The July meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the University Club, in Chicago, at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, July 17, 1944.

The following members were present: President Livingston, Mr.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of June 1, 1944, and the adjourned session of June 22, 1944, together with the meeting of the Executive Committee of May 9, 1944.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the minutes were approved and received

for record as printed on pages 941 to 1018.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING OF JULY 13, 1944

The Secretary presented for record the minutes of a meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University Club, in Chicago, at 12:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 13, 1944. Present: Mr. Park Livingston, Chairman, General Chester R. Davis, and Mr. Frank A. Jensen, members of the Committee; also President A. C. Willard, Professor W. C. Huntington, Director C. S. Havens, Mr. E. Todd Wheeler, and Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary.

Special Building Program

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the proposed Veterinary College, Animal Husbandry Laboratory, and Dairy Husbandry buildings were grouped as associated projects, to be combined as one project if this may be found necessary.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the Health and Physical Education building was approved as a part of the University program, and the entire program as presented was approved for presentation to the State Post-War Planning Commission.

Matters Presented by President Willard

The Executive Committee considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

Appropriation for Airport Drainage

(1) After contracts for the construction of the University of Illinois Airport were let by the Civil Aeronautics Administration it was discovered that the original drainage plans (prepared by the Civil Aeronautics Administration) constituted a violation of the drainage laws of Illinois. It, therefore, became necessary to provide three drainage outlets instead of the one originally specified. Two of these outlets are satisfactorily provided for, but the third has become a subject of controversy. This would be the outlet for the drainage of the western area of the airport. The present Civil Aeronautics Administration plan of development provides for an open ditch which would have several objectionable features, viz.:

1. The right-of-way will be very difficult to secure, because the affected owners of the land live on and operate their farm and depend on it for a livelihood. The airfield development has already taken 180 acres of a total of 320 acres for which the owners were equipped with machinery and buildings to farm. The proposed open ditch would take from them an additional 14 acres, which would mean more than 10 per cent of their remaining 140 acres when roads and

building areas are deducted.

2. The open ditch plan would take out of agricultural production about 12

acres of valuable crop lands.

3. The necessary spoil banks would become a scar on the countryside, which would be inconsistent with the appearance of the project as a whole, and thus would partially nullify the general aesthetic effect which the plans of the Civil Aeronautics Administration will produce on the field, and the University will develop, in connection with its building program.

The outlet for the eastern drainage will be an open ditch, but there has been a natural ditch draining this area before, which is being straightened, deep-

ened, and otherwise improved.

The University has been negotiating with the Civil Aeronautics Administration in an attempt to have them provide a buried pipe channel instead of an open ditch to the west. As a compromise we agreed to one-half mile of open ditch and one-half mile of pipe channel. The Chicago regional office of the Civil Aeronautics Administration submitted to the Washington office a revised drainage design for this portion of the project, in accordance with the University's proposal. The Washington office has disapproved this revision because of the additional cost.

It would be unfortunate to have this mile-long open ditch. Aside from the reasons cited above, there would be public disapproval and the University would be obligated to maintain the ditch.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration will put in a pipe channel for a part of this distance if the University will pay the difference in cost. Estimates prepared by Professor James J. Doland during airport construction and checked with representatives of the Johnson-Green Company (one of the contractors on the airport) indicating the difference in cost between the pipe channel and the open ditch are as follows:

The net present cost to the University would be further reduced by capitalization of the maintenance cost of one-half mile of open ditch, which might easily run to \$200 or more a year.

I therefore recommend a proposal be made to the Civil Aeronautics Administration that the University will agree to the expenditure of the additional cost of the pipe over the open ditch and that an appropriation of \$19,200 be made

from the General Reserve Fund for this purpose.
On motion of Mr. Davis, this recommendation was adopted. The appropria-

tion was made by unanimous vote.

Appropriation for Veterinary College Studies

(2) At its meeting on June 1, 1944 (Minutes, page 958), the Board of Trustees voted to establish a College of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery. The President of the University was directed to have a study made of the organization and the curriculum and submit a detailed report through the University Senate to the Board of Trustees as soon as possible.

A committee has been appointed to make a study of the building and curricular needs for this College. This committee has been instructed to include in its report estimates of capital and operating costs—that is, how much money should be requested for a complete building or buildings, the probable staff requirements and annual budgets—with due consideration given to the transfer of any existing departments to the new college. The committee has likewise been instructed to secure data on curricular requirements.

It will be necessary for this committee to send representatives to other institutions having veterinary colleges and to secure the consulting services of experts in veterinary education. I, therefore, recommend that an appropriation of \$2,500 be made from the General Reserve Fund to the "Committee on Organization and Curriculum for College of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery," this fund to be available for travel expenses, office expenses, secretarial and clerical salaries, and honoraria for consulting services.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this appropriation was made, by unanimous vote.

The Executive Committee adjourned.

ORGANIZATION OF HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND ATHLETICS PROGRAM

Mr. Ames and Mr. Mills made statements on the plans for a building for Health and Physical Education and Athletics, to the effect that such a building should be a University project and not a separate bill sponsored by outside organizations, that it should be on the same basis as the Huff Gymnasium, and that, as a result of the separate organization of the Athletic Association and the School of Physical Education, their interest in the project was entirely from the point of view of intercollegiate athletics, for the purposes of our own student body.

After full discussion, and on motion of Mr. Jensen, the entire matter was referred to the President of the University for study and recommendation on the health and physical education and athletics program.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT WILLARD

The Board considered the following matter presented by the President of the University.

