# MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

June 24, 1941



The June meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the College of Medicine, in Chicago, at 11 o'clock a.m. (Central Daylight Saving Time) on Tuesday, June 24, 1941.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Cleary, Mr. Adams, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer. Mrs. Grigsby took her place with the Board during the forenoon.

President Willard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. H. A. Hazleton, Assistant Comptroller, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information, and, during part of the day, Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson, University Counsel, and Mr. C. S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant Department.

## MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of May 15, 1941, with the adjourned sessions and the Executive Committee meeting of May 27, 1941.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the minutes were approved and received for record as printed on pages 273 to 312 above.

## MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT WILLARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

# APPOINTMENT OF ROY ANDREAE TO BOARD OF EXAMINERS IN ACCOUNTANCY

(1) The Committee on Accountancy recommends the appointment of Mr. Roy Andreae, of the firm of Price, Waterhouse & Company, Chicago, as a member of the Board of Examiners in Accountancy for three years beginning July 1, 1941, to succeed Mr. Charles W. Jones, whose term expires on June 30.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appointment was made as recommended.

# APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR J. M. MATHEWS AS CHAIRMAN OF THE DEPARTMENT OF POLITICAL SCIENCE

(2) With the retirement of Professor John A. Fairlie as Head of the Department of Political Science the Department has voted to change its organization to a department with a chairman. Under the University Statutes a department may be organized either with a chairman or with a head. The chairman is appointed biennially by the Board of Trustees on nomination presented by the President of the University after consultation with the dean of the college and the executive committee of the department concerned.

After conferring with the executive committee of the Department of Political Science, I recommend the appointment of Professor John M. Mathews as Chairman of the Department for two years from September 1, 1941.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

# DEFERMENT OF SABBATICAL LEAVE GRANTED MISS GRACE B. ARMSTRONG

(3) At its meeting on January 22, 1941 (Minutes, page 153), the Board of Trustees granted to Miss Grace B. Armstrong, Assistant Professor, Home Economics Extension, a sabbatical leave of absence on full pay from August 1, 1941, to February 1, 1942. Miss Armstrong has requested that a part of her leave (namely four months) be deferred until the fall of 1942 with the understanding that when her plans for the four-month period have been worked out they shall be subject to the approval of the Dean of the College of Agriculture and the President of the University.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this deferment was approved as recommended.

#### LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR W. M. WILSON

(4) The Head of the Department of Civil Engineering and the Dean of the College of Engineering recommend that Professor W. M. Wilson be authorized to continue his service on the Board of Engineers appointed to determine the loss resulting from the failure of the suspension bridge over the Tacoma Narrows near Seattle, Washington, and to be absent from the University from time to time as such service may require. Professor Wilson's service on this Board will involve no additional expense to the University, and it is to the interest of the University to permit him to continue in this capacity since this is a public service. This service will not interfere with proper supervision by Professor Wilson of his research programs now in progress.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this leave was granted as recommended.

## LEAVES OF ABSENCE

(5) A recommendation that the following leaves of absence be granted members of the staff for the reasons and periods and under the conditions indicated in each case:

Charles Kovacic, part-time assistant in the Department of Physical Education for Men, sick leave with full pay from April 24 through June 30, 1941.

O. T. Bonnett, Assistant Professor of Plant Genetics, sick leave with full pay from May 5 to June 15, 1941.

Miss A. Marie Anderson, Associate in the Department of Art, sick leave with pay from May 6 until August 31, 1941.

Mrs. Elizabeth Beedle, Clerk in the Catalog Department of the Library,

sick leave with pay from May I to June I, 194I.

Dr. M. H. Worthington, Superintendent of the Dispensary, College of Medicine, sick leave with pay from April 25 to August I, 194I.

Dr. D. W. Kerst, Assistant Professor of Physics, extension of leave, without pay, from September 1, 1941, to February 1, 1942, or for as much of this period as may be necessary, for the purpose of completing the induction accelerator which he is building at the General Electric Company as a part of his research program.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, these leaves were granted as recommended.

