Executive Committee Meetings of April 27 and May 14, 1938



The April meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, at 10 o'clock a.m. on Wednesday, April 27, 1938.

The following members were present: President Mayer, Mr. Adams, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Moschel, Mr. Pogue.

President Willard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, and Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller.

As there was no quorum, the Board took a recess.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, APRIL 27, 1938

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University, in Urbana, on Wednesday, April 27, 1938, during the recess in the meeting of the Board held on the same day.

Mr. Oscar G. Mayer, Chairman, and Mr. Orville M. Karraker, member of the Executive Committee, were present; also Mr. Homer Mat Adams, Mr. Louis C. Moschel, and Mr. Harold A. Pogue, members of the Board, and President Arthur C. Willard, Mr. A. J. Janata, and Professor Lloyd Morey.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT WILLARD

The Executive Committee considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

#### THE BUDGET FOR 1938-1939

(1) The University budget for the fiscal and academic years 1938-1939.

Mimeographed copies of the detailed budget were distributed to the members of the Executive Committee and to the members of the Board who were present, together with an analysis showing the income from all sources and the distribution of the proposed expenditures.

The Comptroller presented a statement showing the allocation of the income from state appropriations and the estimated income from all other sources available for the fiscal and academic years 1938-1939 for all budgetary purposes, as recommended by the President of the University.

Mr. Adams having raised the question of the wages of janitors in the Physical Plant Department, the President of the University presented the following statements on the wages of building and maintenance employees and the restoration of salaries of full-time members of the staff.

#### WAGES OF BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE EMPLOYEES

Last year the janitors in the Physical Plant Department requested an increase in their wages from a minimum of 50 cents per hour to a rate of 60 cents, effective July 1, 1937. On July 16, the Board of Trustees, after receiving a report from the Faculty Committee on Wages which had been asked to study the proposal, and after a hearing of a delegation representing the janitors, voted to increase their wages to 56 cents per hour effective July 1, 1937.

On April 11, 1938, the Grievance Committee of Building Service Employees, Local No. 19, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, submitted a request to the Physical Plant Department for a wage scale of 60 cents per hour for regular time, time and one-half for overtime and Sundays, and double time for holidays, effective July 1, 1938. The latter two features have not appeared in previous requests. If this is approved it will mean an added expenditure of about \$14,000 a year for janitor service alone. The Faculty Committee on Wages has given this proposal its consideration and submits the following report:

"Janitors received in 1932-1933, 50¢ to 55¢ an hour, an average of about \$124 a month. Last year they received a maximum of 55¢ an hour and an average of \$116 to \$117 a month. For the current year they receive 56¢ an hour, an average of about \$122 a month. All of these figures include overtime,

hour, an average of about \$122 a month. All of these figures include overtime, which, however, is smaller in amount now than in 1932-1933. The proposals submitted by the janitors would represent an average of about \$125 a month

excluding overtime.

"Janitors in other local institutions receive, according to latest information available, from \$75 to \$120 a month. The best scale of wages appears to be in the Champaign Public Schools where the scale is from \$90 to \$120 for regular "At other universities, more or less comparable to Illinois, the rates of pay

range from \$90 to \$125 a month.

"The Committee has considered carefully the latest request and again has reached the conclusion that it is not feasible to accede to this request for the following reasons:

- "(1) The income for the current biennium consists mainly of State appropriations which are definitely set for two years in advance. Practically no change is possible during the second year of the biennium, since the income for that year is substantially the same as for the first year. Such increase as is available must be applied toward additional staff, both instructional and operating, and to such special adjustments as may be found necessary.
- "(2) The general reserve of the University has suffered heavy inroads of an unexpected character during the past year due to the repairs necessary in the Auditorium and to the necessity of evacuating University Hall.
- "(3) To make a general increase in any one group of employees would necessitate reconsideration of the rates for many other wage groups, especially in the Physical Plant and in Agriculture. The amount of such adjustments would at least equal the amount required to adjust janitors' wages, so that the total added expenditure probably would be from \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year. From the information we have, we are convinced the University budget would not stand such an addition.
- "(4) To make a general revision in wages of employees at this time would bring the University face to face with a serious problem concerning its faculty. At the present time the salaries of approximately 25 per cent of the members of the staff are below the salaries received by these persons in 1932-1933. The average salary of the members of the instructional staff is about 10 per cent below that in effect in 1932-1933.

"In view of these considerations, the Committee feels that the only action that is possible on the petition of these employees is that it be received for con-

sideration in connection with the budget of the next biennium.

"The Committee points out that the situation with respect to these employees is somewhat different than it was a few months ago. In the interval a division of the American Federation of Labor, embracing such employees, has been organized in this community and the majority of the University janitors have become members. The request for an increase in wages is now submitted by this organization. If this request is not granted the organization might see fit to call off its members from University service. It is possible that other divisions of the Federation of Labor might take similar action, in which case a problem of some proportions might be presented. Nevertheless, the Committee does not see how the request can be approved without reductions and revisions in the budget for the current year at other points with consequent results of a serious character."

RESTORATION OF SALARIES IN THE BUDGET FOR THE CURRENT YEAR (1937-1938)

During the current year (1937-1938) there are 355 full-time members of the staff whose salaries have not yet been restored to the 1932 basis preceding the two cuts which became effective March 1 and July 1, 1933. Among these are a number of individuals whom the heads of the departments and the deans of the colleges concerned would readily recommend for complete restoration if sufficient funds were available to provide for this as well as other educational needs. To restore the salaries of all of these people would involve an increase of approximately \$96,000 in the annual budget.

These matters were discussed with Director C. S. Havens, who was present for the purpose, and were referred to the President of the University for further study.

