered his resignation as President of the University, to take effect July 1, 1933, in order to accept the position of Chancellor of New York University. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the

University of Illinois that we accept the resignation of President Chase with reluctance and release him from his present position with genuine regret.

In accepting the resignation of President Chase the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois deems it appropriate to couple with its avowal of regret an acknowledgment of its appreciation of the fine service he has rendered this body, the University, and the people of this state. He came to us three years ago with a constructive program of educational development, rationally progressive and feasible in essential principles, which he has carried towards completion with firm yet tactful vigor; he has approached the problems of the University with sympathetic insight and clear understanding; and he has demonstrated in character and conduct a capacity for cooperation with individuals and groups truly indicative of the highest executive ability. He has given the men and women of the State of Illinois, young and old, the type of leadership which we associate with the ideal university. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary deliver to President Chase

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary deliver to President Chase a copy of this Resolution signed by every member of the Board, attested by the Secretary, and with the seal of this body affixed thereto.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT CHASE

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR ARTHUR F. DODGE (1) A recommendation from the Dean of the College of Education that Assistant Professor Arthur F. Dodge be given sabbatical leave of absence on one-half pay under the rules, for one year beginning September I, 1933. This will involve no additional expense to the University as his work will be carried on at a cost not to exceed the other one-half of his salary.

On motion of Mrs. Hopkins, this leave was granted.

APPOINTMENT OF RESEARCH ASSOCIATE IN ENGINEER-ING EXPERIMENT STATION AND SUPERVISING ENGINEER

(2) A request for authority to appoint a Research Associate in the Engineering Experiment Station and a Supervising Engineer of the Physical Plant at a salary of \$5,000 a year. The Engineering Experiment Station duties will involve tests with Physical Plant equipment and experiments in Physical Plant operations. The salary for the position will be paid from Physical Plant appropriations since most of the duties will be in that division.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this appointment was authorized.

APPROPRIATION FOR VISIT OF LEGISLATURE

(3) A recommendation that an appropriation of 1,200, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made from the Reserve and Contingent Fund for the expenses of the official biennial inspection of the members of the General Assembly of Illinois.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Horner.

APPROPRIATION FOR RADIO STATION

(4) A request from the Director of the University Radio Station for an appropriation of \$1,500 to cover the cost of certain mechanical changes in the Station, and certain proceedings before the Federal Radio Commission to secure an increase in the power allocation to the Station so that it will be a more effective instrument of educational service to the people of the state.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this matter was referred to President Chase with power to act. The appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mrs. Grigsby, Mrs. Hopkins, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mr. Blair, Mr. Horner.

On motion of Mr. Trees, these changes were approved.

THEODORE B. SACHS RESIDENCY IN TUBERCULOSIS

(6) On March 11, 1930 (Minutes, page 545), the Board accepted an offer from the Chicago Tuberculosis Institute of \$2,500 to be paid annually for five years in support of a "Theodore B. Sachs Residency" in the field of tuberculosis. This amount has been paid for three years. Last year only \$1,200 of the \$2,500 paid in was used, and there is a balance of \$1,300 in the fund. Because of a shortage of funds, the Institute

wishes to make the 1933 payment \$1,200, which with the \$1,300 on hand will make a total of \$2,500 available for the work, with the understanding that the University will continue the work in tuberculosis during 1933 and 1934 along the original plans but in a more limited way.

The Dean of the College of Medicine recommends, and I concur, that this modification of the original plan be accepted by the Board.

On motion of Dr. Noble, this modification was accepted.

APPROVAL OF PURCHASES

(7) A report of the approval of the following purchases, amounting to \$1,000 or over. since the last report was made to the Board:

A carload of Chemically Pure and Commercial Acids from the Grasselli Chemical Company, the low bidder, at a price of \$1,326.11, f.o.b. Urbana, to be charged to the General Chemical Stores appropriation.

