UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

October 13, 1933



The October meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, at 1:30 p.m. on Friday, October 13, 1933. LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR M. L. HANSEN

(2) A recommendation from the Acting Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Head of the Department of History that Professor M. L. Hansen of the Department of History be given sabbatical leave of absence on one-half pay under the rules for the year 1934-35. The Department will arrange to take care of his work without additional expense to the University.

On motion of Mrs. Hopkins, this leave was granted.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR H. C. M. CASE

(3) A report that Dr. H. C. M. Case, Professor of Farm Organization and Management, has been given approximately four months leave of absence without pay, beginning when he receives his official appointment and continuing throughout the first semester, to enable him to direct a survey for the Federal Farm Credit Administration. Provision has been made for his University work so that this will involve no expense to the University.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR W. H. RODEBUSH

(4) Dr. W. H. Rodebush, Professor of Physical Chemistry, has been invited to present a paper at the meeting of the Faraday Society to be held at Oxford University in England in April, 1934. Some of the work in physical chemistry done at the University of Illinois several years ago has attracted the attention of the President of the Society, and there is some work now under way which will also be suitable for presentation if it turns out as expected.

This invitation is such an institutional distinction as well as a professional tribute to Professor Rodebush that it warrants special consideration on its merits. It is neither requested nor expected that the University will pay his expenses to the meeting. It would be possible for him to attend if he were given leave of absence for the second semester with full pay, and arrangements would be made by the Department to take care of his work without additional cost. Professor Rodebush also agrees that if this leave is granted he will not request a sabbatical leave of absence for at least six years. In view of the unusual circumstances and subject to the conditions stipulated I recommend that this leave be granted.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this leave was granted. This action was taken in recognition of the special circumstances, and it was not intended to establish a precedent.

AGREEMENT FOR X-RAY STUDY OF INSULATING OILS

(5) A recommendation for the approval of an agreement with the Utilities Research Commission for a cooperative x-ray study of insulating oils by the Engineering Experiment Station. The agreement is drawn for a period of one year beginning October 1, 1933, with a provision for its extension, and the Commission agrees to pay the University \$1,000 for the expenses of the investigation.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this agreement was authorized, subject to the insertion of a clause protecting the right of the University to any patents which may result from this investigation.

AGREEMENT WITH PORTLAND CEMENT ASSOCIATION FOR INVESTIGATION OF RIGID FRAME STRUCTURES

(6) A recommendation for the approval of an agreement with the Portland Cement Association for a cooperative investigation of rigid frame structures by the Engineering Experiment Station. The agreement is drawn for a period of two years from January 1, 1934, with provisions for its termination on three months notice, and extension if necessary, and the Association agrees to pay the University the sum of \$15,000 for the expenses of the investigation.

On motion of Mr. Williams, this agreement was authorized, subject to the insertion of a clause protecting the right of the University to any patents.

CHEMISTRY EXHIBIT AT A CENTURY OF PROGRESS

(7) The Rosenwald Museum of Science and Industry has asked that the material for the periodic table of elements prepared by the Department of Chemistry for A Century of Progress International Exposition in Chicago be turned over to it at the end of the World's Fair. It is the opinion of Professor B. S. Hopkins, who prepared the material, that the Museum can house the collection adequately and give it a very fitting surrounding to enhance its educational value. An entire wing of the building is being planned for chemical displays and it is planned to make the periodic table a feature of this collection.

I recommend that the entire exhibit be housed in the Rosenwald Museum of Science and Industry with the understanding that the materials are a loan to the Museum and will remain the property of the University of Illinois to be recalled if at any time in the future such action is desirable.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this recommendation was adopted.

**CONTRACT WITH ILLINOIS POWER AND LIGHT CORPORATION
FOR ELECTRIC POWER**

(8) The University's power contract with the Illinois Power and Light Corporation under which the corporation supplies the University with stand-by service, selling electric power when the University either is not generating its own or cannot generate enough to meet its peak load requirements, expires July 1, 1934. It is desirable that negotiations be started immediately to secure a new agreement. I recommend that the Acting Director of Buildings and Grounds Operations be authorized to enter into preliminary negotiations with the corporation, and to call on such members of the faculty as he deems necessary for advice. It is understood that these negotiations shall be for the purpose of determining what terms the University is able to get and that they will not involve any agreements as to rates or matters of policy without the approval of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, this recommendation was adopted.

TREASURER'S BOND

(9) A report from the Comptroller that in accordance with the authorization of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on July 10, 1933, the Treasurer's bond has been reduced from one million dollars to five hundred thousand dollars by the Fidelity and Casualty Company of New York, which issued the bond. The reduction is effective July 11, 1933, and the bond at the reduced amount runs until the end of the present term of the Treasurer, March 11, 1935.

This report was received for record.

DEATH BENEFIT—PROFESSOR EMERITUS H. J. BARTON

(10) A report of the death on September 27, 1933, of Mr. H. J. Barton, Professor of Latin Language and Literature, *Emeritus*, and Secretary of the University Senate, who had been in the Service of the University over forty-two years when he retired on September 1, 1926. I have authorized the Comptroller to pay his estate the sum of \$1,000, which was the death benefit payable under the rules of the Board and the terms of his employment.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this action was confirmed.

BURKS PATENT—CHEMICAL TREATMENT OF WATER, CASE 1

(12) A report from Judge Johnson that the Patent Office has rejected the application for patent of Dana Burks, Jr., Chemical Treatment of Water, Case I; with a recommendation that the University abandon further efforts to obtain a patent on this invention.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this recommendation was adopted.

FEES FOR EXTENSION WORK

(13) A recommendation that the basic fee for extension (correspondence) courses be fixed at \$5 a semester credit hour; this action to be tentative and subject to final approval when the plans for the administration of this work are completed.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this recommendation was adopted.

MEETING OF AMERICAN HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

(14) Two years ago President Chase invited the American Historical Association to hold one of its annual meetings, which are usually held the last week of December, at the University of Illinois. This invitation was renewed at the meeting of the Association in Toronto in 1932 and was accepted for the meeting in 1933. It has been customary for institutions at which such meetings are held to provide certain entertainment for the members, including a dinner and a reception. A committee of the faculty is working out plans to handle this meeting. I request authority to extend to the Association such institutional courtesies as are the common and recognized practice at other universities and colleges.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this authority was granted.

AUDIT REPORT OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(15) An audit report from Arthur Andersen and Company of the Athletic Association for the year ended June 30, 1933, and supplementary financial statements for the same period prepared by the Comptroller.

On motion of Mr. Barr, this report was referred to the Finance Committee for examination and report.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(16) The quarterly report of the Comptroller to the Board of Trustees as at September 30, 1933.

This report was referred to the Finance Committee for examination and report.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON RADIO STATION

On motion of Mr. Trees, the President of the Board was requested to appoint a special committee to investigate and to do what can be done to obtain permission for the University radio station to operate at its maximum capacity.

President Barrett appointed Mr. Karraker, Mrs. Freeman, and Mr. Williams to serve on this committee.

RENEWAL OF POPE MORTGAGE

Mr. Trees, for the Finance Committee, presented a report that the administrator of the estate of Mr. B. W. Pope proposes to pay approximately one-half of the principal sum (\$5,000) of the farm mortgage loan held by the Board as one of its investments of trust funds and requests an extension of not more than \$3,000 of the loan for three years, with the privilege of paying all or any part of the loan, with interest, at any time before maturity.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this extension was authorized.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Mr. Trees reported that the Finance Committee had examined the report of the Treasurer presented at the last meeting.

This report was received for record.

INVESTMENT OF TRUST FUNDS

Mr. Trees, for the Finance Committee, presented a report recommending that approximately \$17,000 of trust funds be invested in the following securities, at the market price:

AUTOMOBILE TRAFFIC ON GREEN STREET

Mr. Armstrong reported that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds had investigated automobile traffic on Green Street where it crosses the campus, and that the Committee regarded the present conditions unsatisfactory and dangerous to students entering and leaving the campus.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, the Acting President of the University was instructed to take whatever steps may be necessary to secure a change in State Route 10 so that it shall not go through the grounds of the University.

On motion of Mr. Barr, the Acting President was instructed to ask

the proper authorities to commission temporarily one of the employees of the University to act as traffic policeman at the corner of Green and Wright streets.

KUNZ PHOTO-ELECTRIC CELL

Mr. Williams requested that the Patent Committee be discharged from further consideration of the matter of infringements of the patent for the Kunz photo-electric cell.

On motion of Mr. Trees, this request was granted.

ALUMNI FOUNDATION

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, the special committee on the proposed Alumni Foundation was discharged from further consideration of the matter.

BRADLEY BEQUEST

The Secretary reported the receipt of notice from Mrs. Helen Byers Bradley, that the will of her husband, Colonel William Rogerson Bradley, who died in 1928, contained the following item:

"I give and bequeath to the Military Band Department of the School of Music of the University of Illinois the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), in cash or its equivalent, the same to be a perpetual trust fund to be created and known as the W. R. Bradley Banquet Fund, the principal thereof to be invested in legal securities of the State of Illinois and the income derived therefrom to be used for holding an annual banquet for the members of the said University band, of which Professor A. A. Harding at the date of the making of this will is the leader and director. This bequest is to be paid at the convenience of my legal representative within five years from the date of my death, and is to be paid without any deduction for any collateral inheritance tax, which taxes shall be paid out of my residuary estate first hereinafter mentioned."

On motion of Mr. Trees, this bequest was accepted, and the Acting President of the University was requested to send an expression of the appreciation of the Board to Mrs. Bradley.

DATE OF NOVEMBER MEETING

On motion of Mr. Trees, it was voted to hold the November meeting on Saturday, November 18, at the University.
