The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, February 17, 1949, at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

EXECUTIVE SESSION

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, JANUARY 24, 1949

The Secretary reported for record that the Executive Committee on January 24, 1949, authorized the following purchases on recommendation of the President of the University.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University. **NEW FIRE STATION**

(1) The building appropriation requests for 1949-1951 include \$250,000 for a new fire station. The State Fire Marshal has offered to secure a supplementary appropriation of \$450,000 from the fire prevention fund in the State Treasury to provide additional facilities in this building, particularly an auditorium with seating capacity of 800 to be used for meetings of organizations interested in fire protection, schools of instruction, equipment displays, and quarters for representatives of the State Fire Marshal.

The University is asked to assume:

- Cost of preparing plans, specifications, and supervision of construction.
 Cost of land required.
- 3. Complete operation and maintenance costs for the structure and the grounds.
- 4. Salaries of fire fighting personnel and cost of truck operation.
 5. Responsibility for the assignment of space on the first floor of the building with the privilege of making use of the auditorium and basement area for University functions, provided there are no conflicts with events scheduled by the State Fire Marshal's Office or the Illinois Firemen's Association.

The State Fire Marshal's Office and the Illinois Firemen's Association agree to assume:

Salaries and equipment for their office personnel.

Salary and equipment for a Deputy Fire Marshal, if and when appointed.
 Cost of exhibits and demonstration equipment for training and fire fighting demonstration work.

4. Expense of special arrangements for meetings sponsored by the State Fire

Marshal's Office or the Illinois Firemen's Association.

5. Additions or alterations to the structure or equipment required by the State

Fire Marshal's Office and/or the Illinois Firemen's Association.

The University would provide additional funds of approximately \$6,000 a year for operation and maintenance, but not before 1951. In return the University would have the use of an additional large lecture room when it is not required for the

purposes specified.

In recommending an appropriation for strictly University facilities, the Building Program Committee agreed in principle with the plan of joint development. The Chairman of the Committee, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller have reviewed the proposal submitted by the State Fire Marshal and recommend its approval. He has requested that no publicity be given to the proposal until it is further developed with State authorities.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this plan was approved.

GIFT OF MR. AND MRS. MERLE J. TREES

(2) The Executive Committee of the Board on December 28, 1948 (Minutes, page 190), accepted an offer from Mr. and Mrs. Merle J. Trees of one-half interest in their Rembrandt "Portrait of Amsterdam Burgher" as their gift to the "Emily Nichols Trees (Class of 1905) and Merle Jay Trees (Class of 1907) Collection" for 1048.

Mr. and Mrs. Trees have decided to offer the University the remaining one-half interest in this painting as their 1949 contribution to the Trees Collection. As further evidence of this offer they have sent the Secretary of the Board a formal deed of gift in which each contributes the remaining undivided one-fourth interest in the painting. This painting is appraised at \$65,000 by the Art Institute

of Chicago.

I recommend the acceptance of this offer and that the Secretary of the Board be requested to convey to Mr. and Mrs. Trees a formal expression of appreciation on behalf of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this gift was accepted with great appreciation of the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Trees.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS LEGISLATION TO BE REQUESTED OF THE 66TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- (3) I request that the President of the University be authorized to secure the introduction in the 66th General Assembly of the following University legislation. These measures have been discussed with the Senator and the three Representatives of the 24th Senatorial District who have agreed to sponsor or to secure sponsorship of the bills:
 - Biennial operating budget for 1949-1951.

2. Appropriations for buildings and other capital improvements.

3. Amendment of insurance code to make University of Illinois revenue bonds legal investments for insurance companies in Illinois. Obligations of the University of Illinois Foundation are legal investments for insurance companies but the direct obligations of the University are not. This amendment would improve the market for University revenue bonds.

for University revenue bonds.

4. Amendment of State Finance Act to permit the University to handle, through its own treasury, funds of all self-supporting activities, instead of requiring the deposit in and disbursement from the State Treasury. The present arrangement complicates budget operations and makes it difficult to handle business operations of such activities with dispatch, thus causing loss of discounts and creating dissatisfaction among employees in payment of wages. The change has been discussed with representatives of the Department of Finance and the State Auditor's Office and has their tentative approval.

5. Authorization to pay real estate taxes on certain University properties or to make payments to municipalities in lieu of taxes.