BUDGET OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Director of Intercollegiate Athletics submits on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association the proposed budget of the Association for 1944-1945. The budget is summarized as follows with comparative figures for the preceding year:

At the beginning of the year the Association had a net operating balance of \$60,763.60. At the close of the year, after allowing for increments from non-revenue sources, for special appropriations and reserves, this surplus amounted to \$41,793 (subject to audit). In addition the Association had a reserve of \$32,000 for plant maintenance and replacement.

The budget has been reviewed in detail by the Comptroller. All salaries have

The budget has been reviewed in detail by the Comptroller. All salaries have been reviewed by the President, and those paid jointly by the Athletic Association and the School of Physical Education are concurred in by Director Staley.

I recommend that this budget be approved and that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments as are necessary, including new appointments and acceptance of resignations, as recommended by the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association, within the total estimated income.

The Comptroller presented this budget, and commented thereon.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this budget was approved, and authority was granted to the President of the University as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Jensen, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Karraker, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell.

After an informal discussion of matters pertaining to the internal budget for 1944-1945, the Board recessed until noon on Tuesday, July 18, 1944.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

JULY 18, 1944

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held July 18, 1944, at the University Club, in Chicago, during the recess in the meeting of the Board on the same day, pursuant to call issued on July 12. MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT WILLARD

The Executive Committee considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

BUDGET FOR 1944-1945

(1) The University budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1944, and the academic year beginning September 1, 1944, is submitted herewith (see page 41). I recommend:

1. That this budget covering the allocation of the University's income from

all sources be approved.

2. That the President of the University by authorized (a) to make such changes and adjustments as are needed, (b) to make such additional appointments as are necessary, and (c) to accept resignations as are offered, in accordance with the needs of the University to be covered in the Comptroller's within the total income, all such changes to be covered in the Comptroller's quarterly reports.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the budget was approved and authority granted as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Davis, Mr. Jensen.

PROPOSED SPECIAL RESEARCH FUND FOR 1944-1945

(2) Because of decreased student enrollment on the Urbana campus, the University is committed to a staff for 1944-1945 which is in excess of that required for the expected teaching load. The income applicable to the year 1945 does not permit the retention of all these persons in the regular budget, and yet some portion of their time may be required by courses and curricula leading to

It is proposed to appropriate to the University Research Board a special nonrecurring appropriation out of the General Reserve of the University. From this appropriation it is proposed to assign funds for approved research projects, including both the salary of the staff member concerned and other expenses relating thereto. Through this means it is hoped that a way can be found of providing for the employment of various members of the staff who will not be needed in teaching and administrative duties for full-time service for the coming year but who have promising programs of research which the University would undertake to support if other funds were available, and who would welcome the type of appointment proposed.

Deans of the colleges will be invited to recommend, through the President of the University, to the Dean of the Graduate School the transfer of members of their staffs for part or full time for such purposes. The projects will be reviewed by the Dean of the Graduate School and submitted by him to the University Research Board. When approved, the salaries of the individuals concerned, for part or full time as the case may be, for 1944-1945 will be transferred to the special nonrecurring appropriation herein mentioned. The amounts of their salaries thus transferred will be eliminated from the budgets of the departments to which they are attached. Their names will be retained in those budgets with the indication that their salaries, in whole or in part, for 1944-1945 are paid from the special nonrecurring University Research Fund.

This arrangement will not in any way modify the commitment of the University to these individuals as expressed in present appointments or the moral obligation of the University for renewal of their appointments at their termi-

nation.

In future budgets in which the continuation or renewal of the appointments of the individuals concerned is to be dealt with, new funds must be provided for these salaries in the budgets of the departments to which the individuals are attached.

With the advice of the University Research Board, the Dean of the Graduate School will be responsible for the activities of the research staff thus created for 1944-1945, and in consultation with the Deans and Directors concerned, an attempt will be made to give every member of the staff a reasonable service load of teaching and research.

For the purpose of carrying out the above plan, I recommend the appropriation of \$50,000 from the General Reserve Fund.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Davis, Mr. Jensen.

SABBATICAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR C. V. DONOVAN

(5) Professor C. V. Donovan of the Department of Art requests a sabbatical leave of absence for the second semester of 1944-1945 (six months from March 1, 1945), with pay, in accordance with the University Statutes. He wishes to spend this time investigating methods and technical approaches being used in other schools in the United States in the field of advertising design, with the view of strengthening the University's work in commercial design, which is under his immediate supervision. He also plans to spend a part of the time in painting and study. The department can make provision for his teaching program during the period of his absence without additional expense to the University.

It is to the University's advantage to have him take his sabbatical leave next year rather than at some future time. Professor Donovan has been a member of the faculty for twenty-five years. I recommend approval.

RESIGNATION OF DEAN H. M. MARJERISON

(6) Dean H. M. Marjerison has submitted his resignation as Professor and Dean of the College of Dentistry, effective September I, 1944, to accept the position of Associate Director of the Forsyth Dental Infirmary for Children in Boston, Massachusetts. His letter of resignation follows:

MY DEAR MR. PRESIDENT:

I am herewith submitting my resignation as Dean of the College of Dentistry and Professor of Dentistry, to accept a position as Associate Director of the Forsyth Dental Infirmary for Children in Boston, Massachusetts, the resignation

to become effective September 1, 1944.

My decision to leave the University of Illinois is based on the fact that I have been associated for a number of years with the Forsyth as Trustee, and that the opportunity which is offered to me at this institution is unusual in the field of dentistry. I know of no other deanship which would attract me from the University of Illinois, inasmuch as I believe that one of the greatest possibilities in the country exists here to develop dentistry as a university discipline.

