MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

FEBRUARY 27, 1947

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met on Thursday, February 27, 1947, at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, during the recess of the meeting of the Board on the same day. Mr. Park Livingston, Chairman, and Dr. Karl A. Meyer, member of the Executive Committee, were present; also the members and officers of the Board and the officials of the University enumerated above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CHANGES IN ACADEMIC RANKS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION STAFF

(1) At the request of Professor Seward C. Staley, Director of the School of Physical Education, I recommend the following promotions in academic ranks of members of the staff of the Athletic Association who are also members of the University faculty, effective September 1, 1947:

Douglas R. Mills, Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, Head Basketball Coach, and Assistant Professor of Physical Education, to the rank of Professor

on indefinite tenure.

RAYMOND ELIOT, Head Football Coach and Assistant Professor of Physical

Education, to the rank of Associate Professor on indefinite tenure.

WALTER H. ROETTGER, Head Baseball Coach, Assistant Basketball Coach, and Assistant Professor of Physical Education, to the rank of Associate Professor on indefinite tenure.

Burton A. Ingwersen, Assistant Football Coach and Instructor in Physical Education, to the rank of Associate Professor on indefinite tenure.

Leo T. Johnson, Head Track Coach, Assistant Football Coach, and Associate in Physical Education, to the rank of Assistant Professor for two years from

September 1, 1947.

The University of Illinois Statutes provide that an appointment as professor or as associate professor shall be for an indefinite term; provided, however, that when a person's first appointment in this University is to a professorship, or an associate professorship, such appointment may be for any limited term, but a reappointment following shall be for an indefinite term. Appointments below the rank of associate professor shall be made for a definite term. It is customary to make appointments to the rank of assistant professor for one or two years to coincide with the fiscal biennia.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appointments were approved as recommended.

ADJUSTMENTS IN SALARIES OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION STAFF

(2) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has authorized the following new schedule of salaries for members of the Athletic Association staff effective March 1, 1947, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees:

In the cases of joint appointments, that is, of staff members whose salaries are paid partly by the Athletic Association, the Board of Directors has also voted the assumption of whatever amounts are necessary to provide in full the increases recommended above. In other words, the Association assumes all the increases to be given until such time as the University makes changes in the salaries of staff members holding joint appointments.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these salaries were approved as recommended.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

(3) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on December 28, 1946, the Legal Counsel raised the question whether the Board of Trustees, in acting on Civil Service matters, should not sit as a Civil Service Commission and have minutes of such meetings separately recorded. The Board directed that this be referred to the President of the University for consideration with the Legal Counsel and for report to the Board.

This question has been studied by the Legal Counsel, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and several other University officers. Memoranda from the Legal Counsel and the Director of Nonacademic Personnel are submitted

herewith.

Having considered their report, I recommend:

I. That the minutes of actions of the Board of Trustees on Civil Service matters be published from time to time separately from other minutes of the Board of Trustees and that copies be supplied for distribution to persons who have legitimate reason for receiving them.

2. That following any meeting of the Board of Trustees at which action on Civil Service matters has been taken, the Secretary of the Board shall supply a report of such action for the information of persons who have a legitimate

interest therein.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

REPORTS OF PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

- (4) The Faculty Committee on Patents submits the following report and recommendations relating to patentable discoveries made by members of the staff:
- I. A chemical process for making a culture medium used in growing a fungus from which streptomycin is made. This is a discovery by Professor H. H. Thornberry of the Department of Horticulture as a result of research work by himself and Professor H. W. Anderson on a project sponsored and financed by Eli Lilly and Company, Parke, Davis, and Company, the Upjohn Company, and the Abbott Laboratories. The sponsors have expressed a desire to have this discovery patented by the University and a willingness to pay the cost of securing patents in the United States and in certain foreign countries, in return for which the sponsors shall be given the use of the patent under a non-exclusive license. Such an arrangement is specifically permitted in the policy and regulations of the Board of Trustees relating to research sponsored by outside agencies. The Committee recommends that applications for patents be filed and that the officers of the Board of Trustees be authorized to sign all necessary documents relating thereto.
- 2. Certain antimalarial compounds by Mr. Peter Kovacic, employed in the Department of Chemistry on research work under a restricted contract (No. OEMcmr-321) with the Office of Scientific Research and Development of the United States Government. Under this contract the Government has the right

to determine whether or not a patent application shall be filed and to determine the disposition of the title to and the rights under any application or patent that may result. The Government has asked for an assignment by the discoverer of his rights in the discovery. The Committee recommends that the discoverer be authorized to execute such an assignment and that the University release to the United States Government any rights which it may have therein.