(8) The quarterly report of the Comptroller as of December 31, 1932. (Copies of this report have already been sent to the members of the Board.)

NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL GRANTS TO MEMBERS OF THE FACULTY

(9) A report that the National Research Council has made the following assignments of funds to members of the faculty for research work:

To Professor J. T. Tykociner, of the Department of Electrical Engineering, and Professor Jacob Kunz, of the Department of Physics, jointly, a second grant for technical assistance and the purchase of supplies for use in connection with their work on the precise determination of the magnetic

To Professor Maurice B. Visscher, of the College of Medicine, for technical assistance and the purchase of chemical supplies for use in his investigations on the mechanical efficiency of heart muscle..... 250 00

To Professor Ernst Gellhorn, of the College of Medicine, for the pur-chase of supplies in connection with his study of the influence of metabolities and internal secretions on fatigue..... 500 00

This report was received for record.

GIFTS TO THE UNIVERSITY

(10) The following gifts have been received by the University since the last report: From Dr. William Trelease, Professor of Botany, *Emeritus*, 51 volumes of the Encyclopedia of American Biography, a beautifully printed and bound set which

contains biographical information which is often difficult to obtain elsewhere. From Dr. C. W. Burrill, of Kansas City, Missouri, 17 volumes. Doctor Burrill is the only surviving brother of Dr. Thomas J. Burrill, former Vice-President of the

University.

From Professor John A. Fairlie, 60 volumes of valuable publications, chiefly of the National Industrial Conference Board.

From Mead Johnson and Company, \$2,000 in support of the investigations of Dr. C. I. Reed, Assistant Professor in the Department of Physiology, of the College of Medicine, on the physiological action of irradiated ergosterol of high potency. This is a continuation of work which has previously been financed by this company.

This report was received for record.

BEQUEST OF WENSEL MORAVA

(11) A report was presented to the Board at its meeting on November 19, 1932 (Minutes, page 147), of the bequest of the late Wensel Morava, of the Class of 1878. The hearing on the will was set for the latter part of December, and the University in the meantime executed an appearance. This report was received for record.

I now recommend that the Board accept the bequest under the conditions attached to the gift and that counsel for the Morava estate be notified of this action.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this bequest was accepted.

BUDGET OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(12) A statement concerning the financial plans of the Athletic Association.

It was the sense of the Board that the budget of the Athletic Association, not only for next year but also for the rest of the current year, should be reduced at least twenty-five per cent.

FINANCIAL SITUATION

(13) A report on the financial outlook for the rest of the year.

Mr. Morey made a statement concerning this matter. The report was received for record.

REPORTS OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Mr. Trees, for the Finance Committee, reported on several matters as follows:

INVESTMENT OF MCKINLEY ENDOWMENT AND OTHER TRUST FUNDS

I. On December 21, 1932, the Board directed the reinvestment in United States Government securities of \$2,200 of general endowment funds, the securities of which matured on January 1, 1933. On the same date \$15,000 of investments representing the McKinley Professorship Endowment also matured. A majority of the members of the Finance Committee recommended that this money also be reinvested in United States Government securities.

The Comptroller reports that in accordance with the recommendation of the Committee, and on the advice of the Treasurer of the University, he has purchased \$16,200 par value of United States Treasury $3\frac{3}{4}\%$ bonds due 1940-56 at $105\frac{5}{32}$, or a total cost of \$17,040.38 plus accrued interest, as reinvestments of the above funds. The sum of \$14,300 par value of these bonds, representing the McKinley Professorship Endowment, has been deposited in escrow with the Trevett-Mattis Banking Company of Champaign in accordance with the deed of gift of this fund. The remaining \$1,900, representing the investment of general endowment funds, has been deposited with the First Union Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago for safe keeping in accordance with that bank.

This matter was referred to the Finance Committee, with authority to transfer the investment to other securities if such action seems advisable.