May I express to you my deep appreciation for your counsel and support

during my term of office, and to all administrative officers of the University with

whom it has been a pleasure and privilege to be associated.

I recommend that this resignation be accepted.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this recommendation was adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to record in the minutes and send to Dean Marjerison the following expression of the Board's appreciation of his services:

Dean Marjerison brought to the College of Dentistry and the University of Illinois a broad viewpoint and program which envisaged the development of dental education and research as a university discipline. In his four years with

the University he has implemented his program in a variety of ways which represents a permanent contribution to the University. His leaving represents a

RECOMMENDATIONS RELATING TO PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(7) The Faculty Committee on Patents submits the following report:

I. Professor J. R. Fellows of the Department of Mechanical Engineering has requested that an application be authorized for a patent on the special refractory shapes to be used to form the baffle wall and air passage and combustion chamber in the Illinois smokeless furnace which he has designed. It is the judgment of the Committee that the discovery is an improvement of such a nature that it should be protected by a patent if possible. The Committee recommends that the Board of Trustees authorize an application for a patent on this improvement. Patents have already been secured on two smokeless burners he has developed.

2. Professor D. W. Kerst of the Department of Physics has asked that application be made for patent protection in Canada and Great Britain on the magnetic induction accelerator (the betatron) he has invented and developed. An application for a United States patent was filed in the United States Patent Office on May 4, 1944 (Serial No. 534,060). Application for foreign protection under the International law must be filed within one year from May 4, 1944. Professor Kerst is of the opinion that the most likely foreign markets for the betatron after the war will be in Great Britain and Canada and that the British and Canadians are much interested in using the betatron. Patents have been taken in his name on related discoveries in Canada, Great Britain, New Zealand, and other countries.

The Committee recommends that the Board of Trustees authorize an application for patent protection in Great Britain and Canada.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these applications were authorized as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR LECTURES

(8) On February 24, 1944 (Minutes, page 871), the Board on my recommendation made a special appropriation of \$2,000 for lectures on topics of current interest by nationally known speakers. During the semester just ended, a series of five lectures has been given (see list below). They were well attended and the series created much interest. In some instances the lectures created strong protests on the part of a number of members of the staff. A careful review of the situation does not indicate that this fact should deter the University from presenting lecturers who can express different points of view on controversial issues, since the discussion of some such subjects affords one of the most effective means of bringing the students and the staff of the University into close relation with current affairs.

Accordingly, I recommend that the series be continued for the year 1944-1945, again without any permanent commitment, and that a special nonrecurring appropriation of \$3,000 be made for this purpose from the General Reserve.

APPROPRIATION TO UNIVERSITY CONCERT AND ENTERTAINMENT BOARD

(9) The University Concert and Entertainment Board desires to invite to the University of Illinois during the year 1944-1945 the Pro Arte Quartet for a series of concerts. This Quartet is one of the finest string organizations in the United States. It is in residence at the University of Wisconsin for eight months of the year, the members of the Quartet being given faculty status. The University of Wisconsin would be willing to make this Quartet available to the University of Illinois for a limited number of concerts.

The program would have to be subsidized, because while the concerts would be open to the public it is not likely that the ticket sales would be sufficient to cover the expenses. On the other hand, the concerts would be of definite educational value and from that point of view the University would be justified in assuming some of the expense. I am, therefore, recommending that an appropriation of \$500 be made from the General Reserve Fund to the University Concert and Entertainment Board to match Star Course funds to cover any deficiencies, provided that if the deficiency exceeds \$1,000 the Star Course will take care of the additional amount from its accumulated funds.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Davis, Mr.

LIGHTING SYSTEM FOR RESEARCH IN AGRONOMY GREENHOUSE

(10) Professor W. L. Burlison, Head of the Department of Agronomy, and Dean H. P. Rusk of the College of Agriculture, recommend the installation of electric lights in the east-central section of the Agronomy Greenhouse for use in research work in small grain breeding. In this work, proper control of light through the entire 24-hour period is essential. By the installation of these lights the efficiency of the Greenhouse can be greatly increased for this research

The Agronomy Department has accumulated a reserve of income in excess of budget appropriations and expenditures which amounts to about \$10,000. It is recommended that the appropriation of \$1,600 required for the lighting system

be made from this reserve.

The Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant Department have checked the proposal and concur in it. I concur and recommend approval.

APPROPRIATION FOR DEFICIT IN ILLINI UNION BUILDING

(12) As has been indicated from time to time to the Board, the marked decrease in enrollment on the Urbana campus has had a serious effect on the financial operations of the Illini Union Building. The activities of this building are divided into two categories: (a) income-producing activities, such as food service, bowling alley, and billiard room, and (b) general building.

Income-producing activities are expected to meet all expenses out of their

own income, including pro-rata charge of utilities and a charge for rental of the

space occupied by them, and a reserve for replacement of equipment.

The general building account provides the general services of the nonincome-producing portion of the building, debt service on the entire building, and provision for replacement of general furnishings. A reserve also has been necessary for general taxes assessed against the building. In the past all such expenditures have been financed from the building service charges paid by students or appropriated by the University to cover staff and exemptions.

Through the year 1942-1943 the budget of the building was maintained on a balanced basis in accordance with the foregoing principles. For the year 1943-1944 the income from student fees dropped to 40% of what it was in 1941-1942.