6. Amendment of Civil Service Act to eliminate wartime provisions relating

to certification.

7. Change in name of the "Research and Educational Hospitals" to "University

of Illinois Hospitals.'

8. Transfer of the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute from the Department of Public Welfare to the University. At present the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute is operated jointly by the University and the Department of Public Welfare. A single administration is desirable.

9. Transfer of title to Institution for Tuberculosis Research in Chicago to

the University of Illinois.

President Stoddard and Mr. Morey commented on these proposals. On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as requested.

PURCHASE OF FARM LAND

(4) I recommend that in accordance with the recommendation of Dean Rusk, referred by the Board on January 13, 1949, to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to purchase an option (Minutes, page 196), approved by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Executive Committee on January 18, 1949 (Minutes, page 226), the purchase of 320 acres of land at a price not to exceed \$600 an acre be authorized.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this purchase was authorized as recommended, and the President and the Legal Counsel were authorized to deal directly with the owners and their counsel to secure an option after March 7, 1949, and an appropriation of not to exceed \$100,000 from this year's funds was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

REPORTS OF ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the Secretary was instructed to notify the members of the Board promptly of all actions of the Executive Committee on matters specially referred to the Executive Committee by the Board.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

I. LAWRENCE IVAN O'KELLY, Professor of Psychology, beginning September I, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,000.

2. DETLEV WALTHER SCHUMANN, Professor of German, beginning September

 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.
 3. Leonard Martin Zubko, Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering, beginning February 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,600.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these appointments were confirmed.

OPEN SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered, in open session, the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF ENTOMOLOGY

(1) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Professor William Patrick Hayes, now Acting Head of the Department of Entomology, as Head of the Department on indefinite tenure effective as of February 1, 1949, at an annual salary rate of \$7,500.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR HAROLD L. WALKER AS ACTING DIRECTOR OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF MINES AND MINERALS

(2) At the request of the Governor, I have authorized Professor Harold L. Walker, Head of the Department of Mining and Metallurgical Engineering, to accept appointment as Acting Director of the State Department of Mines and Minerals.

Professor Walker desires to retain his present University position, carrying on his new duties concurrently with the State assignment and without change in salary. This I have approved. I request confirmation of my action.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this action was confirmed as requested.

APPOINTMENTS TO PROFESSIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE DIVISION OF SERVICES FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

(3) The Board of Trustees has authorized the appointment of a Professional Advisory Committee of the Division of Services for Crippled Children to work with the Superintendent of the Division in providing necessary contacts between it and the University. The present committee was appointed for two years from December 1, 1946. The Vice-President in charge of the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy submits the following nominations for reappointments and new appointments to this Committee for two years from December 1, 1948. I concur in these appointments.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these appointments were made as recommended.

PROGRESSIVE ADMISSIONS PLAN

- (4) On recommendation of the Director of Admissions and Records and with the concurrence of the Provost, I recommend the following changes in the policy governing admissions to the University effective at the beginning of the Summer Session of 1949:
- I. That the progressive admissions plan be rescinded. It is generally agreed that the plan has worked well. It is no longer needed, because we expect to be able to admit all students, resident in Illinois, who qualify under the former system. Illinois residents will be admitted who fulfill the standard entrance requirements—graduation from an accredited secondary school with fifteen units of acceptable secondary school work.
- 2. That with respect to applicants who are not residents of the State of Illinois: (a) the admission of new freshmen be confined to students who rank in the upper 50 per cent of their high-school graduating classes; and (b) the admission of transfer students be confined to those who average not less than 3.5 in their college work in terms of the marking system of the University of Illinois.
- 3. That transfer students who are residents of Illinois who have a scholastic average of less than 3.0 be admitted only on special action of the dean of the college to which the student seeks admission.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these changes in policy were approved as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(5) In accordance with the terms of the Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees, the Director of Nonacademic Personnel certifies to the Retirement System most nonacademic employees as of the date of employment. This practice is costly in time and effort, since employee turnover occurs chiefly within the first six months of employment, the normal probationary period.

the normal probationary period.