3. Methods for the preparation of sulfuryl fluoride, and a practical method for the manufacture of sulfamide, by Dr. Mark M. Woyski, Instructor in Chemistry. The Head of the Department of Chemistry is of the opinion that these methods are of scientific interest only and he doubts the practicability of these operations in any commercial processes. The Committee recommends that this discovery be released to the discoverer.

I concur in the recommendations of the Committee.

Professor Britton presented this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

AUTHORIZATION OF HONORARY DEGREES

(5) The University Senate has selected the following Committee on Honorary Degrees:

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the award of not to exceed eight honorary degrees to be conferred at the time of the installation of the President of the University, May 16, 1947, on the nomination of this Committee and the recommendation of the President of the University, and with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees if it becomes necessary to act between meetings of the full Board.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this authority was granted as recommended.

PURCHASE OF CLARK PROPERTY

(6) The recommendation for an additional appropriation of \$10,000 to cover the outside possible cost of the purchase of the Clark property was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for appraisal and recommendation to the Board (Minutes, January 25, 1947, page 216).

Mr. McKelvey commented on this matter and recommended that the appropriation be made.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; absent, Mr. Davis.

APPROPRIATION TO ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

(7) The University of Illinois Alumni Association requested an appropriation of \$48,773 from University funds for operating expenses during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, of which amount \$39,553 was appropriated. The officers of the Association have requested that because of the great increase in the cost of maintaining the Alumni Records the original request for an appropriation of \$48,773 be reconsidered.

I recommend that a supplementary appropriation of \$9,220 be made to the Alumni Records Office for the balance of the current fiscal year.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appropriation was made as recom-

SECOND SESSION, FEBRUARY 27, 1947

When the Board convened following the recess on February 27, 1947, the same members and officers were present as during the first session; also General Davis.

PURCHASE OF MILLIGAN PROPERTY

At this point the Board took up consideration of the acquisition of the Milligan properties at 606 South Mathews Avenue and 1201 to 1203 West California Avenue, in Urbana.

President Stoddard expressed the opinion that since prices had been established for these properties by due process of law in condemnation proceedings in circuit court, the Board of Trustees is now justified in purchasing the properties at the prices so fixed as a part of the site for the Chemical Engineering and Chemistry Buildings so that construction of these essential buildings will not be unduly delayed.

Mr. McKelvey, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, also expressed the opinion that the property should be purchased at the prices fixed by the jury.

The Comptroller stated that there were sufficient funds in the appro-

priation for the purchase of land to meet this expenditure.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matter presented by the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF TEXACO PROPERTY

(1) The Director of the Physical Plant Department requests authority to offer the Texas Company \$40,000 for the property at the northeast corner of Green Street and Mathews Avenue, in Urbana, with the understanding that if this offer is not acceptable to the Texas Company, he may negotiate on their continued use of the site for a period not to exceed five years.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given to Director Havens to proceed as recommended.

OPEN SESSION

The Board, at 12:30 p.m., declared that the meeting was open to the public.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

BEQUEST OF JOHN A. FAIRLIE

(1) The late Dr. John A. Fairlie, Professor of Political Science, Emeritus, who died on January 23, 1947, included the following bequest in his will:

ARTICLE FIVE

I give and bequeath unto the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, with its principal offices in the city of Urbana, Champaign County, Illinois, the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars, the income from which shall be used under such rules and regulations as may be determined and promulgated by the said University of Illinois for the maintenance of a graduate fellowship in political science at said University of Illinois.