1944 the income from student tees dropped to 40% or what it was in 1941-1942. As a result, the operation of the building, after providing reserves for replacements and taxes, shows a deficit of approximately \$50,000 as of June 30, 1944. For the year 1944-1945 a budget has been prepared showing a net deficit of about \$55,000, which may be further increased if the Navy activities are withdrawn from the building as a result of the termination of the Signal School. This figure again allows for a reserve for general taxes of \$17,000 a year, which reserve is necessary until the matter is finally settled by the Supreme Court. The budget of each year includes the sum of \$25,000 paid on the principal Court. The budget of each year includes the sum of \$25,000 paid on the principal of the debt of the building, title to which will shortly be transferred to the University as a result of refinancing arrangements recently concluded.

The budget of the building also includes approximately \$7,700 for the social program over and above the income received from that program through the use of the Ballroom.

It has been the intention from the beginning that this building would be made self-maintaining and self-liquidating. If the enrollment of the University had continued as it was when the building was opened there is little doubt but that that result would have been achieved. It is reasonable to assume that a balanced budget can be accomplished again when the Urbana enrollment returns to a normal basis. In the meantime, the University faces the necessity of assisting temporarily with the financial obligations or permitting the debt obligations to go into default. All payments on the principal of the indebtedness increase the equity of the University in the building, which equity eventually will be completed

The Union has accumulated a substantial sum for replacement of equipment. There is also a considerable reserve relating to taxes which may not be required. Consequently, the cash operation of the building does not require that the entire deficit of the current two years be provided from outside sources, since

a substantial amount can be provided by loans from these reserves.

In view of these circumstances, the Comptroller proposes and I recommend that an appropriation of \$50,000 be made from the General Reserve of the University to apply toward the deficits of the Illini Union Building for the current biennium, 1943-1945, with the understanding that when the operations of the building show a net surplus which would be available for the repayment of these sums, they be repaid to the University from this surplus. It should be noted that these payments will be made out of the General University Income Fund from its students and other general income and not out of any appropriations from state tax revenues.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Davis, Mr. Tensen.

HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL INSURANCE

(13) The Occidental Life Insurance Company has offered to continue our present hospital and medical insurance for the year beginning October 5, 1944, for students and staff on the Urbana campus, providing the present benefits for the following periods and premiums: 16 weeks at \$4.75; 12 weeks at \$3.50; 8 weeks

at \$2.37 $\frac{1}{2}$; 4 weeks at \$1.20.

On August 31, 1943, the Board of Trustees approved placing this insurance with the Occidental Life Insurance Company through the Atwood Agency at \$4.75 per student per semester for 16 weeks. Based on last year's response to our request for quotations, it is not likely that a lower premium or greater benefits would be obtained by again asking for quotations, especially in view of the fact that we anticipate a smaller number of students. This company does not require the University to guarantee any definite percentage of any group. Many companies stipulate that 75% of the entire group, other than students, shall be insured. The Occidental Company secured permission of the State Department of Insurance to issue the specialized policy we require. Any other company would likewise have to secure such permission. Occidental has offered to continue the coverage for an additional year at the same premium rates as at present in spite of a probable further drop in enrollment. The service rendered by this company and the agent has been especially satisfactory.

The cost of this premium will be met from the special hospital and medical

service fees collected from students and staff.

This proposal is recommended by the Dean of Students, the Purchasing Agent, and the Comptroller. I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the acceptance of this proposal was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR RENTAL OF TABULATING MACHINES

(14) The Comptroller requests authorization for the rental of tabulating machines at a cost of \$10,843.20, for the use of the Business Office Tabulating Division, from the International Business Machines Corporation, for the year

July 1, 1944, to June 30, 1945.

Competitive bids were not asked, as the tabulating systems are built up around International Business Machines equipment and no other machines can be used. These machines are available on a rental basis only. This is the total cost for the year on the equipment now in our possession and will be subject to change as equipment is changed during the year. This is merely a continuation of present arrangements. This service is operated as a revolving account and is charged to departments at cost.

The Comptroller and Secretary request authority of the Board to execute

such a contract. I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the execution of these contracts was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASES RECOMMENDED

(15) The Comptroller recommends that the following purchases submitted by

the Purchasing Agent be authorized:

Eighteen cars baled shavings, for the Animal Husbandry and Dairy Husbandry Departments, to be delivered as follows: One car July, 1944; two cars a month from August, 1944, to March, 1945, inclusive; one car April, 1945. It is recommended that this order be placed with P. M. Brennan & Company, Chicago, at their price of \$3,420, f.o.b. Urbana. Bids were also requested from Frank Miller & Sons and from the Shavings and Sawdust Company, both in Chicago, but the Brennan Company is the only bidder.

2. Ten items of precious metals, for the Student Supply Store (Chicago Departments), for student course outfits to be issued to A.S.T.P., N.C.T.P., and civilian students. It is recommended that the order be placed with the lowest bidder on the respective items as follows: Thomas J. Dee, \$230.82; General Refineries, \$2,939.00; I. Stern, \$183.50;—total, \$3,353.32.

CLINICAL FACULTY OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE AND ILLINOIS EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY FOR 1944-1945

(19) A recommendation that the following appointments be made to the nonsalaried faculty of the College of Medicine and the Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary for the academic year beginning September 1, 1944; and that the President of the University be authorized to make such additional appointments and other changes as are desirable and necessary.

All appointments are for one year from September I, 1944, unless other-

wise indicated (see page 20).

A summary by departments of the number of appointments and the comparative figures for 1943-1944 is also submitted (see page 29).