NALLY MORTGAGE

II. A recommendation that the Comptroller be authorized to work out the solution of the problem of the mortgage on the Nally property (at Wright street and University avenue) in harmony with the discussion at this meeting, and to report his action at the next meeting.

On motion of Dr. Noble, this recommendation was approved.

HART MORTGAGE

III. A report that the makers of the Hart mortgage, covering property in Benton. have made a proposal involving the transfer of the land and other property to the University, and a recommendation that the Comptroller be authorized to take the necessary steps to effect a settlement.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this recommendation was approved.

CHICAGO AND WEST TOWNS RAILWAY BONDS

IV. On July 13, 1932 (Minutes, page 95), the Board authorized the deposit of \$1,000 of Chicago and West Towns Railway bonds, representing an investment of the K. C. Babcock Endowment Fund, which were due July 1, 1932, with the Bondholders Protective Committee pending a refinancing of the Company.

The Comptroller reports that he has received from the Committee a bond for \$1,000, due July 1, 1937, bearing interest at five per cent from the date of maturity of the former bond. The new bond has been deposited for safe keeping with the First Union Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago.

This report was received for record.

LA SALLE - WACKER BUILDING

V. A letter from the Comptroller:

January 20, 1933

Mr. Merle J. Trees, 37 West Van Buren Street, Chicago, Illinois DEAR MR. TREES:

In September the Finance Committee authorized the deposit of \$2,000 of 6% Series A first mortgage bonds of the La Salle-Wacker Building corporation received as an investment of the Babcock endowment fund and which are in default with a bondholders protective committee. These bonds were deposited with the committee in accordance with this action.

I am now in receipt of a communication from this committee which I am enclosing to you. The committee proposes to reorganize the company and to issue first mortgage 5% bonds, due 1957, for 50% of the principal of Series A bonds and gold debentures due 1962 for 60% of these bonds, the latter to cover 50% of the principal plus interest from the date of the last interest payment, December I, 1930. Interest on the debentures will be payable only to the amount of net earnings after meeting interest on the first mortgage bonds but not exceeding 5%. The plan is strongly recommended by the committee and it seems to be a satis-

The plan is strongly recommended by the committee and it seems to be a satisfactory arrangement in view of the facts set forward. It is not necessary for us to formally accept the proposal and no action is necessary on our part unless we are unwilling to accept the committee proposal. I shall appreciate advice as to whether we should allow the plan of the protective committee to take its course.

The nature of these documents and the fact that no service is needed in relation to their collection would seem to justify handling them in the same manner as approved by the Board for certain securities of a similar nature as per action of November 19, 1932 (Minutes, page 146). Consequently he has deposited the certificates above described in the safety-deposit box authorized by the Board at that time, to be under the joint control of the Secretary of the Board and the Comptroller.

INTEREST ON UNIVERSITY FUNDS

VII. On February 6, 1932 (Minutes, page 513), the Board authorized the Treasurer of the University to arrange with each depository selected by him for the safe keeping of the general funds of the University for the payment of interest on deposit funds at such rate as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the depository, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, which interest shall accrue to the account upon which it is allowed. On March 8, 1932 (Minutes, page 545), the Treasurer informed the Board that the First National Bank of Chicago will pay the University interest of one per cent to be credited monthly and the rate to remain in force until further notice. This was accepted by the Board.

The Comptroller reports that the Treasurer advised him that on December 26, 1932, the rate of interest on the University's account became one-half of one per cent, and effective January 25 the rate will be one-quarter of one per cent.

This report was received for record.

SELECTION OF PRESIDENT

On motion of Mr. Barr, consideration of the steps to be taken with reference to selecting a successor to President Chase was deferred until the next meeting of the Board.

DATE OF FEBRUARY MEETING

On motion of Dr. Noble, it was voted to hold the February meeting at 10 o'clock a.m. on Thursday, February 16, 1933, at the University, in Urbana.
