### MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

## UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

**September 23, 1948** 



The September meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, September 23, 1948, at the Country Club, in Peoria, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

12 m. — Open session.

President Stoddard was present; also Provost Griffith, Assistant to the President, Mr. A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during the open session, Director J. F. Wright.

### MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of May 21-22 and June 15, 1948.

On motion of General Davis, the minutes were approved as printed

on pages 1091 to 1482.

#### REPORTS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary presented for record the following report of actions of the Executive Committee.

### August 4, 1948

1. Purchase of property at 710 West Indiana Avenue, Urbana. The Board of Trustees on July 21-22, 1948, authorized the Executive Committee to act for the Board in the purchase of another residence property for faculty housing. The Committee authorized the purchase of the property at 710 West Indiana Avenue, Urbana, from Gordon Phillips, owner, for \$17,000, and made an assignment of \$18,000 for this purpose from the General Reserve Fund to provide for expenses incidental to the purchase and such repairs as may be necessary.

### August 11, 1948

1. Funds for remodeling in Chicago Undergraduate Division. The Executive Committee authorized an assignment of \$15,230 from the General Reserve Fund for remodeling to provide a new General Engineering Drawing Room and adapt the present room for use as a library (\$9,500), and for the purchase of equipment, library shelving, tables, chairs, control desk, and miscellaneous furnishings (\$5,730).

These improvements are to provide suitable reading space and the purchase of equipment for a valuable architectural library which has been presented to the

University by Holabird and Root of Chicago.
2. Award of contract for extension of Utilities Distribution System. The following bids were received:

On the recommendation of the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Comptroller, and with the concurrence of the President's Office, the Executive Committee authorized the award of the contract to Kuhne-Simmons Co., Inc., the lower bidder. Funds are available in the State appropriation for this project.

### August 25, 1948

I. Increase in contract for heating installation in Women's Residence Halls. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended an increase of \$1,858 in the contract with Gallaher and Speck, Inc., Chicago, for heating installations in the new residence halls for women on Lincoln Avenue to provide for furnishing and installing the necessary valves, pipes, fittings, and other appurtenances for a pressure reducing valve station. The Executive Committee authorized this increase. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of student residence halls."

2. Contract for construction of steam distribution system. Bids were received for the construction of the steam distribution system between the second unit of the Dentistry, Medicine, and Pharmacy Building and the Chicago Illini Union Building. Five firms were invited to bid but the only one received was from the William A. Pope Company, Chicago, for \$31,240. The bid included a provision that it would remain a firm bid only if accepted within three weeks. The deadline was September 3. 1048: hence early action was desired

was September 3, 1948; hence, early action was desired.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended the award of a contract to the William A. Pope Company, Chicago, in the

amount of \$31,240.

The Executive Committee authorized this contract. Funds are available in the

State appropriation for this project.

3. Reconstruction of sidewalk and driveways at Physics Research Laboratory. The Physics Research Laboratory (Betatron Building) at Urbana is in an area which is subject to flooding during heavy rains as the result of overflow from the Illinois Central underpass. The following bids were secured on the elevation of the sidewalk and reconstruction of such driveway areas as will be necessary to dam the flood waters:

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for this work to the lower bidder, C. A. Petry & Sons, Champaign, in the amount of \$2,865. The Executive Committee authorized the award of this contract. Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Completion of the construction of Physics Research Laboratory" to provide for this improvement.

4. Award of Illinois C.P.A. certificates under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943 to the following candidates:

They have presented satisfactory evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked C.P.A. certificates obtained in other states by passing written examinations and that they meet all of the other conditions specified by this section of the Act. The Executive Committee authorized the award of these certificates.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board discussed items on the agenda and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

# APPOINTMENT OF PAR DANFORTH AS DIRECTOR OF ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(1) I recommend the appointment of Mr. Par Danforth, at present Executive Secretary of the Seattle Branch of the American Friends Service Committee, as Director of Robert Allerton Park with the rank of Professor, at an annual salary of \$8,000, and that the President of the University be authorized to fix the effective date. This will be determined in part by Mr. Danforth's present commitments. As Director of Robert Allerton Park, Mr. Danforth will not only supervise all Park operations but will also be director of all projects for which the Park and Robert Allerton House will be used.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

### PURCHASE OF RESIDENCE PROPERTIES FOR STAFF HOUSING

(2) At its meeting on July 21-22, 1948 (Minutes, page 3), the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of the residence property at 909 West Nevada Street, Urbana, from H. H. Mitchell, owner, for \$17,500 on the basis of an independent appraisal procured by the University. The owner planned to use the proceeds to build a new house. He has subsequently found that \$17,500 is inadequate for this purpose and has secured appraisals of his own which value his property at \$21,000. The purchase of this property was recommended because it is in an area of future campus expansion (for women's residence halls), and in the meantime the property could be used advantageously for staff housing. In view of the great difference in the appraisals and since the site will not be needed for several years, I recommend that the University not purchase the property at this time.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this recommendation was adopted.

### REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS ON INSURANCE PRACTICES

(3) I am submitting an Insurance Report prepared by a temporary advisory committee to the Comptroller and to the President appointed April 28, 1948. Mr. William E. Britton can describe the work of the committee and Mr. Leslie A.

Bryan, its Chairman, will be glad to meet with the Board Committee at any time.

time.

The committee has made a number of explicit proposals for clarifying both policy and practice. I recommend that they be accepted by the Board as a basis for study and appropriate action.

This matter was referred to the Finance Committee for study and report.

## EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS FOR STAFF APARTMENT PROJECT IN CHICAGO

(4) The Board of Trustees on July 21-22, 1948 (Minutes, page 7), authorized the construction of a student residence hall and a staff apartment building for the Chicago Professional Colleges at a cost of \$3,786,733 (exclusive of land cost for which an appropriation of \$50,000 has already been made), these projects to be financed by the University of Illinois Foundation through a loan for which application has been made by the Foundation to the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York. The application is for a loan not to exceed \$4,000,000. Revised estimates indicate a construction cost of \$4,006,869, the increase over the previous estimate being due to an increase in the number of apartment units from 116 to 145. It is believed that the excess of \$6,869 over the loan applied for can be eliminated.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill of Chicago as architects for the staff apartment project at a fee of 5½ per cent of the cost of construction. On this basis it is estimated that the architectural services will cost \$70,300

is estimated that the architectural services will cost \$70,300.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, the contract to be entered into as soon as construction funds have been assured.

Plans and specifications for the student residence hall are being financed by a grant from the Federal Works Agency. This grant is reimbursable if the project is carried to completion but not otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the Committee on Chicago Departments for further study and report to the Board.

### OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session at 2 p.m. on September 23, the same members and officers were present as during the morning session.

### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

### REQUEST OF REPRESENTATIVE JOHN K. MORRIS

(1) Mr. John K. Morris, Representative in the General Assembly of Illinois, has requested an opportunity to appear before the Board of Trustees when the Board considers the building program for the biennium of 1949-1951. He is particularly interested in the building for the College of Veterinary Medicine. I recommend that the Board give Mr. Morris a hearing at the October meeting.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this request was granted.

### ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

(2) The Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine recommends the reappointment of the following present members of the Advisory Committee for the academic year 1948-1949:

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

### APPOINTMENT OF ALBERT E. JENNER, JR., TO BOARD OF EXAMINERS IN ACCOUNTANCY

(3) The term of office of Mr. John S. Miller, the legal member of the regular three-man Board of Examiners in Accountancy, expired on June 30, 1948. To fill this vacancy the Committee on Accountancy recommends the appointment of Mr. Albert F. Jenner, Ir. for a three-year term beginning July 1, 1948.

Mr. Albert E. Jenner, Jr., for a three-year term beginning July 1, 1948.

Mr. Jenner is forty years of age. He is a graduate of the College of Law of the University of Illinois having received his LL.B. degree in June, 1930. He has written extensively on the Practice Act of Illinois, particularly with reference to appellate procedure. He has served most effectively on many committees of the Chicago and State Bar Associations. He has achieved distinction in the profession.

Mr. Jenner is a member of the firm of Poppenhusen, Johnston, Thompson,

and Raymond of Chicago. If appointed Mr. Jenner is willing to serve.

I recommend this appointment.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

# APPOINTMENT OF DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING AND DIRECTOR OF THE ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION

(4) Dean Melvin L. Enger will retire from active service as Dean of the College of Engineering, as Director of the Engineering Experiment Station, and as Professor of Mechanics and Hydraulics on September 1, 1949, at the end of the current academic year.

Current academic year.

I recommend the appointment of Professor William L. Everitt, now Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, to the position of Dean of the College of Engineering and Director of the Engineering Experiment Station for two years from September 1, 1949, and continuing as Professor of Electrical Engineering on indefinite tenure from September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$12,500.

The Executive Committee of the College of Engineering, which consists of the heads of the departments, has been consulted in accordance with the statutory provisions relating to nominations of deans of colleges, and Professor Everitt is the unanimous choice.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made as recommended.

### CURRICULUM IN HEALTH EDUCATION

(5) The University Senate recommends adoption of a curriculum in Health Education. This is a four-year program in the School of Physical Education, requiring a minimum of 130 semester hours of credit and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Health Education (see Appendix, page 128).

This curriculum was prepared by the University Committee on Health Education in the Schools, a Committee of the University Council on Teacher Education. It has been approved by the Council and by the School of Physical Education.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this curriculum was approved and established as recommended.

# RELEASES OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(6) The Governor has authorized releases of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois by the 65th General Assembly under Senate Bill 662, "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent, and distributive expenses of State government," which included appropriations totaling \$12,994,732 to the University for buildings and other capital improvements.

### ADDITIONAL REAPPROPRIATION OF UNEXPENDED BALANCES

(8) On July 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 27), the Board of Trustees approved a reappropriation of certain unexpended balances on June 30, 1948. The need for the following additional balances will continue in 1948-1949, and their reappropriation is requested:

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION

(9) The Board of Trustees on June 15, 1948, approved a special appropriation of \$49,220, the estimated expenditure required in the 1947-1949 biennium for the addition of a 7500 kilowatt service generator, Unit No. 4, in the Abbott Power Plant, Urbana.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, for all engineering services on the complete project. The agreement will be contingent on an additional State appropriation for the 1949-1951 biennium for the completion of this project, and if such an appropriation is not made the University

agrees to reimburse Sargent and Lundy only for actual expenditures.

The contract provides for reimbursing Sargent and Lundy for salaries paid engineers and draftsmen at their regular rates, plus 50 per cent; for salaries paid resident field engineers, plus 10 per cent; for stenographic and clerical services, traveling expenses, and miscellaneous expense at actual cost. Estimated expenditures under this contract during the 1947-1949 biennium are \$49,000; if an additional capital appropriation is received and the project is completed in 1949-1951, the total expenditures under this contract are estimated to be \$110,000.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be

authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was granted as requested.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR UNDERGROUND CONDUIT ON SOUTH FARMS

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend a contract with Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, for engineering services in connection with the construction of an underground conduit line from

the South Farm main switch gear station east to the President's House and to the Horticulture Field Laboratory to replace the existing pole line.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant operation and maintenance budget for the preparation of plans and specifications. This improvement is necessary to eliminate frequent power failures which affect the large refrigerating equipment in the cold storage area of the Horticulture Field Laboratory, research work in this building, and electrical service to the President's House. Such interruptions will continue until the present overhead line is replaced with underground service.

Some of the planning will be done by the Physical Plant Department, but the

necessary personnel is not available for all of the work.

I recommend that authority be granted the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute this contract; the cost is estimated not to exceed \$2,500. The contract will provide for payment by the University of the salaries of engineers and draftsmen, plus 100 per cent, plus actual clerical wages and other expenses incurred.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was granted as recommended.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR TEMPERATURE AND HUMIDITY CONTROL EQUIPMENT IN NOYES LABORATORY

(11) The Board of Trustees has appropriated \$2,500 for the installation of temperature and humidity control equipment in the Noyes Laboratory for research

work financed partly by a grant from the National Institute of Health and partly by the State Water Survey Division, which is housed in this building.

The Chief of the State Water Survey, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for the installation of this equipment to Climatic Engineering, Inc., Danville, the lowest bidder, at a cost of \$5,860. The cost of this installation will be charged in part, \$7,600, the appropriation grade by the Board of Trustees and the charge of the cost o to the appropriation made by the Board of Trustees, and the balance of \$4,200 will be paid from State Water Survey funds.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board

be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as recommended.

#### TABULATING MACHINE INSTALLATION IN CHICAGO

(12) The University has an installation of International Business Machines in Chicago in addition to the one in Urbana, under a contract approved January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 224). It is desired to enlarge this installation to provide for further mechanization of the registration procedure at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. The present installation in Chicago is located at the Chicago Professional Colleges although it provides certain services to the Undergraduate Division. Additional equipment is necessary to take care of the contemplated registration program at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. This equipment should be contracted for now to secure installation for use in 1949-1950. The machines are installed on a rental basis amounting to \$130 a month after allowing for an educational discount of 20 per cent.