It is agreed by all officials concerned that the practice should be changed to provide for certification at the end of the six months probationary period. This calls for the following changes in the Policy and Rules (language to be deleted

in brackets and new language in italics):

Section I — 6. [A permanent and continuous employee is (a) one employed in a position or in work which the University contemplates continuing for the next six months, or is (b) a person who has completed six months of service.] A permanent and continuous employee is an employee who has completed six months service in any classification or classifications in nonacademic employment. For this purpose a month of service shall be no less than twenty work days, excluding approved absences. A person employed regularly but on a part-time basis and fulfilling the above conditions will be considered a permanent and continuous employee.

Section III—1-A. Permanent and continuous employees and those employed in positions or in work which the University contemplates continuing for at least six months, but who have not yet completed six months' service in any classification or classifications of nonacademic employment, in prevailing rate groups paid at hourly rates, will be paid a monthly rate determined by multiplying the number of hours of the work year, which shall be uniform in all years, by the hourly rate and dividing by 12, as follows: . . .

SECTION VI—I-Sub-paragraph. Permanent and continuous employees and those employed in positions or in work which the University contemplates continuing for at least six months, but who have not vet completed six months' service in any classification or classifications of nonacademic employment not in a prevailing rate group will be excused with full pay.

Section VIII - 2-A. Each full-time permanent and continuous employee is entitled to a disability leave of two work weeks with pay in each year of service, no part of which shall be cumulative. Each permanent and continuous employee employed regularly but on a part-time basis is entitled to such fraction of two work weeks with pay as is represented by the relationship between this part-time employment and the full-time schedules in his classification. Any permanent and continuous employee, or any person who is employed in a position or in work which the University contemplates continuing for at least six months, but who has not yet completed six months' service in any classification or classifications of non-academic employment, who is disabled before completing his first year of service will be allowed the same proportionate amount of the two work weeks' disability leave as the portion of the year completed.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin these changes in policy were approved as recommended.

APPROPRIATION AND CONTRACT FOR EMERGENCY LIGHTING SYSTEM IN THE MCKINLEY HOSPITAL

(7) The Board of Trustees has authorized installation of an emergency lighting system in the McKinley Hospital to provide service to the first floor, including X-ray room, laboratory, and emergency room, and to the surgery quarters on the third floor.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$5,124 for this installation to the Leverenz

Electric Company, Danville, the lowest bidder.

I recommend that an appropriation of \$5,124 be made for this improvement and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appropriation was made and authority was given as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Mc-Laughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

COLD ROOM IN PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT BUILDING AT CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(8) One of the important items required for the new Physical Environment Unit, under construction in Chicago from a State appropriation and supplementary appropriations from the University's General Reserve, is a cold room including necessary refrigeration, insulation, and accessory equipment to maintain constant temperature. This equipment is not available as a single standard manufactured product. It must be constructed and installed especially and is of a highly specialized

type both in design and in performance.

A committee appointed by Vice-President Ivy has selected the Vilter Sales and Construction Company and the Armstrong Cork Company, both of Chicago, as the concerns best fitted to provide the desired equipment and in a position to deliver and complete the work promptly and within the period of availability of the State appropriation. Prices have been secured from these concerns as follows:

Vilter Sales and Construction Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Chicago, for mechanical equipment and Armstrong Cork Company, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and Chicago, for insulation. 28 936

The committee in charge of the work has reviewed the proposals and reports that, based on engineering design and cost of necessary components, the proposed costs are reasonable.

Vice-President Ivy requests that the contracts be awarded as scheduled above.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these contracts were awarded as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF HYDRAULIC ENGINEERING LABORATORY QUARTERS

(9) Included in the special appropriations for nonrecurring expenditures made by the Board on January 13, 1949 (Minutes, page 204), are funds for the construction of an addition to Warehouse No. 1, near the Sanitary Engineering Laboratory, to provide quarters for research in hydraulic engineering.

Since the work is of a remodeling nature, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that it be done under the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, for work of this nature at an esti-

mated cost of \$12,577.30.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE CHEMISTRY AND CHEMICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,752.14 in the general contract for the construction of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building to provide for (1) terrazzo treads and landings on the stairs in place of cement treads and landings, and (2) asphalt tile floors in stair halls (continuation of asphalt tile floors in corridors).

These are some of the items eliminated from the original specifications in order to keep down the cost of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building. Sufficient funds are now available for these additions. The terrazzo stair treads and the asphalt tile floors in the stair halls will be more satisfactory from the

standpoint of maintenance and appearance.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(II) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,300 in the general contract for the construction of the Mechanical Engineering Building for the installation of acoustical tile ceilings on the first and second floors in six classroom corridors, Acoustical treatment of these areas was omitted from the original specifications and deferred until it was certain that funds would be available.

Acoustical treatment of ceilings will reduce the noise from the corridors and it is desirable because some classes will extend through periods when other classes are changing. Funds are now available for this addition.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract

dition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF ELECTRICAL CONDUIT UNDER AND ACROSS CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF CHICAGO

(12) At the request of the University of Illinois, the City Council of the City of Chicago passed an ordinance on December 22, 1948, granting permission to the University to excavate for, install, and maintain an electrical conduit under and across certain streets in the City of Chicago.

The Legal Counsel recommends that the following resolution be adopted. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be

authorized to execute an acceptance form for such an electrical conduit.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Chicago, at its regular meeting on December 22, 1948, passed an Ordinance which grants permission to the University of Illinois to install and maintain electrical conduit under and across certain streets in the City of Chicago, and

Whereas, by the provisions of said Ordinance, a copy of which is hereto attached, the same is required to be accepted by the University of Illinois,

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the permission granted by said Ordinance be and the same is hereby accepted according to the terms of said Ordinance as set forth therein.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this resolution was adopted and authority was given as recommended.

PURCHASE OF PRINTING EQUIPMENT

(13) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 312), the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of a new press to be installed in Gregory Hall for joint use by the Illini Publishing Company, the University Press, and the School of Journalism to replace the press now owned and operated by the Illini Publishing Company in Illini Hall. An appropriation of \$25,000 was made to apply toward the cost of the press, the balance of cost of the press to be paid by the Illini Publishing Company.

On September 26, 1947 (Minutes, page 829), the Board approved a contract with Goss Printing Company for the purchase of the press at a price of \$59,710 with an escalator clause providing for an increase in price prior to delivery. It was agreed that if the readjusted price was not satisfactory the contract could be

cancelled by the buyer without penalty.

When the contract was finally concluded in November, 1947, a price of \$61,160 was stipulated. At that time, a payment of \$6,116 was made as the contract

provided.

On January 5, 1949, the company served notice that the press would be ready for delivery in March, 1949, and the price would be \$65,575. In the meantime, serious problems have arisen concerning the location of the press, the space originally intended being in an addition to the north side of Gregory Hall. This plan has not proved entirely feasible and no satisfactory permanent location is now available. The Illini Publishing Company, which is required to meet the cost of the press in excess of the \$25,000 appropriation made by the University, has concluded that the option to cancel the contract should be exercised. The company has been notified accordingly and has returned the deposit made on the contract and has accepted the cancellation. The University appropriation is being lapsed into the General Reserve.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this cancellation of contract was confirmed.

APPROPRIATION OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUNDS

(14) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois on January 29, 1949, appropriated \$1,000 from the unappropriated surplus of the Athletic Association for the purpose of conducting a two-day football clinic for high-school coaches in the State of Illinois. This action is submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval.

On motion of General Davis, this appropriation was approved.

PURCHASES

(15) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the purchases listed under A in the Appendix (page 279). The President has authorized emergency purchases listed under B in the Appendix (page 281).

On motion of General Davis, purchases were authorized as recommended under A, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases under B was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS AND LEASES

(16) The Comptroller's report of contracts and leases executed under the general regulations of the Board, from December 11, 1948, also of change orders for cost-plus and other contracts (see page 282).

This report was received for record.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(17) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of December 31, 1948. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

ARCHITECTURAL STUDIES OF NEW BUILDINGS

(18) It would be an advantage to start preliminary studies of some of the projects included in the building program for 1949-1951 on which no work has yet been done. I asked the Building Program Committee to advise me on how any funds that can be made available for such work prior to July 1, 1949, can best be used.

The Committee recommends that:

 An assignment of \$50,000 be made to start preliminary studies of the Biology Building, first unit; Educational Laboratories Building, Psycho-Educational Clinic Division; and Law Building.
 The firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee of Chicago be employed for

2. The firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee of Chicago be employed for these studies on a cost-plus basis subject to these conditions: (a) a maximum fee of not to exceed \$50,000; (b) services may be terminated at any time; and (c) employment is limited to preliminary studies and the University reserves the right to employ other architects for further work on these projects.

Payment for these services will be on the basis of actual salaries plus 1.3 times that amount for indirect costs and commission, plus such direct expenses as blue-printing, telephone calls, and travel. The work will be carried on as directed by the University and only until such time as the University may direct that it

be stopped.

The appropriation herein recommended is much less than will be required to complete preliminary plans. A larger amount is not being recommended at this time because \$50,000 will take care of all work which can be done immediately.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the employment of Holabird and Root and Burgee was authorized under the conditions recommended, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACT FOR POWER PLANT GENERATING EQUIPMENT

(19) On June 15, 1948 (Minutes, page 1159), the Board of Trustees appropriated \$49,220 as the partial cost of a new turbogenerator and auxiliary equipment needed to increase the power production capacity of the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana-Champaign. The estimated cost of the required generator, auxiliary equipment, and installation is \$1,215,280 and provision for it is included in the building program for 1949-1951 as approved by the Board on October 21, 1948.

The \$49,220 already appropriated is for engineering work which can be done

The \$49,220 already appropriated is for engineering work which can be done during the current biennium. As a further means of expediting delivery of the equipment, it was proposed that contracts be entered into, up to a maximum of \$568,500, such contracts giving the University the right of termination if funds for the generating equipment are not appropriated by the General Assembly of Illinois, in which case the University's liability would be limited to the \$49,220 for engineering services.

The Physical Plant Department has secured bids on a 7500 KW turbogenerator, condensing equipment, and a cooling tower. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts to the

lowest bidders as follows:

This cost is within the maximum of \$568,500. Proposals for an electrical switch gear will be considered later.

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts on the basis of the bids indicated herein.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, contracts were authorized as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF PHYSIOLOGY

- (20) On September 1, 1943, the Department of Physiology in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences was merged with the Department of Zoology as an administrative convenience pending the appointment of a head of the Department of Physiology. The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends that:
- I. Effective September 1, 1949, the Departments of Physiology and Zoology be administered as separate departments of the College.
- 2. Dr. Robert E. Johnson, now Director of the Medical Nutrition Laboratory of the Army Service Forces in Chicago, be appointed Professor and Head of the Department of Physiology on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$10,000 an academic year.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

BIENNIAL BUDGET FOR THE INSTITUTION FOR TUBERCULOSIS RESEARCH

(21) The 65th General Assembly of the State of Illinois appropriated to the University of Illinois the sum of \$32,000 for the operation and maintenance of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research. The General Assembly provided that the management of the Institution be vested in a five-man board, two members to

be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University, two by the Board of the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium, and the fifth member to be elected by the other four,

The 65th General Assembly also appropriated funds to the Department of Public Health for constructing and equipping a building and funds to the Department of Finance for the purchase of land. The University will request legislation transferring to the University title to the land on which the building is now being

The Vice-President in Charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges has submitted on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research a proposed operating budget for the biennium of 1949-1951, totaling \$143,000, with the request that the Board of Trustees submit this budget to the Department of Finance. This amount is required for:

Heating, lighting, and maintaining the new building	\$ 61 000
Salaries, wages, supplies, and equipment	82 000
Total	\$143 000

The \$32,000 appropriated by the General Assembly for 1947-1949 was for salaries, supplies, and equipment for only an eight- or nine-month period during 1948-1949.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the transmittal of this request to the Department of Finance of the State of Illinois.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this budget was approved as recommended for transmittal to the State Department of Finance.

STATUS OF ACADEMY FOR UNITED STATES AIR FORCE

President Stoddard reported informally on the status of plans for an Academy for the United States Air Force (Minutes, October 21, 1948, page 138) to the effect that no decision has been made looking to the establishment of such an academy.

Hospitals

This is to supplement the service of the University's laundry operated by the Physical Plant Department which because of space limitations is unable to do all of the work required. Fifty-seven commercial laundries in the Chicago area were asked if they would be interested in bidding on such service and 12 replied they would. Subsequently six of these laundries submitted bids on a one-stop service with a central pick-up and delivery and two submitted bids on the basis of collecting and delivering laundry at the various locations required. The multiple pick-up and delivery service will be more efficient and economical than a one-stop pick-up and delivery service which would require the University to collect and distribute the laundry internally. This service is proposed only until June 30 of the current fiscal year with any change in price to be mutually agreeable to both parties before it is put into effect. This supplementary service will enable the University to reduce the volume of work handled by its own laundry to a point of greater efficiency.