On motion of Mr. Jensen, these appointments were made and authority was granted as recommended.

DEANSHIP OF COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

(20) Under the Statutes of the University, deans and directors are appointed for a term of two years, usually coinciding with the biennium. This term appointment in no way affects the tenure of such officers as professors; it limits, however, their tenure as administrators to a period of two years,

In connection with the submission of the University budget for 1944-1945, I

wish to advise the Board that I have informed Dean Thomas E. Benner of the College of Education that he will not be recommended for reappointment as Dean of the College at the expiration of his present two-year term as Dean. This action will not affect his tenure as Professor of Education.

This report was received for record.

CIVIL SERVICE SALARY SCALES

Mr. Jensen, for the Committee on Civil Service and Employees, presented a recommendation of the University Civil Service Committee.

PRESIDENT WILLARD:

On behalf of the University Civil Service Committee, we transmit to you herewith for consideration and action by yourself and the Board of Trustees, a revised compensation plan for the University civil service, consisting of a revised schedule of minimum and maximum salaries for the various classifications in the University civil service.

With the exception of the 10% increase in maximum salaries up to \$3,000 effected at the beginning of this biennium, adjustments to meet changes in prevailing wage rates and minor changes in other instances, the schedule in effect up to this time has been that presented to the Board on June 20, 1942, page

933, and approved by the Board on July 25, 1942, page 32.

During the past few months the Committee has carried out a thorough study of classifications in relation to existing conditions and has consulted departments which are primarily concerned. The proposed schedule provides for adjustments to meet changes that have taken place since the original schedule was prepared, covers new classifications found to be necessary, and coordinates scales of pay of comparable positions. A total of 19 ranges of pay are provided, and the 243 classifications are grouped under these 19 scales. The salaries stated include the values of any benefits allowed such as meals, room, or other services, and therefore represent the total allowable compensation, whether paid in cash or in some other form.

The University Civil Service Committee recommends the approval of this

revised compensation plan as of July 1, 1944.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At this point, the Executive Committee went into executive session, and considered matters presented by the President of the University.

OFFICE OF NONACADEMIC PERSONNEL

(21) Since the revision of the State civil service law in 1941, placing the responsibility for University civil service under the Board of Trustees, the problem of an adequate organization for this phase of our work has been under consideration. During this period, as in former years, the administrative responsibility has been carried under the Comptroller, Mr. C. A. Webber having been in immediate charge in addition to his other duties as Bursar.

The Comptroller now recommends that a new administrative office be established to deal with this entire matter, the head of that office to be responsible directly to the President, the exact title to be determined later. The duties of this officer would include supervision of the University civil service system under policies to be established by the University Civil Service Committee with the approval of the Board, recruitment and employment, testing and training, labor relations and wage administration, job analysis, classification and rating, employee welfare, safety, health, and personnel studies.

This proposal was submitted recently to the University Council of Deans, Directors, and faculty members, and, after thorough discussion, was approved

in principle by that body.

For the purpose of carrying this recommendation into effect, I recommend that the sum of \$10,000 be set aside in the budget for 1944-1945 to cover the salary of the proposed new officer and such additional staff and expenses as may be found necessary in the immediate future. I also recommend that when this new officer is appointed the staff and expense budgets of the Personnel Division of the Business Office, both in Urbana and Chicago, be transferred to the new office.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

RESIGNATION OF PROVOST ALBERT J. HARNO AND PROVISION FOR LEGAL SERVICES

(22) For many years Dean Albert J. Harno of the College of Law has also held the position of Provost of the University, which he has filled with great ability and distinction. He has submitted his resignation as Provost effective September 1, 1944, but will continue as Dean of the College of Law and Pro-

fessor of Law as in the past. I recommend acceptance of the resignation.

The retirement of Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson and the absence of N. D. Hodges in military service leaves the administration without provision for handling routine legal services. I therefore recommend that the President be authorized, as a temporary arrangement, to call on Dean Harno for such legal advice and service to University officers and the Board of Trustees as may be requested by the President. In view of this service, I further recommend that no change be made in Dean Harno's present compensation of \$10,000 a year. It is understood that the Board will indicate from time to time whom it wishes to handle specific legal problems.

A recommendation for a successor to the position of Provost will be made

to the Board of Trustees at a later date.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, this resignation was accepted, and the Secretary was instructed to make record in the minutes of the Board's appreciation of Dean Harno's services as Provost, and to notify him

On motion of Mr. Jensen, compensation of A. J. Harno as Dean of the College of Law for one year and Professor of Law on indefinite tenure was fixed at \$10,000 a year, and the President of the University was authorized to call on Dean Harno for routine legal services as he may find it necessary; the Board reserving the right to select counsel for specific legal problems.

DEPARTMENT OF AERONAUTICAL ENGINEERING

(23) The College of Engineering has recommended the establishment of a separate Department of Aeronautical Engineering and the offering of a curriculum in Aeronautical Engineering effective at the beginning of the academic year 1944-1945 or as soon thereafter as the new department and curriculum can be organized.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize this new department. No action on the curriculum is being recommended at this time, but it will be presented to the Board for final approval when it has been set up and passed upon

by the University Senate, in accordance with the University Statutes.

I further recommend the appointment of Henry Sheldon Stillwell as Associate Professor of Aeronautical Engineering and Head of the Department beginning November I, 1944, and continuing through August 31, 1945, at an annual salary of \$5,000, to be paid from the appropriation for airport operation.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this department was established and the appointment made as recommended.

RETIREMENT OF PROFESSOR H. A. RUEHE

(24) Professor H. A. Ruehe, Professor of Dairy Manufactures and Head of the Department of Dairy Husbandry, has requested that he be retired from active service effective October 1 and that he be given the rank of Professor *Emeritus*. He is not requesting a retiring allowance at this time, but the matter of an annuity is one for the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois to determine, on formal application.

Professor Ruehe has been a member of the faculty since July 5, 1912, and has been head of the Department of Dairy Husbandry since 1921. He is 56 years old. The Dean of the College recommends approval of his request and I

concur.

This matter was referred to a special committee consisting of Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, and Mr. Jensen, for study and recommendation.

DEAN OF COLLEGE OF COMMERCE AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

(25) I recommend that Professor Hiram T. Scovill, Professor of Accountancy, Head of the Department of Business Organization and Operation, and Acting Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration since March, 1942, be appointed Professor of Accountancy on indefinite tenure and Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration, effective September 1, 1944, at a salary of \$8,750.

Action on this matter was deferred for consideration by the entire Board; with the understanding that Professor Scovill should continue as Acting Dean.

REAPPROPRIATION OF UNEXPENDED BALANCE OF PHYSICAL PLANT OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

(26) The accounts for Physical Plant Operation and Maintenance, Urbana and Chicago, show unexpended balances of about \$64,000 as of June 30. Work in process at that time was estimated at \$31,570, payable out of this balance. The remainder is unexpended and unencumbered, due to the difficulty of securing labor and material during the past year.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department has submitted a schedule

The Director of the Physical Plant Department has submitted a schedule of renewals and replacements needed at this time, but which have been omitted from the 1944-1945 budget in favor of other items more pressing. A summary of that list is attached. It is obvious that the unexpended balance above-mentioned in excess of work now in process could easily be expended for other

needed work.

In view of these facts, the Director recommends, and I concur, that the entire unexpended balance of Physical Plant Operation and Maintenance funds as at June 30, 1944, be reappropriated for use during the fiscal year 1944-1945.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these balances were reappropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Davis, Mr. Jensen.

COAL CONTRACT FOR URBANA DEPARTMENTS, 1944-1945

(27) The Purchasing Agent submitted to twenty-three concerns specifications and requests for bids for the coal supply of 21,000 tons for Urbana for the coming season. He also ran advertisements in Chicago papers. Two proposals were received, only one of which met University specifications and requirements. This proposal was from the Lafayette Coal Company, Chicago, for 10,550 tons at a price of \$1.60 a ton, f.o.b. mine, Livingston, Illinois, freight \$1.30, delivered cost \$2.90.

The Purchasing Agent, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend that this offer be accepted and the contract approved subject to the approval of the Governor, in accordance with the State constitution.

The Comptroller .commented on this matter. On motion of Mr. Davis, this contract was authorized as recommended.

REPORT OF PROGRESS ON AIRPORT CONSTRUCTION

(28) Professor James J. Doland, Supervising Engineer for the University on Airport Construction, submits the following report of progress since the last report (third) made to the Board on April 8, 1944:

President A. C. Willard:

July 13, 1944

Since May 29, 1944, the date of my last formal report to you, the following items represent the principal developments in the progress of construction of the University of Illinois Airport:

1. Agreement with Two Mile Slough Drainage District.

The agreement with the Two Mile Slough Drainage District was completed and the papers have been placed in the official files of the Board of Trustees.

2. Purchase of Ross Property.

The purchase of the Ross property.

The purchase of the Ross property has been completed, but I understand from Mr. Reno, attorney for Mr. Ross, that the money has not yet been paid.

3. Negotiations for Somers Property.

I have carried on a long series of negotiations with the Somers family in

regard to the right of way for the western drainage outlet. After being assured that the Somers were willing to sell the necessary right of way, I was informed yesterday that they would only permit passage through their land if 1400 feet of 54-inch pipe and 1300 feet of open ditch would constitute the drainage channel. This matter is to be discussed on July 10th in Urbana with Mr. Newton Farr and Mr. Amos Watts. I have already handed you a detailed report on the above negotiations to date.

In anticipation of the possible need for the procurement of other right of way, I contacted on July 7th, Mr. George Reifsteck who owns the land just south of the Somers farm. Mr. Reifsteck is not disposed to permit the ditch to go through his property. The entire matter of the last one-half mile of right

of way for the western drainage is still very much up in the air.

Mr. Watts and Mr. Farr were here on July 10th, and after conferences with the Somers family, we felt that a satisfactory agreement had been reached. But I was advised unofficially on July 12th that the July 10th agreement was not satisfactory to the owner of the farm.

4. Western Drainage.

In regard to the whole problem of western drainage, the C.A.A. refused to

approve the installation of a pipe channel for the half-mile of the western drainage outlet. Efforts were made through Senator Lucas to persuade them to reverse their decision. This, they refused to do, and consequently, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees authorized me to advise the C.A.A. that the University would pay the difference in cost in an amount equivalent to approximately \$27,000. This figure would include \$20,000 of money not then appropriated and \$7,000 of money already appropriated by the Board. I decided to make an offer less than the one authorized, and therefore, told the C.A.A. that the University would contribute a gross amount of \$20,000. This amount would include \$13,000 of new money and \$7,000 of money already appropriated. The offer was formally made by you in a telegram and a letter to the C.A.A. It is recommended that the \$19,000 approved by the Executive Committee on June 30th and on July 13th be allowed to stand, in order to cover contingencies which are bound to arise in the settlement of the Somers controversy. Official acceptance of the offer made to the C.A.A. has not yet been received, but there is every reason to believe that it will be accepted.

5. Progress Reports. I arranged with Professor Huntington and Dr. Peck to have Mr. Tigrak and Mr. Uyanik make daily reports on construction progress. This has been done and copies are on file in this office and in your office. The construction is proceeding on schedule, but the contractor is having considerable difficulty with C.A.A. inspectors. Steps are being taken by the contractors to improve this relationship.

Zoning.

The ordinance covering the zoning of the airport was approved by the Illinois Aeronautics Commission and passed by the Champaign County Board of Supervisors on June 12, 1944.

7. Seeding and Sodding.

Attempts have been made to get the C.A.A. to express a definite program

for the seeding and sodding of the airport. This item was not included in the general contract for the reason that Mr. H. E. Horner of the C.A.A. felt that the work should be done by the College of Agriculture. Correspondence with Mr. Phillips Moore, Chief Engineer of the C.A.A., indicates that the C.A.A. is not yet ready to move on this item.

8. Army.

The Commanding General at Chanute Field has initiated a letter stating the requirements and facilities which they will need on completion of the landing strips and taxiways. These requirements include a control tower and night lighting. I contacted the Building and Grounds Section of the Army Air Force Headquarters in Washington by telephone and they agreed to give the request expeditious and sympathetic handling when the letter reaches that office through channels. I also contacted a military representative of the Facilities Committee of the War Production Board by telephone in regard to probability of the issuance of priorities for the construction of the control tower. His advice was that the priorities would be granted if military necessity were shown and provided the request did not include non-essential buildings.

9. Progress Photographs.

I have arranged with the military authorities at Chanute Field to take air views of the construction work on the 1st and 15th of each month. They will furnish us with two prints of each picture taken. The first pictures were taken on July 1, 1944, but no prints have as yet been received.

10. Water Supply.

The Cooke Contracting Company has developed a well which gives promise of producing 250 gallons per minute. I, therefore, stopped any further exploration or development by the University, because I anticipate that the water supply can best be procured by purchasing the well from the contractors after they finish their construction operations. The well is located on Illinois Central right of way and costs approximately \$1,800, not including the pump.

This report was received for record.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

JULY 25, 1944

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University Club, Chicago, at II a.m. on Tuesday, July 25, 1944. All the members of the Executive Committee were present: Mr. Park Livingston, Chairman, General Chester R. Davis, and Mr. Frank A. Jensen, members of the Committee; also, during parts of the session, Mr. John R. Fornof and Mr. Orville M. Karraker, members of the Board; also Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Mr. C. S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant Department, and Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson, Professor of Law.

SETTLEMENT OF WRIGHT ESTATE

The Comptroller presented the following statement.

Judge Sveinbjorn Johnson submits with his approval, on request of R. F. Mc-Cormick and H. D. Fisk, executors of the estate of Harry G. Wright, a receipt which the Board of Trustees is asked to execute covering the payment of \$21,020.24 as the balance due the University from the above estate in accordance with a report of a special committee on the Wright Estates (Minutes, August 31, 1943, page 500, and resolution of October 29, 1943, page 745). When this payment is made the University will have received from these estates the total sum of \$156,104.24 made up as follows:

AGREEMENT

Wright, deceased, of the sum of Twenty-one Thousand Twenty and 24/100 Dollars (\$21,020.24), we, the undersigned Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, do hereby agree to pay sixty-five percent (65%) of any additional income taxes assessed against the estate of Harry G. Wright, deceased; and to indemnify and hold harmless the estate of Harry G. Wright, deceased, and R. F. McCormick and H. D. Fisk, as Executors of the last Will and Testament of said Harry G. Wright, or either of them, from sixty-five percent (65%) of any damages, suits, causes of action or claims by the United States of America, or any agency thereof, by reason of any additional assessment of income taxes against said estate.

This agreement shall be binding upon our successors and assigns.

Mr. Fisk, who was introduced for the discussion of this item, stated that in his opinion there would be no further income taxes assessed, and that he had secured releases from all the beneficiaries of the estate of Harry G. Wright, deceased. On motion of Mr. Davis, the Comptroller was authorized to accept a cheque for \$21,020.24 as full payment of the distributive share due the University in the estate of Harry G. Wright, deceased, and the President and the Secretary were authorized to sign a receipt for the same and to execute an agreement to pay sixty-five per cent of any additional income taxes assessed against this estate.

KERST-SERBER PATENT

The Secretary presented a proposal that the University tender the Kerst-Serber discovery (Ser. No. 534,060) to the Government of the United States for its use. The Board heretofore approved the issuance to the Government of the kind of license described in the contract (OEM 241).

Judge Johnson advised against the execution of such a tender, stating that the contract provides for a royalty-free license to the Government, with the right in the University to elect to own and control the patent application subject to applicable acts concerning secrecy in the national interest during the emergency.

On motion of Mr. Jensen, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the University on February 16, 1942, entered into a memorandum of agreement known as Contract OEMsr-241 with the United States of America for carrying on a certain research in its laboratories, which research is therein described and not in this resolution set forth because the contract aforesaid is

"Restricted"; and

Whereas, sundry amendments of said contract have from time to time been made and executed by both parties, the latest of which is dated June I, 1944, which modification continues in full force and effect article 5, paragraphs (a) and (b) of a memorandum of supplemental agreement in relation to the contract aforesaid, to wit, Contract No. OEMsr-24I, wherein it is provided that the University of Illinois shall make a disclosure to the Government of any inventions made in carrying out the subject work and shall designate in writing "which of the said inventions shall have or will be covered by applications or patents filed or caused to be filed by the contractor. The contractor (University) shall have the right . . . to elect whether it or the Government shall file applications for patents or inventions . . ."; and

Whereas, under the contract above described the University has the right of election as heretofore stated and is obligated to inform the United States Government whether it chooses to exercise the right of filing application for a

patent on any such inventions or discoveries;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees exercising the full powers of the Board of Trustees under the charter of the University, that the University retain application for patent, Ser. No. 534,060, filed May 4, 1944, covering magnetic induction accelerator with small X-ray source, which discovery was made by Donald W. Kerst and Robert Serber, and that this resolution, together with the action of the Board of Trustees on February 20, 1943 (Minutes, page 283), and of the Committee on Patents in pursuance thereof, shall be deemed an exercise of right of election by the University; and

Be it further resolved that the University of Illinois, the Board of Trustees, and this Executive Committee acting in its behalf, hereby grant and tender unto the United States of America under and pursuant to the provisions of the contract aforesaid a non-exclusive irrevocable royalty-free license "to make, have made, and use for military, naval, and national defense purposes, and sell or otherwise dispose of in accordance with law, material, and to use processes"

under and pursuant to the discovery hereinbefore described; and

Be it further resolved, subject to the within and foregoing reservations and stipulations, that the University, the Board of Trustees, and this Executive Committee acting in its behalf, agree to the imposition of such secrecy in relation to the discovery and application aforesaid and the use thereof as applicable statutes, executive orders, or directives may authorize or require in the national interest, pursuant to the first paragraph of Sec. 42, Title 35, USCA.

LEASE OF SKATING RINK TO TIME, INC.

The Comptroller presented the following statement.

Time, Inc., publishers of Time, Fortune, Life, and Architectural Forum, is considering the location of a part of its Circulation Department at Champaign-Urbana. It desires to lease space for the coming year, during which time the possibilities of a more permanent location will be studied. It has indicated its desire to lease a substantial portion of the Skating Rink as an office and work space for its clerical force, including the entrance section of the building and about one-half of the arena. The Athletic Association has indicated that it is impracticable to operate the Skating Rink during the coming season, so that the building is available for rental during this year, and such a rental would make it possible to recover fixed expenses.

The matter has been reviewed fully by Director Havens, Director Mills, and Comptroller Morey who have offered the following tentative plan of lease:

1. Tenant to have use of the above area described for the purposes stated, including toilet rooms and other necessary service areas aggregating about 38% of the gross area of the building. The University would have access to the remaining area for storage or other purposes not interfering with the work of the tenant.

2. Tenant to pay all costs of improvements for reconstruction required by it, including improved lighting, additional heating, and installation of temporary partitions. No damage is to be permitted to the floor of the skating arena.

3. The entire expense of removal of additions and changes made for the

tenant at the end of the lease period will be paid by the tenant.

4. The University would be given access to the records and equipment of the company for research and instructional purposes to the extent feasible.

5. The tenant assumes responsibility for the removal of all waste and debris

resulting from occupancy.

6. The lease will run from approximately September 1, 1944, to not beyond September 1, 1945, with a possibility of month-by-month extension after the latter date with the approval of the University.

7. Financial provisions:

(a) Rental, from which the University will meet all maintenance expense and other fixed charges, and supply heat, water, and janitor service (estimated cost \$3,800 a year), the balance to go to the Athletic Association:

k.w.h. and billed to tenant (estimate)..... Total estimated cost to tenant for the year.....\$12 000

Judge Johnson, Director Havens, and Mr. August Meyer, counsel for Time, Inc., commented on this proposal.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the Comptroller was authorized to negotiate a contract on substantially the basis outlined.

The Executive Committee adjourned.

THE UNIVERSITY BUDGET FOR 1944-1945

(Adopted by the Board of Trustees July 18, 1944, page 5)

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Appropriations for salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1, 1944.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance lapses at that time.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the positions. Such temporary charges may not exceed the amount of time provided by the position unless otherwise approved by the President.

All balances remaining in the salary budget at the end of the term indi-

cated or at August 31, 1945, lapse on those dates.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and other captions except with the approval of the President of the University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be made between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" on written request to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for expense and equipment and for wages are available for one year beginning July I, 1944, and ending June 30, 1945. All unencumbered balances in these appropriations lapse June 30, 1945.

Unless otherwise indicated in the Budget:

1. All appointments begin September 1, 1944.
2. Civil Service (C.S.) appointments are for one year. Appointees to stenographic and clerical positions are assigned to departments at the convenience of the University. The University reserves the right to change such assignments during the year if the needs of the University and of the Departments require such action.

3. The service required under appointments to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Semester. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Associate and above are paid in twelve equal monthly installments; salaries of other ranks, in ten equal monthly installments. Salaries of part-time assistants are paid in eight equal monthly installments.

4. The service required in all positions in experiment stations and bureaus of research, and in research positions in other departments, is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance of one month for vacations, and salaries are paid

in twelve equal monthly installments.

5. The service required in all other positions-administrative, clerical, and service positions—is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments. Symbols:

A—Indefinite tenure. B—Two years from September 1, 1943. D-One year from September 1, 1944. E-Ten months from September 1, 1944. F-Eight months from October 1, 1944. G—Special tenure. H—July 1, 1944, to June 30, 1945. (All wage items fall in this group.)

C.S.—Subject to University Civil

Service rules.

Part-time: When any of the above symbols is combined with a number, the number indicates the fraction of time in per cent covered by the position.