Professor Fairlie was one of the distinguished members of the University of Illinois faculty. His active service covered a period of 32 years from 1909 when he joined the faculty until 1941 when he retired. Many alumni of the University who had the privilege of studying under Doctor Fairlie will long remember him as a great teacher and scholar. I am sure we are all deeply grateful for his generous gift which will be instrumental in stimulating and rewarding scholarship in a very important field.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this bequest was accepted, for the purposes stated by the donor.

SUPPLEMENTARY EMERGENCY STATE APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1945-1947

(2) The 65th General Assembly has passed and it is expected that the Governor shortly will approve Senate Bill 17 making supplementary emergency appropriations to the University for the current biennium totaling \$9,903,146, of which \$5,933,996 will come from State tax funds and \$3,969,150 from University

These appropriations are for the following purposes: Chicago Undergraduate Division at Navy Pier, covering the budget approved by the Board of Trustees on September 24, 1946\$3 554 178 1946-1947 of Urbana-Champaign and Chicago Professional Col-bana-Champaign and Chicago Professional Colleges..... 1 500 000 Grand Total......\$9 903 146

Of the above items, the entire amount has been appropriated by the Board, or is related to self-supporting auxiliary activities, except the last item of \$1,500,000. This is an additional appropriation from tax funds not yet appropriated by the Board or committed in any manner. It is based on the action of the Board of Trustees, March 9, 1946 (Minutes, page 1028), to be used for the following purposes:

The first item is required to provide for services through the second se-

mester of 1946-1947 of new staff members who were employed for the first semester, and for other necessary staff additions.

The last item of \$575,000 will be needed for emergency adjustments in regular departmental expense and equipment budgets for the remainder of the current year, and for nonrecurring items.

It is proposed to allocate the fund for salary adjustments to the various departments on the basis of the principles to be established by the President on the recommendation of the University Council.

I recommend that:

1. The appropriation of \$1,500,000 be added to the General Reserve Fund of the University.

2. The sum of \$800,000 be appropriated for salary adjustments of academic and nonacademic staffs in the Urbana-Champaign divisions and the Chicago Professional Colleges.

3. The President be authorized to make emergency adjustments out of the remaining funds for staff additions and departmental expense and equipment for the remainder of the year, all such adjustments to be reported to the Board.

Recommendations for nonrecurring appropriations from remaining funds

will be submitted to the Board for consideration from time to time.

STAFF HOUSING PROJECT

(3) On May 29, 1946 (Minutes, pages 1113-1115), the Board approved a plan for the purchase of lots in residential areas in Urbana and Champaign and of 50 prefabricated houses to be constructed on these lots for rental or sale to University staff members. This project is being financed jointly by the University and the University of Illinois Foundation. The Board of Trustees appropriated \$176,000, and the Foundation has secured a mortgage loan of an equal amount. With this sum it was possible to finance only 44 houses.

The University has an opportunity to purchase an additional house of this type, located at 503 South Garfield, Champaign, which was constructed by a private owner for his use but who is now leaving the University. He is willing to sell the house for what it and the lot cost him - \$8,500. There may be some additional cost to the University in securing the transfer of title. An option which expires February 28 was secured on this house to control it for Uni-

versity staff use.

I recommend that the Board authorize the purchase of this house as a part of the staff housing project and that an additional appropriation of \$8,600, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made for this particular acquisition.

SUPPLEMENTARY STAFF HOUSING PROJECT

(4) In spite of all efforts made by the University, the staff housing situation in the Urbana-Champaign departments remains acute. Heads of educational divisions indicate that the housing shortage presents one of the most serious obstacles to securing needed additions to the staff. The situation will be aggravated next year if the staff additions provided for in the biennial budget are realized.

The Provost has recommended that the University extend its staff housing program by the erection of an additional group of houses similar to the project approved by the Board on May 29, 1946 (Minutes, page 1113), and now nearing completion. At my request, the problem has been reviewed by the Comptroller, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Provost, who jointly recommend that a new project of 25 prefabricated houses be authorized. This project is to be financed in part by a special State appropriation and in part by a selfliquidating loan. The amount which can be amortized will be about one-third of

the total.