## APPROPRIATION TO ILLINI UNION BUILDING TO OFFSET REFUND OF SERVICE CHARGE

(6) On September 27, 1940 (Minutes, page 47), the Board of Trustees authorized a reduction in the Illini Union Building service charge from \$5.00 to \$3.00 after the first semester of 1940-1941, since the building was not ready for use at the beginning of the academic year, and on January 22, 1941 (Minutes, page 158), authorized the refund of the \$3.00 collected because the building was not completed and ready for use during the first semester. This was done in the expectation that the Board would appropriate from the General Reserve Fund an amount sufficient to offset this loss in income.

The maximum liability resulting from these refunds is \$15,755. However, the Director of the Physical Plant Department does not request the full amount, but an appropriation of \$14,200, which represents the deficit resulting from the

loss of income from service charges.

I recommend that the amount of \$14,200 be appropriated from the General Reserve Fund to the Illini Union Building for this purpose.

## APPROPRIATION FOR BULLETIN BOARD IN THE ILLINI UNION BUILDING

(7) The University of Illinois Foundation has requested that a bulletin board be placed in the Illini Union Building for the purpose of displaying the names of those persons who contributed \$50 or more to the equipment fund. The estimated cost of such a bulletin board is \$500, and I recommend that this amount be appropriated from the General Reserve Fund for that purpose.

# APPROPRIATION FOR REIMBURSEMENT TO PUBLIC WORKS ADMINISTRATION

(8) A recommendation from the Director of the Physical Plant Department that the Board of Trustees make available a special appropriation in the amount of \$2,492.71 to pay the Public Works Administration for expense incurred by the Federal Government in connection with the Illini Union Building after August 31, 1940—the completion date—for field inspection and auditing. It will be necessary to make this payment before the balance of the funds from P.W.A. are obtained.

I concur in this recommendation.

## APPROPRIATION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF DAIRY HUSBANDRY

(9) The Dean of the College of Agriculture requests an appropriation of \$2,622.37 from the unappropriated income of the Department of Dairy Husbandry to the Department for expense and equipment to supplement its operating budget for the fiscal year 1941-1942. The Departmental expenditures will run approximately \$5,000 in excess of budgetary provisions, due mainly to wages and equipment purchases. For example, it was necessary to buy a new milking machine at a price of \$2,053, provision for which was not made in the original budget of the Department. The balance of the additional funds needed will be provided by transfer from Agricultural Experiment Station funds, so that this does not require an assignment from the General Reserve.

I concur in this recommendation.

# SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS AND NON-RECURRING EXPENDITURES

(10) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Non-Recurring Expenditures has from time to time recommended assignments from the General Reserve Fund for various purposes, but these have not been presented to the Board because of lack of funds. This situation has been due partly to the necessity of making advances from the General Reserve for payments on contracts for the construction of the Illini Union Building pending receipt of the final installments of the grant and loan for this project. The receipt from the Federal Government of the major part of funds due on the grant enables the University to reimburse the General Reserve Fund for these advances and to consider making additional appropriations for needs heretofore deferred. Accordingly, I recommend that the Board make assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

#### Previous Commitments

(The purchase of this property was authorized by the Board January 22, 1941, at a price of \$10,000, plus the 1940 taxes, \$1,000 payable at that time and the balance July 1, 1941. An appropriation of \$1,000 was made at the time and it is now necessary to appropriate \$9,109.08 to pay the balance of the purchase price and the taxes.)

(11) A recommendation that the following unexpended balances estimated as of July 1, 1941, for various purposes be reappropriated for the purposes indicated in each case for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1941, due to the fact that it has not been possible to complete the work or purchases contemplated for these purposes. Under the budget rules of the Board, these balances are lapsed on June 30, unless reappropriated. The total amount is \$133,300.

# EXTENSION OF PERIOD OF SETTLEMENT ON BOND OF HAZEN S. CAPRON, FORMER TREASURER

(12) There is a balance of \$11,849.10 due from Mr. Hazen S. Capron, former Treasurer of the University, which is secured by a participating certificate in the assets of the old First National Bank of Champaign and a bond of Mr. Capron and other sureties, which has been extended from time to time by the Board of Trustees, the last extension being until June 11, 1941.