The Director of Admissions and Records requests approval of such a contract, the necessary funds to be provided in the operating budget beginning with 1949-1950. The Business Manager of the Chicago Divisions, who has general

charge of the tabulating machine equipment in Chicago, concurs.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the International Business Machines Corporation for this equipment and to make minor changes in the contract as the needs of the service may require.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, authority was given as requested.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REFRIGERATOR AT CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(13) Bids have been received for the construction of a walk-in refrigerator for food service at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. This facility is necessary to comply with health standards. Funds are available in the operation and maintenance budget for this project.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the lower bidder, Bromann Brothers, Chicago, in

the amount of \$5,550 for this construction.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as requested.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR FLOORING IN STADIUM

(14) As a part of the restoration of the West Great Hall of the Stadium to its prewar use for physical education and athletic activities, it is proposed to resurface the floor (an area in excess of 20,000 square feet) with asphalt tile rather than the wood mosaic block flooring previously used. Bids have been received on the furnishing and the application of such material.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an award of the contract to W. Lewis and Company, the lowest bidder, in

the amount of \$6,107.77.

Funds are available for this work in reserves accumulated from operation of

temporary housing facilities.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as requested.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS IN ARCHITECTURE BUILDING

(15) The Department of Architecture has requested improvement of the artificial lighting in all of the drafting rooms. Students have been complaining of eyestrain and members of the faculty who are now carrying heavy schedules and who must spend long hours in these rooms are having the same difficulty due to inadequate lighting.

Bids have been received for rewiring, repowering, and relighting of rooms 200 and 210 in the Architecture Building. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the contract for this work be

awarded to the Anderson Electric Company, Inc., Danville, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$22,194. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, authority was given as recommended.

#### IMPROVEMENT OF ROADS SERVING THE ROBERT ALLERTON FARMS

(16) The authorities of Piatt County have requested financial assistance from the University for the oiling of roads in Willow Branch Township in which the Robert Allerton Park and the Robert Allerton Farms are located. About seven miles of roads lie within the lands deeded by Mr. Allerton to the University. In computing the values of all taxable property in Willow Branch Township, it has been found that the University owns approximately 20 per cent of the valuation of this township. The University has not paid taxes assessed against this real estate which means a loss of approximately 20 per cent of all taxes levied in the township.

The township roads in Willow Branch Township must be oiled with at least two coats each year in order to make them year-round roads. Since the University has not paid the 1947 taxes payable in 1948, the Township Highway Commission is faced with the problem of being short over 20 per cent of the money levied and assessed for highway purposes.

The Legal Counsel recommends that the Board authorize a contract with the authorities of Piatt County or of Willow Township whereby the University will agree to pay the cost of surfacing that portion of the road adjoining the Robert Allerton Park and Farms with a provision in the contract that such payment by the University is for services and will not prejudice any of its claims or affect its responsibilities with respect to the tax status of the property involved. The estimated cost of this service is \$2,500 to \$3,000 a year.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized as recommended.

### OIL AND GAS LEASE ON OLNEY EXPERIMENTAL FARM

(17) The University owns 191/3 acres of land near Olney, Illinois, which is used as an experimental fruit farm by the Department of Horticulture. Approximately twelve acres are in orchards and the rest is in pasture land.

Oil wells have been drilled within a mile and one-half of the University's land and have been in production for several years. The Sun Oil Company is interested in developing more production within this territory and has secured leases on properties adjoining the University's land. The Company wishes to secure an oil and gas lease on the University's land which would permit it to conduct drilling operations in the event that oil or gas in commercial quantities is found within a statutory offset location of the University's premises, after discovery and development drilling on other land. In that event the University's land would be communitized with adjoining acreage in such manner as would require the location of not more than one well on the present pasture land if production is discovered in limestone strata, or one well on pasture land and one well in the orchard if production is discovered in sand strata. In either event, location of the well or wells would be discussed with University officials before application for drilling permits from the State, and the wells would be drilled with every precaution possible to avoid damaging the experimental orchard and with full reimbursement for any damage. In the opinion of officials of the College of Agriculture, the drilling of one well would not result in irreparable damage or delay to experimental work.

The proposed lease would provide for the payment of \$5.00 a year an acre. If oil or gas is produced from wells on the University's land, the University will receive one-eighth of the proceeds. If producing wells are drilled within 330 feet of University land, the University will share in the royalties of such production.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the execution of the lease.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the execution of this lease was authorized as recommended.

### ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION

(18) A permanent platform at the Abbott Power Plant in Urbana to facilitate cleaning of tubes in the economizers and high-pressure heaters is needed as cleaning must be done three to five times a year. A permanent platform will eliminate the labor of erecting scaffolding each time the work is done and will reduce risk to the workers.

The University does not have structural iron workers required for the erection of the material, and the only structural iron workers in the community are employed by local contractors. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend, therefore, that this work be done by Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., as an addition to their contract for the superstructure of the Power Plant additions. The platform will cost \$1,373. Funds are available in the budget for this.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition to this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given as requested.

# ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR STEAM DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AT URBANA

(19) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the following additions to contracts for the construction of the steam distribution tunnel at Urbana to provide for furnishing and installing of insulation, pipe valves, and fittings necessary to join the steam service to the student and staff apartments:

The original contracts for this work were awarded by the Board of Trustees on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 228), but this part of the work was not included as the plans for the student and staff apartment building had not been completed. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction for the enlargement and extension of the existing utilities distribution system."

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these additions to contracts were authorized.

# ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS

(20) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,479.12 in the contract with the Warner Construction Company for the general work on the Women's Residence Halls, Urbana. This increase is to provide for the furnishing and installing of wooden stools or bases under the radiators and other work in connection therewith.

Funds are available in the special State appropriation for this project.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition to this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this addition to contract was authorized.

### PURCHASE OF ADVANCED R.O.T.C. UNIFORMS

(21) At the July 22, 1948, meeting, the Board of Trustees approved a recommendation that an order for 200 military uniforms for advanced course students in R.O.T.C. be placed with Jacob Reed's Sons, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who submitted the lowest bid.

These bids were based on our specifications, which included the materials and the Army regulations for style. Before placing an order a sample uniform was requested. When the sample was received it was found to be inferior in work-

manship and the Military Department declared it not satisfactory. Samples from the other bidders were then obtained for comparison. The sample from the Associated Military Stores, Chicago, is without question superior to either of the others and the Commandant requests that this uniform be purchased. The Associated Military Stores has submitted a revised bid, having changed the cap to an unremovable cover as quoted by the others, the reduction being \$1.90. Their price on the insignia is considerably lower than Reed's. The Associated Military Stores bid is now \$71.65 as compared to \$71.45 by Reed's.

The United States Army allows to the University commutation in the amount

of \$94.77 for each student for the purpose of purchasing a uniform which becomes the property of the student when he completes the course. The balance above the cost of this uniform will be used to buy shoes and accessories. It is proposed to provide the student with a high quality uniform which he can use as a

reserve officer or in the regular army.

The Director of Purchases, the Commandant, and the Comptroller now recommend that the order be placed with the Associated Military Stores at their price of \$71.65 because of their ability to furnish a superior quality uniform. They have supplied our R.O.T.C. uniforms for several years and provided excellent quality and service.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of General Davis, this recommendation was approved.

### INSURANCE ON HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL SERVICE PLAN

(22) The Board on July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 10), referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report to the Board the question of insurance on the hospital and medical service plan for students in the Urbana-Champaign, Chicago Undergraduate, and Galesburg Undergraduate divisions for 1948-1949.

The Finance Committee recommends that insurance in a commercial company

be continued for the coming year and that the benefits be as follows:

(1) Hospital allowance of \$5.00 a day of hospitalization, not to exceed twenty-eight days in a semester (compared with \$4.50 a day in 1947-1948).

(2) An allowance up to \$22.50 a semester for miscellaneous hospital services, including laboratory, anaesthetic, operating room, medicines, etc. (the same as at present).

(3) Medical service of \$3.00 a day for not more than two-thirds of the number of days the individual is hospitalized, not exceeding twenty-eight days a

semester, not payable if a surgical benefit is payable (the same as at present).

(4) Allowance for surgical services based on an itemized schedule with a maximum of \$225. (The schedule is approximately 23 per cent less than the schedule of 1947-1948. The company receiving the insurance last year allowed a schedule in excess of customary amounts and difficulties have resulted from such a liberal provision.)

In accordance with the recommendation of the Finance Committee, invitations to bid on this insurance for the University of Illinois beginning September 10, 1948, were submitted to sixty-seven companies and advertised in the press. Prospective bidders were requested to quote only premium rates on either or both a retention and nonretention plan basis for the provision of stated benefits as outlined in the bid form, which benefits were considered by the University, based on its past experience and anticipated needs, as being desirable and adequate to meet the average requirements of the students. The benefits are available to University faculty, employees, and their dependents upon application. Alternate bids were not allowed.