The President of the University presented the following recommendation:

#### APPROVAL OF THE BUDGET FOR 1938-1939

A recommendation that the following budget, covering the allocation of the University's income from all State appropriations (including the appropriation of the Revolving Fund representing all general income) as well as Federal funds and trust funds, and including provisions for all salaries, wages, operation, plant repairs and improvements, special, non-recurring appropriations, and all other expense for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1938, and the academic year beginning September 1, 1938, be approved; that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments as are needed, to make such additional appointments as are necessary, and to accept resignations offered, in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved; and that the Executive Committee of the Board be hereby authorized to make appropriations from the General Reserve Fund and such other adjustments in the budget as may be needed from time to time whenever it is necessary to take such action in the absence of a quorum of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, the budget as printed below was approved as presented, and authority was granted as requested, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Mayer, Mr. Karraker; no, none; absent, Dr. Meyer.

#### GENERAL EXPLANATORY NOTES

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries and Wages" and "Expense and Equipment." Unless otherwise indicated, no transfers may be made between these appropriation captions except with the approval of the President of the University, except that adjustments may be made between the "Wage" provisions and "Expense and Equipment" upon written request to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1. All balances remaining at the end of the term indicated or at August 31, lapse on those dates.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against for services of an employee temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges may not exceed the amount of time provided by the position unless otherwise approved by the President. When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance will lapse at that time.

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment and for Wages are available for one year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. These appropriations are based on an estimated distribution of expenditures according to the various budget classifications of "Office Expenses Travel ate." Expenditures schoold be made in corresponding

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment and for Wages are available for one year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. These appropriations are based on an estimated distribution of expenditures according to the various budget classifications of "Office Expense, Travel, etc." Expenditures should be made in approximate accord with that distribution, material departure from which should be reported in advance to the Dean or Director or other officer concerned, and to the Comptroller. All unencumbered balances in these appropriations lapse June 30.

#### SUMMARY OF INTERNAL BUDGET FOR 1938-1939

The estimated income for the fiscal year 1938-1939 as shown by the attached summary is \$8,011,580. For the current year 1937-1938 the budget estimate of income was \$7,019,074 (Board Minutes, August 2, 1937, page 366) and the probable actual income will be \$7,945,324. The estimated income for the coming year therefore is \$66,256 greater than for 1937-1938, the difference appearing chiefly in Federal funds and in student fees.

The budget of expenditures for 1938-1939 totals \$7,972,121, made up as

The total proposed expenditures for 1938-1939 are \$7,972,121, which, taken from an estimated income of \$8,011,580, leaves a reserve for adjustments and contingencies of \$39,459. To this reserve will be added any unencumbered balance which may remain at the close of the current fiscal year.

#### THE SALARY BUDGET

#### Explanatory Notes

Unless otherwise indicated in the Budget:

1. All appointments begin September 1, 1938.

2. C. S. (Civil Service) appointments are for one year. Appointees to stenographic and clerical positions are assigned to departments at the convenience of the University. The University reserves the right to change such assignments during the year if the needs of the University and of the departments require such action.

3. The service required under appointments in this budget to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Session. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Associate and above are paid in twelve equal monthly installments; salaries of other ranks, in ten equal monthly installments.

4. The service required in all positions in experiment stations and bureaus of research, and in research positions in other departments, is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance of one month for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments.

5. The service required in all other positions—administrative, clerical, and service positions—is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments.

#### Symbols

A—Indefinite tenure.

B-Two years from September 1, 1937.

D-One year from September 1, 1938.

E-Ten months from September 1, 1938.

F-Special tenure.

H-July 1, 1938, to June 30, 1939. (All wage items fall in this group).

#### Part time

When any of the above symbols is combined with a number, the number indicates the fraction of time in per cent covered by the position.

The Dean and the Executive Committee of the College of Liberal Arts and The Dean and the Executive Committee of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommend that he be given a special leave of absence during the entire academic year of 1938-1939 with full pay in order that he may spend a full year abroad completing two major scholarly projects on which he has been working, this leave to supersede the one previously granted. This is being presented to the Board as a special case on the initiative of the Dean and Executive Committee of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the President of the University and not on the application of the individual.

Professor Baldwin is one of the distinguished scholars on the faculty and

Professor Baldwin is one of the distinguished scholars on the faculty and one of the six leading Shakespeare scholars of the world. He has about exhausted the resources for his research available in this country and has reached the point where he cannot further proceed without a prolonged period of study in England. It is impossible for him to do this in one semester nor to finance a full year's sabbatical leave of absence on one-half pay. In view of these

circumstances the College is recommending that the usual conditions governing leaves of absence be waived in the case of Professor Baldwin purely on its merits, that is, his professional reputation and the importance of the research work in which he is engaged.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this leave was granted as recommended.

### LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR F. P. SHEPARD

(6) Associate Professor F. P. Shepard, of the Department of Geology and Geography, who is on leave of absence during the present academic year (the first semester without pay and the second semester a sabbatical leave on onehalf pay), has been granted an extension of his leave, without pay, for the first semester of 1938-1939 to enable him to pursue further certain researches on oceanography on the Pacific Coast.

To carry on his research program effectively it is necessary for Professor Shepard to be away for a part of each year. He has requested that he be given a leave of absence without pay during the first semester of each year for a period of years. # KENDRIC C. BABCOCK ENDOWMENT FUND

Mr. Karraker, for the Finance Committee, presented the following report.

The University received as a part of the Kendric C. Babcock Endowment Fund \$2,500, first 7% bonds of the Illinois Orchard Company, due March 15, 1932. On November 19, 1932, the Board authorized the deposit of these funds with the trustee for the purpose of foreclosure.