The Finance Committee of the Board recommends a further extension of time in the settlement of the account for an additional period of two years, with the provision that if during this period a final dividend is paid on deposits of the old First National Bank any balance on Mr. Capron's account as former

Treasurer shall at once become due and payable.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this extension was granted as recommended.

## CHANGE IN REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION FROM THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE

(13) A recommendation from the College of Agriculture, approved by the University Senate, that the number of hours required for graduation in that College be changed from 120 semester hours exclusive of basic military and physical education to 130 semester hours including these subjects, with the understanding that the new requirement will apply to all curricula in the College of Agriculture except Home Economics and will go into effect with the freshman class of 1941-1942. Home Economics is excepted because this subject may be taken in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and in Education, where the requirement of 120 hours is in effect.

The reasons for the suggested change are as follows:

I. This will equalize the requirements for graduation between transfer students who may now come at the junior level and escape required military and physical education courses, and those students who enter as freshmen. It is true also that certain students entering on the freshman level now escape the requirements in basic military and physical education because of higher age or physical disability. Under the new plan, all students would be required to earn the same number of hours for graduation.

2. The University Senate has recently increased from 8 to 12 the number of semester hours of credit given for the advanced R.O.T.C. course (the junior and senior years of military training which are optional). This makes it desirable to increase the total number of hours required for graduation in the case of those students taking the advanced R.O.T.C. work.

3. The present requirement seems relatively low, as evidenced by the fact that some students are able to complete the requirements for the degree in seven semesters.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this recommendation was adopted.

# STUDENTS' USE OF ENGLISH

(14) Last year as a result of discussions in meetings of the Board of Trustees the Senate Committee on Educational Policy was asked to make a study and to submit recommendations for improving the standard of English used by the undergraduate student body both in speaking and in writing. This Committee has been at work for practically a year, and at the last meeting of the University Senate (June 2) it submitted a report on the student use of English, and the Senate approved this report for transmission to the Board of Trustees with the following recommendations:

1. The Senate elect a standing Committee on Student English to consist of seven members. The duties of this Committee shall be to study the operation of the regulations relating to English and to bring in such further recommendations as may seem desirable for the improvement of the use of English by

students.

2. During the years 1941-1942 and 1942-1943 all students whose rating in the freshman placement test is below passing be required to register in sections of Rhetoric I which meet four times a week instead of three. They shall receive, however, only the usual three credits.

3. For the same period all students receiving the grade of D in the first semester of Rhetoric I, whether in the regular part of the course or in the four-hour part, be required to register in sections of Rhetoric 2 meeting four times a week. They shall likewise receive three credits.

4. After September 1, 1941, and continuing indefinitely thereafter all students who receive a grade of D in Rhetoric 2 be required to take an extra onesemester course carrying three credit hours.

5. All transfer students whose grade at another institution for their last semester in required rhetoric (equivalent to Rhetoric 2) is D (or the equivalent) be required to take the third semester course or pass a proficiency examination.

6. Beginning September 1, 1943, no student who fails to pass the placement test in rhetoric, given at the beginning of each semester, be allowed to register in Rhetoric 1. His schedule of courses shall be reduced by three credit hours in order to permit him to make up this deficiency, which may be removed by tutoring, correspondence study, or otherwise. A three-hour non-credit elective course shall be offered each semester in which students may register on payment of a \$10.00 fee, to prepare themselves to pass the placement test. A student who fails to pass the placement test by the beginning of his third semester must withdraw from the University until he does pass it.

The time of initiating the practice suggested in No. 6 is set two years hence in order to give ample warning to the high schools, and to provide them with full information about the standards in English which we expect from their graduates. It is believed that the cost of the course should be borne mainly by the students. To guard against possible mistakes in grading the placement test, provision should be made for transferring any properly qualified student from the non-credit course to Rhetoric 1 within three weeks after the beginning of the semester, and returning his fee. If Recommendation No. 6 is adopted, it is recommended that the procedures set up in Nos. 2 and 3 go out of effect on

September 1, 1943.

7. All other procedures contained in the questionnaire sent to the faculty be referred to the Committee on Student English for study: specifically, general proficiency examinations, the establishment of upperclass remedial courses, the improvement of speech, the establishment of a writing clinic and a writing laboratory, the publication of a University manual of style, and the publication of a statement that a certain standard of English is required for graduation. It is not meant, however, that the Committee on Student English must confine itself to these procedures; it should consider the subject in the broadest way.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, these recommendations were approved as presented.