Among the Federal housing units supplied to the University are 331 family units available for assignment to staff members if so needed. These units are now subject to (a) limitation by the government to veteran use, and (b) limitation to student use because the University funds used for their construction came entirely from a student residence hall appropriation. University officers have applied to the government for a relaxation of the ruling which permits only veterans to use these houses. (Such a relaxation has been secured for the Galesburg division.) It is now proposed that the special State appropriation be applied in part toward the Federal units to compensate for the use of a portion of them by members of the staff.

It is also proposed to incorporate the additional \$250,000 with the request

for a State appropriation of \$2,200,000 for housing.

I recommend that the Board authorize an additional staff housing project to acquire 25 units according to the following plan:

to acquire 25 units according to the following plan:

1. Total estimated cost, \$238,450, including sites, buildings, and other necessary construction work.

2. Estimated net annual income available for debt service, \$8,236.

3. Estimated amount which can be borrowed and amortized on income, \$70,700.

4. A request to the General Assembly for an appropriation of \$250,000 for staff housing to be used in part for completion of the new project and in part for expenditures on Federal housing units that may be used for staff members, the understanding being that the present State appropriation of \$140,000 made for the purchase of student housing be allowed to lapse.

5. A request to the University of Illinois Foundation to cooperate in secur-

ing the needed loan for this project.

On motion of Dr. Luken, authority was granted as recommended.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

APPROPRIATION FOR AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF DAVID KINLEY

(10) The University has a policy, established several years ago, of publishing biographies of former presidents. In 1923 it published "Selim Hobart Peabody, a Biography" by Mrs. Katherine Peabody Girling, his daughter, and in 1934, "The Life and Work of Andrew Sloan Draper" by Harlan Hoyt Horner. A biography of the first President, John Milton Gregory, by his daughter, was written and published elsewhere during the 1920 decade.

The Director of the University Press has the manuscript for the "Autobiography of David Kinley." He requests authority to publish it and an appropriation of not to exceed \$5,000 for that purpose.

APPROPRIATION FOR BAND UNIFORMS

(II) In previous years members of the University of Illinois Bands were required to purchase uniforms. Students in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps are furnished Army uniforms by the War Department, but the War Department does not furnish Band uniforms. Students in the Bands receive credit for military training during their first two years and for this they are required to drill regularly and to perform at military ceremonies. In addition, Bands perform at numerous University functions each year for which the members receive no compensation. It does not seem to me, therefore, that they should be expected or required to buy their own uniforms. In previous years this was not a large item of personal expense, but now many students can not afford to buy uniforms.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Trustees make an initial appropriation of \$6,500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, toward the purchase of 200 Band uniforms and for the rehabilitation and replacement of overcoats and capes which were purchased over twenty years ago from funds contributed by alumni. It is estimated that the total cost will be \$13,000. The Athletic Association will contribute approximately one-half of the total funds required, from profits accruing to it from the football game in the Pasadena Rose Bowl on January 1, 1047

Time is an important factor in the acquisition of these uniforms. Shortage of fabrics suitable for Band uniforms is also a factor. It is therefore recommended that this be considered a unique purchase and that the Board authorize a contract with DeMoulin Brothers Company, Greenville, Illinois, for the manufacture of uniforms. This company has supplied uniforms to Band members satisfactorily for a period of many years at prices as low as could be obtained anywhere, quality and service considered. It is believed that this manufacturer can best meet all specifications and requirements involved and that purchasing uniforms on the basis of competitive bids under present conditions would not be practicable.

BARNES COLLECTION OF STUFFED ANIMALS

(13) The R. M. Barnes Collection, Lincoln, Illinois, of mounted birds, mammals, reptiles, amphibians, skins of birds, and birds' eggs has been offered to the University of Illinois and the State Museum at Springfield. The estimated value of the specimens and specimen cases to the University is \$6,620. It would be a valuable addition to the Museum of Natural History. The cost of moving the collection to the University and of making space usable for housing and displaying it for study is estimated at \$1,100.

I recommend acceptance of this collection and an appropriation of \$1,100 to

cover the expenses incidental to its acquisition.

