The June meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Chicago Illini Union Building, 715 South Wood Street, Chicago, at 10 a.m. on Saturday, June 20, 1942.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of April 22 and May 16, 1942.

On motion of Mr. Cleary, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 827 to 906 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT WILLARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

INVESTIGATION BY GENERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

(1) During the past several days there have appeared in the press certain statements and charges against the Board of Trustees and the University of Illinois,

attributed to the Attorney General of the State.

Because of the widespread publicity given these statements and the probable harmful and erroneous impression such statements will create in the minds of the citizens of the State, I recommend that the President of the University be authorized to request the General Advisory Committee of the University of Illinois to make an investigation and public report on the validity or falsity of these charges for the information of all citizens. The general direction of such an investigation could properly be handled by the Executive Committee of the General Committee, with each subcommittee studying its appropriate phase of the University's program. There are ten subcommittees, the chairmen of which could meet at the University with the Executive Committee or as a Special Committee to secure pertinent data as the basis for final judgment and report.

No more representative or competent group of Illinois citizens could be

found than the men and women now serving on the General Advisory Committee, all of whom except certain ex-officio members are non-alumni of this University. They are well known in their respective communities and after suitable study of the situation can bring their unbiased and intelligent judgments to bear on this matter which is of vital importance to the University of Illinois and

its future.

DEAR PRESIDENT MEYER:

In view of the published statements appearing in the press of the State and

attributed to the Attorney General of Illinois that

"I intend to prove that since 1934 a group of hand-picked political puppets have virtually built a political empire in Champaign and Urbana and have cloaked their operations and defended their illegal activities behind the shield of education.

"The University has been on the downgrade since 1934 when control was taken over by a board of trustees who were not the choice of the people but were hand-picked by the downstate democratic machine and the Kelly-Nash machine in Cook County.

"Myself and other alumni of the University have watched our school's

decline since the political termites crept into the administration.

"The Johnson exposure in itself is enough to warrant an investigation of the entire administrative branch of the University. If such irregularities have been committed in one department, they may have been committed in others."

I wish to recommend the following procedure for the consideration of the

Board of Trustees:

That, because of the widespread publicity given these statements and the probable harmful and erroneous impression such statements will create in the minds of the citizens of the State, the President of the University be authorized to request the General Advisory Committee of the University of Illinois to make an investigation and public report on the validity or falsity of these charges for the information of all citizens. DEAR PRESIDENT MEYER:

From the statements issued by the Attorney General, as reported in the press recently, it appears that he has raised another issue in the case of Judge Sveinbiorn Johnson, University Counsel and Professor of Law on indefinite tenure. The original issue was the right of the Board of Trustees to employ a counsel to the Board and other University officials. The Attorney General now has attacked the Board of Trustees for employing a University Counsel on the ground that the present incumbent holds what the Attorney General has described as "two jobs," one that of State Director of the Office of Government Reports, the other that of Professor of Law and University Counsel. Inasmuch as the facts have not been given to the public and only distortions have reached the newspapers, I am sending you the following statement. Copies of this letter are being sent to the other members of the Board of Trustees.

In May, 1935, Mr. Frank Walker, now the Postmaster General, then Executive Director of the National Emergency Council, asked Mr. Johnson to take the position of State Director. The initiative was taken in Washington; Mr. Johnson did not seek the position, nor did he procure the support of any person or group, in the State or elsewhere, in this connection. The request was referred to the President of the University and the Board of Trustees, and by unanimous action the request was granted, upon certain conditions for the benefit of the University, with which full compliance has been made.

The position was described by Mr. Walker as entirely non-political; and explicit instructions came from the Washington office to the State Directors that the office must be conducted on an entirely non-partisan and non-political basis. The National Emergency Council started as an emergency agency to coordinate the public works and relief programs. In his instructions to the State Directors, the President of the United States said, among other things: "We do want you to be absolutely hard-boiled if you find any local person within your own states who is trying to get political advantage out of the relief of human needs and you will have the backing of this Administration 1000%, even if you hit the biggest political boss in the United States on the head, in carrying out this general program."

The functions of this office were and now are as follows: (1) to provide general information to the public concerning all federal agencies and to assist the public in obtaining information needful for their own purposes in relation thereto; (2) to act as a liaison agency between state and federal agencies; (3) to coordinate the activities of emergency agencies in the early history of this office (1934-1936), and to assist in eliminating duplication of effort; (4) to furnish the Executive Office reports upon the way the nation's business is being carried on in the State and to point out where improvement in the public service may be made; (5) to prepare reports on all State and local legislation which

may affect the operations of federal agencies in the State.

It is obvious, upon reading this description of functions, that the agency was intended and has in the State of Illinois been administered as a public service agency entirely. Mr. Johnson's work as State Director is well known to the University administration; the President and staff members have been given opportunity, confidentially, to become familiar with some of this work; as a result of his reports and criticisms of Federal Agency practices many of these have been materially altered, with resulting improvement in the public service. The Office of Government Reports has been and is a service agency, and his connection with it has been solely in the interest of better public service.

In December, 1937, Mr. Johnson wished to retire as State Director, so informed the Washington office, and wrote letters to heads of federal agencies thanking them for their cooperation and announcing his retirement. Thereupon the Acting Executive Director wrote the President of the University, urgently requesting that Mr. Johnson be permitted to continue. The request was considered by the President of the University and by the Board of Trustees and was granted upon the understanding that Mr. Johnson would perform his services as Professor of Law and University Counsel, giving such time to the position of State Director as he could give, after performing his duties in the capacity stated. Of this Mr. Leggett, Acting Executive Director, was informed, with it he was satisfied, and on that basis Mr. Johnson has served since.

In the summer of 1941 Mr. Johnson stated, while on a visit in Washington, to the Executive Officer of the Office of Government Reports that he wanted to

In the summer of 1941 Mr. Johnson stated, while on a visit in Washington, to the Executive Officer of the Office of Government Reports that he wanted to be released from his duties. He was informed that consideration would be given to the matter as soon as convenient. The matter received no further attention until April 7, 1942, when the Executive Officer wrote Mr. Johnson, referring to his expressed desire "to be released from your position as State Director of the Office of Government Reports in Illinois, and each time you have brought up the subject we have asked that it be postponed." The Executive Officer stated that the "difficulty of obtaining a qualified successor compels us to request that you continue in your position with this office for another six months. At that time we can reexamine the situation and determine the practicability of releasing you. Knowing as you do of the relationship of our activities to the prosecution of the war, it is my belief that you should consider yourself as drafted for at least another period of six months' service."

Thereafter, Mr. Johnson wrote the President of the University, transmitting this letter from the office in Washington. In this letter Mr. Johnson said among other things, "While I would like to conform with the wishes of the office in accordance with the letter, yet I do not want to leave the impression that my services can be expected to extend beyond this year." Mr. Johnson further stated that if the request be granted, "it must be with the understanding that I will be released permanently from the position of State Director some time during this year." To this letter the President of the University responded in part as follows: "In my judgment, from the point of view of the University, the time has come for you to discontinue your connection with that office as your as appropriate arrangements can be made for your release and replacement."

soon as appropriate arrangements can be made for your release and replacement."

The routine of the State Office of Government Reports is, of course, handled by the office staff. The entire staff of that office is subject to federal civil service. Mr. Johnson's work has consisted chiefly in assuming responsibility for the reporting function and to the extent practicable, in view of his duties to the University, in relation to cooperation between state and federal agencies and in commenting upon important legislative bills which would affect the operations of federal agencies within the State. The Springfield office, set up this year, is conducted by an appointee from Washington, and Mr. Johnson has not even been in Springfield in 1942. This work he has attended to in such spare periods as holidays, after hours, evenings, Saturdays, and even Sundays. It is his judgment upon the matters mentioned which the federal office has wanted and has had. Piecemeal, in the manner described, the office has had the approximate sum total of time to which it was entitled.

There has been no complaint and no reason for complaint from any source that Mr. Johnson has not performed his University duties effectively and promptly. Indeed, the original complaint, now seemingly in the background, was that he was doing some of the work which the Attorney General should do.

Within the last few weeks a survey has been completed of the outside employment of staff members of the larger universities in this general area of the West and Midwest. Without going into the details, the survey shows that staff

members are permitted by the governing boards to engage in remunerative outside activities so long as the activity does not materially interfere with the duties of the staff member to the institution. In this way the income of members is augmented to a very substantial extent in large numbers of cases. It is clear that in almost countless cases staff members could not be kept in their positions but for the fact that this is permitted. Members of medical faculties, faculties in chemistry, in engineering, law, and elsewhere would be drawn into private industry and the professions but for this latitude which governing boards allow. This is not an uncommon situation, and in view of limited financial resources of institutions, the policy of governing boards above described is reasonable and necessary. In the case of Mr. Johnson, for example, he was offered a retainer nearly double what the University was paying him a few years ago, with the privilege to practice law in addition.

It is, of course, well known that every institution of major importance in the country has contributed staff members and their services in whole or in part to the Federal Government in recent years, as well as now and since the war began. It has never been supposed that such service was either tainted or criminal

The Attorney General misrepresents the relation of Mr. Hodges, who is listed in the University budget as "Assistant University Counsel." Mr. Hodges handles student loan fund collections. These are University trust funds given to it by private donors. Their administration is a sizable business, since the University now has loan funds exceeding \$350,000. The bulk of Mr. Hodges' salary is paid out of the income from these loan funds. The University Counsel is ultimately responsible for servicing student loan accounts which cannot be adjusted without going into the courts. Mr. Hodges spends approximately two months in Chicago, devoting all his time to the servicing of these loan fund accounts. In addition, he is gone for several days each week, attending to these accounts, often outside the State. After doing this work for several years as a member of the University Bursar's organization, it was found that in critical cases Mr. Hodges needed a more professional status in order to render effective service, and after due consideration it was concluded to give him the position of Assistant University Counsel since he has had legal training, is a member of the Bar, and is qualified to landle the legal phases of this trust fund business. He receives \$2,100 a year for this collection service and \$900 a year from general University funds for other University services.

Mr. Cleary presented the following statement.

Six issues affecting the University of Illinois have been raised in recent

weeks by Attorney General Barrett.

I. The Attorney General of Illinois has challenged the right of the University of Illinois to employ legal counsel. This issue must be decided by the courts. Although this right is of utmost importance to the efficient, independent functioning of the University, until a court decision is reached further consideration by this Board seems to me superfluous.

2. The Attorney General has challenged the right of the University to permit its employees to accept additional compensation from outside sources. Until some member of this Board joins the Attorney General in attacking a policy long established at this and other universities, there seems to be nothing for us

to discuss along this line.

3. The Attorney General has implied that Judge Johnson's service to the Federal government has been secret and unauthorized. The fact that such employment was formally authorized by this Board, and such action distributed in printed form to all members of the Legislature and State officials, should be publicized together with whatever statement in this regard President Willard cares to make as the executive officer of the University responsible for adjusting terms of employment of all members of faculty and staff.

4. The Attorney General has stated that Judge Johnson, in addition to his \$9,000 salary from the University, drew "an additional income of \$3,800 annually

from the State treasury." This statement is not only misleading, it is false. The \$3,800 referred to is obviously the total of the following four items set up in the budget of the University for the year 1941-1942 (see Minutes of August 5, 1941, page 456):

This does not represent in any way income to Judge Johnson. Yet the Attorney General not only publicized it as such but multiplied it by seven in calculating

Judge Johnson's income since 1935.

5. The Attorney General charges Judge Johnson, in his capacity as Federal employee, with violation of the Hatch Act. This is obviously a matter over which the Federal Department of Justice has jurisdiction, not this Board. It

calls for no discussion here.

6. The Attorney General charges that during the past eight years the Board of Trustees, the staff, and faculty have injured the University of Illinois by injecting politics and political propaganda into administration and teaching. These charges have been given wide publicity in practically every newspaper in the State. Typical quotations follow:

'The administrative branch of the University is shot through with politics."

(Chicago Times, June 15, 1942)
"The University has been on the downgrade since 1934, when control was taken over by a board of trustees who were not the choice of the people but were hand-picked by the downstate Democratic machine and the Kelly-Nash machine in Cook County. Myself and many other alumni of the university have watched our school's decline since the political termites crept into the admin-

"The thing I object to and which every alumnus objects to is injecting politics into the classrooms. Dr. Arthur Cutts Willard, president of the University, Dr. Meyer and members of the board for seven years have condoned sending Johnson, a political propagandist, into the classrooms. They called him a professor of law." (Chicago Sun, June 15, 1942)

These are the most serious charges made against the University of Illinois

by any responsible source within my recollection. Coming from the Attorney General of Illinois they are undoubtedly given great weight by many people. We who are accused cannot dispose of the matter by denials, no matter how false or foolish the charges may seem to us. Nor can these charges be disposed of by

If the Legislature were in session, I would be glad to have the matter referred to a committee composed exclusively of Republican legislators. Since the Legislature is not in session, I suggest that we ask the University of Illinois Advisory Committee to investigate all charges made by the Attorney General of

Illinois, and issue a report to the public.

The University of Illinois Advisory Committee is an exceptionally representative cross section of the finest Illinois citizenship. It will be remembered that only one of its invited members is an alumnus. To these invited members were added as ex-officio members, the officers of the Dads' Association, and the officers of the Alumni Association.

I can imagine no more constructive service this group could render to the University at the present time than to give full, fair, impartial study to the serious charges which the Attorney General of Illinois has made against the Board of Trustees and the administration of the University.

MOTION

I, therefore, move that the Advisory Committee of the University of Illinois be asked to investigate the foregoing charges of the Attorney General of Illinois and any other charges which he may make and report to the public on their truth or falsity. I move that all members of the faculty and staff of the University be instructed to disclose freely to the Advisory Committee any facts of which they may have knowledge concerning the injection of politics or proparative transfer of the charge of ganda into University affairs by the administration or by the trustees, or by officials of any political party.

I also move that the following organizations be invited to investigate the charges of the Attorney General and report to the public on their truth or falsity: the American Council on Education, the Association of American Universities, the American Association of University Professors, and the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association.

I also move that the President of the University and the staff and faculty be instructed to aid these investigations in every way.

After full discussion by the members of the Board, Mr. Cleary's motion was adopted, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

CURRICULUM IN PUBLIC HEALTH ENGINEERING

(2) The field of Public Health Engineering has greatly expanded in recent years, especially since the passage of the Social Security Act, and there is at present a demand for trained men which is considerably larger than the supply. The State Department of Health reports that its work is hampered by the lack

of a curriculum in Public Health Engineering at the University of Illinois.

The University Senate recommends the establishment of the following five-year curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Public Health

Engineering to be offered in the Colleges of Engineering and Medicine.

First Three Years

The first three years are the same as the first three years of the curriculum in Civil Engineering, except that the elective in the second semester of the third year should be either Engineering 92 or Electrical Engineering 4 and 64.

The work for the first semester of the fifth year will be offered in the College of Engineering at Urbana and the second half of the year will be offered at the College of Medicine in Chicago. Students who have received the bachelor's degree in Sanitary Engineering or its equivalent at a recognized college of engineering shall be admitted to the fifth year in the Public Health Engineering curriculum providing they have had the necessary prerequisites for the particular courses required at the University of Illinois.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this curriculum was approved.

REVISED CURRICULUM IN HOME ECONOMICS

(3) The Department of Home Economics for many years has offered a general curriculum in Home Economics and a special curriculum in Nutrition and Dietetics. These two curricula have become inadequate to provide for recent developments in the field and for new vocations which have opened. Among the considerations which have led to the present revision are (1) the increasing importance of psychology, (2) the vocational Smith-Hughes requirements in teacher training, (3) the requirements of the American Dietetic Association for qualified dietitians, and (4) the discovery that the Nutrition and Dietetics major provided too narrow a course of study.

The University Senate has recommended certain revisions to provide, in the general curriculum in Home Economics, six areas of concentration which correspond to the professional or vocational areas: (1) Foods and Nutrition, (2) Hospital Dietetics and Institution Management, (3) Household Management, (4) The Child and the Family, (5) Textiles and Clothing, (6) Teacher Training.

The courses in Home Economics will be arranged in three groups:

Group I, comprising four courses totaling 9 hours, required of all students in the curriculum: H.E. 1, Introduction to Home Economics; H.E. 4, Foods and Nutrition: H.E. 7, Textiles and Clothing; and H.E. 56, Child Development.

Nutrition; H.E. 7, Textiles and Clothing; and H.E. 56, Child Development.
Group II, comprising nine varied and basic courses totaling 23 hours, from which students are required to elect 8 hours (except that majors in Household Management and the Child and the Family must elect 12 hours, and majors in Teacher Training must take all).

Group III, comprising courses in the six areas of concentration, as follows:

(1) Foods and Nutrition. A total of 22-26 hours. Students must elect a

minimum of 12 hours.

(2) Hospital Dietetics and Institution Management. A total of 10 hours. Students must take all ten and in addition 13-15 hours from Foods and Nutrition.

(3) Household Management. A total of 12-17 hours. Students must elect

6 hours plus 6 in a related field—economics or home economics.

(4) The Child and the Family A total of 7-0 hours. Stud

- (4) The Child and the Family. A total of 7-9 hours. Students must elect 6 hours plus 6 hours in a related field—sociology, psychology, or home economics.
- (5) Textiles and Clothing. A total of 20-25 hours. Students must elect a minimum of 12 hours.
 - (6) Teacher Training. A total of 10 hours, all of which must be taken. Reduction of credits is planned for the following courses: H.E. 58, from

5 to 3 hours; H.E. 5, from 4 to 3 hours; and H.E. 19, from 3 to 2 hours. H.E. 59 will be enlarged, and the credit increased from 2 to 3 hours.

Two new courses will be added: H.E. 4, Introduction to Nutrition and Foods, 2 hours; and H.E. 63, Experimental Foods, 3 hours.

Because of the reduction of hours in the courses listed above, no additional

staff or space is needed at this time.

Changes in prerequisites are concerned mostly with home economics courses. However, Chemistry 32 will replace Chemistry 33 for all students except those in Foods and Nutrition and Hospital Dietetics.

The above proposals are the result of ten years of study by the Home Economics Department and have the support of the College of Agriculture. The Senate Committee on Educational Policy, in recommending approval, stated that in its judgment these proposals are the result of wise and careful study.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, these curricular arrangements were approved.

FOUR-YEAR CURRICULUM IN LAW

(4) The University Senate recommends that a new four-year curriculum in Law be established as an option in addition to the present three-year curriculum. The entrance requirements, residence requirements, and the grade and degree requirements in the three-year curriculum shall remain unchanged, except that the thesis requirement for the J.D. degree shall be eliminated. The specific requirements of the new four-year curriculum are:

Admission Requirements—The candidate at the time of his admission shall have completed in residence in a college approved by the University of Illinois one-half the number of hours required for the bachelor's degree by the college from which he transfers to the College of Law. The candidate shall present a grade average of 3.5 in all college work presented for admission.

Graduation Requirements—(1) Satisfactory completion of two years of law work (58 hours) with a grade average of 3.0 in law classes shall be required for the degree of B.S. in law. (2) Completion of two years of additional work in the Law School (112 hours of law work for the four years) with a grade average of 3.0 shall be required for the LL.B. degree. (3) Completion of 112 hours of law work with a grade average of 4.0 shall be required for the J.D. (Doctor of Law) degree.

The prime motive for the four-year curriculum is the indisputable fact that the problems and areas in law have increased to such a degree that it is difficult to treat them adequately in the traditional three years. Realization of this condition has led to various proposals, at different times, for extension of the law course, beginning in 1918 with the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Association of American Law Schools to increase the course to four years. A similar recommendation was made by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in 1921. The Universities of Minnesota and Chicago adopted four-year programs in 1931 and 1935, respectively. This program was the subject of extended discussion at the annual meeting of the Association of American Law Schools in 1939. At that time a poll of law teachers showed 52 per cent to be in favor of the four-year program. In the same year a poll of our own graduates showed 66 per cent to be in favor of it.

At present the law schools which have adopted the four-year program are: the Universities of Chicago, Minnesota, Louisiana State, and Washington, and Washington University at St. Louis. In all these schools, with the exception of the University of Washington, the three-year course has been retained as an alternative curriculum. Recently Northwestern University Law School has reduced the requirement of pre-law study from three to two years.

Not only will the addition of a year of study permit the student to take more law courses than before, but it will permit the Law School to offer some integrating courses, which deal with the legal system as a whole. Accordingly it is intended to offer courses in the Development of Legal Institutions, in Legislation, and in Jurisprudence. And in order that students may have more practice in individual work on specific legal problems, there will be offered a course in the Drafting of Legal Documents and a Seminar.

The Dean states that this program can be initiated without any additional expense for the present and during the war period because of decreased enrollment. However, when the enrollment comes back to the pre-war peak it will be necessary to add to the staff the equivalent of one full-time and one half-time instructor. He points out that studies of the College of Law enrollments indicate that it has been understaffed in normal times.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this curriculum was approved.

DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN ANIMAL PATHOLOGY AND HYGIENE

(5) The Executive Faculty of the Graduate School has recommended, and I have approved, authorization of the award of the degree of Doctor of Philosophy for graduate work in Animal Pathology and Hygiene. The program which

has been worked out for this degree is a modification of one formerly offered in the Department of Animal Husbandry for students whose major interest was in Animal Pathology and Hygiene. The modification consists essentially in some extension of the work in the major field, with corresponding decrease in supporting preparation from other divisions.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the action of the President of the University in authorizing the award of this degree was approved and confirmed.

GRADUATE WORK IN PHARMACY

(6) On recommendation of the Executive Faculty of the Graduate School, the University Senate has recommended the establishment of graduate curricula in Pharmacy leading to the degrees of Master of Science in Pharmacy and Doctor of Philosophy in Pharmacy. The latter will be restricted for the present to work in Pharmacognosy and Pharmaceutical Chemistry.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, these degrees were authorized as recommended.

FEES FOR SUMMER COURSES IN COLLEGE OF PHARMACY

(7) The College of Pharmacy has been authorized to offer a special eight-week teaching program during the summer of 1942 for approximately thirty students. (The College of Pharmacy will not begin operating on a four-quarter basis until September, 1942.)

I have authorized the following schedule of fees for this work and request

confirmation of my action:

Tuition for undergraduate residents of Illinois, \$5 a credit hour, with a maximum of \$20; tuition for undergraduate non-residents of Illinois, \$10 a credit hour, with a maximum of \$40. In addition, a student will pay one-fourth of the annual laboratory and building service fees (according to class level) and such laboratory and dispensary fees as apply to the courses in which he is registered.

On motion of Mr. Karraker, this action was approved and confirmed.

APPOINTMENT TO KATE NEAL KINLEY MEMORIAL FELLOWSHIP

(8) A report of the Committee on the Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Fellowship recommends the appointment of Miss Justine Emerson Fuller, of Urbana, as the eleventh Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Fellow, and Miss Adele Paulina Guntor, of Westville, as alternate.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, these awards were made as recommended.

LEAVES OF ABSENCE

(9) A recommendation that the following leaves of absence be granted members of the staff for the reasons and periods and under the conditions indicated in each case:

LEAVES OF ABSENCE FOR WAR SERVICE

(10) The Board of Trustees on January 24, 1942 (Minutes, page 749), adopted a policy governing leaves of absence for members of the staff and other employees who have been given leaves for military, naval, or other war service. At the meeting of the Board on May 16 consideration was given to the interpretation of this policy with respect to discontinued positions formerly held by members of the staff now on leave for war service. The President of the University was instructed to prepare a statement that in the judgment of the Board the University's policy should follow, so far as possible, the spirit of the Service Men's Employment Tenure Act. Accordingly the following is submitted:

Policy Governing Leaves of Absence for War Service

The Board of Trustees has adopted a policy which provides that all permanent employees of the University on limited tenure may be granted leaves of absence for war service until the close of the current academic year and that such leaves may be extended beyond September 1, 1942, in the discretion of the President. Staff members who are on indefinite tenure will be granted leaves for the duration of the war or until they are honorably discharged from service. Their positions will be held open for them and they may resume such positions on satisfying the President of the University of their physical ability to discharge the duties of the position.

The following policy will apply to those on limited tenure who are granted

leaves:

I. Where the position is one that is considered essential and is continued during the period of absence of the individual, the position will be kept open for the individual. Appointments to such positions will not be made for periods longer than the period of leave and the individual on leave will have the right to return to the position at the termination of his leave, provided he is in satisfactory physical condition to resume the duties of the position.

2. If the position is no longer needed because of decreased enrollment or other causes it may be discontinued. In this event, the former incumbent shall be given first consideration for any other position on the staff for which he is qualified, unless the position is classified under University Civil Service.

3. If the discontinued position is under University Civil Service the individual formerly filling the position will be placed on the reemployment register in the classification formerly held, and his name will take precedence over names added to the register subsequent to the suspension of his employment. He will thus be eligible to appointment to any position in his classification which becomes vacant at or subsequent to his return.

The general reserve of the University will be used to restore discontinued positions to the extent that such restoration is found to be feasible or desirable.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this statement of policy was approved.

CANCELLATION OF LEAVE OF ABSENCE OF MARY STANSIFER LIGON

(11) On December 16, 1941 (Minutes, page 722), the Board granted Mrs. Mary Stansifer Ligon, Home Adviser at Large and Instructor in Home Economics Extension, a leave of absence on one-half pay, for one year from September I. 1042, for the purpose of advanced study of economics, agricultural economics, and home management at the University of Illinois. This leave was subject to the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture, since her salary is paid in full from funds received from the Federal government. The United States Department of Agriculture has suspended all leaves of absence for the duration of the war, and therefore Mrs. Ligon has requested cancellation of her leave.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this leave was cancelled.

RETIREMENT OF RUSSELL G. MORRIS

(12) A recommendation that Russell G. Morris, Superintendent of Agricultural Exhibits in the Agricultural Experiment Station, be retired for physical disability (under the University Statutes) effective June 12, 1942, with an annual disability retiring allowance of \$797.

Mr. Morris is suffering from a heart condition and was given sick leave from January 12 through June 11, 1942, in accordance with the University Statutes governing such leaves. He is unable to return to service, and therefore he is recommended for retirement.

Since he became disabled and unable to perform his duties before March 1, 1942, he cannot be retired under the University Retirement System of Illinois but is eligible for retirement for disability under the old retirement system.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this retirement was authorized as recommended.

UNIVERSITY RETIREMENT SYSTEM AND COMPENSATION FOR EXTRA SERVICES

(13) The act creating the new retirement system for the University, the State Teachers Colleges, and the State Surveys provides that contributions shall be made by employees and benefits shall be paid on total earnings, "provided that if any Employer adopts a rule specifying that any extra compensation for summer teaching or other extra service not included in the regular annual salary shall not be considered as earnings, all amounts so specified shall be excluded."

The question is now being faced in the University for the first time on salaries for services during the Summer Quarter of 1942. Unless the Board of Trustees adopts a rule providing that such extra compensation is not included as a part of earnings for retirement contributions and benefits, the regular deduc-

tions would be made from summer salaries.

After thorough consideration and discussion of the matter with the University Retirement Committee, the Director of the Summer Quarter and the Comptroller recommend adoption by the Board of Trustees of the following rule defining earnings for the purpose of contributions to and benefits of the University Retirement System of Illinois, this to be applicable only to University staff members and employees:

"Extra compensation for summer teaching or other extra service not included in the regular annual salary shall not be considered as earnings under the provisions of the Act establishing the University Retirement System of Illi-

nois approved July 21, 1941."

If at any time conditions, either in general or in individual cases, so change that this regulation is not satisfactory it may be modified by the Board of Trustees under the law.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Davis, action on this matter was deferred pending discussion by the Trustees of the University Retirement System.

APPROPRIATION TO DEPARTMENT OF ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

(14) The estimate of income for the 1941-1942 budget included an estimated item of \$49,780 of income from the operations of the Department of Animal Husbandry in the Agricultural Experiment Station.

Due to increase in prices, an excess of income will be realized. At its meeting on April 22 the Board approved an appropriation of \$9,000, representing excess receipts over budget estimates from operating the Dixon Springs Experiment Station. It is now estimated that the Department will realize an additional

\$6,000 in excess of budget estimates from other operations.

Conditions unforeseen at the time the budget for the current year was made up have increased the operating costs of the Department. These same conditions have increased departmental receipts. The Head of the Department and the Dean of the College, therefore, request that an appropriation of \$4,000 be made from excess receipts of the Department to cover additional operating expenses for the balance of the year.

The Department also requests an appropriation of \$2,250 for rebuilding the concrete floors of the poultry houses. Since this is a non-recurring item, it should not be charged against the current operating budget. The Department has a balance of approximately \$4,000 in accumulated excess receipts of previous years, and the appropriation for rebuilding these floors should be made from this

fund.

I recommend that these appropriations be made, the first from excess receipts of the Department resulting from operations during the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, with the provision that any unexpended balance at the end of the year will lapse into the unappropriated agricultural income reserve; and the second from the unappropriated agricultural income. Sufficient funds are available to cover these appropriations in both cases.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

APPROPRIATION TO UNIVERSITY COUNCIL OF DEFENSE

(15) The University War Committee has appointed a number of subcommittees for various objectives and responsibilities of University war service. One of these, originally the Committee on Protection of Life and Property, but now designated as the University Council of Defense, has prepared a definite plan to protect both life and property about the University in case of danger or disaster. This plan includes training courses for staff members in first aid and in other fields related to civilian defense.

The council needs funds to carry out some of its plans, and no existing

budget can absorb such expense.

The Chairman of the War Committee recommends:

(1) That the University and its employees share equally in the time required to train workers. For example, if a class organized in this program meets for a two-hour period, one hour of this time will be given by the University, and the employee will be asked to contribute an hour from his own time.

(2) That an appropriation of \$1,600 be made to the University Council of

Defense for one year from July 1, 1942.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

SPECIAL GUARD SERVICE IN URBANA DEPARTMENTS

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant Department submits the following estimates of the annual cost of maintaining special guard service in various areas of the Champaign-Urbana campus:

This is not a normal charge against the Operation and Maintenance budget of the Physical Plant Department but is a direct result of the war emergency and should be covered by a special appropriation as the Department cannot absorb this expense in its current budget. The officers concerned recommend as follows:

Radio Transmitter Station—The Director of Radio Station WILL states that the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Federal Communications Commission both have asked all radio stations to maintain regular watchman service as protection against first, sabotage, and second, against loss of equipment, since such equipment is difficult to replace.

Armory and Military Stables—The Professor of Military Science and Tactics has recommended the maintenance of watchman service in these areas because of the University's responsibility to the War Department for the protection of Government property which includes artillery and signal corps fire control equipment, machine guns, rifles and pistols, motor vehicles, animals and stable equipment, and clothing, having an appraised value of approximately \$750,000. Loss of any considerable portion of this property would result in handicapping the program of military training due to the difficulty in replacing such equipment.

Abbott Power Plant and Physical Plant Service Building—The Director of the Physical Plant Department states that in view of reductions in the budget he would not favor continuation of this service at the Physical Plant Service Building, but in his judgment guard service should be maintained at the Abbott Power Plant.

The net result of these recommendations is that an appropriation of \$20,290 will be necessary to continue watchman service at the Radio Station, Armory, Military Stables, and the Abbott Power Plant.

WATCHMAN SERVICE IN THE CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends expansion of the watchman service in the Chicago Departments to provide for the services of four additional men. There are at present three watchmen transferred from the Department of Public Welfare when the Research and Educational Hospitals were taken over by the University. The difficulty of replacing equipment lost through theft makes the need for increased protection all the greater. The cost of this additional service will be \$8,500 a year.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this appropriation was made, subject to the realization of unexpended balances, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

ANNUAL REPORT ON CARTER-PENNELL FARMS

(19) The Dean of the College of Agriculture submits the annual report of the Carter-Pennell Farms covering the farm year, March 1, 1941, to February 28, 1942. This report covers the operations of two farms in Vermilion County held in trust by the Board of Trustees of the University, and the net proceeds are used as a loan fund to aid students. The net income of the two farms for the year was \$3,016.67, which is the largest annual net income that the University has received during the nineteen years it has owned and operated the farms. The operating account now has a cash balance of \$4,665.63. The committee

The operating account now has a cash balance of \$4,665.63. The committee in charge of the operation of the Carter-Pennell Farms recommends that \$2,000 of the cash balance be transferred to the Student Loan Fund. The remaining balance of \$2,665.63 will provide ample reserve for operating expenses and improvements needed at this time.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS OF UNIVERSITY STAFF MEMBERS

(22) At the meeting of the Board on May 16, I presented estimates of staff, space, and budgetary requirements for carrying out the program of medical examinations for staff members which was adopted by the Board at its meeting on April 22. Action on this was deferred.

Staff Requirements—It will require the full-time services of four physicians working eight hours a day, to examine the employees of the University once a year. This is based on an estimate of five complete medical examinations a day by each physician (including medical histories, discussion of results of findings with individuals, and unavoidable delays).

Space Requirements—The Health Service offices in both Champaign-Urbana and Chicago are in constant use from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. It will be necessary to provide four additional offices. The cost of the alterations is estimated at \$3,000.

THE UNIVERSITY BUDGET FOR 1942-1943

(24) The University budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1942, and the ac-

ademic year beginning September 1, 1942, is submitted herewith. (See page 979.)

I recommend that this budget, covering the allocation of the University's income from all State appropriations (including the appropriation of the University Income Fund representing all general income) as well as Federal funds and trust funds, for wages, operation, equipment, plant repairs and replacements, and all other operating expense for the fiscal year beginning July I, 1942, and salaries for the academic year beginning September I, 1942, be approved; that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments as are needed, to make such additional appointments as are necessary, and to accept resignations offered, in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved, and within the total amount appropriated; and that the Executive Committee of the Board be hereby authorized to make appropriations from the General Reserve Fund and such other adjustments in the budget as may be needed from time to time whenever it is necessary to take such action in the absence of a quorum of the Board.

SCHEDULE OF LABORATORY FEES IN URBANA DEPARTMENTS

(25) The following schedule of laboratory fees for the Urbana Departments for the academic year beginning September 1, 1942, is submitted to the Board of

Trustees for approval.

The schedule has been compiled from reports of the departments and has been recommended by the Comptroller and the Provost, in accordance with the procedure specified in the University Statutes. The list provides for special fees in 417 courses, as compared with 415 in last year's list. Of this total, fees are indicated in three courses where none have been charged during the current year, while in six other cases fees have been omitted because of change in the content of courses. In seven cases fees have been increased, and in two cases reductions have been made as a result of the past year's experience, and in 390 cases the fee is the same as for the previous year.

BUDGET OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(26) I present herewith the budget of the Athletic Association for 1942-1943 as approved by its Board of Directors and transmitted by the Director of the Athletic Association. This budget has been examined in detail by the Comptroller and reviewed by the President of the University.

The budget shows an estimate of income of \$232,955, as compared with an original estimate of \$267,905 for the current year and a probable realization of \$257,682. Of this income a total of \$152,750 is expected from football, which is

approximately the same as actually realized for the current year. The Board of Directors feels that this estimate is conservative, based on next year's schedule, but it must be realized that the whole problem of attendance at games estimated at \$35,000 as against \$43,748 actual for the current year.

Expenses are estimated at \$230,480, as compared with an original appropria-

tion of \$258,770 for the current year and a present estimate of \$251,530 of actual expenditures. Of the total budget the sum of \$72,872 is for salaries and retiring allowances and \$157,608 is for expenses. Since the bulk of the income is realized in the early weeks of the year, it is believed that expenditures can be adjusted to meet decreased income if the budget estimate of income is not realized.

The budget thus shows an excess of \$2,475 of estimated income over

receipts and expenses.

All salaries have been checked by the President of the University, and those which are paid jointly by the Association and the University conform to the University budget presented at this meeting.

A preliminary financial statement of the Athletic Association at June 30, 1042, is presented at the close of its budget. It shows an estimated operating balance of \$17,370 at the close of the year as compared with \$28,614 at the beginning of the year. This reduction is due to large expenditures for the connection of the Stadium to the University heating plant and other capital items. Operating income for the year will slightly exceed operating expenses. The Association also will have at the end of the year a reserve of \$13,500 for plant maintenance and replacements and an annuity fund of \$98,448, also bank stock of a par value of \$8,600 not included in the operating balance but understood to have a value of not less than par.

I recommend approval of the budget of the Athletic Association for the

year 1942-1943 as presented.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this budget was approved as recommended.

RESEARCH SERVICES OF MEMBERS OF THE UNIVERSITY STAFF TO THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

(27) Pursuant to authorization of the Board of Trustees, the University has entered into various contracts with the National Defense Research Committee of the Office of Scientific Research and Development of the United States for research work on war problems. The Government provides the funds for the actual expenses of these research programs, including salaries of scientific personnel and others employed on these projects, supplies, equipment, and overhead charges for the use of the University facilities. Members of the regular University staff in charge of this work have donated their services and supervise the work, this being in addition to their regular duties.

Beginning July 1, 1942, new contracts with the Office of Scientific Research and Development will include a provision for charging to the contract the salaries of members of the University staff who are supervising National Defense Research Committee contracts, to the extent of the time devoted to such projects. Funds thus released in the regular budget will be available for the employment of additional staff to assist and otherwise relieve the individuals

concerned of a part of their University work.

An exception to this arrangement is requested in the case of Professor Roger Adams, Head of the Department of Chemistry, who is a member of the National Defense Research Committee and is Chairman of Division B (Chemistry and Chemical Engineering). In that capacity he is in charge of all research work in Chemistry and Chemical Engineering for the National Defense Research Committee. The O.S.R.D. was created by an executive order of the President of the United States. This order specifies that none of the executive officers of the O.S.R.D. or of its two committees (the National Defense Research Committees). search Committee and the Committee on Medical Research) shall receive compensation. Consequently none of these individuals receives compensation from the Government, with the exception of traveling expenses. Professor Adams is devoting approximately seventy-five per cent of the normal working hours to this program, but on the other hand he spends a great deal of his own time in addition to the other twenty-five per cent of the normal working hours to carry on his University work.

Under the circumstances it seems to be justifiable that the University donate his services to the Government as a part of the University's war effort, and I

recommend that this be authorized.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this arrangement was authorized as recommended.

DIESEL ENGINE OPERATORS' SCHOOL FOR THE UNITED STATES NAVY

(28) The United States Navy has inquired if the University can provide the facilities for housing, feeding, and training of approximately 600 Diesel engine operators. We have advised the Navy that facilities for housing and feeding are available, and have suggested that Naval officers be sent here to inspect such facilities as are available for the instructional program to determine if they are adequate for the purpose. These facilities are:

1. The Men's Residence Halls for the housing and feeding of trainees. No rooms in the Residence Halls have been assigned for next year. This program

will mean taking over the Residence Halls for use as barracks.

2. The Ice Skating Rink. In this connection consideration should be given to the effect which taking over the Skating Rink for this purpose will have upon the programs of physical education, intramural sports, and intercollegiate athletics. With the use of the Men's Old Gymnasium and the Gymnasium Annex for the Naval Training School for Signalmen, facilities for these programs of physical education and sports have been greatly reduced. On the other hand, at the request of the Army and Navy the University has increased the amount of physical education required of all male students as a means for conditioning them for military service.

Until more information is available as to the specific requirements of the Navy, sources of funds, and the effect of this on the programs of physical education and sports, I am unable to make a definite recommendation but am bringing the matter to the Board for instruction.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was authorized to continue negotiations and to offer all possible facilities consistent with the maintenance of our program in physical education.

FUNDS FOR BUILDING REMODELING FOR NAVAL TRAINING SCHOOL FOR SIGNALMEN

(29) The Board of Trustees has authorized the release of \$100,000 from the State appropriation for building remodeling as an advance to cover the cost of building changes to provide quarters for the Naval Training School for Signalmen. (See Minutes of May 16, 1942, page 887.) The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends, and I concur, that an additional \$25,000 be released from the same appropriation for this program. Under its contract with the Navy, the University will secure reimbursement for this outlay.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this transfer was authorized, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Adams, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY IN CHICAGO

(30) The Director of the Physical Plant Department has received recommendations from Farr and Company, the firm retained by authority of the Board of Trustees to assist in the purchase of properties in Chicago, concerning the acquisition of the following parcels fronting on Taylor Street between Wood Street and Wolcott Avenue: (1) the purchase of property at 1834 Taylor Street, at \$5,000; (2) the purchase of property at 920 South Wood Street, at \$6,500; and (3) the filing of tax foreclosure suits against the property at 1824, 1832, and 1840 Taylor Street.

Since these prices are in excess of the limit authorized by the Board of Trustees (25 per cent above the appraisal by the Chicago Real Estate Board), the recommendations are hereby submitted to the Board for further instructions. I also submit a schedule outlining the present status of this property acquisition program as a whole, showing anticipated prices. As this schedule shows, it will be possible to acquire this property within the State appropriation for this purpose even if it is necessary to pay the maximum prices.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department concurs in the recommenda-

tions of Farr and Company, and I approve.

Certain representatives of property owners spoke on this matter. On motion of Mr. Davis, the purchase of the properties at 920 South Wood Street and 1834 Taylor Street was approved, and the schedule of acquisition was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration.

APPROPRIATION FOR ORCHARD STREET STORM DRAIN IMPROVEMENT

(31) At its meeting on October 21, 1941 (Minutes, page 678), the Board of Trustees accepted the University's share of the cost of the Orchard Street storm drain improvement, which was estimated at \$3,722.

I recommend that an appropriation of \$3,722 be made from the General

Reserve Fund and that the Board of Trustees authorize payment of this amount to the City of Urbana for the University's share of the cost of this improvement.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this payment was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

RETIREMENT OF H. L. WINGFIELD

(32) A recommendation that H. L. Wingfield, Laborer in the Department of Horticulture, be retired for physical disability, effective April 25, 1942, with an annual disability retiring allowance of \$623, in accordance with the University

Mr. Wingfield has been in the service of the University since April 2, 1928, and he is suffering from organic heart disease. The University Health Officer has certified that he will not be able to resume his work even if he makes a partial recovery from his present condition. Since he became disabled and unable to perform his duties prior to March 1, 1942, he can not be retired under the University Retirement System of Illinois, but is eligible for retirement for disability under the old retirement system.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this retirement was authorized as recommended.

APPROPRIATION TO CHICAGO ILLINI UNION BUILDING

(33) At its meeting on October 21, 1941 (Minutes, page 680), the Board earmarked \$4,462 in the General Reserve Fund for the operation of the Chicago Illini Union Building, but the amount was not appropriated. The Director of the Physical Plant Department now requests that the appropriation be made, and I concur.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

MINIMUM AND MAXIMUM SALARIES OF CIVIL SERVICE STAFF

(34) The University Civil Service Committee recommends a schedule of minimum and maximum salaries for the various classifications in the University Civil Service.

In determining these salary ranges, consideration was given to (1) present salaries and wages paid by the University, (2) comparable salaries paid for similar work in other public institutions in the middle west and particularly in the State of Illinois, (3) the prevailing rate most frequently paid in the community, (4) the current trend of supply and demand in the labor market, (5) comparative difficulty and responsibility of the various positions and their comparative value to the University, and (6) to some extent the cost and standard of living.

A minimum salary rate and a maximum rate have been placed on each classification. The minimum rate is considered the lowest rate that any employee should receive for performing the work of that classification and is generally considered the starting rate for that classification. These rates are for full-time service, and part-time rates should be computed as a proportionate amount of these rates. Salary increases should be approved in orderly steps of \$5, \$10, \$15, or \$25 a month, except where the University is obliged to meet the prevailing rate in the community.

Under present economic conditions it seems apparent that adjustments in the compensation plan may be necessary from time to time. The salary range for each classification should be under more or less constant study to determine any necessary changes.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Civil Service and Employees for study and recommendation.

CIVIL-SERVICE CLASSIFICATIONS

(35) On January 24, 1942 (Minutes, page 749), the Board of Trustees approved 121 classifications in the University Civil Service. This was a partial list and it was understood that additions and changes would be made at a later meeting, since a complete list of classifications could not be submitted at that time due to the necessity of further study, and new classifications have subsequently been found necessary.

The University Civil Service Committee has now completed its initial classification work and recommends that additional classifications (167 in number) be established. This group includes executive and semi-executive positions, foremen, tradesmen, mechanics, clerks, attendants, storeroom employees, and a few miscellaneous classifications.

I recommend that this be referred to the Committee on Civil Service and Employees.

This matter was referred as recommended.

PURCHASE OF COAL FOR URBANA DEPARTMENTS

(38) The Purchasing Agent and the Director of the Physical Plant Department submit the following schedule of bids, received and opened on June 15, 1942, on coal for the Abbott Power Plant for 1942-1943:

Specifications and invitations to bid were sent to twenty operators in the Danville district. In addition advertisements were published in the Danville Commercial News, the Chicago Tribune, and the Chicago Journal of Commerce, inviting bids. Operators in other areas can not compete because of the differential in freight rates. The University's requirements are approximately 36,000 tons a year. Bids on 30,000 tons of screenings were invited, but the lowest bidder—the Globe Coal Company—can supply only 22,500 tons. The Tilton Mining Company quoted the same price, but the Globe Coal Company's coal is considered best due to the low percentage of fines. Approximately 17,000 tons are now in storage. The Purchasing Agent and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend the award of the contract for delivery of screenings, as required during the year, to the Globe Coal Company, Chicago, for 22,500 tons at \$1.65 a ton, f.o.b. mine. The freight rate is 63 cents a ton, making the delivered price \$2.28 a ton.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this contract was awarded as recommended.

Washed screenings for delivery during July, August, September, and October at the rate of 2,500 tons per month.

APPROPRIATION TO DEPARTMENT OF DAIRY HUSBANDRY

(39) The Head of the Department of Dairy Husbandry recommends that the excess receipts over estimated income from departmental sales be appropriated and made available for operating expenses for the balance of the current fiscal year.

The Department supplies all the milk and other dairy products for the Illini Union Building, the Residence Halls, the Home Economics Cafeteria, and for class laboratories. The Department found it necessary to purchase during the year additional cattle to meet the demand. The establishment of the Naval Training School for Signalmen has increased the demand, and it may be

necessary again to increase the dairy herd.

Increasing the herd has meant more feed to purchase, and feed prices have been about fifty per cent higher than they were when the budget for 1941-1942 was prepared. The Department has also expended about \$3,000 in repairs, installing new plumbing, and making other improvements to comply with milk inspection recommendations. These expenditures likewise were not contemplated when the budget was prepared. On the other hand, milk prices have advanced and sales have increased which accounts for the increased income of the Department.

Operating expenses for the year will be approximately \$5,756 in excess of budget appropriations; receipts will be about \$6,800 in excess of the original

estimate.

I concur in the recommendation of the Department that the excess receipts be appropriated to the Department for the current year, with the provision that any unused or unexpended balance at the end of the fiscal year will lapse into unappropriated agricultural income reserve.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

REAPPROPRIATION OF PHYSICAL PLANT EXPENSE AND MAINTENANCE FUNDS

(40) The Director of the Physical Plant Department requests that the unexpended balances in the total Physical Plant Department operation and maintenance budget (both for Urbana and Chicago) at the end of the current fiscal year be carried forward and made available for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1942. The unexpended balance in this appropriation as of May 31, 1942, was \$164,695. The amount of the reappropriation will be the unencumbered portion of that balance. The average monthly expenditure for the past eleven months of the fiscal year was about \$95,000.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Cleary, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Adams, Mr. Cleary, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Karraker, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Wieland.

CHANGE IN CONTRACT FOR ELEVATOR REPAIRS IN RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(41) The Director of the Physical Plant Department requests approval of a change in the contract with the Otis Elevator Company for repairing elevators in the Research and Educational Hospitals by omitting the new DC brake frames and coils with necessary rectifiers, as originally specified for elevators 1, 2, 4, and 5, reducing the total amount of the contract by \$1,044.

Priorities make it impossible to get this equipment now, but it can be installed later. Since there is a mechanical brake now on the elevator, omission of this installation will not constitute a safety hazard. The electrical equipment would have reduced maintenance costs and provided more comfort for

passengers.

I recommend approval of this change order.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these changes were authorized.

STATUS OF UNIVERSITY COUNSEL

(42) I recommend that the Board of Trustees take the necessary steps to establish its legal right to employ counsel, specifically the right to employ Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson as University Counsel and Professor of Law and Norval

D. Hodges as Assistant University Counsel.

At its meeting on May 16, 1942 (Minutes, pages 903-904), the Board voted that vouchers continue to be drawn and certified for the payment of the salaries of Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson as University Counsel and Professor of Law, and Norval D. Hodges as Assistant University Counsel, who have been appointed to these positions by the Board of Trustees. The State Auditor of Public Accounts has informed the University that on the advice of the Attorney General his office will withhold payment of salaries to Messrs. Sveinbjorn Johnson and Norval D. Hodges until instructed otherwise by the Attorney General.

In view of this situation it will be necessary to institute legal proceedings to recover their salaries. The action would be mandamus against the Auditor and possibly against the Attorney General. The Board should also retain counsel to advise as to its participation in the above proceedings and in any other proceedings that may be necessary to establish its right to employ Messrs.

Johnson and Hodges in their present positions.

It was the sense of the Board that no action on this recommendation is now necessary because Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson is still University Counsel in view of previous actions:

- 1. The action taken by the Board on May 16, 1942 (Minutes, pages 903-904), "that vouchers continue to be drawn and certified for the payment of the salaries of Judge Johnson and Mr. Hodges as members of the University staff as in the past."
- 2. The action taken by the Board at the present meeting, approving the University budget and appointments to the staff for 1942-1943, including the reappointments of Judge Johnson and Mr. Hodges (Minutes, page 986).
- 3. The action taken by the Board at the present meeting with specific reference to the charges made by the Attorney General (Minutes, page 908).

STUDENT HOUSING STANDARDS

(43) In 1939 the Board of Trustees established a Division of Student Housing to maintain an inspection and supervisory service. Its responsibilities are (1) to maintain a continuing study of actual housing conditions in the community, (2) to determine what standards are necessary for healthful and safe housing, and (3) to secure adjustments of facilities and accommodations in present housing units to conform to minimum requirements for healthful and safe

housing as determined by the best authorities on this subject.

Housing standards were compiled by a committee consisting of the University Health Officer, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller. After this group had made a thorough study of all the information which could be secured on standards and practices elsewhere, these standards (based on minimum requirements of the American Public Health Association) were then sent to the operators of all housing units on the campus, including the fraternities and sororities, with a recommendation that every effort be made to incorporate in the long-term plan of each house the proper measures for compliance with such standards.

These standards are not applicable to fraternities and sororities exclusively. Student rooming houses, University operated residence halls, privately operated dormitories, and cooperative houses have all met or are making adjustments to meet the same standards. If it is found impossible to make certain recommended improvements due to war priorities on materials, such improvements may be postponed for the duration of the war. In fact, it is the policy of the

Housing Division to give operators of student houses, including fraternities and sororities, as much leeway as is possible consistent with minimum health and safety standards to make the necessary adjustments and changes.

The University has received communications from representatives of fraternities and sororities and from operators of independent student homes, requesting modifications of these standards and exceptions in certain situations. Doubtless members of the Board have also received some of these communications. Inasmuch as the University is operating a Housing Division under regulations and procedures authorized by the Board of Trustees, I recommend that the questions which have been raised be referred to the Board Committee on Student Welfare and Activities.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this matter was referred to the Committee on Student Welfare and Activities for study and recommendation.

(44) A report on student registration in the Summer Session, as of June 18, 1942, in comparison with the final enrollment in the summer of 1941. (It should be noted that the figures for the summer of 1942 are not final, since further enrollments are being received and since there will be a second session beginning on July 20.)

THE UNIVERSITY BUDGET FOR 1942-1943

(Adopted by the Board of Trustees June 20, 1942, Minutes, page 926)

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Appropriations for salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1, 1942.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided

in the budget, the unused balance lapses at that time.

Funds appropriated for salary positions which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the positions. Such temporary charges may not exceed the amount of time provided by the position unless otherwise approved by the President.

All balances remaining in the appropriations for salaries at the end of

the term indicated or at August 31, 1942, lapse on those dates.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries and Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and other captions except with the approval of the President of the University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be made between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" on written request to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for expense and equipment and for wages are available for one year beginning July 1, 1942, and ending June 30, 1943. All unencum-

bered balances in these appropriations lapse June 30, 1942.

Unless otherwise indicated in the Budget:

1. All appointments begin September 1, 1942.
2. Civil Service (C.S.) appointments are for one year. Appointees to stenographic and clerical positions are assigned to departments at the convenience of the University. The University reserves the right to change such assignments during the year if the needs of the University and of the departments require such action.

3. The service required under appointments to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Quarter. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Associate and above are paid in twelve equal monthly installments; salaries of other ranks, in ten equal

monthly installments.

4. The service required in all positions in experiment stations and bureaus of research, and in research positions in other departments, is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance of one month for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments.

5. The service required in all other positions—administrative, clerical, and service positions—is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for

vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments.

Symbols are used to indicate tenure as follows:
Indefinite tenure. E—Ten months from September 1, 1942.
Two years from September 1, 1941. F—Special tenure. A—Indefinite tenure. B—Two years from September 1, 1941.

D-One year from September 1, 1942. H—July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943.

Each salary position is for full time unless the tenure symbol is followed by a number indicating the percentage of time required by the position.
