MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

February 16, 1933



The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, at 10 o'clock a.m. on Thursday, February 16, 1933.

The following members were present: President Barrett, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Grigsby, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; also Mrs. Nellie V. Freeman, member-elect.

President Chase was present.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of January 25, 1933. On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 165 to 179 above.

SELECTION OF PRESIDENT

On motion of Mr. Trees, consideration of the steps to be taken with reference to selecting a successor to President Chase was deferred until the next meeting of the Board.

ACCIDENT COMPENSATION

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, the action of the Board on January 25, 1933, adopting section 2 of the report of the special committee on accident compensation (page 166), was reconsidered.

President Chase made a statement.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, section 2 was amended to read as follows and was adopted in its amended form, effective as of January 25, 1933:

2. In as much as it appears doubtful whether the Board has the legal power to pay compensation in any form to employees who may be injured in its employ, that no compensation be paid to any such employee as may be hereafter injured while employed by the University, and that such employees make their claims in accordance with the law.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON JOURNALISM BUILDING

Mr. Armstrong, for the special committee to confer with the committee of the Illinois Press Association on the matter of providing a building for the School of Journalism, reported that the action of the Illinois Press Association, withdrawing for the present its request for a building, made the continuance of the committee unnecessary.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this report was accepted and the committee was discharged.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT CHASE

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

JAMES M. WHITE DEATH BENEFIT

(1) A report of the death on February 6, 1933, of Professor James M. White, Supervising Architect, and a recommendation that an appropriation of \$3,000 be made from the Reserve and Contingent Fund for the death benefit payable under the rules of the Board and the terms of his contract and that the Comptroller be authorized to make payment to the designated beneficiary.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this recommendation was adopted, and the appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Barr, Mr. Barrett, Mr. Blair, Mrs. Grigsby, Dr. Noble, Mr. Trees, Mr. Williams; no, none; absent, Mrs. Hopkins, Mr. Horner.

RESOLUTION ON THE DEATH OF PROFESSOR WHITE

On motion of Mr. Blair, the following resolution was adopted:

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois records with its deepest sorrow and sense of loss the death on February 6, 1933, of James McLaren White. Professor of Architectural Engineering, Supervising Architect, and Superintendent of Business Operations.

Professor White was one of the distinguished alumni of the University of Illinois and had given almost 43 years of devoted and outstanding service to his Alma Mater, first as a member of the faculty of the Department of Architecture, later as Dean of the College of Engineering, and for over 25 years as Supervising Architect; for the last 12 years he served also as Superintendent of Business Operations. Under his careful and far-sighted planning has been developed a physical plant adequate for the

University's needs and comprehensive plans for future campus development. His advice and counsel on campus planning and college buildings were sought by other institutions of higher education, and he was one of the country's authorities in this field. His passing is a great loss to the University, to his profession, and to the State of Illinois. In recording its sense of sorrow in his loss, the Board wishes to express its deepest sympathy to the members of his family and directs that this resolution be spread upon its minutes and a copy thereof be sent to them.

APPOINTMENT OF CHARLES S. HAVENS AS ACTING DIREC-TOR OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS OPERATIONS

(2) A recommendation that Charles S. Havens, Chief Clerk in the Supervising Architect's Office, be appointed Acting Director of Buildings and Grounds Operations, effective February 16, 1933, with salary at the rate of \$3,000 a year while acting in this capacity.

On motion of Dr. Noble, this appointment was made, subject to any general salary adjustments which may be made.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS ORGANIZATION

(3) A recommendation that the Board consider the business organization of the University.

On motion of Mr. Trees, the committee appointed to consider the business organization and administration of the University was discharged.

On motion of Mr. Williams, the President of the Board was requested to appoint a special committee of three members to consider the business organization of the University and to make recommendations to the Board. President Barrett later appointed Mr. Trees, Chairman, Mr. Armstrong, and Mr. Williams to serve on this committee.

HEARING OF MR. HENDERSON

(4) A request that a hearing be granted to Mr. H. L. Henderson, representing a firm of financial experts which is making a survey of state budget matters on behalf of Governor Horner.

Mr. Henderson was introduced. He made a statement concerning the general financial situation and its application to the University, and retired.

READJUSTMENT IN SALARIES (5) A recommendation that effective March 1, 1933, the salaries or wages of active members of the University staff on Board appointment or in regular employment be

reduced by 10 per cent of that amount of the annual or ten-months cash compensation above \$1.000.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this recommendation was adopted.

SUMMER SESSION STAFF 1933

(6) A recommendation for the approval of the following appointments to the Summer Session staff for 1933, the positions and salaries being indicated in each case; and a request for authority to make such adjustments in the Summer Session budget and such additional appointments as may be necessary. Provision has been made in the budget for 1932-33 for the work of the 1933 Summer Session.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this budget was approved, and authority was granted as requested.

OPERATION OF UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL DURING 1933 SUMMER SESSION

- (7) The following recommendations from the Dean of the College of Education and the Director of the Summer Session:
- That the University High School be authorized to offer high-school courses during the 1933 Summer Session of the University under the general direction of the Dean of the College of Education and the Director of the Summer Session.
 That a fee of \$15.00 be established for students taking one unit of work and of

2. That a fee of \$15.00 be established for students taking one unit of work and of \$8.00 for students taking half a unit of work. The maximum schedule for the Summer Session will be one unit.

3. That an appropriation of \$1,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made from the Reserve and Contingent Fund to supplement the budget of the Summer Session for this purpose. This expense will be met out of the anticipated income based on a maximum enrollment of 65 full-time students or their equivalent, if less than full schedules are taken. The work will not be offered unless it can be completely self-supporting.

This proposal is based on repeated requests from public school men of the State that such a venture be undertaken as a means of exemplifying the theory presented in summer session courses in education and on requests from students in the Uni-

versity High School and other high schools of the State for such work. I recommend approval.

returns to service, to enable him to assist the recently appointed State Acting Director of Agriculture in his former work so that he could take over his State duties at once.

RETIREMENT OF PROFESSOR JAMES B. SHAW

(11) A request from Professor James B. Shaw, of the Department of Mathematics, that he be retired under the rules of the Board on September 1, 1933. He will be 67 years old on March 20, 1933, and will have been in the service of the University 23 years on September 1. The rules of the Board permit retirement at any time after a member of the staff reaches 65 years of age (provided he has been in University service for at least 15 years) in exceptional cases and for substantial cause. His retiring allowance will be \$2,280, and the Department has agreed to provide for his work without an increase in its budget, at least until the time he would normally retire in 1934.

I recommend approval.

INVESTIGATION OF REINFORCED BRICK MASONRY

(12) A report of the authorization of an agreement with the Reinforced Concrete Masonry Research Board for a cooperative investigation of reinforced brick masonry. This agreement is for one year, beginning February 1, 1933, with provision for the extension, and the Research Board agrees to pay the University the sum of \$500 in one sum upon the execution of this agreement and to provide materials and additional funds, as needed, to the amount of \$200 for the expenses of the investigation.