BIDS FOR FURNISHING STRUCTURAL AND REINFORCING STEEL FOR CONSTRUCTION OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(14) The following bids were received on February 5 for furnishing structural and reinforcing steel for the new Mechanical Engineering Building:

Subsequently, the Bethlehem Steel Company reported that their escalation on the structural steel would not exceed \$1,800, which would limit their maximum bid to \$16,700. Joseph T. Ryerson similarly reported that their escalation clause would be 10%, making their maximum bid \$17,215. On this basis, the bid of the Bethlehem Steel Company is lowest, and the University Architect recommends an immediate award to them on the basis of a base bid of \$14,900 subject to escalation, but not to exceed \$16,700.

The University Architect also recommends that the bid of Joseph T. Ryerson and Son for reinforcing steel be rejected, inasmuch as only one bid was received and it is in excess of previous preliminary estimates. He proposes to include reinforcing steel as a sub-bid in the general contract work for which bids are to be received on February 27.

Fugard, Burt, and Wilkinson, Architects for the Mechanical Engineering Building, concur in the above recommendations and further recommend that the contract for structural steel include a provision that it may be transferred to the successful general work contractor.

The Comptroller recommends approval of these proposals and I concur.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these proposals were approved as recommended.

PURCHASE OF STEEL FOR CONSTRUCTION OF BETATRON

(15) The betatron to be constructed in the new Physics Research Laboratory, which is moving toward completion, will be built under the supervision of members of the research staff of the Physics Department. Steel and other material are needed for this purpose. During 1945-1946, President Willard authorized members of the Physics staff to contact steel mills to determine where suitable steel could be obtained. These persons have conferred with officials of Carnegie Illinois Steel Company, American Rolling Mill Company, Wheeling Steel Company, and Allegheny Ludlum Company. Any order placed will be entered at the current price but will be accepted only with the understanding that billing will be at the price in effect at the time of delivery.

Representatives of the Physics Department recommend that orders be placed with the American Rolling Mill Company of Chicago, Illinois, as follows:

This recommendation is based on the following points:

- 1. No other company is prepared to supply transformer steel of sufficient width.
- 2. No other company can supply steel in lengths greater than 10 or 11 feet, whereas we need sheets of considerably greater length. Armco can supply in continuous coils of greater length.

3. The base price of transformer steel is the same for all companies. The

exact cost depends on extra charges for special widths, coiling, and cutting the edges as straight as possible. These were obtained only from Armco, since they were the only ones prepared to provide the correct widths.

The Purchasing Agent and Comptroller submit this recommendation with their endorsement. I concur and request approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized as recommended.

SUPPLEMENT TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR PHYSICS RESEARCH LABORATORY

(16) On December 11, 1945 (Minutes, page 949), the Board approved a contract for general work on the Physics Research Laboratory with King and Petry, Champaign, on a cost plus fixed fee basis in the estimated amount of \$162,700. This was based upon a fixed fee of \$9,725. Increased material and labor costs require a revision in this estimate resulting in an increase of \$60,100 to date, which includes an increase in the contractor's fee in the amount of \$1,800, making the revised estimated cost of the work \$222,800, including a fixed fee of \$11,525.

This particular contract provides that the fixed fee shall be subject to adjustment if the total cost of the project including the fixed payment varies more than 20 per cent more or less than the original estimated cost. Adjustment of the fixed fee shall be on the basis agreed upon between the contractor and architect in advance and shall apply to only such costs which are more or less than the estimated cost, i.e., plus or minus 20 per cent. No adjustment is to be made if the cost is within the allowable variation. Since the total cost will run more than 20 per cent over the original estimates, an upward adjustment in the fixed fee is in order under the contract provisions.

The University Architect and the Comptroller recommend approval of this change in the estimate and fixed fee of the contract, the latter not being subject to reduction in case of saving under estimated cost.

Approval of the Board is requested.

On motion of Dr. Luken, these adjustments were approved as requested.