The Director of Purchases, the Dean of Men, and the Comptroller recommend that the order be placed with the Central Underwriters Agency, Inc., Chicago, representing the Central Life Insurance Company of Illinois, the lowest bidder, at a total estimated yearly premium of \$240,295 based on their bid of \$4.25 for students and other individuals and \$6.72 for family dependents based on nineteen-week semesters, such rates being the result of weekly rates of 22.4 cents an individual and 35.4 cents a family on a nonretention plan basis.

All students, except persons on appointment on the University staff or the

staffs of the allied surveys or laboratories, and students taking not more than one unit of graduate work or five hours of undergraduate work in a semester, or onehalf unit of graduate work or three hours of undergraduate work in the eightweek summer session, pay each semester, as insurance for hospital and medical service, a fee of \$5.00. A student who presents evidence of participation in any other group insurance system providing the same benefits as those covered by the University fee, may petition through the Office of the Dean of Students for a refund of this fee.

Members of the staff and their spouses may participate on a similar basis and family participation (staff member, spouse, and children over three months and under ten years of age) is at the rate of \$22.50 a year. The excess of collections over the cost of insurance is applied to administrative and contingent costs of

operation of the plan.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted. **EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY INSURANCE** 

(23) Renewal is proposed of employers' liability and voluntary workmen's compensation insurance, including occupational disease coverage and schedule general liability and property damage insurance, with limits of \$50/100,000, effective August 7, 1948, for one year, to cover the operations necessary to perform the research work stipulated under numerous tasks of the Naval Research Contract.

Requests for quotations were sent to fifty-six stock and seven mutual company agents. Only one bid was received, the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company, which insured this risk for the past two policy years, and quoted rates identical to those of last year. This company meets our rating requirements.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller recommend that the order be placed with the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company of Chicago at an estimated gross cost of \$2,000 chargeable to contract funds.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this contract was placed as recommended.

#### **PURCHASES**

(24) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the following purchases. Unless otherwise specified, the purchase in each case is recommended on the basis of lowest bid, or because the item is noncompetitive, or to obtain earliest delivery (see Appendix, schedule A, page 129).

The President of the University has authorized emergency purchases as shown

in schedule B (see Appendix, page 131).

On motion of Dr. Meyer, purchases were authorized as recommended, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

### COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(25) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from July II to September 10, 1948 (see Appendix, page 131).

This report was received for record.

### ADJUSTMENTS IN ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION BUDGET TO JUNE 30, 1948

(26) In approving the Athletic Association budget for the year 1947-1948 (August 5, 1947, Minutes, page 491), the Board of Trustees authorized the President to make changes and adjustments as recommended by the Athletic Association Board of Directors within the total estimated income. Following is a statement of adjustments thus made to June 30, 1948, not previously reported:

### PETITION FROM CHAMPAIGN URBANA BUSINESSMEN CONCERNING ILLINI UNION COFFEE HOUSE

(28) The President's Office has received a petition addressed to "The President and Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois," undated, signed by seventy-five businessmen and women and employees of commercial establishments in Champaign-Urbana, concerning the Illini Union Coffee House.

The Coffee House is on the south campus in a temporary building, formerly a mess hall at Camp Grant, which was secured from the Federal Works Agency to increase food service facilities for students and staff. It has been in service, except during the summer of 1948, since the beginning of the first semester of 1947-1948, and is operated as a branch facility of the Illini Union Building. In addition to serving during regular meal hours, the Illini Union Coffee House has offered a soda fountain service between meal hours and in the evenings. The local businessment alleges that this is unfair competition with someonic action. local businessmen allege that this is unfair competition with commercial establishments and ask that the Board of Trustees "take such steps as may be necessary to discontinue and eliminate the above mentioned unfair practices.

#### Answer to the Petition

I. The Coffee House is not financed from State appropriations. The cost of moving the building to the campus and erecting it was financed by a Federal agency. Funds for the purchase and installation of equipment, as well as inventories, have been advanced by the Illini Union from accumulated reserves for maintenance, furniture and equipment, repairs and replacements. These funds must be repaid to the Union, and the present plan calls for the liquidation of this advance over the next five years.

2. A recent survey of the customers in the Coffee House indicated that ap-

proximately 90 per cent of the students using the Coffee House live south of Green Street and west of Wright Street, and the majority live in the temporary houses on the Drill Field. As long as the temporary housing facilities for single students are continued, it will be desirable to continue the operation of the Coffee

House. Soda fountain service has been provided because of a demand for this type of service at meal hours and also to permit the efficient use of the labor

between meal periods.

3. In order to provide additional space in the Illini Union Building for social and recreational programs, it has been decided to close the Ballroom Cafeteria. This was done with the concurrence of Dean Turner, Dean Shelden, Dean Stafford, the Illini Union Board, and student representatives. Therefore, during the current fiscal year the University will offer less food service to students and staff than it did during the past year. We hope this will be offset through additional commercial restaurant service. We plan to reopen the Ballroom Cafeteria if and when it is evident that a need for additional food service exists that can not otherwise be met.

4. In view of the volume of soda fountain business after the evening meal at the Coffee House, we have concluded that we should not continue this feature of the service, but should reopen the Illini Union soda fountain which has been closed during the evenings since the war due to the shortage of labor. This service is desirable because of the many student and faculty activities held in the building

in the evening.

5. The fundamental question involved in this case is whether a need for such service exists and not the reaction of the local operators. The Coffee House was started because of such a need. The need still exists. We are not interested in running restaurants, as such, although food service is regularly maintained in hundreds of American colleges, both public and private. In some, the college dining service, following the old tradition at Oxford University, is compulsory, being regarded as a part of the educational plan.

In food service, as in housing, the University authorities will applaud all

efforts to improve matters through local private initiative.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this communication was referred to the President of the University for reply.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES IN CHICAGO

(29) The Physical Plant Department does not have an architectural staff in Chicago to do the architectural and engineering work (mostly preparation of working drawings and specifications) on the building improvement projects at the Chicago Professional Colleges and the Chicago Undergraduate Division. The architectural firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee proposes to provide the necessary architectural and engineering services, including superintendence of construction work, for a fee of 10 per cent of the first \$50,000 of the cost of a project, 8 per cent of the next \$50,000, and 6 per cent of any cost over \$100,000, plus travel expenses.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends award of a contract on this basis. The Comptroller concurs with the understanding that this firm will be employed on any given project only on notice initiated by the Physical Plant Department and subject to further approval. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller further recommend that the firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee be authorized under the terms of the fore-

going proposal to provide the architectural and engineering services for the Physical Medicine addition at a fee estimated not to exceed \$10,000.

I recommend: (1) approval of this procedure, provided that any commission involving a fee of \$5,000 or less will be subject to authorization by the President of the University, and that if the fee is estimated to exceed \$5,000 it will be subject also to approval by the Board of Trustees; (2) that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with Holabird and Root and Burgee for the architectural and engineering work on minor improvement projects in Chicago in accordance with the terms heretofore specified for the balance of the current fiscal biennium ending June 30, 1949. provided further that the contract may be terminated on thirty days' notice; and

(3) authorization of this firm to provide the architectural work for the Physical Medicine addition under the terms of such contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted.

GREEN STREET SIDEWALK

(30) Recently bids were taken for reconstruction of sidewalks north of Green Street between Wright Street and Goodwin Avenue, which is necessary because the construction of steam and electrical service lines to the new Electrical Engineering and Mechanical Engineering Buildings required the removal of former sidewalks. The cost of this sidewalk, accordingly, will be divided between these two projects. The sidewalk leading to the main entrance of Engineering Hall is a maintenance project, the cost of which is to be charged to Physical Plant Maintenance funds.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the General Paving Company, the lowest bidder,

on the basis of their total base bid of \$6,710.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded and authority granted as recommended.

# ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(31) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, to provide for engineering services to include drawings and specifications for the extension of steam and electrical service from the Utilities Distribution System to the new Graduate Student and Staff Apartments in Urbana.

The Board approved a contract with Sargent and Lundy for engineering services for the Power Plant and Distribution System on November 23, 1945 (Minutes, page 919). The estimated cost of this addition is \$1,425, and costs will be computed on the same basis as the original contract, i.e., 6 per cent of

the cost of the completed project.

Funds are available in the appropriation for student and staff apartments. I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as requested.

# ELECTRICAL SERVICE FOR BETATRON FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

- (32) Incidental to the extension of electrical service for the Betatron for the Chicago Professional Colleges, it will be necessary to conclude the following agreements with the Commonwealth Edison Company:
  - 1. Permit to run overhead lines from University property.
  - 2. Order for labor and material at a cost of \$2,273.

3. Meter lease.

4. Facilities rental agreement.

Funds are available in the capital and operating appropriations to cover the expenditures resulting from the execution of these agreements. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller request the approval of these agreements.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute them.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given as recommended.

# ADDITIONS TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(33) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the following additions to the contract for the electrical work in connection with the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building at Urbana:

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as recommended.

### PURCHASE OF FURNITURE FOR PUBLIC AREAS OF NEW WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(34) In considering the furnishings for the new Women's Residence Hall, I asked a special committee consisting of Professor Frank Roos, Chairman, the late Professor Alta Gwinn Saunders, and Professors Janice Smith and A. C. Littleton to review the problem. The committee recommended that the College of Agriculture be given the responsibility of carrying this project through to completion, working through the Home Economics Department and in conjunction with the Business Office and Physical Plant Department. This responsibility was accepted by Dean Rusk, who assigned Assistant Professor Dorothy J. Iwig of the Home Economics Department to work under his direction and with the aid of an advisory committee. The advisory committee thus appointed included the following:

I concur and request authority to place orders accordingly.

### UNIVERSITY'S SHARE OF SEWAGE DISPOSAL COSTS

(35) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 343), the Board approved a plan under which the University pays part of the operating costs of sewage disposal

through the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District. This became effective July 1.

On May 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 1104), the Board approved in principle the financing by the University of an addition to the local sanitary sewer system to serve the temporary housing area on South First Street, at an estimated cost

of \$60,000. Engineering studies of this development are being made,

Officers of the Sanitary District have now advised the University that a further addition to the central plant, at an estimated cost of \$140,000, is necessary. A large portion of the increased flow is due to the University load. An estimate of the amount of University sewage indicates that the University's fair share of the cost of this addition would be about \$25,000. The University is asked if it will accept this obligation and contribute to the project. The proposal is similar in principle to previous University participation in the costs of sanitary service and of improving West Springfield Avenue in Urbana. This expenditure, however, would be in the biennium 1949-1951, the budget for which is in preparation and is subject to appropriation of the funds by the General Assembly.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the acceptance of this obligation; the item has been included in the biennial budget estimates of the Physical Plant Department.

I recommend that the Board give assent and authorize a provision for this expenditure in the biennial operating budget for 1949-1951, the actual payment to be contingent upon an adequate State appropriation,

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this recommendation was adopted.

### AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(36) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded those candidates who fulfilled all of the requirements and who passed the C.P.A. examination which was given in May, 1948 (see Appendix, page 132).

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

### QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(37) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of June 30, 1948. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

### REPAIR OF WALKS AND DRIVES IN TEMPORARY HOUSING AREAS

(38) Recently bids were requested for repairs to the macadam walks and drives in the temporary housing area. The following bids were received:

A quotation was submitted by the Champaign Asphalt Company for the same work but using a plant-mix hot asphaltic concrete material, which we consider superior to the construction upon which we received bids. Although the quotation of the Champaign Asphalt Company was based on unit prices (20 cents a square foot for resurfacing with asphalt and for patching holes with macadam, and 30 cents a square foot for new construction), quantities required have been taken off by them and checked by our organization, indicating that this work can be accomplished by them at approximately \$13,500. The Champaign Asphalt Company is the only local company in a position to furnish and place hot asphaltic material. Contractors from other cities would not bid on a project of this size, so that it is not possible to obtain competition on the use of this material.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the two bids received on August 31 be rejected, and authority be granted to execute a contract with the Champaign Asphalt Company on a unit cost basis at an estimated total cost of \$13,500. The cost of this work is to be charged to funds available in the maintenance budget of the Temporary Housing Project, so that no special appropriation is needed.

### AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REMODELING 704 SOUTH SIXTH STREET, CHAMPAIGN

(39) The Board of Trustees at its meeting on July 22 (Minutes, page 4), authorized the leasing of property at 704 South Sixth Street, Champaign, and appropriated the sum of \$25,000 for remodeling this area into space suitable for offices of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations.

Since the work is of a remodeling character and it is difficult to secure reasonable fixed bids and because of the time required in preparing detailed specifications and securing bids, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the general work be done under the terms of the contract for minor repairs and alterations on a cost plus basis as awarded by the Board of Trustees at their meeting on July 22, to Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign. The cost of this work is estimated to be \$9,000.

I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute an addition to the general contract to provide for the remodeling

The Comptroller presented this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was authorized as recommended.