(15) A recommendation that the following purchases be authorized:

Bros., Chicago, the lowest bidder, at a price of \$1,291.47 f.o.b. Urbana.

2. One vacuum return line heating pump, for the Physical Plant Department, from C. A. Dunham Company, the lowest bidder, at a price of \$1,410.70 f.o.b. Michigan City, Indiana, freight allowed.

Quotations were secured from all of these companies and orders were placed on the basis of the lowest prices, quality considered. A list of these items is included in the recommendation of the Comptroller and the Purchasing Agent which is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

3. 543 feet of 12" double thick pipe covering for the New Power Plant from the Union Asbestos & Rubber Company, the lowest bidder, at a price of \$1,157.68

4. Syracuse "Adobe Econorim" chinaware for Men's Residence Hall (approximately 523 dozen pieces) from E. A. Hinrichs & Company, Chicago, at a price of \$1,407. This is approximately \$75 over the lowest bid which was on Shenango china. After careful comparison of the Shenango and the Syracuse it was decided that the Syracuse would be preferable because of more satisfactory color, sizes, and designs of the various pieces.

5. 15 rolls (60 square yards each) Armstrong's Brown Linoleum 3/16" thick by 6'0" wide, for Physical Plant Department stock, from F. K. Robeson, Champaign, the lowest bidder, at a price of \$1.39 a square yard, or a total approximate cost of \$1,251 f.o.b. Urbana.

6. Bed linen for the residence halls—103½ dozen bed sheets, 63" x 108"; and 77½ dozen pillow cases to match sheets, 45" x 36"—from H. W. Baker Linen Company, New York City, the lowest bidder, at a total price of approximately \$1,534.50.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the action of the President of the University in authorizing these purchases was approved and confirmed.

## OPERATION OF COLLEGE OF MEDICINE ON A TWELVE-MONTH BASIS

(17) The Executive Council of the Association of American Medical Colleges has recommended that member institutions consider the following specific suggestions designed to increase the number of graduates from medical schools in order to meet more effectively the medical needs of the national emergency, without lowering the standards of medical education: (1) an increase in the

enrollment of the classes entering in 1941 by ten per cent; (2) continuation of the fourth year of the medical curriculum during the summer of 1941 in order to graduate at an early date as many students as possible; (3) revising instructional schedules to accelerate the output of graduates during the national

The Executive Dean of the Chicago Colleges recommends:

1. That the Board of Trustees of the University grant discretionary authority to the Committee on Admissions of the College of Medicine to admit up to 165 students in the 1941 entering class provided that the pending agreement with the Presbyterian Hospital can be consummated this summer.

2. That the University plan for the future on conducting the College of Medicine on a twelve-month basis, particularly for the third- and fourth-year

students. (It is now too late for a program of study to be worked out for the summer for next year's fourth-year students.)

3. That the Committee on Admission be given discretionary authority to accept well-qualified third-year students—up to a total of 165 students in the whole junior class—who desire to transfer to the University of Illinois from other approved medical schools.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were approved.

### FIRE PREVENTION ON URBANA CAMPUS

(18) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on January 22, 1941 (Minutes, page 170), the question was raised whether or not the University should maintain an independent fire station and carry its own risks, or purchase insurance. This grew out of the discussion concerning the cost of meeting recommendations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters Committee on Fire Prevention and Engineering Standards and of the Western Factory Insurance Association. The matter was referred by the Board to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for study and report.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department has made a thorough study

of the situation and his conclusions are as follows:

A well-balanced program should contain provisions for improving both the University buildings (i.e., against hazards) and the fire-fighting facilities to a satisfactory level. He suggests as a criterion for building improvements those required to meet the standards for the Western Factory Insurance Association underwriting and for the National Board of Fire Underwriters Committee on Fire Prevention and Engineering Standards, which are:

I. Fire fighting facilities (Western Factory Insurance Association):

Suggested, also, are such changes as are necessary to make working conditions and wage scales in the University Fire Department comparable with those in the fire departments of the two local communities.