A decree of foreclosure was granted and a receiver was appointed. The receiver operated the premises until December 4, 1937. From time to time portions of the property were sold until all was disposed of and the proceeds turned over to the receiver. The receiver filed a final report in Clay County, Illinois, where the property is located, which report was approved December 4.

1937, and the receiver discharged.

The Comptroller has received and has on file reports of these various operations, the net result of which is a distribution to bond holders amounting operations, the first result of which is a distribution soles of the frace value of the bonds. In making sales of the property, the trustee reserved oil and mineral rights. There is a strong possibility that these rights may come to have a sizable value, in which case a material further realization on the face value of the bonds is entirely possible. In view of these facts, the Comptroller is showing the amount received from the trustee as a credit on the face value of the bonds and is continuing to carry the bonds in the investment account of the Babcock Fund at a book value of \$2,000, showing that the only security is an interest in the oil and mineral rights of the property originally covered by the bonds, in view of the fact that all other interest in the property itself has been released.

Whereas, the University has borne the legal expenses of securing the abovenamed patents and in prosecuting the above-named patent applications, as well as other incidental and indirect costs; and

Whereas, the Utilities Research Commission, Inc. is about to be dissolved and an agreement between the University and Utilities Research Commission, Inc. dated December 3, 1931, concerning the above mentioned applications and Letters Patent, is being this day cancelled and

Whereas, it is the desire of the University and the Company to substitute the within agreement in place of said agreement dated December 3, 1931.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) and other good and valuable considerations by each to the other this day in hand paid, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, and in further consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, it is hereby agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

1. That the University shall immediately assign to the Company the entire right, title and interest in and to the inventions disclosed in the above-mentioned applications and patents, together with the entire right, title and interest in and to said applications and patents, and the Company shall pay the expenses incurred after January 1, 1938, in prosecuting said applications for patents, except that in case the Company discontinues the prosecution of any of said applications as provided for in paragraph 9 of this agreement, then, from that time on, any expenses incurred in the prosecution by the University of said applications shall be paid by the University.

- 2. That if any patentable discoveries concerning the elimination of sulphurous gases from stack gases be made during the course of such investigation as may be conducted under any existing research agreement between the University and Utilities Research Commission, Inc. or extension or assignment thereof which inventions the Company considers worthy of patenting in the United States or foreign countries, the Company shall request the University to make application for United States Letters Patent and foreign patents covering such inventions in the name or names of University agents concerned in making such discoveries, and the University shall assign to the Company all right, title and interest in and to such inventions, applications and patents on the conditions herein stated, and the Company shall diligently prosecute such applications and make reasonable efforts to obtain United States Letters Patent or foreign patents for such inventions at the Company's own expense, provided, however, that if the Company informs the University in writing that it does not desire any particular invention or inventions assigned to it, then the University shall be under no obligation to assign said invention or inventions.
- 3. That the provisions of Paragraph 2 shall apply to any patentable discoveries resulting directly and exclusively from researches made under any such research agreement aforesaid, provided such discoveries are made not later than one year after termination of said research agreement or any extension thereof.
- 4. That the University shall promptly notify the Company of any and all discoveries or inventions which its investigators may make relative to sulphur fumes in stack gases, within the provisions of Paragraphs 2 and 3 hereof, and render all reasonable assistance to the Company in obtaining Letters Patent, by procuring the necessary signatures to the papers and making available full information concerning the inventions.
- 5. That where the Company grants licenses under the patents referred to in this agreement, said licenses shall be made with provisions for the use of the patents which will safe-guard the public, during the life of said patents, from unreasonable restrictions or exorbitant royalties for the use of later patents that may depend for their usefulness on the patents referred to in this agreement.
- 6. That the Company itself, or by means of a licensee or licensees, will make reasonable and diligent efforts to develop and promote such of the inventions referred to in this agreement as to the Company seem to warrant such procedure.
- 7. That the Company shall pay annually to the University twenty-five per cent (25%) of all royalties, license fees, or compensations which it may receive under any license agreements or assignments of the inventions covered by this agreement. As to any inventions for which applications for patents have been filed and assigned to the Company and for which patents have been issued, the Company shall, upon request, inform the University fully concerning the status thereof from the standpoint of commercial development, licensing thereunder, and receipts under licensing agreements. The Commission shall file copies of all licensing agreements with the University immediately upon the execution thereof.
- 8. That the Company shall have the right to discontinue the prosecution of any of said applications for patents which have been or may be assigned by the University to the Company, and in that event the Company shall, upon written request from the University, reassign said discontinued application to the University. The Company will, if requested by the University, at least once every six months report the status and progress of all patent applications pending in the Patent Office, pursuant to this agreement.
- 9. Upon thirty (30) days written notice by the University to the Company of its desire to terminate its future obligations under paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4

of this agreement, all obligations on the part of the University under paragraphs I, 2 and 4 of this agreement arising subsequent to said notice shall cease after the effective date of said notice, and all obligations on the part of the University under paragraph 3 of this agreement arising subsequent to one year after said notice shall cease one year after the effective date of such notice.

#### OFFER OF PROPERTY AT 1210 WEST GREEN STREET

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant Department reports that the property at 1210 West Green Street, Urbana, has been offered for sale to the University. This is the largest lot in the area south of the Boneyard in the block bounded by Mathews Avenue, Green Street, Goodwin Avenue, and Springfield Avenue.

No action was taken on this offer.

#### PROPERTY AT 210 SOUTH MATHEWS AVENUE

(18) In December, 1935, the Board authorized the purchase of the property at 210 South Mathews Avenue at a cost of \$6,100. Improvements on this property consist of a two-story, frame and stucco building. The first floor is rented out

as a restaurant while the second floor is occupied by undergraduate student

The property has been leased, but at no profit. The building is in bad condition, and to put it in suitable shape will require a great amount of repairs. Under the circumstances the Physical Plant Department has been authorized to tear down the building at the expiration of the present lease on June 15.

This report was received for record.

### SMOKING IN UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS

(19) The present University regulations relating to smoking in public buildings on the campus are based upon a provision in the "Rules for Government of Students" adopted by the Board December 8, 1891, which is as follows: "Smoking is not permitted in any of the public buildings of the University." There is also a provision in the regulations applying to undergraduate students forbidding smoking on certain areas of the campus.

Early in 1032 the Board considered a proposal to modify the regulations to permit smoking in certain areas. After considerable discussion the Board decided that it did not wish in any formal or recorded way to modify the regulations existing then regarding smoking in buildings, but it agreed

informally that

- I. The action relating to smoking in buildings is not to be interpreted as forbidding members of the staff from smoking in their private offices.
- 2. The practice of not permitting smoking on certain areas of the campus should be continued in keeping with a long standing tradition.

As a result of these deliberations the President of the University announced to the Deans, Directors, and Heads of Administrative and Academic Departments the following administrative smoking regulations:

- 1. The administration has no objection to members of the staff smoking in their offices under conditions which do not create a fire hazard. Such an interpretation of the Trustees' regulation is not objected to by the Board.
- 2. I ask all individuals concerned to cooperate in seeing that smoking does not go on in corridors, classrooms, teaching laboratories, and other places in which its presence would be objectionable or unsafe.
- 3. As the sentiment of the Board, and I understand a considerable faculty, student, and alumni sentiment, favors not smoking on certain traditional campus areas, I urge everyone to respect this tradition with the understanding that on special occasions and on areas on the campus where conditions bring about a difference in the situation (such, for example, as the tennis courts behind the Library) changes may occur from time to time.

Subsequent to this announcement the President of the University ruled that smoking in certain buildings (notably University Hall, Natural History Building, Old Agriculture Building, and several of the Engineering buildings) would not be permitted because of fire hazards which exist in those non-fireproof buildings.

Smoking on the campus and in University buildings, particularly by students, has become a serious problem. It seems desirable to bring the situation to the attention of the Board for its consideration and a review of existing

regulations and practices.

This report was received for record; it was the sense of the Executive Committee that no change should be made in existing regulations and policies concerning smoking in public buildings.

## RESOLUTION OF ILLINOIS BUILDERS LEAGUE

(20) The Secretary of the Illinois Builders League has sent the following resolution adopted by that organization at a meeting on April 5:

Whereas, it has been brought to the attention of the construction industry of the State of Illinois that the Physical Plant Department of the University of Illinois is engaging in construction work on a day labor basis, and that it is producing materials for its use on a non-competitive basis, and Whereas, the Physical Plant Department not only invades the inherent rights of those who are engaged in construction work and in the marketing of materials, but that it offers to the University no guarantees of any kind as to either ultimate costs or results, and

Whereas, the University is educating persons to enter the construction field under the pretence that it is a fair, unlimited, and open field for the engagement of their professional services, and then deliberately invades that field by eliminating them from the customary and usual competition, and

Whereas, repeated protests to the University against this iniquitous practice has been without avail,

Therefore, be it resolved, by the Illinois Builders League in conference assembled at the Leland Hotel, Springfield, Illinois, this 5th day of April, 1938, that it protest to the University of Illinois against this encouragement of the spread of such a doctrine to other institutions, and it be urged to give consideration to the inherent rights of an industry which has maintained a tremendous invested capital for the service of those who require construction, who are tax payers in the State of Illinois, who have never urged the elimination of fair competition in the engagement of its services, which has held itself ready at all times to adequately and accurately serve the public, the state and its institutions, and

Be it further resolved, that the University of Illinois be urged to comply with similar conditions to that set up in the law for the State of Illinois and its other institutions; and

Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to His Excellency, Governor Horner, and other parties of interest.

This report was received for record.

# POWER PLANT STUDIES

(21) The Advisory Committee on the Power Plant recommends that consulting engineers be employed to make studies of the Power Plant before any further major expenditures are made on the plant.

It is desirable that this study be undertaken and completed as soon as possible. I therefore recommend that the Board authorize the employment of engineers to make such a study and that an appropriation of \$5,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made from the General Reserve Fund for this purpose.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Mayer, Mr. Karraker; no, none; absent, Dr. Meyer.

# LOW-COST STUDENT RESTAURANT

(22) The Student Senate has submitted a request, supported by petitions signed by 1779 students, that the University establish a cooperative or low-cost restaurant in the present Illinois Union Building.

This matter has been under consideration for several weeks, and I have discussed it with representatives of the Men's Independent District Association (an organization of the non-fraternity undergraduate men), but no decision has been reached, and therefore I have no recommendation to make to the Board at this meeting. However, since the Student Senate has requested that this proposal be brought to the attention of the Board, I am presenting it at this time.

This report was received for record.

# PETITION FOR UNDERGRADUATE COURSE IN "PREPARATION FOR MARRIAGE"

(23) The Student Senate (the student governing body of the University) requests that the University offer an undergraduate course in "Preparation for Marriage." The original proposal was received several weeks ago, and after

careful study by the Provost and other officers, the Student Senate was advised that the University would consider offering a course which would take the form of a series of lectures, open to all students, by one or more trained individuals with a proper professional background. The Student Senate has recently expressed its judgment that the most effective service can be given through a credit course on marriage open only to seniors, rather than through a series of lectures. This counter-proposal will, of course, be given due consideration by the proper officials, but since the Student Senate, through its General Welfare Committee, has requested that the matter be brought to the attention of the Board, I am presenting it at this time.

This report was received for record.

#### REQUEST OF ILLINOIS STATE FLORISTS' ASSOCIATION

(24) A request from the Illinois State Florists' Association that the University allocate more funds for research and extension work in floriculture than it has heretofore. A delegation from the Association is also here today to appear before the meeting in support of its request.

The following representatives of the Association were introduced: George J. Ball, President, West Chicago; William G. Loveridge, Secretary, Peoria; Leonard Vaughan, Chicago; P. A. Washburn, Bloomington; James Sykora, Chicago.

Dean H. W. Mumford and Professor J. C. Blair were also introduced.

Mr. Vaughan, acting as spokesman, presented a request that additional provision be made for work in floriculture in research and extension.

The Executive Committee took this matter under advisement.

## LABORATORY FEE FOR SUMMER COURSE IN ANATOMY

(25) A request from the Dean of the College of Medicine for authorization to offer a summer review course for undergraduates in Anatomy to be known as "Course 80, Dissection" and covering a period of three months, approximately from June 10 to September 10, and that a laboratory fee of \$25.00 be established for this course.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this fee was authorized as recommended.

# PART-TIME SUMMER FEES IN THE COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY

(26) A recommendation that the following fees for part-time work in the College of Dentistry during the summer be authorized:

For more than six weeks attendance the full summer term tuition and infirmary fee for full time work will be assessed. This is \$25.00 for residents (\$12.50, tuition, and \$12.50, infirmary fee), and \$35.00 for non-residents (\$22.50, tuition, and \$12.50, infirmary fee).

On motion of Mr. Karraker, these fees were authorized as recommended.

#### LABORATORY FEE IN HOME ECONOMICS

(27) A recommendation from the Dean of the College of Agriculture that the laboratory fee in Home Economics course No. 14 (Home Management) be increased from \$16.00 to \$25.00 for the Summer Session.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this fee was authorized as recommended.

# AGREEMENTS FOR DEVELOPMENT AND DISTRIBUTION OF CERTAIN VARIETIES OF SWEET CORN AND LIMA BEANS

- (28) A report that the Secretary and Comptroller of the Board have been authorized to execute for the University agreements with the following companies for cooperation with the Agricultural Experiment Station in the development and further distribution of certain varieties of sweet corn and lima beans originated at the University:
- 1. Rogers Brothers Seed Company, of Chicago, two agreements, one covering sweet corn and the other lima beans.
- 2. McCrea Seed Company, Incorporated, of Santa Barbara, California, agreement covering the Illinois Baby Potato Lima Bean.

These agreements conform in all essential respects to the form used in similar agreements with other seedsmen.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this action was confirmed.

# EXTENSION OF AGREEMENTS FOR COOPERATIVE INVESTIGATIONS (20) A report of the extension of the following agreements for cooperative

(29) A report of the extension of the following agreements for cooperative investigations, the original agreement in each case having been approved by the Board of Trustees:

- I. National Warm Air Heating and Air Conditioning Association, investigation of "Warm Air Furnaces and Furnace Heating Systems" for one year from April 15, 1938. The Association agrees to contribute \$5,000 for the research program during that period.
- 2. American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers, investigation of heating and ventilation for one year from August 1, 1938. The Society agrees to contribute \$600 for the research program during that period.

#### STEAM BOILER INSURANCE

(31) The University carries insurance on all steam boilers and certain other high-pressure machinery. The policies expire May 1, 1938, and should be renewed at this time.

Sealed quotations on this insurance on the basis of uniform specifications were received and opened on April 15. With one exception (the American Employers Liability Assurance Corporation) the bids are uniform as to

basic rates.

The Lumberman's Mutual Casualty Insurance Company writes a policy in which the policy holder participates in a dividend from the net earnings of the company, payable at the close of each policy year. While the dividend rate is not guaranteed, in the past several years it has amounted to 25 per cent of the premium. On this basis the net cost of a policy with this company would be 25 per cent, or \$1,118.60, less than that of other companies. The University would be required to pay the full amount of the premium, at the same rate as quoted by other companies except the American Employers Liability Insurance Corporation, but receive a refund at a later date as an offset to this payment. This dividend would make the Lumberman's Company's net premium rate the lowest of all quotations received.

The Purchasing Agent recommends, and the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller concur, that this insurance be placed with the Lumberman's Mutual Casualty Insurance Company, of Chicago, for the next three years. The University Counsel has advised that it is entirely legal for the

University to purchase a policy of this kind in such a company.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this contract was awarded to the Lumberman's Mutual Casualty Insurance Company as recommended.

# TRANSFER OF PHRENOLOGICAL COLLECTION TO PSYCHOLOGICAL MUSEUM

(33) In February, 1917, the Department of Psychology purchased at a cost of \$341 a phrenological collection of head models, which in 1934 was turned over by the Department of Psychology to the Department of Anatomy in the College of Medicine. Since neither department has further use for this collection, the heads of the two departments and the Dean of the College of Medicine propose that it be placed in the Psychological Museum in Chicago, which is being established under the direction of Dr. David P. Boder, of the Department of Psychology at Lewis Institute, as an historical exhibit.

I recommend that this collection be lent to the Psychological Museum.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, the transfer of this collection was authorized as recommended.

#### REPORTS ON CARTER-PENNELL FARMS

(34) The fifteenth annual report of the Carter-Pennell Farms covering the farm year, March 1, 1937, to February 28, 1938. This report covers the operation of the two farms in Vermilion County held by the Board of Trustees of the University under a deed from the late Joseph Carter and Jane P. Carter, of Rankin, creating a trust for educational purposes (Minutes of March 13, 1923, page 149). The net proceeds from these trust farms are used as a loan fund to aid students.

The report indicates a net income of \$1,199.64 from the two farms, about \$60 less than the income of the preceding year. Otherwise, the earnings were the best the farms have shown since 1930.

It is customary for the Board to refer these reports to its Committee on Agriculture for consideration and recommendation.

This report was referred to the Committee on Agriculture for consideration and report.

# REVOCATION OF C. P. A. CERTIFICATE OF PAYSOFF TINKOFF

(35) At its meeting on March 18 the Board referred to the Committee on General Policy the report of the Committee on Accountancy on the complaint of the Illinois Society of Certified Public Accountants against Mr. Paysoff Tinkoff with the recommendation that his certificate as a Certified Public Accountant be revoked.

Formal notice had been served, more than twenty days before the meeting, on the respondent, Paysoff Tinkoff, that the Board would consider the report of the Committee on Accountancy and of its own Committee on General Policy at four o'clock this afternoon, and hear anything Mr. Tinkoff might have to

Mr. Tinkoff was introduced; also Professor W. E. Britton, Chairman of the Committee on Accountancy, who was sworn as a witness

by Miss Anna L. Neuber. Miss Louise Lietz acted as reporter.

# EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, MAY 14, 1938

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University, in Urbana, at 9 o'clock a.m. on Saturday, May 14, 1938.

Mr. Oscar G. Mayer, Chairman, and Mr. Orville M. Karraker, member of the Committee, were present; also President Willard, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, and Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson, University Counsel.

# REVOCATION OF C. P. A. CERTIFICATE OF PAYSOFF TINKOFF

Mr. Paysoff Tinkoff, respondent, having been introduced, Mr. Mayer announced that the meeting was open to the hearing of any testimony on behalf of the respondent, in the following statement:

The hearing will now proceed. It is now open to the respondent, Mr. Tinkoff, to offer whatever testimony he may have in answer to the charges filed. I suggest to all counsel that they confine themselves to the presentation of pertinent testimony in view of the charges made. Counsel are advised that objections to questions should be made without argument, that the chair will rule on the objections, either sustaining or overruling them, whereupon, however, no arguments will be entertained, on either side. After both sides have presented such testimony as they may have, or made offers of proof in case objections to testimony are sustained, and when both sides have rested, the Executive Committee will consider a request for the filing of a brief, thereby enabling all parties in interest to present whatever arguments or reasons they may have either for or against the revocation of the certificate of Mr. Tinkoff, against whom charges have been filed, or on any other relevant matters. The chair wants to make it clear to all parties and their counsel that it is the desire of the Committee that the hearing proceed without any unreasonable delay, that dilatory tactics will not be tolerated from any source, and that while the fullest opportunity will be accorded all parties to present testimony bearing on the charges, no procedure calculated to delay unjustifiably the progress of the hearing will be permitted.

Miss Louise Lietz acted as reporter. A copy of her stenographic report of the proceedings is filed with the Secretary of the Board. The following witnesses who were called by the respondent, testified under oath administered by the Secretary of the Board, who is a Notary Public: Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson, Professor William E. Britton, Mr. Paysoff Tinkoff.

At the conclusion of the hearing, at 1:25 p.m., the respondent was allowed forty days to file his brief, with ten days for each side to file the replies.

I concur in the recommendation of the Physical Plant Department that the contract be awarded to the Meyer Furnace Company, its base bid being \$17,607, plus the additions and change orders shown in the analysis of estimated costs. While the cost of installation of the system can be kept within the original appropriation, in my judgment the incidental work should be done at the same time, as this will result in economy of installation and of operation. In former years, when it was not necessary to make up the University's budget on the present close basis, the Physical Plant Department had a fund for general building improvements against which most of these incidental expenses could have been properly charged; but for several years it has not been possible to include such an item in the budget, thus necessitating special assignments from the General Reserve Fund from time to time for various purposes as the free balance permitted. Accordingly I recommend that a supplementary appropriation of \$5,000 be made from the General Reserve Fund for this work.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, the award of this contract was authorized as recommended, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Mayer, Mr. Karraker; no, none; absent. Dr. Meyer.

# RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL FUNDS FOR STUDENT CENTER BUILDING PROJECT

(3) The University has been advised by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works that it should file a new application for a grant to aid in the construction of a Student Center or Union Building, as all such applications are being considered anew. Accordingly, I submit the following

Section I. That A. C. Willard be, and he is, authorized to execute and file an application on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to the United States of America for a loan and grant or grant to aid in financing the construction of a student union building.

Section 2. That A. C. Willard is hereby authorized and directed to furnish such information as the United States of America through the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works may reasonably request in connection with the application which is herein authorized to be filed.

# HONORARIUM FOR PROFESSOR E. L. BOGART

(4) When a prominent speaker from outside of the faculty is secured to deliver the address at the Commencement exercises it is customary to pay him an honorarium for his service. This year Professor E. L. Bogart, of the Department of Economics, who will retire in September, has been asked to deliver the address. Since Professor Bogart is being asked to render this service in addition to his regular duties, I recommend that he be given an honorarium of \$200 and that his compensation for the month of June be increased by that amount (to be charged to the appropriation for Commencement expenses).

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GENERAL POLICY

Pursuant to the instructions of the Board on March 18, 1938 (Minutes, page 663), the Committee on General Policy met in Springfield on May 4 to confer with the Governor, the Director of the Department of Registration and Education, and other representatives of the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation, about the construction of a State Natural Resources Building on the Campus of the University. It had not been possible to arrange this conference for an earlier date. The following were present:

The Committee advised the Governor and the Representatives of the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation that the alternative agreement submitted by the Department of Registration and Education did not meet with the approval of the Board of Trustees. The agreement was gone over in detail, and the Committee pointed out in what respects it differs from that proposed by the Board of Trustees.

After discussion of the various points at issue, the agreement was modified in several particulars to protect the interests of both parties thereto. Following the conference with the Governor, additional changes were made by the Committee on General Policy and submitted to the Director of the Department of Registration and Education and the other representatives of the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation who approved them.

The Committee recommends approval of the agreement as revised in this

conference, a copy of which is appended to this report.

Agreement between the Department of Registration and Education and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois in Relation to the Construction of a Natural Resources Building for the State Scientific Surveys on the Campus of the University of Illinois

Whereas, Section 62, Chapter 127, Illinois Revised Statutes of 1937, requires the trustees of the University of Illinois to provide buildings and places where may be performed the functions and duties formerly exercised by the State entomologist, the State Laboratory of Natural History, the State Water Survey, and the State Geological Survey, but which functions and duties since 1917 have been and are now vested in the Department of Registration and Education, and

Whereas, the University has been housing the Scientific Surveys since 1917 and prior thereto since their organization, in various buildings and places, and also supplying maintenance including light, heat, water, power, and janitor

service, and

Whereas, the present buildings and places provided by the University for such purposes are inadequate therefor, Section 2 of Senate Bill 444, hereinafter described was introduced and enacted authorizing the construction of a Natural

Resources Building on the campus of the University, and also providing that cooperative agreements may be entered into with Federal agencies by which additional funds may be secured from the Federal government, and further providing that an agreement may be entered into between the Department of Registration and Education and the Trustees of the University of Illinois that the University shall in consideration of the cooperation of the Surveys with the University, maintain such buildings in good repair and condition inside and outside, maintain the grounds and furnish light, heat, power, and water and janitor service at no expense to the Department of Registration and Education, thereby carrying out the present agreement that the University of Illinois house such Surveys:

Therefore, the following agreement, made and entered into this fourteenth day of May, 1938, between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, hereinafter called the University, and the Department of Registration and Education of the State of Illinois, hereinafter referred to as the Department, is hereby made for the design, construction, operation, and maintenance of the physical property of a State Natural Resources Building for the scientific Surveys, pursuant to Section 2 of an Act entitled "An Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of certain divisions of the Department of Registration and Education until the expiration of the first fiscal quarter after the adjournment of the next regular session of the general assembly," approved

July I, 1937, and pursuant to Section 62 aforesaid:

I. In consideration of these premises, the University agrees to provide a site for the construction of a Natural Resources Building of the most suitable and complete type possible within the appropriation made available by the Legislature and funds received from the Federal government, either or both, for such purpose and which may be provided by the Department, upon the terms and subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth:

a. The site for the building, proposed by the University and offered for the purposes of this Agreement, is described as follows: An area bounded by Pennsylvania Avenue, Sixth Street, South Drive and Broadwalk, the latter three all extended, approximately 270 feet by 600 feet, immediately West of the

Stock Pavilion.

(1) Such of the above described area as is necessary for immediate con-

struction purposes is now released.

(2) Additional tracts of the said area will be released as work progresses and as the space, in the opinion of the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation of the Department and of the Board of Trustees of the University is required for the aforementioned purposes.

(3) The University will remove the Animal Pathology Building and the Military Stables and clear the ground at as early a date as reasonably may

be done.

(4) All future buildings and improvements to be used by the Surveys

and constructed on this area will also be subject to this agreement.

b. The Department will design, prepare plans and specifications, and supervise the construction of the Natural Resources Building; in doing this the Department will meet the needs, aims, purposes, and objectives of the Surveys, and such plans, specifications, and design will be best calculated to further such ends and objectives, and will be subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works in the event that a loan or grant be forthcoming from said agency. Plans and specifications for the building shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval before the Department advertises for bids. Contemplated contracts shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval before contracts are awarded. Such contracts shall be awarded only to the lowest responsible bidder. As provided in Section 2 of Senate Bill 444, the expense of extending all service lines to said building shall be paid out of the appropriation made in said Section.

c. The program and activities of the Surveys, as determined by the Statutes, in the buildings shall be determined by the Board of Natural Resources and

Conservation of the Department.

d. The University will maintain and operate the building at its own expense, and keep it in good repair and condition inside and outside. It is understood that in assuming the obligation to maintain and operate the building, the University does not bind itself beyond its available financial resources. Except as otherwise expressly stated, it is understood that the phrase, "operate and maintain," in this agreement means, and is limited to maintenance of building and grounds, heat, janitor service, light, power, and water, but not gas used for research investigations, at no expense to the Department. The University reserves the power, as in the case of all other buildings maintained and operated by it, and of space heretofore provided the Surveys aforesaid, to make such reasonable rules and regulations concerning the use of said building as it may deem necessary, consistent with the purposes and objectives of the scientific Surveys.

e. Nothing herein contained shall in any way affect the present occupancy of the State Water Survey Division of the Department which is now being housed and will continue to be housed by the University in the Chemistry

Building.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, the report of the Committee on General Policy was received and adopted, and the execution of the agreement was authorized.

#### LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR MARY LOUISE CHASE

(6) Miss Mary Louise Chase, Assistant State Leader of Home Advisers and Associate in the Home Economics Extension Service, applied for a leave of absence for six months from July I, 1938, on full pay. She is not eligible for a sabbatical leave of absence, under the statutes, but because she is on the Extension staff and her salary is paid entirely from Federal funds, her case was submitted to the Graduate School Research Board along with others applying for sabbatical leaves during 1938-1939. The Research Board included her in its recommendations for leaves which were presented to the Board of Trustees at its meeting on February 11, 1938, but through an error her name was listed with those applying for leave of absence for a full year on one-half pay instead of as an applicant for leave of absence for one-half a year on full pay.

Leaves of absence granted members of the Extension staff of the College of Agriculture, whose salaries are paid entirely from Federal funds, require

approval by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Department is unable to approve a leave of absence with pay for travel in Europe, and therefore Miss Chase desires to take that part of her leave involving foreign travel without pay on her own time and at her own expense. The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends, and I concur, that she be granted leave of absence for two months without pay from July 1, 1938, to August 31, 1938, and five months with full pay from September 1, 1938, to January 31, 1939, instead of the leave previously granted her.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this leave was granted as recommended, and the record was corrected accordingly.

8. Dr. Minas Joannides, Associate in the Department of Surgery, leave of absence from May 7 to September 1, 1938, because of illness. Doctor Joannides is on the Clinical staff and receives no salary.

9. Mr. J. K. Tuthill, Associate Professor of Railway Electrical Engineering, leave of absence with full pay from May 2 to July 1, 1938, on account of illness. The Department is carrying on his work without additional expense to the University.

10. Dr. E. H. Williams, Associate Professor of Experimental Physics, leave of absence with full pay from May 6 to July 1, 1938, on account of illness. The Department is carrying on his work without additional expense

to the University.

11. Mrs. Marie M. Daugherty, Home Adviser in Woodford County, leave of absence from June 20 to August 13, 1938, two weeks with pay and ten days without pay, in addition to the vacation allowance of one month; this is in accordance with the ruling of the Extension Service of the United States Department of Agriculture permitting extension workers to receive an additional two weeks' leave with pay for the purpose of study during the summer.

# RELEASE OF EXPERIMENT FIELD IN MASSAC COUNTY

(9) The Agricultural Experiment Station proposes to discontinue the use of the experiment field near Unionville in Massac County, which was deeded to the University in 1910, in lieu of the opportunities provided in Fayette County in which a field was recently given to the University.

The Unionville field was deeded to the University for experimental purposes by approximately 169 citizens of Massac and Pope Counties who contributed to the purchase of this field, with the provision that in the event the University ceases to use the property for experimental purposes it shall revert to the guarantors. Accordingly the following resolution is offered conveying this property to the guarantors:

#### RESOLUTION

Whereas, the following premises, to wit,
All of the north half of the southwest fourth of the northwest quarter of Section No. fifteen (15) township sixteen (16) south of Range six east (6). Also five acres on the south side of the south half of the northwest fourth of the northwest quarter of Section No. fifteen (15) township sixteen (16) south Range six east (6);

have heretofore been used by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as an experiment station or field, and were conveyed to the said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, as grantee, for such use and purpose by two separate deeds of warranty dated January 22, 1910, and June 24, 1920, respectively, and executed by William J. Sharp and Maggie Sharp as grantors, and filed for record in the office of the Recorder of Massac County, Illinois, on January 26, 1910, in Volume 26 of Deeds at page 299, and on July 9, 1920, in the office of the Recorder of Champaign County, Illinois, in Book 176 of Deeds at page 342, respectively; and

Whereas, the premises above described have served the purpose for which they were conveyed to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois;

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the use of the above described premises be and the same is hereby discontinued as an experiment station or field and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby releases and disclaims

any further interest in, claim to, or use for the same.

Be it further resolved, that the Secretary shall forthwith notify the grantors above named of this action and transmit a certified copy of this resolution to

said grantors.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this resolution was adopted.

#### EXTENSION OF AGREEMENTS FOR COOPERATIVE INVESTIGATIONS

(10) A report of the extension or renewal of the following agreements for cooperative investigations, the agreement in each case having been approved

by the Board of Trustees:

1. United States Bureau of Public Roads and the State Division of Highways, for cooperative investigation of Reinforced Concrete Slabs, for one year from July 1, 1938. Each agency will contribute \$8,000, or a total of \$16,000 for the expense of the investigation. The previous agreement provided a contribution totaling \$20,000, but this change is acceptable to the Engineering Experiment Station.

2. United States Bureau of Public Roads, investigation of the Fatigue Strength of Welded Joints for Structural Steel Members, for one year from July 1, 1938. The Bureau will contribute \$3,500 toward the expenses of this

investigation.

3. Utilities Research Commission, agreement for the following investigations, to December 31, 1938, the Commission having agreed to contribute the amounts indicated in each case: Methods of Eliminating the Stretching of Lead Sheaths, \$4,000; Solubility of Boiler Waters, \$7,500; Investigation of Stack Gases, \$9,500.

This report was received for record, and the President of the University was asked to look into the procedure with respect to such agreements.

## ADMINISTRATION OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY SCHOLARSHIPS

(II) To carry out its responsibilities under the law and for the guidance of administrative officials of the University, the Board of Trustees has adopted certain regulations governing the administration of General Assembly scholarships. The Registrar recommends that the second and third paragraphs of the section on "Residence" of these regulations be amended to read as follows, the

proposed changes being underlined:

"For the purposes of these regulations the residence of the parents, or of one parent if the other be deceased, or of the guardian of the person if both parents are deceased, will be deemed the residence of all students who have not attained their legal majority. Parental agreement that a son or a daughter reside with a named person as a guardian will not be accepted as conclusive by the University in the absence of satisfactory evidence of residence in fact with such alleged guardian.

"A student who gives a false address, or who knowingly offers false or misleading information relative to his residence, for the purpose of obtaining a scholarship is liable to dismissal from the University, or other disciplinary

action, and forfeits the scholarship thus obtained."

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this regulation was adopted.

# STATUS OF GRANT FROM GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF AMERICA

(12) It was reported to the Board on September 27, 1937 (Minutes, page 497), that the Geological Society of America was making a grant of \$10,000 to Associate Professor F. P. Shepard, of the Department of Geology, now on sabbatical leave of absence, to aid in his oceanographic research work.

This grant has been made and the funds are being paid directly to Professor Shepard, who is on the Pacific Coast, instead of through the University. The matter is being reported to the Board to clear the record and to relieve the Business Office of accountability for the funds.