CONTINUATION OF OFFER OF FUNDS FROM NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS

(17) At the meeting on November 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 177), the Board approved an offer of funds in the amount of \$12,945 from the Cook County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Incorporated, for hospital services for a 90-day period. The Foundation has requested a continuation through February 28, 1947, of the agreement entered into, in which the University of Illinois makes available 16 beds in the Research and Educational Hospitals for infantile paralysis cases.

The continuation of this agreement will involve the payment by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to the University of Illinois the additional sum of \$5,796. The Business Manager of the Chicago Colleges recommends that the estimated income of the University be increased by \$5,796 and that temporary

UTILITY AND FIXED EQUIPMENT CONTRACTS FOR WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(22) Bids for utility and fixed equipment contracts for the new Women's Residence Hall were opened February 7. A complete schedule of bids is submitted herewith. The total of lowest bids is \$692,671, but funds are not now available for this amount. These bids decrease the estimated cost of the building from \$3,600,000, as reported to the Board on December 28, 1946 (Minutes, page 195), to \$3,500,000. An additional State appropriation of \$2,200,000 is required, for which a bill is ready for introduction in the General Assembly.

3. Relocating the water main at Fourth Street and Peabody Drive in order not to interfere with the installation of the steam tunnel for which a contract was recently awarded.

4. All water to the temporary housing on the west side of the campus is now fed from connections at Oak Street. This supply is inadequate to supply the housing on the drill field and southwest of the Stadium. Accordingly, a new service is to be provided extending across the south end of the drill field to connect to the main University water supply at Fourth Street.

5. FPHA revised the design of the dormitory buildings on the drill field in order to save their cost, reducing the toilet rooms from two to one a building, enlarging the one remaining. This causes changes in the service connections covered by this last item of the change order.

The original contract with this firm is on a cost basis with a guaranteed maximum. This change order will increase the amount of the guaranteed maximum. Payments, however, will be based on actual cost. Sufficient funds are available to take care of this increase.

The Comptroller recommends approval of this proposed increase, and I

concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this increase was approved as recommended.

¹ Duparquet, Inc. submitted two bids on kitchen equipment, a firm bid of \$175,825 and a base bid of \$157,033, plus escalation limited to 12 per cent. The maximum escalation would result in a total cost of \$175,877. It is, therefore, recommended that the bid with escalation clause be accepted as the maximum cost would be only \$52 over the firm bid and the escalation is not likely to run as high as 12 per cent.

² Escalation clause provides for a decrease as well as an increase, the maximum possible obligation being \$42,997.20.

APPROPRIATION FOR ERECTION OF TEMPORARY WAREHOUSE THROUGH FEDERAL WORKS AGENCY

(25) In accordance with action of the Board on September 24, 1946 (Minutes, page 47), authorizing the Comptroller to apply for needed additional facilities which might be available through Federal Works Agency, application was made for a temporary warehouse in order to help relieve the critical storage problem of the University and release for other use space in University buildings now used for storage. This request was approved and a temporary building providing space for about 13,000 square feet will be moved to the campus and erected by the Agency. It will be located in the Physical Plant service yard east of Goodwin Avenue, Urbana. The University must meet the expense of clearing the site, grading, drives or walks, heating, and lighting. Heating will be extended only to a portion of the building where material to be stored requires protection from extreme cold.

The preliminary estimate of the Physical Plant Department of the cost of this work, subject to receipt of bids on various items of construction, is \$15,000, which includes a fire alarm system and also necessary engineering and architectural services. The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends an appropriation of this amount at this time so that necessary work can proceed at once. It is understood that the exact amount required may be less than this figure, or that some supplement to the appropriation may later be found necessary, after the exact bids are secured.

I concur and request an appropriation of \$15,000 from the General Reserve

Fund for this purpose.

(26) Bids were received on February 4 for electrical work in connection with remodeling Room 215 Electrical Engineering Laboratory. (See Minutes, July 30, 1946, page 9, and January 25, 1947, page 221, for appropriation and previous bids.) Bids were received under three plans: (1) on the basis of a guaranteed maximum cost plus fee in addition; (2) cost plus fixed fee, with cost estimated only; (3) on a firm lump sum bid basis. The Physical Plant Department recommends that a contract be awarded to the Bean Electric Company, the lowest bidder for the electrical work, on the basis of their lump sum bid of \$13,525. Funds are available in the present appropriation to cover this expenditure.