In addition to remodeling the buildings to reduce fire hazards and improve the fire-fighting facilities, it may be desirable to carry insurance on buildings where the risk is very great, such as the Chemistry and Band Buildings. On such buildings where the University is required to do so by the lending agency (Men's Residence Hall, Student Center, Arcade, Illini Union, Medical and Dental College Laboratories, and Chicago Union Building), insurance will, of course, have to be continued. Except in such cases, it is believed that the University should carry its own fire risk for the following reasons:

versity should carry its own fire risk for the following reasons:

1. During the past 20 years, with less adequate fire-fighting facilities, and a lower standard of building construction than the Physical Plant is recommending in this report, the loss by fire has been approximately \$850 a year. It is possible, however, for a large fire to occur at any time, which may affect the fire loss record unfavorably.

2. The plant valuation is large.

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3. The buildings are distributed over a large area and, except in the Engineering group, it is not probable that there would be a conflagration spreading to other buildings.

4. Inspection and prevention are the best means of protection. With a fire station adequately manned and equipped, and with the cooperation of the faculty, such a program should reduce the fire risk to a minimum.

As to the order of urgency of the improvements recommended by the Western Factory Insurance Association and the National Board of Fire Underwriters, the recommendations of the Director of the Physical Plant Department are:

For the next biennium, the Director of the Physical Plant Department believes that Items I through 6, above, involving a capital cost of \$23,660 and an annual operating expense of \$12,260, should be considered as a minimum. In the biennial budget as originally approved by the Board, there were included for fire protection an increase of \$20,000 in capital items and of \$3,240 a year for operation.

At this point, Mrs. Grigsby took her place with the Board.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for study and recommendation.

# UNIVERSITY OUTDOOR RECREATION AREA

(19) The Senate Committee on Athletics has been considering various phases of the programs of physical education and intercollegiate and intramural athletics to determine ways and means of improving the physical fitness of students, which is important to the national defense. The committee recently learned that a tract of land which might be adapted to outdoor recreation use is available for sale, and a sub-committee was appointed to consider the advisability of purchasing this land as a possible site for a "University Outdoor Recreation Area." This tract of land, consisting of 412 acres, is known as the Catlin Lagoon Property, and is 30 miles east of Urbana and about 5 miles west of Danville. It is owned by the United Electric Coal Company of Chicago and is offered for sale at \$20 an acre, or a total of \$8,240. To a certain extent, the property can be used without development.

It is the firm conviction of the Committee that the property, if purchased and developed, would meet a long-felt need, and in the course of time would represent a major expansion of the University's program and services, appreciated by everyone associated with the institution—students, faculty, and alumni.

A second recommendation of the Committee concerns an appropriation for the development of the area. The cost of developing the area depends on (1) the extent and variety of facilities provided, (2) the quality of the facilities provided, and (3) the amount of Federal aid which might be secured.

I submit herewith the complete report of this committee and recommend that it be referred to an appropriate committee of the Board for consideration and advice. (This may be either the Committee on Buildings and Grounds or the Committee on Athletic Activities.)

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for study and report.

### ILLINOIS EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY

(20) An Act of the Sixty-second General Assembly (Senate Bill 170), amending a previous Act in relation to the founding and operation of the Research and Educational Hospitals of the State of Illinois to make possible the inclusion of the Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary as one of the constituent units of the Research and Educational Hospitals group in any plan of joint operation and management by the Department of Public Welfare and the University of Illinois which these two agencies may agree upon, has been passed by the General Assembly and has become a law.

### SENATE BILL 170

An Act to amend Section 1 of "An Act in relation to the founding and operation of Research and Educational Hospitals of the State of Illinois," approved July

"Department" as used in this act means the Department of Public Welfare; "University" means the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois; and "Research and Educational Hospitals" comprises the University Clinical Institute, the Out Patient Department of the University, the Institute for Juvenile Research, the Illinois Surgical Institute for Children, the Psychiatric Institute and such subar hospitals institute and informatics as many he added tric Institute and such other hospitals, institutes and infirmaries as may be added thereto by agreement of the Department and the University. The Medical and Dental Colleges of the University of Illinois may be operated in conjunction therewith to such extent as may be deemed practicable and subject to agreement with the University.

## **EXECUTIVE SESSION**

At this point, on request of Mr. Davis, the Board went into executive session as committee of the whole. The committee rose at the end of a two-hour session without having taken any action.

The Board continued, in open session, its consideration of matters presented by the President of the University.

## RESOLUTION OF THE ILLINI CLUB OF KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI

(24) The following resolution was adopted at a meeting of the Illini Club of Kansas City, Missouri, on June 4, 1941:

"Whereas, it is well known that athletics at the University of Illinois has been strikingly and consistently free from commercialism at all times, and "Whereas, Robert C. Zuppke, Coach of Football since 1913 has contributed

Zuppke, Coach of Football since 1913 has contributed to and exemplified the traditional spirit of amateur athletics at the University, "Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Illini Club of Kansas City hereby commends and congratulates the University for its steadfast refusal to commercialize athletics and for the high standard of sportsmanship now and heretofore maintained, and

"Be it further resolved, that the secretary of this organization be authorized and directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the President and Board of Trustees of the University."

# BACHELOR'S DEGREE FOR EDMUND LOUIS DUBOIS

(25) A recommendation that the President of the University be authorized to confer the degree of Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering as of October 15, 1941, on Edmund Louis DuBois, as recommended by the Dean of the College of Engineering and the University Registrar.

Mr. DuBois is a candidate for a commission in the United States Army through the Sixth Corps Area and was considered by that Area among a few outstanding candidates who were to be recommended to Washington as honor graduates. However, due to the fact that he failed to meet the requirements for his degree in June because of having failed one course the Sixth Corps Area Commander under date of June 10 substituted in his recommendation to Washington the name of the first alternate on the honor graduate list in place of Mr. DuBois, because at that time it could not be certified that Mr. DuBois had completed the requirements for his degree. Mr. DuBois has since taken and passed a special examination in Civil Engineering 65-the course in which he received a failing grade in the second semester and which, therefore, prevented his complying in full with all the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering. In spite of the fact that he did fail one course last semester Mr. DuBois has an outstanding record of 4.213 in the College of Engineering and was Student Colonel of the University R.O.T.C. units during his senior year. He still wishes to be considered for a commission in the army and if the Board is willing to pass on his candidacy for the degree at this time it may further his status for the commission.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this degree was authorized as of June 24, 1941.

### NATIONAL DEFENSE RESEARCH PROJECTS

(26) Pursuant to the authorization of the Board of Trustees, I have authorized the execution by the Secretary and Comptroller of the Board of Trustees of contracts with the National Defense Research Committee covering three research projects to be carried on in the Department of Chemistry. The total amount of money which the Government has agreed to pay covering the cost of these investigations is \$27,075.

# AMENDMENT TO UNIVERSITY STATUTES RELATING TO RETIRING ALLOWANCES AND DEATH BENEFITS

(27) The special committee of the faculty which has been studying the University's system of retirement and death benefits has recommended that the University Statutes relating to the present system be amended to equalize the difference between the retiring allowance paid under the present system of \$4,000 which may be paid to deans and other general administrative officers and a maximum of only \$3,000 which may be paid to other members of the staff.

When the present rules were devised in 1925, in general the salaries of deans and other administrative officers were higher than those of other staff members. This is no longer true. The Committee does not feel that a difference of \$1,000 in the present retiring allowance of these two groups can any longer be justified, particularly since the new system will require contributions by each member of the staff on the basis of total salary. If the differential is removed in full at once, however, it will mean that persons who retire within the next few years might be given an undue advantage over those recently retired. For that reason the committee feels that the maximum retiring allowances to persons other than administrative officers should be increased at the rate of \$100 a year beginning September 1, 1942, until the maximum for administrative officers is reached. Accordingly, the following resolution is offered:

Be it resolved, that paragraph 3 (b) of Section 30 of the University Statutes relating to the maximum retirement allowance to be granted to staff members

be amended by adding the following:

"The maximum retirement allowance which may be granted to staff members other than the President, Deans, and other General Administrative Officers shall be increased at the rate of \$100 per year, the first such increase to be effective on retirement allowances granted as of September 1, 1942, until the maximum hereinbefore set for Deans and other General Administrative Officers is reached; provided that the amount of any retirement allowance shall be fixed at the time of retirement and shall not be subject to increase thereafter by reason of this amendment. The permanent status of the staff member shall be controlling as to the amount of the retiring allowance."

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this resolution was adopted.

## RETAIL SALE OF MILK BY DEPARTMENT OF DAIRY HUSBANDRY

(28) In the exercise of the necessary control over the standards and quality of foods served in the Illini Union Building, the Home Economics Cafeteria, and the residence halls, the University has placed upon the Department of Dairy Husbandry the responsibility of supplying milk and other dairy products from those produced by the University itself or purchased and processed by the Department. With the opening of the Residence Hall for Men in the fall the amount of these products to be supplied through the Dairy Husbandry Department will increase materially. Heretofore it has been possible for the Department to supply the milk needed from the University's dairy herds, but in the future it will be necessary to either increase the herds or purchase milk from outside sources of such quality and in such quantity as to meet the increased demand. Under the circumstances the Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends that effective September 15, 1941, the University discontinue retail sales of milk and dairy products in Champaign and Urbana since the output of the Department will be needed for the various University food services.

# ADMINISTRATION OF THE CHICAGO COLLEGES UNION BUILDING

- (30) A recommendation that the following plan for the management, operation, and maintenance of the Chicago Colleges Union Building be approved:
- 1. Responsibility for the management, operation, and maintenance of the Union Building—
- (a) The Physical Plant Department shall be responsible to the Executive Dean and the President of the University for the operation, maintenance, and management of the building. This responsibility shall include food service; supervision of game room and gymnasia; checking facilities; building and equipment operation and maintenance.
- (b) The Union Board shall be responsible for the social, cultural, and recreational program within the building, including activities of undergraduate students, graduate students, faculty, and alumni, and shall act in an advisory capacity to the Physical Plant Department on the management and operation of the building.
- (c) The Director of the Union Building shall be the executive agent of the Union Board and the Physical Plant Department in the operation and management of the building.
- II. Relationship of the Union Board to the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs-
- (a) The activities of the Union Board in administering its function on the student social, cultural, and recreational program within the building shall extend into the field of student activities, and in conducting such activities, the Union Board shall operate under the jurisdiction of the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs.
- (b) As the Physical Plant Department is directly responsible to the President and the Board of Trustees for the financial success of the building, and as the budget of the building will bear the financial expense of the student program, the authority of the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs shall not extend to the student activities budget of the Union Board.
- III. Membership of the Union Board-
- (a) The Union Board shall consist of eight members, selected as follows: (1) four students—one student elected by each of the three student councils and one elected by the internes and residents of the Research and Educational Hos-

chairman.

pitals and other hospital groups as designated—and (2) four persons appointed by the President of the University from the faculty and alumni.

(b) The members of the Union Board shall serve for a period of one year.(c) The members of the Union Board may elect one member to serve as

## CONTRIBUTION TO ILLINI UNION BUILDING EQUIPMENT FUND

(31) The University of Illinois Foundation has been asked by the Illinois Union, Incorporated, to take over the latter's assets (including real estate properties and cash) and its liabilities amounting to approximately \$140,000, which are secured by the old Illinois Union (later known as the Student Center Building) and Arcade buildings, under the condition that the cash be applied to any project which the University designates.

If this plan is carried through, I recommend that the cash be accepted by the Board of Trustees and credited to the Illini Union Building equipment fund and immediately made available for the finishing and furnishing of the

fourth floor rooms so that they may be ready for use in the fall.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the Board voted to accept these funds if turned over to it, for the purpose recommended.

# VISUAL EDUCATION IN DEFENSE TRAINING

(32) The State Board for Vocational Education has asked the University to undertake the supervision, through its Visual Aids Service in the Division of University Extension, of a summer program (June 16-August 9, 1941) in visual education for the young men and women in defense training at the National Youth Administration Centers in Illinois. The State Board for Vocational Education of the State Board for Vocational Education and State State Board for Vocational Education of the Vocation of the Vo

cation will pay the entire cost of the program.

The plan is as follows: Four teachers familiar with visual materials are to be employed for 8 weeks—salary \$50 a week, plus travel allowance not to exceed \$25 a week. Each will be assigned a specific territory and will have charge of the work in visual education in the National Youth Administration Centers in his circuit, carrying with him films and equipment. The State Board for Vocational Education will purchase \$4,500 worth of films which will become the property of the Visual Aids Service at the conclusion of the program. An agreement will be executed to reimburse the University for all expense which might be incurred for salaries, travel, films, and supply purchases. The agreement will approximate \$9,000, and the claim could be presented for prompt payment on August 9, at the close of the program.

It was necessary that this program begin on June 16. In view of this emergency I authorized sponsorship of this by the Division of University Ex-

tension and request confirmation of my action.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the action of the President of the University in authorizing this program was approved and confirmed.

#### BINDING FOR THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

(34) For a number of years binding has been secured by the Director of the Library without formal contract. The work has been assigned to various binderies on the basis of the quality of their work and their facilities.

During the past year the Director of the Library and the Purchasing Agent have studied the problem jointly, and as a result are submitting a recommendation for a contract for this work for the coming biennium. Visits were made to a number of binderies and three concerns were selected who might be able to handle all or part of the University work. Specifications for the various types of work to be done were compiled by the Director and submitted to these binderies.

Bids on unit prices were received from Ernst Hertzberg & Sons, The Book Shop Bindery, and Burgmeier Book Bindery. The prices submitted by Ernst Hertzberg & Sons are lower in practically all instances than the other two concerns, and the aggregate cost of placing all binding with this concern would be materially the lowest. Furthermore, the prices secured are below those that are being charged the University at the present time on open orders. The total annual amount of binding is about \$30,000 and is provided for in the regular

budget of the Library.

The Director of the Library, the Purchasing Agent, and the Comptroller recommend that a contract with Ernst Hertzberg & Sons for all binding of the University Library for two years beginning July 1, 1941, be authorized on the basis of unit prices received, the contract to be subject to renewal by mutual agreement for succeeding periods of two years each. The provision for renewals does not obligate the University to continue under the contract without securing new quotations unless that should be found as desirable. However, it does leave the way open to get the advantage of a continuation of prices now offered if no new conditions have arisen making new competition desirable or necessary. When the latter condition arises, it is proposed that procedure substantially similar to that followed on this occasion will again be followed.

I recommend approval of this procedure for an experimental period with the understanding that it will be subject to review and modification later in the

light of experience.

On request of Mr. Adams, action on this matter was deferred.

# QUIT CLAIM DEED TO PROPERTY BEQUEATHED TO THE UNIVERSITY BY THE LATE JAMES M. FOWLER

(35) As reported to the Board on November 24, 1939 (Minutes, page 662), the late James M. Fowler, formerly of Martinsville, Illinois, bequeathed to the University interest in 180 acres of land in Clark County for the use of the College of Agriculture. The College has examined this land carefully and has concluded in view of the quality thereof, its distance from the University, and all the circumstances, it would be inadvisable for the University to accept and administer this bequest. Consequently I recommend that the Board of Trustees, through a special quit claim deed with reservation of oil rights, authorize a transfer of the University's interest in this land to the heirs. Originally under the will the entire interest in the property was given to the University, but the widow renounced the will, thereby reducing the University's interest one-half and complicating the situation. Under the quit claim deed the University reserves the oil rights for a period of twenty years; otherwise the land would not be of any particular value to the University and it would be costly to carry out the plan of the testator.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this recommendation was adopted, and the President and the Secretary were authorized to execute the necessary documents.

## KATE NEAL KINLEY MEMORIAL FELLOWSHIP

(36) The Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Fellowship Committee has recommended and I have approved the appointment of Mr. Paul Haller Jones, of Urbana, Illinois, as the Tenth Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Fellow, and of Miss Elsie Mae Bittinger, of Onargo, Illinois, as alternate in case Mr. Jones is unable to take advantage of this fellowship.

I request confirmation of my action.

This building, in the planning of which he took an active part, originally housed the University Library. The College of Law, in the organization of which he was also deeply interested, has occupied it since 1927. In recognition of his services to the University the Trustees of the University have named the building Altgeld Hall.
