MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

January 25, 1947



The January meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Saturday, January 25, 1947, at the University Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

11:30 a.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell. Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the Board early in the forenoon. On invitation of the Board, Mrs.

Doris S. Holt, Trustee-elect, was present during the day.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, Mr. Ernest L. Stouffer, Architect, Mr. Howard A. Hazleton, Business Manager of the Chicago Colleges, and Mr. Norval D. Hodges, Assistant Legal Counsel. Professor Phillips Bradley, Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations, was present during part of the day.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of December 28,

On motion of Mr. Davis, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 191 to 214 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the items on the agenda and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR PURCHASE OF CLARK PROPERTY

(1) On June 30, 1945 (Minutes, page 506), the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of the so-called Clark property in Urbana adjoining the property at the corner of Goodwin and Green Streets (Fay property) acquired for the apartment building project. At that time it was expected that the property could be secured for \$25,000, and an appropriation providing this amount was made. There was an appropriation of \$60,000 for the Fay property but only \$55,095 was required.

A further resolution indicating the necessity of this purchase was approved by the Board on August 29, 1945 (Minutes, page 633), this resolution being necessary to enable the Conservator for the owner of the Clark property to

apply for a permit to sell.

The court has made an independent survey of the value of this property, as a result of which it appears that the cost will be between \$35,000 and \$40,000. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller feel that this addition is necessary to provide the minimum amount of ground necessary for the apartment project and request an additional appropriation of \$10,000, or so much thereof as may prove to be necessary, which, together with the unused balance from the Fay property, should be sufficient to cover the outside possible cost of the Clark property.

I concur and recommend such an appropriation from the General Reserve

Fund.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and recommendation to the Board.

PURCHASE OF KNIPP PROPERTY

(2) A recommendation from the Faculty Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures that the residence of Professor C. T. Knipp at 1003 West Nevada Street, Urbana, be purchased, and that an appropriation of \$20,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made for the purchase and remodeling of this property.

This property is in the range of development of future women's residence halls, being two properties removed from our present holdings and immediately adjoining the forestry on the north. The original price asked was \$22,000, but a tentative offer of \$19,000 was made by University representatives, which offer the owners have indicated they would accept. The price is reasonable as compared with other purchases made by the University.

It is proposed to use this property for the remainder of 1947 and to September, 1948, for faculty housing. At that time it will be assigned to the Bureau of Educational Research, since by that time the Bureau must be found a new location to replace its present location in Gregory Hall which will be required for other purposes.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and recommendation to the Board (see page 219 below).

SALE OF LAND IN ROSELAWN CEMETERY

(3) The Board of Trustees has approved disposing of the University's holdings in Roselawn Cemetery at a price sufficient to recover the University's investment and expenses incurred in holding the property, and has referred the matter to the Finance Committee, which reports as follows:

The Board of Trustees has referred to the Finance Committee for recommendation the problem of disposing of land owned by the University in Roselawn Cemetery near Champaign. The Board had previously indicated that the University should "recover its present investment and expenses incurred in

holding this property" (Minutes, February 24, 1945, page 364).

Since that time continued efforts have been made by University officers to secure an offer which would accomplish this result. This has not been found possible. The best offer received is from Russell L. Earl of Champaign to buy all land owned by the University in the Cemetery, consisting of 789 quarter lots, 239 single lots, and a small, unplatted area in the northwest corner for a purchase price of \$14,000, payable, cash on execution of contract, \$5,000, balance within three years with 3% interest on the unpaid balance, a contract to be drawn mutually satisfactory to the University and the purchaser.

On this basis, the University would not realize its complete investment expenses by \$2,204.15. However, it has not been necessary to expend any part of the appropriation of \$2,220 made by the Board for improvement of the Cemetery

in May, 1945; consequently, that expense has been saved.

The Legal Counsel has advised that it is not possible for the University to attempt to recover any land, in which interments have been made or use any vacant lots now or formerly owned by the University, for building purposes. For that reason, it seems highly desirable to dispose of the University's holdings at the earliest possible date.

The Finance Committee recommends that the offer of Russell L. Earl for the purchase of this land be accepted and the officers of the Board authorized to

conclude a contract and execute all necessary documents.

FRANK H. McKelvey, Acting Chairman CHESTER R. DAVIS K. E. WILLIAMSON

The President recommended that this offer be accepted.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this sale was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell; no, none: absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson.

LEASE OF NAVY PIER AND PURCHASE OF NAVY EQUIPMENT

(4) Officers of the University have been negotiating a lease with officials of the City of Chicago for a portion of Navy Pier for use by the Chicago Undergraduate Division. They have also been discussing with them and with officials of the Navy Department a basis for purchase of certain equipment left on the Pier by the Navy, which the University needs. Complete agreement has now been reached

by representatives of all parties, the principal conditions of which are:

1. The lease of approximately 373,350 square feet of space at a rental of \$115,000 for the 11 months ending June 30, 1947, and \$117,000 a year thereafter, from August 1, 1946, to June 30, 1951, with renewal privilege for three ad-

ditional years.

2. The University is to pay for electricity, gas, water, and heat.
3. The University is to pay \$1,120 a year in lieu of insurance, and to provide

public liability insurance protection to the City.

4. The University is to pay the cost of restoration of the Pier to the condition when Navy took possession, which is estimated at \$200,000, the sum of \$100,000, to be deposited in escrow with the First National Bank of Chicago on the signing of the lease, and an additional \$100,000 on or before August I,

5. All equipment left on the Pier by the Navy Department to be sold by the City to the University for the sum of \$85,000, with the provision that the University may sell surplus equipment and credit proceeds against this payment to an amount not in excess of \$22,000, any realization in excess of this amount to be paid to the City. The University will use at least seventy-five per cent of this property.

I recommend that this lease and purchase be approved, that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the lease when approved by the Legal Counsel, and that the Comptroller be authorized to conclude the purchase of equipment from the Navy as described, with the understanding that immediate sale of equipment not wanted for educational purposes be made.

During the presentation of this item, Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the Board.

Mr. Morey, Mr. Britton, and Mr. Hodges commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the lease was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ARCHITECTURAL AND ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR APARTMENT BUILDING

(5) On June 30, 1945, the Board of Trustees authorized the employment of architectural and engineering firms for designing and planning buildings and other permanent improvements in the University's building program for 1945-1947. This authorization included employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, Chicago, as architects for an apartment building for married students. A contract for professional services was executed as of August 6 1945.

Subsequently the University's housing plans changed. The sudden termination of World War II necessitated providing quickly a great deal of housing for both married and unmarried veterans. Available funds were used for installation of temporary housing secured through the Federal Public Housing Authority. Work on the plans for the permanent apartment building project was suspended after Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill had already done some preliminary work for which the firm has been paid \$1,604.84.

Recently the apartment building project has become again active due to the interest of lending agencies in financing it. Therefore, the contract with Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, which had been suspended, has been reactivated.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the continuation of these services was approved.

INSTALLATION OF PRESIDENT

(6) A request that the Board of Trustees authorize ceremonies for the installation of the President of the University, and appropriate funds to cover the cost of the same.

A two-day affair would be in order, with one day devoted to ceremonies in Chicago in which the Chicago Professional Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy and the Undergraduate Division at Navy Pier would participate, and the other the formal inaugural on the following day at Urbana-Champaign. On both occasions it would be appropriate to have addresses by distinguished educators, scientists, and public officials. It is difficult to make an accurate estimate of the cost, but an appropriation of \$10,000 is suggested.

It is proposed also to have a meeting of the Citizens Advisory Committee on the day following the installation, to sum up, in terms of interest of the entire state, the significance of the ceremonies.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Williamson.

The President of the University was authorized to make all arrangements, in conference with committees of the Board, the Faculty, and the Citizens Committee.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(7) The faculty council and advisory committee on the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations recommends the appointment of an advisory committee of five representatives each from labor, management, and the public. I have asked Dr. Phillips Bradley to present this matter to the Board.

Dr. Bradley presented the names of the proposed members, and explained the method of selection.

After discussion, President Stoddard suggested that Dr. Bradley, in conference with the faculty council, revise the list so that it does not contain more than one person from any company or city (except Chicago), and to recommend varying terms for the first appointees. looking toward a regular term of three years, with one member from each group appointed each year, with alphabetical rotation within each of the groups.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was requested to submit the revised personnel of this committee to the Executive Committee for approval.

PURCHASE OF KNIPP PROPERTY

At this point, Mr. McKelvey reported that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds approved the purchase of the Knipp property as recommended (see page 216 above).

On motion of Mr. Davis, this recommendation was adopted (subject to confirmation of the appraisal), and an appropriation of \$20,000 was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer. Mr. Nickell; no. none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Williamson.

CONDEMNATION OF LAND

Professor Britton reported that in the trial of the suit for condemnation of land in Urbana to be used as a site for the Chemical Engineering Building, the jury had returned a verdict placing valuations on the property at 606 South Mathews Avenue at \$45,000 and on that at 1201-1203 West California Avenue at \$42,750, a total of \$87,750.

After discussion, on motion of Mr. Fornot, the Executive Committee was authorized to take all necessary and advisable action in this matter pending the next meeting of the Board.

OPEN SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board continued, in open session, its consideration of matters presented by the President of the University.

ARCHITECTS FOR BUILDING PROGRAM FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(1) The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends that contracts be made with the following architectural firms:

I. Shaw, Naess, and Murphy, Chicago.—Preparation of building studies and detailed working drawings to the extent funds will permit for the student resi-

dence halls for the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy.

This is an outstanding architectural firm in Chicago and has been selected because of its accomplishments in the housing field. This firm has furnished satisfactory services on the new women's residence hall now under construction at Urbana, and its architects are therefore familiar with the University's policies and standards. This will expedite their work.

2. Schweikher and Elting, Melrose Park.—Preparation of plans and specifications on the Experimental Research Building for the Drug Plant Experimental Station near the Morton Arboretum in DuPage County.

This firm has achieved a national reputation in the field of functional archi-

tectural design. The amount of land available for this project, the open and rolling character of the country, and the relation of building requirements to farming and other out-of-door activities point to the desirability of such style of architecture. This firm is located not far from the Drug Plant Experimental Station site. This will make it possible for them to give the project full attention during the construction stages.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these contracts were authorized as recommended.

BUDGET FOR UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION AT GALESBURG, FISCAL YEAR 1946-1947

(2) The internal budget for the new Undergraduate Division of the University at Galesburg for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, and covering appointments for the academic year 1946-1947, is submitted herewith. The budget has been compiled by the Dean, with the assistance of the Business Manager of the Galesburg Division, on estimates supplied by the various educational officers and the general University offices represented there. It has been reviewed in detail by the Director of the Bureau of Institutional Research, who assisted actively in setting up the Division, and has been examined by the Provost and the Comptroller.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR FARM LABOR EXTENSION PROGRAM

(3) Federal funds again have been made available for the Farm Labor Extension Program for the six-month period of January 1, 1947, to June 30, 1947, to be expended through the University Division of Agricultural Extension. The amount which has been made available for this period is \$101,173, and provision for carrying on this program after June 30, 1947, will depend on the action of Congress.

REAPPROPRIATION OF BIENNIAL CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS

(13) Of the total of \$16,809,000 of capital appropriations approved by the General Assembly in 1945, the sum of \$916,606.31 was actually expended as of December

31, 1946. A further sum of \$1,662,891.04 was encumbered. Releases by the Gov-

ernor to that date total \$7,817,077.

Present conditions make it impossible to expend these funds for the projects for which they were appropriated prior to September 30, 1947, when the unexpended balances will lapse unless reappropriated. With the exception of the appropriation of \$38,000 for the telephone extension service, which will be expended in full by the end of the present biennium, and the appropriation of \$140,000 for the purchase of student housing, which will not be used, all of the appropriations are needed for their original purposes and should be kept available.

Bids have recently been taken on some of the projects and bids will be taken within the next few months on others, but few if any can be completed and paid for by September 30, 1947. It is necessary that the funds be reappropriated before the contracts are executed. Hence, it is recommended that the Board authorize a request to the present General Assembly for the reappropriation of balances existing on June 30, 1947, in the several projects remaining uncompleted at that time. The estimated maximum total of reappropriation which may be required is \$15,626,500 (see Schedule A, page 226).

The rate of progress on the various construction projects during the coming biennium will be determined by the amount of labor and material available and the delivery dates on material required. Under present conditions if all projects are initiated at approximately the same time all will proceed at a very slow rate. Certain projects must be completed by September, 1948, if the University is to meets its commitments to maintain the present student enrollment.

In view of these facts, it is necessary to establish a priority with respect to the schedule of construction of all University projects, both those included in present appropriations and those being requested for the coming biennium. I have conferred with the University officers concerned and submit a schedule of priorities which I recommend be adopted (see Schedule B, page 227).

It is noted that all projects are classified under three headings:

AAA—Construction to begin as soon as possible with the expectation that they will be ready for use in the fall of 1948 or earlier.

AA — Construction to begin only as soon as such construction will not interfere

with progress of AAA projects.

A — Construction to begin to the extent that funds become available and at such time as they will not interfere with the progress of either AAA or AA projects. It is doubtful that any of these A projects can be completed during the coming biennium.

The necessity of such priority of construction applies only to Urbana-Champaign. Conditions in Chicago do not require such classification, and all construction projects there may proceed as rapidly as plans are completed and funds made available.

It is understood that architectural and engineering work will proceed on all projects as rapidly as possible, but bids will not be taken until construction conditions permit.

The completion date of all projects will be determined primarily on the availability of brick masons and the delivery of structural steel. Accordingly, it is recommended that orders for steel on AAA projects be placed as rapidly as possible, in advance of the taking of bids for construction of the buildings.

With respect to any contracts and orders executed, it should be recognized that the same situation will exist as was faced with the women's residence hall, namely, that construction may have to be started before sufficient funds are made

available to complete the project.

In order to complete AAA projects in the time indicated, all other local competition must be eliminated in so far as possible. Accordingly, it is recommended that the Natural Resources Board be requested to defer construction of the three buildings for which funds have been appropriated to them, for approximately one year, in consideration of the University's critical needs for completing certain classroom buildings to provide for instruction of veteran students.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were approved and adopted, and priorities were established as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(14) Bids were received in the office of Sargent and Lundy on January 13, 1947, for the construction of additions to the Utilities Distribution System at Urbana, for which an appropriation of \$791,000 was made for the current biennium.

It is recommended that contracts be awarded as follows:

1. Piping in steam distribution tunnels, to William A. Pope Company, Chicago, the only bidder, \$94,038, with escalation clause for maximum increase of 18% over current labor and material prices.

2. Insulation for piping in tunnels, Asbestos and Magnesia Materials Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, \$52,362 (firm bid).

3. Electrical distribution system, A. S. Schulman Company, Chicago, the

lowest bidder, \$133,850, with escalation clause to a maximum of 16.4%.
4. Construction of tunnels and conduits, Warner Construction Company, Chicago, \$354,511. This concern is considered to be the lowest responsible bidder

on the complete program.

The total of these contracts, \$634,761, is within the appropriation for the Utilities Distribution System. The requests for capital appropriations for 1947-1949 include a provision for additional funds for extension of the Utilities Distribution System sufficient to cover the total cost of this project plus additional

services to buildings contemplated in the 1947-1949 building program. Extension of the Utilities Distribution System is necessary to service adequately existing buildings as well as new buildings to be constructed in various

campus areas.

Mr. Stouffer discussed this item and Item 15 together.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these contracts were awarded as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(15) Bids were received on January 21 for construction contracts and for structural steel for the Electrical Engineering Laboratory, for which a State appropriation of \$875,000 is available during the current biennium. A schedule of the bids and a report from the Director of the Physical Plant Department are submitted herewith.

The present estimate of the total cost of this project is \$1,615,775. The Board of Trustees has authorized a request for an additional appropriation of \$5,100,000 to supplement funds appropriated for the current biennium to cover the increased cost of building construction, which includes an allocation of \$325,000 for the Electrical Engineering Laboratory.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the award of contracts, to the lowest bidder in each case, within the total of the present available funds and after allowing for the cost of architectural and engineering services, as follows:

1. John Felmley, Bloomington, Illinois, construction and structural steel, \$401,000, with the provision that an addition to the contract of \$347,600 may be

made at any time prior to August 1, 1947.

2. Carson-Payson Company, Danville, Illinois, heating and ventilating, \$106,-000, with provision for an increase in the total contract up to \$176,954. This

includes a fixed fee of \$19,661.

3. Leverenz Electric Company, Danville, Illinois, electrical wiring, \$67,000, with a provision for an increase in the total contract up to \$111,869.

4. W. T. Mahoney and Sons Company, Chicago, Illinois, plumbing, \$33,000, with provision for an increase in the total contract up to \$54,400, and with an escalation clause allowing for adjustments to cover increases in costs of labor and material.

These contracts will enable the University to proceed with the project within present financial limitations, and will also permit increasing the contracts on the basis of the bids received if additional funds for this project are made available for the biennium beginning July 1, 1947.

I request approval of these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved.

Explanatory Notes

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but when appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided

which appointments are made at sataly lates test than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance lapses at that time.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges may not exceed the

amount of time provided by the position unless indicated herein or otherwise approved by the President.

All unexpended balances remaining in the salary budget lapse at the close

of each calendar month unless previously assigned or encumbered.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and other captions except with the approval of the President of the University Requests for each other transfers. University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be made between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" upon written request to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment, Wages, and Nonrecurring items are available for one year beginning July 1, 1046, and ending June 30, 1947. All unexpended balances in Wages appropriations lapse June 30, 1947, and unencumbered balances in Expense and Equipment appropriations lapse on that date. Allowable encumbrances for which funds will be carried forward on June 30, 1947, are only those for the purchase of equipment and other capital items.

All new positions classified as permanent and continuous should be included in the salary budget and must not be charged to any wages appropriation except in those departments submitting supplemental budgets detailing such wage appropriations.

Unless otherwise indicated in the Budget:

- I. The service required under appointments in this budget to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Semester. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Assistant Professor and above are paid in twelve equal monthly installments; salaries of other ranks, in nine equal monthly installments.
- 2. The service required in administrative, clerical, and service positions is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments. All such positions in the academic budget are indicated by the letter "Y" following the tenure symbol.

Symbols: Y-Indicates that services are re-A — Indefinite tenure. D — One year from September 1, 1946. quired throughout the year, ex-F — Nine months from October 1, 1946. cept for allowable vacation, with-G — Special tenure. out additional compensation. H — July 1, 1946, to June 30, 1947.

When any of the above symbols is combined with a number, the number indicates the fraction of time in per cent covered by the position.

Housing:

In a number of instances, as a practical and emergency arrangement, housing facilities are being temporarily furnished to staff members without charge, for the convenience of the University. As rapidly as possible, the arrangements are being revised, and final determination as to each case is being concluded.