I concur and request authority to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the

Board to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was authorized as recommended.

BEQUEST OF MRS. LILLIAN M. LARSON

(27) The will of the late Mrs. Lillian M. Larson, widow of Professor Laurence M. Larson, former Head of the Department of History, includes the following

bequest to the University:

"To the Trustees of the University of Illinois, in trust, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the following uses and purposes, to-wit: The principal of said fund shall be kept intact and invested and the income from said fund used to provide a scholarship or scholarships for graduate students attending the University of Illinois and pursuing courses in medieval or English history and majoring in history. It is my hope that such students, with this aid, may carry on in a general way the work pursued by my late husband, Laurence M. Larson, and I establish this trust fund as a memorial for him to be designated as the Laurence M. Larson Scholarship Fund.

... The above gift or trust fund is to have priority and be paid over and

above other gifts herein. . . .

Professor Larson was a distinguished member of the faculty of the University of Illinois. He came to the University in 1907 and served continuously until his retirement in 1937. From 1926 to 1937 he served as Head of the Department of History. He died in 1938. In reporting this bequest, I should like to express for the students, faculty, and, I am sure, the Board of Trustees, our appreciation of this generous gift.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this bequest was accepted and dedicated to the purposes indicated by the donor.

APPRECIATION OF SERVICES OF MRS. GRIGSBY

At this point, Mr. Davis presented the following resolution and moved its adoption.

Whereas, Mrs. Helen M. Grigsby is now completing her third term of service as a Trustee of the University of Illinois; and

Whereas, that service has been marked by a public-spirited and intelligent interest in all the affairs of the University, and particularly in those matters affecting the welfare of the students; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees considers that Mrs. Grigsby's service has

been a substantial contribution to education in Illinois; therefore

Be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees hereby makes record of its appreciation of the able and gracious services of Mrs. Grigsby, and of its regret at their termination.

This resolution was adopted by unanimous standing vote.

Mrs. Grigsby expressed her appreciation, and spoke on the changes that have occurred in the University since she became a Trustee in 1921.

TUITION FEES

President Livingston stated that it had been suggested in the General Assembly that the Board give consideration to an increase in tuition fees.

President Stoddard reported that on his request the Secretary of the Board had prepared a report on the history of fees in the University, and the Provost had prepared a statement on the policies involved.

The Provost presented a summary of these reports and commented

on them.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was requested to study this matter and report at the next meeting of the Board.

EXPANSION OF FOOD SERVICE REQUESTED

The Secretary reported that he had received since the January meeting the following communication from Mrs. Frances Snell, a graduate student, together with a petition signed by approximately 1500 students.

I am submitting to you a number of petitions signed by the students of the University of Illinois. These petitions arose because of the lack of sufficient eating facilities. The announcement of the purchase of a new mess hall has been received with enthusiasm.

An expansion of eating facilities to include service on Sunday with University facilities is a need felt by the students. The solution to this part of the problem is the one which we are now looking forward to.

PARTIAL SETTLEMENT OF BEQUEST OF EDWARD C. EARL

Mr. Davis, for the Finance Committee, reported as follows.

Pursuant to authorization of the Board on May 26, 1945 (Minutes, page 485), Comptroller Morey has been serving as executor of the estate of Edward C. Earl. The entire estate was bequeathed to the University of Illinois for an endowment fund for prizes for architectural students.

\$200 par Pennsylvania Railroad 3½% bonds, due April 1, 1952. \$6,000 cash.

'I give devise and bequeath to The University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois for the sole use of the Architectural Department of the University, the interest from this bequest to be used for small prizes for superior architectural work in the various undergraduate classes of the Architectural Department, Absolutely and in fee simple, all of the Estate of which I may die seized or possessed," and Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has been ad-

vised by its attorney, Mr. Arthur L. Barton of New York that the land referred to in this devise is located in Prince George's County, Maryland, and is described as follows:
