MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

July 21-22, 1948



The July meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Wednesday, July 21, and Thursday, July 22, 1948, at the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, according to the following schedule:

July 21, 8:15 p.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

July 22, 9:30 a.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson. Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board soon after the meeting began.

Provost C. R. Griffith was present, acting for President Stoddard; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during part of the evening, Director D. E. Dickason, Architect E. L. Stouffer, and Mr. N. C. Farr.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PROVOST

The Board considered the following matters presented by the Provost acting for the President of the University.

HEADSHIP OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ART

(1) The President of the University has approved the following request from Professor Frank J. Roos, Jr., of the Department of Art:

"This is to request that I be relieved of my duties as Head of the Department of Art, as of September 1, 1948. By continuing as Professor of Art, I will be able to resume my research which, I feel, has been too long interrupted."

The President has appointed Professor Allen Weller, Chairman, Professor C. V. Donovan, and Associate Professor James Shipley as a Committee to administer the Department of Art beginning in September, 1948.

Confirmation of these administrative changes is requested.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these changes were approved and confirmed.

PROPOSED AGREEMENT WITH REGARD TO OPERATING ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO DIVISIONS

(2) Following the Board's action on June 15, 1948 (Minutes, page 1153), I have carried on negotiations with Mr. Anthon J. Imhahn, President of Local 399 of the International Union of Operating Engineers, with the assistance of Mr. Donald E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, Mr. Paul Hartley, Associate Director, and Mr. Charles E. Reid, Assistant Chief Operating Engineer at the Chicago Professional Colleges. After long face-to-face discussions followed by telephone conversations, there is an unofficial agreement on the following proposal:

That the basic rate of pay for the operating engineers be \$2.25 an hour, with the option of a 48-hour week straight time, the hourly rate to become effective as of July 1, 1947, but the payment of the differential to be on the basis of the 40-hour week which was in effect to July 1, 1948. It is understood that consistent and proportional changes will be approved for chief or supervisory engineers.

On the assumption that official confirmation will have been received from the Union officials, I recommend approval.

Perhaps a few words of explanation would be helpful. On a 40-hour week the new rate comes to \$390 a month; on a 44-hour week, \$430 a month; and on a 48-hour week, \$470 a month. It will be recalled that the average hourly rate for the four hospitals listed is \$1.63; for the four universities, \$1.71; for the six public institutions (exclusive of the Housing Authority, which was low), \$2.35. The average rate for the business and industrial enterprises in the City of Chicago is \$2.00. Our offer, therefore, falls between the rates prevailing in private institutions and those in the other public institutions. Director Dickason and Director Havens are agreed that no lay-offs are contemplated under the new wage scale.

The main thing accomplished by the proposed agreement is that we shall not be tied to a utilization of any political subdivision as a bench mark for establishing this wage scale. In arriving at the figure of \$2.25, what we have done is to average the other hospitals and universities and the political subdivisions in determining the new scale. I am pleased to report that Mr. Imhahn has acted in good faith throughout these proceedings and I believe that we have a basis for labor peace on this front. I recommend, therefore, that the above proposal be adopted.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this proposal was adopted as recommended.

PURCHASE OF RESIDENCE PROPERTIES FOR STAFF HOUSING

(3) The purchase of additional residence properties is recommended as part of the special program of residence properties acquisitions for rental to faculty personnel previously authorized by the Board of Trustees. Houses are needed for at least two new department heads.

1. *701 West Delaware Avenue, Urbana.* The purchase of this property at a price not to exceed \$30,000 is recommended. This is one of the better faculty homes

and should be kept as such. The University has secured an independent appraisal of the property which indicates that the price is very reasonable under present real estate market conditions. There is very good prospect that the house can be rented to a member of the faculty who will eventually purchase it. An appropriation of \$30,000 from the General Reserve Fund is recommended.

2. *1008 South Lincoln Avenue, Urbana.* The Dean of Students and the Director of the Physical Plant recommend the purchase of this property at a cost not to exceed \$30,000. The house would be used as a nurses' home to replace the present nurses' home at 1009 West Nevada Street, and this house would then be available for staff housing. Thus the purchase of this property would accomplish two objectives. The price is based on an independent appraisal secured by the University.

3. *909 West Nevada Street, Urbana.* This property is available for purchase at an appraised value of \$17,500. It is in the zone of future campus expansion (for women's residence halls) along the south side of Nevada Street and is two houses east of University property at 1001 West Nevada Street. It can be used advantageously for staff housing until the site is required for other University use. However, it will not be available for several months. The present owner plans to build a new house.

4. *1209 West Illinois Street, Urbana.* The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends the purchase of this property at a price of \$16,340. It adjoins property the University has purchased at 1205-1207 West Illinois Street.

I recommend that the purchase of these properties be authorized and an appropriation of \$96,340, or so much thereof as is needed, be made for the purchase price, expenses incidental to purchase, and such minor remodeling as may be found necessary to make the houses suitable for University use.

The Board has previously authorized the purchase of twelve residence properties. Some of these houses need repairing and redecorating. This fact was taken into consideration when prices were negotiated. In one case the Board made a specific assignment of \$3,000 for major repairs, but no provision was made for such work on other properties. There is an unexpended and unencumbered balance of \$10,860 in these appropriations. I recommend that the Board authorize the use of this money for repairs and improvements on properties acquired under this program.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these purchases were authorized, the appropriations were made, and funds assigned as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 601½ EAST SPRINGFIELD AVENUE, CHAMPAIGN

(4) The Board of Trustees has approved the site between Wright Street and Sixth Street, and the south side of east Springfield Avenue, Champaign, for the new Water Survey Building to be built by the Department of Registration and Education. Construction on the first unit will begin in the near future. Two properties have been purchased. The Department expects to construct an addition during the 1949-1951 biennium and additional land will be needed. For this purpose the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the chairman of the University Building Program Committee recommend the purchase of the property at 601½ East Springfield Avenue, Champaign, at a price of \$8,000.

I concur in this recommendation and recommend a special appropriation for this purpose.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken.

At this point, Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board.

PROPOSAL FOR TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATION AND STUDY OF THE INSTITUTE OF GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

(5) On August 5, 1947 (Minutes, page 493), the Board of Trustees, consistently with House Joint Resolution No. 17, Sixty-fifth General Assembly, which recommended to the University that it establish a "Curriculum in Government," and on recommendation of the President of the University, established the Institute of Government and Public Affairs. The functions and plan of organization were laid out briefly. Professor H. M. Gray, Professor of Economics and Associate Dean of the Graduate College, was appointed Director.

After a review of the work in this area and with the endorsement of all the parties concerned, I now recommend a temporary change in the administrative organization of the Institute. I believe that such a change will permit us to present a united front as we seek the best talent in this field and that it will enable us better to study the internal organization of the Institute. Thus far it has been difficult to evaluate the respective functions and responsibilities of the Institute in relation to the Department of Political Science and the College of Commerce and Business Administration. Officers of instruction and administration have attempted to find a solution, but I am convinced that what we need now is a re-examination of the basic structure of the Institute.

Professor Clarence A. Berdahl, who will be on a sabbatical leave for the first semester of 1948-1949, has asked to be relieved of his duties as Chairman of the Department of Political Science in accordance with the plan approved in the Department some years ago of placing the chairmanship on a rotating basis. In a separate memorandum I am recommending that Professor Charles M. Kneier be appointed Chairman of the Department to serve out the present biennium. These two actions are in themselves unrelated to the Institute of Government and Public Affairs, except that I am requesting Professor Kneier to serve also as Acting Director of the Institute for the coming year and he is willing to add this to his new duties.

In the meantime, Professor Gray has expressed the desire to return to his professorship in Economics in order that he may resume his program of research in that field and has asked to be relieved of his administrative duties. Dean Howard R. Bowen is anxious to have Professor Gray return to this area on a full-time basis and Dean Louis N. Ridenour of the Graduate College is willing to search for a new Assistant or Associate Dean. Concurrently with these changes, I am asking that the Advisory Committee to the Director of the Institute, of which Dean Bowen is Chairman, devote considerable time during the coming year to an analysis of the functions and organization of the Institute of Government and Public Affairs, with special reference to its administrative status.

The basic question, as I see it, is this: Should the Institute continue to be organized on a broad horizontal basis, drawing directly upon many departments and outside resources, or should it be set up as a specialized agency of the Department of Political Science, perhaps somewhat analogous to the Bureau of Research and Service in the College of Education or the Bureau of Economic and Business Research in the College of Commerce? Under either plan I feel that we should develop the professional work and the public services of the Institute along the lines approved by the Board of Trustees in 1947. We have no desire to weaken the basic plan, but only to strengthen it.

Accordingly, I recommend that Professor Charles M. Kneier be appointed Acting Director of the Institute of Government and Public Affairs for the period beginning September 1, 1948, and ending August 31, 1949.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were adopted.

LEASING OF PROPERTIES OFF CAMPUS

(6) The University is faced with an acute problem of finding space for various activities, and especially for 1948-1949. The delays in the building program plus the development of the instructional and research programs have carried the University beyond the amount of space which will be available in University buildings. The vicinity surrounding the University has been canvassed in an effort to secure rental quarters. This has resulted in the following offers:

1. 704 South Sixth Street, Champaign. — Second floor. A business property

one block from the campus and immediately west of Illini Hall and Arcade Building properties. Contains approximately 5,500 square feet. Admirably suited and satisfactorily located for the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations. Rental, \$408.33 a month. Minimum lease period, five years. University to pay portion of heat and operating expense estimated at \$600 a year.

2. 514 East John Street, Champaign.—Second floor. One block west of campus. Contains approximately 1,200 square feet. Rental, \$150 a month for a term of five years.

The Physical Plant Department and the Provost have examined these properties and report them satisfactory for University use and at reasonable rentals.

Because of constitutional limitations, it is impossible for the University to make a lease which runs beyond the end of a biennium without reserving the right to cancel at that date. The owner of the Sixth Street property, W. B. Hayes, refuses to take a lease of this kind. He is willing to take a lease from the University of Illinois Foundation, which may make a straight five-year lease. The Foundation may then lease it to the University under conditions which the University can meet. There is reason to believe that the University will carry through this lease for the full five-year period.

The area on South Sixth Street would provide for all activities of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations such as office space, seminar room, and library. It would require an additional appropriation of \$2,200 for operating expense and an appropriation for remodeling to be requested at a future meeting of the Board of Trustees.

It is planned to use the area on East John Street for the student publications staff. This would release their present area for the new tabulating equipment now on order. An appropriation of \$800 a year for operation would be required. Some minor remodeling would be necessary but detailed plans have not progressed sufficiently to present an estimate of the amount at this time.

I recommend that (a) the leases be approved, (b) the University of Illinois Foundation be requested to lease the Sixth Street property for sublease to the University, and (c) appropriations be made for operation and rentals as follows: operation, \$3,090 a year, rentals, \$6,700 a year, and that an appropriation not to exceed \$25,000 be made for necessary alterations to prepare the space for use by the Institute.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted, and the appropriations were made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken.

IMPROVEMENTS IN THE PRESIDENT'S HOUSE

(7) The Executive Committee reports that on recommendation of the Provost of the University an assignment of \$28,395.97 was made for remodeling and other improvements in the President's House, viz.:

a. The completion of the east portion of the third floor so as to provide a suite of two bedrooms with adjoining bath.

b. The completion of adjoining space as a sewing room and the construction of shelving for a storeroom.

c. Improvements in the ladies' and men's rooms on the first floor, including a new lavatory.

d. A full length extension of the garage to be built on the south side of the present garage.

The Committee also authorized awards of contracts for this work as follows:

RESOLUTION CONCERNING HOUSING FOR FACULTY OF CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(8) The following resolution endorsing construction of an apartment building at the northeast corner of Harrison Street and Ashland Boulevard, Chicago, is presented:

Whereas, there is a great need for housing facilities for faculty members, staff, and employees at the Professional Colleges in Chicago;

Whereas, it is understood that a group of individuals are interested in constructing an apartment building to contain approximately 120 apartments on a vacant plot of ground which is adjacent to the campus of the Professional Colleges and also adjoins but is not within the Medical Center District;

Whereas, it may be possible if such a building is constructed that the owners might be willing to give priority to University personnel in renting apartments in the building; and

Whereas, in the opinion of the Board of Trustees the construction of such a building with rental priority to University faculty, staff, and employees would alleviate to some extent the need for housing in the area,

Now therefore, be it and it is hereby resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as follows:

1. That the Board of Trustees endorse the construction of the building described at the location indicated, and

2. That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois request that, if the building is constructed, faculty, staff, and employees of the University be given preference in the rental of apartments in the building, it being suggested that this preference amount to a ten-day optional period for renting such apartments in advance of the offering to the general public to rent.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this resolution was adopted.

HOUSING FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

At this point, Dr. Meyer made a report of progress on the consideration of housing for staff, students, and nurses in the Chicago Professional Colleges, and requested Mr. Farr to discuss the projects.

Mr. Farr presented the following summary of financial information:

Mr. Farr recommended that the University approve the project and offer to purchase land from the Medical Center Commission, as a site, for \$50,000; and that the Foundation be requested to apply to the Equitable Life Assurance Society for a loan.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Livingston, the Board took action, by unanimous vote of record, as follows:

I. The proposed project was approved, on condition that it can be set up on substantially the basis presented.

II. The offer to purchase land for \$50,000 from the Medical Center Commission was authorized, and funds were appropriated to cover the purchase.

III. The University of Illinois Foundation was requested to apply for a loan to cover the total cost of construction, excluding land, the details to be approved by the University, including an agreement to lease the properties from the Foundation for an annual rental equal to the debt service.

IV. The Committee on Chicago Departments was authorized to negotiate and recommend to the Board arrangements with architects for the preparation of plans and other matters necessary for the completion of the project.

WAIVER OF PATENT POLICY IN RESEARCH CONTRACTS WITH UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

(g) The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees has informally approved the inclusion of the following patent clause in contracts with the United States Government involving funds supplied by the Atomic Energy Commission. Such provision is contrary to the University policy on patents, but is necessary due to Federal Statute governing the Atomic Energy Commission; and, if the University is to continue research work with funds provided by such Commission, such patent provision must be accepted.

"(1) With respect to each Subject Invention within the scope of this paragraph made by employees of Contractor, except clerical and manual labor personnel who will not have access to technical data, the Contractor shall furnish the United States Atomic Energy Commission (hereinafter in this paragraph called 'the Commission') with complete information thereon. The Commission shall have the sole power to determine whether or not and where a patent application shall be filed and to determine the disposition of the title to and rights under any application or patent that may result. The judgment of the Commission on these matters shall be accepted as final; and the Contractor agrees to obtain the execution of and deliver to the Commission all documents relating to each such Subject Invention and do all things necessary or proper to carry out the judgment of the Commission.

"(2) No claim for pecuniary award or compensation under the provisions of the Atomic Energy Act of 1946 shall be asserted by the Contractor or its employees with respect to any such Subject Invention.

"(3) Except as otherwise authorized in writing by the Commission the Contractor will obtain patent agreements to effectuate the purposes of subparagraphs (1) and (2) of this paragraph from all persons who perform any part of the work under this contract, except clerical and manual labor personnel who will not have access to technical data.

"(4) Except as otherwise authorized in writing by the Commission the Contractor will insert this paragraph in all subcontracts."

Confirmation of the action of the Executive Committee in authorizing the inclusion of such section in government contracts is requested.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the inclusion of these sections in government contracts was approved and confirmed.

CONSTRUCTION AND FINANCING OF GRADUATE STUDENT-STAFF APARTMENT PROJECT AT URBANA

(10) The General Assembly has appropriated (S.B. 662) the sum of \$400,000 for student and staff apartments at Urbana. An additional sum of \$251,700 was appropriated by the Board of Trustees (Minutes, January 8, 1948, page 960). The University owns the site of these apartments (southeast corner of Green Street and Goodwin Avenue, Urbana) which is valued at \$78,300. Plans and specifications have been completed by Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill of Chicago.

Bids for the construction of this project were received July 7. A summary of construction bids and budget for the projects is submitted for (a) the complete project of two six-story and two three-story buildings, (b) one-half of the project consisting of one six-story and one three-story building, and (c) the two six-story buildings.

Funds required for the total cost are expected to be raised by a self-liquidating loan. Inquiry has been made of all lending agencies who, on an earlier survey, indicated that they would be interested in considering a loan on this project. Only three proposals have been offered. The only proposal which would make possible the financing of the project in any form and which is feasible from an amortization standpoint, is that offered by Salk, Ward, and Salk, Inc., of Chicago, on behalf of the Great West Assurance Company of Winnipeg, Canada. This proposal, subject to final approval by the Company, is for a loan of \$900,000, at 4 per cent, payable serially over a period of 25 years, to be a mortgage loan to the University of Illinois Foundation, with a commission of 1½ per cent, payments to be made during construction, prepayment up to 10 per cent in any year

without premium, or at 2 per cent premium sixth to tenth years and 1 per cent premium thereafter for entire loan.

This offer is below the budget estimate of cost of the project by \$44,802, but the architects believe that an adjustment in cost can be made to bring the total outlay within this amount of funds. It exceeds the operating budget of the project by \$2,403 a year, but this is based on an allowance of 5 per cent for vacancy which is believed to be liberal. (It should be noted that this budget does not allow for the payment of local property taxes on this project.) This offer is based on the construction of one-half of the total project including one six-story and one three-story building.

Arguments can be made against going ahead with this proposal at this time. They are: (a) the very high cost of construction, (b) the close margin of net operating income available for debt service, and (c) possible deficit if local property taxes become payable.

In favor of going ahead with the project, however, are the following facts: (a) a fund has been appropriated for this purpose by the General Assembly and is available for the current biennium, (b) an acute need for additional housing facilities for staff and graduate students still exists, (c) the site is owned by the University, (d) there is no assurance that construction cost will be decreased in the near future, and (e) if the project can be initiated and half completed during this biennium, there is a possibility that funds can be secured for the remainder during the succeeding biennium.

In view of all these considerations, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Comptroller, and the Provost recommend:

1. That awards be made to the low bidders for the construction of one-half of this project for total contracts of \$1,222,995.39, an estimated total cost of \$1,674,802.

2. That the offer of Salk, Ward, and Salk, Inc., Chicago, for a loan of \$900,000 be approved.

3. That the University of Illinois Foundation be requested to cooperate in the completion of this financing.

I concur in these recommendations.

The Comptroller presented this matter.

The Legal Counsel commented on the matter of taxation.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR MATERIALS FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM TO THE STAFF- STUDENT APARTMENTS

(11) Bids have been received for materials to be used in the construction of the Utilities Distribution System tunnel east on Illinois Street from Mathews Avenue to supply the proposed Staff-Student Apartment project, viz., steam piping and insulation. It is recommended that the lowest bids be accepted. The awards will be made with the understanding that if bids for the tunnel construction, to be received July 23, establish conditions which can not be met, or that if for any reason the Staff-Student Apartments themselves can not be constructed, these two contracts will not be executed.

The lowest bidders are as follows:

Funds are available in the Utilities Distribution System project for this work.

I concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts as recommended, subject to above condition.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this award was made and authority was given as recommended.

ESTABLISHMENT OF BASIC RATES FOR JANITOR SERVICE AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(12) After various discussions in which Director Dickason took part and in which the President joined on one occasion, the following agreement between the University and the Union is desirable:

The present \$1.35 rate shall be maintained and accepted by the University and the Union for two years beginning July 1, 1948, and ending June 30, 1950, with the understanding that if during that period the composite rate for janitors' wages reaches or goes above \$1.35, the University rate will at that time be tied to the composite janitor rate and shall rise and fall thereafter as it rises and falls.

If by June 30, 1950, the composite janitor rate has not yet reached \$1.35, the University and the Union will reopen negotiations for the purpose of establishing a mutually satisfactory basis for fixing the University wage rate thereafter.

This plan will mean that we will not reduce the janitors' pay prior to June 30, 1950, but will reserve the right to negotiate at that time for establishing a new base related to the composite rate for janitors. In accordance with the action of the Board already taken, it divorces the janitors' rates from the rates for Class B Common Labor.

I recommend that such an agreement be approved.

Director Dickason commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this agreement was approved.

INSURANCE ON HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL SERVICE PLAN

(13) On April 29, 1943, the Board of Trustees established a uniform hospital and medical service fee to be assessed against all students in the Urbana-Champaign departments. At later dates this requirement was extended to the Chicago and Galesburg Undergraduate Divisions.

The Board also approved the recommendation "that at least for the first two or three years, the Board of Trustees authorize the carrying of insurance to cover its obligations under this plan. Later, if it is clear that the proposed fee is adequate, insurance protection can be eliminated."

Each year since that time an insurance policy has been purchased to underwrite the obligation of the Board for the services offered to students under this fee. In the intervening years a considerable surplus has accrued to the University from the operations of the fund (the amount now exceeds \$100,000). Each insurance company carrying the insurance also has had an ample margin over and above costs.

Handling these services through a commercial insurance company involves a material amount of added labor. It also involves added cost of insurance company administration as well as profit retained by them. Experience with the plan is now adequate and the accumulated reserves sufficient to justify the University in assuming this risk and obligation itself.

The Legal Counsel has reported to the Department of Insurance this contemplated change in policy. It is proposed that the buying of insurance to cover this plan be eliminated.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this matter was referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report.

HANDLING OF PETTY CASH AND WORKING FUNDS AND SECURITIES

(14) The State Statute governing the organization of the University (approved February 28, 1867, as amended) provides that at each biennial meeting "it shall be the duty of the Board to appoint a Treasurer who shall not be a member of the Board and who shall give bonds with such security as the Board of Trustees shall deem amply sufficient to guard the University from danger of loss or diminution of the funds entrusted to his care."

Article VI, Section 4 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees (adopted 1908) provides as follows: "The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all the funds and securities belonging to the University."

On February 10, 1932 (Minutes, page 537), the Board of Trustees approved a contract with the First Union Trust and Savings Bank (later merged with

the First National Bank of Chicago) which provides that all securities representing permanent investments of the University are to be held for safekeeping by that Bank.

The Statutes of the University (approved 1936) contain the following provisions:

SECTION 50B:

(1) No department shall receive any funds unless authorized by the Comptroller to do so. All funds shall be accounted for and paid over to the Bursar in such manner and at such times as the Comptroller shall direct.

(2) The Bursar shall collect all moneys due the University from any source and shall turn over the same in full to the Treasurer or to the State Treasurer as required by law as soon as practicable after collection.

SECTION 50E:

(1) The Comptroller is authorized to establish and administer petty cash funds where necessary for the prompt and efficient handling of university business, providing that no single fund of more than \$1,000 may be established without specific action of the Board of Trustees, and provided further that all persons in whose hands a petty cash fund is placed shall be bonded in satisfactory amount. The Board shall designate the banks in which petty cash funds may be deposited and require that persons to whom petty cash funds are advanced make deposits in the banks designated.

Under this authority, the following funds have been maintained in bank accounts other than that in the name of the University Treasurer:

These balances are used to provide a working fund for the purchase of milk and cream by the Dairy Creamery in Urbana, petty cash advances of less than \$1,000 to authorized staff members, advances to the staff for salary earned but not paid by the State Auditor, travel advances, working capital to finance the cashing of salary warrants of staff and veterans' subsistence checks, and other business functions which make necessary the availability of cash at the locations indicated.

The deposit of securities for safekeeping directly with a bank and thus not in the custody or control of the University Treasurer, and the establishment of funds to provide petty cash and working capital which are also not in the custody or control of the Treasurer, are not consistent with Section 4 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, as indicated above. The question recently has been raised by Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, as to his personal liability in the event of a loss involving such securities or cash balances which are in fact neither in his custody nor control. The problem has been reviewed in detail by the Comptroller, Treasurer, and Legal Counsel who recommend that the By-Laws of the Board and the Statutes of the University be amended to conform to the present actual practices and needs of the University, and that thereupon an adjudication be secured from a Court of Jurisdiction to clarify the personal liability of the Treasurer under the Statutes and By-Laws thus amended in relation to the State Statute.

It is therefore recommended that:

1. Section 4 of Article VI of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

"After their receipt by him, the Treasurer of the University shall be the custodian of all funds of the University except such funds, for working purposes, as, from time to time, may be withdrawn from the custody of the Treasurer by

the Board of Trustees and placed in the custody of any University officer. Such working funds may be so withdrawn only in such amounts as may be necessary to provide for the efficient conduct of University business and then only upon such conditions, prescribed by the Board, as will insure their safekeeping and authorized use. The Treasurer of the University shall not be responsible for funds belonging to the University until they have been received by him nor for funds which have been withdrawn from his custody as authorized by the Board of Trustees.

"All securities belonging to the University shall be deposited for safekeeping in a bank designated by the Board of Trustees. The Treasurer of the University shall not be responsible for the safekeeping thereof."

2. Section 50B of the University Statutes, "Receipt and Deposit of Money," be amended to read as follows:

"(1) No department shall receive any funds unless authorized by the Comptroller to do so. All funds shall be accounted for and paid over to the Bursar in Urbana, or the Business Managers in Chicago and Galesburg, in such manner and at such times as the Comptroller shall direct.

"(2) The Bursar in Urbana and the Business Managers in Chicago and Galesburg shall collect all monies due the University from any source and shall turn over the same in full to the Treasurer, or to the State Treasurer, as required by law, as soon as practicable after collection."

The above subparagraphs (1) and (2) shall be subject to Article VI, Section 4 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees and Section 50E (1) of the University Statutes.

3. Section 50E (1) of the University Statutes be amended to read as follows:

"The Comptroller of the University is authorized to establish and administer petty cash and other working funds when necessary for the prompt and efficient handling of University business. Such funds may be so established from funds withdrawn from the Treasurer of the University or from other funds available to the University for such purposes. No single fund in excess of \$1,000 may be so established without specific authorization of the Board of Trustees. Custodians of petty cash and other working funds shall be bonded in amounts satisfactory to the Board. Petty cash and other working funds shall be deposited in banks approved by the Board of Trustees. Neither the Treasurer of the University nor any other officer or employee of the University who is charged by the Board with the responsibility of administering such funds shall be liable for any loss to such funds arising from the insolvency of such depository banks, or for any reason other than his own default."

4. The working funds not in excess of the amounts indicated below be approved, to be deposited in the banks designated:

5. The Legal Counsel be authorized on behalf of the Board to prosecute any suit that may be required to establish the foregoing actions.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were approved, and the By-Laws and the University Statutes were amended as requested.

CORRECTION IN BOARD MINUTES OF MAY 22, 1948

(15) At its meeting on May 22 the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of four residence properties for staff housing including the property at 709 West Michigan Avenue, Urbana. In negotiations with

the owner of this property it was agreed that the University would pay the 1948 real estate taxes, payable in 1949. This was erroneously reported as an agreement by the University to pay the real estate taxes due in 1948 which amount to \$268.15. These taxes are for 1947 and had already been paid by the owner at the time of the negotiations. The 1948 taxes due in 1949 will probably amount to \$300.

Under Illinois law the real estate tax liability is on the owner of a property as of April 1 of the tax year concerned.

It is requested that the Board authorize this correction in the minutes.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the minutes were corrected as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. LOUIS B. HOWARD AS PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF FOOD TECHNOLOGY

(16) The President recommends the appointment of Dr. Louis B. Howard, now Chief of the Bureau of Agricultural and Industrial Chemistry, United States Department of Agriculture, as Professor and Head of the Department of Food Technology on indefinite tenure, beginning September 1, 1948,¹ at an annual salary of \$11,000 for twelve months' service with one month's vacation (AY basis). The President also recommends that as a condition of this appointment Doctor Howard be permitted to do a limited amount of professional consulting work.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appointment was made as recommended.

MEETING OF COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE, JULY 21, 1948

At this point, Dr. Meyer requested a report of the meeting of the Committee on Agriculture held earlier in the day.

Mr. McLaughlin reported orally for the Committee that the afternoon had been given over to a presentation of the building needs of the College of Agriculture by Dean Rusk and his staff, a discussion with the Public Relations Committee of the Illinois Agricultural Association, Mr. Charles B. Shuman, President, and Miss Myra Robinson, President of the Illinois Home Bureau Federation, and Mrs. John Clifton, past President of the Illinois Home Bureau Federation, now Chairman of the Home Economics Building Committee.

Dr. Meyer emphasized the inadequacy of the present facilities and urged that better provision be made for the College of Agriculture.

The Provost gave a preview of the University's askings for buildings for the coming biennium and commented on the general needs of the University.

This report was received for record.

WARNER CONSTRUCTION COMPANY CONTRACT FOR WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees presented a letter from the Warner Construction Company, dated June 28, 1948, in which the Warner Construction Company

1. Demanded that the time fixed under the terms of its contract for the construction of the Women's Residence Hall be extended for a period equivalent to the time lost by reason of any one or all of the fourteen (14) causes for delays by it in the construction of these buildings, as alleged by it;

¹ The effective date was subsequently changed to October 1, 1948.

2. Alleged in each of these fourteen (14) specifications of delay that the causes thereof were by reason of the acts, neglect, or defaults of the Owner or Architect;

3. Also alleged that it could not be declared in default under the terms of its contract until the expiration of said extended period of time equivalent to the time lost by reason of any one or all of the causes as alleged by it; and

4. Also demanded that if its demand for extension of the contract is denied by the Board that matters of dispute or of disagreement or uncertainty be submitted to arbitration in accordance with the terms of its contract.

After discussion of the subject matter of the letter of the Warner Construction Company to the Board of Trustees, dated June 28, 1948, it was resolved that the demand of the Warner Construction Company for extension of time for completion of the contract for the construction of the Women's Residence Hall be and the same is hereby denied; that the allegations of fact in each of the fourteen (14) alleged causes for delay and the alleged causes for delay themselves be and the same are hereby denied; that the Warner Construction Company be and it is hereby declared to be in default under the terms of its contract; that its default is not excused by any provision of the contract or by any rule of law but is the result of its own acts, neglects, or omissions for which it is liable to the Owner for all damages sustained or to be sustained by it by reason of such default; that its demand that the issues, matters in dispute or of disagreement or uncertainty be submitted to arbitration be and the same is hereby denied; that all claims and counterclaims for damages sustained and to be sustained by the Owner, by reason of the default of the Warner Construction Company in failing to complete its contract in accordance with the terms thereof, be asserted against the Contractor, and that the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be and he is hereby directed to reply to the letter of the Warner Construction Company herein referred to and inform it and the bonding companies of this action.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted. Mr. Livingston asked to be recorded as not voting.

SEPTEMBER MEETING TO BE IN PEORIA

On invitation of Mr. Williamson and on motion of Mr. Livingston, the Board voted to hold the September meeting in Peoria, on a date to be determined by the President of the Board in conference with the President of the University.

The Board adjourned at 12:30 a.m.

ADJOURNED SESSION, JULY 22, 1948

When the Board convened at 9:30 a.m. for the adjourned session of July 22, 1948, the following members were present: President Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

Provost Griffith was present; also Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and Director J. F. Wright.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PROVOST

The Board considered the following matters presented by the Provost, acting for the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN OF THE DEPARTMENT OF POLITICAL SCIENCE

(1) Professor C. A. Berdahl, who has served as Chairman of the Department of Political Science since October 1, 1942, has asked to be relieved of the chairmanship at the end of the current academic year. He will be on sabbatical leave of absence during the first semester of 1948-1949. His request is also in keeping with a policy informally agreed upon by the Department of Political Science when the chairmanship administration was adopted to put into practice a rotating service.

After consultation with members of the department, the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Professor Charles M. Kneier as Chairman of the Department of Political Science beginning September 1, 1948, to serve out the current biennium.

The President concurs in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this recommendation was adopted.

CLINICAL FACULTY OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE, 1948-1949

(2) A recommendation that appointments be made to the nonsalaried, or clinical, faculty of the College of Medicine for the academic year beginning September 1, 1948 (see Appendix, page 46), and that the President of the University be authorized to make such additional appointments and other changes as are desirable and necessary.

All appointments are for one year from September 1, 1948, unless otherwise indicated.

A summary by departments of the number of appointments with the comparative figures for 1947-1948 is also submitted.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appointments were made, and authority was given as recommended.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE UNIVERSITY SENATE

(3) The University Senate recommends to the Board of Trustees the following changes in curricula requirements:

1. *English Requirement for Foreign Students.* Rhetoric 114 (English as a Foreign Language) and Rhetoric 115 (English as a Foreign Language) may be accepted as a substitute for Rhetoric 101 and 102 in meeting the requirements for graduation.

2. *Grade-Point Requirement for Premedical Students.* Premedical students must maintain a 3.5 average during the first two semesters in the curriculum. By the end of the third semester the average for the three semesters must be raised to 3.75 and this average must be maintained. Students who fail to meet these minimum requirements will be transferred to the General Curriculum.

3. *Grade-Point Requirement for Pre-dentistry Students.* Students applying for admission to the pre-dentistry curriculum must have ranked in the upper half of their high school graduating class. They must maintain at all times in the curriculum a minimum average of 3.5.

4. *Curriculum in Agricultural Science for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.* Students preparing for graduate study or for employment in certain agricultural industries in which a strong science foundation is necessary are offered two types of programs in this curriculum:

A. For students desiring preparation for advanced study in animal, plant, or soil science.

B. For students desiring preparation for advanced study in the fields included in agricultural economics.

5. *Requirement for Admission to the Pre-veterinary Curriculum in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Professional Curriculum in Veterinary Medicine.* Any freshman whose scholarship rank is in the upper half of his high school graduating class, on entering the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, is eligible for admission to the pre-veterinary curriculum. A student transferring to this college with advanced standing must have maintained at least a 3.5 scholastic average, in terms of the University's grading system, in order to be admitted to the pre-veterinary curriculum.

Applicants for admission to the College of Veterinary Medicine must present not less than sixty semester hours of acceptable credit from a recognized college or university, exclusive of military science and physical education. The sixty semester hours must be distributed as follows:

GRADE REQUIREMENT. Each applicant for admission to the College of Veterinary Medicine, whether from the University of Illinois or from another institution, must have attained in his pre-veterinary work a scholastic average of not less than 3.5, or the equivalent as determined by the University of Illinois for institutions using a different grading system. General University requirements with reference to scholarship of non-Illinois residents will apply.

ENROLLMENT LIMITATIONS. In considering applications for admission, preference will be given to candidates who are residents of Illinois and to Illinois veterans. Students are admitted only by the Director of Admissions and Records. Whenever the number of qualified applicants exceeds the number who can be admitted, selection will be made by a Committee on Admissions composed of the Director of Admissions and Records and members of the faculty of the College appointed by the Dean. When it seems desirable, the committee may refer applicants to the Student Personnel Bureau for interviews.

DEGREES. In the professional veterinary curriculum, the degree of Bachelor of Science in Veterinary Medicine will be awarded on completion of the second year of the curriculum, and the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine will be awarded on completion of the four-year program.

For details of the pre-veterinary and professional veterinary curricula, see Appendix, page 60.

6. *Change in Admission Requirements to Graduate Work in Journalism.* Candidates must present an undergraduate major in journalism (20 hours) or an undergraduate major in one of the related fields of social science. Under the present requirement, candidates must present an undergraduate major in journalism (20 hours).

7. *Authorization of Advanced Degrees in Agricultural Engineering, Speech, and Aeronautical Engineering.* The University Senate recommends that the Board of Trustees authorize the establishment of the following advanced degrees for which the curricula have previously been authorized: Master of Science in Agricultural Engineering, Doctor of Philosophy in Speech, and Master of Science in Aeronautical Engineering.

I concur in the recommendations of the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY AND ANTHROPOLOGY

(4) The President reports for official record that he has authorized a change in the name of the Department of Sociology to the "Department of Sociology and Anthropology."

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this change was approved.

**APPROVAL OF ACTIONS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION**

(5) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association submit the following actions for approval:

1. An appropriation of \$19,250 to purchase the residence property at 301 West Pennsylvania Avenue, Urbana.

2. An appropriation of \$1,874 and award of a contract to the Bash Roofing Company to recalk all expansion joints in the south horseshoe of Memorial Stadium. (The architects, Holabird and Root, recommended for this purpose the use of Hornex, and the Bash Roofing Company is the local distributor for this product.)

3. An additional appropriation of \$3,000 for the construction of a well at the new golf course. (The Board of Trustees on May 22, 1948, Minutes, page 1102, approved an appropriation of \$9,000 for this purpose. It is now clear that this amount will be inadequate, and the supplementary appropriation of \$3,000 is recommended.)

4. An appropriation of \$6,000 for improvements in wiring and new lights for the basketball courts in the West Great Hall of the Stadium.

5. An appropriation of \$250 for the purchase of championship awards for members of the baseball team.

6. A special appropriation of \$3,000 for a contribution to the Alumni Association in connection with service rendered by that organization in field work.

7. An appropriation of \$500 for the annual contribution to the University of Illinois Band to apply on certain expenditures in connection with the football band program.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these actions were approved.

LEGAL SERVICES FOR WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL LOAN

(6) The construction of the Women's Residence Hall, Urbana, is to be financed in part by borrowing funds in the amount of \$900,000. In securing such funds it is necessary that there be an approving opinion of independent counsel. The Legal Counsel and the Comptroller recommend that the firm of Chapman and Cutler, attorneys of Chicago, be engaged for all necessary services in connection with this bond issue.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the employment of Chapman and Cutler was authorized as recommended.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(7) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR REMODELING ARMORY FOR NAVAL SCIENCE

(8) Bids have been received for general and electrical work on remodeling in the Armory to house Naval Science classroom work. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts to the lowest bidders, Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., \$15,692 for general work, and the Square Deal Electric Company, \$6,864 for electrical work.

Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these contracts were awarded and authority was granted as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR MINOR ALTERATIONS

(9) During the past two years, the Board of Trustees has approved on a year-to-year basis (Minutes, March 27, 1947, page 317; September 26, 1947, page 835) a procedure and cost plus fixed fee contracts for minor alterations and remodeling in the Urbana-Champaign division. The work under the contracts is initiated on individual order by the Physical Plant Department, approved by the Comptroller within Board appropriations for jobs which are so small, or of such a character as to make competitive bidding impractical, and not exceeding \$5,000.

This procedure has proved advantageous to all parties concerned. To continue the policy, bids were received on a similar basis for the year 1948-1949.

A general analysis of the bids indicates that if the awards are made to the contractors indicated below, the lowest total cost to the University will result:

General work — Lewis S. Colbert, Urbana

Plumbing and heating — Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company, Champaign

Electrical work — Square Deal Electric Company, La Porte, Indiana

Ventilating and sheet metal work — Schroeder's, Champaign

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend a continuation of this procedure and the award of standing contracts until June 30, 1949, to the companies indicated above.

I concur and recommend that authority be granted to the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute such contracts, the Comptroller to report regularly to the Board all projects initiated under these contracts.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR CHEMISTRY AND CHEMICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,073.83 in the contract with John Felmley Company for the general work on the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building. This increase is to provide for changes requested by the Building Committee of the Chemistry Department to include the furnishing and installation of removable machine platform grading in mezzanine "A" and unit operations laboratory, a stair to the pit in Room 18, and light-proof shades in Room 438.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$6,936.80 in the contract with the Leverenz Electric Company for electrical work in the construction of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building to provide for changes in wiring due to a change from fluorescent lighting fixtures to incandescent lighting fixtures.

Funds are available for these additions in the special State appropriation for the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these changes.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these additions were approved and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(11) The Department of Electrical Engineering has requested the following additions to the contract with the John Felmley Company for the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building:

1. Alterations in Room 219 to make it suitable for laboratory use for illumination engineering instruction.....\$3 062 11
2. Acoustical materials for walls and ceilings..... 5 821 31

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend these additions. Funds are available in the State appropriation for this building.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these changes.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these additions were approved and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT ADDITION TO RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$2,968 to the contract with E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company of Chicago for the general work on the Physical Environment Addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals, to provide for the construction of a temporary machine shop.

Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this addition was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR PLUMBING FOR TEMPORARY CAFETERIA AT URBANA

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$6,827.19 in the contract with the Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company for plumbing and heating work in the construction of the Temporary Cafeteria at Urbana, to provide for the cost of connecting all food service equipment in the building.

Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this change.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this addition was approved and authority was given as recommended.

REPORT OF CHANGE IN ESTIMATES FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON CHEMISTRY AND CHEMICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(14) The Board of Trustees on June 23, 1947 (Minutes, page 398), approved the extension of the contract with Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White for architectural services on the Chemistry Building to include plans and specifications for the equipment. The contract was increased on the basis of 8 per cent of the cost of the equipment, and it was estimated that the total cost of the contract would be \$17,360.

This was based on the original estimate of \$217,000, made two years ago, for

the cost of equipment. Bids received totalled \$548,553.60, so that on the basis of 8 per cent the fee will be \$43,884.29, of which 75 per cent, or \$32,913.22, is due now.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this payment was authorized.

PURCHASE OF OIL FOR TEMPORARY HOUSING

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Comptroller, and the Director of Purchases recommend the purchase of approximately 300,000 gallons of No. 1 fuel oil to be delivered as required during 1948-1949 to the temporary housing units on the Drill Field area. The price is to be the truck-delivered price in effect at the time of delivery. The present price is 14.4 cents a gallon.

It is recommended that orders be placed as follows at an approximate total cost of \$15,000 each:

I concur and request approval of this purchase.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this purchase was approved.

AWARD OF ENGINEERING SERVICES CONTRACT FOR OIL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEMS — TEMPORARY HOUSING

(16) The present system of distributing oil to the storage tanks in the Drill Field housing area has proved to be excessively expensive, amounting to approximately \$30,000 during 1947-1948. A central fuel oil distribution system from storage tanks located on the railroad siding near the Abbott Power Plant might effect substantial savings.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the employment of Neiler, Rich, and Bladen for the purpose of making studies of the engineering phase of the centralized system at a fee of 10 per cent, with the understanding that if for any reason the work should be stopped before completion they will bill the University on the basis of actual time including principals' time multiplied by three to cover overhead and profit, with a maximum fee of \$3,000.

Funds are available in the special State appropriation for temporary student housing.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the employment of this firm was authorized, on condition that these studies can not be undertaken by the Physical Plant Department.

PURCHASES

(17) There are submitted herewith recommendations for purchases for approval by the Board, and purchases authorized by the President of the University (see Appendix, page 61).

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, purchases were authorized as recommended, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

ENGAGEMENT OF IGOR STRAVINSKY

(18) The School of Music requests approval of a contract for the services of Igor Stravinsky, distinguished composer and conductor, to conduct a performance of the University symphony orchestra in connection with the Music Festival to be held March 3, 1949, for a fee of \$1,500.

Funds are available in the regular budget of the School of Music.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ROBBERY AT BUSINESS OFFICE OF CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(19) The Business Manager of the Chicago Professional Colleges reports through the Comptroller that on the morning of June 17, 1948, at about 11:00 a.m., armed robbers held up the Business Office of the University at the Chicago Professional Colleges and robbed the Business Office of the following valuables:

1. Currency and coin.....\$2 238 00
2. Receipts for advances as a result of adjustments due to resignations and travel advances..... 385 27
3. Possible loss due to loss of powers of attorney authorizing the endorsement of State warrants..... 2 446 83

Item 2 represents only that portion of a total of about \$800 of papers taken which it has been impossible to replace. Additional replacements may come to light on these items. Item 3 represents powers of attorney attached to receipts of authorization for endorsing salary warrants from individuals leaving the University after payrolls were prepared. These enable the cashier to replace the amount advanced and credit the difference between that and the warrant to the department to which it was originally charged. It will probably be possible to replace to a considerable degree, and perhaps fully, all of these documents.

Item 1 is completely covered by insurance but not items 2 and 3.

Resolved: That the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association, in convention assembled at Springfield, Illinois, May 16-17-18, 1948, commends the President and Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and Dean E. R. Serles of the College of Pharmacy for the splendid, cooperative, and cordial relations which have existed during the past year between them and the Pharmacy Advisory Committee to the College of Pharmacy, and respectfully suggest and recommend the appointment of our respected member and Past President, Harold A. Wild, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dale Ruedig, as well as the reappointment of our respected member, Otto J. Pelikan, to succeed himself, and the retention of our respected members, Jack I. AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL WORK FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM IN CHICAGO

(24) Bids have been received for electrical work in switch room "C" in connection with the utilities distribution system installation at the Chicago Professional Colleges.

The lowest bid is considerably below others received; however, the contractor has been investigated and his financial responsibility and organization are considered satisfactory. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract to the lowest bidder, the Chicago Square Z Electric Company, on the basis of their base bid of \$11,543, with a 3 per cent escalation cost, making the maximum obligation \$11,889.29.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was awarded and authority was granted as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR REMODELING 1007 SOUTH WRIGHT STREET, CHAMPAIGN

(25) The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees on July 1, 1948, approved a special appropriation of \$27,300 for remodeling the two houses at 1007 South Wright Street, Champaign, for office quarters for the College of Education. Due to the urgency of the project, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the remodeling work be done by the contractors with whom the University had standing contracts for minor building remodeling during 1947-1948. It is also recommended that the work be done on the basis of cost plus the same percentage of cost as was allowed under the standing contracts.

ADDITIONAL QUONSET HUT FOR AIRPORT

(26) The Director of the Institute of Aeronautics requests a special appropriation of \$5,874.83 for the purchase of an additional quonset hut for the Airport to supplement two similar huts purchased in 1947 (Minutes, April 23, 1947, page 346). The new hut would be used as a classroom for the aircraft maintenance engineering course which has been approved and for which these facilities are needed by September. The item is not covered in the regular budget of the division. The Provost and the Comptroller endorse this recommendation.

The Director of Purchases requests authority to place the order for this building with the Harshbarger Building & Supply Company, Urbana, distributor for such buildings in this area, for one 40 by 80 foot quonset hut erected at the Airport, \$5,874.83.

I concur and recommend a special appropriation of the amount required and approval of the proposed purchase.

EXTENSION OF LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR EDGAR L. ERICKSON

(27) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on November 29, 1947 (Minutes, page 929), Dr. Edgar L. Erickson, Associate Professor of History, was granted a leave of absence without pay from March 1 to September 1, 1948, for service to the Department of the Army in the writing of its war history. It was anticipated that the work could be completed within that period but this has been found to be impossible. The Department of the Army has urgently requested an extension of Professor Erickson's leave to September 1, 1949, because of the critical nature of the work involved.

The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Head of the Department of History believe that Professor Erickson should be granted the leave and permitted to complete the project. I concur and recommend that his leave without pay be extended to September 1, 1949.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this leave was extended as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REMODELING HOUSE AT AIRPORT

(28) The Director of the Institute of Aeronautics recommends that the frame house acquired by the University when the Airport land was purchased and which is located close to the main hangars be remodeled into two apartments for Airport staff members. The house is now standing empty and this improvement would provide not only badly needed living accommodations for staff members but would also make it possible for a mechanic to live at the Airport and be available for night flying operations.

Funds for this remodeling are available in accumulated receipts from Airport operations and the initial expenditure would be recovered through income from rentals.

The Director of the Institute of Aeronautics and the Supervising Engineer at the Airport contacted a number of contractors concerning this work and were able to find only one who was interested in undertaking the job. Mr. J. C. Scott, Tolono, Illinois, has offered to do the work on the basis of cost plus 10 per cent with an estimated total cost of \$8,500. The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract to Mr. Scott.

I concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was approved (within the estimate of \$8,500) and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR PURCHASE OF COAL FOR URBANA-CHAMPAIGN DEPARTMENTS

(29) Coal requirements for the Abbott Power Plant at the Urbana-Champaign campus for 1948-1949 aggregate forty thousand tons of screenings. Specifications were submitted to vendors believed to be able to furnish this coal (21 concerns) and advertisements were run in Chicago papers. No bids were received on the basis of the University's specifications because no firm was willing to enter into a contract in accordance with the specifications providing for price adjustment based on coal analysis. All bids received were based on the standard type of coal contract, which does not include price adjustment on basis of analysis but provides for adjustment in the price to reflect any changes in cost of production resulting from changes in miners' wages.

PURCHASE OF PYREX LABORATORY GLASSWARE

(30) Approximately 1,400 cases of Pyrex laboratory glassware will be required for use in instructional and research laboratories at the Urbana departments for the year ending June 30, 1949. This glassware is sold only through authorized dealers at prices prescribed by the manufacturer, the Corning Glass Works, and subject only to discounts which vary on quantity order. The minimum quantity price is based on a minimum of one hundred cases. The total estimated expenditure for the year is \$27,000. All purchases are placed in the General Chemical Storeroom and issued from that point to the various laboratories and charged to budgetary accounts of the departments concerned.

The Director of Purchases requests authority to place orders from time to time with the following authorized dealers in this territory for approximate uniform amounts of \$3,000 total for each dealer for the year, for quantities sufficient in each instance to obtain the lowest price and in accordance with the needs for additional stock from time to time.

REMODELING ROOMS 108-113 NATURAL HISTORY BUILDING

(31) An appropriation has been requested by the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences for remodeling Rooms 108-113 Natural History Building. This is intended to give some measure of relief to the Departments of Geology and Botany. Both of these departments are very crowded at the present time. In addition, an outstanding cytogeneticist with an extensive research program is being added to the staff this fall and space must be provided for his work. The Physical Plant Department has received estimates from contractors indicating a cost of approximately \$8,750.

This request was referred to the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures for emergency action. The Committee recommends that the work be completed at an early date; otherwise the work of these departments will be seriously impeded.

I concur and recommend an appropriation of \$8,750 and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts necessary for this remodeling.

(33) The title to veterans housing units located in Champaign-Urbana is now in the Federal government. They are operated by the University under an operating agreement whereby the University submits reports of operations and remits net operating revenues.

The transfer of complete ownership and control of these units to the University was authorized by Congress under Public Law 796, signed by President Truman on June 28, 1948, such transfer to be effective on the first day of the month following the month in which the University's application is approved. A request for such a transfer must be submitted prior to October 26, 1948. This authority to transfer extends to only those units located on ground owned by the University and would not apply to those units located at Galesburg.

It is highly desirable that the University take advantage of this authority since it would make it possible to operate these units according to general University housing policies and eliminate any conflict with the policies of the Federal Public Housing Authority.

Such transfer would also relieve the University of the additional administrative expense necessary in maintaining records according to the requirements of the Federal government and submitting reports of operations to it.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the adoption of the following resolution. I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to sign all documents necessary to effect this transfer.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the following resolution was adopted, and authority was given as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson.

RESOLUTION

Whereas an act of Congress, H. R. 5710, to amend the Act entitled "An Act to expedite the provision of housing in connection with national defense, and for other purposes" (approved October 14, 1940), approved June 28, 1948, enacted that, "Upon the filing of a request therefor as herein provided, the Administrator shall relinquish and transfer, without monetary consideration, to any educational institution all contractual rights (including the right to revenues and other proceeds) and all property right, title, and interest of the United States in and with respect to any temporary housing located on land owned by such institution, or controlled by it and not held by the United States: . . ."; and,

Whereas said amendatory Act further provides, "The filing of a request under this section must be made within one hundred and twenty days of the date of enactment of the section and shall be authorized by the board of trustees or other governing body of the institution making the request"; and,

Whereas said amendatory Act further provides, "Such request shall be accompanied by an opinion of the chief law officer or legal counsel of the institution making the request to the effect that it has legal authority to make the request, to accept the transfer of and operate any property involved, and to perform its obligations under this section"; and,

Whereas the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation, has heretofore acquired from the United States Government under and by virtue of the provisions of the Act approved October 14, 1940, above referred to, the following described properties:

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation, hereby requests the Administrator to relinquish and transfer to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois all contractual rights (including the right to revenues and other proceeds) and all property rights, title, and interest of the United States in and with respect to the property, herein described, subject in all respects to the terms of said amendatory Act, approved June 28, 1948.

RESEARCH HOUSES ERECTED BY SMALL HOMES COUNCIL

(34) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 341), the Board of Trustees approved a program for the erection of six research homes to be used for staff housing and financed in part by a research grant, in part by borrowed funds, and in part by a University appropriation. The Board also appropriated the sum of \$27,950 for the University's share of a total estimated cost of \$60,210. The Board increased this appropriation by \$6,000 on September 26, 1947 (Minutes, page 821), which, together with adjustments in other funds, was to provide for a revised estimated cost of \$67,650.

The revised estimates have proved to be inadequate. The present situation is summarized as follows:

It is proposed to meet this deficiency by allocating funds from the following sources:

Approval of this revised estimated cost and allocation of funds is requested.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this revision was approved and funds were allocated as recommended.

REAPPROPRIATION OF UNEXPENDED BALANCES

(35) The Comptroller recommends that unexpended balances in appropriations made by the Board of Trustees for services and projects not completed as of June 30, 1948 (see Appendix, page 69), be reappropriated for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1948.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these balances were reappropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson.

FARM BUILDINGS AT CARTER-PENNELLS FARMS

(36) Professor J. B. Andrews, Manager of University farms, recommends that the University contract with Carl J. Steiner, Jr., Cissna Park, for the construction of a corn crib on the North Carter-Pennell Farm for approximately \$4,600 and a cattle shed and concrete cattle yard floor on the South Carter-Pennell Farm for approximately \$3,500.

The need for the crib has been known for some time. The old crib is beyond temporary repair and is unsafe for further use. (A letter in the files written by Professor M. L. Mosher to Dean Mumford in 1938 states the need for replacing the old crib "in the near future.") The shed on the South Carter-Pennell Farm is necessary to meet the requirements for producing Grade A milk. Much time has been spent with staff members in farm management to review location, relative investment, and capacity needs; with the Soil Conservation Service technicians to check drainage affecting location; and with Professor D. G. Carter of the Department of Agricultural Engineering and his staff to provide details of design and to check costs of construction.

Buildings built by Mr. Steiner have been inspected and his references checked. He has been found to be experienced and reliable. His over-all costs, compared with the costs for recent construction of similar buildings in this area, are considered reasonable by Professor Carter.

Funds are available in the operating account of Carter-Pennell Farms.

Professor Case, Dean Rusk, and the Comptroller endorse this request. I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the construction of these buildings was authorized as recommended.

REMODELING OF ARCADE BUILDING

(37) On September 26, 1947 (Minutes, pages 834-835), the Board approved contracts for remodeling the Arcade Building, in line with the agreement of the University to make such remodeling under the lease with John Katsinas. The previous estimate of cost of this work was \$30,000, on a cost plus fixed fee basis. Actual costs will run almost \$50,000 due in part to necessary changes in amount of remodeling and in part to increased construction costs.

Direction to proceed could not be given the contractor until December 2, 1947. There were further delays resulting from (a) unusually heavy rains, (b) shortage of brick masons, (c) delay in securing information from Mr. Katsinas concerning location of equipment, the latter undoubtedly due in part to serious illness in his family.

As of this date, the work required of the University has been substantially completed and the property has been turned back to Mr. Katsinas who has started the installation of new equipment. (Unexpected leakage of water has developed in the basement from an underground spring, which may require until August 15 to correct.) Mr. Katsinas has indicated that he is installing an entire lot of new equipment and making other changes which may cost in the neighborhood of \$75,000. As reported to the Board on September 26, 1947, the lease still has four years to run.

Rental has been suspended during the remodeling period, beginning July 1, 1947, and will be reinstated September 1, 1948. Mr. Katsinas has indicated that he will have the restaurant in operation the first semester of 1948-1949.

This report was received for record.

ADDITION TO HEATING AND VENTILATING CONTRACT FOR AGRONOMY GREENHOUSE ADDITION

(38) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,198 in the contract with Robert Gordon, Inc., Chicago, for the heating and ventilating work on the Agronomy Greenhouse Addition. This

increase is to provide for insulating the low-pressure steam piping. It was originally planned to secure radiation from the low-pressure piping by leaving this piping uncovered. It has now been found, however, that the radiators will be adequate and that, if the pipes are left uncovered, they will render the thermostats ineffective, making temperature control difficult.

Funds are available in the appropriation for the Agronomy Greenhouse Addition.

I concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF GENERAL CONTRACT FOR REMODELING FOR LIBERAL ARTS AND SCIENCES STAFF OFFICES

(39) Estimates from contractors have been received for the cost of remodeling residences owned by the University at 402 South Mathews, 606 South Mathews (rear), and 1205 West California, all in Urbana, in order to provide office space for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The Provost's Office has indicated that the need for office space in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences is the most critical of any of the colleges. Estimates of total costs are as follows:

402 South Mathews.....	\$ 8 500

The house at the rear of 606 South Mathews will be available for a number of years and a rather complete and thorough job of rehabilitation is contemplated. The other two properties may be removed shortly to make way for future building projects. Accordingly, only improvements and remodeling sufficient to make the buildings usable are included.

On March 9, 1948 (Minutes, page 1041), the Board approved an appropriation of \$28,000 for remodeling and equipment of 402, 404, and 606 South Mathews. Of this appropriation, \$19,000 was for remodeling, and is available. It is proposed to remodel 1205 West California rather than 404 South Mathews for this purpose since it would provide more suitable accommodations. An additional appropriation of \$16,100 is necessary to complete the work.

Since this work is remodeling and there are uncertainties as to the amount of work which may be involved and since the work should be completed before the fall semester, it is not practical to attempt to secure lump-sum contracts. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the general work be done by Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, in accordance with his proposal for minor remodeling on a cost plus fixed fee basis for 1948-1949.

The estimated cost of the general work to be done is as follows:

I concur and recommend an additional appropriation of \$16,100 and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above additions to this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this remodeling was approved, authority was given, and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR PIPING SYSTEM AT ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION

(40) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,200 to the contract with William A. Pope Company to provide for soot blower piping. Funds are available for this addition in the State appropriation for Power Plant Additions.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

**ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR VENTILATING
ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING ANNEX**

(41) In accordance with Board action of May 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 317), the Comptroller executed a contract with F. R. Inskip and Company for a ventilating installation at the Electrical Engineering Annex on the basis of cost plus a fee estimated at a total cost of \$2,815.10. The character of the work has been difficult, many changes being necessary in the original plans, and the contractor has failed to report promptly the costs of such changes. Total costs have amounted to \$9,237.27 and have been verified by the Physical Plant Department and the Internal Auditing staff.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the total amount of the contract be increased by \$6,422.17. Funds are available for this increase.

I concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR GENERAL CONSTRUCTION
ON FIRE STATION AT URBANA**

(42) In order to accommodate the new fire truck, it is necessary to remodel the front of the Fire Station to provide for two doors and to enlarge the driveway in front of the building. Since it is impossible to anticipate difficulties which may be encountered in such remodeling, it is not considered advisable to attempt to secure firm bids on the project.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the work be done by Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, in accordance with his proposal for minor remodeling on a cost plus fee basis for 1948-1949. The total estimated cost of this project is \$6,773. Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget for renewals and replacements.

I concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

Director Havens was requested to confer with Mr. John Craig, State Fire Marshal, with respect to matters relating to fire protection.

**AWARD OF CONTRACTS BY THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS
ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION**

(43) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of the award of the following contracts:

I. A contract with N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., Philadelphia, for television privileges for the 1948 home football games. Negotiations have been conducted with station WGN, Chicago, the National Broadcasting Corporation, Balaban and Katz, Chicago, and N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., Philadelphia, for the right to televise and telecast the five football games to be played in Memorial Stadium during the season of 1948. The best offer was received from N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., which proposes to televise all games and to pay to the Athletic Association \$2,000 a game or \$10,000 for the season, subject to the following limitations:

(a) The telecast is to be only for direct play-by-play television while the game is in progress, and there is no right to retelevise or to make motion pictures.

(b) At least five days in advance of each game the company shall submit to the Athletic Association for approval a complete script and description of

scenes to be telecast in connection with any commercial feature of the program. Under no circumstances will there be any advertising of beer, liquor, wine, or laxatives.

(c) The Athletic Association will have the right to terminate the contract if the Association considers any broadcast to be in poor taste or incompatible with the educational dignity and propriety of the University of Illinois.

(d) The contract does not grant the exclusive right to N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., to televise and telecast the games.

The N. W. Ayer Company agrees to pay all expenses of installing of equipment and the operation thereof, and the sole obligation of the Athletic Association is to provide suitable space.

The Legal Counsel and the Comptroller have examined the contract and recommend approval.

2. Purchase of laundry equipment for athletic clothing laundry. The service which has been available and the prices charged for the laundry of athletic gear have not been satisfactory for some time. Therefore, quotations were requested from eight manufacturing concerns for laundry equipment necessary to set up a laundry. Only one company, the U. S. Hoffman Machinery Corp., Chicago, was in a position to furnish the necessary equipment immediately. For \$5,000 this firm offers to supply the following equipment, delivered to Champaign and set on foundations prepared by the Athletic Association: (a) one 36" x 54" Hoffman standard washer (this machine has been used 30 days but is available for immediate delivery), (b) one 30" Hoffman open-top extractor, and (c) two Hoffman open-end drying tumblers.

This equipment will provide for laundering all athletic gear, as well as towels owned by the University but used by varsity athletes in George Huff Gymnasium and Men's Old Gymnasium.

It is understood and agreed that, should the University find it expeditious to install a laundry of its own, this equipment will be sold to the University and that, for the purpose of building up volume, the Athletic Association will be willing to have all its laundry done by the University.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller have reviewed this recommendation and concur with it.

I recommend approval of the above actions of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these awards were approved.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF CABLE AND TRANSFORMERS FOR THE PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT ADDITION IN CHICAGO

(44) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend a contract in the amount of \$10,147 with the Commonwealth Edison Company, Chicago, for furnishing cable work and transformers for electrical service to the Physical Environment Addition in Chicago, and a contract at a monthly rental of \$44.10 for the rental of three transformers. The cost is covered in the operating budget.

The University has ordered transformers but they will not be available until February, 1949, and by renting transformers temporarily the unit may be placed in operation in October, 1948. The installation contract provides for the installation of University cable and is work which would have to be done for the University's transformers. However, if the University is to use the transformers of the Commonwealth Edison Company temporarily the Company requires that the Company install the cable.

The Physical Plant Department has reviewed the proposal and finds it reasonable. The contract will be replaced by a new one when the University transformers are installed.

I concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the proposed contracts.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these contracts were approved and authority was given as recommended.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR FILTRATION PLANT
IMPROVEMENTS AT URBANA**

(45) Bids were received for the installation of a Venturi meter, piping, pump installation, and other miscellaneous work at the Filtration Plant in Urbana. Only one bid was received from Robert Gordon, Inc. of Chicago in the amount of \$72,754, although drawings were taken out by six contractors for the purpose of preparing bids. This bid has been checked by Alvord, Burdick, and Howson, engineers on this project, who consider it satisfactory.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to Robert Gordon, Inc., on the basis of their bid of \$72,754. Funds are available in the State appropriations for "Fire Protection Facilities," and "Water Station Improvements."

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

**SPECIAL APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF CONTRACT
FOR OFFICE REMODELING**

(46) The Dean of the College of Law has requested that room 315 in Altgeld Hall be divided into two smaller rooms by putting up a partition in that room. This remodeling will provide a small office for the faculty editor and a small room for the clerical staff of the new publication *The Law Forum*. The cost of this remodeling is estimated at \$3,300.

The Head of the Department of Psychology requests that room 400 in Gregory Hall be divided into five rooms to provide rooms for carrying out research in the fields of experimental psychology and psychology of learning. The committee appointed by President Stoddard to consider priorities of remodeling work recommends that this work be considered of highest priority. Estimated cost of this work is \$15,700.

The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has considered these requests and recommends a special appropriation of \$19,000 to cover the costs of remodeling in the two areas named above.

The general work in Gregory Hall is estimated at \$8,073. Since this is remodeling work and the securing of fixed bids is not practical, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the contract for the general work be awarded to Lewis S. Colbert on the basis of his proposal for minor remodeling for 1948-1949 on a cost plus fee basis.

I concur and recommend a special appropriation of \$19,000 for the above remodeling and the award of the general contract for the remodeling in Gregory Hall to Lewis S. Colbert.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this remodeling was approved, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR FIRE PUMP AT CHICAGO

(47) The second phase of the water supply program for fire protection for the Chicago Professional Colleges requested by the Fire Marshal and recommended by the report of Holabird and Root of 1944, provides for the installation of a 750 gallon a minute electric fire pump with all connections, the installation of the overhead fire mains in the basement of the first unit of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building, and a direct connection with the city water mains. The completion of this phase will provide a separate water distribution system in University buildings for fire service, independent of that used for domestic service, except the Chicago Illini Union Building, but including the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute and the Institute of Juvenile Research.

Bids were received for this work on January 26, 1948, and the contract for piping in all buildings except Building 909 was awarded to the M. J. Corboy

Company by the Board of Trustees on March 9, 1948 (Minutes, page 1046). The award of the contracts for the other phases of this project was deferred until funds were available. The Company agreed to allow their bid to stand until July 31, 1948.

Funds are now available in the Physical Plant Department renewal and replacement budget for the remainder of the work, and the Director of that Department and the Comptroller recommend that an addition of \$26,580 be made in the contract with M. J. Corboy Company in accordance with their lowest total bid on January 26, 1948, to provide for the fire pump and the installation of overhead fire mains.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute an addition to the contract with the M. J. Corboy Company for this work.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE CLASSIFICATIONS

Mr. Livingston reported, for the Committee on Civil Service and Employees, a list of changes in and additions to the list of Civil Service Classifications, requested by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel (see Appendix, page 73).

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these changes and additions were approved effective July 1, 1948.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At this point the Board went into executive session.

APPOINTMENT OF MR. D. W. SMYTHE

Mr. Nickell and Mr. Livingston raised a question as to the appointment by the President of the University of Mr. D. W. Smythe as Professor of Economics and Research Professor in the Institute of Communications Research.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the President's Office for study and report to the Board.

STAFF HOUSING

The Provost reported that he had just been informed that the residence of the late Professor Alta Gwinn Saunders was available, at a price of \$25,000, and requested authority to purchase this property in the event that the property on Lincoln Avenue should not be available at \$30,000.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this purchase was referred to the Provost and the Executive Committee, with power to act, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

September 23, 1948



The September meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, September 23, 1948, at the Country Club, in Peoria, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

12 m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Fornof, General Davis, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

President Stoddard was present; also Provost Griffith, Assistant to the President, Mr. A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during the open session, Director J. F. Wright.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of May 21-22 and June 15, 1948.

On motion of General Davis, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 1091 to 1482.

REPORTS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary presented for record the following report of actions of the Executive Committee.

August 4, 1948

1. Purchase of property at 710 West Indiana Avenue, Urbana. The Board of Trustees on July 21-22, 1948, authorized the Executive Committee to act for the Board in the purchase of another residence property for faculty housing. The Committee authorized the purchase of the property at 710 West Indiana Avenue, Urbana, from Gordon Phillips, owner, for \$17,000, and made an assignment of \$18,000 for this purpose from the General Reserve Fund to provide for expenses incidental to the purchase and such repairs as may be necessary.

August 11, 1948

1. Funds for remodeling in Chicago Undergraduate Division. The Executive Committee authorized an assignment of \$15,230 from the General Reserve Fund for remodeling to provide a new General Engineering Drawing Room and adapt the present room for use as a library (\$9,500), and for the purchase of equipment, library shelving, tables, chairs, control desk, and miscellaneous furnishings (\$5,730).

These improvements are to provide suitable reading space and the purchase of equipment for a valuable architectural library which has been presented to the University by Holabird and Root of Chicago.

2. Award of contract for extension of Utilities Distribution System. The following bids were received:

On the recommendation of the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Comptroller, and with the concurrence of the President's Office, the Executive Committee authorized the award of the contract to Kuhne-Simmons Co., Inc., the lower bidder. Funds are available in the State appropriation for this project.

August 25, 1948

1. Increase in contract for heating installation in Women's Residence Halls. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended an increase of \$1,858 in the contract with Gallaher and Speck, Inc., Chicago, for heating installations in the new residence halls for women on Lincoln Avenue to provide for furnishing and installing the necessary valves, pipes, fittings, and other appurtenances for a pressure reducing valve station. The Executive Committee authorized this increase. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of student residence halls."

2. Contract for construction of steam distribution system. Bids were received for the construction of the steam distribution system between the second unit of the Dentistry, Medicine, and Pharmacy Building and the Chicago Illini Union Building. Five firms were invited to bid but the only one received was from the William A. Pope Company, Chicago, for \$31,240. The bid included a provision that it would remain a firm bid only if accepted within three weeks. The deadline was September 3, 1948; hence, early action was desired.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended the award of a contract to the William A. Pope Company, Chicago, in the amount of \$31,240.

The Executive Committee authorized this contract. Funds are available in the State appropriation for this project.

3. Reconstruction of sidewalk and driveways at Physics Research Laboratory. The Physics Research Laboratory (Betatron Building) at Urbana is in an area which is subject to flooding during heavy rains as the result of overflow from the Illinois Central underpass. The following bids were secured on the elevation of the sidewalk and reconstruction of such driveway areas as will be necessary to dam the flood waters:

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for this work to the lower bidder, C. A. Petry & Sons, Champaign, in the amount of \$2,865. The Executive Committee authorized the award of this contract. Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Completion of the construction of Physics Research Laboratory" to provide for this improvement.

They have presented satisfactory evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked C.P.A. certificates obtained in other states by passing written examinations and that they meet all of the other conditions specified by this section of the Act. The Executive Committee authorized the award of these certificates.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board discussed items on the agenda and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF PAR DANFORTH AS DIRECTOR OF ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(1) I recommend the appointment of Mr. Par Danforth, at present Executive Secretary of the Seattle Branch of the American Friends Service Committee, as Director of Robert Allerton Park with the rank of Professor, at an annual salary of \$8,000, and that the President of the University be authorized to fix the effective date. This will be determined in part by Mr. Danforth's present commitments. As Director of Robert Allerton Park, Mr. Danforth will not only supervise all Park operations but will also be director of all projects for which the Park and Robert Allerton House will be used.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

PURCHASE OF RESIDENCE PROPERTIES FOR STAFF HOUSING

(2) At its meeting on July 21-22, 1948 (Minutes, page 3), the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of the residence property at 909 West Nevada Street, Urbana, from H. H. Mitchell, owner, for \$17,500 on the basis of an independent appraisal procured by the University. The owner planned to use the proceeds to build a new house. He has subsequently found that \$17,500 is inadequate for this purpose and has secured appraisals of his own which value his property at \$21,000. The purchase of this property was recommended because it is in an area of future campus expansion (for women's residence halls), and in the meantime the property could be used advantageously for staff housing. In view of the great difference in the appraisals and since the site will not be needed for several years, I recommend that the University not purchase the property at this time.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this recommendation was adopted.

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS ON INSURANCE PRACTICES

(3) I am submitting an Insurance Report prepared by a temporary advisory committee to the Comptroller and to the President appointed April 28, 1948. Mr. William E. Britton can describe the work of the committee and Mr. Leslie A.

Bryan, its Chairman, will be glad to meet with the Board Committee at any time.

The committee has made a number of explicit proposals for clarifying both policy and practice. I recommend that they be accepted by the Board as a basis for study and appropriate action.

This matter was referred to the Finance Committee for study and report.

EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS FOR STAFF APARTMENT PROJECT IN CHICAGO

(4) The Board of Trustees on July 21-22, 1948 (Minutes, page 7), authorized the construction of a student residence hall and a staff apartment building for the Chicago Professional Colleges at a cost of \$3,786,733 (exclusive of land cost for which an appropriation of \$50,000 has already been made), these projects to be financed by the University of Illinois Foundation through a loan for which application has been made by the Foundation to the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York. The application is for a loan not to exceed \$4,000,000. Revised estimates indicate a construction cost of \$4,006,869, the increase over the previous estimate being due to an increase in the number of apartment units from 116 to 145. It is believed that the excess of \$6,869 over the loan applied for can be eliminated.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill of Chicago as architects for the staff apartment project at a fee of 5½ per cent of the cost of construction. On this basis it is estimated that the architectural services will cost \$70,300.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, the contract to be entered into as soon as construction funds have been assured.

Plans and specifications for the student residence hall are being financed by a grant from the Federal Works Agency. This grant is reimbursable if the project is carried to completion but not otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the Committee on Chicago Departments for further study and report to the Board.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session at 2 p.m. on September 23, the same members and officers were present as during the morning session.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

REQUEST OF REPRESENTATIVE JOHN K. MORRIS

(1) Mr. John K. Morris, Representative in the General Assembly of Illinois, has requested an opportunity to appear before the Board of Trustees when the Board considers the building program for the biennium of 1949-1951. He is particularly interested in the building for the College of Veterinary Medicine. I recommend that the Board give Mr. Morris a hearing at the October meeting.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this request was granted.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

(2) The Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine recommends the reappointment of the following present members of the Advisory Committee for the academic year 1948-1949:

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

APPOINTMENT OF ALBERT E. JENNER, JR., TO BOARD OF EXAMINERS IN ACCOUNTANCY

(3) The term of office of Mr. John S. Miller, the legal member of the regular three-man Board of Examiners in Accountancy, expired on June 30, 1948. To fill this vacancy the Committee on Accountancy recommends the appointment of Mr. Albert E. Jenner, Jr., for a three-year term beginning July 1, 1948.

Mr. Jenner is forty years of age. He is a graduate of the College of Law of the University of Illinois having received his LL.B. degree in June, 1930. He has written extensively on the Practice Act of Illinois, particularly with reference to appellate procedure. He has served most effectively on many committees of the Chicago and State Bar Associations. He has achieved distinction in the profession.

Mr. Jenner is a member of the firm of Poppenhusen, Johnston, Thompson, and Raymond of Chicago. If appointed Mr. Jenner is willing to serve.

I recommend this appointment.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING AND DIRECTOR OF THE ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION

(4) Dean Melvin L. Enger will retire from active service as Dean of the College of Engineering, as Director of the Engineering Experiment Station, and as Professor of Mechanics and Hydraulics on September 1, 1949, at the end of the current academic year.

I recommend the appointment of Professor William L. Everitt, now Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, to the position of Dean of the College of Engineering and Director of the Engineering Experiment Station for two years from September 1, 1949, and continuing as Professor of Electrical Engineering on indefinite tenure from September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$12,500.

The Executive Committee of the College of Engineering, which consists of the heads of the departments, has been consulted in accordance with the statutory provisions relating to nominations of deans of colleges, and Professor Everitt is the unanimous choice.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made as recommended.

CURRICULUM IN HEALTH EDUCATION

(5) The University Senate recommends adoption of a curriculum in Health Education. This is a four-year program in the School of Physical Education, requiring a minimum of 130 semester hours of credit and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Health Education (see Appendix, page 128).

This curriculum was prepared by the University Committee on Health Education in the Schools, a Committee of the University Council on Teacher Education. It has been approved by the Council and by the School of Physical Education.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this curriculum was approved and established as recommended.

RELEASES OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(6) The Governor has authorized releases¹ of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois by the 65th General Assembly under Senate Bill 662, "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent, and distributive expenses of State government," which included appropriations totaling \$12,994,732 to the University for buildings and other capital improvements.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES
FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION**

(9) The Board of Trustees on June 15, 1948, approved a special appropriation of \$49,220, the estimated expenditure required in the 1947-1949 biennium for the addition of a 7500 kilowatt service generator, Unit No. 4, in the Abbott Power Plant, Urbana.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, for all engineering services on the complete project. The agreement will be contingent on an additional State appropriation for the 1949-1951 biennium for the completion of this project, and if such an appropriation is not made the University agrees to reimburse Sargent and Lundy only for actual expenditures.

The contract provides for reimbursing Sargent and Lundy for salaries paid engineers and draftsmen at their regular rates, plus 50 per cent; for salaries paid resident field engineers, plus 10 per cent; for stenographic and clerical services, traveling expenses, and miscellaneous expense at actual cost. Estimated expenditures under this contract during the 1947-1949 biennium are \$49,000; if an additional capital appropriation is received and the project is completed in 1949-1951, the total expenditures under this contract are estimated to be \$110,000.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was granted as requested.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR
UNDERGROUND CONDUIT ON SOUTH FARMS**

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend a contract with Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, for engineering services in connection with the construction of an underground conduit line from the South Farm main switch gear station east to the President's House and to the Horticulture Field Laboratory to replace the existing pole line.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant operation and maintenance budget for the preparation of plans and specifications. This improvement is necessary to eliminate frequent power failures which affect the large refrigerating equipment in the cold storage area of the Horticulture Field Laboratory, research work in this building, and electrical service to the President's House. Such interruptions will continue until the present overhead line is replaced with underground service.

Some of the planning will be done by the Physical Plant Department, but the necessary personnel is not available for all of the work.

I recommend that authority be granted the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute this contract; the cost is estimated not to exceed \$2,500. The contract will provide for payment by the University of the salaries of engineers and draftsmen, plus 100 per cent, plus actual clerical wages and other expenses incurred.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was granted as recommended.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR TEMPERATURE AND HUMIDITY
CONTROL EQUIPMENT IN NOYES LABORATORY**

(11) The Board of Trustees has appropriated \$2,500 for the installation of temperature and humidity control equipment in the Noyes Laboratory for research work financed partly by a grant from the National Institute of Health and partly by the State Water Survey Division, which is housed in this building.

The Chief of the State Water Survey, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for the installation of this equipment to Climatic Engineering, Inc., Danville, the lowest bidder, at a cost of \$5,860. The cost of this installation will be charged in part, \$1,660, to the appropriation made by the Board of Trustees, and the balance of \$4,200 will be paid from State Water Survey funds.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as recommended.

TABULATING MACHINE INSTALLATION IN CHICAGO

(12) The University has an installation of International Business Machines in Chicago in addition to the one in Urbana, under a contract approved January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 224). It is desired to enlarge this installation to provide for further mechanization of the registration procedure at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. The present installation in Chicago is located at the Chicago Professional Colleges although it provides certain services to the Undergraduate Division. Additional equipment is necessary to take care of the contemplated registration program at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. This equipment should be contracted for now to secure installation for use in 1949-1950. The machines are installed on a rental basis amounting to \$130 a month after allowing for an educational discount of 20 per cent.

The Director of Admissions and Records requests approval of such a contract, the necessary funds to be provided in the operating budget beginning with 1949-1950. The Business Manager of the Chicago Divisions, who has general charge of the tabulating machine equipment in Chicago, concurs.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the International Business Machines Corporation for this equipment and to make minor changes in the contract as the needs of the service may require.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, authority was given as requested.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REFRIGERATOR AT
CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION**

(13) Bids have been received for the construction of a walk-in refrigerator for food service at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. This facility is necessary to comply with health standards. Funds are available in the operation and maintenance budget for this project.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the lower bidder, Bromann Brothers, Chicago, in the amount of \$5,550 for this construction.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as requested.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR FLOORING IN STADIUM

(14) As a part of the restoration of the West Great Hall of the Stadium to its prewar use for physical education and athletic activities, it is proposed to resurface the floor (an area in excess of 20,000 square feet) with asphalt tile rather than the wood mosaic block flooring previously used. Bids have been received on the furnishing and the application of such material.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an award of the contract to W. Lewis and Company, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$6,107.77.

Funds are available for this work in reserves accumulated from operation of temporary housing facilities.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as requested.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS
IN ARCHITECTURE BUILDING**

(15) The Department of Architecture has requested improvement of the artificial lighting in all of the drafting rooms. Students have been complaining of eyestrain and members of the faculty who are now carrying heavy schedules and who must spend long hours in these rooms are having the same difficulty due to inadequate lighting.

Bids have been received for rewiring, repowering, and relighting of rooms 200 and 210 in the Architecture Building. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the contract for this work be

awarded to the Anderson Electric Company, Inc., Danville, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$22,194. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, authority was given as recommended.

IMPROVEMENT OF ROADS SERVING THE ROBERT ALLERTON FARMS

(16) The authorities of Piatt County have requested financial assistance from the University for the oiling of roads in Willow Branch Township in which the Robert Allerton Park and the Robert Allerton Farms are located. About seven miles of roads lie within the lands deeded by Mr. Allerton to the University. In computing the values of all taxable property in Willow Branch Township, it has been found that the University owns approximately 20 per cent of the valuation of this township. The University has not paid taxes assessed against this real estate which means a loss of approximately 20 per cent of all taxes levied in the township.

The township roads in Willow Branch Township must be oiled with at least two coats each year in order to make them year-round roads. Since the University has not paid the 1947 taxes payable in 1948, the Township Highway Commission is faced with the problem of being short over 20 per cent of the money levied and assessed for highway purposes.

The Legal Counsel recommends that the Board authorize a contract with the authorities of Piatt County or of Willow Township whereby the University will agree to pay the cost of surfacing that portion of the road adjoining the Robert Allerton Park and Farms with a provision in the contract that such payment by the University is for services and will not prejudice any of its claims or affect its responsibilities with respect to the tax status of the property involved.

The estimated cost of this service is \$2,500 to \$3,000 a year.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized as recommended.

OIL AND GAS LEASE ON OLNEY EXPERIMENTAL FARM

(17) The University owns 19 $\frac{1}{3}$ acres of land near Olney, Illinois, which is used as an experimental fruit farm by the Department of Horticulture. Approximately twelve acres are in orchards and the rest is in pasture land.

Oil wells have been drilled within a mile and one-half of the University's land and have been in production for several years. The Sun Oil Company is interested in developing more production within this territory and has secured leases on properties adjoining the University's land. The Company wishes to secure an oil and gas lease on the University's land which would permit it to conduct drilling operations in the event that oil or gas in commercial quantities is found within a statutory offset location of the University's premises, after discovery and development drilling on other land. In that event the University's land would be communitized with adjoining acreage in such manner as would require the location of not more than one well on the present pasture land if production is discovered in limestone strata, or one well on pasture land and one well in the orchard if production is discovered in sand strata. In either event, location of the well or wells would be discussed with University officials before application for drilling permits from the State, and the wells would be drilled with every precaution possible to avoid damaging the experimental orchard and with full reimbursement for any damage. In the opinion of officials of the College of Agriculture, the drilling of one well would not result in irreparable damage or delay to experimental work.

The proposed lease would provide for the payment of \$5.00 a year an acre. If oil or gas is produced from wells on the University's land, the University will receive one-eighth of the proceeds. If producing wells are drilled within 330 feet of University land, the University will share in the royalties of such production.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the execution of the lease.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the execution of this lease was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION

(18) A permanent platform at the Abbott Power Plant in Urbana to facilitate cleaning of tubes in the economizers and high-pressure heaters is needed as cleaning must be done three to five times a year. A permanent platform will eliminate the labor of erecting scaffolding each time the work is done and will reduce risk to the workers.

The University does not have structural iron workers required for the erection of the material, and the only structural iron workers in the community are employed by local contractors. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend, therefore, that this work be done by Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., as an addition to their contract for the superstructure of the Power Plant additions. The platform will cost \$1,373. Funds are available in the budget for this.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition to this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given as requested.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR STEAM DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AT URBANA

(19) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the following additions to contracts for the construction of the steam distribution tunnel at Urbana to provide for furnishing and installing of insulation, pipe valves, and fittings necessary to join the steam service to the student and staff apartments:

The original contracts for this work were awarded by the Board of Trustees on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 228), but this part of the work was not included as the plans for the student and staff apartment building had not been completed. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction for the enlargement and extension of the existing utilities distribution system."

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these additions to contracts were authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS

(20) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,479.12 in the contract with the Warner Construction Company for the general work on the Women's Residence Halls, Urbana. This increase is to provide for the furnishing and installing of wooden stools or bases under the radiators and other work in connection therewith.

Funds are available in the special State appropriation for this project.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition to this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this addition to contract was authorized.

PURCHASE OF ADVANCED R.O.T.C. UNIFORMS

(21) At the July 22, 1948, meeting, the Board of Trustees approved a recommendation that an order for 200 military uniforms for advanced course students in R.O.T.C. be placed with Jacob Reed's Sons, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who submitted the lowest bid.

These bids were based on our specifications, which included the materials and the Army regulations for style. Before placing an order a sample uniform was requested. When the sample was received it was found to be inferior in work-

manship and the Military Department declared it not satisfactory. Samples from the other bidders were then obtained for comparison. The sample from the Associated Military Stores, Chicago, is without question superior to either of the others and the Commandant requests that this uniform be purchased. The Associated Military Stores has submitted a revised bid, having changed the cap to an unremovable cover as quoted by the others, the reduction being \$1.90. Their price on the insignia is considerably lower than Reed's. The Associated Military Stores bid is now \$71.65 as compared to \$71.45 by Reed's.

The United States Army allows to the University commutation in the amount of \$94.77 for each student for the purpose of purchasing a uniform which becomes the property of the student when he completes the course. The balance above the cost of this uniform will be used to buy shoes and accessories. It is proposed to provide the student with a high quality uniform which he can use as a reserve officer or in the regular army.

The Director of Purchases, the Commandant, and the Comptroller now recommend that the order be placed with the Associated Military Stores at their price of \$71.65 because of their ability to furnish a superior quality uniform. They have supplied our R.O.T.C. uniforms for several years and provided excellent quality and service.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of General Davis, this recommendation was approved.

INSURANCE ON HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL SERVICE PLAN

(22) The Board on July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 10), referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report to the Board the question of insurance on the hospital and medical service plan for students in the Urbana-Champaign, Chicago Undergraduate, and Galesburg Undergraduate divisions for 1948-1949.

The Finance Committee recommends that insurance in a commercial company be continued for the coming year and that the benefits be as follows:

(1) Hospital allowance of \$5.00 a day of hospitalization, not to exceed twenty-eight days in a semester (compared with \$4.50 a day in 1947-1948).

(2) An allowance up to \$22.50 a semester for miscellaneous hospital services, including laboratory, anaesthetic, operating room, medicines, etc. (the same as at present).

(3) Medical service of \$3.00 a day for not more than two-thirds of the number of days the individual is hospitalized, not exceeding twenty-eight days a semester, not payable if a surgical benefit is payable (the same as at present).

(4) Allowance for surgical services based on an itemized schedule with a maximum of \$225. (The schedule is approximately 23 per cent less than the schedule of 1947-1948. The company receiving the insurance last year allowed a schedule in excess of customary amounts and difficulties have resulted from such a liberal provision.)

In accordance with the recommendation of the Finance Committee, invitations to bid on this insurance for the University of Illinois beginning September 10, 1948, were submitted to sixty-seven companies and advertised in the press. Prospective bidders were requested to quote only premium rates on either or both a retention and nonretention plan basis for the provision of stated benefits as outlined in the bid form, which benefits were considered by the University, based on its past experience and anticipated needs, as being desirable and adequate to meet the average requirements of the students. The benefits are available to University faculty, employees, and their dependents upon application. Alternate bids were not allowed.

The Director of Purchases, the Dean of Men, and the Comptroller recommend that the order be placed with the Central Underwriters Agency, Inc., Chicago, representing the Central Life Insurance Company of Illinois, the lowest bidder, at a total estimated yearly premium of \$240,295 based on their bid of \$4.25 for students and other individuals and \$6.72 for family dependents based on nineteen-week semesters, such rates being the result of weekly rates of 22.4 cents an individual and 35.4 cents a family on a nonretention plan basis.

All students, except persons on appointment on the University staff or the

staffs of the allied surveys or laboratories, and students taking not more than one unit of graduate work or five hours of undergraduate work in a semester, or one-half unit of graduate work or three hours of undergraduate work in the eight-week summer session, pay each semester, as insurance for hospital and medical service, a fee of \$5.00. A student who presents evidence of participation in any other group insurance system providing the same benefits as those covered by the University fee, may petition through the Office of the Dean of Students for a refund of this fee.

Members of the staff and their spouses may participate on a similar basis and family participation (staff member, spouse, and children over three months and under ten years of age) is at the rate of \$22.50 a year. The excess of collections over the cost of insurance is applied to administrative and contingent costs of operation of the plan.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted.

EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY INSURANCE

(23) Renewal is proposed of employers' liability and voluntary workmen's compensation insurance, including occupational disease coverage and schedule general liability and property damage insurance, with limits of \$50/100,000, effective August 7, 1948, for one year, to cover the operations necessary to perform the research work stipulated under numerous tasks of the Naval Research Contract.

Requests for quotations were sent to fifty-six stock and seven mutual company agents. Only one bid was received, the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company, which insured this risk for the past two policy years, and quoted rates identical to those of last year. This company meets our rating requirements.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller recommend that the order be placed with the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company of Chicago at an estimated gross cost of \$2,000 chargeable to contract funds.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this contract was placed as recommended.

PURCHASES

(24) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the following purchases. Unless otherwise specified, the purchase in each case is recommended on the basis of lowest bid, or because the item is noncompetitive, or to obtain earliest delivery (see Appendix, schedule A, page 129).

The President of the University has authorized emergency purchases as shown in schedule B (see Appendix, page 131).

On motion of Dr. Meyer, purchases were authorized as recommended, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(25) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from July 11 to September 10, 1948 (see Appendix, page 131).

This report was received for record.

ADJUSTMENTS IN ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION BUDGET TO JUNE 30, 1948

(26) In approving the Athletic Association budget for the year 1947-1948 (August 5, 1947, Minutes, page 491), the Board of Trustees authorized the President to make changes and adjustments as recommended by the Athletic Association Board

of Directors within the total estimated income. Following is a statement of adjustments thus made to June 30, 1948, not previously reported:

1. Appropriation to reimburse Mr. Ross Anderson for serving as assistant coach during spring football season\$ 300
2. Appropriation for the employment of Mr. C. D. Wagstaff as a consultant to assist in the preparation of plans and specifications for the bids to be let for the construction of the proposed golf course of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois..... 1 000

PETITION FROM CHAMPAIGN-URBANA BUSINESSMEN CONCERNING ILLINI UNION COFFEE HOUSE

(28) The President's Office has received a petition addressed to "The President and Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois," undated, signed by seventy-five businessmen and women and employees of commercial establishments in Champaign-Urbana, concerning the Illini Union Coffee House.

The Coffee House is on the south campus in a temporary building, formerly a mess hall at Camp Grant, which was secured from the Federal Works Agency to increase food service facilities for students and staff. It has been in service, except during the summer of 1948, since the beginning of the first semester of 1947-1948, and is operated as a branch facility of the Illini Union Building. In addition to serving during regular meal hours, the Illini Union Coffee House has offered a soda fountain service between meal hours and in the evenings. The local businessmen allege that this is unfair competition with commercial establishments and ask that the Board of Trustees "take such steps as may be necessary to discontinue and eliminate the above mentioned unfair practices."

ANSWER TO THE PETITION

1. The Coffee House is not financed from State appropriations. The cost of moving the building to the campus and erecting it was financed by a Federal agency. Funds for the purchase and installation of equipment, as well as inventories, have been advanced by the Illini Union from accumulated reserves for maintenance, furniture and equipment, repairs and replacements. These funds must be repaid to the Union, and the present plan calls for the liquidation of this advance over the next five years.

2. A recent survey of the customers in the Coffee House indicated that approximately 90 per cent of the students using the Coffee House live south of Green Street and west of Wright Street, and the majority live in the temporary houses on the Drill Field. As long as the temporary housing facilities for single students are continued, it will be desirable to continue the operation of the Coffee

House. Soda fountain service has been provided because of a demand for this type of service at meal hours and also to permit the efficient use of the labor between meal periods.

3. In order to provide additional space in the Illini Union Building for social and recreational programs, it has been decided to close the Ballroom Cafeteria.¹ This was done with the concurrence of Dean Turner, Dean Shelden, Dean Stafford, the Illini Union Board, and student representatives. *Therefore, during the current fiscal year the University will offer less food service to students and staff than it did during the past year.* We hope this will be offset through additional commercial restaurant service. We plan to reopen the Ballroom Cafeteria if and when it is evident that a need for additional food service exists that can not otherwise be met.

4. In view of the volume of soda fountain business after the evening meal at the Coffee House, we have concluded that we should not continue this feature of the service, but should reopen the Illini Union soda fountain which has been closed during the evenings since the war due to the shortage of labor. This service is desirable because of the many student and faculty activities held in the building in the evening.

5. The fundamental question involved in this case is whether a need for such service exists and not the reaction of the local operators. The Coffee House was started because of such a need. The need still exists. We are not interested in running restaurants, as such, although food service is regularly maintained in hundreds of American colleges, both public and private. In some, the college dining service, following the old tradition at Oxford University, is compulsory, being regarded as a part of the educational plan.

In food service, as in housing, the University authorities will applaud all efforts to improve matters through local private initiative.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this communication was referred to the President of the University for reply.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES IN CHICAGO

(29) The Physical Plant Department does not have an architectural staff in Chicago to do the architectural and engineering work (mostly preparation of working drawings and specifications) on the building improvement projects at the Chicago Professional Colleges and the Chicago Undergraduate Division. The architectural firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee proposes to provide the necessary architectural and engineering services, including superintendence of construction work, for a fee of 10 per cent of the first \$50,000 of the cost of a project, 8 per cent of the next \$50,000, and 6 per cent of any cost over \$100,000, plus travel expenses.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends award of a contract on this basis. The Comptroller concurs with the understanding that this firm will be employed on any given project only on notice initiated by the Physical Plant Department and subject to further approval. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller further recommend that the firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee be authorized under the terms of the foregoing proposal to provide the architectural and engineering services for the Physical Medicine addition at a fee estimated not to exceed \$10,000.

I recommend: (1) approval of this procedure, provided that any commission involving a fee of \$5,000 or less will be subject to authorization by the President of the University, and that if the fee is estimated to exceed \$5,000 it will be subject also to approval by the Board of Trustees; (2) that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with Holabird and Root and Burgee for the architectural and engineering work on minor improvement projects in Chicago in accordance with the terms heretofore specified for the balance of the current fiscal biennium ending June 30, 1949, provided further that the contract may be terminated on thirty days' notice; and

¹ From May, 1942, to April, 1946, the Illini Union Ballroom was used as a mess hall for Army and Navy trainees. After the war the Illini Union Building continued operating it as a cafeteria which operation will be discontinued.

(3) authorization of this firm to provide the architectural work for the Physical Medicine addition under the terms of such contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted.

GREEN STREET SIDEWALK

(30) Recently bids were taken for reconstruction of sidewalks north of Green Street between Wright Street and Goodwin Avenue, which is necessary because the construction of steam and electrical service lines to the new Electrical Engineering and Mechanical Engineering Buildings required the removal of former sidewalks. The cost of this sidewalk, accordingly, will be divided between these two projects. The sidewalk leading to the main entrance of Engineering Hall is a maintenance project, the cost of which is to be charged to Physical Plant Maintenance funds.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the General Paving Company, the lowest bidder, on the basis of their total base bid of \$6,710.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded and authority granted as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(31) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, to provide for engineering services to include drawings and specifications for the extension of steam and electrical service from the Utilities Distribution System to the new Graduate Student and Staff Apartments in Urbana.

The Board approved a contract with Sargent and Lundy for engineering services for the Power Plant and Distribution System on November 23, 1945 (Minutes, page 919). The estimated cost of this addition is \$1,425, and costs will be computed on the same basis as the original contract, i.e., 6 per cent of the cost of the completed project.

Funds are available in the appropriation for student and staff apartments.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as requested.

ELECTRICAL SERVICE FOR BETATRON FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(32) Incidental to the extension of electrical service for the Betatron for the Chicago Professional Colleges, it will be necessary to conclude the following agreements with the Commonwealth Edison Company:

1. Permit to run overhead lines from University property.
2. Order for labor and material at a cost of \$2,273.
3. Meter lease.
4. Facilities rental agreement.

Funds are available in the capital and operating appropriations to cover the expenditures resulting from the execution of these agreements. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller request the approval of these agreements.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute them.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(33) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the following additions to the contract for the electrical work in connection with the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building at Urbana:

1. Furnish and install three 25-kilovolt ampere and three 75-KVA transformers instead of three 15-KVA and three 50-KVA transformers as originally requested..... \$1 232 96
2. Additional installation required for the substitution of a 50 KW — MG set in place of an ignitron in the substation..... 1 026 56
3. Additional electrical facilities necessary to provide more outlets..... 7 417 88

Funds are available for the foregoing changes in the State appropriation for the "Construction of a new Electrical Engineering Building." All of these changes are recommended by the Department of Electrical Engineering.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these additions to the original contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as recommended.

PURCHASE OF FURNITURE FOR PUBLIC AREAS OF NEW WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(34) In considering the furnishings for the new Women's Residence Hall, I asked a special committee consisting of Professor Frank Roos, Chairman, the late Professor Alta Gwinn Saunders, and Professors Janice Smith and A. C. Littleton to review the problem. The committee recommended that the College of Agriculture be given the responsibility of carrying this project through to completion, working through the Home Economics Department and in conjunction with the Business Office and Physical Plant Department. This responsibility was accepted by Dean Rusk, who assigned Assistant Professor Dorothy J. Iwig of the Home Economics Department to work under his direction and with the aid of an advisory committee. The advisory committee thus appointed included the following:

Specifications for the equipment approved by the committee were submitted for competitive bids under various headings. Bids were invited from sixteen companies, and bids were received from ten firms. The bids have been reviewed by the Director of Purchases and Professor Iwig, who recommend that orders be placed with the lowest bidder for each group of items, as follows:

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller endorse this recommendation. Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Construction of student residence halls."

UNIVERSITY'S SHARE OF SEWAGE DISPOSAL COSTS

(35) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 343), the Board approved a plan under which the University pays part of the operating costs of sewage disposal

through the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District. This became effective July 1, 1947, at a cost of approximately \$6,000 a year.

On May 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 1104), the Board approved in principle the financing by the University of an addition to the local sanitary sewer system to serve the temporary housing area on South First Street, at an estimated cost of \$60,000. Engineering studies of this development are being made.

Officers of the Sanitary District have now advised the University that a further addition to the central plant, at an estimated cost of \$140,000, is necessary. A large portion of the increased flow is due to the University load. An estimate of the amount of University sewage indicates that the University's fair share of the cost of this addition would be about \$25,000. The University is asked if it will accept this obligation and contribute to the project. The proposal is similar in principle to previous University participation in the costs of sanitary service and of improving West Springfield Avenue in Urbana. This expenditure, however, would be in the biennium 1949-1951, the budget for which is in preparation and is subject to appropriation of the funds by the General Assembly.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the acceptance of this obligation; the item has been included in the biennial budget estimates of the Physical Plant Department.

I recommend that the Board give assent and authorize a provision for this expenditure in the biennial operating budget for 1949-1951, the actual payment to be contingent upon an adequate State appropriation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this recommendation was adopted.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(36) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded those candidates who fulfilled all of the requirements and who passed the C.P.A. examination which was given in May, 1948 (see Appendix, page 132).

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(37) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of June 30, 1948. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

REPAIR OF WALKS AND DRIVES IN TEMPORARY HOUSING AREAS

(38) Recently bids were requested for repairs to the macadam walks and drives in the temporary housing area. The following bids were received:

Illiana Construction Company, Urbana.....	\$19 800
Frank Somers Company, Urbana.....	19 100

A quotation was submitted by the Champaign Asphalt Company for the same work but using a plant-mix hot asphaltic concrete material, which we consider superior to the construction upon which we received bids. Although the quotation of the Champaign Asphalt Company was based on unit prices (20 cents a square foot for resurfacing with asphalt and for patching holes with macadam, and 30 cents a square foot for new construction), quantities required have been taken off by them and checked by our organization, indicating that this work can be accomplished by them at approximately \$13,500. The Champaign Asphalt Company is the only local company in a position to furnish and place hot asphaltic material. Contractors from other cities would not bid on a project of this size, so that it is not possible to obtain competition on the use of this material.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the two bids received on August 31 be rejected, and authority be granted to execute a contract with the Champaign Asphalt Company on a unit cost basis at an estimated total cost of \$13,500. The cost of this work is to be

charged to funds available in the maintenance budget of the Temporary Housing Project, so that no special appropriation is needed.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute such contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as requested.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REMODELING
704 SOUTH SIXTH STREET, CHAMPAIGN**

(39) The Board of Trustees at its meeting on July 22 (Minutes, page 4), authorized the leasing of property at 704 South Sixth Street, Champaign, and appropriated the sum of \$25,000 for remodeling this area into space suitable for offices of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations.

Since the work is of a remodeling character and it is difficult to secure reasonable fixed bids and because of the time required in preparing detailed specifications and securing bids, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the general work be done under the terms of the contract for minor repairs and alterations on a cost plus basis as awarded by the Board of Trustees at their meeting on July 22, to Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign. The cost of this work is estimated to be \$9,000.

I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute an addition to the general contract to provide for the remodeling of this area.

The Comptroller presented this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was authorized as recommended.

APPRECIATION OF HOSPITALITY IN PEORIA

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the Board made record of its appreciation of the hospitality shown by citizens of Peoria, the managers of the Country Club, and Mr. Williamson, and the Secretary was requested to communicate this fact to the interested parties.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

October 21, 1948



The October meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, October 21, 1948, at the Illini Center, in the LaSalle Hotel, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

9:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

4:30 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Fornof, General Davis, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

President Stoddard was present; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Treasurer I. L. Porter, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton; and, during part of the day, Mr. Newton C. Farr and Professor W. C. Huntington, Chairman of the Building Program Committee.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CHICAGO HOUSING PROJECTS

(1) I have asked Dr. Ivy and Mr. Farr to be present to discuss the status of housing projects in the medical district.

Dr. Ivy stated that it was important that the Board act on these matters as soon as possible. Mr. Farr outlined the four projects for student and staff housing in the area. He stated that the plan for the Urbana staff housing project had been chosen instead of the plans used by the Illinois Institute of Technology. Mr. Farr recommended, in view of the requirements to obtain a loan for construction, that a lease of any part of the land on which the housing project was to be built was not acceptable, and that the land should be purchased from the Medical Center Commission. Mr. Farr recommended also that a contract for architectural services be made with Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill (for action, see page 145).

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the following resolution was adopted.

Whereas, the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois Foundation are now contemplating the acquisition of land from the Medical Center Commission for the purpose of erecting thereon an apartment building in the Medical Center District for the use of students and staff of the University of Illinois; and

Whereas, the Medical Center Commission has proposed that its conveyance of land to the University or to the Foundation take the form of a long-term lease by the Medical Center Commission to the University of Illinois or to the University of Illinois Foundation instead of a conveyance in fee simple; and

Whereas, it is deemed objectionable by the University that any building intended for its use, whether the title to the land and building is to be held by the University directly or indirectly through the University of Illinois Foundation, be erected on land leased to the University or to the Foundation,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that it is hereby declared as a matter of general policy, and with particular reference to the proposal of the Medical Center Commission to lease land for building purposes to the University or to the University of Illinois Foundation, that land to be so acquired by the University or by the University of Illinois Foundation for University building purposes from the Medical Center Commission or other persons shall be acquired in fee simple only, subject only, in the case of the Medical Center Commission, to statutory limitations.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Employment of William H. Butterfield as Manager of the University of Illinois Foundation

(2) Several months ago Mr. Frank E. Bell submitted his resignation as Manager of the University of Illinois Foundation effective July 1, 1948, in order to accept a position at Williams College.

After interviewing a number of candidates for this position, officers of the Foundation and the President of the University selected Mr. William H. Butterfield, Vice-President of DePauw University. By authority of the Directors of the Foundation and with the approval of the President of the University, he has been appointed Manager effective October 15, 1948.

In discussing the terms of his employment it was agreed by the officers of the Foundation and the President of the University that Mr. Butterfield should receive a salary of \$12,000 a year, the Foundation paying \$7,500, and the University paying \$4,500 for special services to be assigned him by the President of the University.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees has authorized this appointment, so far as the University is concerned, and recommends that the Board assign \$4,500 a year from the budget reserve for this position.

This report was received for record.

EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL

(3) The Legal Counsel has requested authority to employ outside counsel to assist him in the preparation for and trial of cases now pending and to help in work on the appeal of these cases to the Supreme Court, if necessary, and to handle negotiations in an effort to settle out of court the controversy with the Warner Construction Company.

There are four cases pending in Cook County. Another one is soon to be started. One case is pending in De Kalb County, one in Piatt County, and one in Champaign County. One case from Champaign County has reached the Supreme Court, briefs are to be written, one case is in the Court of Claims and one is before the Illinois Commerce Commission.

The bulk of the work of the Legal Counsel's office concerns the review and approval of contracts, the handling of claims for compensation under the Workmen's Compensation Law, the writing of legal opinions, and conferences on the legal aspects of various kinds of transactions.

I recommend that the Legal Counsel be authorized to employ outside counsel in these and similar cases, as they arise, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this recommendation was adopted.

EMPLOYMENT OF REAL ESTATE NEGOTIATOR

(4) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on September 23, 1948, a question was raised about the broker employed in the purchase of real estate properties.

The Board of Trustees on March 13, 1945 (Minutes, page 413), authorized the employment of Mr. Sidney B. Trelease as a negotiator in the acquisition of properties. Champaign-Urbana real estate brokerage fees are 5 per cent of the first \$10,000 and 2 per cent of the balance. Mr. Trelease offered to serve as negotiator at a flat rate of \$250 a parcel of property.

During the past two years the University has purchased a number of residence properties for faculty housing. The negotiations for the acquisition of these properties were carried on as follows:

ACADEMY FOR UNITED STATES AIR FORCE

(5) United States Air Force authorities are preparing plans and enabling legislation for the establishment of an Air Force Academy similar to the service academies at West Point and Annapolis. It is anticipated that an interim academy will be established to operate on a small scale with approximately 200 to 300 cadets before completion of the Air Force Academy at its permanent site.

I have invited the authorities of the Air University at Maxwell Field, Alabama, who are preparing the plans for the Air Force Academy, to establish the interim academy at the University of Illinois. I request that the Board confirm my action and also authorize officials of the University to carry on the negotiations with United States Air Force officials if the latter will consider the offer.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the action of the President of the University was confirmed and he was authorized to do everything possible to secure the establishment of this academy at the University of Illinois.

REQUEST FROM PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY FOR A LEAVE OF ABSENCE

(6) The Third Session of the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization will meet in Beirut, Lebanon, from November 17 to December 11. I have been appointed one of the United States delegates to this session. I am also the American member of the Executive Board of UNESCO which will meet in Istanbul November 11 and 12 through the Beirut sessions.

I request a leave of absence with adjusted salary from November 6 to December 14, 1948.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this leave was granted, on the terms requested.

BIENNIAL BUDGET FOR 1949-1951

(7) I present my recommendations for the biennial operating budget of the University of Illinois for the two years beginning July 1, 1949, covering all funds for which appropriations are made by the General Assembly. This estimate is submitted as the proposed basis for the budget to be filed with the Department of Finance by November 1, 1948, as required by law.

Several months ago, deans, directors, and general administrative officers were requested to submit estimates of needs for the coming biennium. These estimates were assembled and carefully studied in the offices of the Provost and the Comptroller. They were then submitted to the University Council for discussion.

After a review of these estimates and consideration of the problems of the next biennium as set forth below, I recommend a total operating budget for 1949-1951 of \$72,271,742. Of this amount, the sum of \$56,271,742 would come from tax funds of the State and the sum of \$16,000,000 from the University's own income.

For the 1947-1949 biennium, the total was \$60,083,818, with \$17,000,000 derived from the University's own income deposited in the State Treasury. The reduction of this item is related to the decrease in the number of veterans. From State tax funds, the present appropriation is \$43,083,818.

The increase of \$12,187,924 is needed for the following purposes:

President Stoddard, Provost Griffith, and Comptroller Morey discussed the proposed budget presenting detailed explanations of all increases recommended. During the discussion of this budget, Dr. Meyer took his place with the Board.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the biennial operating budget was unanimously approved as presented, to be filed as a tentative biennial budget under the State Finance Act, and the President of the University and the President of the Board were requested to take charge of the matter from now on.

STATEMENT BY REPRESENTATIVE JOHN K. MORRIS

At this point, the Honorable John K. Morris, Representative from the Twelfth District, was introduced. Mr. Morris urged that provision be made for housing the College of Veterinary Medicine and the Department of Home Economics as soon as possible.

The Board continued its consideration of matters presented by the President of the University.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES BUDGET FOR 1949-1951

(8) I am recommending a capital expenditures appropriation for the 1949-1951 biennium for the Urbana campus of \$36,855,000 and for the Chicago Professional Colleges of \$26,210,000, a biennial total of \$63,065,000 (Schedule A).

As an example of the need for long-range planning, a total of \$38,370,000 (Schedule B) of capital expenditures for both Urbana and Chicago is required immediately after the proposed 1949-1951 program. The recommendations also show further needs for later biennia (Schedule C).

Professor W. C. Huntington, Chairman of the Building Program Committee, reviewed the work of the Committee in preparing the request and discussed the proposals in detail. The complete report of the Building Program Committee was sent to the Board of Trustees in advance of the meeting and a copy is on file with the Secretary of the Board.

President Fornof expressed the appreciation of the Board for the careful work of Professor Huntington and his committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS

Dr. Meyer presented the following report.

A meeting of the Committee on Chicago Departments of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at 12 o'clock noon on October 11, 1948, at the Chicago Athletic Club. Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Chairman, Dr. Martin G. Luken, General Chester R. Davis, and Mr. Park Livingston were present; also Mr. H. A. Hazleton, Clerk.

The Committee considered a recommendation from the Physical Plant Department that the firm of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill be employed as architects for the proposed staff apartment building at the Medical Center Campus at a fee of 5½ per cent of the total cost of plans for the staff apartment building on the Urbana campus to the building at Medical Center. Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill are the architects employed for the faculty apartment building at Urbana.

After discussion of the recommendation the Committee decided that further information was needed before action could be taken on the proposal to employ Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill at a fee of 5½ per cent.

The meeting adjourned until such time as further information could be secured. Since that adjournment, the Chairman of the Committee secured from the Physical Plant Department further detailed information on the work necessary by Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill to adapt the Urbana building plans to the Chicago building.

The Chairman of the Committee also consulted with other architects concerning the proposal and after telephone discussion by the Chairman with Mr. Davis and Dr. Luken, the Committee recommends that Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill be employed as architects for the faculty apartment building on the Medical Center Campus at a fee of 5½ per cent of the cost of the building but that no contract be entered into with Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill until funds are assured for the completion of the building.

The increase requested for salaries and wages is requested to compensate employees of the Division adequately for the services rendered and to meet the competition for professionally trained staff members. In order to obtain competent personnel in several professional groups, it is necessary to increase the present salary ranges. The nonprofessional staff members must also be more adequately compensated for their services within the Division.

Hospitalization costs during the past biennium have gone up materially. The maximum that the Division has been paying for hospitalization during the present biennium is \$11 a day for Chicago and St. Louis hospitals and \$8 in hospitals

elsewhere in the State. Increasing costs indicate that costs may run as high as \$20 a day in the next biennium, and in the down-state hospitals costs at present are over \$12 a day. The anticipated increase in the cost of hospital care is reflected in the increase requested for the next biennium.

Staff additions of one medical social worker, two nursing consultants, a speech and hearing consultant, and eleven nonprofessional workers are requested for the district offices and the central office staffs in order that the normal growth of this program can be met.

The increase for contractual services results largely from the increased rentals the Division must pay for office space in various localities.

The new item of travel is requested since prior to this time all travel items have been paid for out of federal funds, but due to the decrease in the funds available from the federal government, it is necessary to request an appropriation for this travel from the State of Illinois.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this biennial budget was approved as presented, to be filed as a tentative budget under the State Finance Act.

OPEN SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in open session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

BUDGET FOR THE INSTITUTION FOR TUBERCULOSIS RESEARCH

(1) The Sixty-fifth General Assembly of the State of Illinois appropriated to the University of Illinois the sum of \$32,000 for the operation and maintenance expense of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research. The General Assembly also provided that the management of the Institution be vested in a five-man board, two to be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University, two by the Board of the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium, and the fifth member to be elected by the other four.

The Board of Directors of the Institution has submitted the following budget for the expenditure of this biennium's appropriation during the period of November 1, 1948, to June 30, 1949. The continuation of the program is dependent on the approval by the Legislature of additional appropriations.

APPOINTMENT TO BOARD OF EXAMINERS IN ACCOUNTANCY

(2) Mr. William F. G. Ross, Chairman of the Board of Examiners in Accountancy, has submitted his resignation from the Board because of ill health. He will be hospitalized for several months. The Committee on Accountancy recommends that Mr. Ross's resignation be accepted. The Committee makes this recommendation with much regret. Mr. Ross has given excellent service on the Board during his two years as a member. His full term would have expired June 30, 1949.

The Committee recommends that Mr. Charles Robert Miller of Arthur Young and Company, Chicago, be appointed to the Board of Examiners in Accountancy to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Ross's resignation, that is until June 30, 1949.

Mr. Miller is forty-three years of age. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois, having received the Bachelor of Science degree in accountancy in June, 1928, with high honors. He obtained the Illinois C.P.A. certificate by examination in November, 1928. He has been with the firm of Arthur Young and Company for many years and is now a resident partner. He is recognized by the profession as an outstanding accountant.

Mr. Miller has indicated his willingness to serve.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, Mr. Ross's resignation was accepted, and Mr. Miller was appointed as recommended.

ADMINISTRATION OF DEPARTMENT OF BOTANY

(3) The members of the professorial staff of the Department of Botany have requested a change in the organization of the Department from one administered by a department head to a department organized with a chairman. Such a change of organization is permitted under University of Illinois Statutes on recommendation of the President to the Board of Trustees. I recommend approval of this request, and that Dr. Oswald Tippo, Associate Professor of Botany and now Acting Head of the Department, be appointed Chairman of the Department for two years from September 1, 1948, at an academic salary rate of \$5,500.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were adopted.

UNIVERSITY'S SHARE OF DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT COSTS

(4) The Union Drainage District No. 1 of the towns of Afton and Milan in De Kalb County has requested the University to assume its share of the cost of the cleaning of the drainage ditch which serves in part Wright Farm No. 7.¹ This ditch runs for approximately 160 rods through the entire length of the northeastern eighty acres of Wright Farm No. 7 and provides the drainage outlet for the whole farm. The ditch was dug about thirty-one years ago and has not been maintained adequately and has needed cleaning for some time. The University's share of this expense is \$1,523.99, one-half of which is due in September, 1948, and the balance in November, 1948. The drainage district is also considering an annual maintenance program after the ditch has been cleaned.

This is similar in principle to payments by the University of part of the operating costs of the sewage disposal through the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District, for construction of an addition to the local sanitary sewer system to serve the temporary housing area on South First Street, and for part of the cost of improving West Springfield Avenue in Urbana.

Professor J. B. Andrews, Dean H. P. Rusk, and Comptroller Lloyd Morey recommend payment of this initial expenditure and of a pro rata share of the subsequent annual maintenance charges.

Funds are available from the operation of Wright Farm No. 7.

I concur.

PURCHASE OF ILLINOIS TERMINAL RIGHT-OF-WAY

(6) The Illinois Terminal Railroad Company formerly had a spur track extending through the business and residential part of Urbana and through the University service area to Sixth Street in Champaign. When this spur was abandoned, the University acquired various portions of the property through the following actions of the Board of Trustees:

October 17, 1942 (Minutes, page 110), the Board authorized the purchase of that portion lying between Wright and Sixth Streets at a price of.....\$1 500

September 24, 1946 (Minutes, page 57), the Board authorized the acquisition of that portion between Mathews and Goodwin Avenues at a price of..... 2 500

November 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 164), the Board authorized the purchase of that portion lying between Goodwin Avenue and Harvey Street at a cost of..... 1 500

May 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 370), the Board authorized the purchase of the West ½ block between Harvey Street and Gregory Avenue at a cost of.. 1 000

The purchase of the first parcel has been completed and the title transferred to the University of Illinois. The purchase of the last three parcels has not been completed pending the successful negotiation of some questions concerning the title. It is anticipated that these difficulties will be worked out in the near future.

There is also available the east one-half block between Harvey and Gregory (approximately 40' x 198'). The Illinois Terminal Railroad Company has a buyer for this property at a price of \$750, which represents a unit cost of 9.5¢ a square foot. They have offered this property to the University at the same price, and the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Security Officer, and the Comptroller recommend that the University purchase the property to be used as a parking area and for Physical Plant Service purposes.

I recommend the authorization of the purchase of this land and a special appropriation of \$750 for this purpose.

OIL AND GAS LEASES ON OLNEY EXPERIMENTAL FARM

(7) The Board of Trustees on September 23, 1948 (Minutes, page 84), authorized leasing to the Sun Oil Company for oil and gas development an experimental fruit farm tract of $19\frac{1}{4}$ acres near Olney, Illinois. The Sun Oil Company also wishes to lease the seventy-five acre experimental farm tract which lies to the north of the $19\frac{1}{4}$ acre tract described as follows:

"The South $\frac{3}{4}$ of West half of Southwest quarter of Section 36 and beginning at a point 12 chains South of the Northwest corner of the East half of the Southwest quarter of Section 36, thence South 28.19 chains, thence East 4.26 chains, thence North 28.19 chains, thence West 4.26 chains to place of beginning, 12 acres, more or less in Section 36; also, beginning at the Southwest corner of the West half of Southwest quarter of Section 36, running thence North along the section line 120 rods, thence West 4 rods, thence South 120 rods, thence East 4 rods to the place of beginning, containing 3 acres in Southeast quarter of Section 35, Township 4 North, Range 10 East, containing 75 acres, more or less."

This will give the University the same protection in the event oil or gas production in commercial quantities is developed within a statutory offset location.

The Head of the Department of Horticulture and the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station recommend that this lease be authorized under the same terms as the other lease. The company will pay a rental of \$5.00 a year an acre. If oil or gas is produced from wells on the University's land the University will receive one-eighth of the proceeds; if oil or gas is produced within 330 feet of University land the University will share in the royalties.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this lease was authorized as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF JOSEPH A. RUSSELL AS PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY

(8) I recommend the appointment of Dr. Joseph A. Russell of Syracuse University as Professor and Head of the Department of Geography on indefinite tenure at a salary of \$8,000 an academic year beginning February 1, 1949.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was approved as recommended.

SALE OF STANDARD OIL OF NEW JERSEY STOCK

(9) The Finance Committee of the Board recommends that two shares of Standard Oil Company of New Jersey stock received as a dividend on Standard Oil of Indiana stock be sold, since this dividend has been ruled as a distribution from income.

Authorization for this sale and approval of the following resolution is requested:

RESOLUTION REGARDING SALE OF STOCK

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is the owner of two shares of capital stock of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees has approved the sale of such stock in its meeting of October 21, 1948,

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, be authorized to execute any and all documents to complete such sale.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this sale was authorized and the resolution was adopted as requested.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON STADIUM RESTORATION

(10) The West Hall of the Stadium was used for student housing from 1946 to 1948, and was returned to use for instruction in physical education and student recreational programs at the beginning of the academic year, 1948-1949.

Lewis S. Colbert, General Contractor, Champaign, was engaged to do the necessary remodeling at an estimated cost of \$4,791.

At the time the remodeling was planned, it was anticipated that some work would be required on the floor in the north half of the West Hall. It was impossible to determine the extent and nature of the work until partitions and wood flooring had been removed to permit examination of the concrete base. The cost of the additional work necessary will be \$4,000.

There is other general work to be done to improve the West Hall, estimated to cost \$1,363, for which the Athletic Association will supply funds.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that this additional work for restoration and remodeling be done under the terms of the contract with Lewis S. Colbert for minor alterations authorized by the Board of Trustees on July 22, 1948.

Funds are available for the improvements to be paid for by the Athletic Association in an assignment already approved by the Board of Trustees, and funds are available for the restoration expenditures to be paid by the University in reserves accumulated from operation of the West Hall as a dormitory.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute an addition of \$5,363 in this contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO HEATING CONTRACT FOR CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition in the amount of \$5,404.17 to the contract with the Carson-Payson Company, Danville, for the heating work in the construction of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building, for underground steam lines which will connect the houses at 1205 West California and 606 South Mathews front and rear with the University steam heating system.

Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract addition.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$7,892 to the contract with the James McHugh Sons, Inc., for the general work on the Mechanical Engineering Building to provide for spray painting of exposed haydite block and concrete surfaces in all painted rooms except basement corridors.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the Mechanical Engineering Building.

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract change.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$10,535.37 in the contract with the John Felmley Company for the general work on the Electrical Engineering Building. This increase is to provide for the following:

1. Labor and material necessary for the removal of the existing bridge over the Boneyard, construction of a new bridge, and rerouting the creek under the new bridge.....\$7 046 42
2. Labor and material for walks and drives..... 3 488 95

Funds are available in the State appropriation for this building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above additions to this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO THE GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$2,812.73 to the contract with the John Felmley Company for the general work on the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building to provide for:

1. Substitution of Acoustone and Acousti-Celetox in lieu of acoustical plaster specified.....\$1 665 62
2. Furnishing and installing of a gas cylinder shelter for the storage of gases under high pressures..... 1 147 11

Funds are available for these additions in the State appropriation for this building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above additions to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR ALTERATIONS IN THE MEN'S OLD GYMNASIUM

(15) On January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 960), the Board of Trustees appropriated \$26,000 for alterations and lockers in the Men's Old Gymnasium. This project was not considered to be of top priority, and the work was postponed. Now that higher priority projects are under way, this one may go ahead.

Since this is a remodeling job, it is not feasible to secure competitive bids. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the work be done by the following contractors under the terms of their standing contracts on a cost plus a fee basis for minor remodeling as approved by the Board of Trustees on July 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 18):

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, purchases were authorized as recommended, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

GIFTS AND GRANTS OF FUNDS FOR RESEARCH AND OTHER PURPOSES

(17) A report of gifts and grants of funds for research and other purposes received by the University since the last report on July 22, 1948 (see Appendix, page 165).

This report was received for record.

CANCELLATION OF SABBATICAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE GIVEN PROFESSOR RAYMOND P. STEARNS

(18) Associate Professor Raymond P. Stearns of the Department of History was given a sabbatical leave of absence for the second semester of 1948-1949 by the Board of Trustees on March 9, 1948.

Professor Stearns has requested that his leave be deferred for the convenience of the University because the Department of History has recently suffered major losses in the death of Professor Theodore C. Pease, former Head of the Department, and in the resignation of Professor Charles E. Odegaard.

I recommend cancellation of this leave without prejudice as to future reinstatement.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this recommendation was adopted.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR STANLEY D. TYLMAN

(19) Dr. Stanley D. Tylman, Professor and Head of the Department of Crowns and Fixed Partial Dentures, College of Dentistry, has been invited to give a series of clinics and conferences for the dental faculties of the Universities of Buenos Aires and Cordoba in Argentina. The United States Department of State has asked that this teaching mission be undertaken.

The Dean of the College of Dentistry and the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommend that he be given a leave of absence with full pay during the months of November and December, 1948. His duties will be taken over by other members of the faculty so that there will be no additional expense to the University.

I have authorized this leave of absence and request confirmation of my action.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this leave was granted as recommended.

INCREASE IN CONTRACT FOR FLOORING IN STADIUM

(20) On September 23, 1948 (Minutes, page 83), the Board of Trustees awarded a contract for asphalt tile flooring to W. Lewis and Company in the amount of \$6,107.77 as a part of the program of restoration and improvement of the West Great Hall of the Stadium. After the bids had been received for this flooring, the Athletic Association requested the addition of asphalt tile markings for the basketball courts. The asphalt tile markings are preferred to the painted markings because they are more permanent and economical over a long period of usage.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,020 in the contract with W. Lewis and Company to provide for this additional installation to be paid for by the Athletic Association.

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the above contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, authority was given as recommended.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

November 19, 1948



The November meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Friday, November 19, 1948, at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

12:30 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: General Davis, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

Provost C. R. Griffith was present, acting for President Stoddard; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Assistant to the President, Mr. A. J. Janata, and Legal Counsel W. E. Britton.

In the absence of President Fornof, Mr. McKelvey was made chairman of the meeting.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of July 21-22 (pages 1-74) and September 23, 1948 (pages 75-134).

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the minutes were approved as printed above.

CONFIRMATION OF APPOINTMENT OF MR. D. W. SMYTHE

The Provost reported for the President on the appointment of Professor Dallas W. Smythe, on which the Board, at the meeting of July 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 33), asked for further information. The President had previously sent, under date of September 9, a formal, written report to all members of the Board of Trustees, a copy of which is in the files of the Secretary of the Board as a matter of record.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Livingston, the Board voted that this appointment be confirmed, in the light of information available today.

REVISION OF STATUTES

In view of the fact that a question was raised with respect to the appointment of Professor Smythe, and in view also of the confusion that arose three years ago in connection with the appointment of a Director of the Division of Special Services for War Veterans, General Davis moved that the provisions of the University Statutes relating to interim appointments by the President of the University be referred to the Committee on General Policy, in conference with the President, for revision and report to the Board for adoption. The motion was passed.

It is the sense of the Board that all appointments should be made in conformity with the University Statutes, and that the Board should be informed at each meeting of all interim appointments involving tenure of more than one year.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PROVOST

The Board considered the following matters presented by the Provost acting for the President of the University.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL

(1) The Board of Trustees on October 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 137), authorized the University's Legal Counsel to employ special counsel in litigation cases, subject to Board approval in each case.

The Executive Committee on November 3, 1948, authorized the employment of Mr. John T. Chadwell of the firm of Snyder, Chadwell, and Fagerburg, Chicago, in the case of Blackburn, *et al.* vs. Fornof, *et al.*, in the Circuit Court of Cook County. This is a mandamus action under the Civil Service Act challenging the right of the University to discontinue the function of providing instruction for crippled children in the Research and Educational Hospitals. Three teachers were given "lay-off" notices on July 1, 1948. The case may go to the State Supreme Court.

This report was received for record.

SPECIAL COUNSEL, KENNEY VS. BOARD

(2) The Legal Counsel requests authority to engage Mr. John T. Chadwell, of Chicago, as special counsel in the case of Kenney vs. Board of Trustees, a civil service case that should be reached for trial early in January.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this authority was granted, the fees to be determined by the Board.

ILLINI SCHOLARSHIPS, INC.

(3) On February 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 974), the Board of Trustees approved a plan for the award of undergraduate scholarships for which funds would be supplied by "Illini Scholarships, Inc." of Chicago, and accepted \$1,750 to cover the first two scholarships established under this plan.

One of the scholarship holders failed to comply with the conditions of the award and thus forfeited his scholarship after holding it one year. The other recipient has resigned from the scholarship. There are no students at present receiving scholarships established under this fund and no new candidates have been recommended. At the request of the officers of Illini Scholarships, Inc., the balance of \$1,500 remaining in this fund has been refunded to this organization.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this action was approved and confirmed.

MIDWEST INTER-LIBRARY PROGRAM

(4) During the past fifty years the libraries of the midwest have built up great collections and have become an active creative force in the promotion and development of research. There has been a tremendous expansion of physical facilities and staff. Each library has tried to acquire as much of the books and other materials it needs as its financial resources will permit but now there are not enough copies of some essential research materials for all libraries that need them and not even the wealthier libraries can finance the purchase of all published materials. Under these circumstances no one library can satisfy the needs of research and scholarship from its own resources.

The presidents of thirteen midwestern universities¹ and a "Conference of Midwestern Research Libraries" have been discussing plans for cooperation in the further development of library facilities. It has been proposed that there be established a "Midwest Inter-Library Corporation" composed of cooperating member libraries which would undertake a program of action in three areas: (1) Cooperative housing of little-used material (books and other materials which should be preserved but which are not used enough to give them working library space); (2) coordination of collecting policies; and (3) cooperative technical and bibliographic services. These three areas are separable and the adoption of the proposals in any one does not require adoption of the others. The presidents of the thirteen midwestern universities at a meeting held on November 1, 1948, unanimously approved this program and its objectives in principle. They also agreed to recommend its approval, in principle, to their respective governing boards and to request authorization to participate in future planning, and to join in an appeal to the Carnegie Corporation of New York for financial support.

There are certain elements in this program which must be considered very carefully by the University of Illinois from the standpoint of its own internal policies and its responsibilities to the public before commitments are made.

I am recommending, on behalf of the President, that the Board of Trustees authorize the President and other appropriate University officers to proceed with further discussions and negotiations, including specifically (1) participation by the University in the organization of the Midwest Inter-Library Corporation and Center and the selection of a board of directors and an executive committee; (2) joining with other institutions in a request to the Carnegie Corporation of New York for financial support; and (3) the payment by the University of its share of the expenses of organizing the Midwest Inter-Library Corporation and Center. Further financial commitments, after the Corporation is organized, would still be subject to approval by the participating institutions.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was granted as requested.

SALE OF SPECTROGRAPH

(5) During the years 1937-1941 the Physics Department built a mass spectrograph under the supervision of Professor E. B. Jordan, a specialist in spectroscopy, who was appointed to the staff for research and instruction in that field of physics. The spectrograph is a highly precise instrument capable of yielding accurate values of atomic masses and is much needed in present-day physics. It was expected that Professor Jordan would use the instrument in his researches for several years; in fact, he did use it for two years following its completion and it yielded results

of value. During 1942-1943, Professor Jordan was obliged to resign from the University because of poor health and since then the instrument has not been used. The Department has not been able to find a successor who would be interested in and qualified to carry on research with the mass spectrograph. The University now has an opportunity to sell this instrument to the Argonne National Laboratory for use by Dr. A. J. Dempster, a world authority on mass spectroscopy. It appears unlikely that anyone else will want the instrument or at least be willing to pay for it.

The instrument cost the University \$16,087. This includes the cost of materials used, the time of the departmental machine shop, and the time of a glass blower. It does not include any of Professor Jordan's time, a good deal of which was spent on the design of the instrument.

The Head of the Department of Physics, the Dean of the College of Engineering, and the Dean of the Graduate College recommend the sale of the instrument to the Argonne National Laboratory for \$15,000. This price was set by the Head of the Department after consultation with several parties concerned and has been accepted by the Argonne National Laboratory. The price is approximately what it cost the University to construct the instrument but is considerably below present-day replacement cost. On the other hand, no one would purchase it at the replacement figure because it would be preferable to construct a new instrument exactly suited to the purposes of the user. Hence the price proposed appears equitable.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the sale of this instrument and that the proceeds be appropriated to the Department of Physics for its research work.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this sale was authorized and the receipts assigned as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON REMODELING OF OLD BOILER HOUSE AT URBANA

(6) On January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 954), the Board authorized the acquisition of an electronic digital computer at an estimated maximum cost of \$150,000. It has been decided to house the computer project in the old boiler house, which was vacated when the new power plant was erected. The old boiler house is now a part of the Physical Plant Service Building and is used as a warehouse. It is desired to remodel this building by putting in floors and other interior installations to make full use of the available space, which is not only urgently needed for the computer project but also for other important University activities now inadequately housed.

The Building Program Committee included \$200,000 for remodeling this building in its recommendations for 1949-1951, under the heading of Building Remodeling and Improvement at Urbana. The Board approved this item as a part of the capital appropriations for 1949-1951. It is very desirable that plans and specifications be prepared at once so that work can go forward as soon as funds become available.

The Physical Plant Department has recommended that Holabird and Root and Burgee of Chicago be engaged for this service on a fee basis of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of the estimated cost of the project for working drawings and specifications only, and 6 per cent of the total cost for complete service if funds are appropriated for the remodeling but not to exceed a maximum fee of \$15,000 for architectural services. The firm offered a credit for studies made by the University four years ago for use of the same area as a warehouse or storage building, which resulted in approximately the same general solution as is now proposed, the exact amount of credit to be determined later, after preliminary studies have been completed and the amount of savings can be determined. It is estimated that this credit will amount to about one-half per cent.

Negotiations are in progress to secure outside funds to support and strengthen the computer program, and it is hoped that a proposal based on these negotiations can be submitted to the Board at an early meeting. Meanwhile, however, the availability of space in the boiler house at the earliest possible date is essential to the

success of the project, and funds already appropriated for it may be used for preparing plans.

The Dean of the Graduate College recommends that the cost of plans for remodeling the building be paid out of the \$150,000 already allocated to the computer project by the Board.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract for architectural services.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized as recommended.

CLASSIFICATION OF "TEACHER OF HANDICAPPED CHILDREN" DISCONTINUED

(7) The Legal Counsel recommends the adoption of the following resolution.

Whereas, the teaching of children of common and high-school age who are patients in the Illinois Surgical Institute for Children, in the Research and Educational Hospitals of the University of Illinois, has been discontinued, and

Whereas, it is the judgment of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that it is for the good of the classified service to abolish the classification of "Teacher of Handicapped Children,"

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon it by the statutes of Illinois in such case made and provided and in accordance with the rules promulgated thereunder by the Board, that the classification designated "Teacher of Handicapped Children" and appearing on page 360 of the Class Specifications and Compensation Plan of the University of Illinois, hereby is abolished.

Professor Britton commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted.

OPEN SESSION

The Board, in open session, considered the following matters presented by the Provost, acting for the President of the University.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(1) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943. These persons have presented evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked C.P.A. certificates issued by other states on the basis of their having successfully passed regular written examinations. They have also satisfied all other requirements of this section of the act.

Professor Adams has been asked to serve on this mission. It will require his absence from the University from approximately November 19 to December 29.

Professor H. W. KENDALL, Head of the Department of Physical Medicine. The Office of the Surgeon General, Department of the Army, has requested the services of Professor Kendall as a civilian consultant to advise the Theater Surgeon in the Pacific Area and the hospital staffs on the treatment of patients. This will require Professor Kendall's absence from the University for a period of approximately thirty days beginning November 1, 1948.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the action of the President in granting these leaves of absence was approved and confirmed.

AMENDMENT OF CLASS SPECIFICATIONS AND COMPENSATION PLAN FOR NONACADEMIC PERSONNEL

(3) In the volume of Class Specifications and Compensation Plan appear separately listed statements concerning each position classification of the University civil service. Each statement includes three parts: Definitions, Duties by Example, and Qualifications. The paragraph on Qualifications sets forth details as to training, experience, and personal qualifications normally considered as those necessary for satisfactory job performance. By their very nature, most of these statements of qualification are specific. In the majority of cases the specific qualifications as set forth are obtainable and desirable in the form listed. Occasionally there is an applicant who, while not possessing exactly the qualifications as printed in our description, has a combination of other or different qualifications which make his employment or promotion highly desirable.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel recommends that the Class Specifications and Compensation Plan be amended to include the following paragraph:

"Under exceptional circumstances training or experience deemed equivalent in value though differing in detail may be substituted for that specified on recommendation of the department head and approval of the Director of Nonacademic Personnel."

The Legal Counsel has advised that it is within the power of the Board of Trustees under the State Civil Service Law to adopt this amendment.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this amendment was adopted as recommended.

APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS AND AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR ALTERATIONS TO DAVID KINLEY HALL

(5) On July 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 17), the Board of Trustees approved an appropriation of \$2,400 for architectural services for remodeling David Kinley Hall to provide fourteen additional offices and five classrooms which are urgently needed.

The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends an appropriation of \$55,000 be made for this remodeling. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for the general construction work to E. N. DeAtley, Champaign, Illinois, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$48,732.50. The balance of the recommended appropriation will be needed for other phases of the remodeling and for contingencies.

I recommend that an appropriation of \$55,000 be made for this project and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with E. N. DeAtley.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR SERVICE DRIVES AT TALBOT LABORATORY

(6) Bids were received for the reconstruction of sidewalks on the north side of Green Street between Wright Street and Goodwin Avenue and for the construction of service drives at Talbot Laboratory. That portion of the bids relating to the sidewalks was awarded to the General Paving Company, the lowest bidder, by the Board of Trustees on September 23, 1948 (Minutes, page 90). The recommendation for the award of the contract for drives was withheld since funds were not available.

The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has studied the need for the service drives and has included in its recommendations (separately submitted), an additional appropriation for this purpose. If the Board makes this appropriation the Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend the award of the contract to the General Paving Company, also the lowest bidder on this portion of the work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a change in the contract with the General Paving Company to include construction of the service drives at Talbot Laboratory at a cost of \$7,080.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change of contract was authorized as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR FIRE PROTECTION FACILITIES

(7) The following bids were received on the installation of a new fire alarm system at Urbana-Champaign:

Hecker & Company, Inc., Chicago.....	\$32 632
Kil-Bar Electric Company, Chicago.....	28 565

These bids are on the installation of a distribution system and branch connections to ten buildings.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the Kil-Bar Electric Company, the lower bidder. Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Construction of fire protection facilities" to cover this installation with the exception of connections to the Illini Union Coffee House (\$140), the Men's Residence Halls (\$185), and the Military Stables (\$125), which will be financed from current operating funds for these buildings.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the Kil-Bar Electric Company in the amount of \$28,565.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT UNIT IN THE RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,838.20 in the general contract with the E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company of Chicago, Illinois, for the construction of the Physical Environment Unit in the Research and Educational Hospitals to cover installation of laboratory equipment.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of addition to present Hospital Building for Research in Physical Environment."

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASES

(9) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the following purchases. Unless otherwise specified, the purchase in each case is recommended on the basis of lowest bid (see Appendix, page 183).

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these purchases were authorized as recommended, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(10) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from September 11 to October 10, 1948 (see Appendix, page 185).

This report was received for record.

INCREASE IN CONTRACT FOR PRINTING SPECIALIZED PUBLICATIONS

(11) On June 30, 1945 (Minutes, page 519), the Board of Trustees approved an increase in the rates of the contract with the George Banta Publishing Company, Menasha, Wisconsin. This company has printed *The Journal of English and Germanic Philology* for thirty-five years. The company specializes in the particular type of printing required for this publication and has provided the University with first class service and high-grade printing.

The present contract provides that either party may terminate the contract by a ninety days' notice to the other party. The George Banta Publishing Company has submitted a revised price schedule to be effective October 1, 1948, which

represents an increase of approximately 23 per cent over the schedule approved in 1945. The new prices are not out of line with price increases in the printing industry.

The Director of the University Press, the Director of Purchases, and the Comptroller recommend that this new schedule of prices be accepted and the present contract so amended.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this amendment in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this amendment to contract was approved as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(12) A contract for architectural services on the Electrical Engineering Building was awarded by the Board of Trustees on June 30, 1945 (Minutes, page 507), to Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White at a fee of 6 per cent of the construction cost. Changes in the construction of the building, made at the request of the Department of Electrical Engineering, after the original plans had been drawn have required additional architectural services.

The Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend a change in the contract with Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White to provide for a payment of \$5,507.76 to cover additional architectural services. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of the building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this change in contract was authorized as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK REMODELING OF AGRICULTURAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(13) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has included in its recommendations (separately submitted in item No. 4) an appropriation of \$13,000 for remodeling the Agricultural Engineering Building. If the Board makes this appropriation, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the general work to L. S. Colbert, Champaign, under the terms of the contract with this firm for minor alterations as approved by the Board of Trustees on July 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 18). The estimated cost of the general work is \$7,300. On remodeling jobs of this size it is not feasible to secure firm competitive bids. In fact, many contractors will not bid on such work because there are more uncertain factors of cost in remodeling work than in new construction.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute an addition to the contract with L. S. Colbert for this remodeling job on a cost plus fee basis.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF CANCER EXHIBIT IN MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY

(14) Bids have been received for the construction of the following University of Illinois exhibits in the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago: (1) installation of a Cancer Exhibit adjacent to the present Miracle of Growth Exhibit, and (2) additions to the present Miracle of Growth Exhibit. The Illinois Division of the American Cancer Society has assigned \$50,000 for the new exhibit and funds are available in the budget of the Vice-President in Charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges for additions to the Miracle of Growth Exhibit.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the C. W. Haynes Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, on a lump sum basis of \$19,407 and the acceptance of an alternate bid of \$677 (covering additions to the Miracle of Growth Exhibit), or a total contract

award of \$20,084. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the C. W. Haynes Company in the amount of \$20,084.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this contract was authorized as recommended.

COLLEGE ADVISORY COMMITTEES IN AGRICULTURE

REMODELING OF PROPERTY AT 1209 WEST ILLINOIS STREET, URBANA, FOR STAFF HOUSING

(5) On July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 3), on the recommendation of the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures, the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of the property at 1209 West Illinois Street, Urbana, at a cost of \$16,340. Previously (Minutes, February 21, 1948, page 973) the adjoining vacant property at 1205-1207 West Illinois Street was purchased at a cost of \$5,950. An assignment of \$6,000 was made to convert it into a parking lot. The property at 1209 has on it an old, two-story house in rather poor condition. It was contemplated that this house would be razed and the two areas used for parking, in which case a larger appropriation will be required.

Further investigation shows that the house can be remodeled into four modest but satisfactory apartments for family use. In view of the continued need for additional housing for University staff members, the Provost recommends an estimated expenditure of \$12,000. It may be several years before the land is required for a major University building and during that time at least a part of this investment can be recovered. In the meantime, four additional family units will be added.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recom-

mend that the contract for the general work on this property be awarded to Lewis S. Colbert under the standing contract with him for minor remodeling, on a cost plus basis previously approved by the Board, at an estimated cost of \$6,000 for the general work.

I concur in this proposal and recommend an appropriation of \$12,000 for this remodeling.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this project was approved and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Davis, Mr. Livingston.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF BARRIER AT
CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION**

(6) When the University of Illinois took over the Navy Pier, there were no stanchions or chains around the east end of the Pier separating the recreational area and the promenade. This area is used heavily during the day and is also used at night whenever dances or other events are held in the auditorium. The installation of a barrier is desirable as a safety improvement and is also required under the terms of our agreement with the City of Chicago as a restoration item. The United States Navy, former lessee of the Pier, removed the barrier and the University in leasing the space assumed the obligation of replacement.

Bids have been received for this installation, and the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract to the lowest bidder, the Pulaski Iron Works, Chicago, in the amount of \$3,223.25.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant renewal and replacement budget.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as recommended.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF VENTILATING
SYSTEM IN ILLINI UNION BOOKSTORE**

(7) The bookstore area in the Arcade Building was increased in 1947 by the closing of the central corridor to provide office space. This has been a material improvement in the bookstore operation, but since these are interior rooms there is a problem of ventilation. A similar problem exists in the book storage rooms in the basement during the summer months.

Bids have been received for the installation of a ventilating system for these areas.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the lowest bidder, Schroeder's Heating and Ventilating, Champaign, on the basis of their bid of \$4,970.

Funds are available from Bookstore operations for this improvement.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as requested.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REPLACEMENT OF SIDEWALKS AT
CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES**

(8) Bids have been received for the replacement of sidewalks and curbs on the east side of Wood Street between Polk Street and the alley north of Taylor Street and also on the south side of Polk Street from Wood Street to the alley west of Hermitage Avenue.

The walks and curbs in these locations are in very bad condition and are hazardous. New sidewalks are contemplated regardless of how the area is finally developed architecturally, and the replacement at this time would definitely improve the appearance of the Wood Street frontage, as well as reduce hazards.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the lowest bidder, Concrete Craftsmen, Inc., Chicago, in the amount of \$4,850. Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget for this improvement.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as requested.

CONTRACT FOR ELECTRIC CRANE IN NEW CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(9) Bids have been received for an electric crane to be furnished and installed in the new Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an award of contract to the Abell-Howe Company, Chicago, on the basis of their lowest bid of \$5,505. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as requested.

**INCREASE IN CONTRACT FOR PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT
ADDITION IN CHICAGO**

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with the E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company of Chicago, for the general work in connection with the construction of the Physical Environment Addition in the amount of \$6,681, to provide for the installation of pressure chambers. The design for the pressure chamber installation was not completed when the contract was awarded.

Funds are available for this addition in the appropriation for this project.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this change in the general contract for the Physical Environment Addition.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this change in contract was authorized as recommended.

PATENT ON SYNTHESIS OF SPARTEINE

(11) Dr. Nelson J. Leonard, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, and one of his students, Mr. Roger E. Beyler, have discovered a method for synthesis of the drug sparteine which is believed to be patentable. This is the first total synthesis of sparteine developed and the drug has some practical value. In the judgment of the experts in the Department of Chemistry, this discovery is of substantial value but is not of the type which the University itself should develop. The Dean of the Graduate College and the University Research Board therefore recommend that Doctor Leonard's discovery of a method for the synthesis of sparteine be released to him as an agent of the University of Illinois Foundation.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this release was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASES

(12) There are submitted recommendations for purchases for approval by the Board (see Appendix, page 232) and a report of purchases authorized by the President of the University (see Appendix, page 235).

On motion of Mr. Davis, purchases were authorized as requested, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

PURCHASE OF DENTAL EQUIPMENT

(13) The Dean of the College of Dentistry and the Director of Purchases recommend the purchase of fourteen clinical adult dental chairs from the Ritter Company, Inc., Rochester, New York, at a total price of \$6,510. This will require a special appropriation.

This purchase is part of a program, to extend over a period of time, for the replacement of chairs and other dental equipment, which will be presented to the Board of Trustees for consideration later. There are approximately 115 dental chairs for the use of students and staff members. Ninety of them should be replaced. Most of these are more than thirty years old (the latest purchase was in 1914) and the condition of the chairs is such that they are not worth the expense of extensive repairs necessary to put them in first-class condition. In the meantime, it has been found that effective January 1, 1949, there will be a 10 per cent increase in price. The Ritter Company has fourteen chairs of the type

used by the University available for delivery, and the purchase of this group of chairs immediately will result in a saving of approximately \$600.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this purchase was authorized, and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Davis, Mr. Livingston.

ASSIGNMENTS OF FUNDS BY BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(14) The Board of Directors of the University of Illinois Athletic Association has made the following appropriations from reserve funds of the Association. Since these represent major adjustments in the budget of the Association, approval of the Board is required and I so recommend.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these adjustments were approved, and the President of the University was authorized to approve a revision of certain salaries of the staff of the Athletic Association, effective March 1, 1949.

CONTRACT WITH WARNER CONSTRUCTION COMPANY FOR WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(15) On July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 13), the Board of Trustees by resolution declared that the Warner Construction Company is in default under the terms of its contract for the construction of the Women's Residence Hall and declined to extend the time for completion of this contract. A large number of items relating to financial settlement under the contract are still unadjusted. Many of these are relatively minor in character and some represent substantial amounts. There also is the question of damages to the University as a result of the delay in completion.

The Contractor has indicated his desire to continue the work to the completion of the Halls, but in order to protect his banking arrangements he wishes assurance that there will be no withholding of payments accruing under the contract and on which the University raises no question. It is desirable to set up machinery by which the settlement of such items is expedited. Counsel for the

Contractor and the University Legal Counsel have submitted the attached stipulation to which the Board of Trustees is requested to agree.

I recommend that the stipulation be approved subject to the following conditions:

1. That William E. Britton, in acting for the University in the settlement of individual items, proceed in accordance with the advice of the University Architect and the Comptroller (the latter acting as auditor on cost contracts).
2. That items not in excess of \$1,000 may be settled and paid, the total of such payments to be reported to the Board.
3. That items in excess of \$1,000 are to be reported to the Board for approval before payment in accordance with the usual procedure.
4. That no agreement shall be concluded with respect to any settlement for damages arising from the delay in completing the contract except with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the Board was authorized to appoint a special committee¹ to review this matter in conference with the President of the University and with the aid of the Comptroller, the Legal Counsel, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and others, and make a recommendation to the Board.

ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON STAFF HOUSING

(16) The University's Staff Housing Committee recommends that Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, Architects for the Student and Staff Apartments being constructed at Green and Goodwin, Urbana, be employed on a limited basis for further studies of rental staff housing.

Such a study would yield information needed by University officials in deciding how any funds appropriated for housing for the biennium of 1949-1951 can be used effectively. This study will include working in conjunction with the Community Planner to recommend locations, estimates of costs of land acquisition and site developments, economic analysis and recommendation of types of construction, development of income and expense budgets. The estimated cost of this service is \$3,600.

The Staff Housing Committee considered various possibilities of making such a study and concluded that the work can be done with the least delay and expense to the University and on the broadest possible basis by a qualified firm of architects. In the judgment of the Committee an independent survey will also be valuable.

I recommend that the Executive Committee authorize employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill for this work and that an assignment of \$3,600 be made from the General Reserve Fund to cover the cost thereof.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this recommendation was approved, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Davis, Mr. Livingston.

The Executive Committee adjourned.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board in executive session considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

STAFF HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

(1) There is in Urbana-Champaign, and probably will continue to be for some time to come, a serious shortage of residences, especially for rent. New houses have been built recently, and more are under construction, privately financed. Most of these are priced at \$15,000 and upward. There are practically no houses being built for rental purposes. The University could use perhaps 300 houses for rent to staff members, present and prospective. Many families are inadequately housed or must pay rents beyond their means. This is especially true of those in the intermediate ranks.

This situation presents to the Small Homes Council an extraordinary opportunity to apply certain principles of construction and other ideas it has developed through research on a small scale to a housing project under realistic conditions. The proposed project will require the services of architects who are specialists in designing modular houses which can be constructed at a reduced unit cost by using mass production techniques; of a site planner; and of builders expert in such types of residence construction who have the organization, personnel, and other resources to build houses rapidly. Speed is essential. As conceived, the project would be completed and the houses ready for occupancy by September 1, 1949.

Accordingly, I recommend:

(1) Authorization by the Board of Trustees of a staff housing research project for the construction, under the research supervision of the Small Homes Council, of about thirty single-family dwellings in Urbana-Champaign for rental to members of the staff, with provision for study and report.

(2) An appropriation of not to exceed \$325,000, to be supplemented by a loan on a self-liquidating basis, to cover the costs involved in the improvement of land, architectural services, building contracts, supervision and collection of research data required by the project, at a total estimated cost of \$412,000.

(3) Authorization to employ Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, Architects, of Chicago, at a fee of \$16,000 for the following services: consultants to the Small Homes Council and the Physical Plant Department on design and construction, complete architectural services on preparation of working drawings, specifications, design and working drawings for site plan, utilities, grading, and supervision of construction.

(4) Utilization of an area of approximately ten acres of land in an eighty-acre tract now owned by the University at the southwest corner of Race Street and Florida Avenue, Urbana.

On request of President Stoddard, Professor Scheick commented on this matter.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and recommendation to the Executive Committee, and the Executive Committee was authorized to take action on the recommendation of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.¹

PURCHASE OF LAND FOR COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE

(2) The University has been asked if it would be interested in acquiring a part or all of a half section (320 acres) of land immediately south of and adjoining the horticultural farm along the Race Street road. Additional land is needed by the Agricultural Experiment Station for research in problems of production and in veterinary medicine. This particular land is ideally located to serve both needs. This land has been appraised at \$600 an acre by real estate experts employed by the University. The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends the purchase of the land at this price.

I concur and request that the Board authorize the offer of an option for the purchase of this land at \$600 an acre.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, with power to authorize the purchase of an option at a cost (for the option) of not to exceed one thousand dollars.¹

HOUSING AT CHICAGO MEDICAL CENTER

(3) Mr. Newton C. Farr reported progress on financing two residential buildings for students and apartments for staff members in the Medical Center in Chicago.

Dr. Ivy and Mr. Farr commented on this matter.

SALE OF LAND FOR SITE OF Y.M.C.A.

(4) Mr. Farr recommends the sale to the Y.M.C.A. of two parcels of land on West Polk Street in Chicago, at the prices attached: 1935-1937 West Polk, 6250 square feet, \$3,125; 1949-1953 West Polk, 9031¼ square feet, \$9,031.25.

Dr. Ivy recommended that this sale be made, subject to the approval of the Committee on Chicago Departments.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this matter was referred to the Committee on Chicago Departments for consideration and recommendation to the Executive Committee, and the Executive Committee was authorized to complete the sale, subject to stipulations previously approved by the Board, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Stevenson.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(5) The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees on December 9, approved the following recommendations received from the President's Office:

1. Award of a contract for the installation of a fuel oil distribution system in the Drill Field housing area to Gallaher and Speck, Inc., Chicago, in the amount of \$39,045.

On July 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 20), the Board of Trustees authorized the employment of the firm of Neiler, Rich, and Bladen, Chicago, for the purpose of making studies of the engineering phase of a centralized system for distributing oil to the Drill Field housing project.

The plan which this firm submitted eliminates the necessity of servicing the fifty-gallon ordinary oil drums, which are on racks in front of each building and used for fuel storage. The proposed system provides for four buried tank stations which will be connected with the buildings and to the individual heaters by means of a buried copper pipe and controlled by automatic device.

Seven firms were invited to bid, but only two bids were received for the installation of this system as follows:

Carson-Payson Company, Danville.....	\$43 952

The bids provided that if more than three inches of frost are encountered, the cost will be increased on a sliding scale up to \$1.10 a foot.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended, the President's Office concurring therein, the award of a contract to the lower bidder, Gallaher and Speck, Inc. Funds were available for this installation from the income of the project. It is estimated that the installation will provide an annual saving of \$30,000 in labor costs.

2. Award of a contract for installation of steam lines in the Nurses Home at the Chicago Professional Colleges to Fettes, Love, and Sieben, Chicago, in the amount of \$1,747.

The following bids were received on the installation of a 3" high-pressure steam line and a 1½" return line in the basement of the Nurses Home at the

Chicago Professional Colleges. This installation is needed to provide a dark room and a laboratory to be used in connection with the Medical Betatron.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended, the President's Office concurring therein, the award of the contract to Fettes, Love, and Sieben in the amount of \$1,747. Funds were available.

This report was received for record.

ESTATE OF MRS. THOMAS ARKLE CLARK

(6) The will of the late Mrs. Alice V. B. Clark, widow of the late Dean Thomas Arkle Clark, includes the following bequest to the University:

"*Item 18:* All of the rest, residue and remainder of my property and estate I give and bequeath to the Trustees of the University of Illinois. Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) of said residue is to be held in trust and the interest accruing thereon is to be used by said Trustees for the maintenance of the equipment and the library of the Thomas Arkle Clark Recreation Room of the William B. McKinley Memorial Hospital. The remainder of said sum shall be held by said Trustees of the loan fund to be loaned in sums not exceeding Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) in any one year to any one student and to be loaned at Five Per Cent to undergraduate students only, preferably to juniors and seniors, upon their own notes, and under such other conditions and regulations as said Trustees may prescribe. The interest accruing on these loans shall be used for the equipment and maintenance of the William B. McKinley Memorial Hospital."

The personal property will inventory about \$80,000 and real estate about \$50,000. Specific bequests total \$68,000, which, plus costs of administration and claims, will come near to exhausting the \$80,000 of personal property, so that the University's interest is approximately the value of the real estate.

It appears that during her lifetime Mrs. Clark had promised to give the University Y.M.C.A. \$8,000 when convenient. Six payments, totaling \$2,600, were made on this pledge between June 28, 1938, and July 2, 1941. Subsequently Mrs. Clark became ill and Mr. Chancy L. Finfrock, Urbana, her attorney, was appointed Conservator for her. He took the position that as long as she was ill, it was not feasible to make any more gift payments. The Y.M.C.A. has asked the Estate to pay the balance of \$5,400 due on this pledge. Mr. Finfrock, who is also attorney for Mrs. Clark's Estate, believes there is no binding contract and that it was merely a promise to make a pledge which the Executor of the Estate is not authorized to pay. If payment is made, the \$5,400 will in effect come from the residuary estate in which the University is the beneficiary.

The claim is on file in probate proceedings. The attorney for the Estate has asked for instructions from the Board of Trustees as to whether the claim should be paid or contested.

It is clear (1) that the Court will decide the validity of the Y.M.C.A.'s claim, regardless of any action by the University, (2) that the Y.M.C.A. believes it has a just claim, (3) that, apart from this sum of \$5,400, there will be a substantial contribution to the loan funds of the University.

I recommend, therefore, that the University refrain from contesting any payment of this claim by the Executor of the Estate, should he decide to make such payment.

No action was taken on this matter.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE PRACTICES

(7) On September 23, 1948, the Board received from the President an insurance report prepared by a temporary advisory committee, Dr. Leslie A. Bryan, chairman, to the Comptroller and the President, recommending certain principles and procedures relating to insurance. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee for study and report and the Committee reports as follows:

A. The Finance Committee recommends the following principles in determining which University risks are to be covered by insurance:

- I. Fire and extended coverage insurance is not recommended on University buildings or contents except:
 1. Where required by contract to which the University is a party.
 2. Where express or implied trusts are involved which place an obligation upon the University to carry insurance as a legal requirement of good trusteeship.
 3. Where the rental charge or other income is set on the basis of current rates and normally includes the cost of insurance.
 4. Where funds are provided voluntarily from outside sources to be used in the payment of insurance premiums.
 - II. Casualty insurance coverage is not recommended on University risks except:
 1. Where required by contract to which the University is a party.
 2. Where it is expedient to protect University employee interests.
 3. Where it is expedient to have competent inspection service for the prevention of accidents.
 - III. Burglary, robbery, and theft insurance coverage is not recommended on University risks except:
 1. Where it is expedient to protect the University against loss in the handling of all cash and securities.
 2. Where the rental charge or other income is set on the basis of current rates and normally includes the cost of insurance.
 - IV. Bond coverage is not recommended on University risks except:
 1. Where required by law.
 2. Where it is expedient to protect the University against fidelity loss in the handling of property.
 - V. Insurance is recommended for the hospital and medical service program for students under the special fee required of them and available to staff members.
- (The foregoing recommendations are as proposed by the Advisory Committee except that the Advisory Committee recommended against insurance of hospital and medical service. The Finance Committee does not concur in that recommendation.)
- VI. Coinsurance is recommended:
 1. Where a loan agreement or contract requires coverage to at least 80 per cent of the value of the property (fire and extended coverage).
 2. Where it is required by insurance contract in order to obtain the coverage desired.
 3. Where insurance is carried on income producing properties insured to at least 80 per cent of their value.
 4. The amount of coinsurance shall be determined as follows:
 - a. The requirements of a given contract.
 - b. Otherwise, 80 per cent shall be considered as standard.
 5. The insurable values of University property insured subject to coinsurance shall be determined and maintained as follows:
 - a. Valuation on buildings shall be determined and maintained by the Architectural Department of the Physical Plant except in those instances where the Physical Plant and the Business Office may feel outside valuations necessary.
 - b. Valuation of contents shall be determined by outside appraisals. The frequency or need for any upkeep service of such appraisals shall be left to the discretion of the Business Office.
 - B. The foregoing recommendations include (No. II-2) insurance in excess of the legal liability of the University (\$2,500 in each instance) for bodily injury and property damage in connection with automotive and aircraft equipment and protection of the operators of such equipment. This practice is followed by other departments of the State and we think that public policy dictates the continuation of this policy. The Finance Committee further concurs in the recommendation of the Vice-President of the Professional Colleges and the Dean of the College of Medicine that malpractice insurance be carried on the full-time staff engaged in the direct treatment and care of patients. This

also goes beyond the extent of the legal liability of the University but we believe should be provided.

- C. The Finance Committee recommends (as recommended by the Advisory Committee) that the following principles be followed in the procurement of insurance on risks which are to be covered by insurance:

I. All insurance on University risks shall be placed only with companies having at least an A policyholders' rating and AA financial rating by Best's most recent manual.

1. In determining the amount of insurance to be allocated to any one company, consideration shall be given to the amount of insurance to be placed in comparison with the financial rating of the company.

2. All liability policies shall contain a legal immunity endorsement prohibiting the insurance company from taking advantage of any legal immunity to which the University as a public institution might be entitled.

3. The policies placed with mutual companies shall be of the nonassessable type.

II. Fire and extended coverage on University risks shall be placed with stock and mutual companies at a ratio, as near as practicable, of 75-25 per cent respectively, except that individual risks which are under \$50,000 may be placed completely with either stock or mutual companies.

III. Competitive bids on all insurance shall be invited wherever practicable. Awards shall be made on the basis of the lowest gross bid. In the case of identically low bids, drawing by lots shall determine the placing of the coverage.

IV. One renewal of coverage with an agent, broker, or company shall be permissible except when it would be advantageous to procure new bids and, if resulting in lower rates or premiums, the coverage shall be placed with the low bidder and, in case the bids are identical, the insurance may be placed with the present agent, broker, or company unless better service can be secured from some other source.

- D. If the foregoing recommendations of the Committee are approved, previous actions of the Board concerning insurance on the University's property will thereby be repealed:

I. On October 5, 1926, the Board of Trustees authorized the Comptroller to renew insurance on nonfireproof buildings and contents in Chicago which expired during that year and to increase or decrease the insurance to keep it on an 80 per cent basis on valuation of buildings and contents.

II. The Board of Trustees on April 27, 1935, informally referred to the policy of the University in this respect to carry insurance on buildings and structures which were distinctly nonfireproof.

III. On June 15, 1935, the Board recommended that fire insurance be taken out on certain named buildings, including the old Medical Building, Dental Building, and Pharmacy Building, all located in Chicago; also farm buildings on the Carter-Pennell Farms, both north and south.

IV. On July 26, 1935, the Board recommended that insurance be placed on the Chemistry Building and contents because of the extra-hazardous condition of the building, subject to 80 per cent coinsurance. The Board further recommended that insurance be placed on the glass in all greenhouses of the University.

V. On February 20, 1943, the Board recommended that as all insurance policies expire, renewals for fire and extended coverage shall be made in suitable stock and mutual companies at a general ratio of 75-25 per cent; with not more than 25 per cent mutual on any one risk except that steam boiler insurance may be carried in full in mutual companies. (Replaced by No. II-2.)

REVISIONS IN BIENNIAL OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1949-1951

(8) The biennial operating budget for 1949-1951, approved by the Board of Trustees on October 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 138), totaling \$72,271,742, was submitted to the Department of Finance prior to November 1, 1948, as required by law.

At the request of the Illinois Budgetary Commission, University officials appeared before the Commission at a hearing held in Springfield on December 15, 1948, to discuss the budget. The Commission did not consider the building program for 1949-1951 as it was at that time studying only operating budgets. President John R. Fornof, Mrs. Doris S. Holt, Messrs. Park Livingston, Kenney E. Williamson, Walter W. McLaughlin, Frank H. McKelvey, and Vernon L. Nickell of the Board of Trustees also attended the hearing. The budgetary needs of the University were presented by the President of the Board, the President of the University, and the Vice-President in Charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges.

On December 31, 1948, the Chairman of the Commission, Senator Everett R. Peters, informed the President of the University that the Commission would recommend to the Governor an appropriation to the University from the General Revenue Fund of \$54,271,742, instead of \$56,271,742 requested, plus an appropriation of \$16,000,000 from the University Income Fund, or a total of \$70,271,742 instead of \$72,271,742 requested by the University. This is a decrease of \$2,000,000 in the biennial budget approved by the Board of Trustees on October 21, 1948, but is a net increase of \$10,187,924 over the total operating appropriation for 1947-1949.

It would be undesirable to make any reduction in the increase requested for salaries and wages. No decrease can be made in the allocation to the University Retirement System or in the item of increase necessary to continue the present internal budget to the next biennium due to the fact that the 1948-1949 budget exceeds one-half of the biennial appropriation for 1947-1949. No decrease should be made in the amount requested for expense and equipment (recurring). This leaves only the increases for staff additions (\$2,362,142), and for nonrecurring equipment (\$803,572) as feasible areas for adjustments to conform with the recommendation of the Budgetary Commission.

I submit two schedules showing how these adjustments may be accomplished:

- I. Analysis of Increases by Purpose and Location. Original increases requested and proposed revisions.
- II. Budget Estimate for Operation 1949-1951 Biennium. Comparative budgets for 1947-1949, and for 1949-1951 as revised, classified according to expenditures and sources of funds in the standard form required by the Department of Finance.

I recommend that the item of nonrecurring equipment be omitted and that the increase requested for staff additions be reduced from \$2,362,142 to \$1,196,428. I further recommend that the Board reconsider its action of October 21, 1948, and approve a total budget of \$70,271,742 based on these adjustments.

The Comptroller and the Provost commented on the changes.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the action of October 21, 1948 (Minutes, pages 138-42), was rescinded, and funds were reallocated as shown in schedule II following, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Stevenson.

ELECTRONIC DIGITAL COMPUTER PROJECT

(9) On January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 954), the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of an electronic digital computer (EDVAC) at an estimated cost of \$150,000 from the Reeves Instrument Company, Inc., New York, and funds were made available for this purpose.

This is highly specialized equipment and the machines are constructed on a limited basis so that each one is practically a custom job. It has been determined that the Reeves Company can not supply the University with a machine meeting specifications in a reasonable length of time and is willing to terminate the contract. The alternative is for the University to construct the machine under the supervision of its own experts. There is also a very good possibility that the United States Army will contract with the University for the construction of a computer by the University for the Ordnance Department, all costs of the same to be paid by the Government. The negotiations are now under way and if successful a proposed contract will be presented to the Board at a later date. The construction of two machines concurrently should result in saving to the University.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees reconsider its action of January 8, 1948, and authorize (1) the construction of the electronic digital computer by the University; (2) the use of the funds previously assigned (\$75,000 from General Reserve, \$75,000 from Graduate College Research, total \$150,000) for salaries, wages, equipment, building remodeling, and contingencies as the detailed needs of the computer construction program may require; and (3) negotiation of a contract with the Ordnance Department, United States Army, for the construction of a computer for the Army, said contract to be subject to approval by the Board.

The purpose of the curriculum is to train recreation leaders, youth leaders, and similar workers for employment in public, industrial, and other types of recreation programs requiring trained leadership. There are several hundred people employed in this work in Illinois, most of whom are not professionally trained. In recent years there has been a demand for trained personnel.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDING AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(4) The Governor has authorized the following release of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois by the 65th General Assembly under Senate Bill 662, "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent, and distributive expenses of State government," which includes appropriations to the University for buildings and other capital improvements as follows:

"For Contingencies to cover expenditures for purposes for which the amount appropriated in any item above enumerated is or becomes insufficient\$618 845"

the sum of \$85,000 (the eighth release from this item), to augment Release No. 5 in the amount of \$2,000,000 for the "construction of student residence halls," which amount was insufficient to complete this project.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these funds were appropriated for the "construction of student residence halls," by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Stevenson.

LAPSING OF BALANCES IN APPROPRIATIONS FOR MINOR REMODELING AND PLANT EXTENSIONS

(5) At present there are approximately one hundred and twenty special Board of Trustee appropriations on the records for minor remodeling and plant extensions.

Since this is the last year of the biennium, it is important that careful control be maintained of these appropriations so that balances not needed for specific purposes will lapse into the General University Reserve and be available for additional appropriation. Since these appropriations are for remodeling, in which the amount of work to be done can not always be exactly determined until after work has been started, the appropriations based on original estimates in some instances are inadequate and in the others more than necessary.

The Comptroller requests authority, in lapsing of appropriations from general University funds for minor remodeling and plant extensions, to apply such lapses to deficits in appropriations of a similar character.

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given the Comptroller as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR REPLACEMENT OF NEWTON SOIL EXPERIMENT FIELD BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

(6) The barn at the Newton Soil Experiment Field and all equipment and materials stored in it were destroyed by fire of unknown origin during the night of December 3. The building, constructed in 1942 (to replace one that had been destroyed by lightning), was considered reasonably fireproof. It was built with glazed tile block walls, hardwood bracing and rafters; the sheathing was sycamore, the roof was shingle, and the floor was of concrete consisting of one-half inch of finishing cement over a five-inch base. The fire destroyed much of the cement surface and there appears to be little salvage in the tiles. Machinery and supplies (including seed) were either damaged beyond repair or consumed, with the possible exception of a roller and tractor plow, and the wagon scale which was outside of the building.

The building cost \$1,978.02; the equipment, \$4,483.95; total cost, \$6,461.97.

The replacement of the building will undoubtedly cost twice as much as the original cost in 1942. Hence the loss is approximately \$8,500.

I recommend that an appropriation of \$8,500 be made from the General Reserve Fund to replace the building and equipment lost in this fire.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Forno, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Stevenson.

PATENT ON N,N-DIMETHYLACETAMIDE AS A SOLVENT FOR POLYACRYLONITRILE

(7) Professor C. S. Marvel reports the discovery by himself and Assistant Professor Robert L. Frank of a compound "N,N-dimethylacetamide" as a solvent for polyacrylonitrile.

Ordinarily the discovery of a solvent is of little significance but in the present instance it may be of some value because polyacrylonitrile can be spun into fibers from solution. One of the chemical industries is setting up a plant for doing that. They have many solvents at their disposal, some of which are superior to N,N-dimethylacetamide, but even so the possession of a patent on the latter may be worth while although it is not important enough to warrant appreciable expense on the part of the University.

The Chairman of the University Research Board after consultation with experts in the Department of Chemistry recommends that this discovery be released to Professor Marvel as agent of the University of Illinois Foundation.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this release was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASES

(8) There are submitted recommendations for purchases for approval by the Board (see Appendix, page 233).

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these purchases were authorized as recommended.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(9) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed for the period from October 11, 1948, to December 10, 1948 (see Appendix, page 235).

This report was received for record.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

At this point, the Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. FRED PATRICK BARNES, Assistant Professor in the College of Education, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,200.

2. ROBERT FERBER, Research Assistant Professor in the Bureau of Economic and Business Research, for the period from December 1, 1948, to August 31, 1949, at an annual salary rate of \$6,110.

3. ALFRED M. FREUDENTHAL, Research Professor in the Department of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$10,000, on indefinite tenure.

4. JAMES FREDERIC HALSEY, Research Assistant Professor of Fluid Mechanics in the Department of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,000. (Two-year appointment.)

5. FRANCO MODIGLIANI, Research Associate Professor in the Bureau of Economic and Business Research, from November 15, 1948, to August 31, 1949, at an annual salary rate of \$9,500.

6. ROBERT ELDON PINGRY, Assistant Professor in the College of Education, beginning February 1, 1949, at an annual salary rate of \$4,000.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the action of the President of the University in making these appointments was confirmed.

REPORT OF AUDIT OF UNIVERSITY ACCOUNTS

(10) The Secretary of the Board reports that he has received from George Rossetter and Company, auditors of the University, the report of their examination of the accounts of the University for the year ended June 30, 1948. Copies of the report have been sent to President Stoddard and all the members of the Board of Trustees. The report includes a certification of the balance sheet, a statement of current income and expenditures and current funds surplus, and a summary of changes in the balances of other funds.

This report was received for record.

(11) The Finance Committee reports the following transactions involving securities:

APPOINTMENT OF UNIVERSITY AUDITORS

(12) The Finance Committee recommends that the firm of George Rossetter and Company, Certified Public Accountants, Chicago, be retained as auditors for the year ending June 30, 1949, and that their services be charged on the basis of a per diem rate and expenses, with the understanding that the aggregate charge will not exceed the following sums:

These maximum costs are based on the assumption that if the auditors go beyond the scope of usual examination, further compensation for such additional work will be allowed after review and approval by the Finance Committee.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the employment of George Rossetter and Company was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON THE MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(13) On February 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 1002), the Board of Trustees approved an addition to the contract for general work on the Mechanical Engineering Building to provide more classrooms in the basement of the building. At that time it was decided to defer action on the installation of asphalt tile in this area until funds would be available for such an improvement.

Funds are now available and the Mechanical Engineering Department recommends that asphalt tile be laid in the basement to finish these rooms in the same manner as other rooms in the building.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with James McHugh Sons, Incorporated, contractors for the general work on this building, in the amount of \$3,594.91 to provide for the furnishing and installation of the asphalt tile.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR REMODELING OF DAVID KINLEY HALL

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,800 in the general contract with E. N. DeAtley for the remodeling of David Kinley Hall for additional work on the ground floor room and in the elevator shaft in the attic to provide additional classroom space. Funds are available for this increase.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO PLUMBING CONTRACT FOR STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$6,949 in the contract with E. M. Hays, Champaign, for the plumbing work in the construction of the student and staff apartments, Urbana, to provide for the installation of a fire protection system. Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR REMODELING PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES AT CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(16) On November 19, 1948 (Minutes, page 174), the Board of Trustees approved an appropriation of \$35,000 for remodeling at Navy Pier to provide additional physical educational facilities.

Bids have been received on the construction work needed on the Auditorium in connection with this project. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract to E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$12,833.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR BUILDING ALTERATIONS IN THE RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(17) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has made a recommendation for an appropriation of \$110,000 for building improvements requested by the College of Medicine in the Department of Physical Medicine.

The work will consist of remodeling in the general hospital building and the Illinois Surgical Institute building, and the construction of an enclosed passageway in which certain offices will be located between the two buildings.

If the Board approves the appropriation, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract in the amount of \$86,675 to E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was awarded as recommended.

WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS REVENUE BONDS

At this point, Mr. Williamson presented the following report and recommendations of the Finance Committee, with a resolution providing for the issue of "\$800,000 Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949," and for the sale of the bonds to Shields and Company, and Eastman, Dillon, and Company, on their joint bid.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE ON WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS REVENUE BOND ISSUE

Bids were received on January 11, 1949, for \$800,000 revenue bonds of the new Women's Residence Halls. The proceeds from the sale of these bonds, together with the appropriation of \$2,600,000 by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois will provide the total sum of \$3,400,000 for the cost of constructing and equipping the new Women's Residence Halls.

Five bids were received representing fifteen companies. The lowest bid is offered by Shields and Company and Eastman, Dillon, and Company as a joint bid with an effective interest rate of 2.71815 per cent for all bonds. Bonds maturing through 1952 will bear interest at 4 per cent; bonds maturing from 1953 through 1961 will bear interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent; and bonds maturing from 1962 through 1973 will bear interest at the rate of $2\frac{3}{4}$ per cent.

The bidders have proposed that the bonds, principal, and interest be payable at the Northern Trust Company, Chicago.

The Comptroller reports that the lowest bidders have met all requirements and recommends that the award be made to them.

In connection with this issue of bonds, the firm of Chapman and Cutler have prepared a resolution authorizing the issuance of Women's Residence Halls revenue bonds in the amount of \$800,000.

The Finance Committee concurs in the foregoing recommendation and recommends the adoption of this resolution.

Mr. Williamson moved that the resolution be adopted and that the award be made as recommended.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS REVENUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$800,000

RESOLUTION authorizing and providing for the issue of \$800,000 Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949 for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of constructing new women's residence halls located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, Urbana, Illinois, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of the said new women's residence halls, for the purpose of paying the cost of the maintenance and operation thereof, and payment of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds.

WHEREAS pursuant to "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, equip, complete, operate, control and manage student residence halls, staff housing facilities, dormitories, health and physical education buildings, or other revenue producing building or buildings, defining the duties of such Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charge fees or rates for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds." Approved June 30, 1945. L. 1945, p. 1753; title as amended by Act approved July 21, 1947, this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is authorized to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing, equipping or completing the construction and equipment of student residence halls payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof; and

WHEREAS the Sixty Fourth and the Sixty Fifth General Assembly of the State of Illinois appropriated the sum of \$2,600,000 applicable to the construction of new women's residence halls and responsive to said appropriations this Board of Trustees has heretofore acquired the property located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, Urbana, Illinois, and described as follows:

"Bounded on the east by Lincoln Avenue in Urbana, Illinois and extending west therefrom to a line running north and south three hundred and twenty six (326) feet five (5) inches from the back of the west curb of said Lincoln Avenue and bounded on the north and south by lines parallel to, and two hundred and sixty (260) feet from, a line midway between the center lines of Ohio Street and Iowa Street, Urbana, Illinois and at an angle of ninety (90)

degrees to said Lincoln Avenue, the same being a part of the North Half ($N\frac{1}{2}$) of the South East Quarter ($SE\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Nineteen (19) North of Range Nine (9) East of the Third (3rd) Principal Meridian" and contracts have been let for the construction and equipment of said residence halls for women students of said University, and based upon the contracts heretofore let this Board of Trustees has heretofore estimated and does hereby estimate that the cost of the construction of the new women's residence halls upon said above described property located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, complete with all equipment, will aggregate the sum of \$3,400,000; and

WHEREAS in addition to said appropriations made by the Sixty Fourth and Sixty Fifth General Assembly of the State of Illinois it will be necessary for this Board of Trustees to raise the sum of \$800,000 to complete the construction thereof and fully equip said women's residence halls; and

WHEREAS in order to produce the additional \$800,000 necessary for the completion and equipment of said women's residence halls located on the property hereinabove described at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue in the City of Urbana, Illinois, it will be necessary that this Board of Trustees borrow money and issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$800,000 as authorized pursuant to the Act hereinabove referred to:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1. That it be and it is hereby determined by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, that it is necessary and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that it borrow the sum of \$800,000 to complete the construction of and to fully equip the new women's residence halls located on the property described in the preambles of this resolution at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, and in evidence thereof issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$800,000.

SECTION 2. That said bonds shall be designated "Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949," be numbered 1 to 800, inclusive, be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, be dated February 15, 1949, bonds numbered 1 to 70, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of four per cent (4%) per annum, bonds numbered 71 to 334, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent ($2\frac{1}{2}\%$) per annum, and bonds numbered 335 to 800, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and three fourths per cent ($2\frac{3}{4}\%$) per annum, interest payable October 1, 1949, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year, and to become due as follows:

provided, however, said bonds shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity on any interest payment date at the option of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on or after April 1, 1952, and up to and including October 1, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1954, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1958, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall, with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois; and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

SECTION 3. Any of said bonds may be registered as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University to be kept in the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said Depositary as registrar. After such registration no transfer of such bonds shall be valid unless made on the said books by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney and similarly noted on such bonds. Upon presentation of any of such bonds registered as to principal, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, executed by the registered owner, or by a duly authorized attorney, such bond shall be transferred upon such books. The registered owner of any such bond registered as to principal shall also have the right to cause the same to be discharged from registration by transfer to bearer, in which case transferability by delivery shall be restored, and thereafter the principal of such bond when due shall be payable to the person presenting such bond. Any such bond registered as payable to

bearer may be registered again in the name of the owner with the same effect as the first registration thereof. Successive registrations and transfers as aforesaid may be made from time to time as desired. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

Said bonds shall be signed by the President and two members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, sealed with the corporate seal of said University, attested by the Secretary of said Board, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signatures of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

SECTION 4. That said bonds and coupons, and form for registration, shall be in substantially the following form:

This bond and the series of which it forms a part is issued under authority of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois, entitled "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, equip, complete, operate, control and manage student residence halls, staff housing facilities, dormitories, health and physical education buildings, or other revenue producing building or buildings, defining the duties of such Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charge fees or rates for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds." Approved June 30, 1945. L. 1945, p. 1753; title as amended by Act approved July 21, 1947, as amended, and all other Laws supplementary thereto, and a resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of constructing new women's residence halls, located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue in the City of Urbana, Illinois, and is payable solely from the net revenue to be derived from the operation of said building, and not otherwise, and this bond and the series of which it forms a part do not constitute an indebtedness of said University or of the State of Illinois within any constitutional or statutory limitation, and neither the taxing power nor the general credit of said University or the State of Illinois is pledged to the payment of this bond or the interest thereon.

Under said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and other Laws supplementary thereto and the said resolution adopted pursuant thereto, the net revenue derived from the operation of said building shall be deposited with The Northern Trust Company, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, under a Deposit Agreement entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of

Illinois and the said Bank, and used only for the purpose of paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of and interest on the bonds of said University that are issued under authority of said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and the resolution of the Board of Trustees, hereinabove referred to, and which are payable by their terms only from the net revenue of said women's residence halls located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, in the City of Urbana, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Illinois, and the applicable resolutions of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, have been done and have happened and have been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law and that provision has been made for depositing the net revenue derived from the operation of said buildings with the said The Northern Trust Company, to be applied in the manner as hereinabove set forth.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$800,000, all of like date and of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 800, inclusive, and said bonds are subject to redemption as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 1, 1952, and up to and including October 1, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1954, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1958, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to date of redemption; such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption, interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond shall pass by delivery unless it is registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University kept at the office of the Depositary hereinabove mentioned, such registration to be noted on the back hereof. After such registration no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on such books by the registered holder in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing and similarly noted hereon, but this bond may be transferred in like manner to bearer, and thereupon transferability by delivery shall be restored and it may again from time to time be registered or transferred to bearer as before. Such registration, however, shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons hereto appertaining, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

This bond and all other bonds of this issue shall have all of the qualities of negotiable instruments, and during such time as this bond is payable to bearer, the same and each of the coupons hereto appertaining may be negotiated by delivery by any person having possession thereof, howsoever such possession may have been acquired, and any holder who shall have taken this bond while so payable to bearer or any of said coupons from any person for value and without notice shall thereby acquire absolute title to this bond or to such coupons as the case may be, free of any defenses enforceable against any prior holder and free from all equities and claims of ownership of any such prior holder, and the said University and any paying agent may deem and treat the bearer of this bond, or, if registered, the person in whose name it is registered and the bearer of any interest coupons appertaining hereto as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes.

Said University of Illinois hereby covenants with the holder of this bond that it will keep and perform all the covenants and agreements in the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of said University of Illinois, authorizing the issue of this bond and the series of which it forms a part and as provided in the Deposit Agreement hereinabove referred to, and hereby irrevocably obligates itself to deposit the net revenue derived from the operation of said women's residence halls with the said Depositary, to administer the said net revenue as

provided for in and by said Deposit Agreement, and to establish from time to time charges and fees for the use of said buildings and to maintain and collect charges and fees sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing of said buildings, and pay the principal of and interest upon all revenue bonds which by their terms are payable from such revenues until all of such bonds have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, said University of Illinois, by its Board of Trustees, has caused this bond to be signed by the President of the Board of Trustees and two members thereof, its corporate seal to be hereto affixed, attested by the Secretary of said Board, and the coupons hereto attached to be authenticated by the facsimile signatures of the President and Secretary of said Board of Trustees, and this bond to be dated the fifteenth day of February, 1949.

SECTION 5. That upon the issuance of any revenue bonds herein provided for there be and there is hereby established a fiscal year for the operation of said Women's Residence Halls located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, in the City of Urbana, Illinois and said fiscal year shall commence the first day of July of each year and end the last day of the next succeeding June and all revenues derived from the operation thereof shall be set aside as collected in a separate account and fund and apart from any other funds of said University, and said

University covenants that all the revenues, income, receipts, profits, rates, rents, charges, fees and returns derived from the said women's residence halls and the operation thereof, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing said women's residence halls, shall be paid over to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned semi-annually not later than the dates as hereinafter specified in the said deposit agreement prior to April 1 and October 1 of each year, and said revenues so paid over to the Depositary shall be used only in paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of and interest upon the revenue bonds of said University that are payable by their terms only from such revenues, and such funds shall be used only for the purposes and in accordance with the Deposit Agreement hereinafter set out.

SECTION 6. That for the purpose of further securing the income and revenue to be derived from the operation of the said women's residence halls and the application of the net revenue to the payment of the principal of and interest upon the said bonds hereby authorized, the net revenue derived from the operation of the said women's residence halls shall be deposited with The Northern Trust Company, hereby designated as the Depositary for the said net revenue, and the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees and Treasurer of said University be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the University a Deposit Agreement with said bank as Depositary in substantially the following form, to wit:

THIS DEPOSIT AGREEMENT dated February 15, 1949, between the University of Illinois, a public corporate body duly organized and existing under the laws of and located in the State of Illinois (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "University"), party of the first part, and The Northern Trust Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois and having its office in the City of Chicago, in the State of Illinois (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Depositary"), party of the second part,

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS the University, pursuant to a resolution of its Board of Trustees, entitled

"RESOLUTION authorizing and providing for the issue of \$800,000 Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949 for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of constructing new women's residence halls located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, Urbana, Illinois, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of the said new women's residence halls, for the purpose of paying the cost of the maintenance and operation thereof, and payment of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds,"

adopted by said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on the 13th day of January, 1949, has issued or is about to issue Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000) principal amount of its Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949 for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of constructing new women's residence halls on the following described property:

"Bounded on the east by Lincoln Avenue in Urbana, Illinois and extending west therefrom to a line running north and south three hundred and twenty six (326) feet five (5) inches from the back of the west curb of said Lincoln Avenue and bounded on the north and south by lines parallel to, and two hundred and sixty (260) feet from, a line midway between the center lines of Ohio Street and Iowa Street, Urbana, Illinois and at an angle of ninety (90) degrees to said Lincoln Avenue, the same being a part of the North Half (N½) of the South East Quarter (SE¼) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Nineteen (19) North of Range Nine (9) East of the Third (3rd) Principal Meridian" located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue in the City of Urbana, Illinois, said bonds being dated February 15, 1949, and maturing as follows:

Bonds numbered 1 to 70, inclusive, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent (4%) per annum, bonds numbered 71 to 334, inclusive, bearing interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent (2½%) per annum and bonds numbered 335 to 800, inclusive, bearing interest at the rate of two and three fourths per cent (2¾%) per annum, interest payable October 1, 1949, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year, said bonds being redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 1, 1952 and up to and including October 1, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1954, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1958, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois; and

WHEREAS the said bonds are payable both as to principal and interest and premium, if any, solely from the net revenues to be derived from the operation of

the said women's residence halls, the term "net revenues" as used herein meaning the gross revenues of the said building, less the reasonable cost of operating, insuring, maintaining and repairing the said women's residence halls; and

WHEREAS the University has, in and by the said resolution, covenanted and agreed, for the benefit of the holders from time to time of the said bonds and the interest coupons thereto appertaining, that the net revenues of the said women's residence halls will be from time to time deposited with the Depositary and used only for the payment of the fees and expenses of the Depositary, principal of, premium, if any, and the interest on the said bonds; and

WHEREAS the University has, in and by the said resolution, further covenanted and agreed that it would execute and deliver a Deposit Agreement in the form and terms hereof:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth and pursuant to the terms and provisions of the said resolution, the University and the Depositary have agreed and do hereby agree as follows for the equal and proportionate benefit and security of the holders of the said bonds of the University and the interest coupons thereto appertaining; that is to say:

SECTION 1. The University covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said women's residence halls, and that it will furnish to the Depositary, on or before October 1, 1949, for that period from February 15, 1949, to June 30, 1949, and on or before October 1 in each year thereafter so long as any bonds remain outstanding, a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses and the net revenues of the said women's residence halls for the twelve months' period ended on the next preceding June 30. The Depositary shall have no duty to request any such information nor any duty relative to the statements from time to time furnished by the University, except to preserve the same for the inspection of the holders of the bonds during usual business hours.

SECTION 2. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds hereinabove referred to that all of the revenues, income, receipts, profits, charges, fees, rents and returns derived from the said women's residence halls and the operation thereof shall be collected by the University and, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing the said women's residence halls, shall be paid over to the Depositary semi-annually not later than July 31, for the previous six months' period ending June 30 each year, and January 31, for the previous six months' period ending December 31 of each year; provided, however, there shall be deposited on September 15, 1949, the net revenues for the period from February 15, 1949, to June 30, 1949, which amount shall not be less than interest requirements due on said bonds October 1, 1949, plus Depositary's fees, and the University hereby covenants and agrees so to do. All funds received by the Depositary under the terms of this agreement, after deducting fees and expenses of such Depositary, shall be held by the Depositary in a special trust account to be known as the sinking fund and shall be disbursed or applied by the Depositary as hereinafter provided.

At least five (5) days before each semi-annual interest payment date the Depositary shall, if the sinking fund moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose, set aside an amount equal to the interest becoming due on the next ensuing interest payment date on all of the said bonds then outstanding, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of such interest, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of such interest on the next ensuing interest payment date upon surrender of the interest coupons becoming due on the said interest date and appertaining to the outstanding bonds.

At least five (5) days before the express date of maturity of the bonds, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund, if such moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose after making provision for payment of the interest becoming due on the outstanding bonds on such maturity date, an amount equal to the principal of the bonds then maturing, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of the principal

of the said maturing bonds, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of the principal of the said bonds upon surrender of the said bonds.

If, upon the fortieth (40th) day before any interest payment date, the Depositary has cash in the sinking fund after setting aside an amount sufficient to pay interest becoming due on all outstanding bonds on the next two ensuing interest payment dates and to pay the principal and premium, if any, of any bonds theretofore called for redemption and not yet redeemed and the principal of all bonds becoming due on the next two ensuing principal payment dates, such cash shall be applied by the Depositary to the redemption on the next ensuing interest payment date of outstanding bonds, which by their terms are redeemable, in an amount sufficient to exhaust as nearly as may be such cash, after deducting therefrom and paying all costs and expenses of such redemption.

The said bonds are each in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and are numbered from 1 to 800, inclusive. All bonds redeemed through the operation of the sinking fund, together with the appertaining interest coupons, shall be cancelled by the Depositary and delivered to the Treasurer of the University. The Depositary shall keep a record of the numbers of all bonds so redeemed.

Notice of redemption through the operation of the sinking fund shall be published by the Depositary, either in the name of the University or in the name of the Depositary, as the Depositary may determine, once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois. Such notice shall with substantial accuracy:

(a) Designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois;

(b) If the bonds to be redeemed are less than all of those outstanding, designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and

(c) State that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of the principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of the bonds so called for redemption will cease.

Upon publication of notice of redemption of any bonds through the operation of the sinking fund, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund an amount sufficient to pay and redeem the said bonds, and such funds be and are hereby appropriated irrevocably for that purpose, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply such funds to the payment and redemption of the said bonds on or after the specified redemption date upon surrender of the said bonds, together with all unmatured interest coupons thereto appertaining.

SECTION 3. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds, hereinabove referred to, that it will, so long as any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, keep in the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois, books for the registration and transfer as to principal of bonds of the said issue, and the said Depositary is hereby appointed the agent of the University, with the title of Registrar, for the purpose of registering and transferring the said bonds as to principal only.

As to each bond registered, as to principal only, the person or entity in whose name the same is for the time being registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, except for the purpose of receiving payment of the outstanding coupons, if any, appertaining thereto, and so long as the same shall be so registered payment of or on account of the principal thereof shall be made by the Depositary, as paying agent, only to the registered owner thereof. The bearer of any of the said bonds which shall not be registered as to principal and the bearer of any coupon appertaining to any such bond, whether or not such bonds shall be registered as to principal, shall for all purposes be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner of such bond or coupon as the case may be for the purpose of receiving payment thereof and for all other purposes, and the Depositary, as paying agent, shall be fully protected in making payment of any such bond or coupon to the bearer thereof.

SECTION 4. The Depositary has executed this agreement and agrees to carry out the terms and provisions hereof on its part, but only upon and subject to the following express terms and conditions:

(a) The Depositary shall not be responsible for any recitals herein or in the said bonds or for the validity of this agreement or of the said bonds, nor for the performance of any of the agreements herein contained on the part of the University.

(b) The Depositary shall not be accountable for any of the proceeds of the bonds or of the revenues of the said women's residence halls nor for any other funds of the University, except such funds as may be deposited hereunder. The Depositary shall not be required to allow interest on any funds at any time deposited hereunder. The Depositary may become the owner of bonds of the said issue with the same rights which it would have if not Depositary.

(c) The Depositary shall not be liable for any action taken or omitted to be taken by it in good faith and in the exercise of reasonable care and believed by it to be within the discretion or power conferred upon it by this agreement, nor shall the Depositary be responsible for the consequences of any error of judgment, and the Depositary shall not be answerable except for its own acts, neglect and default, nor for any loss unless the same shall happen through the negligence or want of good faith of the Depositary.

(d) The Depositary shall be entitled to advice of counsel concerning all matters arising under this agreement and its duties hereunder, and may in all cases pay such reasonable compensation as it shall deem proper to such counsel and all such outlays and expenditures shall be repaid to the Depositary out of the sinking fund money.

(e) The Depositary shall not be required to give any bond or surety in respect of the exercise of the duties and powers conferred hereby or otherwise in respect of the premises.

(f) The Depositary shall have a first lien hereunder upon the sinking fund moneys for reasonable compensation, expenses, advances and counsel fees incurred in and about the exercise and performance of its powers and duties hereunder, and the cost and expense of defending against any liability in the premises of any character whatsoever. The compensation of the Depositary shall not be limited to or by any provision of law in regard to the compensation of a trustee of an express trust.

(g) The Depositary at the time acting hereunder may at any time resign by giving not less than sixty (60) days' written notice to the University specifying the date when such resignation takes effect.

SECTION 5. The University covenants that in case the Depositary at the time acting hereunder shall resign or be dissolved or shall be in the course of dissolution or liquidation or otherwise become incapable of acting hereunder, the University will forthwith appoint a successor Depositary which shall be a trust company or bank in good standing located in the State of Illinois and having a capital and surplus of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000), if there be such a trust company or bank willing, qualified and able to accept the appointment upon reasonable or customary terms.

Every successor Depositary appointed hereunder shall execute, acknowledge and deliver to its predecessor and also to the University an instrument in writing accepting such appointment hereunder, and thereupon such successor Depositary, without any further act, deed or conveyance, shall become fully vested with all of the estates, rights, powers, duties and obligations of its predecessor, and every predecessor Depositary shall deliver all moneys and securities, together with a record of the amount and the numbers of the outstanding bonds, to its successor; provided, however, that before such delivery is required or made, all fees, advances, and expenses of the retiring Depositary shall be paid in full.

Any corporation into which the Depositary or any successor to it may be merged or converted or with which it or any successor to it may be consolidated, or any corporation resulting from any merger, conversion or consolidation to which the Depositary, or any successor to it shall be a party, shall be the successor Depositary under this agreement without the execution or filing of any paper on the part of either of the parties hereto.

SECTION 6. Nothing in this agreement expressed or implied is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person, firm or corporation, other than the parties hereto and the holders of the said bonds and the coupons thereto appertaining, any right, remedy or claim, legal or equitable, under or by reason of this agreement or any covenant, condition or stipulation hereof.

SECTION 7. Said University hereby covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said women's residence halls, and that it will furnish to the Depositary and to the original purchasers of said bonds on or before October 1 in each year so long as any bonds remain outstanding a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses, and the net revenues of said women's residence halls for the twelve months' period ending on the next preceding June 30.

SECTION 8. The University covenants that while any of the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding it will establish charges and fees for the use of said women's residence halls and all of the facilities thereof adjusted so as to provide revenues at all times sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, insuring and repairing the said women's residence halls, to pay the interest from time to time becoming due on the said bonds from time to time outstanding, and to provide for the payment of the principal of such bonds at maturity.

SECTION 9. It is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any revenue bonds issued hereunder are outstanding no additional revenue bonds shall be issued which, by their terms, are payable from the revenues of said women's residence halls located at 1005 South Lincoln Avenue, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, unless and until all revenue bonds issued pursuant to the terms of this resolution have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest, or until provision shall have been made for such payment in full.

SECTION 10. Said University of Illinois hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, or any of them, that it will punctually perform all duties with reference to said women's residence halls required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Illinois, including the making and collecting of sufficient charges and fees for the use of said properties and all of the facilities thereof, and segregating the revenue thereof and the application of the income and revenue thereof, as provided by this resolution; and it hereby covenants and agrees not to sell, lease, loan, mortgage or in any manner dispose of said women's residence halls, including any and all extensions and improvements that may be made thereto, until all of the bonds herein authorized to

be issued shall have been paid in full, both principal and interest, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment thereof in full, and the said University further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously operate said women's residence halls and maintain and keep in full force and effect at all times adequate insurance for the protection of said properties, including multi-risk insurance, covering loss or damage to said properties and use and occupancy insurance covering loss of use of said properties. The cost of maintaining all insurance shall be deemed to be an operating charge and shall be paid only from revenues.

Any proceeds derived by said University from any multi-risk insurance shall be applied to the payment of the said University's reasonable and necessary costs in reconstruction, repair or rehabilitation of the said properties and any proceeds derived from any use and occupancy insurance shall be applied in the same manner and to the same effect as gross operating revenues.

SECTION 11. The provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between the University of Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after issuance of the bonds no changes, additions, alterations or amendments of any kind shall be made to this resolution in any manner, until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder, and interest thereon, shall be paid in full, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment of all bonds hereby authorized and interest thereon in full.

SECTION 12. Any holder of a bond or bonds, or any of the coupons of any bond or bonds issued under the provisions of this resolution, may either in law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceeding, enforce or compel the performance of all duties required by this resolution or the acts under which the bonds hereby authorized are issued, including the fixing, maintaining and collecting of such charges and fees for the use of such properties and all facilities thereof as will be sufficient for all the purposes provided by this resolution, and the application of income and revenue therefrom.

SECTION 13. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.

SECTION 14. That Trustees CHESTER R. DAVIS and KARL A. MEYER be and they are hereby designated and directed to execute the said Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949 hereby authorized, together with the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and the said President, Secretary and Treasurer of this Board of Trustees, be and they are each of them hereby authorized and directed to execute all instruments, papers, documents and agreements necessary or convenient to accomplish the issue and delivery of the said Women's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1949 to the purchaser thereof.

SECTION 15. That said revenue bonds shall be executed as soon after this resolution becomes effective as may be, be deposited with the Treasurer of said University, and be by him delivered to Shields & Company and Eastman, Dillon & Company, the purchasers thereof, upon receipt of the purchase price, the contract for the sale thereof heretofore entered into be and the same is hereby in all respects ratified and approved. Any accrued interest or premium derived from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in the sinking fund hereinabove provided and applied toward payment of interest or principal of said bonds as thereby required.

SECTION 16. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

JANUARY 18, 1949

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the President's House, in Urbana, on Tuesday, January 18, 1949, at 3 p.m. Present: Mr. Fornof and Mr. Livingston, members of the Committee, Mr. McKelvey and Mr. McLaughlin, members of the Board, President Stoddard, and the following University officials: Provost Griffith, Dean Rusk, Dean Bowen, Mr. Janata, Director Havens, Professor Scheick, Comptroller Morey, and Secretary Cunningham.

REPORT OF MEETING OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS, JANUARY 18, 1949

The Secretary presented the following report of a meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds met at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, January 18, 1949, in the Illini Union Building, in Urbana. Present: Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin; also Mr. Fornof, President Stoddard, and the University officials listed above as attending the meeting of the Executive Committee.

Purchase of Land for College of Agriculture

The Committee considered the recommendation for the purchase of 320 acres of land south of the horticultural tract (see above, page 196).

Mr. Morey, Dean Rusk, and President Stoddard commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the Committee voted to recommend the purchase of this land at \$600 an acre, and authorized the necessary down payment to make the transaction legal. The Committee saw no objection to making the purchase through the University of Illinois Foundation on terms mutually agreeable.

Staff Housing Research Project

The Committee considered also the Staff Housing Research Project (see above, page 196).

President Stoddard, Professor Scheick, and Mr. Morey commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the Committee voted to recommend to the

Executive Committee that the recommendations of President Stoddard be approved, as amended to provide for an amortization period of about fifteen years and for the employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill to assist the Small Homes Council on a cost-plus fixed-fee basis with a guaranteed maximum of \$16,000.

STAFF HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

On recommendation of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, the recommendations of President Stoddard for the establishment of a staff housing research project (page 196 above) as amended (page 226 above) was approved and authorized, and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Davis.¹

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Executive Committee acted on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

INSTITUTE OF AVIATION

(1) Director Leslie A. Bryan of the Institute of Aeronautics recommends that the name of the Institute be changed to "Institute of Aviation." This will give the Institute a name which is more widely used and understood by the general public. It will also help eliminate the confusion of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering (a Department in the College of Engineering), with the Institute. Dean M. L. Enger of the College of Engineering and Professor H. S. Stillwell, Head of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering, concur.

I recommend approval.

This change of name was approved as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ASPHALT TILE FLOOR IN ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING AND PHYSICS RESEARCH LABORATORY BUILDINGS

(2) Bids have been received on installation of asphalt tile floor surfacing in portions of the Electrical Engineering Building and the Physics Research Laboratory. Provision of this type of floor surfacing was deferred until it was certain that funds would be available to cover the cost of such installation. Funds are now available and bids have been taken on such floor surfacing throughout the Electrical Engineering Building, except where already provided, and in the offices and public areas only of the Physics Research Laboratory. In the Electrical Engineering Building, the original contract included the provision of this surfacing only in the large machine laboratory, the department office, and the corridors.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract in the amount of \$11,299 (\$10,327 for the Electrical Engineering Building and \$972 for the Physics Research Laboratory) to the lowest bidder, the Roofing and Insulation Supply Company, Champaign-Urbana.

I concur and request that authority be given to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the contract.

This authority was given as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR TEMPORARY HOUSING SANITARY SEWER

(3) Bids have been received for the construction of a sanitary sewer to serve the temporary housing areas on the west side of the campus, to relieve the present overloaded sewers from the Stadium and the Men's Residence Hall, and to serve other future University buildings in this area. Funds are available.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recom-

mend the award of a contract to the lowest bidder, Mancini and Ventrella, Chicago, on the basis of a lump sum bid of \$89,351.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

This authority was given as recommended.

**ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON
STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS**

(4) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,637 in the contract for the general work in connection with the construction of the student and staff apartments. This increase is to provide for the substitution of terrazzo stair treads and landings in place of cement.

Funds are available for this addition.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above addition to this contract.

This addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASES

(5) There are submitted recommendations for purchases for approval by the Board (see Appendix, page 234).

These purchases were authorized as recommended.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

NEW FIRE STATION

(1) The building appropriation requests for 1949-1951 include \$250,000 for a new fire station. The State Fire Marshal has offered to secure a supplementary appropriation of \$450,000 from the fire prevention fund in the State Treasury to provide additional facilities in this building, particularly an auditorium with seating capacity of 800 to be used for meetings of organizations interested in fire protection, schools of instruction, equipment displays, and quarters for representatives of the State Fire Marshal.

The University is asked to assume:

1. Cost of preparing plans, specifications, and supervision of construction.
2. Cost of land required.
3. Complete operation and maintenance costs for the structure and the grounds.
4. Salaries of fire fighting personnel and cost of truck operation.
5. Responsibility for the assignment of space on the first floor of the building with the privilege of making use of the auditorium and basement area for University functions, provided there are no conflicts with events scheduled by the State Fire Marshal's Office or the Illinois Firemen's Association.

The State Fire Marshal's Office and the Illinois Firemen's Association agree to assume:

1. Salaries and equipment for their office personnel.
2. Salary and equipment for a Deputy Fire Marshal, if and when appointed.
3. Cost of exhibits and demonstration equipment for training and fire fighting demonstration work.
4. Expense of special arrangements for meetings sponsored by the State Fire Marshal's Office or the Illinois Firemen's Association.
5. Additions or alterations to the structure or equipment required by the State Fire Marshal's Office and/or the Illinois Firemen's Association.

The University would provide additional funds of approximately \$6,000 a year for operation and maintenance, but not before 1951. In return the University would have the use of an additional large lecture room when it is not required for the purposes specified.

In recommending an appropriation for strictly University facilities, the Building Program Committee agreed in principle with the plan of joint development. The Chairman of the Committee, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller have reviewed the proposal submitted by the State Fire Marshal and recommend its approval. He has requested that no publicity be given to the proposal until it is further developed with State authorities.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this plan was approved.

GIFT OF MR. AND MRS. MERLE J. TREES

(2) The Executive Committee of the Board on December 28, 1948 (Minutes, page 190), accepted an offer from Mr. and Mrs. Merle J. Trees of one-half interest in their Rembrandt "Portrait of Amsterdam Burgher" as their gift to the "Emily Nichols Trees (Class of 1905) and Merle Jay Trees (Class of 1907) Collection" for 1948.

Mr. and Mrs. Trees have decided to offer the University the remaining one-half interest in this painting as their 1949 contribution to the Trees Collection. As further evidence of this offer they have sent the Secretary of the Board a formal deed of gift in which each contributes the remaining undivided one-fourth interest in the painting. This painting is appraised at \$65,000 by the Art Institute of Chicago.

I recommend the acceptance of this offer and that the Secretary of the Board be requested to convey to Mr. and Mrs. Trees a formal expression of appreciation on behalf of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this gift was accepted with great appreciation of the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Trees.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS LEGISLATION TO BE REQUESTED OF THE 66TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

(3) I request that the President of the University be authorized to secure the introduction in the 66th General Assembly of the following University legislation. These measures have been discussed with the Senator and the three Representatives of the 24th Senatorial District who have agreed to sponsor or to secure sponsorship of the bills:

1. Biennial operating budget for 1949-1951.
2. Appropriations for buildings and other capital improvements.
3. Amendment of insurance code to make University of Illinois revenue bonds legal investments for insurance companies in Illinois. Obligations of the University of Illinois Foundation are legal investments for insurance companies but the direct obligations of the University are not. This amendment would improve the market for University revenue bonds.
4. Amendment of State Finance Act to permit the University to handle, through its own treasury, funds of all *self-supporting activities*, instead of requiring the deposit in and disbursement from the State Treasury. The present arrangement complicates budget operations and makes it difficult to handle business operations of such activities with dispatch, thus causing loss of discounts and creating dissatisfaction among employees in payment of wages. The change has been discussed with representatives of the Department of Finance and the State Auditor's Office and has their tentative approval.

5. Authorization to pay real estate taxes on certain University properties or to make payments to municipalities in lieu of taxes.

6. Amendment of Civil Service Act to eliminate wartime provisions relating to certification.

7. Change in name of the "Research and Educational Hospitals" to "University of Illinois Hospitals."

8. Transfer of the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute from the Department of Public Welfare to the University. At present the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute is operated jointly by the University and the Department of Public Welfare. A single administration is desirable.

9. Transfer of title to Institution for Tuberculosis Research in Chicago to the University of Illinois.

President Stoddard and Mr. Morey commented on these proposals.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as requested.

PURCHASE OF FARM LAND

(4) I recommend that in accordance with the recommendation of Dean Rusk, referred by the Board on January 13, 1949, to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to purchase an option (Minutes, page 196), approved by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Executive Committee on January 18, 1949 (Minutes, page 226), the purchase of 320 acres of land at a price not to exceed \$600 an acre be authorized.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this purchase was authorized as recommended, and the President and the Legal Counsel were authorized to deal directly with the owners and their counsel to secure an option after March 7, 1949, and an appropriation of not to exceed \$100,000 from this year's funds was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

REPORTS OF ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the Secretary was instructed to notify the members of the Board promptly of all actions of the Executive Committee on matters specially referred to the Executive Committee by the Board.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. LAWRENCE IVAN O'KELLY, Professor of Psychology, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,000.

2. DETLEV WALTHER SCHUMANN, Professor of German, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.

3. LEONARD MARTIN ZUBKO, Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering, beginning February 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,600.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these appointments were confirmed.

OPEN SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered, in open session, the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF ENTOMOLOGY

(1) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Professor William Patrick Hayes, now Acting Head of the Department of Entomology, as Head of the Department on indefinite tenure effective as of February 1, 1949, at an annual salary rate of \$7,500.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR HAROLD L. WALKER AS ACTING DIRECTOR OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF MINES AND MINERALS

(2) At the request of the Governor, I have authorized Professor Harold L. Walker, Head of the Department of Mining and Metallurgical Engineering, to accept appointment as Acting Director of the State Department of Mines and Minerals.

Professor Walker desires to retain his present University position, carrying on his new duties concurrently with the State assignment and without change in salary. This I have approved. I request confirmation of my action.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this action was confirmed as requested.

APPOINTMENTS TO PROFESSIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE DIVISION OF SERVICES FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

(3) The Board of Trustees has authorized the appointment of a Professional Advisory Committee of the Division of Services for Crippled Children to work with the Superintendent of the Division in providing necessary contacts between it and the University. The present committee was appointed for two years from December 1, 1946. The Vice-President in charge of the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy submits the following nominations for reappointments and new appointments to this Committee for two years from December 1, 1948. I concur in these appointments.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these appointments were made as recommended.

PROGRESSIVE ADMISSIONS PLAN

(4) On recommendation of the Director of Admissions and Records and with the concurrence of the Provost, I recommend the following changes in the policy governing admissions to the University effective at the beginning of the Summer Session of 1949:

1. That the progressive admissions plan be rescinded. It is generally agreed that the plan has worked well. It is no longer needed, because we expect to be able to admit all students, resident in Illinois, who qualify under the former system. Illinois residents will be admitted who fulfill the standard entrance requirements—graduation from an accredited secondary school with fifteen units of acceptable secondary school work.

2. That with respect to applicants who are not residents of the State of Illinois: (a) the admission of new freshmen be confined to students who rank in the upper 50 per cent of their high-school graduating classes; and (b) the admission of transfer students be confined to those who average not less than 3.5 in their college work in terms of the marking system of the University of Illinois.

3. That transfer students who are residents of Illinois who have a scholastic average of less than 3.0 be admitted only on special action of the dean of the college to which the student seeks admission.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these changes in policy were approved as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(5) In accordance with the terms of the Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees, the Director of Nonacademic Personnel certifies to the Retirement System most nonacademic employees as of the date of employment. This practice is costly in time and effort, since employee turnover occurs chiefly within the first six months of employment, the normal probationary period.

It is agreed by all officials concerned that the practice should be changed to provide for certification at the end of the six months probationary period. This calls for the following changes in the Policy and Rules (language to be deleted in brackets and new language in italics):

SECTION I—6. [A permanent and continuous employee is (a) one employed in a position or in work which the University contemplates continuing for the next six months, or is (b) a person who has completed six months of service.] *A permanent and continuous employee is an employee who has completed six months' service in any classification or classifications in nonacademic employment.* For this purpose a month of service shall be no less than twenty work days, excluding approved absences. A person employed regularly but on a part-time basis and fulfilling the above conditions will be considered a permanent and continuous employee.

SECTION III—1-A. Permanent and continuous employees *and those employed in positions or in work which the University contemplates continuing for at least six months, but who have not yet completed six months' service in any classification or classifications of nonacademic employment,* in prevailing rate groups paid at hourly rates, will be paid a monthly rate determined by multiplying the number of hours of the work year, which shall be uniform in all years, by the hourly rate and dividing by 12, as follows: . . .

SECTION VI—1-Sub-paragraph. Permanent and continuous employees *and those employed in positions or in work which the University contemplates continuing for at least six months, but who have not yet completed six months' service in any classification or classifications of nonacademic employment* not in a prevailing rate group will be excused with full pay.

SECTION VIII—2-A. Each full-time permanent and continuous employee is entitled to a disability leave of two work weeks with pay in each year of service, no part of which shall be cumulative. Each permanent and continuous employee employed regularly but on a part-time basis is entitled to such fraction of two work weeks with pay as is represented by the relationship between this part-time employment and the full-time schedules in his classification. Any permanent and continuous employee, *or any person who is employed in a position or in work which the University contemplates continuing for at least six months, but who has not yet completed six months' service in any classification or classifications of non-academic employment*, who is disabled before completing his first year of service will be allowed the same proportionate amount of the two work weeks' disability leave as the portion of the year completed.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin these changes in policy were approved as recommended.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(6) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

1. Remodeling Room 406 Davenport Hall.....	\$11 010

APPROPRIATION AND CONTRACT FOR EMERGENCY LIGHTING SYSTEM IN THE MCKINLEY HOSPITAL

(7) The Board of Trustees has authorized installation of an emergency lighting system in the McKinley Hospital to provide service to the first floor, including X-ray room, laboratory, and emergency room, and to the surgery quarters on the third floor.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$5,124 for this installation to the Leverenz Electric Company, Danville, the lowest bidder.

I recommend that an appropriation of \$5,124 be made for this improvement and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appropriation was made and authority was given as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

COLD ROOM IN PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT BUILDING AT CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(8) One of the important items required for the new Physical Environment Unit, under construction in Chicago from a State appropriation and supplementary appropriations from the University's General Reserve, is a cold room including

necessary refrigeration, insulation, and accessory equipment to maintain constant temperature. This equipment is not available as a single standard manufactured product. It must be constructed and installed especially and is of a highly specialized type both in design and in performance.

A committee appointed by Vice-President Ivy has selected the Vilter Sales and Construction Company and the Armstrong Cork Company, both of Chicago, as the concerns best fitted to provide the desired equipment and in a position to deliver and complete the work promptly and within the period of availability of the State appropriation. Prices have been secured from these concerns as follows:

Vilter Sales and Construction Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Chicago, for mechanical equipment and installation.....	\$98 140
Armstrong Cork Company, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and Chicago, for insulation.....	28 936

The committee in charge of the work has reviewed the proposals and reports that, based on engineering design and cost of necessary components, the proposed costs are reasonable.

Vice-President Ivy requests that the contracts be awarded as scheduled above. I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these contracts were awarded as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF HYDRAULIC ENGINEERING LABORATORY QUARTERS

(9) Included in the special appropriations for nonrecurring expenditures made by the Board on January 13, 1949 (Minutes, page 204), are funds for the construction of an addition to Warehouse No. 1, near the Sanitary Engineering Laboratory, to provide quarters for research in hydraulic engineering.

Since the work is of a remodeling nature, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that it be done under the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, for work of this nature at an estimated cost of \$12,577.30.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE CHEMISTRY AND CHEMICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,752.14 in the general contract for the construction of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building to provide for (1) terrazzo treads and landings on the stairs in place of cement treads and landings, and (2) asphalt tile floors in stair halls (continuation of asphalt tile floors in corridors).

These are some of the items eliminated from the original specifications in order to keep down the cost of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building. Sufficient funds are now available for these additions. The terrazzo stair treads and the asphalt tile floors in the stair halls will be more satisfactory from the standpoint of maintenance and appearance.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,300 in the general contract for the construction of the Mechanical Engineering Building for the installation of acoustical tile ceilings on the first and second floors in six classroom corridors. Acoustical treatment of

these areas was omitted from the original specifications and deferred until it was certain that funds would be available.

Acoustical treatment of ceilings will reduce the noise from the corridors and it is desirable because some classes will extend through periods when other classes are changing. Funds are now available for this addition.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF ELECTRICAL CONDUIT UNDER AND ACROSS CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF CHICAGO

(12) At the request of the University of Illinois, the City Council of the City of Chicago passed an ordinance on December 22, 1948, granting permission to the University to excavate for, install, and maintain an electrical conduit under and across certain streets in the City of Chicago.

The Legal Counsel recommends that the following resolution be adopted. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute an acceptance form for such an electrical conduit.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Chicago, at its regular meeting on December 22, 1948, passed an Ordinance which grants permission to the University of Illinois to install and maintain electrical conduit under and across certain streets in the City of Chicago, and

Whereas, by the provisions of said Ordinance, a copy of which is hereto attached, the same is required to be accepted by the University of Illinois,

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the permission granted by said Ordinance be and the same is hereby accepted according to the terms of said Ordinance as set forth therein.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this resolution was adopted and authority was given as recommended.

PURCHASE OF PRINTING EQUIPMENT

(13) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 312), the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of a new press to be installed in Gregory Hall for joint use by the Illini Publishing Company, the University Press, and the School of Journalism to replace the press now owned and operated by the Illini Publishing Company in Illini Hall. An appropriation of \$25,000 was made to apply toward the cost of the press, the balance of cost of the press to be paid by the Illini Publishing Company.

On September 26, 1947 (Minutes, page 829), the Board approved a contract with Goss Printing Company for the purchase of the press at a price of \$59,710 with an escalator clause providing for an increase in price prior to delivery. It was agreed that if the readjusted price was not satisfactory the contract could be cancelled by the buyer without penalty.

When the contract was finally concluded in November, 1947, a price of \$61,160 was stipulated. At that time, a payment of \$6,116 was made as the contract provided.

On January 5, 1949, the company served notice that the press would be ready for delivery in March, 1949, and the price would be \$65,575. In the meantime, serious problems have arisen concerning the location of the press, the space originally intended being in an addition to the north side of Gregory Hall. This plan has not proved entirely feasible and no satisfactory permanent location is now available. The Illini Publishing Company, which is required to meet the cost of the press in excess of the \$25,000 appropriation made by the University, has concluded that the option to cancel the contract should be exercised. The company has been notified accordingly and has returned the deposit made on the contract and has accepted the cancellation. The University appropriation is being lapsed into the General Reserve.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this cancellation of contract was confirmed.

APPROPRIATION OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUNDS

(14) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois on January 29, 1949, appropriated \$1,000 from the unappropriated surplus of the Athletic Association for the purpose of conducting a two-day football clinic for high-school coaches in the State of Illinois. This action is submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval.

On motion of General Davis, this appropriation was approved.

PURCHASES

(15) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the purchases listed under A in the Appendix (page 279). The President has authorized emergency purchases listed under B in the Appendix (page 281).

On motion of General Davis, purchases were authorized as recommended under A, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases under B was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS AND LEASES

(16) The Comptroller's report of contracts and leases executed under the general regulations of the Board, from December 11, 1948, also of change orders for cost-plus and other contracts (see page 282).

This report was received for record.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(17) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of December 31, 1948. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

This report was received for record.

ARCHITECTURAL STUDIES OF NEW BUILDINGS

(18) It would be an advantage to start preliminary studies of some of the projects included in the building program for 1949-1951 on which no work has yet been done. I asked the Building Program Committee to advise me on how any funds that can be made available for such work prior to July 1, 1949, can best be used.

The Committee recommends that:

1. An assignment of \$50,000 be made to start preliminary studies of the Biology Building, first unit; Educational Laboratories Building, Psycho-Educational Clinic Division; and Law Building.

2. The firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee of Chicago be employed for these studies on a cost-plus basis subject to these conditions: (a) a maximum fee of not to exceed \$50,000; (b) services may be terminated at any time; and (c) employment is limited to preliminary studies and the University reserves the right to employ other architects for further work on these projects.

Payment for these services will be on the basis of actual salaries plus 1.3 times that amount for indirect costs and commission, plus such direct expenses as blue-printing, telephone calls, and travel. The work will be carried on as directed by the University and only until such time as the University may direct that it be stopped.

The appropriation herein recommended is much less than will be required to complete preliminary plans. A larger amount is not being recommended at this time because \$50,000 will take care of all work which can be done immediately.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the employment of Holabird and Root and Burgee was authorized under the conditions recommended, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACT FOR POWER PLANT GENERATING EQUIPMENT

(19) On June 15, 1948 (Minutes, page 1159), the Board of Trustees appropriated \$49,220 as the partial cost of a new turbogenerator and auxiliary equipment needed to increase the power production capacity of the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana-Champaign. The estimated cost of the required generator, auxiliary equipment, and installation is \$1,215,280 and provision for it is included in the building program for 1949-1951 as approved by the Board on October 21, 1948.

The \$49,220 already appropriated is for engineering work which can be done during the current biennium. As a further means of expediting delivery of the equipment, it was proposed that contracts be entered into, up to a maximum of \$568,500, such contracts giving the University the right of termination if funds for the generating equipment are not appropriated by the General Assembly of Illinois, in which case the University's liability would be limited to the \$49,220 for engineering services.

The Physical Plant Department has secured bids on a 7500 KW turbogenerator, condensing equipment, and a cooling tower. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts to the lowest bidders as follows:

7500 KW turbogenerator, General Electric Company, Chicago, \$282,200,	
subject to a maximum escalation of 10%, or a maximum cost of.....	\$310 420
Bids were taken on a full extraction generator (that is, one from which all the steam may be available for heating), and, as an alternate, on a generator which would provide maximum extraction up to the 7500 KW capacity. The latter has the same generating capacity as the former but requires less floor space and costs less. It is proposed to accept the alternate bid and award the contract on that equipment.	
Condensing equipment, Worthington Pump Company, Chicago, \$48,920	
plus a maximum escalation of 10%, or a maximum cost of.....	53 812
Cooling tower, Marley Company, Inc., Chicago, \$31,363, plus (a) unloading and erection, \$7,663, and (b) a maximum escalation of 15% or a maximum cost of.....	40 176
Total	\$404 408

This cost is within the maximum of \$568,500. Proposals for an electrical switch gear will be considered later.

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts on the basis of the bids indicated herein.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, contracts were authorized as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF PHYSIOLOGY

(20) On September 1, 1943, the Department of Physiology in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences was merged with the Department of Zoology as an administrative convenience pending the appointment of a head of the Department of Physiology. The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends that:

1. Effective September 1, 1949, the Departments of Physiology and Zoology be administered as separate departments of the College.

2. Dr. Robert E. Johnson, now Director of the Medical Nutrition Laboratory of the Army Service Forces in Chicago, be appointed Professor and Head of the Department of Physiology on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$10,000 an academic year.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

BIENNIAL BUDGET FOR THE INSTITUTION FOR TUBERCULOSIS RESEARCH

(21) The 65th General Assembly of the State of Illinois appropriated to the University of Illinois the sum of \$32,000 for the operation and maintenance of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research. The General Assembly provided that the management of the Institution be vested in a five-man board, two members to

be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University, two by the Board of the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium, and the fifth member to be elected by the other four.

The 65th General Assembly also appropriated funds to the Department of Public Health for constructing and equipping a building and funds to the Department of Finance for the purchase of land. The University will request legislation transferring to the University title to the land on which the building is now being erected.

The Vice-President in Charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges has submitted on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research a proposed operating budget for the biennium of 1949-1951, totaling \$143,000, with the request that the Board of Trustees submit this budget to the Department of Finance. This amount is required for:

Heating, lighting, and maintaining the new building....	\$ 61 000
Salaries, wages, supplies, and equipment.....	82 000
<i>Total</i>	<u>\$143 000</u>

The \$32,000 appropriated by the General Assembly for 1947-1949 was for salaries, supplies, and equipment for only an eight- or nine-month period during 1948-1949.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the transmittal of this request to the Department of Finance of the State of Illinois.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this budget was approved as recommended for transmittal to the State Department of Finance.

STATUS OF ACADEMY FOR UNITED STATES AIR FORCE

President Stoddard reported informally on the status of plans for an Academy for the United States Air Force (Minutes, October 21, 1948, page 138) to the effect that no decision has been made looking to the establishment of such an academy.

<p>This is to supplement the service of the University's laundry operated by the Physical Plant Department which because of space limitations is unable to do all of the work required. Fifty-seven commercial laundries in the Chicago area were asked if they would be interested in bidding on such service and 12 replied they would. Subsequently six of these laundries submitted bids on a one-stop service with a central pick-up and delivery and two submitted bids on the basis of collecting and delivering laundry at the various locations required. The multiple pick-up and delivery service will be more efficient and economical than a one-stop pick-up and delivery service which would require the University to collect and distribute the laundry internally. This service is proposed only until June 30 of the current fiscal year with any change in price to be mutually agreeable to both parties before it is put into effect. This supplementary service will enable the University to reduce the volume of work handled by its own laundry to a point of greater efficiency.</p>

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

March 10, 1949



The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Thursday, March 10, 1949, according to the following schedule:

10:00 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

12:30 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Fornof, Mr. Herick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson. General Davis, retiring member, was present during the early part of the meeting.

President Stoddard was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information, and Miss Marietta Stevenson, Director of Social Welfare Administration.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of January 13, 1949, with the minutes of the Executive Committee of December 28, 1948, and January 18, 1949.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the minutes were approved and received for record as printed on pages 189 to 238 above.

MR. KENNEY E. WILLIAMSON ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD
Mr. Livingston nominated Mr. Kenney E. Williamson, of Peoria, for the office of President of the Board for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Williamson as President. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Williamson was declared elected President of the Board.

Mr. Fornof expressed his appreciation of the cooperation of the members of the Board and of the President and executive staff of the University during his term.

President Williamson took the chair and expressed his appreciation of the honor of his election.

MR. HARRISON E. CUNNINGHAM ELECTED SECRETARY

On nomination of Mrs. Holt and on motion of Mr. Livingston, Mr. Harrison E. Cunningham, of Urbana, was elected Secretary of the Board for one year.

PROFESSOR LLOYD MOREY ELECTED COMPTROLLER

On nomination of Mr. Herrick and on motion of Mr. McLaughlin, Professor Lloyd Morey, of Urbana, was elected Comptroller for one year.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTED

Mr. McLaughlin nominated Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick nominated Mr. Livingston, and Mr. Hickman nominated Mr. McLaughlin to serve, with the President of the Board as Chairman, as members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year.

Mr. McLaughlin withdrew in favor of Mr. Livingston.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Fornof and Mr. Livingston as members of the Executive Committee. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Fornof and Mr. Livingston were declared elected.

MR. IRVIN L. PORTER ELECTED TREASURER

On nomination of Mr. McLaughlin and on motion of Mr. Fornof, Mr. Irvin L. Porter, of Chicago, was elected Treasurer for two years, under the same conditions of bond as at present.

TREASURER'S BOND

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the amount of the Treasurer's bond was fixed at \$3,000,000.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the Finance Committee was instructed to see that the Treasurer secure a satisfactory bond, and to report it to the Board for record.

AUTHORITY TO RECEIVE MONEY

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be, and he hereby is, authorized to receive and receipt for all moneys, and to endorse all orders, drafts, and checks due and payable to the Board of Trustees or to the University of Illinois, and especially all drafts drawn by the Treasurer of the United States payable to the Board of Trustees or the University of Illinois.

DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are authorized to delegate the signing of their names as President and Secretary, respectively, to vouchers to be presented to the State Auditor, and to warrants drawn on the Treasurer of the University, under the following conditions.

The President of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to C. H. Pratt, to L. M. Dahlenburg, and to W. D. Green in Urbana, and to H. A. Hazleton, to G. H. Pontious, and to H. O. Albers in Chicago, to W. J. English and to B. W. Benedict in Galesburg, to H. R. Kobes and to Mabel F. Meek in Springfield, authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor; and to C. C. DeLong, to H. F. Thornes, and to R. W. Zimmer in Urbana, and to H. A. Hazleton, to G. H. Pontious, and to H. O. Albers in Chicago, and to W. J. English and to B. W. Benedict in Galesburg, authority to sign his name to warrants on the University Treasurer covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations approved by the Board.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Maude Archdeacon and to Helen L. Smith in Urbana, and to G. R. Moon, to Ethel Englejohn, to Helen Wyle, and to Velma M. Davis in Chicago, and to L. O. Kerwood and Lois Herron in Galesburg, authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor and to warrants on the University Treasurer, covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations of the Board. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Mrs. Freda M. Hicks and to Lean C. Ryan authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees on vouchers against the State Auditor approved in accordance with the regulations of the Board. And be it further

Resolved, that the First National Bank of Chicago as a designated depository of Irvin L. Porter, Treasurer of this corporation, be and it (including its correspondent banks) is hereby requested, authorized, and directed to honor checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money drawn in this corporation's name, including those drawn to the individual order of any person or persons whose name or names appear thereon as signer or signers thereof, when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signatures of the two following: Kenney E. Williamson, President, and H. E. **SERVICES OF CHESTER R. DAVIS, FRANK H. McKELVEY,
 AND DR. MARTIN G. LUKEN**

The Secretary presented the following:

The University of Illinois has been unusually fortunate in the men and women who have served as members of the Board of Trustees. They have given freely of their time and energy, and their clear vision and their wisdom have been an important factor in the development of higher education in the State.

General Chester R. Davis, Dr. Martin G. Luken, and Mr. Frank H. McKelvey have served as Trustees in a critical period in the history of the University, the Nation, and the World. In their term, the number of students in the University has varied from the lowest in twenty-five years to the highest in its history. In this time, the Board has had to provide not only for the education of regular students in all curricula, but also for many in the armed services. The research facilities of the University were made available to the prosecution of the war. A great airport came into being, with State and Federal aid.

With the end of hostilities, the needs of the returning veteran became pre-eminent. Steps were taken to meet the urgent need for housing. The teaching and scientific staffs were enlarged. The administrative organization was improved. Great appropriations were obtained, looking not to the maintenance of affairs as they had been, but to the development of a greater and more vital service to the State.

In all the business of the Board, General Chester R. Davis, Mr. Frank H. McKelvey, and Dr. Martin G. Luken have made a fine contribution. In marking the termination of their service, the Board makes record of its appreciation of their character and their abilities, and extends to them its most cordial good wishes for the future.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this resolution was adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to send copies to General Davis, Dr. Luken, and Mr. McKelvey.

TELEGRAM FROM MR. McKELVEY

The Secretary read the following telegram from Mr. Frank H. McKelvey.

President, Board of Trustees, University of Illinois

Care of H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Blackstone Hotel, Chicago

As I reach the end of my services on this Board, I step aside with regret but with the full appreciation of the opportunities for service that have come my way. Being associated with such a fine group is a stimulating experience and has broadened and enriched my life. It has been my privilege to have been actively interested in our University for nearly 47 years and its progress and welfare will always be important to me. I am convinced that a good administration depends on one thing alone and that is the ability of the administrators. We who have had the

good fortune to work with Dr. Stoddard and his associates know full well that quality has not been sacrificed for quantity. May the best interest of the University always have first place in your deliberations.

REMARKS BY GENERAL DAVIS

General Davis expressed his thanks for the action of the Board, and said that he enjoyed serving as Trustee for nine years more than anything he has ever done, and that he thought no service was more worth while.

General Davis withdrew.

SERVICES OF MR. FORNOF AS PRESIDENT

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the Secretary was instructed to record in the minutes an expression of the appreciation of the Board for the fair, impartial, and effective manner in which Mr. Fornof had performed his duties as President of the Board during the past year.

On request of President Stoddard, and on motion of Mr. Nickell, the Secretary was instructed to include the President of the University and the executive staff as joining in this expression of appreciation.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board in executive session considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

HOUSING FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(1) A report from Dr. Ivy and Mr. Farr on the negotiations to secure a loan to construct staff and student apartments for the Chicago Professional Colleges.

Dr. Ivy, Mr. Farr, President Stoddard, and Mr. Morey commented on this matter. The report was received for record.

PURCHASE OF FARM LAND

(2) A letter dated March 9, 1949, from Dean Rusk on the progress of the negotiations to purchase farm land (Minutes, February 17, 1949, page 242). The holders of the option demand \$675 an acre for the entire tract. Dean Rusk states that three tracts, with a total of 280 acres, now seem to be available at a lower cost. This land would meet the needs of the College of Agriculture better than the Kameron-Webber tract (the McCullough farm). Dean Rusk recommends that these three tracts be purchased at prices not to exceed those mentioned in his letter of March 9.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the President of the University was authorized to withdraw the offer for the Kameron-Webber tract, and to negotiate for the purchase of the tracts now recommended by Dean Rusk and the amount appropriated on February 17, 1949 (\$100,000) was made available for the purchase, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Stevenson.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the President of the University was authorized to employ an agent familiar with dealings in farm land.

MIDWEST INTER-LIBRARY CORPORATION

(3) A report of progress on the Midwest Inter-Library program (Minutes, November 19, 1948, page 171). This project was incorporated, "not for profit," March 5, 1949 (see Appendix, page 304).

The Provost commented on this matter.

This report was received for record.

POWER PLANT FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(4) A report on the negotiations to interest the Commonwealth Edison Company in building the necessary plant to supply steam and electricity for the Chicago Professional Colleges.

Dr. Ivy commented on this matter.

This report was received for record.

SALE OF LAND TO Y.M.C.A.

At this point, Dr. Meyer requested the Secretary to read the following report of the Committee on the Chicago Departments on the sale of land to the Y.M.C.A. (Minutes, January 13, 1949, page 197).

A meeting of the Committee on Chicago Departments of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at 12 o'clock noon on January 20, 1949, at Dr. Karl A. Meyer's apartment, Cook County Hospital, Chicago. Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Chairman, General Chester R. Davis, Mr. Park Livingston were present. Absent, Dr. Martin G. Luken. Also present were Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, and H. A. Hazleton, Business Manager of the Chicago Colleges and Divisions who acted as Clerk.

1. The Committee, after a discussion of the sale of certain parcels of land owned by the University in the Medical Center District to the Chicago Y.M.C.A., on motion of Mr. Livingston, seconded by Mr. Davis, voted to recommend that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved,

A. That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois sell to the Y.M.C.A. of Chicago at a price of not less than \$12,156.25 the following parcels of land subject to stipulations previously adopted by this Board:

1935-37 West Polk Street described as follows: Lots twelve (12) and thirteen (13) in Potter Palmer Subdivision of lot eleven (11) and part of lot twelve (12) lying south of Polk Street in Codwise's Subdivision of the West Half of the south-east quarter of section eighteen (18) township thirty-nine (39) north, range fourteen (14) east of the third principal meridian in Cook County.

1949-53 West Polk Street described as follows: Lots eighteen (18), nineteen (19) and twenty (20) in Potter Palmer's Subdivision of lot eleven (11) and that part of lot twelve (12) lying south of Polk Street (except Winchester Avenue) in Codwise's Subdivision of the West half (W ½) of the southeast quarter (SE ¼) of Section eighteen (18), Township thirty-nine (39) north, range fourteen (14), east of the third principal meridian, except the west 1.37 chains in Cook County, Illinois.

The property at 1949-53 West Polk Street at the corner of Damen Avenue, was purchased November 28, 1939, at a price of \$14,941.70. It contains 9,031.25 square feet and is offered at \$1.00 per square foot, or \$9,031.25. The reason for the difference in price is that the property when originally purchased contained some improvements, including a tavern, which were immediately demolished. The property is now vacant.

The parcel at 1935-37 West Polk was purchased March 19, 1947, at a price of \$2,107.62 and is offered for \$3,125, or \$.50 per square foot.

B. That the sale of the property above described be on the condition that the Y.M.C.A. agree to erect and maintain on the above described land within five (5) years a building, four stories or more in height to provide among other facilities rooms for rental purposes and the further condition that the Y.M.C.A. agree to make available to students of the University of Illinois in Chicago as well as academic and nonacademic staff members employed by the University or affiliates of the University in Chicago an allotment of rooms for rental purposes comparable to the allotment now made in the present Congress Street Y.M.C.A.

2. On motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Livingston, the Committee voted to recommend to the Board of Trustees of the University that the proceeds of the lands sold to the Y.M.C.A. be set aside by the Board of Trustees of the University for the purchase of other land within the Medical Center District.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session, the same members and officers were present as during the morning session; also Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, and Director J. F. Wright.

MISS MARIETTA STEVENSON INTRODUCED

At this point, the President of the Board introduced Miss Marietta Stevenson, Director of Social Welfare Administration, who was present at the invitation of the Board.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. ARTHUR M. MCANALLY, Associate Professor of Library Science, and Assistant Director of the Public Service Departments, in the Library, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6800.
2. HOWARD WILK, Assistant Professor of Hygiene, and Medical Adviser for Men, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5500.
3. GEORGE T. WOODS, Assistant Professor of Veterinary Extension, in the Department of Veterinary Pathology and Hygiene, in the College of Veterinary Medicine, and in the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics, beginning May 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5000.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appointments were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR REPOWERING AND RELIGHTING PHYSICS BUILDING

(4) On November 19, 1948 (Minutes, page 174), the Board of Trustees appropriated funds for the installation of an improved primary service to furnish 208/120 volt electric service to the Physics Laboratory. This is the first phase of a project to repower and relight the building.

Bids have been received for the general work and the electrical work, which will provide for the installation of primary service connection to and including the main secondary circuit breaker in the transformer room and necessary alterations in that room. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract for the general work to Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., Champaign, for \$6,379 and for the electrical work to Square Deal Electric Company, LaPorte, Indiana, for \$12,400, both being the lowest bidders.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

(6) The University Senate recommends that the following requirements for admission to the School of Journalism be established effective September 1, 1949, applicable to students entering the University after that date:

"For admission to the School of Journalism as a candidate for a degree a student must be able to matriculate in one of the undergraduate colleges of the University and must offer in addition, fifty-six semester hours of work in one of the undergraduate curricula, exclusive of required courses in physical education and military science. A candidate who seeks admission from another institution must offer the same amount of work in an established curriculum of that institution. No applicant whose grade point average in all college work is less than 3.5 will be admitted except on approval by the School of an individual petition for admission. An applicant for admission will find it to his advantage to include in his pre-journalism curriculum at least six hours of rhetoric and composition, ten hours of science, which may include mathematics, and twelve hours of social sciences (history, political science, economics, sociology, and psychology)."

The School of Journalism is a senior division; two years of college work are required for admission to the professional curricula. The present requirements for admission include a minimum grade point average of 3.25. The change proposed is to increase this to 3.5 with the provision that exceptions may be authorized on individual petitions.

I concur.

APPROPRIATION OF ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS TO AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION AND EXTENSION SERVICE IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

(7) Additional Federal funds have been allotted to the University for research and extension in Agriculture and Home Economics. The following increases in the budget as approved by the Board of Trustees on June 15, 1948, are recommended by the Dean and Director:

ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES FOR DEPARTMENT OF BIOCHEMISTRY

(9) In a separate recommendation an appropriation is requested for \$10,000 for architectural studies of alterations and equipment installation in the Department of Biochemistry, Chicago. The Physical Plant Department recommends that this work be done by Holabird and Root and Burgee under the standing contract with them for studies of minor improvements in the Chicago Professional Colleges. The charge for that service would be in accordance with the provisions of that contract (Minutes, September 23, 1948, page 89).

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, this recommendation was approved.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR TENNIS COURTS CONSTRUCTION

(10) As a part of the Water Station improvement program, a water reservoir was constructed at the southwest corner of Mathews and Springfield Avenues, thereby eliminating two tennis courts used by the University High School. To replace these, the Director of the Physical Plant Department proposes constructing two tennis courts in the northeast corner of Illinois Field. Representatives of the Athletic Association, the School of Physical Education, and the Building Program Committee have approved this site.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,350 in the general contract with James McHugh Sons, Incorporated, for the construction of the Mechanical Engineering Building to provide for installing a subsoil drainage system through the center area of the building to prevent ground water seepage through the basement floors. It is recommended that this change order be issued on a cost plus basis (actual cost plus 25 per cent of materials cost and 38 per cent of labor) but not to exceed the sum of \$4,350.

Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONCRETE WALKS AND DRIVES AT URBANA

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,470 in the contract with the General Paving Company for construction of a new sidewalk along the north side of Green Street through the campus and the Talbot Laboratory service drive. This increase is to provide for widening Burrill Avenue between Green Street and the bridge over the Boneyard.

The curbs of this street must be repaired due to changes in driveways resulting from the construction of the new Electrical Engineering Building. The widening of Burrill Avenue at this point will be an improvement and will fit in with the future widening of Burrill Avenue from the Boneyard north to Springfield Avenue, will permit the completion of walks and drives on the east side of the new Electrical Engineering Building, and will provide additional parking space for cars.

Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO PIPING CONTRACT FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AT URBANA

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$5,047 in the contract with the W. A. Pope Company, Chicago, for installation of piping in the steam tunnel of the utilities distribution system at Urbana.

The work to be done under this addition consists of:

- (a) Installation of University-owned vacuum pump in Loop Vault No. 9 between Mumford Hall and the Animal Genetics Building;

- (b) Lateral condensate return piping from Mumford Hall, Animal Genetics Building, and Agricultural Engineering Building to new steam tunnel; and
- (c) A new condensate return main in the steam tunnel to connect the lateral piping with the vacuum pump in Loop Vault No. 9.

This work is a part of the utilities distribution system, but was eliminated from the original contract because of the uncertainty that sufficient funds would be available. A reserve had to be held for the escalation of prices and for contingencies. The maximum escalation in prices has not materialized and funds are now available for the work proposed under this addition.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO PLUMBING CONTRACT FOR STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$6,052 in the contract with E. M. Hays, Champaign, for plumbing installation in the Student and Staff Apartments building, Urbana, for the extension of water service from the utilities distribution system.

When bids were taken on the construction of this building the drawings for this phase of the utilities distribution system had not been prepared. The utilities extensions were considered separately from the building contract. Proposals have been secured from Robert Gordon, Inc., Danville, contractor for the installation of extensions to the general water system of the University, and E. M. Hays, contractor for the installation of plumbing in the Student and Staff Apartments. The Gordon proposal is \$8,673 and the Hays \$6,052.

Funds are available for this addition in the State appropriation for the Student and Staff Apartments.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract with E. M. Hays.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this addition to contract was approved as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR STEAM SERVICE CONNECTION TO STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to A. Kilander and Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of steam service connections to the Student and Staff Apartments on a base bid of \$7,992 subject to a maximum escalation of 10 per cent for changes in cost of material, or increases in labor rates. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of the Student and Staff Apartments.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR POWER PLANT EQUIPMENT

(16) The following bids have been received on structural steel for the floor base required for the installation of water treatment equipment in the Abbott Power Plant:

PURCHASES

(17) There are submitted a report of an emergency purchase authorized and a list of purchases recommended (see Appendix, page 305).

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the President of the University in authorizing an emergency purchase was approved and confirmed, and the purchases recommended were authorized.

(18) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed to March 10, 1949 (see Appendix, page 307).

CURRICULUM IN SECRETARIAL TRAINING

(19) The University Senate recommends the establishment of a new curriculum or concentration of courses of study in the College of Commerce and Business Administration to be known as "Secretarial Training." This program is designed for students who wish to prepare for secretarial work requiring a high degree of technical skill and broad business education. It is an Upper Division curriculum open to students who have completed the first two years in the College of Commerce and Business Administration. The course requirements are as follows:

Primary List: At least forty-four hours including the courses shown as required must be selected from the following. *Required:* Management 101; Economics 248; Management 245; Marketing 101; Rhetoric 272; Business Law 261; and Secretarial Training 102, 112, 103, 113, 222, 233. *Elective:* Economics 200, 210, 214, 228, 240, 250, 254, 255, 272, 303, 312, 378, 379.

Secondary List: Fifteen hours of electives must be chosen from courses in history, philosophy, political science, psychology, sociology, and home economics.

Note 1. The program for the Upper Division is open only to students who have completed all of the requirements of the Lower Division. Students in Secretarial Training may substitute Business Computations (Accy. 121) for college algebra.

Note 2. Students will be admitted to typewriting and shorthand for credit only when they have achieved a level of proficiency equal to that reasonably expected from one year of high school or one semester of college work.

Note 3. Students who have had inadequate prior training in typewriting and shorthand may take their instruction in Beginning Typewriting (Sec. Tr. 101) and Beginning Shorthand (Sec. Tr. 111) in the College of Commerce and Business Administration but will receive no credit.

Note 4. Credit for shorthand and typewriting will be allowed for graduation only in the commercial teaching and secretarial training fields of concentration.

Note 5. Credit in shorthand and typewriting toward graduation will be granted only when the entire series of courses in these subjects is completed.

Note 6. Typewriting and shorthand classes will each meet for one class hour, five times a week.

Note 7. All students selecting this field of concentration will be required to complete sixty hours in courses offered in the College of Commerce and Business Administration as a graduation requirement.

Note 8. The secretarial training field of concentration will result in the following distribution of hours in the Upper Division: Required, 32; economics electives, 12; secondary list, 15; free electives, 7 to 11; total, 66 to 70.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR WELL AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(20) The Director of Robert Allerton Park and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for the drilling of an eight-inch well at the Park to John Bolliger Sons, Fairbury, the lowest bidder, on the following terms:

1. A base price of \$1,875 for the first 150 feet and \$8 a foot for each additional foot up to a maximum of 200 feet.

2. The price to the University will be reduced \$8 a foot for every foot less than 150, to a minimum depth of 100 feet.

3. If the well is drilled and cased to a depth of 150 feet or more and a production of less than fifty gallons a minute of clear water is not obtained, a credit will be allowed the University of \$5 per foot drilled, provided that the contractor is permitted to retrieve and take possession of the screen and casing.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to make such a contract. Funds are available in income from farm operations allocated to the Park.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was given as recommended.

APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR ADDITION TO ANIMAL GENETICS BUILDING

(21) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends that an appropriation of \$52,500 be made for construction of an addition to the Animal Genetics Building.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that if the appropriation is approved a contract for general work be awarded to Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, for \$34,700 and to Schroeder's, Champaign, for heating and ventilating work for \$7,340.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts as recommended.

GIFT OF HOLABIRD AND ROOT AND BURGEE

(22) The architectural firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee, Chicago, has given the University a valuable collection of approximately 1,500 volumes of architectural books for the Art and Architectural Reading Room of the Library at the Chicago Undergraduate Division at Navy Pier. The collection is appraised at \$9,000.

This gift has been formally presented to the President of the University by Mr. John Wellborn Root, senior partner of the firm. In giving these books he has requested that the collection be known as the "John Augur Holabird Memorial," in memory of the late Colonel John Augur Holabird who was for many years a member of the firm.

I have accepted the collection and request that the Board of Trustees give suitable recognition of this handsome gift.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this report was received for record and the Secretary was requested to prepare a suitable resolution.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR SWITCHGEAR IN UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AT CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(24) Bids have been received on switchgear for the Chicago Illini Union Building substation, which is part of the utilities distribution system at the Chicago Professional Colleges.

The University at the present time is receiving an electric rate from Commonwealth Edison Company based on one point delivery although there are actually four delivery points. The Commonwealth Edison Company has continued the rate based on one point delivery with the understanding that at a later time in the coming biennium it will be reduced to one point delivery. The switchgear recommended will reduce the point of delivery from four to three.

It is recommended that the contract for this installation be awarded to the Sorgel Electric Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the lowest bidder for \$13,691. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the utilities distribution system in Chicago.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was awarded as recommended.

REVISION OF BIENNIAL APPROPRIATION FOR 1947-1949

(25) State appropriations made to the University for operations are in accordance with classifications of expenditures specified by the State Finance Act and are subject to its provisions. It is necessary to request the 66th General Assembly of Illinois to pass an emergency act reallocating, by object classifications, the appropriation to the University for the current biennium, 1947-1949. This will not require any increase in the current biennial appropriation but will authorize the use of funds already appropriated although not available without legislative readjustment of the budget.

I recommend that the Board authorize the officers of the University to secure such legislation.

MIDWEST INTER-LIBRARY CORPORATION

The Midwest Inter-Library Corporation was incorporated on March 5, 1949, under the Illinois General Not For Profit Corporation Act. The purposes of the organization are to establish and maintain an educational, literary, scientific, charitable, and research inter-library center; to provide and promote cooperative, auxiliary library services for nonprofit educational, charitable, and scientific institutions; to establish, conduct, and maintain a place or places for the deposit, storage, care, delivery, and exchange of books, pamphlets, photographs, motion-picture film, phonograph records, and other articles or documents containing written, printed, or recorded matter, and services of all kinds with respect thereto, and circulate and distribute any and all educational, literary, scientific, or scholarly publications, books, catalogs, and periodicals dealing with books and other material deposited in said library or available in participating or other libraries.

The Board of Directors of the new corporation are: President E. C. Colwell, University of Chicago; President Henry T. Heald, Illinois Institute of Technology; Provost Coleman R. Griffith, University of Illinois; Director R. E. Ellsworth, University of Iowa; Judge Ora L. Wildermuth, Gary, Indiana; Dean J. H. Nelson, University of Kansas; Dean W. H. Combs, Michigan State College; Vice-President W. T. Middlebrook, University of Minnesota; Director Jens Nyholm, Northwestern University; and Mr. R. W. Kettler, Purdue University.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the new corporation on March 9, 1949, President E. C. Colwell was named Chairman of the Board and Provost Coleman R. Griffith as Vice-Chairman.

The Board approved the Bylaws of the Corporation, instructed the Executive Committee, composed of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman, President Heald, Vice-President Middlebrook, and Director Ellsworth to accept, on behalf of the corporation, an unrestricted gift of \$500,000 from the Carnegie Corporation of New York, to accept a contingent gift of \$250,000 from the same corporation, and to seek ways and means of removing this contingency by securing an additional gift of \$250,000 from some other source. The Rockefeller Foundation of New York is known to be interested in the project and a petition will be addressed to this Foundation for an appropriation of \$250,000 to the Inter-Library Center. The total

fund of \$1,000,000 will be used for the construction costs of the Center and for initial operating costs.

The Executive Committee is now pushing plans to select a site for the Center, presumably in the City of Chicago, to find a Director of the Center, and to perfect the other arrangements necessary to such a large enterprise.

The Inter-Library Center is one of the most forward steps ever taken in the regional organization of resources for scientific, cultural, and scholarly work. Little-used materials in the participating libraries will be housed in the Center. By this concentration at the Center, a great research library can be established, but at the same time the participating institutions will be able to expand their holdings in the areas that are most useful for their own facilities. Full coordination with and speedy exchange between the participating libraries give dramatic promise of more useful service to research and scholarship throughout the midwest area.

**With Executive Committee Meeting
of March 29, 1949**



The April meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, April 21, 1949, at the Executive Mansion, in Springfield, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

12 m. — Open session.

All the members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Governor Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and during part of the day, Director J. F. Wright.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of March 10, 1949.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 285 to 308 above.

REPORTS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary presented for record the following actions of the Executive Committee since the March meeting of the Board.

Closing of Galesburg Division

The Executive Committee on March 15, 1949, approved a recommendation of President Stoddard that the Galesburg Undergraduate Division be closed as of June 30, 1949.

Purchase of Farm Land

The Executive Committee on March 16, 1949, accepted an offer of Gordon F. Kamerer and Charles M. Webber, of Urbana, to sell the 320-acre McCullough farm to the University at \$500 an acre, plus \$3,000 legal expenses already incurred. Messrs. Kamerer and Webber executed a contract of sale and the University issued a formal acceptance of the contract, and made a payment of \$8,000.

The Executive Committee also approved the purchase from the Sullivan heirs of two tracts of forty acres each, described as follows:

The SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 19, and the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 30, both in Township 19 North, Range 9 East of the 3rd P.M.

at a price not to exceed \$800 an acre. The Executive Committee made an additional assignment of \$7,000, and made the combined appropriation of \$107,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, available for payments on the purchase of the McCullough farm and the two Sullivan tracts.¹

Contracts for Steam Distribution System

The Executive Committee on April 9, 1949, approved the award of contracts to the lowest bidders for construction of concrete tunnel and installation of piping from the Dairy Manufacturers Building east to the site of the College of Veterinary Medicine Science Building, as follows:

Construction of tunnel: Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., \$84,775

Installation of piping: William A. Pope Company, \$16,970 (plus escalation not to exceed 18%)

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the President of the University was requested to send to Mr. Gordon F. Kamerer and Mr. Charles M. Webber an expression of the Board's appreciation of their public service in this transaction.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the Board made record of its appreciation of the services of President Stoddard and Dean Rusk in negotiating these purchases of land at such favorable terms.

Executive Committee Meeting, March 29, 1949

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago, Illinois at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 29, 1949. Present: Mr. K. E. Williamson, Chairman, Mr. John R. Fornot, and Mr. Park Livingston, members of the Committee; also Dr. George D. Stoddard, President, Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Mr. William E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and Mr. H. A. Hazleton, Business Manager, Chicago, who acted as Clerk.

¹ The Comptroller reported on April 21, that the appropriation of \$7,000 was not necessary, and that the total payments on these lands for the current fiscal year would be \$64,000, and that the balance had been lapsed into the General Reserve.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Executive Committee considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CHICAGO HOUSING PROJECTS

(1) As a result of conferences between representatives of the University, the Medical Center Commission, and the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, concerning the financing of housing projects for the Chicago Professional Colleges, the following procedures are proposed:

1. The Medical Center Commission will request a loan from the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States for funds with which to construct a staff apartment building and a student residence hall in Chicago as well as some equipment for the buildings constructed and the remodeling of properties now existing on the site adjacent to the staff apartment building.

2. The Medical Center Commission on the basis of a commitment from the Assurance Society to make such a loan will endeavor, with the cooperation of the University, to secure temporary financing for the purpose of constructing and partially equipping the buildings as well as the remodeling of existing properties.

3. The buildings will be built from plans prepared by the University architects and the construction will be supervised by University architects.

4. The contracts for the construction of the buildings will be let by the Medical Center Commission with the approval of the Board of Trustees of the University.

5. Upon completion of the buildings, the Medical Center Commission will issue its revenue bonds as the basis of the loan from the Assurance Society.

6. The Medical Center Commission will lease the properties so constructed, as well as existing properties, to the University of Illinois at a rental and for a period of time necessary to amortize the loan. This lease will be assigned by the Medical Center Commission to the Assurance Society as Security for the loan.

7. The Medical Center Commission will agree to convey the properties to the University at any time the University is willing to pay the outstanding principal of the loan with any interest due, thus discharging the Medical Center Commission from any liability to the Assurance Society.

8. The Medical Center Commission also agrees that if the University carries the lease until the entire bond issue is paid the Medical Center Commission will convey the property to the University of Illinois at that time.

9. The University agrees to convey the site for the residence hall to the Medical Center Commission, if this is necessary.

10. The loan requested is to be at 4 per cent with level semi-annual payments of principal and interest based on a twenty-five-year amortization schedule, the outstanding balance at the end of twenty years to be due and payable at that time.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the Executive Committee recommended approval of this plan. This will require rescinding a resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on October 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 136), declared as a matter of general policy that the land for these housing projects be acquired by the University in fee simple and not be leased.

**CONTRACTS FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL
HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT**

(2) The Board of Trustees, through its Committee on Buildings and Grounds and Executive Committee (Minutes, January 13, 1949, pages 196 and 226-227) has authorized the construction under the supervision of the Small Homes Council of approximately thirty houses as a research and demonstration project and for rental to members of the faculty. An appropriation of not to exceed \$325,000, to be supplemented by a loan, was made for this project. The total cost was estimated at \$412,000.

Bids have been received on the general work (complete construction of the houses), site improvements, and landscaping. The lowest bid on house construction

is well within the Small Homes Council estimate. However, due to improvements in the site plan and landscaping, and the addition of garages and breezeways to all houses, the total cost of the project is now estimated at \$465,000. A loan of \$140,000 plus the appropriation of \$325,000 will provide enough funds to complete the project. The Comptroller has surveyed sources of borrowing and all replies indicate that net income from rentals will be adequate to amortize a loan of \$140,000 in approximately fifteen years, the amortization period specified by the Board.

Submitted herewith are Schedule A, Capital Budgets for this Project; Schedule B, Estimated Annual Income and Expenses; and Schedule C, List of Bids Received.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts to the following firms who were the lowest bidders in each case:

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts. I further recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to secure offers of funds to be borrowed and to submit such proposals to the Board of Trustees through the Finance Committee.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authorization was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE IMPROVEMENTS

(3) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, for remodeling in the Veterinary Pathology Laboratory at an estimated cost of \$21,583. Funds are available in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this purpose.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, authorization was given as recommended.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CONVEYANCE OF EASEMENT

(4) *Whereas*, the residue and remainder of the Estate of Harry G. Wright was devised to the University of Illinois, to be administered by the College of Agriculture of the University insofar as practicable in the judgment of its Board of Trustees, and used for the purpose of promoting agricultural education and for founding scholarships, but nevertheless the use made of the devise and bequest thereunder was to rest in the sole discretion and judgment of its Board of Trustees; and

Whereas, a portion of said residue was a certain lease of land on the southerly shore of Big Sand Lake in Vilas County, Wisconsin (theretofore assigned to said decedent whereon was erected a small summer home), together with an easement for a private road over adjoining property to connect with Wisconsin State Highway No. 70; and

Whereas, R. F. McCormick and H. D. Fisk, the Executors under said will, pursuant to an order entered May 20, 1941, in the County Court of DeKalb County, Illinois, executed and delivered to Park Livingston, as purchaser, an instrument purporting to convey the aforementioned property and interest; and

Whereas, said purchaser has been advised that the said Executors' deed may not be under the laws of the State of Wisconsin sufficient to convey the title or interest of Mr. Wright, and has requested that the University of Illinois, as such residuary devisee, execute and deliver to him a deed, in form now before this meeting, conveying the interest of the University in said premises:

Now, Therefore, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved that, in the discretion and judgment of this Board of Trustees, the property and interests so conveyed by the Executors of the Estate of Harry G. Wright, due to the character and location

thereof, are deemed impracticable to be administered and used for the purpose of promoting agricultural education and for founding scholarships, and that the action of said Executors above mentioned is hereby ratified and approved and, in view of the fact that the consideration therefor paid by said purchaser has been received by said Executors, that the President and Secretary execute, acknowledge, and deliver, for and on behalf and in the name of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a deed to said property and interests in the form now before this meeting; conveying

The leasehold estate created by that certain lease from the Eagle River Fishing and Shooting Club to George E. Nye, demising and leasing for a term of ninety-nine years, Lot Five (5) in Section Two (2), Township Forty-one (41) North, Range Twelve (12) East of the Fourth Principal Meridian, otherwise described as: Commencing at the Southwest corner of said Section Two (2) and thence East along the Section line between said Section Two (2) and Section Eleven (11) in said Township and Range, a distance of two hundred (200) feet; thence North to Sand Lake; thence in a Southwesterly direction to where the Section line between said Section Two (2) and Section Three (3) in said Township and Range intersects Sand Lake; thence South along said Section line to the point of beginning. CHICAGO HOUSING PROJECTS

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the Board reconsidered and rescinded its resolution of October 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 136), with reference to the Chicago housing projects, and adopted the plan and method of procedure contained in item 1, parts 1 to 10 inclusive, of the minutes of the Executive Committee of March 29, 1949.

SMALL HOMES COUNCIL HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

The Legal Counsel reported that he had received information that the lowest bidders on general work for the Housing Research Project had not supplied, and probably could not, because of other commitments, supply a bond within thirty days from the opening of bids.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the Board voted to authorize the Director of the Physical Plant Department to reject all other bids for general work and to advertise for new bids for general work on the Housing Research Project, with fifteen-day limit, if the lowest bidder should fail to supply a satisfactory bond within thirty days from the opening of the bids.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the Comptroller was authorized to extend the amortization period of the loan for this project to twenty years if necessary.

CONVEYANCE OF EASEMENT

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the action of the Executive Committee in executing a conveyance of land and easement to right-of-way in Wisconsin (part of the estate of the late Harry G. Wright) was approved and confirmed.

**APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE
PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY**

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. DAVID W. BELCHER, Assistant Professor of Management, in the Business Management Service, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,000.
2. WILLIAM M. CAPRON, Assistant Professor of Economics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,500.
3. EDWARD CHAINSKI, Clinical Assistant Professor of Otolaryngology, in the College of Medicine, beginning March 1, 1949, without salary.
4. JOHN A. COCHRAN, Assistant Professor of Economics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,500.
5. ANDREW L. COMREY, Assistant Professor of Psychology, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,000.
6. ARNOLD C. CONDON, Associate Professor of Secretarial Training, in the Department of Business Organization and Operation, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,000.
7. FRED W. FOSTER, Associate Professor of Geography, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,500.
8. HAROLD MARSH, JR., Assistant Professor of Law, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,000.
9. ROBERT J. MAURER, Associate Professor of Physics, in the College of Engineering, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,000.
10. FREDERICK SEITZ, Professor of Physics, in the Graduate College, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$11,000.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the action of the President in making these appointments was confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

VISIT OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

(1) Following a custom of many years' standing, the Sixty-sixth General Assembly of Illinois will make its biennial visit to the University of Illinois (Urbana-Champaign campus) on April 28-29 for the purpose of inspection. A large delegation is expected.

The expenses of this visit are paid by the University and the Board has usually made a special appropriation for that purpose. I recommend that the Public Functions Fund of the President's Office for the current fiscal year of 1948-1949, be supplemented by an assignment of \$2,500 for this purpose.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Stevenson.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR DEAN HOWARD R. BOWEN

(2) Dean Howard R. Bowen of the College of Commerce and Business Administration has been asked by the Department of the Army to serve on a Commission to review the public finances of Japan during the months of June and July. The purpose of the commission would be to review its tax system and ways and means of balancing its budget and repressing inflation.

I recommend that Dean Bowen be given a leave of absence with pay from June 1 to August 1, 1949, for this purpose.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this leave was granted as recommended.

TRAINING PROGRAM FOR NURSES

(3) The Board of Directors of the Cook County School of Nursing requests an affiliation with the University of Illinois whereby a student may receive a diploma in nursing from the Cook County School of Nursing and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from the University of Illinois, provided the student has fulfilled the University's requirements for the degree.

The University Senate recommends approval of a training program for nurses according to the following plan:

1. A two-year pre-professional curriculum in nurses training to be offered at Urbana-Champaign and at the Chicago Undergraduate Division (Navy Pier).

2. The requirements for admission will be the same as those required for admission to the Cook County School of Nursing.

3. The curriculum of the Cook County School of Nursing will be accepted as fulfilling the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

Any subsequent changes in this curriculum will be subject to approval by the University Senate and the Board of Trustees.

I submit a memorandum prepared by the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges in consultation with representatives of the Cook County School of Nursing, the Cook County Hospital, and the Cook County Board of Commissioners which presents the proposed plan of affiliation with the University of Illinois in detail (see Appendix, page 348).

I recommend approval of this training program and plan of affiliation.

President Stoddard, Dr. Ivy, Provost Griffith, and Dr. Meyer commented on this program.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this training program and plan of affiliation were approved as recommended.

CONTRACT WITH ILLINOIS WATER SERVICE COMPANY

(4) On April 10, 1948 (Minutes, page 1072), the Board of Trustees voted to contract with the Illinois Water Service Company for furnishing the entire water supply of the University at Urbana-Champaign. The conditions of such a contract will provide that the University shall pay rates approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission. The rate schedule which the Company submitted to the Commission at that time would have increased rates then in effect by approximately 50 per cent in the bracket applicable to maximum University consumption (over 300,000 cubic feet per quarter) for softened water but the rates subsequently approved by the Commission are based on iron free water only. The rate applicable to the quantity bracket of over 300,000 cubic feet per quarter was increased from six cents per 100 cubic feet per quarter to seven cents, or an increase of 16 $\frac{2}{3}$ per cent instead of from six to eight cents as requested by the Company. The comparative schedule of rates is:

The Company can not furnish softened water as originally contemplated. The charge for iron free (rather than softened) water, in the bracket of maximum University consumption (over 300,000 cubic feet per quarter), as now approved by

the Illinois Commerce Commission, will be seven cents per 100 cubic feet per quarter, instead of the rate of nine cents previously requested for softened water. While softened water is desirable, it is not essential and was not requested by the University.

It was originally proposed that the Company would provide and maintain all metering facilities. The meters were to be of the volumetric type with straight reading horizontal register and recording only the volume consumed, and not the rate of flow. From the University's point of view, recording the rate of flow is desirable. Contracts for the University's water station improvements now under construction call for a Venturi meter which will record both rate of flow and quantity consumed. Installation of an additional meter by the Water Company would require the University to construct a meter vault. The Company is willing to use the Venturi meter provided by the University.

The contract as now drafted provides that:

a. The Water Company will proceed as rapidly as possible to deliver water needed by the University.

b. Not later than two years from the date of the agreement it will begin to furnish the entire requirements of the University.

c. In the interim the University will use its own facilities and supply together with water purchased as needed.

d. After the Company begins to supply the entire requirement, the University facilities will be maintained for emergency use only.

e. The adequacy of water service will be determined by the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

f. The quality of water furnished will be based on the standards of the United States Public Health Service for drinking water.

g. If the Water Company at any time fails to furnish an adequate or potable supply or to take steps toward correcting any deficiencies within six months, the University is relieved of its obligations under the contract.

h. Subject to constitutional and statutory limitations on biennial appropriations, the agreement runs for thirty years subject to the right of either party to terminate at the end of any ten-year period on two years' written notice.

i. The University agrees to comply with all rules and regulations of the Water Company approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission, and shall have a period of five years in order to install such facilities and to do the work required to comply with such regulations. Water furnished under this agreement may be used by the University for cooling purposes or other processing purposes comparable with any industrial use permitted by the Water Company.

Chapman and Cutler, attorneys of Chicago, have recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution:

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the following agreement for the purchase of water by the University of Illinois from the Illinois Water Service Company, to wit:

AGREEMENT FOR PURCHASE OF WATER

This agreement, made and entered into this 21st day of April, 1949, by and between ILLINOIS WATER SERVICE COMPANY, a private corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as the "Water Company"), and the UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, a public corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as the "University"),

WITNESSETH, as follows:

Whereas, the Water Company is a public utility subject to regulation by the Illinois Commerce Commission and owns and operates a system of wells, together with water treatment facilities, water mains and distribution facilities, and is presently engaged in the business of furnishing water service in the Cities of Champaign and Urbana, Illinois; and

Whereas, the University likewise owns certain wells, a distribution system and other facilities capable of furnishing a part of the water service requirements of the University; and

Whereas, for reasons of economy the University is desirous of contracting with the Water Company for the furnishing of the entire water supply of the University, and the Water Company is willing to furnish such water supply upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth;

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto have agreed, and do hereby agree, as follows:

1. Subject to the remaining terms and provisions of this agreement, the Water Company agrees to sell and deliver to the University at the point of delivery hereinafter specified, and the University agrees to purchase and take at said delivery point, all water required by the University for use on the campus and in all buildings or other structures owned or operated by the University in and about the Cities of Champaign and Urbana, Illinois, and which may now or hereafter be connected to the distribution system maintained by the University. It is understood, however, that the Water Company is now in process of drilling additional wells to augment its supply and expects to install additional water treatment facilities and will not be able to furnish the entire requirements of the University until approximately two (2) years after the execution and delivery of this agreement. Accordingly, it is agreed that the Water Company shall proceed as speedily as possible to do all work necessary to enable the Water Company to furnish the entire requirements of the University and in the meantime the University may take and the Water Company shall, to the extent that it is able to do so, deliver such amounts of water as may be needed by the University to supplement its own water production. Such supplementary water shall be taken through existing connections and, insofar as possible, at night. In any case, the Water Company shall begin furnishing the entire requirements of the University not later than two (2) years after the date of this agreement.

2. The University agrees to pay to the Water Company for all water furnished to the University according to the applicable rates from time to time on file with the Illinois Commerce Commission or such other regulatory body as may from time to time have jurisdiction over such water rates. The Water Company shall render bills for such water service to the University on a monthly basis and the amount of each bill shall be payable on or before the 25th day after the rendering of the bill, and, if paid thereafter, the applicable penalty or discount contained in any rate schedule then in force will be added or withdrawn. The Illinois Commerce Commission has heretofore directed that the Water Company shall, in its present rate schedule give recognition, in the form of lower rates, to consumers using in excess of 300,000 cubic feet of water per quarter and the Water Company has, in compliance with such direction, filed a rate schedule with said Illinois Commerce Commission providing for such a lower rate to such consumers. The Water Company agrees that it will, in any rate schedule hereafter filed, recommend similar recognition and consideration to the University and other consumers using extraordinarily large quantities of water. It is understood that any rate schedule which shall hereafter be filed must necessarily be approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission or any other regulatory body having jurisdiction over water rates.

3. The point of delivery of the water to be furnished hereunder shall be at a service valve to be furnished by the Water Company and to be located north of the south property line of Springfield Avenue, between Romine and Matthews Streets, in Urbana, Illinois, and after installation of such service valve all such water shall be furnished through a Venturi meter (hereinafter sometimes called the "Master Meter") to be furnished and paid for by the University. Pending the installation of said service valve and meter, water shall be furnished hereunder through the presently available connections and meters. It is understood that there is now being maintained a connection at a point south of the Auditorium on Armory Avenue extended where water is now being furnished to the University and that after the installation of said service valve, the said connection and the meter located at said connection shall continue to be owned and shall be maintained by the University, but that said connection shall not be used for the purpose of furnishing water to the University after the Water Company has notified the University that it will furnish all of the University's requirements, except in case of emergency and then only upon notice to the Water Company by the University

of its intention to use the same. If said connection shall be used after the Water Company is furnishing all of the University's requirements, the water flowing through the meter at said connection shall be added to the amount flowing through the Master Meter for the purpose of billing in any billing period during which the said connection may be in use for emergency purposes. A minimum charge shall be made to the University in respect of this connection equal to the minimum charge fixed in the rate schedule of the Water Company in force at the time and applicable to the size of meter then in use, and the University shall be given credit for the amount of water allowed for such minimum charge in any such rate schedule. The University shall provide space for the said Master Meter, and if a meter vault is required, the same shall be built by the University at its expense in accordance with specifications to be furnished by the Water Company.

The division of responsibility for the maintenance of the respective facilities of the Water Company and the University shall be at the said service valve to be furnished by the Water Company, and the Water Company shall not be required to provide more than one service line leading to such valve unless required by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. The University agrees to construct, maintain and operate at its sole cost and expense all equipment and facilities (including all service connections) beyond the delivery point which may be necessary to take and utilize the water furnished by the Water Company. It is understood that the University now and hereafter may desire metered water service to buildings and facilities of the University located on or off the campus and which are not, or may not hereafter, be connected with its distribution system and that with respect to any such metered water service a separate bill shall be rendered monthly or quarterly, at the discretion of the Water Company, to the University for each such meter so furnishing water at the applicable rates from time to time in force for such metered water service, and that the amount of the water furnished through such metered water service shall not be considered as a part of, nor added to, the amount of water furnished through the Master Meter. Such metered water service shall be furnished under such rules, regulations and conditions of service applicable to other customers of the Water Company as may be in force and effect during the time service is received by the University. In order to eliminate the necessity of the University using its pumping equipment, the Water Company agrees to operate its pumping equipment so as to fill its elevated storage tank located on North Champaign Street, extended, Champaign, Illinois, and which has a capacity of approximately one million (1,000,000) gallons, at least once in twenty-four hours, which operation of the Water Company's pumping equipment should be sufficient to fill the University's present elevated tank within the same 24 hour period. In the event that the said elevated storage tank of the Water Company should not be filled once in 24 hours or be out of service for any reason, the Water Company agrees to maintain operating pressures at its pumping station at least equal to those with which it maintains on an average daily basis while the said elevated storage tank is in service. In any case, the University shall be responsible for the pressure in its mains and distribution system for fire protection purposes.

4. It is understood that all water to be furnished hereunder shall be potable water and the standards of the United States Public Health Service for drinking water shall be the standards used in determining potability. It is further understood that the Water Company, after the expiration of a period of two (2) years from the date of this agreement, shall at all times furnish to the University an adequate supply of water, and if any question shall arise as to the adequacy of such water supply, the question shall be determined by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. In case of any deficiency either in potability or adequacy, the Water Company shall not be in default hereunder if, within six (6) months after such deficiency occurs, it shall commence the necessary engineering studies and place orders for all materials that such engineering studies indicate are necessary and take such other steps as may be necessary to correct the then existing deficiency, and pursue the same to completion within a reasonable time, and if the Water Company shall not take steps to correct the then existing deficiency in the manner and within the time above specified, the University shall, at its option, be relieved of its obligation under this agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Water Company shall not be required to correct any deficiency when the Water

Company is unable to correct such deficiency for reasons as set forth in Section 10 hereof. The adequacy of the water supply furnished to the University shall be determined at the point of delivery at the service valve and Master Meter above mentioned, as determined from time to time by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, and in any case a water supply at the rate of one thousand (1,000) gallons per minute, United States Standard Liquid Measure (or such other amount as the parties hereto shall agree upon), shall be deemed to be adequate for all purposes of this agreement unless the National Board of Fire Underwriters shall determine otherwise. The Water Company agrees to conduct such studies as may be necessary for the long term future water supply of the University and the community and to furnish to the University such physical plant data as may be necessary to assure the University of the adequacy of the water supply, but the Water Company shall not be required to furnish such data more than once in each calendar year.

5. The University agrees to comply with all of the rules and regulations of the Water Company from time to time on file with the Illinois Commerce Commission and governing service in the Cities of Champaign and Urbana; provided, however, that if at the date of this agreement it is necessary for the University to do any work or install any facilities in order to comply with such rules and regulations, the University shall have a period of five (5) years from and after the date of this agreement to install such facilities or to do such work, except in cases where non-compliance with such rules and regulations may in any way affect the bacteriological quality of the water furnished by the Water Company, in which case it shall be the duty of the University to comply immediately with such rules and regulations.

6. It is understood that water furnished under this agreement may be used by the University for cooling purposes or for other processing purposes, comparable with any existing industrial use permitted by the Water Company without imposing any restrictions. If there shall hereafter be any change in the rules and regulations respecting the use of water for any of the purposes specified in this paragraph, the University shall be entitled to the benefit of any such change to the same extent as other customers of the Water Company. In case of any dispute with respect to the foregoing, both parties agree to jointly submit the question to the Illinois Commerce Commission and to abide by any ruling, whether formal or informal, given by the said Commission.

7. Nothing in this agreement contained shall be deemed to prohibit the University from producing such quantities of raw water as may be needed for research in the field of biology or any other research where the treated water served by the Water Company is not suitable. The University agrees that it will under no circumstances permit any cross connection of any kind to be made between any such raw water supply and the treated water supply furnished by the Water Company.

8. The University agrees that so long as this agreement shall remain in force, it will maintain its existing water wells throughout their expected life but, from and after the time when the Water Company shall commence to furnish the entire water supply of the University such wells will be maintained for standby and emergency purposes only; provided, always, that such wells may be operated periodically for test purposes as may be deemed necessary or advisable by administrative authorities of the University responsible for the water supply, but the water produced from such test runs shall not be utilized by the University unless it meets the standards approved by the United States Public Health Service. Such test runs may be made at approximately thirty (30) day intervals during the life of this agreement and may be of approximately two (2) hours duration.

9. The unit of measurement for the water delivered hereunder shall be one thousand (1,000) gallons of water, United States Standard Liquid Measure. For the purposes of measurement of water delivered hereunder, it is understood that 7.48 gallons of water shall constitute one (1) cubic foot. It is further understood that the meter to be originally installed at the service valve hereinbefore referred to shall be a Venturi meter. The University shall have access to the said Master Meter, but the reading and calibrating and adjustment of such Master Meter shall be done only by the employees or agents of the Water Company. For the purposes of this agreement the original record of reading of any meter (including the Master Meter) shall be the journal or other record book of the Water Company in its office in which the records of the employees or agents of the Water

Company who take the reading are or may be transcribed. Approximately once in each six (6) months period during the life of this agreement, on a date as near the last day of the month as practicable, the Water Company shall calibrate said Master Meter in the presence of a representative of the University, and the representatives of the parties hereto shall jointly observe any adjustments made to such meter when such adjustment be necessary. If upon any test, whether by check meter or otherwise, the percentage of inaccuracy of the said Master Meter is found to be in excess of two per cent (2%), registration thereof shall be corrected for a period extending back to the time when such inaccuracy occurred, if such time is ascertainable, and if not ascertainable, then for a period extending back one-half of the time elapsed since the last date of calibration, but in no event more than six (6) months.

10. In the event either party hereto is unable, wholly or in part, by reason of force majeure to carry out its obligations under this agreement, other than any obligation to pay money due hereunder, then such party may give notice in writing to the other party hereto, giving notice and full particulars of such force majeure within a reasonable time after the occurrence of the cause relied on, whereupon the obligations of the party giving such notice insofar as they are affected by such force majeure shall be suspended during the continuance of any inability so caused, but for no longer period, and such cause, as far as possible, shall be remedied by the party giving such notice with all reasonable dispatch. The term "force majeure" as employed herein, shall include acts of God, strikes, lockouts, other industrial disturbances, acts of the public enemy, priorities or orders of any kind of the Government of the United States or of the State of Illinois or of any civil or military authorities on account of any war or war defense program, insurrections, riots, epidemics, lightning, earthquakes, fires, storms, floods, explosions, and any other causes of the kind herein enumerated, not reasonable within the control of the party claiming suspension.

11. The term of this agreement shall be thirty (30) years from the date hereof, subject to the right of either party hereto to terminate this agreement upon the expiration of a period of ten (10) years from the date hereof or twenty (20) years from the date hereof, upon giving to the other party two (2) years written notice of such termination; provided, however, that this agreement shall not become effective unless and until it shall be presented to and approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission and the parties hereto agree to cooperate in procuring such approval.

12. It is understood that the provision of this agreement shall not extend or apply to the use of raw water produced by the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois at the Stadium, and at the University Golf Course. The University may, at its discretion, extend the water distribution system to service University owned property outside the city limits of the Cities of Champaign and Urbana, Illinois.

13. In the event that control of the Water Company is acquired by a municipal corporation by purchase, lease, operation of law, or otherwise, the University, at its option and by giving six months written notice of its intention so to do, may terminate this agreement. Otherwise, this agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns, but nothing herein contained shall be deemed to confer any rights upon any person, firm or corporation other than the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.

All provisions and terms of this agreement shall be subject to the provisions of Article 4, Section 18, Constitution of Illinois 1870, and to Section 28, Chapter 144, Illinois Revised Statutes 1947.

In Witness Whereof, Illinois Water Service Company has caused this agreement to be signed by its President or a Vice President thereunto duly authorized and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by its Secretary or Assistant Secretary, and the University of Illinois has caused this agreement to be signed by the Comptroller of its Board of Trustees thereunto duly authorized and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by the Secretary of its Board of Trustees, all as of the day and year first above written.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this resolution was adopted.

At this point, Governor Stevenson took his place with the Board. He spoke of his pleasure in having the Board meet with him at the Executive Mansion, and of his appreciation of the prompt action of President Stoddard and the Board in deciding to close the Galesburg Undergraduate Division so that the plant could be used by the Department of Public Welfare.

BUDGETARY DISCUSSION

In a short discussion of budgetary matters, President Williamson expressed the appreciation of the Board for the appropriations for the University approved by the Governor in his budget.

President Stoddard spoke of the urgency of the item of one million dollars for remodeling and fire prevention in the Noyes Laboratory of Chemistry (\$230,000), remodeling the Old Power Plant so that the space could be used (\$400,000), and repowering the Physics Building to secure adequate power and to reduce the fire hazard (\$270,000). The Provost and the Comptroller supported the President's position.

Governor Stevenson expressed his regret that the expected income of the State would not provide for any additions to his budget. He said that he would give this item a high priority in case additional income were to materialize.

The Board recessed for luncheon.

OPEN SESSION

After luncheon, the Board convened in open session. Governor Stevenson was present during the afternoon.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

**APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR ALLEN STUART WELLER
AS HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ART**

(1) The Dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts recommends the appointment of Dr. Allen S. Weller, now Professor of the History of Art in the Graduate College, as Professor and Head of the Department of Art in the College of Fine and Applied Arts on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$9,000 an academic year.

Professor Weller has been serving as Chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Department of Art since September 1, 1948.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made as recommended.

**APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF
GENERAL ENGINEERING DRAWING**

(2) Professor H. H. Jordan, Head of the Department of General Engineering Drawing, has for many years been serving as Associate Dean of the College of Engineering. The College of Engineering requires his services as Associate Dean on a full-time basis. It is therefore recommended that:

1. Professor Jordan be relieved of the headship of the Department of General Engineering Drawing and be appointed Associate Dean of the College of Engineering for two years from September 1, 1949, and Professor of General Engineering Drawing on indefinite tenure, at an annual salary of \$10,500.

2. Professor R. P. Hoelscher, formerly of the Department of General Engineering Drawing, who has been serving as Dean of Engineering Sciences at the Chicago Undergraduate Division (Navy Pier) for the past three years, be appointed Professor and Head of the Department of General Engineering Drawing on indefinite tenure from September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$8,300 an academic year.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appointments were made as recommended.

**APPOINTMENT OF HALVOR ORIN HALVORSON AS PROFESSOR AND
HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF BACTERIOLOGY**

(3) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Halvor Orin Halvorson, now Professor of Bacteriology at the University of Minnesota, as Professor and Head of the Department of Bacteriology on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$9,000 an academic year.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this appointment was made as recommended.

**APPOINTMENT OF JOHN LEWIS HELLER AS PROFESSOR AND
HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CLASSICS**

(4) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of John Lewis Heller, now Professor and Chairman of the Department of Classics at the University of Minnesota, as Professor and Head of the Department of Classics on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$8,000 an academic year.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(5) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943. They have all submitted evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked certificates which they obtained in

other states on the basis of having passed the written examination. They have also presented evidence to the Committee that they satisfy the other provisions of Section 5:

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS GOVERNING ADMINISTRATION OF THE LAW RELATING TO CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS

(6) Under an act of the General Assembly of Illinois passed in 1943 superseding the original Accountancy Act of 1903 and the Public Accounting Act of 1927, the University continues to have the responsibility of examining applicants for certificates of Certified Public Accountant. Certificates to successful candidates are issued in the name of the Board of Trustees.

To carry out the provisions of the law the Board of Trustees appoints a board of three examiners to prepare, conduct, and grade examinations. Also, as a new provision of the Act of 1943, the University, with the approval of the Department of Registration and Education (which formerly administered the Public Accounting Act of 1927), has appointed a special board of five examiners to pass upon the qualifications and examine applicants for the C.P.A. certificate with ten years of experience who hold certificates of registration as Public Accountants in Illinois by waiver or oral examinations under the Act of 1927.

A Committee on Accountancy, appointed by the President of the University from the faculty, passes upon applicants for the Illinois C.P.A. certificate who hold C.P.A. certificates from other states or who possess the Illinois P.A. certificate under the Act of 1927 on the basis of a written examination. The Committee serves in other ways as the President's agent in administering the Accountancy Act. The Board of Trustees has established regulations for the administration of the Act.

Each applicant for the C.P.A. certificate by written examination is required to pass examinations in the Theory of Accounts, Commercial Law, Auditing, and Practical Accounting.

The Committee on Accountancy has been discussing with the Board of Examiners in Accountancy and with the Board of Directors of the Illinois Society of Certified Public Accountants a modification of one of the rules (Rule 33) which has provided for one re-examination in subjects failed in a candidate's original examination provided his grades were not below 60 per cent. The Directors of the Illinois Society of Certified Public Accountants believe that the rules should be liberalized by giving the candidate additional opportunities to remove failures in his original examination. The Committee on Accountancy recommends that Rule 33 be amended to read as follows (language to be deleted in italics):

"A candidate who passes in Theory of Accounts and Practical Accounting,¹ and fails in one or both of the other examination subjects (Auditing and Law), *with a grade not lower than 60 in the subject or subjects failed*, or a candidate who passes in Auditing and Law and fails in Theory of Accounts and Practical Accounting,¹ *with a grade not lower than 60*, shall be credited with the subject or subjects in which he has received passing grades and may upon application and payment of the required examination fees present himself for re-examination in the subject or subjects in which he failed at any three of the six semi-annual examinations next succeeding the examination at which he qualifies for such partial re-examination. Whenever a candidate presents himself for re-examination he must write on all subjects in which he then has failing grades.

"If on re-examinations, the candidate passes in the subjects in which he has failed, he shall be eligible for the C.P.A. certificate; if he fails to do so, he shall revert to the status of a new applicant who is required to write the entire examination.

¹ The examination in Theory of Accounts and the two sessions of the examination in Practical Accounting are considered as one subject in administering this rule.

"The time limitation within which a candidate is required to pass subjects under this rule shall not include any period during which the applicant serves in the armed forces of the United States."

Because of the change in Rule 33, a slight change in phraseology of another rule (Rule 34a) is required. As revised, Rule 34a would read:

"A candidate whose standing is such that he shall be required to write in all subjects may not present himself for re-examination until at least one examination shall have intervened following his last examination or re-examination, and then only upon presentation of satisfactory evidence that he has made further preparation in the interim."

These changes will provide three opportunities for a candidate to remove original failures. They must be exercised within six semi-annual examinations (substantially three years) next following the examination in which he qualified under the rule.

The Act provides that a fee of \$25 shall be paid by each candidate admitted to the complete examination. This fee goes into the Accountancy Fund from which all expenses incurred in the administration of the C.P.A. Act must be met. Originally candidates writing part of the examination under Rule 33 paid the full fee of \$25. A number of years ago the Board of Trustees, on recommendation of the Board of Examiners in Accountancy and the Committee on Accountancy, authorized re-examinations under this rule without the payment of additional fees. At that time there was a substantial balance in the Accountancy Fund.

Expenses of administration of the C.P.A. Act have now greatly increased so that it is necessary to return to the practice of requiring that fees be paid by candidates given re-examinations under Rule 33. This will be particularly necessary since additional re-examinations are being provided in the amendment of Rule 33. The Committee on Accountancy therefore recommends that candidates writing under Rule 33, as revised, be charged fees as follows:

For candidates writing Theory and Practice of Accounting...	\$20
For candidates writing Auditing or Commercial Law, or a combination of Auditing and Commercial Law.....	15

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these changes were approved as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS FOR SCHOLARSHIPS IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

(7) For fifty years the University has been awarding scholarships in agriculture and home economics, established by the Board of Trustees at the request of the Illinois Farmers' Institute, which exempt the holders from payment of tuition fees. Originally one scholarship was available in agriculture and one in home economics in each county of the State (except Cook and Lake Counties where two scholarships, one in agriculture and one in home economics, were awarded in each of the first seven, later the first ten, Congressional Districts which are in those counties). On September 27, 1940, the Board of Trustees reduced the number of scholarships in agriculture and home economics offered in Cook and Lake Counties from twenty to four, thereafter offering one of each scholarship in each county instead of one in each of the first ten Congressional Districts.

Under present regulations governing these scholarships, candidates must meet certain conditions of eligibility, viz., (a) a candidate must be a bona fide resident of the county from which he is recommended; (b) the candidate must rank in the upper 50 per cent of the high school class with which he graduated; (c) awards to students entering the University by transfer from other colleges or universities are made only to those who have a scholastic average of fifteen points above the passing grade of the college or university previously attended. In addition, the candidates must (a) be recommended by the Illinois Farmers' Institute; (b) pass with an average grade of seventy or higher the competitive examination given by the County Superintendent of Schools on the first Saturday in June to candidates for County scholarships which are established by law. (If a candidate for a scholarship in agriculture or home economics passes this

examination with the highest grade, such candidate automatically receives the County scholarship. County scholarships were established by an Act of the General Assembly of Illinois. One is available in each county of the State.) (c) The candidate must register in the University for a curriculum in agriculture or home economics at the opening of the next semester or summer session following the award.

The regulations also provide that if the Illinois Farmers' Institute fails to recommend a suitable candidate from any county the President of the University may appoint a candidate who meets all conditions of eligibility.

The Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics and the officials of the Illinois Farmers' Institute recommend that the present regulations be amended by rescinding the requirement that candidates must file application with the Illinois Farmers' Institute and be recommended by the Institute. Omission of these requirements will make the administration of these scholarships consistent with the administration of County scholarships and will considerably reduce paper work. As a collateral effect, these scholarships will now be continued strictly as University scholarships.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these changes were approved as recommended.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS AND DISPLACED PERSONS

(8) A number of American organizations have applied to the University for aid to foreign students and displaced persons. The Campus Chest, a student organization which raises funds for contributions to campaigns for charitable, health, and other welfare enterprises, has been active in aiding students and institutions of higher education in war-devastated countries. Some time ago I appointed a committee of students and members of the faculty, under the chairmanship of the Director of Admissions, who is also Chairman of the Committee on Special Undergraduate Scholarships, to review requests for aid and advice with (a) the Campus Chest, or (b) the University, on those which should be given serious consideration.

The Committee recommends that ten additional scholarships covering tuition, laboratory, library, and supply fee, and Illini Union Building service charge, be established for awards to displaced persons who desire to enroll in the University of Illinois as students and who meet the requirements for admission. The Committee has been advised by the student groups which have been active in this matter that:

1. The Campus Chest is willing to assume the travel expenses of ten displaced persons from the port of entry to Urbana.
2. Board and room accommodations have been found for ten such persons.
3. Various community organizations are being approached with a view toward supplying about \$210 a student to meet other necessary expenses.

If necessary a small amount can be assigned from the "President's Fund" in the Illini Achievement Fund.

It is the opinion of the Committee that it will be possible to provide complete living expenses for ten displaced persons. The students will be selected through the National Coordinating Council for the Placement of Displaced Students and through the American Fund for Czechoslovak Refugees, Inc. These organizations will give the University an opportunity to select from a number of candidates.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these scholarships were established as recommended.

GENERAL LABORATORY, LIBRARY, AND SUPPLY FEE FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(9) In December, 1942, the Board of Trustees (Minutes, page 207), authorized the establishment of a uniform laboratory, library, and supply fee to be charged students at Urbana-Champaign, replacing the former separate laboratory fees. The present laboratory, library, and supply fee is \$8.00 a semester. The Provost

as Chairman of the faculty Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommends this be extended to graduate students in the Chicago Professional Colleges. At present such graduate students are charged a laboratory fee of \$5.00 a unit of credit for laboratory courses. He recommends that this be replaced by a laboratory, library, and supply fee of \$5.50 a term to be charged all graduate students.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was adopted.

HONORARY DEGREES

(10) The University policy covering honorary degrees is based on a resolution of the Board of Trustees dated March 11, 1902. It is conservative, but it does not indicate the procedures that may be followed. I feel that the University should continue to be conservative on this matter, but that we should follow a systematic plan in bringing nominations before the Board.

Accordingly I appointed a committee to review the situation and also brought it to the attention of the University Senate, or general faculty, at its meeting on February 14, 1949. The committee made a report to the University Senate on April 4 and the Senate has recommended the following regulations in which I concur:

1. Honorary degrees may be conferred in recognition of eminent achievement in scholarship or of high distinction in public affairs.

2. There shall be a standing committee of the Senate through which all nominations shall be made, and the Senate shall vote on the names submitted to it.

3. Final action will be taken by the Board of Trustees. The degrees approved will be conferred by the President of the University, on behalf of the Board, at a regular commencement or special University celebration.

4. To receive the degree, the recipient must attend the ceremony in person. In recommending these regulations the Senate also passed the following resolution: "It is the sense of the University Senate that a conservative policy should be maintained in the conferring of honorary degrees."

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these regulations were adopted.

LEGAL SERVICES FOR STAFF HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

(11) The construction of staff houses in Urbana for rental to staff and for the research program of the Small Homes Council is to be financed in part by borrowing funds in the estimated amount of \$140,000. It appears that the best method of securing those funds would be through a revenue bond issue of the Board of Trustees. In such circumstances it is necessary that there be an approving opinion of independent counsel.

The Legal Counsel and the Comptroller recommend that the firm of Chapman and Cutler, attorneys of Chicago, be engaged for all necessary services in connection with this bond issue.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, this recommendation was adopted.

ANNEXATION TO THE CITY OF URBANA AND THE URBANA-CHAMPAIGN SANITARY DISTRICT OF STAFF HOUSING RESEARCH AREA

(12) It is proposed that the staff housing area at the corner of Florida Avenue and Race Street, Urbana, be annexed as parts of the City of Urbana and the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District.

The advantages to the University are (1) a lower fee for the connection to the utility service lines will probably result; (2) mail service will be extended to the houses, while otherwise occupants would have to go to rural delivery mail boxes at the corner of Florida Avenue and Race Street; (3) since the City of Urbana officials have indicated they desire to extend the city limits to include this area, cooperation on the part of the University would be good public relations.

There is now some confusion in relationship between the Urbana-Champaign

Sanitary District and the Saline Branch Drainage District in this area. Under a court action of February 8, 1949, by which lands within the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District were detached from the Saline Branch Drainage District, the area south of Florida Avenue and west of Race Street remained a part of the Saline District although not contiguous to its main area. It is suggested, therefore, that the University request the court to order detachment of the area from the Saline District and inclusion in the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District for storm drainage purposes. The University and the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District have previously entered into agreements under which the University has assumed its proportionate share of operating costs of the sewage disposal plant. The University has also assumed its proportionate share of improvements which will result in increased service to the University. Annexation of this area to the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District and removing it from jurisdiction of the Saline Branch Drainage District will, therefore, not result in increased costs or new obligations which the University would not otherwise contemplate assuming.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Coordinator of the Small Homes Council, the Legal Counsel, and the Comptroller recommend:

1. That the Board of Trustees petition the City of Urbana to extend the city limits to include the tract on which the staff houses will be built.

2. That the Board of Trustees petition the court to (a) remove the Saline Branch Drainage District jurisdiction over this area, and (b) include the housing tract in the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District.

I concur and request that the Legal Counsel be authorized to file the necessary petitions.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, these recommendations were adopted.

INSTALLATION OF WATER MAIN ON UNIVERSITY PROPERTY

(13) The Illinois Water Service Company proposes to extend a twenty-inch main across Illinois Field at the north end of the campus at Urbana-Champaign as part of the plan to provide the University with its entire water supply.

The Company will agree to install this main at a time which will not interfere with the normal use of Illinois Field. The Company further agrees to restore the property to a condition satisfactory to the University and to remove the main if in the future it would interfere with any University construction or campus development. The Company also assumes all the maintenance expense and any losses or damage to University property arising from construction work.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the Company be authorized to construct a water main subject to the conditions herein specified.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the necessary agreement with the Company.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were adopted.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS

The following items, numbered 14 to 29, were presented and considered together.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority to execute the contracts was given as recommended.

LIGHTING CONTRACT FOR AGRONOMY GREENHOUSE

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract in the amount of \$4,266 to the Square Deal Electric Company, LaPorte, Indiana, the lowest bidder, for the installation of force lights in the Agronomy Greenhouse Addition.

Funds are available in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for the Agronomy Greenhouse Addition.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

CONTRACT FOR REMODELING IN ROOM 406 DAVENPORT HALL

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, for the remodeling of 406 Davenport Hall at an estimated cost of \$6,000. Funds are available in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this purpose. The remodeling is to make the room available for the Department of Animal Science.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR EMERGENCY EXITS IN
TEMPORARY HOUSING BUILDINGS**

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract in the amount of \$8,993 to C. A. Petry and Sons, Champaign, the lowest bidder, for the installation of emergency fire doors in each second story unit of the two-story temporary housing buildings. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR PAINTING IN GALESBURG
UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION**

(17) The University is obligated under its lease of the former Mayo General Hospital buildings at Galesburg from the War Assets Administration to do certain maintenance work. Bids have recently been secured on exterior painting, caulking, and glazing of certain buildings. This work represents deferred maintenance which was scheduled by the Physical Plant Department following a survey made jointly with representatives of the War Assets Administration in December, 1948, and before the decision to close the Galesburg Division was made.

The Department of Public Welfare has requested the University to go ahead with this work since it represents maintenance chargeable to a period during which the buildings were occupied by the University. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract for \$18,749.92 to B. W. Anderson, of Galesburg, the lower bidder. Funds are available for this work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR ACOUSTICAL TREATMENT IN THE MEDICAL AND
DENTAL COLLEGE LABORATORIES BUILDING AT CHICAGO**

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,526 to the Airtite Insulation Company, Inc., Chicago, for acoustical treatment of Room 702 (a part of the Anatomy Laboratory) in the First Unit of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building. Funds for this work are available in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees on January 13, 1949, for equipment and improvements in the College of Medicine.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR GENERAL LIGHTING OF ANATOMY LABORATORY
AT CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES**

(19) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,354 to the Construction Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for general lighting installation in the Anatomy Laboratory in the First Unit of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building at Chicago. Funds for this work are available in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this purpose.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR FIRE ALARM SYSTEM IN MEDICAL AND DENTAL
COLLEGE LABORATORIES BUILDING AT CHICAGO**

(20) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$15,506 to the B-H Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of a new fire alarm system in the First Unit of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building and in the Research and Library Unit. Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget for this installation.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR LIGHTING OF LIBRARY ROOMS
AT CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES**

(21) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,118.75 to the Hyre Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for electrical work to improve the lighting in the library work rooms of the Chicago Professional Colleges. Funds have been appropriated by the Board of Trustees for this purpose.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR REMODELING IN RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL
HOSPITALS AT CHICAGO**

(22) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$4,287 to the C. W. Haynes Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for remodeling the Otolaryngology Laboratory of the Research and Educational Hospitals in Chicago. Funds have been appropriated by the Board of Trustees for this purpose.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR SIDEWALKS AND CURBS AT CHICAGO
PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES CAMPUS**

(23) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$5,240 to T. A. Rehnquist Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for construction of new sidewalks and curbs on the east side of Wood Street between Polk Street and the alley north of Taylor Street and on the south side of Polk Street from Wood Street to the alley.

Funds are available for this construction work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR REMODELING PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES AT
CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION**

(24) On November 19, 1948, the Board of Trustees appropriated \$35,000 for remodeling at Navy Pier to provide additional needed physical education facilities. On January 13, 1949, the Board approved a contract with E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company, Chicago, for \$12,833 for the first phase of remodeling (general construction work).

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$18,500 to the Mueller Construction Company, Chicago, the lower bidder, for the second phase of the remodeling (plumbing, electrical, and other mechanical installations).

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR SHOP LIGHTING AT CHICAGO
UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION**

(25) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$4,285 to the B-H Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder for electric lighting installations to replace temporary lighting in the Physical Plant Department Shops at Navy Pier.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR LAWN REPAIRS ON
TEMPORARY DORMITORY AREA**

(26) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that a contract in the amount of \$1,830 be awarded to Martin Ivey, Urbana, the lowest bidder, for repairing the lawn on the temporary dormitory area on the drill field. The lawn was damaged by excavation for installation of a fuel distribution system. Funds are available in the appropriation for temporary student housing.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

**CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL DUCT RUN AND NEW UNIT
SUBSTATION AT THE CHICAGO ILLINI UNION BUILDING**

(27) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$19,124 to George Swanson and Son, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for an electrical duct run and new unit substation at the Chicago Illini Union as a part of the utilities distribution system. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

**CONTRACT FOR ALTERATIONS TO ELECTRICAL RISERS AND
INSTALLATION OF SCRUBBING RECEPTACLES IN THE
RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS**

(28) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$8,508.37 to the Hyre Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder for alterations to three electrical risers and the installation of three polarized electrical receptacles in the Research and Educational Hospitals. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

CONTRACT WITH URBANA-CHAMPAIGN SANITARY DISTRICT

(29) On May 22, 1948, the Board of Trustees approved in principle a program for the construction of a relieving sanitary sewer from Gregory Drive and First Street to Third and Healey Streets in Champaign, to serve the temporary housing area. To expedite the improvement, the University was to construct the sewer and finance the entire cost.

On January 18, 1949, the Executive Committee of the Board approved the award of a contract for the construction of the sewer.

Details of the contract to be executed with the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District have now been completed. The contract provides:

1. The University will superintend the construction and assume the cost thereof.

2. The University will maintain that portion of the sewer which is located on University property.

3. The University will turn over to the District that portion of sewer not located on University property and the District will maintain this portion.

4. The District will make no further requests from the University for any financial contribution toward the cost of intercepting sewer additions completed by the District in the year 1948, and to which the University has already contributed part of its proportionate share of the cost.

5. The District will submit to the University all plans for future additions to that portion of the sewer turned over to the District. If the University objects to such addition, provision is made for arbitration of the differences.

6. The District guarantees that any sewage discharged through connections hereafter made by the District will not overload the sewer to the extent insufficient capacity will remain for sewage from present or future University buildings in the areas adjacent to this sewer.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that such a contract with the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District be approved.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR REPOWERING AND RELIGHTING PHYSICS BUILDING

(30) On November 19, 1948 (Minutes, page 174), the Board of Trustees appropriated funds for repowering and relighting the Physics Building. On March 10, 1949 (Minutes, page 294), the Board approved the award of contract for the installation of an improved primary service to this building.

Funds are also available in the original appropriation by the Board of Trustees for the remodeling, repowering, and relighting of Room 100c and for emergency service to the fourth floor of the Physics Building.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that this work be done by the contractors for the general building relighting and repowering as follows:

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute these additions to contracts.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these additions to contracts were authorized as recommended.

TERMINATION OF CONTRACT FOR TEMPORARY HOUSING UNITS AT GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(31) With the closing of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, the University will discontinue operating the temporary housing units under a contract with the Public Housing Administration of the United States. This agency has requested the Board of Trustees to adopt the following resolution:

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois executed Contract No. WS-5 (S-709) with the War Assets Administration for the property located at Galesburg, Illinois, and known formerly as the Mayo General Hospital, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois executed a contract with the Public Housing Administration on the 5th day of November, 1946, for the operation of certain housing units at the site of the former Mayo General Hospital, and

Whereas, the University of Illinois did notify the War Assets Administration on March 25, 1949, of their intention not to renew the lease for the Mayo General Hospital after September 30, 1949, and

Whereas, the need for the operation by the University of Illinois of the temporary housing units will no longer exist by reason of the termination of the lease for the former Mayo General Hospital,

Be It Therefore Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby terminates its contract with the Public Housing Administration as of June 30, 1949, subject to the surrender of possession of the various units as vacated by the tenants, but in no event later than September 20, 1949.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this resolution was adopted.

APPROVAL OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION APPROPRIATION

(32) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association appropriated from the reserve funds of the Association the sum of \$851 for the purpose of paying the Northern Trust Company the amount due for handling, during the year ending February 6, 1949, pension and insurance accounts for the Athletic Association.

Approval of this action by the Board of Trustees is required and I so recommend.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this action was approved as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR THE CHEMISTRY DEPARTMENT

(33) On March 10, 1949 (Minutes, page 300), the Board of Trustees on recommendation of the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures appropriated \$10,000 for equipment for the Chemistry Department. The Committee also recommended that the possibility of purchasing additional equipment from the appropriation for the new Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Building be considered.

This does not appear feasible and the Committee recommends an additional appropriation of \$6,260 from the general funds of the University with the understanding that if any balance remains in the appropriation for the building it will be applied toward equipment purchases.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Meyer.

PURCHASES

(34) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the following purchases. Unless otherwise specified, the purchase in each case is recommended on the basis of lowest bid (see Appendix, page 351).

On motion of Mr. Hickman, these purchases were authorized as recommended, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

DEPARTMENT OF DAIRY SCIENCE

(35) The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends that the name of the Department of Dairy Production be changed to the Department of Dairy Science.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this change was approved as recommended.

CHANGE IN NAME OF ENGINEERING HALL

(36) When Engineering Hall was built in 1894 it housed all of the Engineering departments, including Physics and Architecture. Since then other quarters have been provided for several of the departments and when the new engineering buildings now under construction are completed only the Department of Civil Engineering will have its office in Engineering Hall. The Dean's offices and the Library will remain in this building and the classrooms in it will, of course, be available to all Engineering departments.

The Dean of the College recommends that the name of the building be changed to "Civil Engineering Hall." The inscription "College of Engineering" which is cut in stone over the entrance will not be changed. Metal letters will be placed over the front entrance to designate the building.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this change was authorized as recommended.

(38) On March 30, 1949, on the basis of a memorandum prepared by Wilbur Schramm, Director of the Institute of Communications Research, we requested aid from the Rockefeller Foundation to conduct a seminar on educational radio at Robert Allerton Park in the summer of 1949 as follows:

On April 8 we received word from John Marshall, Associate Director of the Humanities of the Rockefeller Foundation, that the grant-in-aid in the sum of \$6,380 had been approved. I recommend acceptance of this grant with acknowledgment to the Rockefeller Foundation.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this grant was accepted with appreciation.

WORK AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

The three following items, numbered 39, 40, and 41, were presented and considered together. After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Hickman, these contracts were referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, with power to act.¹

PAINTING AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(39) Bids have been secured on exterior and interior painting of the Allerton House, Gate House, and the House in the Woods at Robert Allerton Park. Because of the uncertainty as to the exact amount of work required, bids have been secured on the basis of direct cost of labor and materials, plus a percentage for overhead. Materials would be provided at cost, as specified by the University. Standard insurance coverage would be required.

It is believed undesirable to award the contracts for both exterior and interior painting to the same person, since all contractors have a rather limited number of men available, and it is difficult for any one contractor to accept both contracts and complete them by the date desired, June 1, 1949.

The Office of Nonacademic Personnel has surveyed labor rates in Monticello and reports that there is no single uniform prevailing rate for this class of labor. The rates quoted by the various contractors are all within the ranges of the rates actually paid in this community.

The Director of Robert Allerton Park and the Comptroller recommend that contracts be awarded as follows:

For exterior painting, Emory Warner, Monticello, the lowest bidder, at \$1.50 an hour for labor

For interior painting, D. L. Okey, Mansfield, next lowest bidder, at \$1.75 an hour for labor

Materials as specified by the University to be furnished at cost; labor and material to be subject to a 10 per cent increase for overhead

The estimate for exterior painting is \$3,000 and interior painting, \$5,000. Funds to this extent are available in the income from the farm applicable to such expenditures. It is proposed to proceed with the work in the houses involved in the order of priority as listed above and carry out the work to such extent as is possible within these limits of total cost.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above contracts.

REMODELING AND REPAIRS AT ALLERTON HOUSE

(40) Bids have been received on remodeling and repairs at Allerton House, for work included in the special appropriation made by the Board on March 10, 1949, in accordance with plans prepared by the University Architect. It consists of remodeling the lower floor from a garage area into a kitchen and food storage area, remodeling the main floor to set up a serving room, and of installing toilets and heating facilities. It is hoped to install additional toilet facilities in the main part of the house and to make some alterations in what was formerly the service wing (in order to increase bedroom capacity) if funds permit. Because of the limitation of funds, the work has been arranged in an order of priority, starting with the kitchen, serving room, dining room, public toilet rooms, and going on to the remodeling in the other parts of the house. The work will be rounded off at the point where funds are exhausted. In order to proceed in this way bids were solicited on a cost plus basis.

Considering all factors, the best bid is listed by Bowman Hardware and Electric of Monticello. The Director of Allerton Park and the Comptroller recommend, after a review of the bids with the Physical Plant Department, that the contract be awarded to this firm at the cost of labor (as per schedule submitted) plus 10 per cent the cost of wholesale materials plus 20 per cent, and the cost of other materials plus 10 per cent, all subject to detailed audit by the University, with a maximum cost of \$35,000 for the work to be done. If the work desired can not be completed within this limit, a further report may be made to the Board and an additional appropriation proposed. All work will be supervised by the Consulting Engineer now serving on the Allerton project and by the University Architect's Office.

I concur and recommend approval.

REMODELING AND REPAIR OF HOUSES AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(41) At the present time there are two houses in Robert Allerton Park which are unoccupied and which need to be repaired and remodeled before they can be used. Both are without plumbing or electric wiring. One does not have a heating system and is in need of substantial repairs before it can be used.

The House in the Woods is to be used as one of the residences to be occupied by those attending conferences at Allerton. It has a heating system but does not have electric wiring or plumbing. It will have four bedrooms upstairs and four bedrooms downstairs. Two bathrooms are needed. In addition minor structural changes and wiring are required.

The other house, the gardener's house, on the south end of the property, across the river from Allerton House will be occupied by an employee's family thus giving us more space in the Gate House or in Allerton House itself for overnight guests. This house needs a heating system, bathroom and kitchen, plumbing, and wiring, as well as some major repairs.

Because the work is essentially remodeling, bids have been invited on a cost plus basis. The bids do not include heating, plumbing, or electrical work, for which later recommendations will have to be submitted.

The Director of Allerton Park and the Comptroller, after a review of the bids with the University Architect's Office, recommend that the firm of Hammer-schmidt Brothers of Monticello, whose unit rates are lowest, be given a contract

for the general repairs and alterations in these two houses in accordance with their proposal. This firm has done some minor work at Robert Allerton Park, and their work is of good character.

The estimate of all work at the House in the Woods is \$5,000 and at the gardener's house, \$7,000. Funds are available in the income from the farms which may be applied to these expenditures. There will be income from the use of both houses from which the outlay can gradually be recovered.

I concur and recommend approval.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(42) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

1. Cages for Animal Hospital at Chicago Professional Colleges. \$12 000
2. Remodeling third floor of Davenport House for the National Vocational Guidance Association..... 2 400

Total\$14 400

I concur.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK IN CONNECTION WITH REMODELING THIRD FLOOR OF ILLINI HALL FOR SPEECH LABORATORY

(43) A separate request has been submitted to the Board of Trustees by the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures for an appropriation of \$39,000 for the above remodeling.

The general work on this project in the amount of \$27,400 is of a remodeling character, and it is not feasible to attempt to secure fixed bids.

If the special appropriation is made available for this work, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the work be done by Lewis S. Colbert under the terms of his standing contract with the University for minor remodeling.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute the above addition to the standing contract with Lewis S. Colbert for minor remodeling.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Meyer.

CONTRACT FOR INTERIOR REMODELING AT THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(44) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$4,588 to Frank H. Stowell Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for interior building remodeling at the Chicago Professional Colleges to provide a new darkroom for development of photographic plates and films, additional quarters for the internal auditing division of the Business Office, and additional quarters for the Nonacademic Personnel Office. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, authority was given as recommended.

The condition of the obligation is such that:

Whereas, the above bounden IRVIN L. PORTER was on the 10th day of March, A.D. 1949, duly elected by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to the Office of Treasurer of the University of Illinois for a term of two years:

Now therefore, if the said IRVIN L. SCHOOL OF NURSING

In order to secure improved facilities for the education of nurses, to increase the number of students in process of education, and to effect a more economical use of space that is already available, thus obviating the need for the immediate construction of a residence for nurses and of a building for a School of Nursing, an affiliation between the University of Illinois School of Nursing and the Cook County School of Nursing is proposed, this affiliation to be supplemented by the hospital facilities of the University and of the Cook County Hospital, and by affiliation with the Presbyterian Hospital, St. Luke's Hospital, and such other hospitals as the scope of the program may require.

Aside from good educational policy, the immediate occasion for the proposed affiliation is as follows: Immediately adjacent to the Cook County Hospital and the University of Illinois Chicago Professional Colleges, there is an excellent Nurses Residence with 820 rooms. At the present time, 545 rooms are occupied by student nurses, staff members, and others. The remaining rooms in the number of 275 are vacant. The University of Illinois originally included in its capital budget for 1949-1951, a request for \$1,600,000 for a nurses residence. There is a proposal to request a further item in the 1951-1953 budget for a College or School of Nursing building. Good economy suggests an arrangement whereby existing facilities be used to the maximum before further construction is undertaken. The proposed affiliation would lead to this economy.

In order to effect the proposed affiliation, the following actions are necessary:

1. An agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the Board of Trustees of the Cook County School of Nursing which will provide for:

a. The appointment of qualified staff members, including if mutually agreeable, the Director or Dean of the Cook County School of Nursing, to the staff of the University of Illinois School of Nursing on a nonsalaried basis.

b. The distribution of student nurses for hospital instruction between the Cook County Hospital and the University of Illinois Hospitals (Research and Educational Hospitals) shall be made according to the ratio of the normal bed complement of the two hospitals which at present is approximately 3,400 for the former and 500 for the latter; i.e., according to the present number of beds 85 per cent of the student nurses in each class will receive hospital instruction at Cook County and 15 per cent at the University of Illinois.

c. The University will pay the Cook County School of Nursing for the meals (if taken) and room of those students (15 per cent of each class) who will receive hospital instruction at the University of Illinois Hospitals. (The present rate is \$30 a month for meals and \$35 a month for room.)

d. The University will reimburse the Cook County School of Nursing for the cost of instruction of 15 per cent of the student nurses in each class, the cost of instruction being calculated from the salary paid the teachers and the materials and supplies used in the laboratories and excluding any administrative overhead.

2. Recommendation by the Senate Committee on Educational Policy and approval by the University Senate and by the Board of Trustees to adopt in principle (a) the present student admission requirements and (b) the present curriculum of the Cook County School of Nursing.

3. Recommendation by the Senate Committee on Educational Policy and approval by the University Senate and by the Board of Trustees to authorize the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing on the completion of the curriculum.

4. Admission requirements (present requirements of the Cook County School of Nursing) for candidates for the course leading to the Diploma in Nursing and for the course leading to baccalaureate degree and the Diploma in Nursing.

a. Accreditation of high schools.

(1) Candidates for admission to the Cook County School of Nursing as graduates must be graduated from an accredited four-year high school or present equivalent educational preparation.

(2) Certificates in proper form are accepted from schools accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, New England College Admissions Board, North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Western Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York for college entrance requirement.

b. Subject requirements. Sixteen units of credit are required. Any one of the following patterns of the high school program is acceptable.

c. Average grade requirement. Emphasis is placed upon high scholastic attainments of applicants and selection is made from students ranking in the upper half of their classes and on the basis of information revealed by psychometric tests. It is expected that candidates have the ability to carry work on a college level.

5. Curriculum of Cook County School of Nursing. The curriculum is standard for all schools approved by the National League of Nursing Education. It consists of the usual amounts of basic science including anatomy, physiology, chemistry, microbiology, pharmacology, and the chemistry of nutrition, a substantial block of social science, and the principles of medicine and medical nursing. It is presently deficient in the humanities. The last year and a half consist of both didactic and practical work in nursing with increasing emphasis on nursing in the hospital and in the community and the techniques associated therewith.

The course can be completed in a period, varying from 28 to 36 months in length, depending upon the student's previous academic preparation.

6. Recommendation by the University Committee on Fees and Scholarships and approval by the Board of Trustees to adopt the present scale of fees of the Cook County School of Nursing. (Note: The Committee has already taken action to adopt this proposal in principle.)

7. It is understood that the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges may initiate, in consultation with the Dean or Director of the Schools of Nursing,

a. Recommendations for new staff members or replacements for the united schools;

b. Changes in curriculum;

c. Changes in fee schedules;

d. Effective methods of supervision of the courses of instruction; each of these items being subject to study and further action by the appropriate University agencies.

8. The agreements reached in these several respects shall hold for the biennium of 1949-1951 and are subject to review before the next biennial period.

9. The Senate Committee on Educational Policy will recommend the adoption in principle of the following pre-professional curriculum, admission requirements for which must meet the entrance requirements of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences general curriculum and the requirements for the respective courses in the curriculum:

Pre-professional courses as specified. A minimum of sixty semester hours as outlined below. No degree shall be granted unless the student qualifies for the State Board examination.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

May 21, 1949



The May meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, on Saturday, May 21, 1949, according to the following schedule:

10:00 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

11:30 a.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also Assistants to the President, A. J. Janata and Wilbur Schramm, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Provost C. R. Griffith, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during the open session, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information, and Senator E. R. Peters.

**CONTRACT FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL HOUSING
RESEARCH PROJECT**

The Secretary reported for record an action of the Executive Committee on May 17, 1949, awarding the contract for general work on the Small Homes Council Housing Research Project at Florida Avenue and Race Street to the Kuhne-Simmons Company, the lowest bidder, on the basis of the acceptance of Alternates 1, 2, and 6 in the bid schedule, providing for deductions totaling \$9,330, reducing the contract from \$406,000 to \$396,670. The Executive Committee also authorized further contract changes reducing construction costs by approximately \$4,000. The date for completion of the general work is October 15, 1949.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following recommendations of the President of the University.

STEAM HEATING PLANT FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(1) The building program requested by the University for 1949-1951 included \$26,210,000 for the Chicago Professional Colleges of which \$6,400,000 was for a steam generating plant and for additions to the utilities distribution system. The revised program based on the Governor's recommendation in his budget message to the 66th General Assembly totals \$21,000,000 of which \$15,400,000 is for the Chicago Professional Colleges, including \$1,500,000 for a steam generating plant and additions to the utilities distribution system. This is not enough for a new plant which is needed to service the present buildings plus those to be constructed in 1949-1951.

University officials have been carrying on negotiations with the Commonwealth Edison Company of Chicago to enlist its aid in providing this steam service. Commonwealth Edison has offered to do this and has prepared a contract the principal provisions of which are:

1. A new corporation to be called "The Medical Center Steam Company" is to be organized to provide central steam service to the University and to other institutions in the Medical Center District.

2. The contract will be between the Company and the University of Illinois; the University will make such subcontracts with other users as may be feasible and desirable.

3. The Company will construct the plant and distribution system according to plans and specifications approved by the University. All additions thereto will also be subject to University approval. The maximum investment, without further mutual consent, is to be \$10,000,000.

4. The construction of the plant will be financed to the fullest extent possible by a direct outside loan. (An insurance company has tentatively offered to finance 80 per cent of the investment at 3½ per cent interest.) Commonwealth Edison Company will provide the remainder of the funds needed.

5. The operations of the Medical Center Steam Company will be conducted by the Commonwealth Edison Company on a nonprofit basis. Commonwealth Edison will be reimbursed for management services not to exceed \$1,000 a month, plus indirect costs relating to such services. The University will participate in establishing operating policies.

6. Steam service rates will be based on the following costs and charges a month:

a. Interest: On the outside loan an amount sufficient to cover the interest payable; on funds supplied by Commonwealth Edison, 5 per cent plus income tax estimated at 3.06 per cent. These charges are to be based on current "depreciated investment" calculated monthly.

b. Depreciation charge: At 3 per cent per annum on the original cost of facilities until such facilities are completely amortized.

c. A general tax charge computed by deducting from the Company's charges for all taxes, any amount included for revenue taxes, in accordance with the Com-

pany's method of determining general tax accrual. Adjustments will be made for any variations from the estimates.

d. Operating expenses: A direct charge for all operating and maintenance expenses other than for fuel and ash removal, plus a steam charge calculated by adding to the cost for fuel burned the net cost of ash disposal.

e. Revenue tax charge: Any revenue taxes payable if such be assessed by the State or local governments.

7. The contract shall continue in force until such time as the Company's depreciation reserve for all facilities, other than facilities comprising working capital, becomes equal to the Company's investment in such facilities. Upon such termination the Company shall convey to the University all facilities and all inventories of operating and maintenance supplies provided the University pays the Company (a) all outstanding charges for steam service furnished including cost of discontinuing business with the Company, (b) the cost of the Company's inventories, (c) an amount equal to any redemption premium plus accrued interest the Company is required to pay on its indebtedness to others than Commonwealth Edison. The University, however, shall have the right to terminate the agreement at any time prior to its regular termination, on six months' written notice to the Company and on the purchase of the Company's equity in addition to the payment of costs previously specified. All obligations of the University shall be subject to constitutional and statutory limitations with respect to its expenditures.

The draft of the contract which is being submitted herewith is in substantially complete form but is subject to minor changes. There is also submitted a draft of the contract for use in subcontracting with other institutions desiring to purchase steam service.

I recommend approval of this program and the adoption of the attached resolution prepared by the Legal Counsel to authenticate this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this program was approved as recommended and the following resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby approve, in the form submitted to this meeting, the proposed agreement between Medical Center Steam Company, a corporation to be organized under the laws of Illinois, and this Board, providing for the construction by the Steam Company of a central steam plant and distribution system and the furnishing of steam service to the University, and through the University to other institutions located within the Medical Center District as defined in such agreement, all upon the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in such agreement; that upon the completion of the organization of the Steam Company the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board be and they hereby are authorized, empowered, and directed, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver such agreement in the form submitted to this meeting or with such changes in such form, not of substance, as may be approved by such officers, their approval of any such changes to be conclusively evidenced by their execution and delivery of such agreement; that upon the execution of such agreement by this Board and the Steam Company the proper officers or agents of this Board be and they hereby are authorized, empowered, and directed to do all such things as may be necessary to carry out and perform all of the obligations of this Board under such agreement; and that the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to file with the records of this meeting, properly identified, a copy of such agreement in the form submitted to this meeting, and also, if any changes shall be made in such agreement prior to the execution thereof, a copy of such agreement as executed and delivered by the parties thereto.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT ILLINOIS STREET AND MATHEWS AVENUE IN URBANA

(2) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures and the University Building Program Committee jointly recommend the purchase of the vacant lot at the southeast corner of the intersection of Illinois Street and Mathews Avenue in Urbana for the sum of \$25,000.

I concur in this recommendation. An appropriation of \$25,000 will be necessary.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

**PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT SIXTH AND JOHN STREETS
IN CHAMPAIGN**

(3) The Building Program Committee has recommended expansion of the Urbana-Champaign campus in the areas immediately surrounding the central part of the campus.

A property in this area at the corner of Sixth and John Streets has become available. It is described as "the north half of the west half of Block 13 in the James Wright Addition of the City of Champaign" and contains approximately 175 feet frontage on East John Street and 168 feet on South Sixth Street, a total area of 29,400 square feet. It was appraised recently by independent appraisers at \$80,000. It includes a large, though quite old, two-story house, which can be used immediately for administrative offices or rehousing of the Speech Clinic, and the property is very desirable for future expansion of the campus.

The owners have offered the property to the University for \$80,000 with an initial payment of \$23,500 on July 1, 1949, \$28,250 on July 1, 1950, and the final payment of \$28,250 on June 30, 1951, with interest at the rate of 4 per cent on the unpaid balance. The University would also have the right of prepayment in full at any time after January 1, 1950.

The Provost, the Comptroller, and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend that the purchase be made under the above terms. I concur and request an appropriation of \$24,000 to cover the initial payment due July 1, 1949, and incidental expenses.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, Mr. Nickell; absent, Mr. Hickman, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

Mr. Nickell stated in explanation of his negative vote, that he did not approve of paying interest on deferred payments.

**APPROPRIATIONS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS, 1949-1951**

(4) In revising the University's building program for 1949-1951, to reduce the total appropriation from the \$63,065,000 requested by the University to the \$21,000,000 total (\$15,400,000 for the Chicago Professional Colleges; \$5,600,000 for the Urbana-Champaign campus) recommended by the Governor in his biennial budget submitted to the 66th General Assembly, certain adjustments will be necessary.

The problems arising out of this limitation of funds were discussed with the Governor at the Board of Trustees meeting held in Springfield on April 21, 1949. Attention was called to the difficulties resulting from absence of funds for safety improvements and other necessary building remodeling. A problem of equal seriousness at Urbana-Champaign is a critical power shortage. Increased power plant capacity is necessary to meet additional demands resulting from completion of new buildings during the 1947-1949 biennium, the two major buildings to be constructed during 1949-1951, plus the increase in power demand resulting from normal growth of the University. The University now has three 3,000 kw. generators in the Abbott Power Plant and an old 500 kw. generator, which can be used in a limited way in case of an emergency, in the old power plant. It is necessary periodically to take one generator out of service for overhauling, so that the present firm electric capacity is 6,500 kw. The maximum coincident demand at present is 5,800 kw., and by September 1, 1949, it will be at least 7,900 kw. When the buildings to be constructed during 1949-1951 are "on the line" it is estimated that the maximum coincident demand will be 10,150 kw.

In recognition of this the Board of Trustees on June 15, 1948, authorized the purchase of a 7,500 kw. generator, cooling tower, and condenser at an estimated cost of \$1,300,000 to be constructed and paid for during the biennium of 1949-1951, contingent on the availability of funds. Since it takes a long time to secure delivery of this kind of equipment, the Board authorized placing the order early so that it would have a high priority. The allocation of only \$5,600,000 for buildings at Urbana, of which \$5,000,000 is for College of Veterinary Medicine and College of Agriculture buildings, does not include any money at all for additions to the power plant.

The \$15,400,000 building program for the Chicago Professional Colleges includes \$1,500,000 for additions to the old power plant and extensions of the utilities distribution system. It is not enough to build a new power plant which is needed. The Commonwealth Edison Company of Chicago has agreed to construct and operate a plant to provide steam heating service for the Chicago Professional Colleges (this service will also be available to other institutions in the Medical Center District) under a plan whereby the University will eventually acquire the plant. Commonwealth Edison will also construct the utilities distribution system. Consequently of the sum previously allocated for capital improvements in Chicago, \$1,300,000 could be released for other uses, and \$200,000 retained for electric distribution lines and remodeling. If the \$1,300,000 is allocated to Urbana-Champaign, funds will be provided for some of the safety improvements and other remodeling urgently needed and also for increasing the power production of the Abbott Power Plant. An additional 3,000 kw. generator and auxiliary equipment is necessary to provide the minimum power production capacity which will be needed by the end of the biennium of 1949-1951. This will not allow any excess for succeeding biennia.

I request that the Board of Trustees authorize the President of the University to make the necessary revisions in the allocations of funds for buildings and other capital improvements for the biennium of 1949-1951 within the total of \$21,000,000 which the Governor has recommended.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was granted as requested.

ILLINI UNION FOOD SERVICE AT UNIVERSITY CLUB IN URBANA

(5) On June 23, 1947, the Board authorized a contract with the University (Men's) Club in Urbana, whereby the University assumed responsibility for food service at the Club, through the Illini Union. Meals were to be served to members and nonmembers at the same price. It was understood that every effort would be made to operate the program on a self-supporting basis.

It has not been possible to accomplish this result. For the year 1947-1948, there was a net deficit of \$6,705.48. For the period September 1, 1948, to March 31, 1949 (the Club was not operated during the summer months), the deficit was \$8,388.03. These deficits have been absorbed by the Illini Union. They are without any charge having been made for the use or operation of the building, or for utilities other than those directly required in food service.

Some of the reasons for these deficits are stated as follows:

1. The gross volume of business has been considerably less than was anticipated when the arrangement was established.
2. Increasing food and labor costs have required higher meal prices and have reduced the total number of meals served.
3. Meal service requirements are irregular, with a rather large luncheon business but relatively small evening business.

A review of the entire situation indicates that the food service is urgently needed and that it would be impossible to absorb the present patronage of the University Club at the Illini Union Building. This is especially true at the noon luncheon. Food service at the Club is not limited to Club members but is available and is used by other faculty and staff personnel who are not members. Club members receive no special consideration in the food service.

Officers of the University Club urge that the operation of the food service at the Club be continued by the Illini Union as a service to University staff. It should be added that a considerable number of meetings of University organizations and visiting groups are held at the University Club and it would not be possible to find those facilities elsewhere on the campus.

The management of the Illini Union is willing to continue the responsibility for University Club food service but desires that the Board be advised that to do this means, based on an experience to date, a deficit from the University Club which must be absorbed in the Illini Union Building operations. The University pays the Illini Union a service charge for all members of the staff comparable to that charged to students.

In the meantime a survey will be undertaken to ascertain if the net costs may be reduced. In view of the all-University services involved, I recommend that a new contract be signed.

This report was received for record.

WAGES OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

President Stoddard reported that he had received, just before coming to this meeting, a communication from Mr. Sherdie C. Jones, of the Twin City Federation of Labor, requesting certain increases in the wages of nonacademic employees.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the President's Office for consideration and report.

OPEN SESSION

The Board convened in open session at 12:15 p.m.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

5. HALVOR O. HALVORSON, Professor of Bacteriology and Head of the Department, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$9,000.
6. JOHN L. HELLER, Professor of the Classics and Head of the Department, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$8,000.
7. ROBERT I. HULSIZER, JR., Assistant Professor of Physics, in the College of Engineering, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,200.
8. W. E. MARTIN, Assistant Professor of Education, in the Bureau of Research and Service, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,500.
9. S. MERYL ROSE, Associate Professor of Zoology, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,800.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the action of the President in making these appointments was confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE 1949 SUMMER SESSION STAFF

(1) I submit the budget for the 1949 Summer Session. It provides for an eight-week session at Urbana-Champaign and the Chicago Undergraduate Division (see Appendix, page 375).

Salaries of all members of the faculty who are recommended for appointments to the Summer Session staff are computed on the basis of two-ninths of the salary of the academic year for two months of summer service. This is in accordance with the terms of employment of the academic, administrative, research, and extension staffs authorized by the Board of Trustees on January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 952).

The budget totals \$528,106 for Urbana-Champaign, \$87,362 for the Chicago Undergraduate Division, and \$22,969 to be assigned by the Dean of the Summer Session in terms of enrollment demands.

I recommend that:

1. The appointments to the Summer Session staff and the allocation for unassigned salaries be approved as submitted.

2. All appointments for contracts for service during the Summer Session include a provision permitting reduction in time and salary or cancellation of the contract in the event that enrollment does not warrant continuation of the appointment on the basis originally recommended.

3. The President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments, including additional appointments and acceptance of resignations, as are necessary in accordance with the needs of the University.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were adopted, and authority was given as requested.

**INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS
ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

(3) The plan for the administrative organization of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations provides for an Advisory Committee composed of representatives in equal number of labor, employers, and the public, due regard being given to including both urban and rural interests. The first appointments in each group are to be made in terms of one, two, and three years respectively and appointments thereafter to be for three years. The first committee was appointed two years ago without any specification as to terms since it was on a trial basis. **RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS**

(4) The Governor has authorized the following release of funds from the appropriation made to the University of Illinois by the 65th General Assembly under Senate Bill 662, "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent, and distributive expenses of State government," which included appropriations totaling \$12,994,732 to the University for buildings and other capital improvements.

Release No. 519

From the item "For contingencies to cover expenditures for purposes for which the amount appropriated in any item above enumerated is or becomes insufficient (total appropriation, \$618,845).....\$15 000"

To augment Release No. 3 (July 22, 1947) in the amount of \$1,150,000 for the construction of a new Mechanical Engineering Building, and Release No. 351 (September 7, 1948) from contingencies in the amount of \$62,000, for the completion of the Mechanical Engineering Building.

I recommend that these funds be appropriated for the construction of the building.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

**CONTRACT FOR EMERGENCY LIGHTING OF MEDICAL
AND DENTAL COLLEGE LABORATORIES BUILDING**

(5) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$8,482 to the B-H Electric Company of Chicago for the installation of emergency lighting in the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building in Chicago.

Funds are budgeted to cover this work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

**ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR STEAM SERVICE TO
CHEMISTRY ANNEX**

(6) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,550 to the contract with L. H. Prentice Company, Chicago, for the installation of steam piping to the Chemistry Annex to provide for the construction of two new manholes and diversion of a sewer not specified in the original contract which was awarded by the Board of Trustees on June 15, 1948 (Minutes, page 1150). Funds are available.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as requested.

**REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE
ON AUTOMOBILE FLEET**

(7) Automobile insurance on the University fleet expires June 30, 1949. The Travelers Insurance Company, current insurance carriers of this risk, as they have been for the past two years, have indicated their desire to continue on this risk for another year.

Last year requests were submitted for quotations to sixty-eight mutual and stock insurance companies. Also advertisements were inserted in daily papers but only three insurance companies, including Travelers, the lowest bidder, submitted quotations.

Travelers requested for the year July 1, 1948, to July 1, 1949, and the governing bureau authorized, a deviation from manual rates of 50 per cent bodily injury and property damage and a fixed fleet plan reduction of 20 per cent.

Travelers anticipate authorization for 1949-1950 by the governing bureau of a deviation from manual rates of 55 per cent bodily injury and property damage and a fixed fleet plan reduction of 20 per cent. On this basis the anticipated cost of automobile public liability and property damage insurance with \$25/50,000 bodily injury limits and \$5,000 property damage limits would be \$3,500 (estimated) for the policy year beginning July 1, 1949. Funds are provided in the Physical Plant Department budget.

The Comptroller has recommended that this insurance be renewed with the Travelers Indemnity Insurance Company for another year effective July 1, 1949, on the basis of their proposal outlined herein, in which they would allow a 55 per cent reduction from manual rates plus an additional 20 per cent fleet discount.

The Finance Committee recommends approval.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the Comptroller's office and the Finance Committee to secure additional bids.

REPORT OF TOTAL AMOUNTS OF STANDING CONTRACTS FOR MINOR IMPROVEMENTS

(8) The Board of Trustees at the April meeting requested a report of total contracts let under these general standing contracts since July 1, 1948. That report is as follows, for the period July 1, 1948, to May 1, 1949:

CONTRACT FOR HEATING AND VENTILATING IN ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(9) The heating and ventilating installations in the Electrical Engineering Building were by Carson-Payson Company, Danville, under a cost plus a fixed fee contract authorized by the Board of Trustees on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 228). The maximum estimated cost was \$176,954. The Comptroller has reported that due to increased labor rates and material costs, the total cost of the heating and ventilating installations under this contract will be \$194,471.45. The fixed fee of this contract, which is included in the total cost, is \$19,661. This compares favorably with the lowest lump sum bid of \$223,000 received at the time the contract was awarded.

This report was received for record.

FEES FOR EXAMINATIONS IN HIGH-SCHOOL AND COLLEGE SUBJECTS

(10) As a service to the State Board of Law Examiners the University offers examinations in high-school and college subjects to candidates who wish to qualify for the study of law and eventually for admission to the Bar examinations. Fees are charged to cover the cost of this service. From time to time changes have been made in the fees whenever necessary in order to meet expenditures. The present schedule of fees established by the Board of Trustees on March 10, 1942, is as follows:

High-school subjects.....	\$ 75 per half unit of credit
College subjects.....	2 00 per subject

For the past two years these fees have not covered expenses and it has been

necessary to use part of the small surplus previously accumulated. The Director of Admissions recommends the following rates in this schedule effective July 1, 1949:

High-school subjects.....\$1 25 per half unit of credit
College subjects..... 2 50 per subject

On the basis of the present number of individuals taking the examinations, the schedule of fees proposed would produce an income of about \$19,000 a year and the expense of giving the examinations is about \$17,000 a year. Thus the fees proposed include a safety factor to allow for shrinkage in the number of examination applicants and for possible increase in expenditures not now anticipated.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these rates were approved as recommended.

PURCHASES

(11) There are submitted reports of (A) emergency purchases authorized and of (B) purchases recommended (see Appendix, page 392).

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed, and the purchases recommended were authorized.

GRANT OF FUNDS FOR SEMINAR ON THE ATLANTIC PACT

(12) At the meeting of the Board on April 21, 1949, I reported informally that the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace was considering a grant of funds to the University toward the expenses of a seminar on the Atlantic Pact to be held at Allerton Park during the summer of 1949. I am pleased to report that a grant of \$2,000 has been offered and has been accepted. The seminar will be conducted by the Institute of Government and Public Affairs, July 13-16.

I request that the Board of Trustees, through its Secretary, express to Dr. James T. Shotwell, Acting President of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, an official recognition of this grant.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the Secretary was instructed to send such expression to the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

DEPARTMENT OF BACTERIOLOGY IN THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

(13) The Dean of the College of Medicine and the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommend that the name of the Department of Bacteriology and Public Health in the College of Medicine be changed to the Department of Bacteriology.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change was made as recommended.

NAMING OF NEW UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS

(14) I recommend that the new University buildings recently completed or now under construction at Urbana-Champaign be named as follows:

Electrical Engineering Building
Mechanical Engineering Building
East Chemistry Building
Lincoln Avenue Residence

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these names of buildings were approved.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(15) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from April 11 to May 10, 1949 (see Appendix, page 395).

(16) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of March 31, 1949. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO FINANCING STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENT BUILDING IN URBANA

(17) On July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 9), the Board accepted an offer from Salk, Ward, and Salk, Inc., Chicago, for a loan of \$900,000 partially to finance the construction of the Student and Staff Apartment project in Urbana. Salk, Ward, and Salk has placed the loan with the Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America whose attorneys request that the Board of Trustees adopt the attached formal resolution.

The Comptroller and the Legal Counsel recommend the adoption of the resolution (see Appendix, page 395).

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this resolution was adopted as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR RE-ROOFING ADMINISTRATION BUILDING (WEST)

(18) The following bids have been received for the re-roofing (using the present tile) of the Administration Building (West):

H. Reuter Company, Kankakee.....	\$11 452
J. L. Kingston, Bloomington.....	7 935

This building was constructed in 1915 and has been in service thirty-four years. Due to roof deterioration there is danger of the tile shingles sliding off.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract for \$7,935 to J. L. Kingston of Bloomington, the lower bidder.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget for this work. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

RECOMMENDATIONS RELATING TO PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(19) The following discoveries which are potentially patentable have been reported to the President of the University:

1. The invention of an atomizing nozzle by Mr. E. H. Conroy, Jr., a graduate student. He developed certain principles of nozzle design which appear to be novel and worth while, in connection with his research work for the Ph.D. degree on the combustion of sulfur. This research work is supported by the Texas Gulf Sulphur Company.

Both the Company and the University are interested in making the discovery of the greatest use to the public, that is, to the users of sulfur. The Company desires that the new discovery be made available through non-exclusive royalty free licenses.

2. The invention of an electronic X-ray film contrast enhancer by Messrs. J. S. Garvin, C. W. Goodwin, and S. N. Stein of the College of Medicine. It is the judgment of the University Research Board that this device has a field of usefulness but requires considerable development and is not likely to bring commercial possibilities attractive enough to justify securing patent coverage at the expense of the University.

3. A new method of synthesizing the intermediate products from which chloromycetin is developed: A process of preparing a new antibiotic by Professor Herbert E. Carter of the Department of Chemistry, Assistant Professor David Gottlieb of the Department of Horticulture, and Mr. P. K. Bhattacharyya, a graduate student in chemistry, while engaged in research work on antibiotics sponsored by Abbott Laboratories, Eli Lilly and Company, and the Upjohn Company.

The University Research Board recommends that these discoveries be released to the discoverers as agents of the University of Illinois Foundation.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these patents were released as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR PARKING LOTS AND SIDEWALKS

(20) Bids have been taken for the construction of parking lots and sidewalks in the areas indicated in the accompanying schedule. The parking lot bids were taken on hot-mix asphalt surfacing specifications (such as is usually used on public streets). Alternate bids were also invited on a cold-plant mix surfacing and a crushed rock surfacing with an asphalt binder, both of which are inferior to the hot-mix asphalt. The bids on the two alternates were not sufficiently lower to merit consideration and are therefore not shown.

All contractors known to be interested were invited to bid on the sidewalk construction but only one qualified bid was received, from Lynne Meyer, Urbana.

Funds are available for the construction of parking lots and sidewalks, the source of the funds being indicated in the bid schedule.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of contracts to the lowest bidders as follows:

For parking lots, Champaign Asphalt Company, Champaign.....	\$35 355 00
For sidewalks, Lynne Meyer, Urbana.....	7 608 50

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the contract for parking lots was awarded as recommended; the matter of the construction of sidewalks was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, to secure new bids and to award the contract.

INCREASE IN CONTRACT FOR BUILDING ALTERATIONS IN RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(21) On January 13, 1949 (Minutes, page 211), the Board of Trustees authorized a contract with E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company, Chicago, for building alterations in the Research and Educational Hospitals to provide additional and improved quarters for the Department of Physical Medicine. On recommendation of the Head of the Department, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend a change in this contract to include the installation of a ventilation system and to provide for the future installation of air conditioning in the hydrotherapeutic quarters. The design of these installations had not been completed when the contract was awarded and it was let without this work to expedite the remodeling. The change will require an addition of \$3,376.80. Funds are available for this increase in the appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this work.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR PNEUMATIC TUBE SYSTEM IN PHYSICAL MEDICINE ADDITION

(22) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$1,500 to Kelly Systems, Inc., Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of a four-inch pneumatic tube system in the Research and Educational Hospital quarters which are being remodeled for the Department of Physical Medicine. The tube system is for transmission of records of patients and other documents.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on April 21, I presented three recommendations for the awards of contracts for remodeling, repairs, and painting of houses at Robert Allerton Park, including the main house, Gate House, and two other houses in the Park. Copies of the recommendations are enclosed.

In view of questions raised by Mr. R. G. Soderstrom, President of the Illinois State Federation of Labor, and Mr. Fern R. Rauch, Assistant Director of the State Department of Labor (copies of their telegrams are also enclosed) concerning the rates of wages to be paid for this work, the Board deferred action on the awards of the contracts and referred them to your Committee with power to act.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel and the Legal Counsel have reviewed this matter and have submitted a report which I am transmitting herewith.

I am sending you a memorandum concerning craft jurisdiction and determination of wage rates which was drawn up by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Chairman of the Nonacademic Personnel Advisory Committee on the basis of a conference between representatives of the University and of labor unions. I approved this memorandum on April 19, 1949 (Please note this was before any questions had been raised regarding the award of contracts at Allerton Park.) as a basis for wage agreements and work assignments until further notice.

The evidence indicates that:

1. There are no "prevailing rates" established in Monticello and Piatt County by agreements between labor organizations and employers.
2. The rates of pay which the contractors who bid on the remodeling, repairs, and painting at Robert Allerton Park propose to pay to their craftsmen are the same rates they are paying for other work on public jobs.
3. The contractors in Monticello do not employ union labor as a general practice nor do they employ non-union labor exclusively. On occasions they have employed union labor. Union labor is brought in for special work on bridges, tanks, and pipe lines.

The issues finally boiled down to one: Has a prevailing rate of wages for the work to be done under the proposed contracts been established in Monticello?

It is my judgment, in which the University representatives concur, that this question must be answered in the negative. A prevailing rate could not therefore be specified in the proposed contracts. If labor representatives or other citizens believe otherwise it is their privilege to bring the matter into court, following the procedure given in the statutes. Should a judge rule against the University in this matter, I should recommend that the University, in accepting such a decision, apply it to the beginning hour of all work in the contracts.

I feel that there is nothing to be gained by further delay, and I therefore recommend that the contracts for work at Allerton Park as submitted to the Board of Trustees on April 21st be approved.

Whereas, the General Assembly of Illinois has appropriated by Senate Bill No. 662 the sum of \$400,000 for the construction of graduate student and staff apartments at Urbana, Illinois; and

Whereas, the General Assembly has appropriated in said Bill additional sums for the equipment of buildings and contingencies from which the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has allocated the sum of \$251,700 for staff hous-
ing; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois owns the property described as follows:

Situated in the State of Illinois, County of Champaign, and City of Urbana, in the west half of the North East Quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of the North East Quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (S 18) in Township Nineteen North (T19N), Range Nine East (R9E) of the Third Principal Meridian (3rd PM) and being known as parts of Lots Eleven (11) and Twelve (12) of W. M. Goodwin's Addition to the City of Urbana as recorded in Deed Book Twenty-four (24), Page Five Hundred Eighty-two (582), of the records of said County and being more fully bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at an iron pin at the intersection of the east line of Goodwin Avenue and the south line of Green Street as now located; thence easterly along the south line of Green Street, a distance of One Hundred (100) feet to an iron pin; thence southerly along a line parallel to the east line of Goodwin Avenue, a distance of One Hundred Seventy (170) feet to an iron pin; thence easterly at Ninety Degrees (90°) to the preceding course, a distance of Ninety-nine (99) feet to an iron pin; thence southerly along a line parallel to Goodwin Avenue and at Ninety Degrees (90°) to the preceding course, a distance of One Hundred Sixty-four and Thirteen Hundredths (164.13) feet to an iron pin; thence westerly One Hundred Ninety-nine (199) feet to an iron pin in the east line of Goodwin Avenue; thence northerly along the east line of Goodwin Avenue, a distance of Three Hundred Thirty-two and Eight Tenths (332.8) feet to the place of beginning, containing One and One Hundred Thirty-four Thousandths (1.134) acres more or less, but subject to all legal highways; and has determined to use said property as a site for graduate student and staff housing apartment buildings for which said sums were appropriated and allocated; and

Whereas, plans and specifications for the construction of a six-story apartment building and a three-story apartment building on said premises have been drawn and prepared by Skidmore, Owings & Merrill of Chicago; and

Whereas, bids for the construction of such project were received from bidders and opened by the University on July 7, 1948; and

Whereas, such bids revealed that it would be necessary to borrow \$900,000 in addition to said appropriations to complete the project; and

Whereas, Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., submitted a financing proposal for a loan in the sum of \$900,000 under date of July 15, 1948, and said proposal was accepted by the Board of Trustees on July 21, 1948; and

Whereas, Modern Woodmen of America, an Illinois corporation, and Royal Neighbors of America, an Illinois corporation, have succeeded to the rights and assumed the obligations of Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., in connection with said financing arrangements; and

Whereas, said Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America are not to be obligated to purchase the bonds evidencing such loan hereinafter referred to, until construction is completed; and

Whereas, it is necessary to obtain interim loans up to \$900,000 principal to complete construction and equipping of said buildings, and arrangements have been made with the First National Bank of Chicago for the making of such interim loans to the University of Illinois Foundation as trustee; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees has determined, in order to obtain said loan to aid in the acquiring, constructing, and equipping of said buildings, to create a trust with the University of Illinois Foundation as active Trustee, and convey said real estate to the Foundation as active Trustee, to be held in trust under the terms of a trust agreement to be known as "University of Illinois Student-Staff Apartment Buildings Trust—Urbana Campus," all pursuant to "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to create trusts, to convey property in trust, to enter into trust agreements providing the powers and duties of the trustee and providing for the issuance of bonds by such a trustee and providing for the payment and securing thereof; to enter into year to year or other leases, to pledge for the performance of its obligations under such leases certain receipts and collections which the board is authorized by 'An Act to amend section 6 of 'An Act in relation to state finance,' approved June 10, 1919, as amended,' approved July 11, 1935, to retain in its own treasury, and to enter into covenants

with the United States or any agency thereof and to take other action for the purpose of obtaining grants from the United States to aid in financing the construction and equipping of university, college or educational buildings on which said board shall be given a year to year or other lease or the privilege thereto. (Filed March 20, 1936, L. 1935-36, First Sp. Sess., p. 179.)" As amended by Act approved July 11, 1939, House Bill 784 and other applicable statutes (herein sometimes called "the Enabling Acts"); and

Whereas, there has been submitted to the Board of Trustees a proposed form of Loan Agreement to be dated June 15, 1949, between the University of Illinois Foundation, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America, and a proposed form of deed in trust under which title to said real estate would be conveyed to the Foundation as active Trustee, and a proposed form of trust agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois Foundation, being the trust agreement above referred to, with a proposed form of trust indenture and a proposed form of operating lease attached to and incorporated in said form of trust agreement, all to be dated June 15, 1949 (a copy of said Loan Agreement and proposed deed in trust and trust agreement with exhibits attached being attached to and incorporated in the minutes of this meeting); and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are authorized and empowered by virtue of the Enabling Acts to create said trust and convey said property in trust to the University of Illinois Foundation and execute and deliver said trust agreement (and thereby empower the Foundation as active Trustee, to make interim loans and execute its notes evidencing the same and its bonds in the principal sum of \$900,000, as provided in said form of trust indenture, and to execute said trust indenture to Harris Trust and Savings Bank as Trustee, securing the payment of said bonds), and to enter into an operating lease with the University of Illinois Foundation in the form attached to and incorporated in the minutes of this meeting;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois does hereby authorize and empower the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees to execute and deliver, for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a Loan Agreement to be dated June 15, 1949, with the University of Illinois Foundation, Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America, providing among other things:

(1) For the issuance of bonds of the University of Illinois Foundation individually and as such trustee, in the principal sum of \$900,000, with interest at 4 per cent per annum, interest only until January 1, 1950, payable on January 1, 1950, and principal and interest from January 1, 1950, payable in equal quarterly installments of \$14,285 commencing on April 1, 1950, with a final installment payable on October 1, 1973, with privilege to prepay, not to exceed \$90,000 in any mortgage year, and with privilege to redeem in full on or after the 20th installment date at 102 and on or after the 39th installment date at 101;

(2) For the execution and delivery by the Foundation as active Trustee of a trust indenture substantially in the form attached to said Loan Agreement, to Harris Trust and Savings Bank, an Illinois corporation having its principal office in Chicago, Illinois, as "Bondholders' Trustee," providing the rights and powers of such Bondholders' Trustee and of the bondholders, not including, however, the right to forfeit or obtain title to the project through foreclosure proceedings, or otherwise, but conferring upon the Bondholders' Trustee the powers authorized to be conferred upon such Trustee by the terms of the Enabling Acts;

(3) In the event the bonds have not been delivered to Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America and the project completed by October 1, 1949, for the payment by the Foundation of a standby fee in the form of interest on \$900,000 at 4 per cent per annum from October 1, 1949, until such delivery of the bonds;

(4) Such other terms and provisions, including such changes or amendments thereto, as the board of directors of said University of Illinois Foundation (or as any officers of the University of Illinois Foundation to whom the board of directors may delegate appropriate authority in that regard) shall deem necessary or advisable to effectuate and carry out such financing program;

and that said Officers be and they are hereby authorized and directed to carry out, perform, and consummate all of the terms and provisions of said Loan Agreement;

Be It Further Resolved, that the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and they are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions and to execute all documents necessary to create said trust with the University of Illinois Foundation as active Trustee, for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, and equipping said buildings and of obtaining a loan from Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., in the sum of \$900,000 for such purpose, such actions to include, but not be limited to, the following acts herein specifically set forth:

1. That the said Officers of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and they are hereby authorized to execute and deliver a deed in trust conveying the aforesaid real estate to the University of Illinois Foundation as active Trustee, and to execute a trust agreement with the University of Illinois Foundation as active Trustee, all in the form attached to and incorporated in the minutes of this meeting.

2. That said University of Illinois Foundation, individually and as such trustee, be and it is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute and deliver said Bonds, Trust Indenture, Steam Agreement and such other papers and documents as the directors of said Foundation (or as any officers of the University of Illinois Foundation to whom the Board of Directors may delegate appropriate authority in that regard) may deem necessary or advisable in order to effectuate the creation and execution of said trust and the consummation of said financing program.

3. That said University of Illinois Foundation, individually and as such trustee, be and it is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to borrow from the First National Bank of Chicago sums of money not to exceed \$900,000 principal amount for such times and upon such terms as the board of directors of said Foundation (or as any officers of the University of Illinois Foundation to whom the board of directors may delegate appropriate authority in that regard) shall determine and, to evidence said loans, to execute and deliver on behalf of and in the name of the Foundation, individually and as such trustee, notes therefor, and to pledge as security for said loans the \$900,000 principal amount of 4 per cent Revenue Bonds to be issued under and secured by the Trust Indenture described in said Loan Agreement and to do all acts and things necessary or desirable and to execute such further documents as may be required by said the First National Bank of Chicago in connection with said loans.

4. That the said Officers of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute an operating lease substantially in the form attached to said form of trust agreement from the University of Illinois Foundation as trustee at a fixed quarterly rental sufficient to provide funds necessary for payments of interest, principal, and other charges under said trust indenture, said lease to include consent to the assignment in said Trust Indenture by the Foundation to said Bondholders' Trustee of said operating lease and said lease to contain the agreement of the University of Illinois that its rights under said operating lease shall at all times be subordinate and inferior to the lien of said trust indenture and subject to the provisions thereof;

5. That the said Officers of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute a steam agreement with the University of Illinois Foundation for the furnishing by the University of Illinois to said project of live steam at cost so long as facilities for furnishing such steam are maintained by the University of Illinois.

Be It Further Resolved:

1. That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and they are hereby authorized, empowered, and directed for and in behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to execute an assignment to the University of Illinois Foundation as such trustee, in respect of the construction contracts with various contractors covering the erection upon said premises of the projects herein referred to, upon securing from said Foundation the assumption and agreement of said Foundation as such trustee, to perform all of the rights, duties, and obligations of said Board of Trustees under said contracts;

2. That said Foundation as such trustee be and it is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to do and perform any and all acts and things necessary to complete and equip said buildings;

3. That all funds now on hand out of said \$400,000 appropriation and out of said allocation of \$251,700 hereinabove referred to shall be made available to said Foundation for the cost of construction and furnishings and used toward or reserved and set aside for such purposes before any of the proceeds of said interim financing or sale of Bonds shall be so used;

Provided, However, that the obligations created by these resolutions or under leases, trust agreements, or otherwise incurred by the Board of Trustees in connection with said project, shall not be a debt of the State of Illinois, and the State shall not be liable thereon; and

Provided Further, that the notes, bonds, and other obligations of the University of Illinois Foundation in connection with said project shall not be a debt of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois or the State of Illinois, and neither the Board nor the State shall be liable thereon; and

Provided Further, that, wherever reference is made in any of these resolutions to Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America, such reference may include either or both of said corporations.

STUDENT-STAFF APARTMENT BUILDINGS

The minutes of this meeting of May 21, 1949 (page 369), contain the record of the action of the Board adopting a resolution (page 395) authorizing the loan agreement for the Student-Staff Apartment Buildings.

The documents are incorporated in the minutes by means of the following notation:

Exhibits 1, 2, A, B, and 3 referred to in the Loan Agreement are, hereby, incorporated in the minutes by reference. These exhibits in printed form are bound with a printed form of the Loan Agreement, which has been marked on the title page thereof with the following legend written with pen and ink:

"This document, with attached exhibits, has been incorporated in the minutes of the Board of Trustees at its May 21, 1949, meeting by reference, appearing in the minutes at page 400," and the same are filed in the office of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois under the rubric "Student-Staff Apartments," this file being arranged alphabetically.

Loan Agreement

THIS AGREEMENT made June 15, 1949, by and between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a duly organized and existing public corporation of the State of Illinois, party of the first part, hereinafter called "University of Illinois",

University of Illinois Foundation, a duly organized and existing non-profit corporation of the State of Illinois, party of the second part, hereinafter called "Foundation", and

Modern Woodmen of America, an Illinois corporation having its principal place of business in the City of Rock Island, Illinois, party of the third part,

Royal Neighbors of America, an Illinois corporation having its principal place of business in the City of Rock Island, Illinois, party of the fourth part (said party of the third part and party of the fourth part being hereinafter sometimes collectively called "Lender"),

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, the General Assembly of Illinois has appropriated by Senate Bill No. 662 the sum of \$400,000 for the construction of graduate student and staff apartments at Urbana, Illinois; and

Whereas, the General Assembly of Illinois has appropriated in said Bill additional sums for the equipment of buildings and contingencies, from which the University of Illinois has allocated the sum of \$251,700 for staff housing; and

Whereas, the University of Illinois is now constructing on real estate located at the southwest corner of Green Street and Goodwin Avenue, Urbana, Illinois, a six-story apartment building and a three-story apartment building, to be used for graduate student and staff apartments in accordance with said appropriations, said buildings being in accordance with plans and specifications drawn and prepared by Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, of Chicago, which plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the Lender; and

Whereas, it will be necessary to borrow the sum of \$900,000 to complete said project; and

Whereas, a financing proposal for a loan in the sum of \$900,000 for such purposes was heretofore submitted by Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., to the University of Illinois under date of July 15, 1948, and was accepted by the University of Illinois on July 21, 1948, the original terms of said loan being set forth in a letter of July 24, 1948, from Lloyd Morey, Comptroller of the University of Illinois, to Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., to which letter express reference is hereby made; and

Whereas, since July 24, 1948, the Lender has succeeded to the rights and assumed the obligations of Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., in connection with said financing

proposal and the parties have agreed upon certain changes in the method of financing, which changes have been approved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, the Board of Directors of the University of Illinois Foundation, and by the Lender, and the parties desire to reduce their agreement to writing;

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, the parties do hereby agree as follows:

1. The recitals herein contained are expressly made a part of this agreement.
2. All prior agreements between the parties are merged in this agreement.
3. The University of Illinois agrees forthwith to convey the real estate upon which the project will be located, by Deed in Trust in the form hereto attached and marked "Exhibit 1", pursuant to an Active Trust Agreement in the form hereto attached and marked "Exhibit 2", which Active Trust Agreement the University of Illinois and the Foundation hereby agree they will execute and deliver, all in accordance with the power and authority vested in the University of Illinois under and by virtue of the provisions of the statutes of the State of Illinois contained in Sections 68 to 70, inclusive, of Chapter 144 of Illinois Revised Statutes 1947.
4. The Foundation agrees forthwith to execute and deliver a Trust Indenture in the form attached to said Trust Agreement and marked "Exhibit A", and record the same in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds of Champaign County, Illinois, and concurrently to execute and deliver its 4% Revenue Bonds in accordance with the provisions of said Trust Indenture, said Trust Indenture and Bonds to be issued in pursuance of said statute of the State of Illinois.
5. The University of Illinois and the Foundation agree concurrently with the execution of said Trust Indenture, but subject thereto, to execute and deliver a Lease in the form attached to said Trust Agreement and marked "Exhibit B".
6. The University of Illinois and the Foundation agree, forthwith, to execute and deliver a Steam Agreement in the form hereto attached and marked "Exhibit 3" and to join in the execution and delivery of any supplemental Trust Indenture which the Lender may reasonably require, in order that the Bondholders' Trustee and bondholders under the Indenture may have the benefit of and enforce such Steam Agreement against the University of Illinois, to the extent that the same may be lawful.
7. The Foundation agrees prior to the disbursement of the loan to procure from Chicago Title & Trust Company and deliver to the Lender a preliminary report on title showing that Chicago Title & Trust Company is prepared to issue its owner's guarantee policy in the usual form for \$100,000 guaranteeing that the Foundation, as Trustee, is vested with fee simple title to such real estate, subject only to usual stock objections. Said preliminary report on title may also contain such other objections as counsel for the Lender may approve.
8. The University of Illinois and the Foundation agree that they will cause said improvements to be substantially completed and ready for occupancy, with reasonable dispatch and not later than June 30, 1950.
9. The Foundation has arranged to borrow, individually and as such trustee, funds from the First National Bank of Chicago, a national banking association (hereinafter called "First National") which funds will be used to defray a portion of the cost of constructing and equipping said buildings. The University of Illinois agrees that said sums of \$400,000 and \$251,700 appropriated by the General Assembly of Illinois shall be fully disbursed and used toward or reserved and set aside for the cost of construction and furnishings before any of the proceeds of said interim financing or sale of Bonds hereunder shall be so used.
10. Upon compliance by the University of Illinois and the Foundation with the foregoing provisions of this agreement and with the terms and provisions hereinafter set forth, the Lender agrees to purchase from the Foundation, at par, the Bonds of the Foundation individually and as such trustee issued pursuant to and secured by said Trust Indenture in the amount of \$900,000 (the purchase of said Bonds being herein sometimes referred to as "disbursement of the loan"). Anything herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding, it is expressly understood and agreed that Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America shall each be severally obligated to purchase bonds in the amount of \$450,000, and that neither of said parties shall be answerable or liable for the default of the other. The option to terminate this agreement contained in paragraph

16 hereof may be exercised by either or both of Modern Woodmen of America and Royal Neighbors of America, and such exercise by either one of said parties shall terminate this agreement with respect to both of said parties.

11. Upon execution of the Bonds the Foundation shall deliver the same to Harris Trust and Savings Bank, as Trustee under said Indenture, for certification, with instructions: (a) to notify the Lender when said Bonds have been certified; and (b) to deliver said Bonds to First National to be held by First National as collateral security for the interim loans to be made by First National to the Foundation, individually and as such trustee. The Foundation will authorize First National to deliver said Bonds to the Lender upon receipt by First National from the Lender of a certified or cashier's check drawn on a bank or trust company having its principal office in Chicago, Illinois, having a capital and surplus of at least \$1,000,000, payable to the order of the First National for such amount, not exceeding the purchase price of the Bonds, as First National shall certify to the Lender as owing to it, on such interim loans, including fees for supervising interim loan payouts, and a similar check for the balance, if any, of the purchase price of the Bonds, in accordance with this agreement, payable to the order of the Foundation as such trustee. The Lender shall not be obligated to disburse the loan and purchase the Bonds, however, until ten (10) days after written notice from First National that the Bonds are ready for delivery and until the conditions in paragraph 12 hereof set forth have been complied with. At the time of disbursement of the loan there shall be added to the unpaid principal of the Bonds and paid as part of the purchase price, all interest which may have accrued upon the Bonds from the date of issuance or the date to which last paid, as the case may be, to the date of disbursement of the loan. At the time of delivery of the bonds by First National to the Lender, First National shall furnish a warranty to the Lender with respect to said bonds as follows:

(a) That it has not pledged, assigned, hypothecated or otherwise disposed of said bonds or its interest therein.

(b) That it has no interest in said bonds except as collateral for the interim loan or loans hereinabove referred to and that such interest will cease upon payment to First National in accordance with this Paragraph 11.

It is expressly understood and agreed (and this agreement is made for the benefit of First National) that First National shall not, by delivery of such bonds to the Lender or by the execution of an instrument as hereinabove provided, be deemed to have made any warranties or representations, express or implied, with reference to said bonds except the express warranties set forth in said instrument in writing. The Lender may rely upon any certification by First National as to the amount owing to it, on such interim loans, without inquiry of any kind.

12. The Lender shall not be obligated to make disbursement of the loan unless the following conditions (which are hereby agreed to be conditions precedent) shall have been fully complied with:

(a) The University of Illinois and the Foundation shall not be in default hereunder;

(b) Said project shall be substantially completed and ready for occupancy;

(c) A continuation of said Chicago Title & Trust Company preliminary report on title shall have been furnished to the Lender covering a date not more than sixty (60) days prior to the date of disbursement, showing that Chicago Title & Trust Company is prepared to issue its owner's guarantee policy covering said date, but otherwise in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 7 hereof;

(d) An affidavit of a duly authorized officer of the Foundation shall have been furnished to the Lender to the effect that the Foundation has not conveyed, assigned or in any way clouded or encumbered title to the real estate and that no changes have occurred in the title to said real estate since the date of said last mentioned continuation of said Chicago Title & Trust Company preliminary report on title;

(e) The lease with the University of Illinois in the form attached to said Trust Agreement as Exhibit "B" shall have been renewed for a term of two (2) years commencing July 1, 1949 and expiring June 30, 1951, in case the disbursement of the loan shall occur on or after July 1, 1949;

(f) The Foundation shall have paid to the Lender all installments of the standby fee theretofore becoming due and payable.

Within thirty (30) days after disbursement of the loan the Foundation agrees to furnish to the Lender a Chicago Title & Trust Company owner's guarantee policy issued pursuant to said preliminary report on title referred to in subparagraph (c) hereof.

13. The proceeds of the sale of Bonds hereunder, remaining after the deductions herein authorized to be made from said proceeds by the Lender and after the payment to First National as aforesaid shall be paid to the Foundation, and shall be used by it for the following purposes exclusively:

(1) To defray the cost of constructing the project, and furnishing the same to the extent provided in said Indenture, which may then remain unpaid;

(2) To set aside a reserve to insure final completion of construction, in case at the time of disbursement of the proceeds of the loan said improvements shall have been substantially completed, ready for occupancy, but shall not have been finally completed, and to insure that furnishings and equipment will be installed to the extent provided in said Indenture;

(3) The balance of proceeds of the sale of Bonds, if any, shall be segregated in a special fund to be held by the Foundation in trust for the proper equipment, maintenance, and repair of the project, for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and for performance by the Foundation of its other covenants and agreements to be contained in said Indenture.

14. If the University of Illinois and the Foundation shall not have complied with the conditions set forth in subparagraphs (a) to (e), inclusive, of Paragraph 12 hereof, and the loan shall not have been disbursed prior to October 1, 1949, the Foundation agrees to pay to the Lender, as a standby fee, interest on \$900,000 at 4% per annum from October 1, 1949, to the date when either: (a) said buildings and improvements shall have been substantially completed and ready for occupancy and the University of Illinois and the Foundation shall have complied with the conditions set forth in said subparagraphs (a) to (e), inclusive, of Paragraph 12 hereof and the loan disbursed; or (b) the Lender shall have elected, pursuant to Paragraph 16 hereof, to terminate its obligation to purchase said Bonds. Said standby fee shall be payable quarterly on the first day of January, 1950, and on the first day of each April, July, October and January thereafter, so long as it shall accrue in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph, provided, however, that upon the happening of either of the events above set forth upon which said standby fee shall cease to accrue, the Foundation shall forthwith pay to the Lender all of said fee then accrued and unpaid, notwithstanding that such event may occur on a date other than the first day of January, April, July or October.

15. From the proceeds of said loan the Lender shall be and is hereby authorized to deduct the following:

(1) All printing, mimeographing and recording expense, and title guarantee and abstract charges, if any, incurred by the Lender and Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc.; also the cost of procuring and approving legal opinion of special counsel for the Lender in connection with its purchase of the bonds, such cost not to exceed the sum of \$5,000;

(2) A commission for Salk, Ward & Salk, Inc., for its services to the borrowers in negotiating the loan, equal to $\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the amount of the loan;

(3) Any portion of the standby fee then accrued and unpaid;

(4) The fees and expenses of Harris Trust and Savings Bank for accepting and acting as Trustee, Depositary and Registrar under the Indenture, including fees and expenses for certification of the Bonds;

(5) The principal portion of any installment or installments on said Bonds which may have matured prior to the disbursement of the loan.

16. If said buildings and improvements have not been substantially completed and ready for occupancy and the Lender notified by First National, pursuant to Paragraph 11 hereof, that the Bonds are ready for delivery to the Lender prior to June 30, 1950, or if the Foundation and University of Illinois shall make default in the performance of any other of their covenants or agreements herein contained and such default shall continue for a period of thirty (30) days after written

notice from the Lender, then, and in either of such events, the Lender may, at its option, at any time thereafter prior to the disbursement of the loan, terminate this agreement, whereupon all obligations of the Lender hereunder shall cease and determine; provided, however, that notwithstanding such termination, the Foundation shall pay to the Lender all of the items set forth in Paragraph 15 hereof, which items, until paid, shall be secured by said Indenture and which Indenture shall not be released, notwithstanding the termination of this agreement, until each and all of said items shall have been paid to the Lender, or to the Trustee under the Indenture, as the case may be, by the Foundation.

17. It is contemplated that the six-story building will be substantially completed and ready for occupancy prior to the substantial completion, ready for occupancy, of the three-story building. It is the intention of the parties, in such event, to endeavor to make an arrangement, mutually satisfactory to all of the parties, to make a partial disbursement of the proceeds of the loan and defer disbursement of the balance until the three-story building shall have been substantially completed and ready for occupancy.

18. Service of notice hereunder may be had upon any of the parties by United States registered mail addressed to the Lender at Rock Island, Illinois, to the University of Illinois, c/o Lloyd Morey, Administration Building, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois, and to the Foundation, c/o W. H. Butterfield, Union Building, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois, or addressed to such other addresses as any of the parties hereto may furnish to any of the other parties as the place for the service of notice.

19. The University of Illinois and the Foundation shall furnish, as and when requested, certified copies of resolutions acceptable to counsel for the Lender, in connection with the execution of all documents required hereunder.

20. Prior to disbursement of the loan, the University of Illinois and the Foundation shall furnish evidence satisfactory to the Lender that said buildings have been fully paid for, free and clear of mechanics' liens and claims therefor.

21. The Foundation, prior to disbursement of the loan, shall furnish a letter in form satisfactory to the Lender, agreeing to purchase, affix to the Trust Indenture and pay for United States documentary stamps covering the issuance of the Bonds, in case such stamps should be required by law.

The June meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Saturday, June 25, 1949, at the LaSalle Hotel in Chicago according to the following schedule:

9:00 a.m. — Executive session, Committee of the Whole.

11:00 a.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins; absent, Dr. Meyer, Governor Stevenson.

President Stoddard was present; also, Mr. Irvin L. Porter, Treasurer, Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, and, during part of the meeting, Messrs. Newton C. Farr, Real Estate Consultant to the Board on acquisition of Chicago properties, W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and C. Lincoln Wiliston, Manager of Public Information for the Chicago Divisions.

SECRETARY, PRO TEMPORE

In the absence of Secretary H. E. Cunningham due to illness, Mr. A. J. Janata was appointed Secretary, *pro tempore*.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary, *pro tempore*, presented the minutes of the meeting of April 21, 1949, with minutes of the Executive Committee of March 15, 29, and April 9.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 309 to 356 inclusive.

REPORTS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary, *pro tempore*, presented for record the following report of actions of the Executive Committee, on the dates indicated, since the May 21 meeting of the Board.

Purchases

Authorized emergency purchases on items listed in the President's Agenda. Each recommendation was based on several competitive quotations. (June 9, 1949).

Remodeling to Eliminate Fire Hazards

Authorized the execution of a contract with Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White for architectural services in connection with remodeling work in University buildings to eliminate fire hazards; this firm to be paid the actual cost of labor and materials, plus 100 per cent of these costs as commission and overhead, plus travel expenses. (June 16, 1949).

Leave of Absence for Dean Ridenour

Granted leave of absence of one month to Dean L. N. Ridenour, to enable him to act as chairman of a working committee to advise the Scientific Advisory Board of the Air Force on Air Force installations and policies concerned with research and development, and to recommend plans and policies which will lead to the utmost economy and effectiveness in Air Force research and development. This is at the request of General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Chief of Staff. Lieutenant General James H. Doolittle will serve as a member of this committee. (June 17, 1949).

Addition to Contract for Electrical Work for Mechanical Engineering Building

Approved an addition to the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company for electrical work in the construction of the Mechanical Engineering Building in the amount of \$4,280.20, to provide for thirty-nine additional power connections for machine tools secured by the University from the War Assets Administration. (June 21, 1949).

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

STUDENT AND STAFF HOUSING AND LAND ACQUISITION FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(1) At the request of the President of the University, Mr. Newton C. Farr, who has been serving as Consultant on Land Acquisition and Housing Projects for the Chicago Professional Colleges, submitted the following report and recommendations:

Commitment has been received by Mr. Walter A. Wade, representing the Medical Center Commission, from the Equitable Life Assurance Society for the financing of the student residence building and the staff apartments on the Chicago campus. Three recommendations have been made for an independent real estate

appraiser to review the operating figures on these projects. It is recommended that the appraiser selected by Equitable be employed at once to make his report.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, employment of an independent real estate appraiser was authorized, the cost to be charged against the appropriation of \$50,000 made on July 21, 1948, for the purchase of land from the Medical Center Commission.

In view of the fact that Equitable has agreed to go ahead with the financial program, it is recommended that the architectural firm of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill be authorized to complete plans and specifications for the staff apartment building at the earliest possible date in order that bids may be taken for this project during the summer.

No action was taken. The Board had previously (Minutes, October 21, 1948, page 145) authorized the employment of this firm but specified that no contract be entered into for architectural services until funds for this project have been assured.

Mr. Harry Pearce has recommended that the property at 1712-14-16 West Taylor Street be purchased for use to house the Chicago Campus Paint Shop which is now located in the basement of the Research and Educational Hospitals. Funds for this purchase are available in the 1947-1949 Land Appropriation Account. It is estimated that these properties can be acquired for a total cost of \$20,500. It is recommended that funds be designated for the purchase of these properties.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, purchase of this property was authorized and assignment of \$20,500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was made from the State appropriation for "Land acquisitions for extension of campus in Chicago," by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

The area selected as a site for the proposed steam plant is located south of Taylor Street between Hermitage Avenue and Paulina Street and running approximately 350 feet south of Taylor Street. The cost of assembling this land has been estimated at approximately \$150,000. The University already owns the southeast corner of Hermitage Avenue and Taylor Street, approximately 125 feet square. The Medical Center Commission has already acquired certain parcels in this area. It is recommended that this area be approved for acquisition and that the balance of funds now available for land purchase be made available to this account at this time.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, purchase of this property was authorized and the balance of the unassigned funds in the State appropriation for "Land acquisitions for extension of campus in Chicago," or so much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated for this purpose by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

Certain areas for buildings to be built on the west side campus will not be available without the assistance of the Medical Center Commission in providing funds to purchase the land. It is recommended that Dr. Ivy be authorized to negotiate with the Medical Center Commission for them to acquire, with their own funds, land to be made available for the University of Illinois.

No action required.

This concluded the presentation of Mr. Farr's recommendations.

A progress report by Comptroller Lloyd Morey on negotiations with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States for the

financing of student and staff housing projects was also presented. Copies of this report had previously been sent to all members of the Board of Trustees and a copy is in the files of the Secretary of the Board as a matter of record. Mr. Fornof called attention to one of the terms in the financing plan proposed by Equitable, namely, the requirement of "A commitment fee of $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1% per annum from the time the loan is approved and accepted until bonds are taken, not later than December 31, 1950." Mr. Porter, Treasurer of the Board, also commented on this requirement. Following discussion, on motion of Mr. Fornof, the Board voted that this commitment fee requirement be reviewed with representatives of Equitable to determine if it can be reduced.

APPROPRIATION FOR LEGAL SERVICES

(2) The Legal Counsel submits the following bills received for legal and other services:

A special appropriation is necessary to cover payments for these services.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these payments were authorized and an appropriation of \$2,752.18 was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACT FOR STUDENT HOUSING SURVEY

(3) In order to develop a long-range program for student housing, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, architects, Chicago, be employed to:

1. Make a survey of housing facilities for unmarried students in other institutions, at a cost of \$5,600, plus traveling expenses.
2. Develop standards of construction for future residence halls at the University of Illinois, with particular reference to capital and maintenance costs.

Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill are experts on institutional housing plans. The Dean of Students, the Coordinator of the Small Homes Council, and the Chairman of the University Building Program Committee concur in this recommendation.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget for the cost of this survey. Student housing is one of the University's serious building problems. It is important that we secure information on the best methods of dealing

with this problem based on the experience of others and the advice of competent authorities so that a sound program of development can be formulated.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the President of the University was requested to secure further information regarding this survey and to present it, with his recommendation, to the Executive Committee.

**OBJECTIONS TO DETERMINATION OF PREVAILING RATES OF WAGES
MADE BY THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS IN AWARDED
CONTRACTS AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK**

(4) In accordance with the Prevailing Wage Act, the University published its determination with respect to wages in the locality of Monticello and Piatt County as to certain crafts and workmen.

Objections to such determination have been filed by the President of the Twin City Federation of Labor of Champaign. The Act provides that in such case the public body (in this case the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois) shall set a date for and conduct a hearing on the objections. At least ten days' notice of the time and place must be given to objectors.

The Board of Trustees, itself, may conduct the hearing or it may designate some of its members or other persons to do so and to report their findings and recommendations to the Board for its consideration and action. In Civil Service hearings, the Board has appointed three persons who were not Board members to take testimony and to report back to the Board. There are several ways of setting up a hearing commission: (1) by the Board itself; (2) the Board may direct one of its standing committees or appoint a special committee to conduct the hearing; (3) by a faculty group appointed by the Board; (4) by a group of citizens with no official connection with the University appointed by the Board; and (5) the unions and the University may each select a representative and let those two select a third. If an outside group is appointed, the question of fees and traveling expenses must be considered. In any case some officer of the University must have authority and instructions to set up the machinery for this hearing and following through on such details as arrangements for a place for the hearing, sending notices, employment of a court reporter, and other services. The Secretary of the Board will be an appropriate officer for this purpose since he is an officer of the Board. (Neither the Legal Counsel, who will be defending the University, nor the Director of Nonacademic Personnel, who will be a witness, could properly do this.)

A special appropriation to cover the expenses of the hearing will also be necessary.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, the Board voted that (a) the hearing be conducted by a commission of the faculty to be appointed by the Board on nomination by the President of the University; and (b) the Secretary of the Board be directed to serve as executive secretary of the commission with authority to make all appropriate arrangements necessary for conducting the hearing.

On this motion Mr. Nickell voted "no," and Mr. Livingston asked to be recorded as not voting.

ADDITION TO STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(5) The appropriations made by the Sixty-fifth General Assembly of Illinois for University buildings to be constructed during the biennium of 1947-1949 include \$400,000 for "Construction of student and staff apartments." With this fund as a partial equity, supplemented by a loan, the University is constructing permanent student and staff apartments to provide quarters for married students and members of the faculty. The complete project will consist of two six-story buildings and two three-story buildings containing altogether 213 apartments. At present, one-half of the project (one six-story building and one three-story building) is under construction and nearing completion, this being the maximum construction possible with the funds so far available.

Unassigned funds are still available in building appropriations to the University for the biennium 1947-1949 which, combined with the appropriation of \$200,000 requested for student and staff housing for the 1949-1951 biennium, would enable the University to proceed with another step in this project, the construction of the second six-story building, which would include ninety-five apartments.

There has previously been released \$48,405 from the contingency item in the building appropriations to the University, to supplement funds for the construction of student residence halls. This will not be needed for that project. There is also available an unexpended \$60,000 in funds previously released from items for student and staff apartments, and for preparation of plans and specifications for future building projects; and there is an unreleased balance of \$29,595 in the item for contingencies.

The Governor has been requested to: (1) rescind in part a previous release of funds authorized by him, so that \$48,405 assigned from the contingency item to supplement funds for the construction of student residence halls will be returned to the contingency appropriation; and (2) release a total of \$78,000 from the contingency appropriation to be applied on the construction of student and staff apartments. The sum of these items (\$60,000, \$29,595, and \$48,405) will provide \$138,000 of funds currently available for student and staff housing construction.

If this money can be combined with the \$200,000 requested for the biennium of 1949-1951, there will be available a total of \$338,000, which would enable the University to proceed with the construction of the second six-story apartment building. The total cost of this is estimated at \$1,152,000 (see Schedule A, page 476), of which \$814,000 can be borrowed and amortized from rental income. A preliminary survey indicates an estimated net income of \$54,904 (see Schedule B, page 477).

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the Board authorize the construction of the second six-story building subject to the release of funds in 1947-1949 building appropriations by the Governor, and subject to the receipt of construction and financing bids within the estimates.

I concur and recommend that:

1. The Finance Committee of the Board be authorized to act for the Board on bids for the financing of the second six-story unit.

2. The Executive Committee of the Board be authorized to award construction contracts if satisfactory bids are received.

Funds appropriated for the biennium 1947-1949 are available until September 30, 1949, but must be encumbered prior to June 30. Committee action is therefore recommended in view of this time element.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were approved.

BIDS ON STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(6) Bids on the second six-story building of the Student and Staff Apartments now under construction at Green Street and Goodwin Avenue, Urbana, indicate that the total capital cost will be \$1,038,000, or \$114,000 less than the architects estimated. Hence it will be necessary to borrow only \$700,000 instead of \$814,000. The estimated net annual income from rents will be adequate to amortize this amount.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of contracts to the lowest bidders as follows, subject to the release of funds in current building appropriations by the Governor and to final approval of an appropriation of \$200,000 for housing in the building appropriations requested for the 1949-1951 biennium:

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these contracts were authorized as recommended.

DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN COMMUNICATIONS

(7) The Executive Faculty of the Graduate College and the University Senate recommend the establishment of a program of study of mass communications leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was approved.

FIVE-YEAR CURRICULUM IN ARCHITECTURE

(8) The faculty of the College of Fine and Applied Arts and the University Senate recommend the establishment of a five-year curriculum in architecture leading to the degree of Bachelor of Architecture with two options: (1) general option for architects and (2) engineering option for architectural engineers. This is a revision and expansion of the present four-year undergraduate curriculum in architecture to five years. It is proposed to inaugurate this curriculum for students entering as freshmen in September, 1949 (see Appendix, page 477).

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were approved.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(9) The Committee on Accountancy recommends the following persons for the Illinois C.P.A. certificate under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943. They have submitted satisfactory evidence that they were holders of valid unrevoked C.P.A. certificates issued by other states on the basis of written examinations. They have satisfied all other requirements of the law.

SABBATICAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR NEIL E. STEVENS*

(10) Professor Neil E. Stevens of the Department of Horticulture has been granted sabbatical leave of absence for six months beginning March 1, 1950, on one-half pay. He has requested that this be changed to sabbatical leave for one year on one-half pay, beginning September 1, 1949.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this leave of absence was authorized.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(11) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

1. Converting and remodeling Allerton property
(additional).....\$21 000
2. Equipment for Department of Bacteriology..... 20 000
3. Remodeling in Noyes Laboratory..... 17 700
4. Remodeling in Horticulture Field Laboratory..... 6 356

These proposed improvements have been carefully studied by the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures. Its reports giving details of the reasons for these improvements are submitted herewith.

I concur and recommend that these appropriations be made from the 1948-1949 General Reserve Fund to the extent that funds are available therein and the remainder from the General Reserve Fund from 1949-1950, and that all of these appropriations be made available until June 30, 1950.

CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE CLASS SPECIFICATIONS AND SALARY RANGES

(12) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel recommends the following changes in University Civil Service positions, to become effective July 1, 1949: (1) deletions from class specifications; (2) additions to class specifications; (3) changes in existing class specifications; and (4) changes in salary ranges of existing class specifications.

These changes are shown in detail in the accompanying schedules and they have previously been submitted to the Committee on Civil Service and Employees for study in advance of the Board Meeting. A copy is filed in the office of the Secretary of the Board.

I concur in the Director's recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, these changes in class specifications and salary ranges were approved.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

(13) The Secretary has reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. WAYNE MELVILLE BEVER, Associate Professor of Crop Pathology, on one-fifth time, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$1,005.

2. GORDON W. BINKERD, Assistant Professor of Music, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,300.

3. ROBERT CAMPBELL, Assistant Professor of Economics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,500.

4. HERMAN CHERNOFF, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,500.

5. THOMAS L. GRISAMORE, Assistant Professor of Hygiene and Medical Adviser for Men, in the Undergraduate Division in Chicago, on one-half time, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$3,500.

6. LEONID HURWICZ, Research Professor of Economics and Mathematical Statistics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,850.

7. WILLIBALD KARL JENTSCHKE, Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, beginning March 16, 1949, without salary.

8. MARTHA SUE LEWANDOSKI, Assistant Professor of Hygiene and Medical Adviser for Women, beginning June 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,000.

9. JAMES HARRY POTTER, Professor of Mechanical Engineering, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,200.

10. SOL SPIEGELMAN, Research Professor of Bacteriology, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.

11. PETER NICHOLAS VUKASIN, Assistant Professor of Economics, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,500.

12. ERWIN KURT EDWARD WEISE, Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, beginning March 16, 1949, without salary.

13. PAUL YOUNG, Professor of Music, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,000.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the President in making these appointments was confirmed.

CONTRACT FOR PIPING IN ABBOTT POWER PLANT

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$16,582.53 to the Dobe Piping Company, Edwardsville, the lowest bidder, for the installation of piping for the feed water treatment equipment in the Abbott Power Plant. Contracts have previously been authorized by the Board of Trustees for the additional feed water treatment equipment and for the purchase of structural steel. This equipment is needed to increase the generator capacity of one turbo-generator by increasing the feed water capacity. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was authorized.

CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK IN ABBOTT POWER PLANT

(15) Bids have been requested twice for the general construction work required for the installation of feed water equipment for the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana-Champaign. This project has already been authorized by the Board and some of the equipment contracts have been awarded.

Only one bid, for \$31,250, was received on the general work on the first attempt. The bid was rejected because it was in excess of the engineering estimates of the cost of the job. As a result of the second invitation, the following bids were received:

Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., Champaign.....	\$27 500

These bids are still in excess of engineering estimates. As a result of negotiations with the lower bidder, he has offered to do the construction work, with certain minor revisions acceptable to the University, at a cost of \$18,080.

Funds are available for this project in the appropriation for "Enlargement of Power Plant" for the biennium of 1947-1949. The funds will lapse unless encumbered by June 30 and expended by September 30, 1949.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that all bids be rejected again and that a contract for \$18,089 be awarded to Kuhne-Simmons Company.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR FIRE PROTECTION FACILITIES AT URBANA

(16) The University has a contract with the Kil-Bar Electric Company, Chicago, for the installation of a new fire alarm system on the Urbana-Champaign campus at a contract price of \$28,565. The contract also provides that the Company shall test existing fire-alarm cable on the campus and that if replacements are necessary they will be made at an additional cost of 36 cents a lineal foot.

Tests indicate that approximately 12,000 lineal feet of cable should be replaced. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with the Kil-Bar Electric Company for the replacement of cable at a cost of not to exceed \$4,320, final payment to be determined by the actual measurement of new cable installed.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Construction of fire protection facilities" for the biennium of 1947-1949. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this contract change.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change was authorized.

CONTRACTS FOR PHYSICAL PLANT SERVICE BUILDING ANNEX

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of contracts to the following lowest bidders for the construction of a temporary one-story building, approximately 24 feet by 80 feet, as a Physical Plant Service Building Annex:

CONTRACT FOR EXTENSION OF UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM TO STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS AT URBANA

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts for the extension of the electrical distribution system to the Student and Staff Apartments at Green Street and Goodwin Avenue to:

These are the lowest bids in each case.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Extension of the Utilities Distribution System."

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these contracts were authorized.

CONTRACT FOR RECORD PROGRAM SERVICE

(19) The Director of Radio Station WILL and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the Muzak Corporation, New York City, for a recorded program service consisting of transcriptions aggregating four thousand or more recorded titles for a two-year period from July 1, 1949. The contract also provides for additional recorded program service each month consisting of a set of transcriptions aggregating at least two hours of continuous playing time. The cost of this service is \$2,910, payable in twenty-four monthly installments, of which the first six shall be \$110 each and the remaining eighteen \$125 each.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this contract was authorized.

CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES AT CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(20) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend the employment of Pace Associates for architectural services in connection with the design and construction of the proposed new classroom and laboratory building at the Chicago Professional Colleges. Pace Associates propose to provide complete architectural, engineering, and supervisory service for a fee of 5½ per cent of the cost of the work designed by them or purchased under their direction. This firm was previously engaged for preliminary studies on this project and any payments received for this preliminary work will be credited against the fee under the contract now proposed.

It is recommended that authority be granted to execute a contract with Pace Associates for this project subject to the availability of funds in the 1949-1951 appropriations.

I request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was authorized.

REPLACEMENT OF TENNIS COURTS IN CHICAGO

(21) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the awarding of a contract for \$11,095 to Frank H. Stowell, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the construction of tennis courts at the corner of Polk and Wood Streets in Chicago. This construction is necessary to replace tennis courts which were torn up for the installation of underground steam and electrical lines.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized.

CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF DENTAL UNITS

(22) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the awarding of a contract for \$4,083 to Fettes, Love, and Sieben, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of thirteen dental units in the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building in Chicago. The purchase of these units was previously authorized by the Board and funds were appropriated for this purpose, including installation costs.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this contract was authorized.

CONTRACT FOR A NEW 500 KVA UNIT SUBSTATION IN CHICAGO

(23) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$10,975 to the White City Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the electrical work for a new 500 kva unit substation in the Chicago Illini Union Building on the Chicago Professional Colleges Campus.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, this contract was authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR HOUSING AREA SANITARY SEWER

(24) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$2,340.65 to the contract with Mancini, Ventrella, and Sons for the construction of a sanitary sewer serving the University housing area and other University buildings on the west side of the campus. The increase is to provide for crushed rock for bedding sewer tile where poor soil bearing conditions were encountered and for the additional work required because of unrecorded utility lines.

The specifications for this construction job provide for additional allowances for unusual conditions encountered during construction. This allowance relieved the contractor of including in his bid a contingency factor. It has been the experience of consulting engineers that making such provisions for contracts in sewer jobs results in a lower over-all cost than would be the case if contractors had to anticipate such contingencies in the base bid.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Construction of temporary student housing."

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this change was authorized.

INCREASE IN EQUIPMENT CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(25) The Building Committee of the Department of Chemistry, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,815.20 in the contract with the Kewaunee Manufacturing Company for the laboratory equipment in the East Chemistry Building on the Urbana Campus.

In the original planning of the equipment for the new building, it was decided that part of the furniture should be of wood construction. The Building Committee of the Department of Chemistry has reconsidered this problem and has come to the conclusion that metal furniture is much more desirable. All of their studies indicate that metal furniture will last longer, and in the long run be more economical than wooden furniture.

The recommended increase of \$2,815.20 will provide for the additional cost of all steel equipment.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this change was authorized.

ADDITIONS TO HEATING AND VENTILATING CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(26) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend two increases in the contract with the Carson-Payson Company, Danville, for the construction of the East Chemistry Building:

Installation of additional hydrogen sulphide lines in six different rooms.....	\$1 262 80
Construction of a separate vent independent of the rest of the ventilating system for a hood in Room 405 to make possible the use of this room for radio carbon work without creating a hazard in other areas in the building.....	2 377 72

Funds are available in the State appropriation for 1947-1949 for "Construction of a New Chemistry Building."

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute these changes in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these changes were authorized.

ADDITION TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(27) After bids were received for the construction of the East Chemistry Building, changes had to be made in all contracts so that the total construction cost would be within the available funds. One of the reductions was changing the majority of the interior lighting fixtures from fluorescent to incandescent. The building plans had specified interior fluorescent lighting throughout.

The estimated cost of interior fluorescent lighting fixtures for the entire building was \$55,000. The actual cost of interior lighting fixtures (mostly incandescent; a small amount of fluorescent lighting has been used where such installations are justified for special reasons), including light bulbs, is \$10,447.16. The lighting fixtures are not a part of the electrical contract but were purchased separately by authority of the Board of Trustees on the basis of competitive quotations.

Incandescent fixtures require more wiring, i.e., a larger gauge of copper wire, than fluorescent, and other incidental changes require additions to the contract for electrical work. The Board has previously authorized an increase of \$6,936.80 in the contract for the electrical work for switchboard changes due to the change from fluorescent to incandescent light fixtures, and an additional increase of \$120 was authorized by the Comptroller for changing the size of the cable.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller now

recommend an additional increase of \$14,556.35 (for new design for switchboards, bus ducts, and transformer, \$5,584.54; for increase in wiring throughout the building, \$8,971.81) in the contract with the Leverenz Electric Company, Danville. These increases aggregate (\$6,936.80, \$120.00, \$14,556.35) \$21,613.15, to which must be added the cost of incandescent fixtures, \$10,447.16, making a total of \$32,060.31, as compared with an estimated cost of \$55,000 for fluorescent fixtures. The net capital saving is \$22,939.69.

While current consumption of incandescent lighting is from two to two and one-half times that of fluorescent lighting, Professor J. O. Kraehenbuehl of the Department of Electrical Engineering, an expert on illumination, has advised that with the low cost to the University of producing electric power, from fifteen to twenty years of operation would be necessary before the saving in current would offset the higher capital cost of fluorescent lighting, and by that time the fixtures will probably be obsolete. Professor Kraehenbuehl states that maintenance of fluorescent lighting fixtures costs from two to three times the maintenance of incandescent lighting.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute these changes in the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these changes were authorized.

ADDITION TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(28) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,280.20 in the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company for the electrical work in connection with the Mechanical Engineering Building.

It has been possible to secure additional machine tools from the War Assets Administration as surplus government equipment at a very low cost to the University. Some of the machines were obtained for the cost of transportation and some of them at 5 per cent of the government appraised value. This additional equipment, however, required a revision of the arrangement of shop equipment and thirty-nine additional power connections. The architects checked the costs involved and find them very reasonable for the work to be done.

Funds are available for this addition.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change was authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR BUILDING ALTERATIONS FOR DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL MEDICINE

(29) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,426 in the contract with E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company of Chicago for the intercommunication system in the Department of Physical Medicine, Chicago. The details for this work were not completely worked out when the original contract was awarded and the contract was let without it to avoid delay in starting the remodeling.

Funds are available for this addition.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this change was authorized.

APPROPRIATIONS BY THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(30) The following appropriations by the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association are submitted to the Board of Trustees for their approval:

1. An appropriation of \$2,000 for necessary paving of walks, drive, and apron to the barn at the golf course.

2. Supplementary appropriation of \$13,000 for the completion of the well and other miscellaneous work necessary to complete the project at the golf course.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appropriations were approved.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the action of the President of the University in authorizing an emergency purchase was confirmed, and purchases were authorized as recommended.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(33) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from May 11 to June 10, 1949 (see Appendix, page 483).

This report was received for record.

WAGE ADJUSTMENTS FOR CERTAIN NONACADEMIC GROUPS

(34) I. The President of the University has given approval and directions concerning certain modifications of the policy and procedures (see addendum below) relating to employees in salary-range, nonprevailing rate groups as follows effective July 1, 1949:

A. All employees now receiving \$150 a month or less in total compensation and who on July 1, 1949, will have completed their six months' probationary period shall receive a minimum annual increase of \$150 for the biennium of 1949-1951.

B. Agricultural employees at the Assistant level (Group II) now receiving various individual salaries within a \$175-250 range shall receive \$250 a month, and adjustments are to be made in ranges and rates of all agricultural employees to bring them into harmony with this basic adjustment.

C. The 75 cents minimum hourly rate (\$130 monthly for the forty-hour week) approved in March shall be applied to the cash compensation of food service employees without deduction of the value of meals furnished, and adjustments shall be made in other ranges and wages of food service classifications to maintain harmony with this increase in the base rate.

II. These provisions call for further budget adjustments as follows:

A. Approximately 375 employees who now receive \$1,800 or less will receive increases totaling approximately \$21,000 in addition to those already provided in departmental budget recommendations.

B. Approximately one hundred employees will receive increases totaling approximately \$21,000 in addition to those anticipated in earlier computations. Ranges are being moved upward an average of \$25 in order to accommodate these salary increases.

C. All food service employees will receive an increase of at least \$120 a year with larger sums being provided at the lower end of the present pay brackets.

Approval of the 75 cents an hour minimum involves a revision of the first five ranges in the Civil Service classification system as follows:

Range I	now \$100-\$140	} Combined as one range \$130-\$165
Range II	now 120- 160	
Range III	now 125- 175.....	140- 175
Range IV	now 140- 200.....	150- 200
Range V	now 150- 225.....	160- 225

I request approval of these new wage scales subject to favorable action by the General Assembly and the Governor on the University's biennial operating budget of \$67,271,742 for the biennium of 1949-1951. The budget will carry the changes required within the allocations for nonacademic salaries. The additional funds needed for increasing the wages of food service employees are being provided from nonacademic wage reserves and will not be charged to food service operations. If the Board gives approval of these changes it will not be necessary for it to act separately on an itemized and detailed list of the classifications affected.

Nonacademic salaries are paid on the basis of the fiscal year from July 1 to June 30. Since the internal budget for 1949-1950 will not be presented to the Board of Trustees at this meeting, and to avoid the necessity of payroll adjustments for retroactive salary increases, authority is requested to pay the July nonacademic salaries in accordance with rates recommended by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel and approved by the President. Such rates will be included in the budget to be presented to the Board of Trustees later.

ADDENDUM

I. On March 15, 1949, the President of the University approved a statement of general policy for wage and salary increases for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949. The essential elements in this policy were:

A. For Prevailing Rate Groups, changes in wage rates as they occur in the community in which the work is performed.

B. For Salary Range Groups:

1. Requirements of the Policy and Rules and of the terms of certain collective bargaining agreements calling for minimum increases of \$120 a year to employees below range midpoint are to be given first priority.

2. Balance of available funds is to be assigned to colleges, departments, and divisions on an equitable basis related to total salary budgets, for application to individual salaries which shall take into account merit, internal equities, length of service, and rates paid for similar duties by outside employment.

a. No increases are to be given which will carry individual salaries above the top of approved ranges.

3. The University will recognize a minimum rate of 75 cents an hour for non-academic employment.

C. Of the 10 per cent of total salary and wage funds included in the biennial budget approximately three-quarters was to be made available for use in the first year of the biennium and one-quarter held in reserve for the second year.

II. Under this policy, budgets have been prepared and submitted which provide for the following:

A. Prevailing Rate Employees will receive in full and on time adjustments equal to those provided for similar work in their respective community.

B. Salary Range Employees:

1. All food service and agricultural employees except a few at the top of their range will receive increases on July 1 in accordance with the provisions of University-Union agreements.

2. At least 90 per cent of all laboratory, stores, and airport employees will receive sizable increases under contract provisions and departmental recommendations.

3. A similar proportion of clerical, supervisory, and other non-unionized employees will receive comparable increases.

4. About the only ones for whom no increases are being proposed are (a) those already at the top of their range; (b) very new employees still in their probationary period; (c) a few employees now being paid the top limit of their value on their particular jobs.

The plan as approved and implemented in accordance with the above details was intended to provide for adjustments based on merit and relationship to rates paid for similar work by the best type of employers elsewhere. It allowed for consideration of individuals and for the establishment of an over-all salary schedule in proper internal relationship and proportion. In so doing, while it did provide

certain rather low salary ranges and individual rates, these ranges and rates were based on similar ones at the community level.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these wage adjustments were approved as recommended.

**APPOINTMENT OF WALTER H. ROETTGER AS
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**

(35) The Director of Athletics has recommended, and the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has approved, the appointment of Walter H. Roettger as Assistant Director of Athletics effective July 1, 1949. He will continue as Associate Professor of Physical Education for Men, as Head Coach of Baseball, but will be relieved of his duties as Assistant Basketball Coach in view of his increased administrative responsibilities. This change in status involves no increase in his salary (\$7,670 a year, of which the University pays \$1,500 for teaching services). That portion of salary he has been receiving from the Athletic Association for basketball coaching will be charged against administration.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this appointment was confirmed.

**APPOINTMENT OF DANIEL BORTH, JR., AS ASSOCIATE DEAN OF
THE COLLEGE OF COMMERCE AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION**

(36) The Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration recommends the appointment of Daniel Borth, Jr., now Professor of Accountancy, as Professor of Accountancy on indefinite tenure and Associate Dean of the College for one year from September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$9,000.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this appointment was approved.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR DIRECTOR R. B. DOWNS

(37) Director R. B. Downs of the Library and the Library School has been asked to advise the Library of Congress on the future development of its National Union Catalog. This is a field in which he has had much professional experience and he has asked for a leave of absence during July in order to accept the assignment.

I recommend that he be given the leave with full pay.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this leave was authorized.

AWARD OF CONTRACT BY THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(39) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has awarded a contract to Mr. W. L. Hall for the purchase and installation of a complete underground irrigation system for the gridiron in Memorial Stadium and has assigned the sum of \$15,000 from Stadium Maintenance Funds for the completion of the project. Bids were received for this work including the excavation, back-filling, sodding, purchase of pipe, sprinkler heads, tees, valves, and connections as follows:

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the Board of Directors was approved.

LIBRARY BINDING

(40) The Director of the Library, the Director of Purchases, and the Comptroller recommend placing an order for library binding for two years beginning July 1, 1949, for all University of Illinois requirements (Urbana-Champaign, Chicago Professional Colleges, and the Chicago Undergraduate Division) with Ernst Hertzberg and Sons, Chicago, the lowest bidder.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized.

CONTRACT FOR LANDSCAPING WORK

(41) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$8,727 to Martin Ivey, Urbana, the lowest bidder, for landscaping the East Chemistry Building and Physics Research Laboratory areas. The total cost is divided into a charge of \$6,198 for the East Chemistry Building area and \$2,529 for the Physics Research Laboratory area.

Funds are available in the State appropriations for the construction of these buildings to cover the cost.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this contract was authorized.

**ADDITION TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR
ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING**

(42) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,671.51 in the contract with Leverenz Electric Company for the electrical work in the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building. This will provide for furnishing and installing eight reduced voltage starters for eight motors on the supply and exhaust fans, replacing the "across-the-line" starters furnished with the fans. The change in starters is requested to comply with the policy of the Physical Plant Department of using reduced voltage motor starters on all motors over five horsepower, thereby reducing the load on power lines when motors are started.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this change was authorized.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(43) When plans and specifications for the East Chemistry Building were prepared, acoustical ceilings were eliminated from all but four rooms to keep construction costs to the minimum until availability of funds was assured.

The Chemistry Department has requested acoustical ceilings in additional rooms, since it is now known that funds will be available in the appropriation for this building.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$8,000 in the contract with John Felmley Company for the general work on the construction of this building for acoustical ceilings in:

Ground floor: Entrance lobby No. 2, corridors Nos. 12 and 17.

First floor: Lobby (students lounge) No. 101, seminar No. 118, classroom Nos. 121, 123, and 136, corridor No. 122, conference room No. 130, departmental offices Nos. 133 and 134.

Second floor: Drafting and lecture room No. 203 and library No. 235.

Third floor: Seminar No. 319, departmental offices Nos. 321 and 322.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, this change was authorized.

**CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES ON VIVARIUM
REFRIGERATION SYSTEM**

(44) The present refrigerating system at the Vivarium Building at Urbana-Champaign is twenty-five years old and has reached the point beyond which it is no longer economical to repair it. Its obsolescence has been accelerated by rapid progress in the refrigerating field. The refrigerant used is a hazardous sulphur dioxide type. The present system is incapable of obtaining the temperature and humidity ranges required for certain experimental work.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that a contract be awarded to Mr. E. C. Manthei of Champaign to prepare plans, specifications, and cost estimates for replacing this refrigerating system, the contract to be on the basis of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of the cost of the new equipment, equipment replacement, and installation, with the provision that the fee shall not exceed \$2,800. The total estimated cost for modernization, exclusive of these engineering services, is \$60,460.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget for this contract for preparing plans and specifications.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was authorized.

CONTRACT FOR PURCHASE OF COAL

(45) The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller recommend that a contract be awarded to the Republic Coal and Coke Company, Mattoon, the lowest bidder, for approximately 40,000 tons of screenings coal to be delivered to the Abbott Power Plant, Urbana-Champaign, as required from September 1, 1949, to May 31, 1950, at a price of \$4.00 a ton f.o.b. mine. The total expenditure will be approximately \$160,000 for the coal, plus \$38,160 for freight, a total of \$198,160.

The lowest bid is determined by the number of British thermal units for one cent based on guaranteed analyses.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized, subject to constitutional provisions.

REAPPROPRIATION OF UNEXPENDED BALANCES

(46) The Comptroller recommends that the following unexpended balances in appropriations made by the Board of Trustees for services and projects not completed as of June 30, 1949, be reappropriated (see Appendix, page 483). The total of such balances recommended for reappropriation is \$2,377,467, of which it is recommended that \$1,017,187 be reappropriated for a period of sixty days from July 1, 1949, and the remainder of \$1,360,280 be reappropriated for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949. The appropriation balances included in the first group are for projects which can be completed within the sixty-day period provided by the State Finance Act and can be charged against the University's appropriation for the biennium of 1947-1949. Other items will be covered by unexpended balance in University Income Fund at June 30, 1949, which will be covered by State appropriations for 1949-1951.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these appropriations were approved by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Forno, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

**INSTALLATION OF LABORATORY EQUIPMENT IN
EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING**

(47) Much of the equipment for the East Chemistry Building has already been purchased and will be paid for from the State building appropriations for 1947-1949 for the construction of this building. An additional appropriation of \$400,000 has been requested for 1949-1951 for the purchase of additional equipment and for installation.

In the meantime, bids have been taken on the installation of this equipment. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contracts to the lowest bidders as follows, in each case the contract to be subject to availability of funds for the biennium of 1949-1951:

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these contracts were authorized subject to availability of funds.

**CONTRACT FOR EXTENSION OF UTILITY SERVICES TO
VETERINARY SCIENCE BUILDING**

(48) The Board of Trustees has awarded contracts for the construction of a steam tunnel and installation of piping for extension of the utilities distribution system to the site of the proposed new College of Veterinary Medicine building.

Bids have now been received for (1) insulation of the pipe, and (2) the construction of underground electric duct run and manholes.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contracts to the lowest bidders:

Asbestos & Magnesite Materials Company, Chicago, insulation of the pipe.....	\$ 8 570

Funds are available in the State appropriation for 1947-1949 for the enlargement and extension of the utilities distribution system.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these contracts were authorized.

CONTRACT FOR WATERPROOFING EXTERIOR WALLS OF PHYSICS RESEARCH LABORATORY

(49) Shortly after the completion of the Physics Research Laboratory (the Betatron Building), it was found that the mortar joints, particularly in the south wall, were not water-tight. This is probably due to use of mortar of too rich a mixture in the laying of the bricks, causing shrinkage and fine cracks in the joints. During heavy rains there is considerable leakage with damage to the interior walls and in some cases to equipment.

The Physical Plant Department consulted the State Architect's office and the Small Homes Council regarding corrective measures. Both organizations had experienced similar defects but knew of no product or treatment they could recommend. After further investigation, information and estimates were secured from two organizations specializing in this kind of work, the Western Waterproofing Company, Chicago, and the A. C. Horn Corporation, Minneapolis, Minnesota. Western quoted a price of \$3,450 for repairing the entire south elevation of the Physics Research Laboratory and the Horn Corporation quoted \$3,344 for the same job. Work done by this company on other buildings, including some hotel jobs, was investigated and found satisfactory.

The treatment consists of testing all joints with hammer and chisel, taking out loose joints, and grouting all of the joints with factory-mixed material. The work is all done by the Horn Corporation's trained crew.

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract for \$3,344 for the restoration of the south elevation of the Physics Research Laboratory.

Funds are available in existing appropriations for this work.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized.

CLOSING OF GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(50) Further conferences have been held with the Public Housing and Home Finance Administrator (in charge of the temporary housing project at Galesburg), and the Director of Public Welfare with respect to the time and conditions of the final transfer of government property used by the Galesburg Undergraduate Division.

Under the date of May 31, 1949, the War Assets Administration approved a transfer of this property to the State of Illinois for use for public health purposes, including especially the operation of a Geriatrics Institute for the care of the aged, infirm, and senile as of June 1, 1949, subject to concurrence of the University. This transfer was accepted by the Director of the Department of Public Welfare and by the Comptroller on behalf of the University, by Letter Agreement dated May 31, 1949, subject to ratification by the Board of Trustees.

By agreement with the Department of Public Welfare, the University has continued in possession in order to close up its activities. The Department further requested that the University continue responsibility for the property until September 1, 1949 (the original lease with the University ran until September 20, 1949). Officers of the University have agreed to do this, it being understood that operations are to be reduced as rapidly as possible and the staff and expenses

limited to those necessary for the protection of property and winding up the records and affairs of the University, including the removal of University property.

A resolution relating to the temporary housing units was approved by the Board on April 21, 1949. The effective date of that transfer has now been made July 30, at which time this portion of the property will be returned to the Public Housing Administration.

A resolution is now submitted relating to the general hospital property and its approval by the Board is requested.

Resolution approving the Letter Agreement for transfer of the site of the former Mayo General Hospital now under lease to the University of Illinois from the War Assets Administration

Whereas, it has been decided to close operation of the Galesburg Division of the University of Illinois at the end of the current academic year, and

Whereas, the Department of Public Welfare of the State of Illinois has applied to the War Assets Administration for purchase of the property and site now leased by the University of Illinois at the Galesburg Division, and that such application of purchase has been processed and transfer conditionally consummated by a Letter Agreement dated May 31, 1949, in which such property, personal and real, has been sold to the State of Illinois for public health purposes,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Letter Agreement dated May 31, 1949, between the State of Illinois Department of Public Welfare and the War Assets Administration or its successor in function, be confirmed, and the execution thereof by Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, through William J. English, Business Manager, Galesburg Division, be and is hereby ratified and approved.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this resolution was adopted.

LEASE OF ILLINI CENTER

(51) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 348), the Board of Trustees authorized the leasing of quarters (3,000 square feet of space) in the LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, for the Illini Center, to be used jointly by the University and the Alumni Association, at a rental of \$4,500 a year. The lease will terminate on June 30, 1949. The University has the option of renewing it for three successive two-year periods; the lessor has reserved the right to negotiate an adjustment in the rental with each renewal.

In consideration of the expenditure by the University for remodeling and furnishing the quarters, the LaSalle Hotel accepted a moderate rental for the earlier years of the occupancy, with the understanding that a higher rental would be put into effect later.

The LaSalle Hotel has requested a rental of \$5,400 for 1949-1950 and of \$6,000 for 1950-1951. The present rental is at the rate of \$1.50 a square foot, and the proposed rates are \$1.80 a square foot for 1949-1950 and \$2.00 a square foot for 1950-1951. The rates are reasonable in comparison with other office quarters of similar quality in terms of location and services available in the Chicago Loop.

The Comptroller requests authority to extend this lease for two years ending June 30, 1951, at a rental of \$5,400 for 1949-1950 and \$6,000 for 1950-1951.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this lease was authorized.

HOUSE BILL 970

(52) At this point Mr. Livingston asked that the Board consider the implications of House Bill 970 now before the Senate of the Sixty-sixth General Assembly of Illinois.

This bill was introduced in the House of Representatives on May 17, 1949. It would amend an Act of 1941 by placing the administration of civil service in the University of Illinois under a separate board of commissioners to be appointed by the Governor. The Act of 1941 authorized and directed the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to classify by rules adopted for that purpose all nonacademic positions and employments in the University of Illinois (except the faculty, administrative officers, professional and scientific positions) with reference to duties thereof for the purpose of establishing grades, salary scales, and

standards of examinations therefor. Such positions and employment now constitute the classified civil service of the State in relation to the University of Illinois. All appointments are made in accordance with the provisions of such rules.

Mr. Livingston pointed out that the Board as a whole has not had a previous opportunity to consider House Bill 970 and take an official position on it. The bill was introduced shortly before the May meeting of the Board, at which time the Board had no knowledge of it. There has been no meeting of the Board since that time and obviously the Executive Committee could not speak for the Board. The present University Civil Service system was enacted at the request of the Board which also adopted the Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees pursuant to such legislation.

After thorough discussion, on motion of Mr. Hickman, the Board adopted the following resolution and requested that it be transmitted to the Senate:¹

"The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is opposed to the passage of House Bill 970 which would change the administration of civil service in the University by removing it from the Board of Trustees and placing it under a separate board of commissioners to be appointed by the Governor.

"The Board of Trustees is of the strong conviction that this bill would seriously hamper the Board and administrative officers in the administration of nonacademic employees."

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the Board expressed to Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, its sympathy in his illness, and best wishes.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

July 28, 1949

**With Actions of the Executive Committee of
June 30 and July 5, 1949**



The July meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, July 28, 1949, in the Illini Union Building, at Urbana, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

President Stoddard was present; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Assistant Comptroller H. O. Farber, and, during part of the day, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton and Dean H. P. Rusk.

ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary reported for record that the Executive Committee has taken action on the following matters, on recommendation of President Stoddard, since the June meeting of the Board.

Employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill

The Executive Committee on June 30 authorized the employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill at a fee not to exceed \$5,600 for services plus traveling expenses, based on the estimate in the memorandum from the Director of the Physical Plant Department.

Appointments

The Executive Committee on July 5 made the following appointments:

1. JOHN DOUGLASS RYDER, Professor and Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, at a salary of \$11,000.
2. FREDERICK C. DIETZ, Head of the Department of History, at a salary of \$9,500.
3. LAURA J. HUELSTER, Acting Head of the Department of Physical Education for Women, for one year, at a salary of \$5,500.

Leave of Absence for Professor Scheick

The Executive Committee on July 5 granted leave of absence without pay for one year from September 1, 1949, to Professor William H. Scheick, to enable him to act as Executive Director of the Building Research Advisory Board of the National Research Council.

The Committee also appointed Associate Professor James T. Lendrum to be Acting Coordinator of the Small Homes Council for the year.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF WILLIAM G. KAMMLADE AS ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF EXTENSION SERVICE IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS AND STATE LEADER OF FARM ADVISERS

(1) The Dean of the College of Agriculture, who is also Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics, recommends the appointment of Dr. William G. Kammlade, now Professor of Animal Science, as Associate Director of the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics and as State Leader of Farm Advisers for two years and as Professor of Agricultural Extension on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$10,000.

I concur.

Dean Rusk commented on this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made as recommended.

INTERNAL OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1949-1950

(2) I present the University's internal operating budget for all divisions and funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949, and for academic and administrative appointments beginning September 1, 1949. This budget has been prepared by the Provost and the Comptroller in accordance with policies approved by the President and in conference with deans, directors, and other administrative officers.

I recommend that:

1. This budget, covering the allocation of the University's operating income from all sources for the year beginning July 1, 1949, be approved (see Appendix, page 531).

2. The President of the University be authorized, in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved and within total income, to (a) make such changes and adjustments as are needed, (b) make such additional appointments as are necessary, subject to the provisions of the University Statutes, and (c) accept resignations. All such changes will be covered in the Comptroller's quarterly financial reports, or in reports to the Board by its Secretary.

This budget was discussed by the President, the Provost, and the Comptroller.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the budget was amended by making the salary of President Stoddard \$22,000 a year, effective July 1, 1949.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the operating budget was approved as amended, the appropriations were made, and authority was granted as requested, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins.

DIRECTORSHIP OF THE INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(3) Dr. Phillips Bradley, who has been serving as Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations since August 1, 1946, and who is also Professor of Political Science, has asked to be relieved as Director of the Institute upon the expiration of his present term of appointment in that position on August 31, 1949, and to be assigned to full-time service as Professor of Political Science.

I recommend approval and request that I be authorized to conclude the change in Professor Bradley's status by an appropriate assignment of duties and adjustment of his appointment from a twelve months' to an academic year basis.¹

I further recommend the appointment of Dr. William Ellison Chalmers, now Associate Professor of Economics (one-half time in the Institute and one-half time in the College of Commerce and Business Administration), as Acting Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations for one year from September 1, 1949, and as Professor of Economics on indefinite tenure.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, Director Bradley's resignation was accepted and he was assigned to the Department of Political Science, and Professor Chalmers was appointed Acting Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations and Professor of Economics as recommended.

STEAM HEATING PLANT FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(4) On May 21, 1949 (Minutes, page 358), the Board of Trustees authorized a contract with the Medical Center Steam Company, a corporation to be organized under the laws of Illinois, for the construction of a central steam plant and distribution system for University buildings as well as those of other institutions in the Medical Center District. It authorized the officers of the Board to make "changes in form but not of substance" of the contract as submitted on May 18.

Subsequent discussion has made it necessary to work out various other changes, some of them minor in character but others of a major character. For that reason a revised draft of the contract is resubmitted to the Board for approval (see Appendix, page 516).

The principal changes which result from discussions with the insurance company making the loan for construction and with income tax officials by Commonwealth Edison Company are as follows:

1. Elimination of the word "depreciation" and the substitution of "amortization" (Articles IV and V, Sections 5.01 and 5.02).

2. Change in the term of the agreement from an indefinite period (until all investment has been amortized) to a definite period of thirty years, during which all the plant is to be amortized (Section 9.01). This results in a change in the rate of amortization (depreciation) charge from 3 per cent as formerly proposed, to an adjustable sum which at all times will result in complete amortization within the period of the contract (Section 5.02).

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the approval of the revised draft of contract by the Board.

Additional actions are requested of the Board of Trustees by officers of Commonwealth Edison Company in charge of the development of the Medical Center Steam Company as follows:

1. Resolution accepting an ordinance passed June 22, 1949, by the City Council of the City of Chicago, granting the University authority to make the installations necessary for the heating plant.

2. Resolution authorizing assignment of the above mentioned ordinance to the Medical Center Steam Company.

3. Resolution approving execution of revised contract with the Medical Center Steam Company herein reported.

4. Resolution authorizing the conveyance of land now owned by the Board

of Trustees to the Medical Center Steam Company as a part of the site for the proposed power plant.

The exact conditions under which this land should be conveyed are still a matter of further consideration to determine what procedure would be most advantageous to the University, whether to convey without consideration or to convey for a cash consideration commensurate with the current value of this property. If the latter is done, the amount of such consideration would apply toward the total capitalization of the plant. Mr. Newton C. Farr has recommended a valuation of \$1.00 a square foot, giving an estimated evaluation of \$14,845 for the land to be conveyed. Because early action in the conveyance of the real estate may become necessary, no mention of consideration is made in the resolution, and the exact plan followed will be reported to the Board at a later time.

All the foregoing resolutions (see Appendix, page 513) have been approved by the Legal Counsel and are recommended for adoption by the Comptroller. I concur.

These changes in contract and resolutions were discussed in detail.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the changes were approved and the resolutions were severally adopted as recommended.

COMPENSATION FOR DR. LLOYD SMITH

(5) Under date of February 8, 1949, Dr. Lloyd Smith of Berkeley, California, filed a claim against the University of Illinois for compensation for medical expenses incurred, and to be incurred, in the treatment of cataracts on both eyes, alleged to have been caused by radiation from the Illinois cyclotron, on which he worked as a research assistant at the University of Illinois during the years 1943-1945.

Dr. Smith was a graduate student in the Department of Physics and a research assistant in this department from June, 1942, until July 31, 1945. In August, 1945, Dr. Smith became a member of the staff at Ohio State University and continued in such position until June, 1946, at which time he received his Ph.D. degree from the Ohio State University. From August, 1946, to September, 1947, Dr. Smith was a postdoctoral scholar at the University of Chicago. From September, 1947, to the present time, Dr. Smith has been a member of the staff of the radiation laboratory at the University of California at Berkeley.

This claim was referred to the Committee on Accident Compensation, of which the Legal Counsel is Chairman, for investigation. The Committee has made a thorough inquiry, has consulted medical authorities, and has submitted a report. In the opinion of the Committee's chairman the evidence establishes the following:

1. That Dr. Lloyd Smith was exposed to neutron radiation from the cyclotron during the period of his employment as a research assistant in the Department of Physics from the winter of 1943, to July 31, 1945, the date on which Dr. Smith left the employment of the University.

2. That Dr. Lloyd Smith was not exposed to the hazards of neutron radiation or analogous radiation from the date of his leaving the University of Illinois down to the dates of the several letters from the Ohio State University, the University of Chicago, and the University of California, all in April and May, 1949.

3. That Dr. Lloyd Smith has developed cataracts on both of his eyes.

4. That the cause of the cataracts on Dr. Smith's eyes was the exposure to neutron radiation during the period of his employment as a research assistant at the University of Illinois while working on the cyclotron.

5. That the cataracts on Dr. Smith's eyes constitute a disease which arose out of and in the course of his employment at the University of Illinois.

6. That Dr. Smith's condition constitutes an occupational disease governed by the Occupational Diseases Act of Illinois of 1936.

7. That such occupational disease is compensable under the provisions of such Act.

Conclusion seven is supported by a legal opinion which is a part of the Committee's report.

I recommend, therefore, that the Board of Trustees authorize the payment of compensation to Dr. Lloyd Smith in accordance with the formula followed in other compensation cases governed by the Occupational Diseases Act of Illinois, in an amount yet to be determined.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this settlement was authorized as recommended.

AUTOMOBILE FOR THE VICE-PRESIDENT IN CHARGE OF CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(6) On an informal canvass of the Executive Committee, I recommend that the Board authorize the purchase of an automobile to be assigned to the Vice-President of the University, in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, for his use and that an appropriation of \$2,700, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be made for this purpose.

Quotations have been secured from several dealers on an appropriate type of car for this purpose. The Business Manager of the Chicago Professional Colleges, the Director of Purchases, and the Comptroller recommend the purchase of a Buick four-door roadmaster sedan, model 49-71, from Emil Dene-mark, Inc., Chicago, the lowest bidder, at a price of \$2,685.09.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins.

AUTOMOBILE FOR THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

President Williamson asked the Board to consider the purchase of an automobile for the President of the University to replace the University's Buick limousine which has been in service since February, 1940. Mr. Williamson presented a report from the Physical Plant Department which indicates that the Buick can no longer be kept in a condition safe for highway driving and that it should be replaced. He also presented quotations secured on several cars.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. JOHN MARKUS BLATT, Assistant Professor of Physics, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,500.
2. RUBIN G. COHN, Associate Professor of Law, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.

3. CHARLES C. COLBY, Visiting Graduate Professor of Geography, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$8,000.

4. ROBERT KAUL FINN, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,500.

5. WILLIAM S. KINNE, JR., Professor of Architecture, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.

6. JAMES A. PRESTRIDGE, JR., Assistant Professor of Architecture, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$4,200.

7. TOM CHRISTOPHER RIVES, Special Research Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering, beginning July 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,000.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

INTERNAL BUDGET OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FOR 1949-1950

(1) The Director of Intercollegiate Athletics submits, on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association, the budget of the Association for 1949-1950 which is summarized as follows with comparative figures for the preceding year:

On July 1, 1948, the Athletic Association had a net operating surplus of \$91,221 and a reserve for plant maintenance of \$12,523. It is estimated that on June 30, 1949, the operating surplus will be \$179,203 after allowing for an estimated lapse in 1948-1949 appropriations of \$25,000 and that the reserve for plant maintenance will remain \$12,523.

The budget has been examined by the Provost and the Comptroller, and all salaries have been reviewed by the President; those salaries paid jointly by the Athletic Association and the School of Physical Education have been approved by the Director of the School of Physical Education.

The budget includes an appropriation of \$10,000 to be allocated by the Board of Directors for contingency expenditures not to exceed \$1,000 for any one item.

I recommend that this budget be approved and that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments, including approval of new appointments and acceptances of resignations, as are necessary and recommended by the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association within the total estimated income, such changes to be reported to the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

APPOINTMENT OF JANICE M. SMITH AS ACTING HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF HOME ECONOMICS

(2) The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends the appointment of Dr. Janice M. Smith, now Professor of Nutrition in the Department of Home Economics, as Professor of Nutrition on indefinite tenure and as Acting Head of the Department of Home Economics for one year, from September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$8,000.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this appointment was made as recommended.

SALE OF COOK COUNTY AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION

(4) Since 1925, the Agricultural Experiment Station has been operating a substation in Cook County for the purpose of studying vegetable and floral crop production problems in northern Illinois. The Station consists of twenty acres of land south of DesPlaines, Illinois¹ purchased at a cost of \$16,000. Improvements include a house costing \$10,442.63, a tool shed costing \$1,193.64, a greenhouse costing \$11,706.73, tile drainage, and extension of electric service lines (for which the University was reimbursed by the utility company) and other improvements. The total capital investment in this Station is \$42,283.89.

The Cook County Experiment Station was established pursuant to an act of the General Assembly in 1923, which also appropriated \$25,000 for this purpose. The DesPlaines site was selected, after experiments were carried on in the spring of 1924 in different localities in Cook County and after more than fifty farms were inspected.

From 1925 to 1935, inclusive, the General Assembly made separate appropriations for the operation of this Station. Since then funds for it have been included in the University's biennial budgets.

During the past twenty-five years experiments have been conducted on critical problems of vegetable crop production in the northern Illinois area. These experiments have covered breeding and selection of productive varieties, plant disease control, cultural methods, and fertilizer needs of the crops. Results of these experiments have been published by the Agricultural Experiment Station in eight bulletins and circulars. Since 1926, truck growers' schools have been held annually at the Station, and in recent years a field day has been conducted each summer. Large numbers of interested growers come to the Station every season for help. In recent years, the College of Pharmacy has done some research work with drug plants there.

Due to urban developments in that vicinity the station should be given up and the work transferred elsewhere. Even though it is fenced on three sides, there is difficulty in controlling experiments because of trespassing and theft. Truck growers are moving to the west. Cook County truck growers generally recognize the inadvisability of attempting to continue working there under present conditions. Some phases of the work can be continued at the Morton Arboretum on land assigned to the College of Pharmacy.

The Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station recommends that this land be sold and the proceeds assigned to the Department of Horticulture for relocating this experimental work at the Morton Arboretum, where it can be integrated with the drug-plant research work of the College of Pharmacy, and elsewhere.

I recommend that the Board authorize the Committee on Agriculture to investigate this matter, with a view to selling this land, to employ a competent

appraiser to determine its market value, and to employ a real estate broker to negotiate with prospective purchasers, and report its recommendations to the Board.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted.

SALE OF INTEREST IN DRIVEWAY AT 1007 SOUTH WRIGHT STREET

(5) In purchasing the property at 1007 South Wright Street, Champaign (Minutes, October 30, 1947, page 882), the University acquired one-half of a driveway serving both its property and that of the Pi Beta Phi Sorority adjoining it on the north. Joint use of this driveway is impractical, and a drive to meet University needs has been provided on another part of the property.

The Pi Beta Phi Sorority has requested the University to sell its part of this drive at a recently appraised value of \$2,000, or \$500 a front foot. Sale of the south half of the driveway will not materially affect future permanent construction on this land by the University.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the sale. I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a deed of conveyance of the area, described as follows, for a consideration of \$2,000:

The North Four (4) Feet of the following: Commencing at a point 10 rods North and Sixty-six (66) Feet West of the Southeast corner of the Northwest Quarter of Section Eighteen (18), Township Nineteen (19) North, Range Nine (9), East of the Third Principal Meridian, running thence West One Hundred Seventy-four and one-half (174½) Feet, thence North Ninety-four (94) Feet, thence East One Hundred Seventy-four and one-half (174½) Feet, thence South Ninety-four (94) Feet to the place of beginning.

The proceeds will go into the general funds of the University.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this sale was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(6) The Governor has authorized the following release of funds from the appropriation made to the University of Illinois for 1947-1949 under "An Act making appropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent, and distributive expenses of State government," which includes appropriations totaling \$12,994,732 to the University for buildings and other capital improvements:

Release No. 574

"For contingencies to cover expenditures for purposes for which the amount appropriated in any item above enumerated is or becomes insufficient (total appropriation, \$618,845)\$78 000"

To augment Releases Nos. 35, 326, and 327 for the construction of student and staff apartments.

A release of \$48,405 from this same item previously authorized to supplement funds for the construction of student residence halls, not now needed for that project, has been cancelled by the Governor at the request of the University.

A report was made to the Board on June 25 that the Governor had been asked to approve this new release of \$78,000 to supplement funds for the construction of student and staff apartments.

I recommend that the Board appropriate this fund for the construction project.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell,

APPROPRIATION FOR PURCHASE OF LAND

(8) On April 21, 1949 (Minutes, page 310), the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of the 320-acre McCullough Farm and the purchase of eighty acres from the Sullivan heirs. On May 21, 1949 (Minutes, page 360), the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of the property at Sixth and John Streets in Champaign. All of these purchases are on the basis of contracts providing for annual payments and the Comptroller reports that in the year 1949-1950 the total of such payments will be \$55,500.

I recommend an appropriation of this amount.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins.

MARY G. McLELLAN SCHOLARSHIP IN ART

(9) Through the bequest of the late Mary G. McLellan of the Class of 1888, the University has a fund endowing a scholarship in art. This scholarship in art is awarded under regulations adopted by the Board of Trustees May 16, 1942 (Minutes, page 872). These regulations specify, as to eligibility:

"The Scholarship will be open to students of American citizenship who have been in residence for two (not necessarily consecutive) years in the Department of Art of the University of Illinois and meet the following requirements: (a) Recognized standing as graduating senior in the year the award is made, or graduating senior in the year preceding the date of award. (b) Applicant shall not be over twenty-five years of age, as of June first of the year application is made. Exception shall be made in the case of students who have performed military service for our country—in which case the age limit shall be extended by the period of the candidate's actual performance of military service."

As originally set up, the scholarship was to be a biennial award providing a stipend of \$1,200. Because of diminishing returns from invested funds, the stipend is decreased and it is not always possible to make an award every two years. Consequently, in fairness to students who might be candidates for the scholarship, the Department of Art recommends that the eligibility requirements be changed to read:

"The Scholarship will be open to students of American citizenship who have been in residence for two (not necessarily consecutive) years in the Department

of Art of the University of Illinois and meet the following requirements: (a) Recognized standing as graduating senior in the year the award is made, or graduating senior in the classes since the previous award was made. (b) . . ."

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this change was approved as recommended.

UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR STUDENTS FROM COOK COUNTY

(10) An Act of the General Assembly of Illinois, effective July 1, 1905, provides that there shall be awarded annually, in each county of the State, a University of Illinois scholarship to the high school graduate who passes with the highest grade a competitive examination given on the first Saturday in June under the supervision of the County Superintendent of Schools. Such scholarship exempts the holder from payment of tuition, matriculation, term, or incidental fees, but not laboratory fees or service charges. The University prescribes the rules and regulations under which the examinations are given and prepares the questions.

Recognizing the inequity in the distribution of these scholarships throughout the State, the Board of Trustees in 1941 established sixteen special scholarships in Cook County which are awarded to the candidates who rank in the next sixteen places, according to their grades, below the winner of the competitive examination. Last year 265 high school graduates applied for admission to the Cook County scholarship examination. This year 403 made such applications and 277 wrote the examination. Cook County still is not receiving its proportionate number of scholarships on the basis of population and the Assistant Superintendent of Schools of Cook County has asked if the University of Illinois can remedy the situation.

The Faculty Committee on Fees and Scholarships has considered this and recommends that the Board of Trustees increase the total number of special scholarships in Cook County by fifty, thus making a total of sixty-six scholarships available to those writing the competitive examination for the Cook County scholarship in addition to the winner who will receive the one provided by law.

The Committee further recommends that this be retroactive to June 1, 1949, so that these scholarships may be awarded candidates who wrote the Cook County scholarship examination on June 4, 1949. This is feasible because the examination was given recently, the records are still available, and it will be easy to notify the successful candidates.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were adopted. Mr. Herrick asked to be recorded as voting in the negative.

PATENT PROVISION IN AGREEMENT WITH UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

(11) The Research and Marketing Act of 1946 provides, among other things, for cooperation between the United States Department of Agriculture and various state agricultural experiment stations in determining "the best methods of processing, preparation for market, packaging, handling, transporting, storing, distributing, and marketing agricultural products." Funds for the work are to be allocated to the experiment stations on the basis of each approved project.

In order to reduce the amount of paper work required for individual research projects to a minimum, the United States Department of Agriculture proposes one general agreement between the Department and the Illinois Agricultural Experiment Station under which less formal documents covering individual projects can be executed. The Department proposes including in this master agreement the following provision relating to patentable discoveries:

"Patentable results of any work carried on under the terms of this agreement shall be made available to the public through dedication, assignment, or in such manner as the United States Department of Agriculture shall determine. Other results of research or investigations and information concerning the project shall be made known to the public by the State agency unless the project statement shall provide otherwise."

While this conflicts with the patentable provisions in the University of Illinois Statutes, the purpose in each case is the same—protection of the public. In the opinion of counsel for United States Department of Agriculture this provision is required by law.

The Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Chairman of the University Research Board recommend that the Board of Trustees waive the University's patent provisions in this particular case.

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this provision was waived in this instance as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR WATER AND GAS SERVICE EXTENSIONS TO SMALL HOMES COUNCIL STAFF HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT AREA

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend authorization of the following agreements for utilities installations in the Small Homes Council Staff Housing Research Project area at Race Street and Florida Avenue:

Illinois Water Service Company, installation of water service and fire hydrants at a cost of.....	\$5 918 36
Illinois Power Company, extension of gas service to the houses: main extension, \$1,243; excess service pipe, \$2,392.....	3 635 00

The Legal Counsel has reported his opinion and recommendation that these streets be not dedicated to the city of Urbana.

The cost of the gas main extension, \$1,243, is payable on signing of the agreement. This is refundable over a ten-year period if the gross revenue received by the company from gas service by the extension exceeds the estimated gross revenue on which free extensions are determined.

Funds are available in the appropriation for this project to pay for these installations.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these installations were authorized and authority given as recommended.

DEDICATION OF STREETS IN STAFF HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

(13) At the Board meeting on May 21, 1949, in connection with the award of contracts for the above project, a question of the dedication of streets in the housing area was deferred for further report and consideration by the Board.

The matter has been reviewed by the Legal Counsel, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller. The Legal Counsel has submitted comments on the situation (copy attached) in which he recommends against such dedication. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller concur in that recommendation.

I concur and recommend that the streets in this area not be dedicated to the city.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this recommendation was concurred in.

CONTRACT WITH SARGENT AND LUNDY FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES ON POWER PLANT EQUIPMENT

(14) On June 15, 1948 (Minutes, page 1159), the Board of Trustees authorized a plan for the installation of a 7,500 kw. generator in the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana contingent on the availability of sufficient funds in the State appropriation for buildings and permanent improvements for 1949-1951. The new generator was to increase power capacity to service the new buildings included in the original construction program for this biennium. Sufficient funds were not included in the State appropriations for 1949-1951 for the installation of a generator of this size. Moreover, not all of the buildings included in the original program will be constructed during 1949-1951, so that a smaller generator will suffice. On May 21, 1949 (Minutes, page 361), the Board of Trustees approved a revised plan for the installation of a new 3,000 kw. generator and auxiliary equipment.

The State appropriations made to the University for the construction of buildings and other capital improvements for 1949-1951 include \$1,275,000 for "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" and \$375,000 for "Construction of Extensions to the Utilities Distribution System" at Urbana.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the employment of Sargent and Lundy of Chicago, for engineering services on the installation of the 3,000 kw. generator and auxiliary equipment and on the Utilities Distribution System on the following basis: compensation for services will consist of current expense charges plus a fixed fee. The current expenses charge will be the engineering drafting at actual salaries plus 50 per cent for overhead, resident field engineers at actual salaries plus 10 per cent for overhead, clerical, travel, and miscellaneous expenses at actual cost. The fixed fee charge will be 2 per cent of the estimate mutually agreed upon by Sargent and Lundy and the University of the cost of the generator and auxiliary equipment, and 2 per cent of the actual cost (excluding Sargent and Lundy's charges and University engineering, supervisory, and overhead costs) of the extension of the distribution system. The fixed fee charge will be billed and paid in installments of 10 per cent when the services are ordered, 80 per cent in equal monthly installments based on the number of months it takes to complete the project, and 10 per cent when the project has been completed. It is estimated that the cost of engineering services under such an arrangement will total \$108,000. Funds are available in State appropriations for these projects.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$5,209 in the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company for the electrical work in the construction of the Mechanical Engineering Building. This increase is to provide for additional wiring in seven rooms which will be used for the Internal Combustion Engine Laboratory and in the Equipment Construction Shop. Wiring for these rooms was not included in the original contract because the exact type of equipment to be installed in these rooms was not known and consequently the power requirements could not be specified.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of the Mechanical Engineering Building.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT WITH ALLIS-CHALMERS MANUFACTURING COMPANY FOR SUPERVISION OF ASSEMBLY AND ERECTION OF BETATRON

(16) The University has a contract with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, for engineering services in supervising the assembly and erection of the Betatron. The Company provides expert supervisory personnel and is authorized to purchase necessary miscellaneous materials and tools, and to hire labor during the assembling of the Betatron. The contract is limited to an expenditure of \$25,000. The Board has also authorized a subcontract negotiated by Allis-Chalmers with the Pennoyer Merchants Transfer Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, for the actual rigging required for the Betatron.

Professors D. W. Kerst and F. W. Loomis and the Comptroller recommend that the Board authorize an increase of \$10,000 in the Allis-Chalmers contract to provide for additional materials and services to be supplied by that Company in connection with the construction of a large bias reactor at the New York Naval Shipyard. The reactor is not a part of the work contemplated in the

Allis-Chalmers contract. It was originally planned to have it built by some manufacturer of electrical equipment, but it was found that the Shipyard could do it for much less provided that responsible and skilled personnel representing the University was on hand to supervise the work. Arrangements have been made for Allis-Chalmers engineers experienced in coil winding to represent the University. The rates of compensation payable have been approved by the Head of the Department of Physics.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this change of contract was authorized as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR NATURAL RESOURCES GARAGE

(17) The State Geological and Natural History Surveys have requested the University to supervise certain alterations in the Natural Resources Building Garage to provide additional shop and storage space. The funds will be provided by the Geological Survey.

Dr. M. M. Leighton, Chief of the Geological Survey, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract for \$6,676.24 to Clyde Gates, the lowest bidder.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded as recommended.

REPORT ON ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(18) On January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 228), the Board of Trustees awarded a contract to the A. S. Schulman Electric Company for the electrical distribution work in connection with the construction of the Utilities Distribution System. This contract was subject to an escalation to a maximum of 16.4 per cent. The total amount of the contract to date is \$171,621.75, of which \$170,998.38 is subject to the escalation provision.

The Comptroller reports that the A. S. Schulman Electric Company has incurred additional costs under this escalation clause of \$29,811.10 but are limited by the maximum escalation provision to a reimbursement of \$28,043.73.

This report was received for record.

ADDITION TO HEATING AND VENTILATING CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(19) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase in the amount of \$7,172.65 in the contract with the Carson-Payson Company for heating and ventilating installations in the construction of the East Chemistry Building to provide for:

1. Substitution of reduced voltage starters in lieu of those specified for four large motors.....\$1 474 60
2. Provision for high-pressure steam service in the Instrumentation Laboratory and the Unit Operations Laboratory..... 5 698 05

Funds are available for these additions in the appropriation for the East Chemistry Building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute these additions.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these additions to contract were authorized as recommended.

INSURANCE ON AUTOMOBILE FLEET

(20) On May 21, 1949 (Minutes, page 366), the Board received a report on this problem and directed that bids be solicited, and authorized the Finance Committee to consider these bids and make an award.

In accordance with this action, bids were solicited on insurance for one year effective July 1, 1949, with limits of \$25,000 to \$50,000 bodily injury and \$5,000

property damage on the entire fleet of automotive equipment owned by the University, or leased. Such insurance is authorized under the Board policy on insurance. Requests for quotations were submitted to representatives of sixty-four companies. A total of eight representatives submitted bids. The lowest bid was submitted by W. R. Hidy, Champaign, for a premium of \$3,314.50, for insurance placed with the Hartford Indemnity Company.

The Finance Committee has reviewed the bids and has awarded this insurance to the lowest bidder for one year, with the right reserved by the University to renew in the same company for an additional year.

This report was received for record.

HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL SERVICE INSURANCE

(21) The University charges all students at Urbana-Champaign and in the Chicago Undergraduate Division who do not hold staff appointments a fee of \$5.00 a semester for hospital and medical service. It is the practice of the Board to place this insurance with a commercial insurance company. The present insurance expires August 31, 1949.

About a year ago at the request of several members of the staff I appointed a special committee to advise on a hospital and medical service insurance plan for the staff. This committee recommended that such a plan be set up, and its report was submitted to the Finance Committee of the Board for review.

Acting on instructions of the Finance Committee, the Business Office has secured quotations from interested companies on plans of insurance providing for the following coverages:

Student Plan

A. Hospital Residence, \$6.50 a day (present \$5.00) up to twenty-eight days in one semester.

B. Hospital Services, \$32.50 in one semester (present \$22.50).

C. Physician's Indemnity, \$3.00 a day for not more than two-thirds of the number of days of hospital residence, not exceeding \$56.00 in one semester (same as at present).

D. Surgical Benefits, per schedule, up to \$225.00 for disability (same as at present). (Maximum total allowance in maternity cases, \$55.00).

Staff Plan

A. Hospital Residence, \$6.50 a day, up to thirty-one days of confinement.

B. Hospital Services, \$32.50 a confinement.

C. Physicians Indemnity, \$3.00 a day not exceeding \$62.00 a hospital confinement.

D. Surgical Benefits (same as student plan). (Maximum total allowance in maternity cases, \$55.00).

The special staff committee has recommended that two separate contracts be made, but that both contracts be with the same company. The low proposal under such an arrangement is submitted by the Continental Casualty Company, Chicago, through George Franks, Champaign broker, for estimated premiums of \$221,507 for the Student Plan and \$191,200 for the Staff Plan (anticipating 75 per cent participation), a grand total of \$412,707.

It is recommended that the plan be self-supporting and that the premiums charged be sufficient to cover the estimated administrative cost to the University. The premium charges would be as follows:

The insurance would be written for one year but the company would be advised that it is the intention of the University to extend the policy for at least one additional year.

These proposals have been reviewed by the Finance Committee and approval is recommended by that Committee.

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

PURCHASES

(22) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Comptroller recommends the following purchases (see Appendix, page 522).

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these purchases were authorized as recommended.

AUTHORITY TO PURCHASE CATTLE

(23) The program for the purchase of feeding cattle for the Wright Farms for the 1949-1950 feeding season will be approximately as shown by the following schedule:

Such purchases are made on the basis of current market prices when suitable stock is available, and payment is due immediately. Under such conditions, it is impractical to request the approval of the Board of Trustees prior to each transaction.

The Director of Purchases, the Comptroller, and Professor J. B. Andrews of the College of Agriculture who supervises the Wright Farms, request authority to purchase feeding cattle substantially in accordance with the above schedule when such purchases are recommended by the farms manager. All such purchases will be reported to the Board of Trustees. They will be financed from the income of the Wright Farm operations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these purchases were authorized as recommended.

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL MEDICINE AND REHABILITATION

(24) The Dean of the College of Medicine and the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommend that the name of the Department of Physical Medicine, in the College of Medicine and the Research and Educational Hospitals, be changed to Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this change was made as recommended.

COMMITTEE TO HEAR OBJECTIONS TO DETERMINATION OF WAGE RATES MADE BY THE UNIVERSITY IN AWARDED CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(25) As reported to the Board on June 25, 1949 (Minutes, page 405), objections have been filed, under the prevailing wage act, to the determination of the prevailing rates of wages made by the University in awarding construction contracts at Robert Allerton Park in Piatt County. The act provides that a hearing on these objections be held.

The Board voted that the hearing be conducted by a committee of the faculty to be appointed by the President of the University. I nominate the following: Edward W. Cleary, Professor of Law, *Chairman*; Cecil A. Moyer, Associate Professor of Accountancy; and John B. Parrish, Associate Professor of Economics.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this committee was appointed as recommended.

CLOSING OF THE GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(26) It seems appropriate at this meeting of the Board of Trustees to make official record of the closing of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division. With this in mind there has been prepared a brochure reviewing the history of the Galesburg Division, entitled *The College Made in a Month*. I am pleased to present this brochure to the Board as a part of the official report. It will be distributed to members of the General Assembly and other State officials, to the Citizens Committee of the University, and to staff members of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division.

I submit also a report prepared by the Comptroller on expenditures, both capital and operating, on the Galesburg Undergraduate Division from the fall of 1946 to its closing date, June 30, 1949 (see Appendix, page 524).

This report was received for record.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(27) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed, June 11 to July 10, 1949 (see Appendix, page 525).

APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR F. B. ADAMSTONE AS HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF ZOOLOGY

(28) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Professor F. B. Adamstone, now Acting Head of the Department of Zoology and Physiology, as Professor and Head of the Department of Zoology on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1949, at a salary of \$7,500 an academic year.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

(29) As a matter of official information and record, I report the passage by the Sixty-sixth General Assembly of the following legislation affecting the University directly or indirectly (see Appendix, page 526).

REAPPROPRIATION OF UNEXPENDED BALANCES

(30) The Comptroller recommends that the following unexpended balances in appropriations made by the Board of Trustees for 1948-1949 for services and projects not completed as of June 30, 1949, be reappropriated for a period of sixty days from July 1, 1949 (see Appendix, page 530).

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these balances were reappropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr.

Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Stevenson, Mrs. Watkins.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR SANITARY SEWER

(31) The University has a contract with Mancini, Ventrella, and Sons, Chicago, for the construction of a sanitary sewer to serve the housing area and other buildings on the west side of the campus. As is customary in sewer contracts, this one contains a provision that if in the course of construction conditions not known at the time the contract was signed are encountered, the contractor is entitled to additional compensation as negotiated by him and the University.

In the course of this sewer construction quick-sand beds were encountered on the south side of Armory Avenue and on the north side of Green Street. As a result it is necessary to change the sewer plan by elevating the sewer line, using cast iron pipe to bridge the quick-sand beds at vulnerable points, and using larger tile in certain sections of the sewer. The alternative would be to pump out the quick-sand pockets and fill in with crushed rock which would be extremely expensive.

Changes agreed upon will cost \$4,500. The contractor has offered to assume half the cost because the change in the sewer plan is of some advantage to him. Wilson and Anderson, Consulting Engineers in charge, have approved the revised plan and recommend its acceptance. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller concur.

I recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute a change in this contract by increasing it \$2,250. Funds are available in the State appropriation for temporary housing for the biennium of 1947-1949. Since these funds were encumbered when the original contract was entered into they will be available until September 30.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change of contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR REWIRING PHYSICS LABORATORY

(32) The University has a contract with the Square Deal Electric Company, LaPorte, Indiana (Minutes, March 10, 1949, page 294), for the electrical installations in the repowering and relighting of the Physics Laboratory (the old Physics Building).

This contract covers the first phase of the repowering and relighting contract. It was anticipated that the second and third phases of this project would be completed with funds available in building appropriations for 1949-1951. Because of the reduction in building funds, the completion of the project will have to be postponed. The Head of the Department has therefore requested that certain additional temporary electrical facilities be installed before the beginning of the first semester of 1949-1950.

This work will consist of additional lighting fixtures in one room and additional electrical outlets in eight rooms at an estimated cost of \$2,410. Funds are available in the appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this project.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend this addition to the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company for this additional work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change in the contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this change in contract was authorized as recommended.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

PROCEDURE IN PURCHASE OF COAL

(33) At the Board meeting on June 25, 1949, in connection with the proposed contract for purchase of coal for the Urbana-Champaign power plant for 1949-1950, members of the Board requested information as to the procedure followed in judging the quality of coal supplied.

In response to this request the Director of Purchases has submitted through the Comptroller the following reports:

1. Extract from a "Survey of Business Administration Organization—University of Illinois" by Booz, Fry, Allen, and Hamilton, August 1, 1942, on "the University coal purchasing."

2. Copy of bid form on coal for 1949-1950 submitted to all prospective bidders, in which the requirements of quality are set forth (item 2, page 3) and the method by which tests of such quality will be made.

The Purchasing Division and the Physical Plant Department have given assurances that the program of tests will be regularly followed. A quarterly report of such tests will be made to the Board as requested.

This report was received for record.

CONTRACT WITH WARNER CONSTRUCTION COMPANY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

Report of a Special Committee

(34) On December 30, 1948, acting pursuant to authorization by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, President John R. Forno appointed Mr. Kenney E. Williamson of the Board of Trustees and the President of the University a special committee to review all matters in dispute relating to the contract with the Warner Construction Company, Chicago, for the construction of the Women's Residence Hall (Lincoln Avenue Residence), and to make recommendations concerning the same to the Board. Subsequently, this Committee employed special counsel to represent it in direct negotiations with counsel for the Warner Construction Company.

The Committee recommends a settlement on numerous changes in the contract representing credits to the University for work omitted and extra payments to the contractor for additional work ordered—all relating to grading of the site, construction of sidewalks and driveways, and other work outside of the building but a part of the general contract. The net increase originally requested by the Warner Company was \$19,086.26. Your committee's attorney and the University Architect recommended a settlement of \$12,087.28, to which the contractor has agreed. This represents an increase of \$1,275.43 in the fixed fee to be paid under the contract, and an increase of \$11,594.85 in construction costs.

Your committee recommends approval and authorization of the contract change orders necessary to implement this settlement. It affects only one phase of the construction contract and not settlement of the question of damages resulting from the delay in completion of the building.

STEAM HEATING PLANT FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

Resolution authorizing acceptance of ordinance passed on June 22, 1949, by City Council of the City of Chicago

Resolved: That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby authorizes, empowers and directs the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and file with the City Clerk of the City of Chicago, Illinois, an acceptance of the ordinance duly passed by the City Council of such City on June 22, 1949 (and now effective subject only to the

filing of such acceptance) granting permission and authority "to the University of Illinois, a corporation, its successors and assigns, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance, to excavate for, install and maintain conduits, tunnels, steam and condensate pipes and related accessories in any and all streets, avenues, alleys, and public places within the boundaries of the 'Medical Center District' as now or hereafter established," in said City of Chicago; such acceptance to be in the form submitted to this meeting; that the Secretary of this Board be and he is hereby directed to file with the records of this meeting, properly identified, a copy of such acceptance in the form submitted to this meeting; and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed, at the time of filing such acceptance with such City Clerk, to pay to the City of Chicago, in the name and on behalf of this Board, as compensation for the privileges granted in and by such ordinance, the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00), for the full term of such ordinance, in compliance with the provisions of Section 4 of such ordinance.

Ordinance

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Permission and authority hereby are given and granted to the University of Illinois, a corporation, its successors and assigns, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance, to excavate for, install and maintain conduits, tunnels, steam and condensate pipes and related accessories in any and all streets, avenues, alleys, and public places within the boundaries of the "Medical Center District" as now or hereafter established, the present boundaries being Ashland Boulevard on the East, a line co-incidental with Congress Street extending from Ashland Boulevard in a westerly direction to Oakley Boulevard on the North, Oakley Boulevard on the West and Roosevelt Road on the South, together with the necessary manholes, for a period of forty (40) years from and after the date of the passage of this ordinance, and thereafter until terminated by at least six months' written notice by the City to the grantee, or by like notice from the grantee to the City.

SECTION 2. Said conduits, tunnels, steam and condensate pipes, accessories and manholes shall be installed under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works and shall be maintained in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Chicago and the directions of the Commissioner of Public Works. If and when requested by the Commissioner of Public Works, the grantee shall file with such Commissioner at any time or from time to time, as and when any construction work is done by the grantee pursuant to this ordinance, a plat or plats showing the location of said conduits, tunnels, steam and condensate pipes, accessories and manholes. The grantee shall keep that portion of any street, avenue, alley or public way over the structures and appliances herein authorized, and the openings thereto, in good condition and repair, safe for public travel, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works. Upon termination of the privileges herein granted by lapse of time, or otherwise, the grantee, without cost or expense to the City of Chicago, shall, upon the written request of the City, remove the structures and appliances herein authorized, and in the event of the failure, neglect or refusal of the grantee so to do, the City of Chicago may do said work and charge the cost thereof to the grantee.

SECTION 3. The grantee will hold and save the City of Chicago harmless from any and all liability for cost of removal, relocation, alteration, repair or maintenance of the structures or appliances herein authorized and from any and all damages thereto on account of the location, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair or maintenance of any public ways, bridges, subways, tunnels, vaults, sewers, water mains, conduits, pipes, poles and other utilities.

SECTION 4. The grantee agrees to pay the City of Chicago as compensation for the privileges herein granted the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for the full term of this ordinance, said payment to be made as of the date of the acceptance of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, provided the grantee files a written acceptance of this ordinance with the City Clerk within six months after the passage of this ordinance.

Resolution authorizing assignment to Medical Center Steam Company of ordinance passed June 22, 1949, by City Council of the City of Chicago

Resolved: That, upon the filing with the City Clerk of the City of Chicago of the acceptance (authorized to be filed in and by another resolution this day adopted by this Board) of the ordinance hereinafter in this resolution mentioned, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby authorizes, empowers and directs the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver to Medical Center Steam Company, an Illinois corporation, an assignment of all the rights, benefits, privileges and advantages granted and conferred by the ordinance duly passed by the City Council of the City of Chicago, Illinois, on June 22, 1949, granting permission and authority "to the University of Illinois, a corporation, its successors and assigns, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance, to excavate for, install and maintain conduits, tunnels, steam and condensate pipes and related accessories in any and all streets, avenues, alleys and public places within the boundaries of the 'Medical Center District' as now or hereafter established," in said City of Chicago; such assignment to be substantially in the form submitted to this meeting; and that the Secretary of this Board be and he is hereby directed to file with the records of this meeting, properly identified, a copy of such assignment in the form submitted to this meeting.

Resolution authorizing execution of revised steam contract with Medical Center Steam Company

Resolved: That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby approves, in the form submitted to this meeting, the proposed revised agreement between Medical Center Steam Company, a corporation organized on June 28, 1949, and now existing under the laws of Illinois, and this Board (such proposed revised agreement being a revision of the proposed agreement approved for execution by this Board at its meeting held on May 21, 1949), providing for the construction by the Steam Company of a central steam plant and distribution system and the furnishing of steam service to the University, and through the University to other institutions located within the Medical Center District as defined in such revised agreement, all upon the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in such revised agreement; that the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver such revised agreement in the form submitted to this meeting or with such changes in such form, not of substance, as may be approved by such officers, their approval of any such changes to be conclusively evidenced by their execution and the delivery of such revised agreement; that upon the execution of such revised agreement by this Board and the Steam Company, the proper officers or agents of this Board be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed to do all such things as may be necessary to carry out and perform all of the obligations of this Board under such revised agreement; and that the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to file with the records of this meeting, properly identified, a copy of such revised agreement in the form submitted to this meeting, and also, if any changes be made in such agreement prior to the execution thereof, a copy thereof as executed and delivered by the parties thereto.

Resolution authorizing conveyance of certain real estate to Medical Center Steam Company

Resolved: That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, in furtherance of the purposes of the steam contract dated as of July 1, 1949, between Medical Center Steam Company and this Board, hereby authorizes, empowers and directs the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver to Medical Center Steam Company, an Illinois corporation, a warranty deed conveying to such Medical Center Steam Company the following described real estate, to wit:

AGREEMENT dated as of July 1, 1949, between Medical Center Steam Company (hereinafter called the "Company") and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois (hereinafter called the "University")

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, the Company is an Illinois corporation organized for the exclusive purpose of providing central steam service to the University, and through the University to other institutions in the Medical Center District (as hereinafter defined) as may from time to time enter into contracts with the University for steam service pursuant hereto; and

Whereas, the University requires an adequate and continuous steam supply for its teaching and research programs and for the care of patients in its own and other hospitals with which the University may contract pursuant hereto; and

Whereas, the existing facilities of the University are inadequate to provide such service to the new buildings to be constructed by the University; and

Whereas, the Company, an Illinois corporation, has been organized by Commonwealth Edison Company, the Company's sole stockholder, at the request of the University; and

Whereas, the Company's charter powers are limited to the furnishing of central steam service to the University; and

Whereas, the University desires to contract with the Company for steam service in accordance with the terms hereof;

Now, Therefore, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE I. DEFINITION OF MEDICAL CENTER DISTRICT

SECTION 1.01. The term "Medical Center District" shall mean an area within the City of Chicago the boundaries of which are Ashland Boulevard on the East, a line co-incidental with Congress Street extending from Ashland Boulevard on a westerly direction to Oakley Boulevard on the North, Oakley Boulevard on the West and Roosevelt Road on the South.

Such area for the purposes of this agreement may be increased or decreased but only by agreement of the Company and the University.

ARTICLE II. PROPERTY ADDITIONS AND REPLACEMENTS

SECTION 2.01. The Company in accordance with a reasonable time schedule approved in writing by the University shall construct a low pressure central steam plant and distribution system in accordance with plans and specifications prepared and approved as provided in Section 2.02. The facilities to be provided by the Company, in addition to such plant and distribution system, shall include all land, rights, privileges and permits therefor, together with a reasonable inventory of operating and maintenance materials and supplies, fuel and an adequate cash working fund. The Company shall not be obligated, without its consent, to expend more than \$10,000,000 for all facilities provided hereunder including the construction of the initial system and all additions thereto.

SECTION 2.02. Plans and specifications for the initial facilities shall be prepared by the Company in accordance with the general directions of the University. Plans and specifications for additions to and replacements of the Company's facilities shall be prepared by the Company in accordance with the general directions of the University. Before the Company proceeds with any such work the plans and specifications therefor shall have been approved in writing by the University. Before the Company enters into any construction contract which involves or may involve \$50,000 or more, such contract shall have been approved in writing by the University.

SECTION 2.03. The Company shall have the right, if necessitated by operating emergency, to make replacements of and additions to its facilities after consultation with the University but without prior approval of the plans and specifications therefor by the University, provided that the Company shall not expend under the provisions of this Section 2.03 more than \$50,000 in any calendar year.

SECTION 2.04. If, at any time, the Company is of the opinion that an addition to or replacement of any of its facilities is necessary to the safe operation of such facilities, and if the University fails within a period of 60 days to approve plans and specifications for such work, the Company shall have the right to refer the matter to arbitration as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2.05. The University shall at all times have designated a qualified person to act for it, with full power to sign requests, approvals, consents, designations and other authorizations hereunder, and to receive notices, requests, demands or other communications hereunder.

ARTICLE III. STEAM SERVICE

SECTION 3.01. The Company shall furnish steam service and the University shall take and pay for such service upon the terms and conditions hereof.

SECTION 3.02. The University shall have the right to furnish steam contracted for herein by the University and not required by it for its own use, to any governmental agency, charitable institution or other institution located in the Medical Center District upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by contract between the University and such governmental agency, charitable institution or other institution.

SECTION 3.03. The Company shall furnish the University, and any governmental agency, charitable institution or other institution located in the Medical Center District having a contract with the University pursuant to Section 3.02, such amount of steam service as the University shall request from time to time subject only to the limitation that, if at any time the service requested to be furnished from any facility exceeds the capacity of such facility, the service from such facility shall be limited as directed by the University.

ARTICLE IV. THE COMPANY'S INVESTMENT

SECTION 4.01. The Company's "investment" in facilities, other than facilities comprising working capital, for any month shall mean the cost of such facilities, including carrying charges during construction as hereinafter provided. The Company's "investment" in working capital for any month shall mean (a) the cost of the Company's inventory of operating and maintenance materials and supplies and fuel, plus (b) an allowance for cash working funds in the amount of 2% of the Company's investment in all facilities other than working capital.

SECTION 4.02. The Company's "amortization reserve" for facilities shall mean the amortization charged with respect to such facilities after deducting retirements and adding net salvage.

SECTION 4.03. The Company's "unamortized investment" in facilities shall mean the Company's investment in such facilities after deducting the Company's "amortization reserve" with respect thereto. Any contributions received by the Company in aid of construction shall also be deducted in determining the Company's unamortized investment in facilities. The University shall have the right to make such contributions at any time before, during or after construction.

ARTICLE V. THE COMPANY'S CHARGES

SECTION 5.01. For each month the Company shall be entitled to an investment charge comprising the sum of the amounts calculated as follows:

- (a) From the total of the Company's unamortized investment as of the beginning of such month in all facilities there shall be deducted the weighted average principal amount of the Company's indebtedness to others than Commonwealth Edison Company, and the remainder shall be multiplied by one-twelfth of 5%; provided, however, that for months prior to the month of July, 1951 such remainder shall be deemed to be the weighted average principal amount of the Company's indebtedness to Commonwealth Edison Company;

- (b) The interest accrued, including amortization of debt discount, premium and expense, during such month on the Company's indebtedness to others than Commonwealth Edison Company; and
- (c) An income tax charge for such month calculated as follows:
 - (1) The estimated income tax to be incurred by Commonwealth Edison Company during the current calendar year upon income from investments by Commonwealth Edison Company in the Company shall be divided by twelve. The amount thus determined shall be the "income tax accrual" for such month.
 - (2) There shall be added to or subtracted from the income tax accrual for such month the amount of any proper adjustments of income tax charges for periods prior to such month.

SECTION 5.02. For each month beginning with the month of July, 1951 the Company shall be entitled to an amortization charge calculated as follows:

- (a) The amortization charge for each month prior to the month of June, 1981 shall be equal to the quotient obtained by dividing
 - (1) the Company's unamortized investment as of the beginning of such month in all facilities, other than facilities comprising working capital, by
 - (2) the number of months in the period from the beginning of such month to the end of the month of June, 1981.
- (b) The amortization charge for the month of June, 1981 shall be the amount necessary to make the Company's amortization reserve for all facilities, other than facilities comprising working capital, equal to the Company's investment in such facilities, all as of the end of such month.

SECTION 5.03. For each month the Company shall be entitled to a general tax charge calculated as follows:

- (a) From the amount provided by the Company for taxes for such month, there shall be deducted any amount included therein for revenue taxes charged for under Section 5.06. The amount thus determined shall be the Company's "general tax accrual" for such month.
- (b) There shall be added to or subtracted from the general tax accrual for such month the amount of any proper adjustments of general tax accruals for periods prior to such month.

SECTION 5.04. For each month the Company shall be entitled to an operating charge calculated by deducting from the amounts properly charged by the Company for such month to operating expenses and maintenance the amounts included therein for fuel and the net cost of ash disposal.

SECTION 5.05. For each month the Company shall be entitled to a steam charge calculated by adding to the cost of fuel burned during the month the net cost of ash disposal.

SECTION 5.06. For each month the Company shall be entitled to a revenue tax charge, if any is payable. The revenue tax charge shall be equal to the amount for such month of all gross revenue, sales or other similar taxes payable by the Company.

SECTION 5.07. The Company's carrying charges during construction included in investment as provided in Section 4.01 shall be such portion of its charges under Section 5.01 to 5.06, inclusive, as is properly allocable to construction; provided, however, that no amount shall be allocable to construction which shall have been billed to the University subject to current payment. The remainder of such charges shall be billed to the University monthly and paid for by it as hereinafter provided.

ARTICLE VI. METHOD OF OPERATION

SECTION 6.01. The Company shall operate its facilities in a prudent and efficient manner and subject to the general direction of the University. Operations of the Company may be conducted, in whole or in part, by Commonwealth Edison Company for the Company. The payments by the Company to Edison for such services shall not include any profit to Edison but, insofar as such services are furnished to the Company by employees of Edison, the payments therefor shall include properly calculated compensation to Edison for all indirect costs, including pensions, payroll taxes, vacations, supervision and idle-time. Because the University and others having contracts with the University pursuant to Section 3.02

are engaged in activities of an educational or charitable character, the Company's payment to Edison for the general administration of the Company shall be limited to \$1,000 per month. No compensation shall be paid by the Company to its officers or directors. Nothing in this Section shall be deemed to preclude the payment of interest and dividends to Edison.

SECTION 6.02. The University, once in each calendar year, shall be furnished a copy of an audit report, in reasonable detail, by Edison's regular independent public accountants which shall be a firm of recognized national standing.

SECTION 6.03. The University shall have access at all reasonable times to the properties, accounts and records of the Company for the purpose of determining compliance with the provisions hereof.

ARTICLE VII. MONTHLY BILLS

SECTION 7.01. As soon as practicable after the end of each month, the Company shall render the University a bill for all charges determined by the Company to be due hereunder up to the end of such month, and the University shall pay such bill within 30 days after the receipt thereof. Such monthly bills shall include such information as the University may request from time to time as to the service furnished to the University and others having contracts with the University pursuant to Section 3.02. The Company shall also, from time to time, upon request of the University, furnish to the University such information as the University may reasonably request in order to enable it to determine the accuracy and reasonableness of bills rendered in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement.

SECTION 7.02. If it shall be found at any time during the term hereof that any bill rendered by the Company to the University has not been determined in accordance with the provisions hereof, the Company shall promptly correct such bill. If the University and the Company cannot agree as to the correctness of any bill, such bill shall nevertheless be paid when due under the provisions of Section 7.01 but the matter shall be submitted to arbitration as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 7.03. Should the University fail to pay in full any bill when due, the Company shall have the right to discontinue, for that cause, the furnishing of service hereunder until such bill is paid, after giving the University 15 days' notice of the Company's intention to do so. Any such discontinuance shall not discharge the University from its obligation to continue to make all payments in accordance with the provisions hereof. The right of the Company to discontinue the furnishing of service as above provided shall be cumulative and in addition to any and every other remedy given hereunder or otherwise existing.

ARTICLE VIII. ARBITRATION

SECTION 8.01. If, at any time, a difference of opinion shall arise between the parties hereto in regard to their respective rights, duties and obligations hereunder, or in respect of any payments to be made by virtue hereof, and the parties hereto are unable to come to a mutual agreement thereon within 90 days thereafter, or within a longer period if both parties agree thereto, the question, or questions, in dispute shall be referred to a Board of Arbitrators consisting of three persons skilled in the particular matter which is the subject of dispute.

SECTION 8.02. Each of the parties hereto shall choose one of such arbitrators, and the two so chosen shall select the third arbitrator.

SECTION 8.03. The party desiring such arbitration shall give written notice thereof to the other party, setting forth definitely therein the point, or points, in dispute and naming the person selected by such party to act as arbitrator.

SECTION 8.04. If the party on whom such notice is served shall for 20 days thereafter fail to name by notice to the other party a person to act as its arbitrator, then the party giving such notice shall name the second arbitrator, and the two thus chosen shall select the third arbitrator.

SECTION 8.05. If the two arbitrators chosen as herein provided shall be unable to agree upon a third arbitrator within 20 days after their appointment (or if they were appointed on different days, then within 20 days after the appointment of the one last appointed), then such third arbitrator shall be named and selected

by the person who at the time shall be performing the duties of Chief Judge of the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, Eastern Division, and application may be made upon two days' notice in writing to the parties hereto by either or both arbitrators to such Judge for such purpose.

SECTION 8.06. The Board of Arbitrators so chosen shall immediately proceed to hear and determine all matters submitted to them, after giving to each party hereto not less than five days' notice of the time and place of meeting; and at the time and place appointed, they shall proceed promptly to hear and dispose of the matters in dispute unless in their judgment the hearing should be adjourned to a later day or days, of which adjournment like notice shall be given unless notice is waived by both parties, in which case the hearing may proceed at any earlier day.

SECTION 8.07. The determination of such Board of Arbitrators acting by majority vote as to any matter so submitted to them shall be final and conclusive upon the parties hereto, and such parties shall abide by such decision and perform the conditions thereof as if the same were made a part hereof.

SECTION 8.08. All expenses connected with such arbitration, including a reasonable compensation to the arbitrators, shall be borne by the Company and shall be included in its operating expenses for purposes of billing hereunder.

ARTICLE IX. TERM

SECTION 9.01. The term of this agreement shall be for a period commencing July 1, 1949, and terminating June 30, 1981. Upon such termination the Company shall convey to the University all the Company's facilities, other than facilities comprising working capital, and all the Company's inventory of operating and maintenance materials and supplies and fuel, and upon such conveyance the University shall pay to the Company (a) all unpaid charges for service furnished hereunder including costs of discontinuing the business of the Company, (b) an amount equal to the cost of the Company's inventory of operating and maintenance materials and supplies and fuel, and (c) an amount equal to any redemption premium, including accrued interest, the Company is obligated to pay on indebtedness of the Company held by others than Commonwealth Edison Company.

SECTION 9.02. The University shall have the right to terminate this agreement and to have such facilities conveyed to it at any time prior to its regular termination upon six months' written notice to the Company upon payment to the Company, in addition to the amounts required to be paid under Section 9.01, of an amount equal to the Company's unamortized investment in all facilities other than facilities comprising working capital.

SECTION 9.03. The right of the University to have such facilities of the Company conveyed to it upon termination hereof under either Section 9.01 or 9.02 shall be subject to the prior discharge of any and all mortgage liens on such facilities, and the Company agrees, upon such termination and upon the making by the University of the payment required to be made by it, to deposit with the trustee or trustees under such mortgage lien or liens funds sufficient for the discharge thereof.

ARTICLE X. MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 10.01. The Company shall not be liable to the University, or to others having contracts with the University pursuant to Section 3.02, for any loss or damage resulting from delay in delivery or non-delivery of all or any portion of the steam service to be furnished hereunder unless such delay or non-delivery occurs through the negligence or wilful default of the Company. The Company shall, however, in the event of any such delay or non-delivery, promptly take all reasonable steps to establish service or resume full service at the earliest practicable time.

SECTION 10.02. Subject to the provisions of Section 10.01, during the term hereof the Company shall indemnify the University against all claims for damages in favor of third persons arising from the construction, installation, relocation, removal, operation or maintenance of the Company's facilities; and the Company shall reimburse the University for all damages, costs, expenses and attorneys' fees that the University may be put to or incur in defending, or by reason of, any suit brought against it for such damages; provided, however, that all expenditures

made and costs incurred, including damages, by the Company with respect to any such claim, and all reimbursements of the University by the Company with respect to any such suit, shall be included in the Company's operating expenses for the purposes of billing hereunder unless the Company's outlays for such purposes shall have resulted from the negligence or wilful default of the Company. During the term hereof the University shall indemnify the Company against all claims for damages in favor of third persons arising from the construction, installation, relocation, removal, operation or maintenance of the University's facilities; and the University shall reimburse the Company for all damages, costs, expenses and attorneys' fees that the Company may be put to or incur in defending, or by reason of, any suit brought against it for such damages.

SECTION 10.03. Unless the party addressed shall otherwise consent in writing, each notice, request, demand or other communication required to be given or which may be given under any provision of this agreement shall be given in writing. Each such communication shall be addressed to such person or place as may be designated in writing from time to time by the party addressed. If no person or place has been designated with respect to a particular type of communication to the University, it shall be addressed to the person designated by the University under the provisions of Section 2.05. If no person or place has been designated with respect to a particular type of communication to the Company, it shall be addressed to the Company at 72 West Adams Street, Chicago, Illinois.

SECTION 10.04. This agreement is entered into, on behalf of the Company, subject to the consent and approval of Illinois Commerce Commission.

SECTION 10.05. All provisions and terms of this contract shall be subject to the provisions of Article 4, Section 18 of the Constitution of Illinois, 1870, and to Section 7 of an Act to provide for the organization and maintenance of the University of Illinois, approved February 28, 1867, as amended, the same being Section 28 of Chapter 144, of the Illinois Revised Statutes, 1947.

SECTION 10.06. This agreement is executed in duplicate, and shall inure to and be binding upon the respective successors and assigns of the Company and the University; provided, however, that neither party may assign this agreement without the prior written consent of the other party.

In Witness Whereof, Medical Center Steam Company has caused this agreement to be executed in its corporate name by its President, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by its Secretary, and The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has caused this agreement to be executed in its name by its Comptroller and its Secretary, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed by its Secretary, all as of the day and year first above written.

SENATE BILL 235. "An Act to amend Section 2 of 'An Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the University of Illinois.'" (Approved by the Governor).

This is an adjustment in the appropriation made to the University for the biennium of 1947-1949 from the University Income Fund.

HOUSE BILL 826. "An Act to make a certain reappropriation to the University of Illinois." (Approved by the Governor).

Reappropriates \$500,000 from the 1947-1949 building funds for the construction of the Betatron and associated equipment.

SENATE BILL 251. "An Act making appropriations for expenses incident to the operation of the Institute of Tuberculosis Research." (Approved by the Governor).

Appropriates \$143,000 to the University of Illinois for the operation of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research.

SENATE BILL 249. "An Act authorizing and directing the Medical Center Commission to convey certain real property located in the City of Chicago, Illinois, to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois." (Approved by the Governor).

Authorizes and directs the Medical Center Commission to transfer to the Board of Trustees of the University the title to the Institution for Tuberculosis Research property in Chicago.

SENATE BILL 250. "An Act to amend Section 2 of 'An Act to provide for the establishment of an Institution for Tuberculosis Research, to prescribe the powers and duties of various public bodies in relation thereto, and to make appropriations in connection therewith.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Transfers the management and control of the Institution for Tuberculosis Research to the Board of Trustees of the University. The management of the Institution heretofore has been carried on jointly by the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium and the University.

Other Legislation

SENATE BILL 80. "An Act to amend Section 125 of the 'Illinois Insurance Code.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Permits domestic insurance companies to invest funds in University of Illinois revenue bonds.

SENATE BILL 276. "An Act to amend Section 7 of 'An Act to provide for the organization and maintenance of the University of Illinois.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Authorizes the Board of Trustees to make payments to local governments in lieu of real estate taxes on certain University properties.

SENATE BILL 323. "An Act to amend Sections 5, 8, 8½, and 23 of 'An Act in relation to State finance.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Amends the State Finance Act to eliminate special funds including the old University of Illinois Fund, formerly known as the "Mill Tax Fund." (This should not be confused with the University Income Fund.) The University formerly derived part of its revenues from the mill tax, a tax on real and personal property. The Act of 1933 establishing the Retailers' Occupation Tax (Sales Tax) provides that revenues from this tax shall be paid into the funds previously established and maintained by revenues from property taxes. The elimination of the Mill Tax and other special funds by Senate Bill 323 is of no significance so far as revenues are concerned but it will simplify to some extent the business operations of the State government.

HOUSE BILL 421. "An Act to amend Section 36a of 'An Act to regulate the civil service of the State of Illinois.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Returns University of Illinois Civil Service to pre-World War basis by eliminating wartime regulations relating to certification; permits waiving of State residence requirement for technical positions.

HOUSE BILL 984. "An Act to amend the title and Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 of 'An Act in relation to the founding and operation of Research and Educational Hospitals of the State of Illinois.'" (Vetoed by the Governor).

Changes the name of "Research and Educational Hospitals" to "University of Illinois Hospitals."

SENATE BILL 210. "An Act to amend Section 3 of 'An Act to establish a surgical institution for children.'" (Vetoed by the Governor).

Requires the University of Illinois to provide education for children who are patients in the Illinois Surgical Institute for Children.

SENATE BILL 126. "An Act to amend Sections 30-9 and 30-10 of 'The School Code.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Provides that failure of a member of the General Assembly to make a nomination for a University of Illinois scholarship in any year will not cause that scholarship to lapse, but the member may make a nomination for such scholarship at any time before the expiration of his term.

SENATE BILL 288. "An Act to amend Sections 30-9 and 30-10 of 'The School Code.'" (Vetoed by the Governor).

Provides that each member of the General Assembly may award annually two University of Illinois scholarships instead of one.

SENATE BILL 497. "An Act to add Section 9a to 'An Act to regulate the civil service of the State of Illinois.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Provides that University of Illinois employees transferring to other civil service positions in Illinois will retain seniority rights.

SENATE BILL 561. "An Act to amend Sections 1, 4, 5, 6 and 8 of 'An Act to provide for reciprocal allowance of credits for retirement, death and disability benefits between the State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois, the University Retirement System of Illinois and the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois, and for the transfer of certain funds between said systems.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Provides reciprocity between State, University, and Teachers' Retirement funds.

SENATE BILL 545. "An Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of certain boards, commissions and agencies." (Vetoed in part by the Governor).

Includes an appropriation of \$826,486 to the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois for necessary operating expenses and reserves of the Retirement System. Other funds are included in appropriations to participating institutions.

SENATE BILL 577. "An Act making an appropriation for Air Navigation Facilities." (Approved by the Governor).

Includes an appropriation of \$3,278,000 to the State Department of Aeronautics for airport development. The University has been informed that the Department has planned to assign \$50,000 of this appropriation for improvements in the University of Illinois Airport.

SENATE BILL 655. "An Act making reappropriations for certain additional ordinary, contingent and distributive expenses of State government." (Vetoed in part by the Governor).

An appropriation to the State Department of Public Health for the construction of a State Tuberculosis Hospital in Cook County which includes an item of \$280,000 to be applied toward the construction of a central steam heating plant in the Medical Center District.

HOUSE BILL 745. "An Act making an additional appropriation to the Medical Center Commission for acquisition of land." (Approved by the Governor).

Appropriates \$250,000 to the Medical Center Commission for land acquisition.

SENATE BILL 635. "An Act to regulate the supervision, accountability and control of all State owned properties, both real and personal, providing certain penalties and repealing an Act therein named." (Approved by the Governor).

Directs the State Auditor of Public Accounts to set up a system of inventory control which will make the executive officers of State departments and institutions (in the case of the University of Illinois, the President of the University) accountable to the Auditor for the supervision, control, and inventory of all State-owned property. Requires each responsible State officer to conduct a survey and report such survey under oath before disposal (including trade-ins) of State-owned property.

HOUSE BILL 400. "An Act to amend Sections 2.5, 2.10, 2.16, 4.1, 4.2, 5.1, 5.3, and 5.4 of 'An Act to provide for the creation, maintenance, and administration of a Retirement System for the benefit of the staff members and employees of the University of Illinois and of certain other State educational and scientific agencies.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Increases employee contributions to University Retirement System of Illinois from 3½ per cent to 5 per cent.

HOUSE BILL 226. "An Act to add Section 18-5.1 to 'The School Code.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Provides for the payment from State funds to school districts of the annual tuition cost of children attending public schools who live in houses on land owned

by the State from which no property tax revenues are derived by the school districts serving such children.

SENATE BILL 373. "An Act to amend Section 4 of 'An Act to regulate the practice of public accounting and to repeal certain Acts therein named.'" (Approved by the Governor).

Provides that public accountants applying for a certificate of Certified Public Accountant by special examination must have held certificates as public accountants and have had five years of experience in the State instead of ten years as heretofore required.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS BUDGET FOR 1949-1950

(Approved by the Board of Trustees July 28, 1949, page 491)

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1, 1949.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance is lapsed at that time, resulting in a reduction in the budget.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending the appointment of someone to the position, be drawn against by time cards submitted to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges *may not exceed the amount of time provided* by the position unless indicated herein or otherwise approved by the President.

All unexpended balances remaining in the salary budget lapse at the close of each calendar month unless previously assigned or encumbered. Such lapses do not result in a reduction in the budget.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and "Expense and Equipment" except with the approval of the President of the University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be requested between "Salaries" and "Wages" and between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" upon notice to the Comptroller, stating the reason for such transfer.

Appropriations for "Expense and Equipment" and for "Wages" are available for one year beginning July 1, 1949, and ending June 30, 1950. All unexpended balances lapse June 30, 1950. The reappropriation of funds will be considered only in special situations.

The services required for members of the academic and administrative staff are in accordance with "Terms of Employment" adopted by the Board of Trustees on January 8, 1948.

a. For those positions indicated entirely as "Y", or for that portion of time indicated as "Y", services are required for the full year of twelve months, with allowance of one month for vacation. No additional compensation is allowed for summer session services for any salary or portion of salary indicated as "Y".

b. For those positions in the academic budget not indicated as "Y", or for that portion of time not indicated as "Y", services are required only during the regular academic year of two semesters (three terms in the Chicago Professional Colleges). If teaching is required during the Summer Session, it will be covered by an additional appointment with salary.

The services required for members of the nonacademic staff are for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacation, in accordance with civil service regulations. Salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments and positions are indicated as "H".

Symbols

- A — Indefinite tenure, payable in twelve monthly installments.
- B — Two years from September 1, 1949, payable in twelve monthly installments.
- D — One year from September 1, 1949, payable in twelve monthly installments.
- E — The academic year 1949-1950, payable in ten installments of which the first and last shall be half installments and the other eight full installments equal to one-ninth of the annual salary.
- G — Special tenure as described.
- H — In accordance with civil service regulations, beginning July 1, 1949.
- Y — When following A, B, D, or G, indicates that services are required throughout the year, except for allowable vacation, without additional compensation.

Part-time

When any of the above symbols is combined with a number, the number indicates the fraction of time in per cent covered by the position.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

**DETERMINATION OF WAGE RATES TO BE SPECIFIED IN
CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK**

(1) The Board of Trustees on July 28, 1949, appointed Professors E. W. Cleary, C. A. Moyer, and John B. Parrish as a committee to hear objections filed by representatives of organized labor to the University's determination of wage rates on construction work at Robert Allerton Park. The hearing began on September 14. Mr. Lester Asher, Associate of Mr. Daniel D. Carmell of Chicago, represented the objectors. Professor William E. Britton, Legal Counsel, represented the University.

The Legal Counsel reports that after disposition of preliminary matters Mr. Asher proposed a conference with University representatives. The latter agreed and the conferees then withdrew from the hearing room. The Legal Counsel further reports as follows:

"At this conference Mr. Asher proposed, as a possible means of disposing of the present litigation by agreement, that the objectors would be willing to withdraw their objections to the University's determination of wage rates for the present construction work at Allerton Park and that in all respects the issues raised thereby be regarded as closed if the University and the objectors found it possible to agree upon some procedure for the determination of wage rates applicable to future construction work at Allerton Park.

"University representatives agreed to canvass possibilities. Mr. Asher then proposed that for future construction work at Allerton Park the University designate the State Department of Labor as its agency to conduct the investigation required by the Prevailing Wage Act with power to make findings of fact and determinations of wage rates.

"University representatives then withdrew from the conference with Mr. Asher and conferred on his proposal. We agreed among ourselves: (1) that the suggested conclusion of the matter was of such a nature that it could not be summarily rejected; (2) that we would agree with Mr. Asher to concur in the proposed termination of the proceeding upon condition that it be modified as follows: that instead of using the State Department of Labor alone, there be appointed a committee composed of (a) the Director of the State Department of Labor, or a person designated by him, (b) a member appointed by the President of the University of Illinois, and (c) a member appointed by the State Federation of Labor, to conduct investigations of wage rates in Piatt County in connection with future construction work on the Allerton trust properties of the University in accordance with the Prevailing Wage Act and to report to the President of the University and to the Board of Trustees that they were not able to ascertain any prevailing wages, or if ascertainable, to report with respect to prevailing rates of wages involved in such construction work in that locality; and (3) it was further agreed that Mr. Asher, as the attorney acting for the objectors, would write a letter to the University stating that the claim of the objectors that labor unions in Champaign County had the right to determine wage rates in Piatt County for purposes of the Prevailing Wage Act was not in accordance with the Statute.

"University representatives then called Mr. Asher and presented their counter proposal. Mr. Asher then conferred with his clients alone and on his return to the conference with University representatives accepted the counter proposal. The University and the objectors then joined in a motion for continuance of the Hearing. The Hearing Committee allowed the motion and fixed October 17 as the adjourned date for reopening the Hearing."

The Legal Counsel, the Director of Nonacademic Personnel, and the Director of Robert Allerton Park recommend adoption of the following procedure as an instrument of settlement of future questions on rates of wages in Piatt County on the understanding that the pending hearing is dismissed by the objectors.

It is recommended that there be appointed a fact-finding committee composed of (a) a member appointed by the Illinois State Federation of Labor, (b) a member appointed by the President of the University of Illinois, and

(c) a citizen of Piatt County to be selected by the other two, to conduct investigations of wage rates in Piatt County in connection with construction work on the Allerton trust properties of the University in accordance with the Prevailing Wage Act and to report to the President of the University and to the Board of Trustees that they were not able to ascertain any prevailing wages, or, if ascertainable, to report with respect to prevailing rates of wages involved in such construction work in that locality.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted.

REQUEST OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

(2) A request on behalf of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for a joint meeting with the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for the purpose of discussing the common aims and problems of the two institutions has been presented by the President of Southern Illinois University. It is also suggested that there be a preliminary meeting of the officials of the two institutions to prepare an agenda and determine what matters should receive consideration by the two Boards.

This matter was referred to the President of the University for further study.

CHANGES IN ADMINISTRATION OF RADIO STATIONS

(3) Sometime ago Mr. Josef F. Wright, Director of Public Information, Director of Radio Stations WILL and WIUC-FM, and Associate Professor of Journalism, asked to be relieved of his duties as Director of the Radio Stations so that he might devote all of his time to his responsibilities as Director of Public Information which, in a university of this size, should be a full-time position. However, he was willing to continue until a suitable man could be found not only to replace him as Director of the Radio Stations but also to coordinate all radio activities of the University.

I have recently approved the appointment of Robert B. Hudson, presently Director of Education of the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS), to the position of Associate Professor in the School of Journalism and Director of University Broadcasting in the Institute of Communications, effective October 15, 1949.

I recommend that Mr. Wright be relieved of his duties as Director of the Radio Stations, effective October 15, and that he be appointed full-time Director of Public Information and Associate Professor in the School of Journalism, without any change in salary. I recommend further that Frank E. Schooley, presently Assistant Director of the Radio Stations, Assistant Director of Public Information, and Assistant Professor of Journalism be appointed Manager of Radio Stations WILL and WIUC-FM and Assistant Professor of Journalism without any change in salary. The Station Manager will be under the direction of the Director of University Broadcasting.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, these recommendations were adopted, and the President of the University was requested to express the Board's appreciation of Director Wright's thirty years of faithful and constructive service (see Appendix, page 881).

UNIVERSITY PRESS AUTHORS' CONTRACTS

(4) The Director of the University Press recommends that the Press be authorized to enter into contracts with authors of books it intends to publish and that the corporate officers of the Board of Trustees be authorized to execute such contracts on approval in each case by the President of the University.

The basic form of the proposed contract has been approved by the Legal Counsel and Comptroller, and incorporates suggestions arising out of the experiences of many other presses. Briefly summarized, the provisions of the contract are as follows:

1. The author guarantees that his manuscript is original, free of copyright by someone else, and not libelous. He promises to deliver the manuscript by a certain time and in proper condition for publication. There are detailed provisions for the handling of revisions and proofs, and for the assessment of costs for illustrations, cuts, retyping, and other expenses of preparation.

2. The publisher (i.e., the University) has the right to reject the manuscript or to require or to make revisions in the manuscript. The accepted and revised manuscript must be published within a certain time, or the contract terminates. The degree of responsibility of the publisher for care of the manuscript, when it is in his possession, is defined; and so also is the responsibility for taking out and renewing copyright, and for the procedure to be followed in case a new edition is required or the book is allowed to go out of print.

3. The author will be paid no royalties on the first 1,000 copies sold. After 1,000 copies have been sold, a royalty of 15 per cent of net will be paid, until 10,000 are sold, after which the royalty will be 25 per cent of net.

4. There are detailed provisions for the handling of secondary rights to the manuscript. If the Press grants right of reprint to another U. S. publisher or a book club, to an anthology or a digest, the proceeds are to be divided equally between author and publisher. If the Press sells foreign, translation, serial, dramatic, motion picture, radio, or television rights, the author is to receive two-thirds of the proceeds, the Press one-third.

In any given contract, of course, there may be slight deviation from the basic provisions. For example, no royalty will be paid staff members of the Press who publish books with the Press. In the case of some very expensive books, it may be desirable to begin royalty payments after 2,000 or 3,000 copies, rather than 1,000. In the case of one international book the Press hopes to publish, it may be necessary to assign foreign rights. Any such deviation will be submitted to the President of the University for approval.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, authority was granted as recommended.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE ON SALE OF COOK COUNTY AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION

(5) At its meeting on July 28 the Board of Trustees referred to its Committee on Agriculture a recommendation that the Cook County Agricultural Experiment Station south of Des Plaines, Illinois, be sold. The committee was authorized to investigate this proposal, to employ a competent appraiser to determine the market value of the property, to employ a real estate broker to negotiate with prospective purchasers, and to report to the Board.

The committee engaged Messrs. Allan Kirkwood, Suite 1125, 134 S. LaSalle Street, Chicago; H. M. Cornell, 464 Northwest Highway, Des Plaines; and Richard J. Leyden, Suite 863, 38 South Dearborn, Chicago as appraisers. Their certificate of appraisal is submitted herewith and the original signed copy is hereby given to the Secretary of the Board for record. Accompanying the certificate of appraisal is a statement of the qualifications of each of these gentlemen as real estate experts.

Your Committee recommends that the land be sold and reports that it has employed Richard J. Leyden, one of the appraisers, as broker to negotiate with prospective purchasers and report through the Committee to the Board.

The Committee has authorized the Business Office to pay each of these appraisers \$75 (total \$225) for their services. This is the minimum standard fee specified by the Cook County Real Estate Board for such work.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR PURCHASE OF FORESTRY AREA

(6) The University has an opportunity to acquire a tract of 63.5 acres of timber land which is the only virgin forest left in the prairie states. It is a natural area representing an original and essentially undisturbed example of a prairie border forest. This land, known as the Isaac Funk Timber Tract, is north of McLean in McLean County. It would be a living museum of natural history and a resource for biological scientists. If the area is not acquired by the University or some other agency soon, the trees will be sold for timber.

It will take \$25,000 to acquire this land. Several members of the Funk Family have agreed to contribute up to \$15,000. The University of Illinois Foundation is considering an assignment of \$5,000 from Foundation funds. If \$20,000 can be secured from these donors, I would recommend that the University put in \$5,000. The University would have complete title to this property.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the acquisition of this land and the assignment of \$5,000 as the University's share of the purchase price, contingent upon donations of \$20,000 from other sources.

Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board during the presentation of this matter.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this acquisition of land was authorized; the appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACT WITH VETERANS ADMINISTRATION FOR STEAM SERVICE

(7) The contract with the Medical Center Steam Company to supply the University with steam from a central plant at the Chicago Professional Campus authorizes the University to furnish steam not required for its own use to any governmental agency, charitable institution, or other institution located in the Medical Center District under such conditions as may be agreed to by the University and such agency or institution.

The Veterans Administration, which plans to build a large hospital at Polk and Damon Streets, desires to contract for steam from this plant at a price which will reimburse the University for the cost of producing the steam and for the additional capital outlay required to increase capacity and distribution facilities, amortized over a period of thirty years. Increases or decreases in the costs of labor, fuel, applicable taxes, or compliance with governmental regulations shall be reflected by changes in the basic rate.

The contract would be to June 30 following establishment of service and would continue, subject to (a) availability of federal appropriations, (b) cancellation at the end of any year on sixty days notice by either party, and cancellation if the Veterans Administration closes the activity for which steam is being purchased. Provision would be made for mutual adjustment of the balance due the University for the unamortized portion of the capital investment in the event of termination of the contract.

I recommend adoption of the following resolution authorizing a contract with the Veterans Administration which will include the provisions specified by University officers as indicated above:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, at its regular meeting held on May 21, 1949, approved a program whereby the Medical Center Steam Company will provide central steam service to the University and to other institutions in the Medical Center District, Chicago, Illinois, and

Whereas, such program anticipated the making of such contracts between the University and other users as may be feasible and desirable, and

Whereas, it is deemed to be feasible and desirable that the University execute a contract with the United States of America represented by the Chief, Procurement Division, Supply Service, Veterans Administration, for the furnish-

ing of steam to the Veterans Administration Hospital in the Medical Center District, all in accordance with the program heretofore approved as aforesaid,

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby approve the proposed contract with the United States of America represented by the Chief, Procurement Division, Supply Service, Veterans Administration, providing for the furnishing of steam to the Veterans Administration Hospital in the Medical Center District, Chicago, Illinois, and the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board be and they hereby are authorized, empowered, and directed, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver such contract.

Dr. Meyer took his place with the Board during the presentation of this matter.

The Comptroller discussed the provisions of this contract (see Appendix, page 882).

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this resolution was adopted as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Stevenson.

INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

Mr. Fornof reported the receipt of letters from representatives of management in Rockford with respect to the policies and program of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations.

After discussion, President Williamson requested the Committee on General Policy to attend the next meeting of the Advisory Committee of the Institute, and all members of the Board to attend if possible.

CASE OF VIRGINIA KENNY vs. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Doctor Meyer inquired about the status of the Virginia Kenny litigation, a mandamus proceeding in which Miss Kenny, Medical Social Worker in the Social Service Department of the Research and Educational Hospitals, seeks to be restored to the position of Head of the Social Service Department.

This matter was referred to the Committee on the Chicago Departments for consideration and advice to the Board.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session after luncheon and inspection of the facilities at the Pier, the same members and officers were present as during the morning session.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

STAFF AND PROGRAMS FOR 1949-1950

(1) The Provost has prepared a report on important additions to the staff and the educational programs for 1949-1950 (see Appendix, page 885).

The Provost presented this matter.

This statement was received for record.

**BOND ISSUE FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL
HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT**

(2) The Executive Committee on March 29, 1949, in approving the Small Homes Council Housing Research Project, authorized the Comptroller to secure offers on funds to be borrowed (\$175,000 out of a total of \$500,000) for submittal through the Finance Committee to the Board. Bids on a revenue bond issue were received as of September 12, 1949 (schedule of bids received and circular inviting same are attached). The low bid is by John Nuveen & Company, 135 South LaSalle Street, Chicago, for an average interest rate of 2.724 per cent, the bonds to be sold to them at par plus a premium of \$40. The bonds are dated October 1, 1949, and delivery is to be made on or about that date. Interest rates and maturities are:

Representative Williamson designated Mr. Livingston and Mrs. Watkins as representatives of the Board to sign the bonds with him.

I have authorized a leave of absence, without pay, from August 1 to November 1, 1949, and request confirmation of this action with authorization to extend this leave if the Navy requests her to continue in active service for a longer period.

EXCHANGE OF PROFESSORS

(7) The Head of the Department of German requests authorization of the exchange of Professor J. Theodore Geissendoerfer of the University of Illinois with Professor Gilbert Waterhouse of Queens University, Belfast, Ireland. Tentatively the first semester of the academic year 1950-1951 has been selected for this exchange.

I recommend approval and authorization to set up the terms of this exchange and other details, including a change in the period involved if this be deemed advisable upon further negotiations.

Professor Geissendoerfer has been granted sabbatical leave for the second semester 1949-1950 which he is planning to spend in study and research in Europe. If this exchange arrangement goes through, he will remain abroad and serve on the faculty of Queens University while his replacement, Professor Waterhouse, is teaching at the University of Illinois.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were approved.

**CHANGES IN REGULATIONS FOR ADMINISTRATION OF
GENERAL ASSEMBLY SCHOLARSHIPS**

(8) Under an act of the General Assembly of Illinois, passed in 1905, each member of the General Assembly has the privilege of nominating annually one resident of his district for a scholarship in the University which exempts the holder from the payment of tuition fees. For the purpose of carrying out its responsibilities under the law, and for the guidance of the administrative officers concerned, the Board of Trustees of the University has from time to time adopted regulations governing the administration of General Assembly scholarships.

The 66th General Assembly amended the scholarship law to provide that the failure of a member to make a nomination for a scholarship in any year will not cause that scholarship to lapse, but the member may make a nomination for such scholarship at any time before the expiration of his term. This amendment necessitates a change in the regulations governing General Assembly scholarships as heretofore approved by the Board of Trustees. I therefore recommend the following changes:

*Present Regulations***I. Appointments to Scholarships**

1. The original nomination of a candidate to a new four-year scholarship must be filed with the President of the University on or before the opening day of the fall semester or term of the University year in which the candidate expects to enter the University and the President is forbidden by the Statute to accept an original nomination after this date. (This is interpreted to mean within the first ten (10) days of the semester.)
2. In case the first nominee fails to accept the appointment or, not being a graduate of an accredited school, fails to pass the required examinations for admission, the member who made the original appointment may nominate another student from his district to such scholarship.
3. A nomination to fill a vacant scholarship or transfer an unused portion of a scholarship shall be effective as of the opening of the semester or term of the University during which it is made, provided such nomination is filed with the University during the first half of

*Proposed New Regulations***I. Appointments to Scholarships**

1. Each member of the General Assembly may award one four-year scholarship each year. Such scholarships shall become effective at the beginning of the semester or term following the date of appointment. Original appointments for scholarships which accrue to a member in any elected term may be deferred to a later date, but must be made prior to the expiration of that term. An original nomination so deferred shall become effective at the beginning of the semester or term following such nomination and shall continue for four years thereafter. A scholarship shall lapse if the member fails to make a nomination prior to the expiration of the term for which he was elected. (A nomination made during the first half of the semester will become effective as of the beginning of that semester.)

such semester or term, but if it is filed during the second half of the semester or term, it shall not become effective until the opening of the next following semester or term.

4. (A scholarship becomes vacant either (1) through failure of the holder to register, or (2) through written statement signed by him relinquishing his rights to the scholarship. See full statement under "registration" below.)
5. If a member desires to select his nominee on the basis of competition he may require the applicants to write the scholarship examination held in the office of each County Superintendent of Schools on the first Saturday of June as provided in Section 30—7. Candidates should notify the County Superintendent of their intention to write at least ten days in advance of the date of the examination. They will be subject to the University regulations with respect to the conduct of such examinations.

II. Qualifications of Candidates

1. To qualify for appointment under this Act, a candidate must be—

(1) At least 16 years old.

(2) A graduate of a high school or other secondary school accredited by the University of Illinois and must present fifteen units of high school work in acceptable subjects including certain prescribed subjects. A candidate who is not a graduate of an accredited high school may qualify for appointment to a scholarship by passing entrance examinations and thus qualify for admission to the University.

(3) A legal resident of the State and of the district represented by the member who makes the nomination. (See interpretation of "residence" below.)

III. Registration

1. Having satisfied the entrance requirements, the new appointee to a four-year scholarship or to the unused portion of a scholarship must register in the University not later than twenty (20) days after the opening date of the semester or term when the scholarship first becomes effective. If the appointee fails to so register he forfeits the scholarship unless he is unable to

register because of military or naval service.

2. Failure of a scholarship holder to register in the University not later than twenty (20) days after the beginning of the fall or winter semester will constitute a release (forfeiture) of the scholarship. The member who made the original appointment, if he is still a member of the General Assembly, may transfer the scholarship to some other student in his district. A scholarship held by a person who has been granted a leave of absence under the law to earn money to continue his education may be transferred only when released in writing by the present holder; and such a scholarship held by one who is absent for military or naval service is not forfeited by failure to register or by a discontinuance of his course, and may be transferred only when released in writing by the present holder, or when proof of death is presented by affidavit of some competent person.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these regulations were amended as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR LEASE OF EDUCATIONAL FILMS

(9) The Dean of the Division of University Extension recommends that the University enter into a contract with United World Films of America, New York City, for the leasing and acquisition of a series of films on "The Earth and Its Peoples." The films have been produced for the teaching of geography in grade and high schools. The collection consists of 121 prints of 35 titles. The lease provides for the payment of \$35 per print upon receipt of the films, \$35 per print 12 months after delivery, and \$35 per print 24 months after delivery, a total payment of \$105 per print. Upon conclusion of the lease, the films will become the property of the University. The lease may be terminated at the end of a year upon 30 days' notice.

The films will be used by the Audio-Visual Aids Service for rental to schools at a rate of \$3 for the first day and \$.50 for each additional day. During the period of the lease United World Films will pay the University \$5.50 per booking which United World Films arranges with schools to introduce the films. United will not charge schools for this. The University will service all bookings in Illinois except in the City of Chicago. "Junior Scholastic," a monthly school magazine, will have an article on these films in each issue during the school year 1949-1950.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR REMODELING HOUSE AT
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AIRPORT**

(10) On July 22, 1948 (Minutes, pages 23-24), the Board of Trustees authorized a contract with J. C. Scott, Tolono, for remodeling a house at the University of Illinois Airport to provide living quarters for two members of the staff of the Institute of Aviation whose services require them to live near the Airport. The contract was on a cost plus 10 per cent basis at an estimated total of \$8,500.

It is very difficult to estimate the cost of remodeling jobs accurately because unforeseeable construction conditions are frequently encountered. That was true in this case and a great deal of additional work had to be done which was not originally contemplated. The audited cost is \$16,802.43. There is no question that the costs were incurred and with the approval of the University representative in charge. Through an oversight and misunderstanding of the original action of the Board, the Institute of Aviation did not report an increase in the estimate until the work had been completed. The Director of the Institute of Aviation and the Comptroller request approval of the increased estimate and authority to pay the contractor the full amount of cost incurred and audited, subject to the usual filing of waivers of liens.

Because the remodeling has resulted in a higher standard house than was originally contemplated, the scale of rentals is somewhat higher and the expenditure will be recovered through income from rentals in a period of approximately seventeen years.

I concur in the recommendations of the Director and the Comptroller.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, these recommendations were adopted.

CONTRACT FOR PAINTING OF PIPING

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$9,850 to J. Bernard Mullen, of Chicago, the lowest bidder, for painting of piping in connection with the installation of laboratory equipment in the East Chemistry Building.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Acquisition and installation of Chemistry Building equipment."

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was given as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REMODELING IN LINCOLN HALL

(12) On July 28, 1949, the Board of Trustees approved an appropriation for remodeling and equipping certain rooms in Lincoln Hall for the language departments.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to C. A. Petry, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$8,157.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, authority was given as recommended.

RELEASES OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(13) The Governor has approved the following releases of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

"Acquisition and Installation of Chemistry Building Equipment.....\$330,000"

Release No. 2

"For Equipment for Buildings at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago.....\$ 50,000"

This is a partial release of an appropriation of \$680,000. The funds so released may be used by the University for the acquisition and installation of Chemistry Building equipment, the amount appropriated for this specific purpose having proved insufficient to complete the project, and are supplementary to release No. 1.

Release No. 3

"For Contingencies to Cover Expenditures for Purposes for which the Amount Appropriated in any Item Above Enumerated is, or becomes, Insufficient.....\$ 20,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$550,000, and the \$20,000

released is to supplement releases Nos. 1 and 2 for the acquisition and installation of Chemistry Building equipment.

Release No. 4

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Acquisition through Construction or Purchase of Student and Staff Housing..\$190,000"

Release No. 5

"For Contingencies to Cover Expenditures for Purposes for which the Amount Appropriated in any Item Above Enumerated is, or becomes, Insufficient.....\$ 10,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$550,000 and is to supplement the housing funds in release No. 4.

Release No. 6

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings..\$ 85,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,215,000 and the \$85,000 so released is for architectural and engineering services for additions to power and heating plant and remodeling of existing buildings at Urbana-Champaign.

Release No. 7

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Construction of Veterinary Science Unit.....\$ 40,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,560,000 and the \$40,000 so released is for architectural and engineering services on the Veterinary Science Building.

Release No. 8

"For Permanent Improvements at Chicago Construction of Addition to Present Hospital.....\$246,000"

This is a partial release from a total appropriation of \$7,395,000 and the \$246,000 is to be used for architectural and engineering services on the construction of an addition to the present hospital at Chicago.

Release No. 9

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Construction of Agricultural Structures and Remodeling Present Agricultural Buildings.....\$ 20,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$200,000 and the \$20,000 so released is for architectural and engineering services on the construction of agricultural structures and remodeling present agricultural buildings.

Release No. 10

"For Permanent Improvements at Chicago Construction of Utility Distribution System and Remodeling of Existing Buildings.....\$ 13,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$100,000 and the \$13,000 so released is for architectural and engineering services on the construction of Utilities Distribution System and remodeling of existing buildings at Chicago.

Release No. 11

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Construction of Animal Science Laboratory.....\$ 62,500"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$2,160,000 and the \$62,500 so released is for architectural and engineering services on the construction of the Animal Science Laboratory at Urbana-Champaign.

Release No. 12

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Construction of Extension to the Utility Distribution Systems.....\$ 40,000"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$375,000 and the \$40,000

so released is for architectural and engineering services on the construction of extension to the utilities distribution systems at Urbana-Champaign.

I recommend that the funds released be appropriated for the purposes specified.

APPROPRIATION FROM AGRICULTURAL INCOME

(14) The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends an appropriation of \$2,000 from the accumulated surplus in agricultural income for the improvement of feed lots in the beef cattle feeding shed area. The work will consist of grading three feed lots and concreting another. The improvement is needed to provide a cattle feed lot which will be used in studies of controlled feeding on individual animals. Funds are available.

I concur.

GIFT TO THE UNIVERSITY

(21) Mr. J. D. Phillips, class of 1893, of Los Angeles, California, has offered the University approximately \$10,000 to establish a scholarship fund to be called the "J. D. and Clara Moore Phillips Scholarship." The income from the fund

is to be paid to Mr. Phillips and, at his death, to a designated beneficiary, now 76. Upon the death of the beneficiary, the income shall be used for scholarships. There are no limitations upon the kind of scholarships other than that they should be used to aid worthy students. The scholarships would be awarded by the University Committee on Scholarships.

Mr. James David Phillips was born in 1868 and is a graduate of the University of Illinois, receiving the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Architecture in 1893 and of Master of Architecture in 1943. He was a member of the staff of the College of Engineering from 1892 to 1902. He was a member of the Engineering staff of the University of Wisconsin from 1902 to 1920 and Business Manager of that institution from 1920 until he retired in 1938. He is the author of several textbooks on mechanical drawing and has written numerous articles relating to university financing.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the acceptance of this fund was authorized.

REPORT OF GIFTS AND GRANTS RECEIVED BY THE UNIVERSITY

CONTRACT FOR TURBINE GENERATOR

(23) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$141,266.85, subject to the release by the Governor of funds appropriated to the University for this purpose, to the General Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for a 3000-kilowatt automatic extraction turbine generator as a part of the addition to the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana.

The State appropriations made to the University for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements include \$1,215,000 for "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" at Urbana-Champaign. These funds are available on release by the Governor.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, authority was granted as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR POWER PLANT EQUIPMENT

(24) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend awards of contracts for \$20,213 to the Fluor Corporation, Ltd., Los Angeles, California, for a cooling tower, and for \$28,980 to the Worthington Pump & Machinery Corporation, Chicago, for condensing equipment for additions to the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana, subject to the release by the Governor of funds appropriated to the University for this purpose. These are the lowest bidders in each case and the proposals are firm prices. The proposal of the Fluor Corporation is subject to completion of the erection of the cooling tower prior to September 30, 1950, but in the event the erection can not be completed prior to that date, prices will be adjusted upward or downward in accordance with the standard escalation clause, if escalation in cost is in excess of 2 per cent of the price quoted.

The State appropriations made to the University for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements include \$1,215,000 for "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" at Urbana-Champaign. These funds are available upon release by the Governor.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, authority was given as recommended.

SANITARY SEWER FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

(25) The City of Urbana has agreed to permit connection of the sanitary sewer in the Small Homes Council Housing Research Project area at Race Street and Florida Avenue to the city system. This will require a new sewer from Pennsylvania Avenue to Michigan Avenue and the University should assume its proportionate share (\$1,267.86) of the cost of the improvement.

The city is ready to proceed with the construction. The improvement is needed and the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the University assume its share of the cost. Funds are available in the budget set up for this housing project.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to pay the City of Urbana the sum of \$1,267.86 when the sewer has been completed.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was given as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR CONSTRUCTION OF PARKING LOT FACILITIES

(26) There are now about 5,000 faculty and staff cars and nearly 3,000 student cars for which parking spaces are sought on or near the campus. The University of Illinois now has about 2,000 spaces which have been surfaced and are operated mainly for the use of faculty. The congestion around the campus is extremely bad and hazardous for all concerned.

The Provost has recently appointed a committee to consider the whole problem of parking facilities, including new areas that might be developed and the merits of a nominal rental fee for the continued use of parking spaces. Student pressure for increased facilities is severe.

Several areas have already been studied by the Physical Plant Department and four of these could be made available for use in the very near future, whenever funds are available. Areas presently under consideration would provide for about 372 spaces for students and 94 spaces for staff. This whole problem has been under review by the Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations and the Committee is favorable to prompt and substantial steps toward providing additional parking facilities.

I recommend an appropriation of \$30,000 from General Reserve to the Physical Plant Department in order to provide additional parking facilities, specific assignments from this fund to be made by the President of the University for each particular project, the bids to be submitted to the Executive Committee for authorization of contracts.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FROM UNIVERSITY CLUB OF URBANA TRUST

(27) On October 29, 1943 (Minutes, page 743), the Board of Trustees approved an agreement with the Men's University Club of Urbana for the purchase by the University of the property of the Club and providing for changes in the future operations of the Club. This agreement also established a trust fund for "the financing of a future building project and/or furnishing or equipping space to be occupied by the Club." The Men's University Club undertook to induce its members to contribute the fund for a future Faculty Graduate Student Center by turning in Club bonds, the value of which could be applied to the fund, or by making other contributions. The University agreed to match all moneys con-

tributed to this fund by members of the Club during the biennium ended June 30, 1945. The trust fund thus established now amounts to \$15,374.92.

There is no prospect for a new University Club building in the immediate future. The Men's University Club has undertaken to improve the present facilities through the enlarging of the food service area and remodeling club room facilities. The Club has funds for redecorating but not for the purchase of necessary new equipment and furnishings. The Board of Governors of the Men's University Club is of the opinion that the purchase of equipment and furnishings, amounting to \$2,500, comes within the intention of the Trust Agreement, and requests the release by the Board of Trustees of the University of \$2,500 from the Trust Fund. It is expected that by so using such part of the Trust Fund the Club facilities will become more attractive, thereby increasing participation by the faculty and reducing the food service operating deficit through increased patronage.

I recommend the release of \$2,500 from the University Club Trust Fund which is held by the University of Illinois Foundation for the purpose requested by the Board of Governors of the Club.

PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES

(28) The Comptroller and the Legal Counsel report that they have been working with officials of Champaign, Piatt, and De Kalb counties in the determination of amounts which the University may appropriately pay for services of governmental bodies in those counties under the provision of the act of the last General Assembly authorizing such payments. Agreement has been reached with these officials with respect to practically all of the properties involved. All such payments are covered by income produced by such properties except in a very few cases where the properties were income-producing when acquired but shortly thereafter but subsequent to the date of tax assessment were transferred to educational uses.

In nearly all cases payments will be made out of funds now available in income accounts. In some instances net income of properties on which payments for preceding years are in order was transferred to the General Reserve Fund of the University, so that funds are not now available in the income accounts of these properties to cover such payments.

The Comptroller requests an appropriation from the General Reserve Fund of \$3,628. I recommend approval.

The Comptroller and the Legal Counsel commented on this matter.

CONTRACT WITH MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION

Resolution

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has approved an agreement with the Medical Center Steam Company providing for the construction by the Steam Company of a central steam plant and distribution system for the furnishing of steam service to the University and through the University to other institutions located within the Medical Center District in Chicago as defined in such agreement; and

Whereas, the Illinois Commerce Commission has approved said agreement; and

Whereas, an agreement between the Board of Trustees and the Medical Center Commission is desired for the clarification of certain matters relative to the operation of said agreement between the Board of Trustees and the Medical Center Steam Company; and

Whereas, such agreement between the Board of Trustees and the Medical Center Commission has been prepared and presented to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees;

Therefore Be It Resolved, by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees that the proposed agreement between the Board of Trustees and the Medical Center Commission is hereby approved, and the Comptroller and Secretary of this Board be and are hereby authorized, empowered, and directed, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver such agreement.

Contract Between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and Medical Center Commission

This AGREEMENT made this 9th day of August, 1949, by and between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a Public Corporation (hereinafter called the University), and the Medical Center Commission, a Public Corporation,

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, Medical Center Steam Company (hereinafter called the Steam Company), has been incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois and is authorized by its charter to furnish steam service to the University and through the University to other institutions within the Medical Center District in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and

Whereas, the University and the Steam Company have entered into a contract dated July 1, 1949, for the construction, operation, and maintenance by the Steam Company of a steam plant and distribution system in the Medical Center District, a copy of which contract is hereto attached, and

Whereas, the Illinois Commerce Commission on July 29, 1949, entered an order in case No. 37530, granting to the Steam Company a certificate of convenience and necessity for the construction, operation, and maintenance of such steam plant and distribution system as described in said order and said contract, and

Whereas, the Medical Center Commission was created and exists under and by virtue of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, and under the provisions of said act has certain rights, powers, privileges, and obligations with respect to said Medical Center District, and it is desired that all qualified applicants for steam service within said District be furnished with steam service under and pursuant to the provisions of said contract;

Now, Therefore, the parties do hereby agree as follows:

Upon certification by the Medical Center Commission to the University at any time, or from time to time, that a governmental agency, charitable institution or other institution located within the Medical Center District, is in the judgment of the Medical Center Commission a qualified applicant for steam service, the University agrees to cause such service to be furnished to such applicant subject to the provisions of the said contract and the availability of an adequate steam supply for such applicant within the firm capacity of the plant upon compliance by such applicant with the following terms and conditions:

- (a) That such applicant shall enter into an agreement with the University to take steam service and to compensate the University for such service.
- (b) That the charges for such service shall be fixed by the University on a fair and equitable basis.
- (c) In the event that any applicant and the University are unable to agree upon a fair and equitable basis for such charges, then the fair and equitable basis for such charges shall be determined jointly by the University and the Medical Center Commission.
- (d) Should the University and the Medical Center Commission be unable to agree on a fair and equitable basis for such charges, in that event the then Governor of the State of Illinois or such person, persons or agency as he may designate shall determine what the fair and equitable charges for such services shall be, and such determination shall be binding on the parties hereto.

In Witness Whereof, the University has caused this instrument to be executed in its corporate name by its Comptroller and its Secretary, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed by its Secretary, and the Medical Center Commission has caused this agreement to be executed in its corporate name by its President, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by its Secretary, all in duplicate as of the day and year first above written.

STATEMENT OF PRESIDENT REGARDING CHANGES IN ADMINISTRATION OF THE RADIO STATIONS, AND THE APPOINTMENT OF MR. HUDSON

About a year ago, Mr. Josef F. Wright asked to be relieved of his part-time duties as director of the University's radio stations in order to devote full time to his responsibilities as director of public information. He was willing to continue, however, until a suitable man could be found to coordinate all broadcasting activities of the University.

This man has now been found, in the person of Mr. Robert B. Hudson, whose appointment as director of University broadcasting and associate professor of journalism, has been presented to the Board today. Mr. Hudson's career is distinguished, both in radio and in adult education. He was founder and first director of the Rocky Mountain Radio Council, one of the outstanding accomplishments in the educational use of radio. For the last four years he has been director of education for the CBS network. In this capacity he was associated with some of the network's best public service programs, such as the School of the Air, You Are There, People's Platform, Invitation to Learning, Doorway to Life. At Illinois,

Mr. Hudson will be chairman of the radio curriculum in the School of Journalism as well as director of University broadcasting. With this appointment, I feel that we can no longer put off Mr. Wright's request, and I have therefore recommended that he be permitted to devote full time to public information.

I can not let this occasion pass without saying a few more words about Joe Wright who this week completes thirty years of service to the University. He came to work for the University of Illinois as secretary to President Kinley on October 1, 1919. The following year Dr. Kinley assigned him the task of setting up a University information service. He has been director of this service ever since. In 1925, when the Illinois experimental radio station grew into station WILL, he was made director of the University station. In that position he developed the University Radio Service which supplies programs to other stations. He was instrumental in establishing the University FM station WIUC, and has been a ceaseless crusader for a state-wide educational FM network. He appointed Mr. Frank E. Schooley, who is today being named station manager. Joe Wright has held high office in the National Association of Educational Broadcasters as well as in the College Public Relations Association, and he is affectionately known to hundreds of radio and newspaper men. Now that Joe Wright is consolidating his activities a little, I am glad to express the University's gratitude for thirty years of faithful and constructive service.

CONTRACT WITH VETERANS ADMINISTRATION FOR STEAM SERVICE
This AGREEMENT made and entered into this _____ day of _____ 19____, by and between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, a public corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois (hereinafter called the "Contractor") and the United States of America (hereinafter called the "Government") represented by the Chief, Procurement Division, Supply Service, Veterans Administration (hereinafter called the "Contracting Officer").

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, there is being erected a Veterans Administration Center in Chicago, Illinois, consisting of a Regional Office and an estimated 500 bed capacity hospital, bounded by Polk Street on the North, South Damen Avenue on the East, on the South by West Taylor Street, and on the West by Ogden Avenue; and

Whereas, the Government desires that the necessary steam be furnished as required by the Veterans Administration Center; and

Whereas, it is to the advantage of the Government to procure steam from the Contractor in lieu of providing its own plant; and

Whereas, the Contractor is in a position to furnish the required amount of steam to the Government; and

Whereas, the Government is willing to compensate the Contractor for providing the required steam service.

Now, Therefore, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I. FACILITIES

The Contractor will provide a steam plant from which steam will be furnished through underground pipes to be provided by the Contractor to the Government boundary line at the northwest corner of Damen Avenue and Taylor Street.

ARTICLE II. SERVICE

(a) The Contractor agrees to furnish sufficient steam at an approximate pressure of 110 lbs. per square inch, to the Government boundary line, to meet the requirements of the Government, but not to exceed, at the option of the Contractor, 53,000 lbs. of steam per hour.

(b) The Government agrees to purchase from the Contractor approximately 74,000,000 lbs. of steam during each twelve month period of this contract.

ARTICLE III. METERING

The steam furnished hereunder shall be measured by meters installed by the Contractor at the approved location. The Contractor shall have the right and privilege to maintain and calibrate such meter or meters and will have access thereto over the lands of the Government at all reasonable hours for such purposes.

ARTICLE IV. RATES

(a) The Government agrees to pay the Contractor \$1.32 for each 1,000 lbs. of steam based on an annual consumption of 74,000,000 lbs. furnished and will be increased or decreased as provided in this Article. In the event the consumption by the Government is less than 74,000,000 lbs. of steam, the Government will pay to the University of Illinois \$0.205 per 1,000 lbs. for the difference between the actual consumption and the 74,000,000 lbs. In the event the annual consumption is greater than 74,000,000 lbs., the cost of steam will be reduced by \$0.205 per 1,000 lbs. for all steam in excess of 74,000,000 lbs.

(b) It is understood and agreed that the fixed charge of \$0.205 represents Government's reimbursement to the Contractor for the construction of the necessary facilities for furnishing steam to the Government amortized over a period of 30 years, at the end of which time the fixed charge of \$0.205 or such amount in effect at that time will be discontinued and the rate for each 1,000 pounds of steam shall be decreased accordingly. In the event the Contractor furnishes services to others and the outlay incurred by reason of furnishing facilities to supply steam to the Government is reduced below \$455,000, or if savings in the amortization rate reduces said outlay below \$455,000, or if any combination of the above factors produces such result, then the fixed charge of \$0.205 will be decreased in proportion to the reduction below such amount.

(c) If this contract is terminated by the Government prior to the end of the 30 year period the amount of the termination charge to be paid to the Contractor in lieu of the fixed charge shall be an amount mutually agreed upon by the Government and the Contractor at that time.

(d) Said unit price of \$1.32 for each 1,000 lbs. of steam furnished shall be increased or decreased by an amount equal to the net increase or decrease of the Contractor's cost for furnishing such steam resulting from the following:

1. Any increases or decreases in labor costs for the furnishing of such steam from the present labor cost. Present labor costs are those set forth in Schedule A annexed hereto. Labor costs shall include all allowances and benefits to the employees.

2. Any increases or decreases in cost of fuel for producing such steam from the present cost of such fuel. The present cost of such fuel so delivered is stated in Schedule A annexed hereto. Cost of fuel as used herein means its cost delivered at the steam plant of the Contractor.

3. An increase in the cost of furnishing such steam resulting from any applicable taxes hereafter imposed upon the contractor by Federal, State, or local governments.

4. An increase in the cost to the Contractor for furnishing such steam caused by compliance by the Contractor with any and all future statutes, rules, or regulations of the Federal, State, or local governments which are applicable.

(e) All such increases or decreases in cost shall be determined by ordinary accounting principles. Contractor agrees to maintain in accordance with usual accounting practice records of all such increases or decreases in such costs.

ARTICLE V. ADJUSTMENT OF RATE

On or before the first day of September in each year during the period of the contract, the Contractor shall furnish the Government with a statement of the adjustment of said cost of \$1.32 per each 1,000 lbs. of steam by the formula contained in Article IV hereof, and at the same time will make available to the Government, at the place where such records are kept, for its review and audit the cost records of the Contractor in support of such statement of adjustment. The Government reserves the right to submit a claim for adjustment of such statement. The adjustment as shown by the statement, or in the event of the filing of any claim in the manner aforesaid, then any readjusted statement shall be settled as soon as possible by the Government. Any amount due the Government as a result of the adjustment will be deducted from subsequent voucher or vouchers submitted by the Contractor. Any amount due the Contractor as a result of the adjustment as shown by the statement will be paid by the Government, upon receipt of a properly prepared invoice from the Contractor.

ARTICLE VI. PERIOD OF CONTRACT

Subject to the availability of appropriations, the period of time covered by this contract shall be from the date of the first delivery of steam service to the following June 30 and shall continue thereafter until further notice.

ARTICLE VII. PAYMENT

Payment for services shall be made at the end of each month after service has been rendered.

ARTICLE VIII. DEFINITIONS

"Contracting Officer" refers to the Chief, Procurement Division, Supply Service of the Veterans Administration, or his duly appointed successors and their authorized representatives and any other duly authorized representatives of the Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

ARTICLE IX. NON-DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE

The Contractor, in performing the work required by this contract, shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color or national origin, and that he will include a similar provision in all sub-contracts.

ARTICLE X. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT

No member or delegate to Congress or resident commissioner shall be admitted to any share or part of this contract or to any benefit that may arise therefrom, but this provision shall not be construed to extend to this contract if made with a corporation for its general benefit.

ARTICLE XI. TAXES

Rates specified for steam service are exclusive of any sales or use tax imposed by state, or by any duly constituted taxing authority therein having jurisdiction to impose such a tax on the articles named in this agreement, the United States not being liable for payment of such tax (Public No. 819—76th Congress, approved October 9, 1940).

Rates specified included any applicable Federal Excise Taxes, as the United States is not exempt from payment of such taxes.

ARTICLE XII. TERMINATION

This agreement, if accepted, shall become a contract and shall remain in force during the period above stated unless terminated at the request of either party after sixty (60) days' notice in writing.

In the event the Veterans Administration closes this activity subsequent to the execution of this contract or during the contractual period, this contract may be canceled immediately upon written notice to the Contractor and the Veterans Administration relieved from its obligation to make further purchases of supplies or services thereunder, except as otherwise provided for herein.

Operating Adjustment Clause
Schedule "A"

The steam charges are based upon the cost to the University of Illinois as of June 1949. Steam generated from fuel costing 36.62 cents per million B.T.U. at the steam plant. When the average cost for twelve months of fuel per million B.T.U.'s shall be more than 37.36 cents or less than 35.88 cents, the steam rate shall be increased or decreased. Labor cost shall be increased or decreased based on the June 1949 wage rate paid by the University. The cost of producing steam as of June 1949 is \$1.115 per thousand pounds based on twelve consecutive months.

REPORT ON STAFF AND PROGRAMS FOR 1949-1950

In accordance with the educational plans set forth in the "Analysis of Appropriation Requests for Operation for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 1949," important additions have been made to the staff of the University in order to provide the personnel for a more mature student body and further to strengthen research and instruction in recently initiated activities.

The appointments of Professor H. O. Halvorson as Head of the Department of Bacteriology and of Professor Sol Spiegelman as a research specialist in genetics and cell respiration, together with other changes and additions, will bring about a first-rate department during the present year.

A notable research program in physiology has been moved from the Army Quartermaster Corps in Chicago to the University through the appointment of Dr. R. E. Johnson, as Professor and Head of the Department of Physiology. We may now say that the life sciences are in an extremely favorable position.

Professor John L. Heller, the new Head of the Department of Classics, will continue the substantial traditions of the Department and be a strong representative of the humanities at the University of Illinois.

The area of clinical psychology is strengthened by the appointment of Professor L. E. O'Kelly, the field of map construction and reading by Professor F. W. Foster, the field of linguistics by Professor D. W. Schumann, and the field of geography by Professor C. C. Colby, formerly Head of the Department of Geography at the University of Chicago.

In the field of physics, the appointments of Professor Frederick Seitz and Professor R. J. Maurer round out the work of the Department and add more distinction to the University. These men are famous for their work in the physics of the solid state, a field which has recently become basic to ceramics and to engineering. The elevation of Professor William L. Everitt to the Deanship of the College of Engineering, and the appointment of Professor J. D. Ryder to the Headship of the Department of Electrical Engineering, will consolidate great advances already made in these areas.

A further step ahead in the whole area of journalism and communications has been taken by the appointments of Professor R. B. Hudson, whose specialty is educational broadcasting, and Professor C. E. Osgood, whose specialty is the psychology of communications. During the year the social, psychological, and dramatic foundations of communications will be brought under severe review and the whole field developed in accordance with its importance. Professor Hudson will serve as Director of University Broadcasting.

The brilliant achievements of the College of Fine and Applied Arts, especially in the areas of architecture, art, and music, will be continued throughout the year. As an interim measure, while enrollments are being stabilized, a part of the advanced teaching load in Architecture will be carried by eight top-ranking architects of national reputation, serving on a part-time basis. Professors W. S. Kinne, specialist in materials and methods of construction, and Gabriel Guevrekian, internationally known in architectural design and planning, have been added to the staff. Musical composition and theory will develop rapidly under Professor Burrill Phillips, and Professor Paul Young will bring new leadership to the choral groups. During the second semester, Georges Enesco will be on the campus as a Visiting Artist.

The health and recreational programs of the School of Physical Education will move forward rapidly because of the addition of new curricula and the ap-

pointment of Professor H. S. Hoyman, a specialist in public health. Professor F. E. Boys, who is in the same area, will also supervise the medical factors in all experiments using human subjects.

The increased strength in all of the life sciences means a real addition to the sciences that are basic to agriculture, but the College of Agriculture, in its own right, has added to its research and service personnel. Professor A. I. Nelson, whose specialty is food processing, and Professor Z. J. Ordal, whose specialty is food microbiology, are notable additions to the Department of Food Technology. Professor M. B. Linford brings the background of his long career as a specialist in plant diseases to the Department of Horticulture.

A major step toward the introduction of new statistical methods into the field of economics has been taken in the appointment of Professor Leonid Hurwicz. Professor Hurwicz will also be a notable addition to the growing power of the University in the application of mechanical and statistical procedures to a great variety of research problems. Mr. G. R. Beam has become the Director of the Statistical Service Unit, and late last year Professor W. G. Madow, specialist in probability theory, was named to the Department of Mathematics. Another notable appointment in this general area is that of R. E. Meagher as chief engineer of the electron digital computer.

In the usual quota of replacements on account of death, retirement, or resignation, an attempt has been made to secure able young men and women who give clear promise of useful careers at the University. All departments report enthusiastically of success in this attempt. In some areas which have been under pressure on account of heavy enrollments, junior staff additions have been made simply to absorb teaching load. The quality of this staff and of the hundreds of part-time assistants is, according to Dean Ridenour, uniformly high.

Except for the appointment of Associate Dean Fred W. Trezise, formerly of the Galesburg Division, to replace Associate Dean R. P. Hoelscher in Engineering at the Chicago Undergraduate Division, no substantial changes in personnel have been made at the Navy Pier. The teaching skill of the staff is excellent, and transfers from the Undergraduate Division to the Urbana campus are giving a good account of themselves.

The most notable event at the Chicago Professional Colleges is the new program in nursing education in cooperation with the Cook County School of Nursing and by affiliation with other hospitals in the City of Chicago. The laboratory for aviation medicine and physical environment has been fully activated. A physicist and a pathologist have been added to the staff of the medical batatron, and the first human patients have had initial cancer treatments. Under the excellent leadership of Dr. A. C. Ivy, all of the professional divisions are moving ahead in research, in the quality of clinical instruction, and in public service. Except for the appointment of M. J. Galbraith, formerly Director of Student Welfare at the Galesburg Division, to a new post as Director of Student Affairs, the main staff additions, both academic and nonacademic, have been in the technical areas.

In spite of record enrollments in all divisions, an excessive number of large classes has been avoided, new equipment has been purchased, the pulse of research is steady and strong, and the morale of the faculty is high. The year 1949-1950 promises to be a great one in the history of the University.

*Resolution Authorizing the Issuance of \$175,000 Staff Housing
Revenue Bonds of 1949*

RESOLUTION authorizing and providing for the issue of \$175,000 Staff Housing Revenue Bonds, Series of 1949, for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of constructing certain staff housing facilities on property owned by the University of Illinois located in Urbana, Illinois, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of the said project, for the purpose of paying the cost of the maintenance and operation thereof, and payment of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds.

WHEREAS pursuant to "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, equip, complete, operate, control and manage student residence halls, staff housing facilities, dormitories, health and physical education buildings, or other revenue producing building or buildings, defining the duties of such Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charge fees or rates for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds." Approved June 30, 1945. L. 1945, p. 1753; title as amended by Act approved July 21, 1947, this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is authorized to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing, equipping or completing the construction and equipment of staff housing facilities payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof; and

WHEREAS the Sixty Fifth and the Sixty Sixth General Assemblies of the State of Illinois appropriated the sum of \$325,000 applicable to the construction of such staff housing facilities and responsive to said appropriations this Board of Trustees has heretofore acquired the property located in Urbana, Illinois, south of Florida Avenue and west of Race Street, and described as follows:

and the construction of said staff housing facilities is now in progress, and based upon the contracts heretofore let this Board of Trustees has heretofore estimated

and does hereby estimate that the cost of the construction of staff housing facilities upon said above described property, complete, will aggregate the sum of \$500,000; and

WHEREAS in addition to said appropriations made by the Sixty Fifth and Sixty Sixth General Assemblies of the State of Illinois it will be necessary for this Board of Trustees to raise the sum of \$175,000 to complete the construction thereof; and

WHEREAS in order to produce the additional \$175,000 necessary for the completion of said staff housing facilities located on the property hereinabove described in the City of Urbana, Illinois, it will be necessary that this Board of Trustees borrow money and issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$175,000 as authorized pursuant to the Act hereinabove referred to:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1. That it be and it is hereby determined by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, that it is necessary and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that it borrow the sum of \$175,000 to complete the construction of the staff housing facilities located on the property described in the preambles of this resolution in the City of Urbana, Illinois, and in evidence thereof issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$175,000.

SECTION 2. That said bonds shall be designated "Staff Housing Revenue Bonds, Series of 1949", be numbered 1 to 175, inclusive, be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, be dated October 1, 1949, bonds numbered 1 to 46, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent (2½%) per annum, bonds numbered 47 to 175, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and three-fourths per cent (2¾%) per annum, interest payable April 1, 1950, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year, and to become due as follows:

provided, however, said bonds shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity on any interest payment date at the option of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on or after October 1, 1952, and up to and including April 1, 1954, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1954, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including April 1, 1959, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall, with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned in the City of Milwaukee and State of Wisconsin; and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

SECTION 3. Any of said bonds may be registered as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University to be kept in the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said Depositary as registrar. After such registration no transfer of such bonds shall be valid unless made on the said books by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney and similarly noted on such bonds. Upon presentation of any of such bonds registered as to principal, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, executed by the registered owner, or by a duly authorized attorney, such bond shall be transferred upon such books. The registered owner of any such bond registered as to principal shall also have the right to cause the same to be discharged from registration by transfer to bearer, in which case transferability by delivery shall be restored, and thereafter the principal of such bond when due shall be payable to the person presenting such bond. Any such bond registered as payable to bearer may be registered again in the name of the owner with the same effect as the first registration thereof. Successive registrations and transfers as aforesaid may be made from time to time as desired. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

Said bonds shall be signed by the President and two members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, sealed with the corporate seal of said University, attested by the Secretary of said Board, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signatures of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

SECTION 4. That said bonds and coupons, and form for registration, shall be in substantially the following form:

and is payable solely from the net revenue to be derived from the operation of said facilities, and not otherwise, and this bond and the series of which it forms a part do not constitute an indebtedness of said University or of the State of Illinois within any constitutional or statutory limitation, and neither the taxing power nor the general credit of said University or the State of Illinois is pledged to the payment of this bond or the interest thereon.

Under said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and other Laws supplementary thereto and the said resolution adopted pursuant thereto, the net revenue derived from the operation of said facilities shall be deposited with the Marine National Exchange Bank of Milwaukee, in the City of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, under a Deposit Agreement entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the said Bank, and used only for the purpose of paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of and interest on the

bonds of said University that are issued under authority of said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and the resolution of the Board of Trustees, hereinabove referred to, and which are payable by their terms only from the net revenue of said staff housing facilities located on the property above described, in the City of Urbana, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Illinois, and the applicable resolutions of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, have been done and have happened and have been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law and that provision has been made for depositing the net revenue derived from the operation of said facilities with the said Marine National Exchange Bank of Milwaukee, to be applied in the manner as hereinabove set forth.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$175,000, all of like date and of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 175, inclusive, and said bonds are subject to redemption as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after October 1, 1952, and up to and including April 1, 1954, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1954, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including April 1, 1959, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to date of redemption, such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption, interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond shall pass by delivery unless it is registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University kept at the office of the Depositary hereinabove mentioned, such registration to be noted on the back hereof. After such registration no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on such books by the registered holder in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing and similarly noted hereon, but this bond may be transferred in like manner to bearer, and thereupon transferability by delivery shall be restored and it may again from time to time be registered or transferred to bearer as before. Such registration, however, shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons hereto appertaining, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

This bond and all other bonds of this issue shall have all of the qualities of negotiable instruments, and during such time as this bond is payable to bearer, the same and each of the coupons hereto appertaining may be negotiated by delivery by any person having possession thereof, howsoever such possession may have been acquired, and any holder who shall have taken this bond while so payable to bearer or any of said coupons from any person for value and without notice shall thereby acquire absolute title to this bond or to such coupons as the case may be, free of any defenses enforceable against any prior holder and free from all equities and claims of ownership of any such prior holder, and the said University and any paying agent may deem and treat the bearer of this bond, or, if registered, the person in whose name it is registered and the bearer of any interest coupons appertaining hereto as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes.

That upon the issuance of any revenue bonds herein provided for there be and there is hereby established a fiscal year for the operation of said staff housing facilities located on the property heretofore described in the preambles of this resolution, in the City of Urbana, Illinois and said fiscal year shall

Bonds numbered 1 to 46, inclusive, bearing interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent ($2\frac{1}{2}\%$) per annum, bonds numbered 47 to 175, inclusive, bearing interest at the rate of two and three-fourths per cent ($2\frac{3}{4}\%$) per annum, interest payable April 1, 1950, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year, said bonds being redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date on or after October 1, 1952 and up to and including April 1, 1954, at par and accrued interest and a premium of three per cent (3%) of the principal amount thereof, a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1954, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including April 1, 1959, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on October 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois; and

WHEREAS the said bonds are payable both as to principal and interest and premium, if any, solely from the net revenues to be derived from the operation

of the said staff housing facilities, the term "net revenues" as used herein meaning the gross revenues of the said facilities, less the reasonable cost of operating, insuring, maintaining and repairing the said facilities; and

WHEREAS the University has, in and by the said resolution, covenanted and agreed, for the benefit of the holders from time to time of the said bonds and the interest coupons thereto appertaining, that the net revenues of the said staff housing facilities will be from time to time deposited with the Depositary and used only for the payment of the fees and expenses of the Depositary, principal of, premium, if any, and the interest on the said bonds; and

WHEREAS the University has, in and by the said resolution, further covenanted and agreed that it would execute and deliver a Deposit Agreement in the form and terms hereof:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth and pursuant to the terms and provisions of the said resolution, the University and the Depositary have agreed and do hereby agree as follows for the equal and proportionate benefit and security of the holders of the said bonds of the University and the interest coupons thereto appertaining; that is to say:

SECTION 1. The University covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said staff housing facilities, and that it will furnish to the Depositary, on or before October 1, 1950, for that period from October 1, 1949, to June 30, 1950, and on or before October 1 in each year thereafter so long as any bonds remain outstanding, a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses and the net revenues of the said staff housing facilities for the twelve months' period ended on the next preceding June 30. The Depositary shall have no duty to request any such information nor any duty relative to the statements from time to time furnished by the University, except to preserve the same for the inspection of the holders of the bonds during usual business hours.

SECTION 2. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds hereinabove referred to that all of the revenues, income, receipts, profits, charges, fees, rents and returns derived from the said staff housing facilities and the operation thereof shall be collected by the University and, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing the said staff housing facilities, shall be paid over to the Depositary semi-annually not later than July 31, for the previous six months' period ending June 30 each year, and January 31, for the previous six months' period ending December 31 of each year, provided, however, there shall be deposited on or before March 1, 1950, an amount of the net revenues for the period from October 1, 1949 to the last day of February, 1950, which shall not be less than interest requirements due on said bonds April 1, 1950, plus Depositary's fees, and the University hereby covenants and agrees so to do. All funds received by the Depositary under the terms of this agreement, after deducting fees and expenses of such Depositary, shall be held by the Depositary in a special trust account to be known as the sinking fund and shall be disbursed or applied by the Depositary as hereinafter provided.

At least five (5) days before each semi-annual interest payment date the Depositary shall, if the sinking fund moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose, set aside an amount equal to the interest becoming due on the next ensuing interest payment date on all of the said bonds then outstanding, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of such interest, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of such interest on the next ensuing interest payment date upon surrender of the interest coupons becoming due on the said interest date and appertaining to the outstanding bonds.

At least five (5) days before the express date of maturity of the bonds, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund, if such moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose after making provision for payment of the interest becoming due on the outstanding bonds on such maturity date, an amount equal to the principal of the bonds then maturing, and such funds shall

be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of the principal of the said maturing bonds, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of the principal of the said bonds upon surrender of the said bonds.

If, upon the fortieth (40th) day before any interest payment date, the Depositary has cash in the sinking fund after setting aside an amount sufficient to pay interest becoming due on all outstanding bonds on the next two ensuing interest payment dates and to pay the principal and premium, if any, of any bonds theretofore called for redemption and not yet redeemed and the principal of all bonds becoming due on the next two ensuing principal payment dates, such cash shall be applied by the Depositary to the redemption on the next ensuing interest payment date of outstanding bonds, which by their terms are redeemable, in an amount sufficient to exhaust as nearly as may be such cash, after deducting therefrom and paying all costs and expenses of such redemption.

The said bonds are each in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and are numbered from 1 to 175, inclusive. All bonds redeemed through the operation of the sinking fund, together with the appertaining interest coupons, shall be cancelled by the Depositary and delivered to the Treasurer of the University. The Depositary shall keep a record of the numbers of all bonds so redeemed.

Notice of redemption through the operation of the sinking fund shall be published by the Depositary, either in the name of the University or in the name of the Depositary, as the Depositary may determine, once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois. Such notice shall with substantial accuracy:

(a) Designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be the office of the Depositary, in the City of Milwaukee and State of Wisconsin;

(b) If the bonds to be redeemed are less than all of those outstanding, designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and

(c) State that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of the principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of the bonds so called for redemption will cease.

Upon publication of notice of redemption of any bonds through the operation of the sinking fund, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund an amount sufficient to pay and redeem the said bonds, and such funds be and are hereby appropriated irrevocably for that purpose, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply such funds to the payment and redemption of the said bonds on or after the specified redemption date upon surrender of the said bonds, together with all unmatured interest coupons thereto appertaining.

SECTION 3. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds, hereinabove referred to, that it will, so long as any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, keep in the office of the Depositary, in the City of Milwaukee and State of Wisconsin, books for the registration and transfer as to principal of bonds of the said issue, and the said Depositary is hereby appointed the agent of the University, with the title of Registrar, for the purpose of registering and transferring the said bonds as to principal only.

As to each bond registered, as to principal only, the person or entity in whose name the same is for the time being registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, except for the purpose of receiving payment of the outstanding coupons, if any, appertaining thereto, and so long as the same shall be so registered payment of or on account of the principal thereof shall be made by the Depositary, as paying agent, only to the registered owner thereof. The bearer of any of the said bonds which shall not be registered as to principal and the bearer of any coupon appertaining to any such bond, whether or not such bonds shall be registered as to principal, shall for all purposes be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner of such bond or coupon as the case may be for the purpose of receiving payment thereof

and for all other purposes, and the Depositary, as paying agent, shall be fully protected in making payment of any such bond or coupon to the bearer thereof.

SECTION 4. The Depositary has executed this agreement and agrees to carry out the terms and provisions hereof on its part, but only upon and subject to the following express terms and conditions:

(a) The Depositary shall not be responsible for any recitals herein or in the said bonds or for the validity of this agreement or of the said bonds, nor for the performance of any of the agreements herein contained on the part of the University.

(b) The Depositary shall not be accountable for any of the proceeds of the bonds or of the revenues of the said staff housing facilities nor for any other funds of the University, except such funds as may be deposited hereunder. The Depositary shall not be required to allow interest on any funds at any time deposited hereunder. The Depositary may become the owner of bonds of the said issue with the same rights which it would have if not Depositary.

(c) The Depositary shall not be liable for any action taken or omitted to be taken by it in good faith and in the exercise of reasonable care and believed by it to be within the discretion or power conferred upon it by this agreement, nor shall the Depositary be responsible for the consequences of any error of judgment, and the Depositary shall not be answerable except for its own acts, neglect and default, nor for any loss unless the same shall happen through the negligence or want of good faith of the Depositary.

(d) The Depositary shall be entitled to advice of counsel concerning all matters arising under this agreement and its duties hereunder, and may in all cases pay such reasonable compensation as it shall deem proper to such counsel and all such outlays and expenditures shall be repaid to the Depositary out of the sinking fund money.

(e) The Depositary shall not be required to give any bond or surety in respect of the exercise of the duties and powers conferred hereby or otherwise in respect of the premises.

(f) The Depositary shall have a first lien hereunder upon the sinking fund moneys for reasonable compensation, expenses, advances and counsel fees incurred in and about the exercise and performance of its powers and duties hereunder, and the cost and expense of defending against any liability in the premises of any character whatsoever. The compensation of the Depositary shall not be limited to or by any provision of law in regard to the compensation of a trustee of an express trust.

(g) The Depositary at the time acting hereunder may at any time resign by giving not less than sixty (60) days' written notice to the University specifying the date when such resignation takes effect.

SECTION 5. The University covenants that in case the Depositary at the time acting hereunder shall resign or be dissolved or shall be in the course of dissolution or liquidation or otherwise become incapable of acting hereunder, the University will forthwith appoint a successor Depositary which shall be a trust company or bank in good standing located in the State of Illinois and having a capital and surplus of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000), if there be such a trust company or bank willing, qualified and able to accept the appointment upon reasonable or customary terms.

Every successor Depositary appointed hereunder shall execute, acknowledge and deliver to its predecessor and also to the University an instrument in writing accepting such appointment hereunder, and thereupon such successor Depositary, without any further act, deed or conveyance, shall become fully vested with all of the estates, rights, powers, duties and obligations of its predecessor, and every predecessor Depositary shall deliver all moneys and securities, together with a record of the amount and the numbers of the outstanding bonds, to its successor; provided, however, that before such delivery is required or made, all fees, advances and expenses of the retiring Depositary shall be paid in full.

Any corporation into which the Depositary or any successor to it may be merged or converted or with which it or any successor to it may be consolidated,

or any corporation resulting from any merger, conversion or consolidation to which the Depositary, or any successor to it shall be a party, shall be the successor Depositary under this agreement without the execution or filing of any paper on the part of either of the parties hereto.

SECTION 6. Nothing in this agreement expressed or implied is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person, firm or corporation, other than the parties hereto and the holders of the said bonds and the coupons thereto appertaining, any right, remedy or claim, legal or equitable, under or by reason of this agreement or any covenant, condition or stipulation hereof.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, said University of Illinois, acting by and through its Board of Trustees, has caused this agreement to be signed in its name by the President of the Board of Trustees and the Treasurer thereof and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by the Secretary thereof, and said Marine National Exchange Bank of Milwaukee has caused this agreement to be signed in its corporate name by one of its Vice Presidents and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by one of its Assistant Cashiers, all as of the day and year first above written.

SECTION 7. Said University hereby covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said staff housing facilities, and that it will furnish to the Depositary and to the original purchasers of said bonds on or before October 1 in each year so long as any bonds remain outstanding a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses, and the net revenues of said staff housing facilities for the twelve months' period ending on the next preceding June 30.

SECTION 8. The University covenants that while any of the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding it will establish charges and fees for the use of said staff housing facilities and all of the facilities thereof adjusted so as to provide revenues at all times sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, insuring and repairing the said staff housing facilities, to pay the interest from time to time becoming due on the said bonds from time to time outstanding, and to provide for the payment of the principal of such bonds at maturity.

SECTION 9. It is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any revenue bonds issued hereunder are outstanding no additional revenue bonds shall be issued which, by their terms, are payable from the revenues of said staff housing facilities, unless and until all revenue bonds issued pursuant to the terms of this resolution have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest, or until provision shall have been made for such payment in full.

SECTION 10. Said University of Illinois hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, or any of them, that it will punctually perform all duties with reference to said staff housing facilities required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Illinois, including the making and collecting of sufficient charges and fees for the use of said properties and all of the facilities thereof, and segregating the revenue thereof and the application of the income and revenue thereof, as provided by this resolution; and it hereby covenants and agrees not to sell, lease, loan, mortgage

or in any manner dispose of said staff housing facilities, including any and all extensions and improvements that may be made thereto, until all of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall have been paid in full, both principal and interest, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment thereof in full, and the said University further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously operate said staff housing facilities and maintain and keep in full force and effect at all times adequate insurance for the protection of said properties, including multi-risk insurance, covering loss or damage to said properties and use and occupancy insurance covering loss of use of said properties. The cost of maintaining all insurance shall be deemed to be an operating charge and shall be paid only from revenues.

Any proceeds derived by said University from any multi-risk insurance shall be applied to the payment of the said University's reasonable and necessary costs in reconstruction, repair or rehabilitation of the said properties and any proceeds derived from any use and occupancy insurance shall be applied in the same manner and to the same effect as gross operating revenues.

SECTION 11. The provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between the University of Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after issuance of the bonds no changes, additions, alterations or amendments of any kind shall be made to this resolution in any manner, until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder, and interest thereon, shall be paid in full, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment of all bonds hereby authorized and interest thereon in full.

SECTION 12. Any holder of a bond or bonds, or any of the coupons of any bond or bonds issued under the provisions of this resolution, may either in law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceeding, enforce or compel the performance of all duties required by this resolution or the acts under which the bonds hereby authorized are issued, including the fixing, maintaining and collecting of such charges and fees for the use of such properties and all facilities thereof as will be sufficient for all the purposes provided by this resolution, and the application of income and revenue therefrom.

SECTION 13. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.

SECTION 14. That Trustees PARK LIVINGSTON and FRANCES B. WATKINS be and they are hereby designated and directed to execute the said Staff Housing Revenue Bonds, Series of 1949, hereby authorized, together with the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and the said President, Secretary and Treasurer of this Board of Trustees, be and they are each of them hereby authorized and directed to execute all instruments, papers, documents and agreements necessary or convenient to accomplish the issue and delivery of the said Staff Housing Revenue Bonds, Series of 1949, to the purchaser thereof.

SECTION 15. That said revenue bonds shall be executed as soon after this resolution becomes effective as may be, be deposited with the Treasurer of said University, and be by him delivered to John Nuveen & Co., the purchasers thereof, upon receipt of the purchase price, the contract for the sale thereto heretofore entered into be and the same is hereby in all respects ratified and approved. Any accrued interest or premium derived from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in the sinking fund hereinabove provided and applied toward payment of interest or principal of said bonds as thereby required.

SECTION 16. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

October 25, 1949



The October meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Tuesday, October 25, 1949, in the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, according to the following schedule:

11 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during the open session, Director of Public Information J. F. Wright.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of July 28, 1949.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 489 to 808 above.

ACTION OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE — PURCHASE OF COAL

The Secretary presented for record a report of the action of the Executive Committee on October 21, 1949, authorizing the purchase of twenty-five cars (approximately 1,250 tons) of 1¼" washed screenings, at \$5.25 a ton, f.o.b. mine, freight rate \$2.05 a ton, total cost a ton \$7.30 and total for this order, \$9,125, from the Republic Coal and Coke Company, Chicago.

In this connection, the Comptroller reported that the bid of the Republic Coal and Coke Company had been conditioned on immediate acceptance, and that the price had been raised to \$5.50 by the Company before the action of the Executive Committee could be communicated to them.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF COAL

(1) On October 21, 1949, the Executive Committee authorized the purchase of twenty-five cars (approximately 1,250 tons) of 1¼" washed screenings, from the Republic Coal and Coke Company, Chicago, to increase the University's coal supply at Urbana-Champaign in view of the coal strike. As of October 12 the University had in storage in Urbana-Champaign approximately 4,000 tons of coal which, under normal operations, would be sufficient for twenty-six days. The additional twenty-five cars would add approximately eight days to the present supply. The Director of Purchases has located, through the Republic Coal and Coke Company, a source of coal mined at Staunton, Illinois, by members of the Progressive Mine Workers Union who are not on strike. The Republic Coal and Coke Company is a distributor. The University now has a contract with this Company to supply coal as needed throughout the fiscal year 1949-1950 from a Danville mine in which United Mine Workers are employed, but this coal can not be delivered because of the strike.

The recommendation to the Executive Committee was based on an oral offer. The Company is now unable to supply this coal at the original price of \$5.25 a ton but will accept an order at \$5.50 a ton (plus freight at \$2.05 a ton, or a price of \$7.55 a ton delivered) for twenty cars to be shipped a car a day. The order will be subject to cancellation by the University at any time.

In view of the coal shortage and the uncertainty of deliveries from Danville under the University's standing contract, the Director of Purchases recommends that an order be placed with the Republic Coal and Coke Company at \$5.50 a ton. To avoid further price increases he has placed an order for twenty cars on this basis, subject to approval by the Board. He is trying to find additional coal and has located eight cars which were bought at the price of \$5.25 a ton f.o.b. mine, the price authorized by the Executive Committee.

Under current market conditions, price competition is not feasible and it is a matter of purchasing coal wherever it is available as a protection against curtailing power plant operations further. Immediately after the coal strike started on September 19 all Physical Plant operations were reviewed in order to reduce to a minimum the use of steam and electric power.

I recommend approval as an emergency measure, and that further purchases be authorized between this time and the next meeting of the Board, by concurrence of the President of the Board and the Comptroller; and that the President of the University be authorized to transmit to the members of the staff a statement of the situation, to the end that the greatest economy in the use of coal be promoted.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted.

CHANGE IN STATUS OF PROFESSOR WILLIAM E. BRITTON

(2) Professor William E. Britton of the College of Law has also been serving as Legal Counsel since September 1, 1945. He accepted this assignment with the expectation that he would be able to teach part time as his predecessors had

done. The volume of legal work required of him has increased to such an extent that he finds it impracticable to combine it with part-time teaching or to do any substantial amount of legal research. He does not want to give up teaching and research entirely.

Professor Britton has, therefore, requested that (a) he be relieved of his services as Legal Counsel and be appointed Professor of Law on full time, effective February 1, 1950, and that (b) he be granted a sabbatical leave of absence on full pay for the second semester of 1949-1950. He plans to use this sabbatical leave on research and on revisions of four of his case books. He has been out of law teaching, in effect, for seven years and needs to reorient himself.

I recommend approval.

President Stoddard and President Williamson expressed their appreciation of the able and faithful services of Professor Britton as Legal Counsel.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the recommendations of the President of the University were approved.

LICENSING OF BETATRON IMPROVEMENT PATENTS

(3) The University holds two patents (United States patents 2,447,255, Kerst *et al*, August 17, 1948, and 2,473,123, Adams, June 14, 1949) covering improvements in the betatron. The first (No. 2,447,255) is an improvement which makes the betatron particularly useful in radiography and in X-raying materials. It makes the X-rays come from a very fine focal point which enables a fine flaw to be discovered in any material being examined. The second patent (No. 2,473,123) is a circuit which increases the X-ray yield of the betatron and brings the yield up to a more or less uniformly high level.

The University has been following the policy of patenting improvements and accessories designed for the betatron by members of the staff. No financial return is expected but the effect of the policy puts the University in a strong position to influence the use of the basic betatron patents by the General Electric Company which holds them. The General Electric Company's policy permits universities to make betatrons for research purposes and it also grants manufacturers nonexclusive royalty-free licenses to make betatrons for the same purpose.

The Head of the Department of Physics and the Chairman of the University Research Board recommend that the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, be given a royalty-free nonexclusive license to use the inventions claimed in United States patents 2,447,255, Kerst *et al*, August 17, 1948, and 2,473,123, Adams, June 14, 1949, both assigned to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

The Head of the Department of Physics and the Chairman of the University Research Board also recommend that immediate steps be taken to secure patent coverage in Great Britain on the inventions claimed and allowed in United States patent application serial No. 617,255, Kerst. This improvement is known as the "Betatron Injector Structure."

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

RELEASE OF PATENT RIGHTS TO ENDOMYCIN

(4) For some years past, a program of systematic research aimed at discovering new antibiotic substances has been supported at the University by contributions from three pharmaceutical houses: Abbott, Eli Lilly, and Upjohn. Of several antibiotic agents studied in this work, one, an antifungal agent which has been tentatively named Endomycin, seems to have some promise of becoming a useful therapeutic agent.

Much expensive work must be done before any such possibility can be realized; this will be undertaken by the drug companies involved. Meanwhile, as a precaution, these firms desire the culture and isolation of Endomycin to be patented. Since the terms of the University's agreement with them prescribe that they be granted royalty-free nonexclusive licenses under any patents resulting from this work, it

is a matter of no particular consequence to the pharmaceutical houses concerned whether they or the University hold the patent on Endomycin.

It seems unlikely that royalties on such a patent would ever be realized by the University, since the three important companies holding royalty-free licenses will be well ahead of the others in their knowledge and facilities for producing Endomycin, and able to supply any quantities that are required, in the judgment of Professor H. E. Carter of the Department of Chemistry who has been directing the research work in this field. Other firms are therefore not likely to desire to obtain licenses to produce this antibiotic.

There appears to be no doubt that the University and its individual members who have participated in the program will get their full share of credit for Endomycin, whoever holds the patents.

The University Research Board recommends that the patent rights to Endomycin be released to Professors H. E. Carter of the Department of Chemistry and David Gottlieb of the Department of Horticulture, the discoverers.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this release was authorized as recommended.

REQUEST OF THE ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNING BOARDS OF STATE UNIVERSITIES AND ALLIED INSTITUTIONS

(5) From time to time the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has been invited to become a member of the "Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions," and the invitation has recently been renewed. The Association is an organization of over sixty governing boards of state-supported institutions of higher education in thirty-two states and Puerto Rico.

The Middle West is well represented. All of the Big Ten Universities, with the exception of Northwestern University, which is privately owned and therefore not eligible, and the University of Illinois, are members.

The annual dues for the University of Illinois would be \$120. The Association has an annual meeting usually in September or October.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, membership in this association was authorized.

REPORT OF TESTS OF COAL

(6) In previous reports on contracts for coal for Urbana-Champaign Power Plant for 1949-1950 (June 25 and July 28, 1949) it was indicated that quarterly reports of tests of coal are to be made to the Board. The Physical Plant Department has submitted through the Comptroller the report of tests for the month of September, 1949, which is submitted herewith (see Appendix, page 935).

This report was received for record.

AGREEMENT WITH BUILDING SERVICE EMPLOYEES UNION RELATING TO WAGE RATES FOR JANITOR SERVICE AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(7) In its meeting on May 21 and 22, 1948 (Minutes, page 1093), I presented to the Board of Trustees a suggested basis for agreement between the University and Local 119, Building Service Employees International, for establishing the principle of paying prevailing rates for janitor service on the Urbana campus. The statement was approved as the basis of further negotiation and I was requested to send the statement to the Executive Committee of the Board for its consideration and action.

Following correspondence with the Executive Committee, the Committee approved a statement which included the following paragraph:

The University base rate for Janitor shall be a rate agreed upon by negotiations in behalf of a large group of janitors engaged in work of a similar character under union contract in a representative group of Illinois cities including Chicago.

At its meeting on July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 10), the Board approved a further statement as to the interim relationship between the Union and the University pending the completion of final and detailed negotiations.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel reports that he has now completed negotiations and that an agreement has been reached which fully satisfies the conditions established by the Board and which is likewise acceptable to the Union. Under this agreement, University wage rates will be tied to rates paid by the Building Managers' Association of Chicago and by a group of boards of education in suburban communities west and southwest of Chicago.

The immediate effect of this agreement is to provide for a five-cent increase in the present hourly wage of \$1.35 (of which increase three cents is the value of six paid holidays not heretofore granted to custodial employees), and to reduce the working time of night janitors by a twenty-minute lunch period to be allowed within the work shift.

I have approved this agreement as being in accordance with the principles established by previous action of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this agreement was approved.

CASE OF VIRGINIA KENNY

At this point, Mr. Livingston, in the absence of Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Chairman, made an informal report on a meeting of the Committee on Chicago Departments to consider the Kenny case (see Minutes, September 29, 1949, page 816).

After discussion, on motion of Mr. Hickman, the President of the University was requested to investigate this matter further in conference with the Committee on Chicago Departments.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session after luncheon, the same members and officers were present as during the morning session.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. MARIE A. HINRICHS, Assistant Professor of Hygiene, beginning October 15, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,500.
2. HERBERT O. KUBLY, Associate Professor of Speech, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,500.
3. WILLIAM H. MILLER, Assistant Professor of Music, on one-fourth time, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$1,250.

5. HEINZ M. VON FOERSTER, Special Research Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$5,000.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these appointments were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CANCELLATION OF LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR JOHN H. GARLAND

(1) Associate Professor John H. Garland of the Department of Geography was granted a sabbatical leave of absence on full pay for the second semester of 1949-1950 (Minutes, March 10, 1949, page 292). He has asked permission to postpone the leave until such time when he will be in a position to utilize more fully its benefits.

I recommend that his leave be cancelled without prejudice as to a future application.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this leave was cancelled as recommended.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(2) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943, and who have submitted evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked certificates of certified public accountants obtained in other states by passing the regular written examinations. They have also met the other requirements specified in Section 5 of the Act.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

LEGAL SERVICES FOR MEDICAL CENTER STEAM COMPANY

(3) The costs of the legal services required in setting up the Medical Center Steam Company and in financing the construction of the steam plant for the Chicago Professional Colleges are payable by the University. The firm of Isham, Lincoln, and Beale, Chicago, was employed for this purpose under arrangements between the Medical Center Steam Company and the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, which is financing the project.

The officers of the Medical Center Steam Company have submitted a report of legal services rendered to date and have asked the University's concurrence. The law firm desires to charge a fee which is entirely satisfactory to the University. This has been considered by the Legal Counsel and the Comptroller, who recommend that the University concur in a fee of \$8,500 for services rendered through October 10, 1949. Of this total, \$1,000 is related to the organization of the Company and \$7,500 to financing. There will probably be some additional legal expense incidental to the final closing of the bond issue after construction is completed about July, 1951. These legal services will be paid for by the Medical Center Steam Company and no University appropriation is required at this time.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees concur in the payment of the proposed fee.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, the Board concurred in the payment of the proposed fee.

PAYMENTS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES

(4) An Act of the General Assembly of Illinois (Senate Bill 276, Sixty-sixth General Assembly), approved July 8, 1949, authorizes the Board of Trustees of the University to make payments to local governments in lieu of taxes on certain University properties. Pursuant to this act, the Legal Counsel has made agreements with the State's Attorneys of Champaign, Piatt, and De Kalb Counties to pay for governmental services in lieu of taxes. Payments were made covering the period 1944 through 1948 (of which \$23,456.02 was the amount paid for 1948), on income-producing properties. A summary of the payments is presented for record:

ANNUAL PAYMENTS TO INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

(5) The Institute of International Education was established in 1919 to provide needed services to foreign students, professors, and scholars desiring to study in the United States, as well as students and professors in American colleges and universities desiring to study abroad. Its leadership in stimulating exchanges of students between the United States and foreign countries is universally recognized.

Through the years the Institute has been supported largely by grants of funds from educational foundations. The demands on the Institute and its activities have developed to such an extent that it needs more financial support. An appeal has been made, on behalf of the Institute, to the colleges and universities which it serves to contribute annually to its support. Utilizing the Institute's services has resulted in financial savings to colleges and universities. In the case of the University of Illinois an annual contribution could be regarded as payment for services. An annual subscription of \$300 has been suggested.

I recommend that such annual payments be authorized.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this recommendation was approved.

APPROPRIATIONS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUNDS

(6) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of its action in making the following assignments from surplus funds of the Association:

(a) Payment to the Alumni Association for services rendered, \$3,000. This is in partial payment of the salary of a member of the Alumni Association staff who performs field services for the Athletic Association.

(b) Expenses of sending the University of Illinois band to the Iowa-Illinois game at Iowa City, Iowa, October 8, 1949, \$10,000. The action of the Directors was "... an appropriation of \$10,000 or as much thereof as might be needed ... " The actual expense of this band trip was \$2,408.76.

These funds were available for the purposes indicated and I recommend that the action of the Board of Directors be confirmed.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these assignments were confirmed.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(7) The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends assignments of funds from the "Reserve for Nonrecurring Purposes" in the budget for 1949-1950 as follows:

CONTRACT FOR POWER PLANT EQUIPMENT

(8) Bids have been received for switchgear and incidental equipment in connection with the power plant addition in Urbana. The proposal covers the furnishing of five new switch panels and the conversion, reconditioning, and installation of new current transformers on twenty-one existing switch panels to increase interrupting capacity of the present installation. The conversion, reconditioning, and new current transformers for the existing switchgear is necessary because of the increase in the total generating capacity of the station.

Although advertisements were placed in two newspapers and three manufacturers were specifically invited to make proposals, only one bid of \$66,266.40 was received. It is from the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company of Chicago. This bid is subject to adjustment upward or downward in accordance with the prices in effect at the time of shipment not to exceed 10 per cent of the bid price. The architects for this project, Sargent and Lundy, believe that it is impossible to secure competitive bids for this work because of the necessity of matching the present installation and due to the fact that most of the work involved is on the conversion and reconditioning of the equipment manufactured by the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company. They have analyzed the bid and compared it with similar bids on current work handled by their office of other manufacturers and are satisfied that the price quoted is fair and reasonable.

Funds are available for this work in the State Appropriation for the Power Plant addition in Urbana, subject to release of these funds by the Governor.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company in accordance with their bid of \$66,266.40 subject to an adjustment in price upward or downward at the time of shipment not to exceed 10 per cent of the price quoted.

I concur in these recommendations and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were approved and authority was granted as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES ON REHABILITATION OF
WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM IN THE RESEARCH
AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS**

(9) The water system in the Illinois Surgical Institute of the Research and Educational Hospitals needs to be modernized and rehabilitated.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the firm of Neiler, Rich, and Bladen, Chicago, for engineering services on the rehabilitation of the hot and cold water systems at a fee of 8 per cent of the cost of the work covered by the construction contracts and any additional work required by the University. It is estimated that the fee will amount to approximately \$2,500.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, authority was granted as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES ON REPLACEMENT OF
ELEVATORS IN THE RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS**

(10) Two elevators in the Research and Educational Hospitals must be replaced. Holabird and Root and Burgee, Architects and Engineers, Chicago, have submitted a proposal to do the engineering work, including preparation of plans and specifications, at a fee of 5 per cent of the cost of the replacement of the two elevators. The total fee is estimated to be \$5,000.

Holabird and Root and Burgee are the architects for the new hospital addition and the work on this addition will involve considerable work in the present Research and Educational Hospitals. They will be able to coordinate the replacement of the elevators with the construction of the hospital addition.

Funds are available.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to Holabird and Root and Burgee for the engineering work on this project.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was awarded as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(11) The Department of Chemistry requests that a vibration proof foundation be constructed in the basement of the East Chemistry Building on which to install a large compressor.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with the John Felmley Company in the amount of \$1,759 (see Minutes, August 5, 1947, page 502).

Funds are available in the State appropriation for East Chemistry Building equipment for the 1949-1951 biennium. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this contract change.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as recommended.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(12) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from September 11 to October 10, 1949 (see Appendix, page 935).

This report was received for record.

PURCHASES

(13) A report of (A) emergency purchases authorized and (B) purchases recommended (see Appendix, page 937).

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed, and the purchases recommended were authorized.

REPORT OF COMPLIANCE OF REPUBLIC COAL AND COKE COMPANY WITH CONTRACT SPECIFICATIONS FOR COAL DELIVERED TO ABBOTT POWER PLANT DURING MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, 1949

Coal contracts specified 2,700 tons of coal to be delivered during the month of September; however due to the miners' three-day work week slow down and the strike, which was effective on September 19, 1949, only 2,073.4 tons were delivered.

Coal samples for each of the three weeks in which coal was delivered were sent to the State Geological Survey in Urbana for analysis, and were found to fall within the limits of the specifications as set forth in the contract. No premiums or penalties were necessary. Although the contract does not include penalties or premiums for moisture content of coal, it does include a maximum guaranteed moisture content. Due to the drier at the mine being out of order, the coal delivered had a moisture content above the guarantee. Negotiations are now in process for an adjustment of this discrepancy.

The following table is a comparison between the guaranteed analysis with the actual analysis as determined by the State Geological Survey:

The above analyses were again used as a basis for calculating the heat value received for one cent and they appear to compare very favorably with that calculated at the time the contract was awarded. The B.T.U./cent at the time of contract award was 45,937. The average B.T.U./cent from analyses 45,603. This is less than 0.8% variation from that used as a basis of award. The nearest competitor, at the time of award, offered only 41,800 B.T.U./cent.

Rough calculation from operating data (which has not been checked by closely controlled boiler efficiency tests) shows that operation with Republic Coal and Coke Company coal under contract gives an evaporation of approximately eight pounds of steam per pound of coal, whereas operation with coal of the nearest competitor, the Bell and Zoller Coal Company, Murdock mine, gives only seven pounds of steam per pound of coal. Burning an average of 150 tons of coal a day of Bell and Zoller Company coal would only amount to 131.25 tons of Republic Coal and Coke Company coal or a saving of 18.75 tons a day. ($18.75 \times \$4.954/\text{ton} = \92.89).

We believe that the burning tests and coal analysis made to date have entirely justified our recommendation of the Republic Coal and Coke Company over the other bidders.

The November meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Tuesday, November 29, 1949, at the Chicago Illini Union, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10:00 a.m. — Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

12:30 p.m. — Luncheon.

2:00 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistants to the President A. J. Janata and Wilbur Schramm, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton; and, during the open session, Director J. F. Wright.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. W. W. CHARTERS, JR., Assistant Professor in the Bureau of Research and Service, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$4,800.
2. BENJAMIN B. FREUD, Visiting Professor of Physical Sciences, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$6,000.
3. ROBERT K. LIM, Visiting Research Professor of Clinical Science, beginning September 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$1,260.
4. CHRISTOFFER OPTEDAHL, Visiting Assistant Professor of Geology, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,300.
5. WILLIS A. WOOD, Assistant Professor of Dairy Bacteriology, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,200.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, these appointments were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CONTRACTS FOR ADDITION TO RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(1) Bids have been received on the construction of, and on some of the equipment (kitchen and cafeteria) for, the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals in Chicago. These bids are on the first construction phase; the second phase will include the remodeling and alterations necessary in the present building as a result of the new addition.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts as follows:

Funds are available in the State appropriation to the University for 1949-1951 for "Construction of Addition to Present Hospital."

Schedules of bids are herewith given to the Secretary for his files.

I recommend that these contracts be awarded subject to the release of funds by the Governor, and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts.

During the presentation of this matter, Mr. E. L. Stouffer, Architect, Messrs. William Holabird and J. Z. Burgee, of the firm of Holabird and Root and Burgee, and Mr. Harry Pearce, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for the Chicago Colleges, were present.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Livingston, contracts were awarded and authority to execute contracts was given as recommended.

**DETERMINATION OF WAGE RATES TO BE SPECIFIED FOR
CONSTRUCTION WORK AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK**

(2) At its meeting on September 29, 1949, the Board of Trustees approved a procedure as an instrument of settlement of future questions on rates of wages to be paid for construction work at Robert Allerton Park in Piatt County. The proposal, as revised and approved by the Board, provides that such questions shall be determined by the appointment of a fact-finding committee (see Minutes, page 812).

The University's present Committee¹ appointed by the Board of Trustees on July 28, 1949, to conduct a hearing on the objections to the current determination of wage rates and Counsel for the objecting labor organizations are of the opinion that it might be difficult for the first two members specified in the proposal of September 29, 1949, to agree on a third if they are limited to Piatt County. They jointly recommend, the University's Legal Counsel and its Director of Non-academic Personnel concurring, that the third member be selected by the other two without restriction to Piatt County and in accordance with the procedure outlined below:

A fact-finding committee composed of (1) one member appointed by the Illinois State Federation of Labor, (2) one member appointed by the President of the University, and (3) one member selected by the other two, provided that if they do not agree on a candidate within ten days the Director of the State Department of Public Works and Buildings will be asked to select the third member, to conduct investigations of wage rates in Piatt County in connection with construction work on the Allerton Trust properties of the University in accordance with the Prevailing Wage Act and to report to the President of the University and to the Board of Trustees that they are unable to ascertain any prevailing wages, or, if ascertainable, to report with respect to prevailing wages involved in such construction work in that locality.

I recommend that the action of the Board of Trustees of September 29, 1949, be reconsidered and that the Board authorize the appointment of the Committee as indicated above.

The University Committee, which has been conducting a hearing on objections previously filed, reports that if this plan is approved the pending objections will be withdrawn. Hence, if the Board approves the procedure recommended, I recommend further that the present Committee be discharged.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted. Mr. Herrick voted in the negative.

REPORT ON APPLICATION FOR PATENT OF "METHOD AND APPARATUS FOR DISPERSING INSECTICIDES AND THE LIKE"

(3) Application was filed for a patent of "Method and Apparatus for Dispersing Insecticides and the Like," discovered by Dr. H. F. Johnstone, Professor of Chemical Engineering, during the course of research under a wartime contract with the Office of Scientific Research and Development.

Professor Johnstone reports that the patent examiner has given a final rejection to the claims made in the patent application Number 596800, filed May 30, 1945. Professor Johnstone recommends against further prosecution of this application through appeal by the University. The Chairman of the University Research Board concurs in this, but recommends that since the invention was the result of research work paid for by federal funds, the United States government be offered the opportunity of prosecuting an appeal with the understanding that any patent resulting from such action would belong to the United States government.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

**PATENT POLICY GOVERNING RESEARCH UNDER UNITED STATES
PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE GRANTS**

(4) The University is receiving a number of grants-in-aid from the Division of Research Grants and Fellowships, National Institute of Health, United States Public Health Service. As a condition to receiving such grants the Office of the Surgeon General is insisting that the following be included in the application submitted by the University:

"That if any patentable discoveries or inventions are made in the course of the work aided by any grant received as a result of this application, the applicant will, in consideration of such grant, refer to the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service, for determination, the question of whether such patentable discovery or invention shall be patented and the manner of obtaining and disposing of the proposed patents in order to protect the public interest."

The policy of the Public Health Service as to patentable discoveries is quite similar to that of the University in that it is the policy of that agency to administer such discoveries in such a manner as to promote the public interest. For this reason and since the probability of the development of any discoveries or inventions which would be patentable under such grants is remote, it is recommended by the Legal Counsel, the Dean of the Graduate College and Chairman of the University Research Board, and the Bursar that the usual requirement in research investigations that all control of patentable discoveries lie with the University, be waived in the case of investigations supported by the United States Public Health Service, and that the above section be incorporated in applications or contracts with such agency.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this recommendation was adopted.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION INSTRUCTIONAL CONTRACTS

(5) Contracts with the Veterans Administration providing for the instruction of veteran students at Urbana have been on a "Cost of Teaching Personnel" basis since February, 1946. Such basis provides for "compensation" to an institution in lieu of regular tuition by means of a rate per credit hour determined in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Administrator of Veterans Affairs under powers given him by the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (GI Bill) and related legislation. Briefly, such rate is calculated by determining the total salaries paid the academic staff for teaching, eliminating all portions of salaries paid for research, public service, administrative duties, extension or other services, for a certain base period, and dividing such total salaries by credit hours earned by all students, including veterans, in such base period. This rate, determined by the Bureau of Institutional Research, was included in Urbana contracts covering the periods indicated as follows:

These rates result in compensation to the University for about half of the actual instructional costs.

The regulations issued by the Veterans Administration referred to allowance for federal funds in such calculations, specifying particularly "Smith-Hughes or other laws" (which provide for reimbursement for expenditures) and state that "due consideration" should be given thereto. There was no indication that funds received under the original Land-Grant Act and supplementary laws would be excluded in arriving at the credit hour rate and hence no allowance for them was made in our calculations. These funds are appropriated to the individual states and in Illinois amount to \$160,131 annually. They are expended by the University of Illinois for instructional purposes. In February, 1949, the Business Office was informally advised by a Veterans Administration representative in Washington that no deduction would be made for such funds, but in April, 1949 the Administrator issued decision No. 812 specifically ruling against the inclusion

of these funds in such calculation. This decision was immediately protested since it was the conviction of University officials that the federal funds in question were in the nature of endowment income and were wholly unrelated to payments from the Veterans Administration which under the GI Law are "compensation" for services rendered and were not reimbursement for specific expenditures. Since the majority of the Land-Grant institutions are similarly affected by the ruling, the position taken by the University is now being actively supported by the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities, the National Association of State Universities, and the American Council on Education.

The rate specified in contracts listed above covering the period February 9, 1946, through February 6, 1949, included salaries paid from the federal funds in question. The Veterans Administration has called on the University for a lump-sum credit of a pro rata share of such funds received during each such period, based on the proportion of instruction to veterans to total instruction given. Such a calculation would result in a refund to the Veterans Administration of \$295,117. The General Accounting Office, however, has recently made an examination of the accounts of the University and, based upon a recalculation of the original credit hour rates, has determined a deficiency of \$412,967 instead of \$295,117 for the three years involved. The exclusion of these funds also involves approximately \$94,000 for the current contract year ending February 5, 1950.

The Veterans Administration refused to negotiate a contract with the University for the current contract year ending February, 1950 without excluding such federal funds from the calculated rate. Since the receipt of the major portion of such compensation is essential to the realization of budget income for the current biennium, it was necessary to accept a new contract (V3028-751 listed above) carrying a rate excluding these funds. This contract, however, was executed by the Comptroller under protest, and with the condition that if the final decision was to include these funds the contract rate would be revised accordingly.

At this date the Administrator of Veterans Affairs is being urged to rescind his ruling and allow the inclusion of such funds in these calculations. If this is not accomplished, then either Congress should be requested to revise the governing legislation or the matter should be taken to the courts for adjudication.

In many institutions other more or less serious problems of relationship with the Veterans Administration have arisen. In the University of Illinois, however, relations have been congenial and generally satisfactory, except as to the federal fund problem.

An informal report by the Legal Counsel of the University (November 17, 1949) is attached.

Re: Status of Federal Land-Grant Funds with Respect
to Veterans' Administration Rulings

DEAR PRESIDENT STODDARD:

In reply to your request, following is my opinion with respect to the controversy which has developed between the Land-Grant Colleges and Universities and the Veterans' Administration concerning the status of Federal Funds appropriated by Congress under the Land-Grant Acts.

This opinion deals with the broad issues that have arisen. Voluminous files have accumulated in this and other universities with respect to these issues. Numerous conferences have been held by representatives of the Land-Grant Institutions among themselves and with the Veterans' Administration. I am familiar with the files here and also with the accumulation of information, factual and legal, that has been assembled by Iowa State College and by their counsel, and also with the legislation, with the regulations of the Veterans' Administration and with the legal opinions of its counsel as they pertain to this controversy. I have participated in several conferences with representatives of the Land-Grant Colleges and their counsel. No attempt is here made to restate the extensive factual background or to restate the numerous detailed legal issues which are set forth in the correspondence, memoranda and briefs above referred to.

As I see it, the whole problem heads up in the question should the funds appropriated by Congress to the several states for use by their respective Land-Grant Institutions be included or excluded by Land-Grant Institutions in deter-

mining the rate of compensation payable by the Veterans' Administration to them for the training of veterans?

The Land-Grant Institutions claim that these funds should be included. The Veterans' Administration claims that these funds should be excluded.

Following is a summary of the principal arguments in support of the position of the Land-Grant Institutions.

1. It is conceded by the Veterans' Administration that income derived from private endowment funds and used for the payment of salaries of the instructional staff properly may be included by such institutions in determining the rate of compensation payable by the Veterans' Administration to such institutions for the training of veterans. The origin and history of congressional legislation from 1862 onward with respect to Federal Funds in aid of Land-Grant Institutions stamps these funds essentially as endowment funds such that their treatment should be the same as that accorded to private endowment funds.

2. Land-Grant Funds received by the several states under acts of Congress lose their character and identity as Federal Funds upon appropriation thereof by the states to the several beneficiary institutions, thus making it improper for the Veterans' Administration to take into account the origin thereof.

3. Where the statute provides, as it does in the case under consideration, that if the administrator "finds that the customary tuition charges are insufficient (he) may provide for the payment of such fair and reasonable compensation as will not exceed the estimated costs of teaching personnel and supplies for instruction," the term "cost" as here used should mean "cost" without regard to the source of the funds from which these "costs" are paid.

4. The fact that in calculating the "fair and reasonable compensation" for teaching veterans, costs of physical plant operation, depreciation, libraries, general and administrative expenses and other indirect costs are excluded, is a circumstance which lends strong support to the position that reasonable compensation should, at least, include all teaching costs.

5. The fact that this University and other Land-Grant Institutions have prepared their teaching cost data and budgets on their bona fide construction of the statute and the regulations creates a situation which, in and of itself, makes it unjust to apply a contrary interpretation retroactively.

6. The fact that the Land-Grant Acts do not direct that such funds be spent exclusively for the payment of teaching salaries but permit their use for any maintenance or operating costs directly or indirectly related to the teaching function, confers upon the beneficiary institutions the discretion to use such funds for either or both purposes. If these Federal Funds had been used to meet such maintenance and operational costs, it is our understanding that the administrator would not insist that they be deducted in determining the rate of compensation. The Veterans' Administration, in my opinion, can not legally take advantage of the fortuitous election of a particular institution to use such Federal Funds in the payment of teaching salaries instead of other maintenance and operational costs for to do so would confer upon the Veterans' Administration the power to force an election which the statute confers solely upon the institution concerned.

7. If the Veterans' Administration properly may force an institution to exclude such Federal Funds in its determination of a reasonable compensation, such action could afford a precedent for a similar claim by other Federal agencies that their respective commitments to pay reasonable compensation for various services to be received from universities would be reduced by the amounts received from these Federal Land-Grant Funds.

PLAN FOR ADMINISTERING MEDICAL SOCIAL SERVICE AND SOCIAL CASE WORK

(6) In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on October 25, 1949, I submit, herewith, a report¹ including a plan for administering the Medical Social Service and Social Case Work at the University, as a

solution of the problems raised by the decision of the Superior Court of Cook County in the case of Virginia Kenny.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the President was authorized to put into effect the plan presented, with such modifications as do not interfere with its substance.

PAYMENT OF FEES FOR LEGAL SERVICES

(7) The Board of Trustees has authorized the employment of Snyder, Chadwell, and Fagerburg, attorneys in Chicago, as special counsel for the University in two law suits:

1. The case of Miss Virginia A. Kenny, Medical Social Worker in the Social Service Department of the Research and Educational Hospitals, suing for a writ of mandamus directing the Board of Trustees to restore to her "all her rights, duties, honors, and emoluments as the person in charge of the Social Service Department of the Research and Educational Hospitals of the University of Illinois."

2. The case of Misses Ida E. Blackburn, Theresa G. Heggerty, and Harriet B. Allen, former teachers of children patients in the Research and Educational Hospitals, which positions have been discontinued, seeking a writ of mandamus ordering the restoration of those positions.

The Legal Counsel submits two statements received from this law firm for services to date:

The Legal Counsel recommends payment of these bills. A special appropriation will be required.

I concur.

EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL IN PROCEEDINGS INVOLVING UNIVERSITY'S LIABILITY UNDER ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(8) The University Counsel requests that the Board of Trustees authorize the employment of Craig and Craig, attorneys, Mattoon, Illinois, as special counsel for the University in proceedings instituted by the Leverenz Electric Company, Danville, Illinois, in the Circuit Court of Champaign County, and in such other proceedings as the University may determine are desirable, under a claim for additional payment of approximately \$9,000 on a contract for electrical work in the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building. This dispute has gone through the arbitration procedure provided in the contract, but Legal Counsel for the University recommends against acceptance of the findings of the arbitrators.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was adopted, subject to the approval of the President of the University.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened after luncheon, the same members and officers of the Board and of the University were present as during the morning session; also, on invitation of the Board, the following members of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University: General

Morris, Business Manager, Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., and Administrative Assistant to the President, Dr. Charles D. Tenney, of Southern Illinois University.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR DEAN MIRIAM A. SHELDEN AND APPOINTMENT OF ACTING DEAN OF WOMEN

- (1) On recommendation of the Dean of Students, I have authorized
1. An extension of Dean Miriam A. Sheldon's leave of absence without pay from November 1, 1949, through June 30, 1950;
 2. The appointment of Miss Agnes G. Tandberg, Assistant Dean of Women, as Acting Dean of Women effective November 1, 1949, and continuing to June 30, 1950, inclusive, at an additional salary of \$100 a month for that period.
- Confirmation of these actions is requested.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these actions were confirmed.

SABBATICAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR RAYMOND P. STEARNS

- (2) Professor Raymond P. Stearns of the Department of History was given a sabbatical leave of absence on full pay for the first semester of 1949-1950. He has requested that his leave be changed to sabbatical leave on one-half pay for the full academic year, 1949-1950.

He has found in London, where he is doing research, a mass of material far beyond his previous expectations. In order to make the most of this opportunity, he needs to be there a full year. The courses given by Professor Stearns will be taken over by other members of the department, and one-half of his salary will be released for the employment of such additional staff as may be necessary.

The Head of the Department of History and the Dean of the College recommend approval.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this request was granted.

RESIGNATION OF DEAN JOHN B. YOUMANS

- (3) Dr. John B. Youmans, Professor of Medicine, Dean of the College of Medicine, Medical Director of the Research and Educational Hospitals and of the Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary, has accepted a position as Professor of Medicine and Dean of the School of Medicine at Vanderbilt University. He has submitted his resignation from the University of Illinois faculty and asks to be released as of March 1, 1950.

Vice-President A. C. Ivy and I recommend that his request be granted.

The University is losing an outstanding scholar and medical leader. Dean Youmans's many public and private achievements in medicine in the last two decades have brought him national fame. Vanderbilt University will gain conspicuously in his return to the campus where he had already served with distinction.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this resignation was accepted as recommended, and the President was instructed to convey to Dr. Youmans an expression of the regret of the Board at his leaving and of good wishes for his success and happiness.

APPOINTMENT TO THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY

- (4) The Dean of the College of Pharmacy recommends the appointment of Mr. David D. Stiles, Associate Director of Sales, Abbott Laboratories, North Chicago, Illinois, as a member of the Advisory Committee of that College for a

period of five years (July 1, 1949, to June 30, 1954) to replace Mr. Jack I. Reader, Chicago, whose term has expired.

The other members of the Committee and their terms are Messrs. Charles R. Walgreen, Jr., Chicago, 1948-1950; W. Edwin Brown, Quincy, 1948-1951; Harold A. Wild, Joliet, 1948-1952; and Otto J. Pelikan, Oak Park, 1948-1953. Mr. Henry A. Besser, President of the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association, is a member of the Committee, *ex officio*. The member who is in his last year of tenure serves as Chairman.

Last year the Board of Trustees approved appointments to this Committee for the terms indicated so that thereafter one appointment for a five-year term could be made each year.

I concur and recommend further that Mr. Stiles be also appointed a member of the Citizens Committee of the University of Illinois.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(5) The Governor has approved the following release of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

Release No. 13

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign; Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings.....\$263 500"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,215,000 of which \$880,000 has been budgeted for additions to the power plant at Urbana. The Governor has previously released (Release No. 6) \$85,000 for plans and specifications for this project. The funds now released are for

I recommend that the funds released be appropriated for the purposes specified. The Board has already awarded contracts for the purchase of this equipment.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these funds were appropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Forno, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(6) The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends assignments of funds from the "Reserve for Nonrecurring Purposes" in the budget for 1949-1950 as follows:

1. Remodeling of quarters for Student Counseling Bureau at Chicago Undergraduate Division (Navy Pier).....	\$ 6 500
2. Remodeling and equipment for Department of Bacteriology at Urbana..	50 000

Requests for these assignments of funds have been carefully studied by the Urbana-Champaign Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations. Reports of the Committee, giving details on each item, are submitted herewith.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

PURCHASE OF LAND IN CHICAGO

(7) The area selected as a site for the Medical Center Steam Company plant is south of Taylor Street between Hermitage Avenue and Paulina Street, Chicago. The Medical Center Commission has already acquired certain properties in this area and will acquire additional parcels. The estimated acquisition cost to the Commission is approximately \$200,000. Other parcels in this area have already been purchased by the University.

On June 25, 1949 (Minutes, page 403), the Board of Trustees authorized Vice-President Ivy to negotiate with the Medical Center Commission for the property required for the steam plant. The Commission has adopted a resolution approving the sale to the University of the land it needs for the token amount of \$1,000. Doctor Ivy recommends that the expenditure of \$1,000 for this property be approved.

I concur in this recommendation, the payment to be made from funds received from the sale of land to the Medical Center Steam Company.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this purchase of land was authorized; the appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACT FOR ALTERATIONS IN ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM IN THE RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$3,557.07 to the Block Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for alterations in the electrical distribution system in the general hospital (Building 911) of the Research and Educational Hospitals. The work will consist of replacing two of five panels and is part of the plan of modernization recommended by Holabird and Root and Burgee.

Funds have been budgeted for this purpose.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

CONTRACT FOR ALTERATIONS OF EMERGENCY AND EXIT LIGHTING SYSTEMS IN THE NURSES HOME

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,709 to Henry Newgard and Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for alterations of the existing emergency and exit lighting systems in the Nurses Home (Building 914) of the Research and Educational Hospitals. This is part of the plan of modernization recommended by Holabird and Root and Burgee.

Funds have been budgeted for this improvement.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these recommendations were adopted.

**CONTRACT FOR FIRE ALARM SYSTEM IN CHICAGO
ILLINI UNION BUILDING**

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$6,531 to the B-H Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of a fire alarm system in the Chicago Illini Union Building to comply with the Chicago Municipal Code.

Funds have been budgeted for this work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were adopted.

**CONTRACT FOR REPLACEMENT OF WINDOW FRAMES AND
INSTALLATION OF SAFETY DEVICES FOR WINDOW
WASHERS IN BUILDINGS OF THE CHICAGO
PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES**

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$12,873 to the Federal Remodeling and Building Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for (1) replacement of window frames and installation of window washer bolts on the south wing of the Chicago Illini Union and (2) replacement of leaded windows with wood casement sash in the general hospital of the Research and Educational Hospitals.

Replacement of the window frames in the Union Building is necessary because of deterioration. Installation of wood casement sash to replace existing fixed leaded windows in the Research and Educational Hospitals is requested because window washing at present is extremely difficult.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant Operation and Maintenance budget.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted.

**CONTRACT FOR REMODELING IN ILLINOIS
NEUROPSYCHIATRIC INSTITUTE**

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$3,996 to C. W. Haynes Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for remodeling on the eighth floor of the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute.

The work includes construction of partitions, and changes incidental thereto, to make a women's open psychiatric ward into a combination men's and women's open psychiatric ward. This is proposed by Director Fred Hoehler of the Department of Public Welfare and Vice-President A. C. Ivy and is consistent with the agreement between the University of Illinois and the Department for the operation of the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute whereby the University performs all maintenance and operation work of this kind and bills the Department of Public Welfare for the cost plus 10 per cent for overhead.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

**APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR SAFETY
IMPROVEMENTS IN NOYES CHEMISTRY LABORATORY**

(13) A serious fire and safety hazard exists in the Noyes Laboratory of Chemistry. The internal construction of the west wing, built in 1901-1902, is of heavy timber framing except the third floor ceiling and attic which are of ordinary joist construction. This section of the building is serviced only by one large, non-fireproof open central stairway, the space below being used for storage.

On January 13, 1949 (Minutes, page 204), the Board of Trustees appropriated \$50,000 for safety improvements in the Noyes Laboratory, including construction of additional exits in certain laboratories, emergency showers and corrections in ventilating hoods. Part of the funds was used for preparation of plans and specifications for the construction of enclosed stair towers. Bids received on the construction of two new fireproof stairways at the northwest and

southwest entrances of the building indicate that this phase of the safety improvements can be completed for \$150,000.

The State appropriations for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements at the University include an item "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings," \$1,215,000, of which \$880,000 has been budgeted for additions to the power and heating plant and \$420,000 for remodeling of existing buildings. The improvements in Noyes Laboratory have a high priority among remodeling projects.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that \$150,000 of this State appropriation be assigned for remodeling of existing buildings, including the improvements in the Noyes Laboratory, and that contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders as follows:

Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company, Champaign....\$10 350

This contract does not cover removal of the present central stairway and construction of floors over the stair well, a separate contract for which will be recommended later. This job is included in the estimated budget of \$150,000.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts subject to the release of funds for this work by the Governor.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted.

**CONTRACT FOR PARKING LOT TO SERVE STUDENT
AND STAFF APARTMENTS**

(14) It was not practicable to provide automobile parking space adjacent to the student and staff apartments on Goodwin Avenue and Green Street. However, the committee on parking has included this area in its recommendations for additional facilities. Ground is available nearby on University property at 1106 and 1108 West Green Street.

Bids have been taken on the construction of a parking lot with a rock base and a penetration binder for fifty-four cars at 1106 West Green Street.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to the Champaign Asphalt Company, the lowest bidder, for \$3,500. The cost of this work can be charged against funds available for the construction of the student and staff apartments.

I recommend construction of this parking lot and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these recommendations were adopted.

CONTRACTS FOR REPAIR WORK ON ALLERTON FARMS

(15) Grain storage space has been at a premium this fall. In anticipation of this situation, the 1948 corn crop was cleared out of the cribs on the Allerton Farms. When the cribs were empty, it was found that repairs would be necessary but the extent of the work could not be determined until it was started, i.e., floor boards taken up and siding removed.

Harold Hammerschmidt, Monticello, who had previously done work for the University at Allerton Park, had a crew of men available to start the work and complete it by harvest time. Mr. Hammerschmidt offered to do the work on a time and material basis as follows:

The repair job was done on this basis and the total cost is now estimated as follows:

All costs are subject to audit, and payments will be made on the basis of audited costs.

Funds are available from the farm operations income.

The contract with Mr. Hammerschmidt has been approved by Dean Rusk, has been checked and endorsed by the Legal Counsel and the Director of Non-academic Personnel, and is submitted by the Comptroller.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this work was approved.

CONTRACT FOR REMODELING IN GEORGE HUFF GYMNASIUM

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$1,890 to E. N. DeAtley, Champaign, the lowest bidder, for the general work in remodeling of space (Room 212) in the George Huff Gymnasium to provide quarters for the work in physical fitness.

There is submitted separately a recommendation that a special appropriation of \$2,250 be made for this work. I concur and recommend that the Secretary of the Board and the Comptroller be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

CHANGE IN CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ANIMAL QUARTERS FOR DEPARTMENT OF PHYSIOLOGY

(17) A contract for the construction (general work) of animal holding quarters for the Department of Physiology was awarded to Lewis S. Colbert, Champaign, on a cost plus fee basis, under the terms of his standing contract for the year ending June 30, 1949, for minor improvements. The preliminary estimate of cost was \$4,700 but the present estimate will exceed this by \$1,525. Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget.

The Department of Physiology has also requested some additional work (more cages and concrete runways) on these animal quarters, not specified in the original plans. The estimated cost is \$4,200 of which \$1,800 can be supplied by the Physical Plant Department. There is before the Board a separate recommendation for a supplementary appropriation of \$2,400 to the Department of Physiology. It is estimated that the work to be done by the general contractor on this additional construction will cost \$1,250.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend approval of additions to the contract with Lewis S. Colbert of \$1,525 to cover the excess over estimated cost, and \$1,250 to cover the additional work requested by the Department of Physiology. There have been no previous change orders on this project recommended to the Board.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute these contract additions.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this recommendation was adopted.

ADDITION TO LANDSCAPING CONTRACT FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL HOUSING RESEARCH PROJECT

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$3,579.65 in the contract with Grundstrom Company, Inc., Glenview, Illinois, for the landscaping of the Small Homes Council Housing Research

Project area at Race Street and Florida Avenue to include the following additional planting:

Rosa Multiflora hedge, double row, approximately 1,790 lineal feet, along the south and west border of the area.....	\$1 360 40
Additional lawn seeding between this hedge and rear property lines of houses, covering approximately 4.63 acres.....	2 219 25
<i>Total</i>	\$3 579 65

The original plans provided for the erection of a wire fence along these area borders but the hedge is recommended because it will cost less and will add to the appearance of the area. It will serve as a screen and a barrier between the housing area and the horticulture experimental plots.

The additional lawn seeding was not included in the original specifications as the area involved was not originally included in the property lines assigned for individual use of the occupants of the houses. When the specifications were drawn the exact use of this area was not determined and later it was decided to develop it as a lawn.

Funds are available in the appropriation for this project.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the landscaping contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

DISCONTINUANCE OF ALHAMBRA CROP EXPERIMENT FIELD

(19) On July 17, 1917 (Minutes, page 418), the Board of Trustees accepted an experimental field of approximately forty acres at Alhambra, Illinois, described as "East one-half of the south one-half of the southeast quarter of section 14, township 5 north, range 6 west of the third principal meridian."

The field was donated by Adolph Hitz with the provision that if the University of Illinois discontinues the use of the land for agricultural experimentation and demonstration for a period of more than two consecutive years, the title to the land shall revert to the donor, or to his heirs or assigns.

The University has developed the Brownstown Experiment Field in Fayette County as a "Crops Center" for the breeding, evaluating, increasing, and distribution of crops particularly well adapted to the area. The Brownstown field is more desirable than the Alhambra field because: (1) soil type at Brownstown is representative of a larger area of Illinois than that at Alhambra; (2) the large number of "slick" spots¹ on the Alhambra field and their random occurrence lowers the reliability of crop tests made there; (3) the distance from the central station at Urbana makes Brownstown more readily accessible than Alhambra.

The Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Head of the Department of Agronomy recommend that in the interests of economy in carrying on crop experimental work and in view of the enlarged program contemplated on the Brownstown field, the Alhambra Crop Experiment Field be discontinued, beginning with the seeding of wheat this fall.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the necessary papers to effect the transfer of the title to the Alhambra field to the estate of Adolph Hitz.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR FIRE PROTECTION IMPROVEMENTS

(24) The proposed fire protection improvement program includes the installation of fire alarm evacuation signals and controls in (1) permanent housing units, (2) secondary schools, and (3) hospitals.

To carry out this program, installations will be required in the University High School, Illini Union, University Club, Men's Residence Halls, and McKinley Hospital.

The first step in the program is the preparation of plans and specifications and securing of accurate estimates. To accomplish this, additional engineering services are required.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the employment of Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White, who have designed the fire alarm telegraph system on the campus, on the basis of actual cost of labor and blueprints, plus 100 per cent, plus travel expense if such is necessary.

The total cost of the engineering services on the above projects is estimated at approximately \$4,800, of which the proportionate share on self-supporting buildings will be financed from their income, and other projects from Physical Plant operating appropriations.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the above contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this recommendation was adopted.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

January 12, 1950



The January meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, January 12, 1950, at Hotel LaSalle, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

2 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins.

President George D. Stoddard was present; also Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Treasurer I. L. Porter, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Business Manager H. A. Hazleton, and, during the open session, Director J. F. Wright.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of September 29, October 25, and November 29, 1949.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 809 to 962 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR LAND ACQUISITION

(1) Future development of the University, both at Urbana-Champaign and at the Chicago Professional Colleges, necessitates acquisition of additional land. The Board of Trustees has already approved (Minutes, July 28, 1943, page 450) the acquisition of a specified area in Chicago. The Building Program Committee has recommended, with respect to Urbana-Champaign, that land in the area of contemplated development be acquired, when necessary, to prevent anticipated commercial development, or when property becomes available at attractive prices; that land be acquired, whenever possible, before its need by the University is made known publicly; and that land for all projects be acquired not later than the biennium preceding anticipated construction.¹

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that these acquisitions be authorized. I concur in the general program proposed and recommend that authority be given to negotiate for the purchase of desirable properties at prices based on independent appraisals, to secure options where necessary, and to submit proposed purchase contracts to the Board. It is understood that all commitments will be subject to release of funds by the Governor.

The Provost and the Comptroller commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as recommended.

RELEASES OF POTENTIALLY PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(2) The Department of Chemistry has reported potentially patentable discoveries made in the course of research work described as follows:

1. A discovery by Assistant Professor Robert L. Frank concerning the preparation and properties of metallic complexes of 2,5-dihydroxy-1,4-benzoquinone and its 3,6-disubstituted analogs, especially 3,6-diphenyl-2,5-dihydroxy-1,4-benzoquinone. Such compounds from insoluble coordinated complexes with a large variety of cations (examples are the ions of silver, mercury, magnesium, calcium, strontium, barium, copper, cadmium, zinc, aluminum, tin, arsenic, bismuth, iron, nickel, thorium, and uranium).

The insolubility of most of the complexes may make the reaction useful in the removal or separation of cations from solutions and also in the qualitative and quantitative analysis of such cations. Furthermore, some of the complexes themselves may have applications as pigments, stabilizers for plastics or petroleum products, fungicides, or as carriers of metals in certain drug applications.

2. In his researches on restricted rotation, Professor Roger Adams observed that certain *p*-phenylene diamine derivatives were readily oxidized to *p*-quinone diimides. Since this latter class of compounds is new and relatively simple in character, Professor Adams suggests that the University may wish to consider patenting them. To cover these adequately, the *p*-quinone di- and mono-imides, analogous substances in the naphthalene series and in the biphenyl series, probably would require about six patent applications.

The *p*-quinone diimides are of interest scientifically because, unlike the parent compounds, *p*-quinone monoimine and diimine, they are stable. Only in very complex molecules has the *p*-quinone diimine linkage been previously found to have stability. The rather simple derivatives described are yellow solids, which show no tendency to decompose. They are interesting because they should have reactions similar to *p*-quinones, a class of compounds very useful in the synthesis of many types of organic molecules.

To explore the potentialities of *p*-quinone diimides will require several years. Professor Adams is prepared to publish a report of this discovery, but before doing so he wishes to consider patenting this class of compounds as protection

against industrial laboratories noting what has been done and exploiting the scientific significance of this discovery, unless the University desires to patent them.

In the opinion of the Chairman of the University Research Board and his expert adviser on these particular cases, it is extremely unlikely that the discoveries would have any commercial value in themselves. Unless the University could follow an all-out patent program with promotion and development, the expense and work involved in patenting the discoveries would not be justified. The Chairman of the University Research Board recommends that these discoveries be released to the discoverers.

The Department of Electrical Engineering reports an invention by Paul M. Kintner, Instructor in Electrical Engineering, of a specialized oscilloscope intended for the study of low-frequency alternating current circuits. While this instrument may be useful in student laboratories, the likelihood that a patent covering these devices can be secured is very small in view of the amount of prior work done in this field. The practical significance of this invention appears to be small. The Chairman of the University Research Board therefore recommends release of this discovery to the inventor.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, these releases were authorized as recommended.

APPRECIATION OF ROGER ADAMS

President Stoddard called attention to the election of Professor Roger Adams to be President of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1950. This is the largest organization of scientists in the world, and the election is a merited recognition of the eminent scientific attainments of Dr. Adams.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the Secretary was directed to make record of the Board's appreciation of the attainments of Dr. Adams, and to prepare a copy for presentation to him.

STATUS OF APPLICATION FOR PATENT ON ELECTROSTATIC STORAGE SYSTEM FOR HIGH-SPEED COMPUTERS

(3) At its meeting on January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 955), the Board authorized the filing of a patent application covering an invention by Professor Arthur L. Samuel of an electrostatic storage device for use in connection with high-speed computers.

The University's patent attorney has discovered a possible interference with this patent. In the meantime, Professor Samuel has left the University and developments in computer work during the past two years indicate that the Samuel invention will have far less significance than was thought at first. Therefore, the Chairman of the University Research Board recommends that the University do not prosecute an application for this patent.

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this recommendation was adopted.

STATE APPROPRIATION FOR AGRICULTURAL STRUCTURES AND REMODELING PRESENT AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS

(4) The State appropriations to the University for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements include \$305,000 for "Construction of Agricultural Structures and Remodeling Present Agricultural Buildings."

The Building Committee of the College of Agriculture has recommended that this appropriation be allocated for the following improvements:

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this matter was referred to the Committee on Agriculture for consideration and report.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF HOUSING FOR MARRIED STUDENTS AND STAFF, URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(5) The Federal Housing Act of 1949 provides for certain assistance by the Federal Government to local housing agencies in the redevelopment of land and construction of low cost public housing facilities. The University of Illinois needs additional housing facilities for married students and junior staff members of the character proposed by the Housing Act and it needs to eliminate as rapidly as feasible the temporary housing facilities now in use.

A program is recommended (see attached memorandum) which proposes the following:

1. The University shall purchase land and convey it to the Champaign County Housing Authority.

2. The Champaign County Housing Authority shall borrow funds under the provisions of the Federal Housing Act and construct an apartment building of ninety-five units, such building to be similar to that now under construction on the Urbana campus but with sufficient reduction in cost to bring the cost within the limitations of the Housing Act.

3. The Champaign County Housing Authority will lease the building when completed to the University for a fixed annual rental adequate to pay the annual debt service on the obligation.

4. When the debt has been paid, the Champaign County Housing Authority will reconvey the land and improvements to the University.

This program represents a possible way in which the University can participate in the benefits proposed under the Federal Housing Act of 1949. I recommend that I be authorized to submit this program to the Champaign County Housing Authority and endeavor to secure its acceptance. It is understood that any final program would be submitted to the Board of Trustees for their consideration and further notice.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, authority was granted as recommended.

CHICAGO HOUSING PROJECTS

(6) The Comptroller presents a review of recent estimates of cost secured on the proposed student residence hall and staff apartment building at the Medical Center, and reports from the Equitable Life Assurance Society as to the maximum loan that could be secured. The reports show that the estimated costs exceed the maximum that can be borrowed.

Mr. Livingston and Dr. Ivy made statements on this matter.

Mr. Amos Watts, of the firm of Chapman and Cutler, commented on this matter, with special reference to the requirements of equity and income necessary to support a marketable bond issue.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Fornof, this matter was referred to the Committee on Chicago Departments, for inquiry into and study of all phases of the proposal. It was the consensus of the Board that the employment of special counsel should be continued, and that funds already appropriated for this project (\$50,000, for the purchase of land, July 21, 1948, page 7), should be used for the preparation of plans and specifications, if approved by the Committee.

OPEN SESSION

After luncheon, at 2 p.m., the Board convened in open session. Mr. Fred H. Ebersold, President of the Alumni Association, was present on invitation of President Williamson.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. STEPHEN B. BINKLEY, Associate Professor of Biological Chemistry, beginning November 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.
2. WALKER BLEAKNEY, Visiting Professor of Physics, beginning September 16, 1949, at an annual salary of \$7,500.
3. ALOYSIUS W. BUREK, Assistant Professor of Hygiene, beginning January 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$7,000.
4. RUDOLF CARNAP, Visiting Professor of Philosophy, beginning February 14, 1950, at an annual salary of \$12,000.
5. ALBERT W. HEYER, JR., Assistant Professor of Psychology, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$4,500.
6. ALMA E. HILLER, Associate Professor of Biological Chemistry, beginning December 1, 1949, without salary.
7. CARL A. JOHNSON, Assistant Professor of Clinical Science, beginning February 1, 1950, without salary.
8. F. R. METZGER, Assistant Professor of Physics, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$4,500.
9. JOHN P. NASH, Research Assistant Professor of Applied Mathematics, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$7,200.
10. EDWARD H. TYNER, Professor of Soil Fertility, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$6,400.
11. GILBERT WATERHOUSE, Exchange Professor of German, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$6,300.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these appointments were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CONSULTANT ON CAMPUS PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

(1) I recommend that the firm of Gregg and Briggs, Architects and Engineers, Chicago and Peoria, Illinois, be employed as consultant to the University on campus planning and development. The services would include the following features:

1. To make campus studies, plans, and models looking to the future development of the campus at Urbana-Champaign;
2. To advise the Building Program Committee in relation to the design and placement of new buildings, including housing;
3. To serve as a consultant on the major remodeling and reconstruction of campus buildings;

4. To relate the campus plan, as a whole, to the community development plan in which the University has been participating;

5. Mr. Cecil C. Briggs, partner in the firm, who has been serving as Visiting Professor of Architecture on one-half time since September, 1948, to continue his teaching service as part of this assignment.

I further recommend that this employment be effective as of January 1, 1950, and that the combined consultant's fee for the services for the calendar year 1950 be \$19,800, this to include the salary of Professor Briggs as half-time professor at his present rate of \$4,800.

An appropriation of \$15,000 is required.

This proposal is not without well-established precedent in this University and in other institutions of higher education. In past years the University of Illinois has had the benefit of advice and cooperation from several distinguished architects, among them Clarence H. Blackall of Boston, of the Class of 1877; W. Carby Zimmerman, who was State Architect from 1905-1913; Daniel H. Burham, the father of the Chicago City Plan; Holabird and Roche of Chicago; Charles A. Platt of New York; Howard L. Cheney (Consulting Architect for the Illini Union Building). More recently we have had a Consultative Committee on Architecture (Messrs. Howard L. Cheney, Chicago; J. Robert F. Swanson, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan; George L. Horner, State University of Iowa; and Chance S. Hill, Oak Park, Illinois).

We have already used Mr. Briggs as a consultant on a temporary basis in connection with the design of the Veterinary Medicine and Animal Science Buildings. As a result we achieved some substantial savings in costs without a diminution in building function.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTOR OF INSTITUTE OF GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

(2) Professor Charles M. Kneier, Chairman of the Department of Political Science, has also been serving as Acting Director of the Institute of Government and Public Affairs since September 1, 1948. He accepted this administrative assignment on an acting basis, with the understanding that he would be relieved when a permanent Director is appointed.

I recommend the appointment of Dr. Royden Dangerfield, now Director of Studies at the National War College and on leave of absence as Professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin, as Professor of Political Science and Director of the Institute of Government and Public Affairs, at an annual salary of \$10,000 on a Y basis (twelve months' service with one month's vacation) effective August 1, 1950.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

(3) Professor Paul N. Landis who has been serving as Acting Head of the Department of English since February 1, 1949, and who previously served as Vice-Chairman for a year and a half, has asked to be relieved of this administrative assignment, effective July 1, 1950, in order to return to full-time undergraduate teaching.

I recommend that his request be granted. Also I take this occasion to express my warm appreciation of his services.

The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Dr. Gordon Ray, who has been Professor of English since September 1, 1946, as Professor and Head of the Department of English on indefinite tenure, effective July 1, 1950, at a salary of \$8,500 an academic year.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, Professor Landis was relieved of his administrative duties, Professor Ray was appointed as recommended, and the Secretary was directed to inform Professor Landis of the Board's appreciation of his services.

CHANGE IN THE ORGANIZATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS

(4) The Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration reports that the members of the faculty of the Department of Economics, now organized with a head, have voted in favor of changing the organization of the department to one with a chairman. The Dean recommends that this change be made. I concur.

The Executive Committee of the Department and the Dean of the College recommend the appointment of Dr. Everett E. Hagen, now Professor of Economics, as Professor of Economics on indefinite tenure and Chairman of the Department until August 31, 1951, at an annual salary of \$11,000 for twelve months' service including one month's vacation, effective January 1, 1950.

They also recommend the appointment of Dr. Paul M. Van Arsdell, now Professor of Economics and Administrative Assistant to the Head of the Department, as Professor of Economics on indefinite tenure on one-half time, and Vice-Chairman of the Department of Economics until August 31, 1951, on one-half time, at a salary of \$7,500, effective January 1, 1950, services as Professor on one-half time to be required during the two semesters of the academic year beginning in September and ending in June and services as Vice-Chairman to be required on a twelve months' basis including one month's vacation.

I recommend that these appointments be made.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were adopted.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(5) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the following persons be awarded the certificate of Certified Public Accountant under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943; they hold valid and unrevoked certificates issued by other states of the United States:

VETERINARY MEDICINE BUILDING

(6) The Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine recommends that the new building to be constructed for that College be officially named Veterinary Medicine.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this building was named as recommended.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(7) The Governor has approved the following release of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

Release No. 14

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign

Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings".....\$150 000

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,215,000 of which \$880,000 has been budgeted for additions to the power plant and \$263,500 for remodeling of

existing buildings, of which \$137,465 has been earmarked for safety improvements in the Noyes Laboratory of Chemistry. The funds now released are for the construction of new stairways at the northwest and southwest entrances to the building, contracts for which were awarded by the Board of Trustees on November 29, 1949.

Release No. 15

"For Permanent Improvements at Chicago

Construction of Addition to Present Hospital".....\$5 804 110

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$7,395,000. The Governor has previously released (Release No. 8) \$246,000 for architectural and engineering services for this project. The funds now released are for:

APPROPRIATION FOR GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS FOR 1950-1951

(9) The Dean of the Graduate College recommends that an appropriation of \$150,000 be made at this time for graduate fellowships for the year 1950-1951. The same amount was appropriated for the current academic year and is included in the preliminary budget estimates for next year. It is desirable that funds be committed now so that fellowship awards can be made and announced on April 1, 1950.

I concur.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR ADVANCE PLANNING

(10) Public Law 352 enacted by the Eighty-first Congress provides additional funds to be loaned by the federal government to states and their political subdivisions to complete the plan preparation of public works. This is similar to a previous program under which the University received advances of funds for the plan preparation for the student and staff apartment building and the hospital addition at Urbana and the student residence halls and nurses home in Chicago.

The new law provides that the federal government will advance 25 per cent of the agreed sum and the remainder of the costs will be paid when the plans have been completed and approved by the Community Facilities Service of the General Services Administration. The monies advanced by the federal government for any project must be repaid without interest whenever funds become available for the construction of that project. If it is not started within three years and the funds advanced by the federal government have not been repaid within this period, the University will not be eligible to apply for loans or advances on any other public works under the provisions of this law.

The Building Program Committee recommends that the University apply for advances for the preparation of plans for the following buildings:

**PROFESSIONAL WORK EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENTS IN
UNIVERSITY CURRICULA**

(11) The University Senate recognizes that it may be desirable for students to gain practical experience in their professional fields while pursuing certain programs of study in the University and that they may be strongly advised to do so. In general, such programs should be established and monitored by the licensing agencies or the professional associations concerned rather than by the University. Since, however, some programs of this type are or may be required by the University, the University Senate recommends adoption of the following policy:

1. The term "professional work experience" is defined as a term of service, usually away from the campus, in the vocational or professional field for which a student is preparing himself in a program of studies leading to a degree.

2. A professional work experience program may be made a requirement for a degree if the program is under the general supervision of the University.

3. Excepting regularly approved academic credit courses which may require field experience as a part of the laboratory work for credit, no formal academic credit will be granted for professional work experience.

4. In cases where the requirement for professional work experience is met by work done for the University, the University may pay for such work only when it would otherwise have to be done by an employee of the University and is not organized solely to provide such experience for the student.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this policy was adopted.

**CONTRACT FOR EQUIPMENT FOR ADDITION TO RESEARCH
AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS IN CHICAGO**

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$189,138.83 to the Laboratory Furniture Company, Long Island City, New York, the lowest bidder, for the laboratory installations in the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals in Chicago. Detailed plans and specifications based on the recommendations of the academic departments concerned were prepared by the Physical Plant Department and bids were invited by the Purchasing Division of the Chicago Business Office.

Funds are available for this work in the State appropriation to the University for 1949-1951 for "Construction of Addition to Present Hospital."

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract subject to release of funds by the Governor.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR STRUCTURAL STEEL FOR POWER PLANT ADDITION

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$6,094 to Hansell-Elcock Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the structural steel for the turbine room addition of the Abbott Power Plant at Urbana-Champaign, subject to the release of funds by the Governor. Funds are available in the State appropriation for 1949-1951 for "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings."

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR EXTENSION OF STEAM SERVICE IN
STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS AREA**

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$16,479 to the Northwestern Heating and Plumbing Company, Evanston, Illinois, the lowest bidder, for the extension of steam service from the southwest corner of the first six-story building of the Student and Staff Apartments on Goodwin Avenue and Green Street to the second six-story building now under construction. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR DRY CLEANING SERVICE FOR STUDENTS IN
UNIVERSITY RESIDENCE HALLS**

(15) It has become desirable to provide a central procedure for dry cleaning service for men living in University residence halls at Urbana-Champaign. It may be desirable later to provide a similar service in women's halls. It would be operated as a part of the "canteen" service established in some of the residence halls. A contract would be made with one company for all such service, handled through the canteen, and all pick-ups and deliveries would be made from a central point in the halls. The hall management would supervise the collection of accounts and the payments to the contracting company. This service would not prevent any resident in the halls from having his dry cleaning done by another service.

The Purchasing Division invited bids on this service from all local cleaners. Six bids were secured, and the best proposal is offered by William and Earnest Beightler, a partnership operating as "Chief Illini Cleaners." The schedule gives the lowest rates for individual items and a discount of 20 per cent for women's work and 25 per cent for men's work. This discount would be retained to cover the administrative cost of handling the centralized service, except that 5 per cent would be paid to the student organization in the halls for its social programs. The students would benefit by the lower schedule of rates.

The Director of Housing, the Director of Purchases, and the Comptroller recommend that a contract be made with the "Chief Illini Cleaners" on the basis of their bid to provide service in the Men's Residence Halls and that the contract be extended to include the Women's Residence Halls if that becomes desirable. All financial obligation assumed by the University is covered by collections to be made from students, including the overhead expense.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was awarded as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR REMODELING IN MEDICAL AND
DENTAL COLLEGE LABORATORIES BUILDING**

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,696 to the Mutual Contracting Company, Chicago, Illinois, the lowest bidder, for remodeling of Room 166 in the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building. The work required consists of the construction of glass partitions, installation of lighting fixtures, and incidental changes to provide additional needed office space.

Funds are available in the special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this on October 25, 1949 (Minutes, page 922).

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Forno, authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF FIRE PUMP IN
CHICAGO ILLINI UNION**

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract in the amount of \$15,680 to the Economy Plumbing and Heating Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of a fire pump in the Chicago Illini Union Building.

The work required consists of furnishing and installing a 500 gallon per minute fire pump with all necessary pipes from city water main and to existing standpipe system with the necessary electrical work as required to operate the pump as prescribed by code. Also the installation of a sprinkler system as requested by the Chicago Fire Prevention Bureau of the Chicago Fire Department in the room used for lumber storage.

Funds are available in the budget of the Physical Plant Department for this work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,066.20 in the contract with the Leverenz Electric Company for the electrical work in the construction of the East Chemistry Building. This increase is to provide for the furnishing and installation of electrical outlets and connecting machinery in Rooms 19 and 23.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Acquisition and Installation of Chemistry Building Equipment."

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, authority was given as recommended.

GIFT FROM THE CHAMPAIGN-URBANA KIWANIS CLUB AND ALPHA GAMMA DELTA SORORITY

(19) The Kiwanis Club and the alumnae chapter of the Alpha Gamma Delta Sorority in Champaign-Urbana have turned over to the University \$2,033.72 representing the proceeds of a dance to raise funds to aid Dr. Severina Nelson, Associate Professor of Speech and Director of the Speech Clinic, in her work with children suffering from cerebral palsy. The fund has been accepted by the University and has been made available for the purpose indicated.

I am happy to report this generous contribution of the Champaign-Urbana Kiwanis Club and the Alpha Gamma Delta Sorority.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR ADVANCE PLANNING

Resolution Authorizing Filing of Application with the United States of America for an Advance to Provide for the Advance Planning of Non-Federal Public Works under the Terms of Public Law 352, Eighty-first Congress of the United States, Approved October 13, 1949

WHEREAS, the University of Illinois, herein called the "Applicant," after thorough consideration of the various aspects of the problem and study of available data has hereby determined that the construction of certain public works, generally described as the Biology Building, Pharmacy Building, Student and Staff Housing, Law Building, Psycho-Educational Clinic, and the Physics Building addition, are desirable and in the public interest and to that end it is necessary that action preliminary to the construction of said works be taken immediately; and

WHEREAS, under the terms of Public Law 352, Eighty-first Congress, approved October 13, 1949, the United States of America has authorized the making of advances to public bodies to aid in defraying the cost of architectural, engineering, and economic investigations and studies, surveys, designs, plans, working drawings, specifications, procedures and other action preliminary to the construction of public works (exclusive of housing); and

WHEREAS, the Applicant has examined and duly considered such act and the Applicant considers it to be in the public interest and to its benefit to file an application under said Act and to authorize other action in connection therewith;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees, the governing body of said applicant, as follows:

1. That the construction of said public works is essential to and is to the best interests of the Applicant, and to the end that such public works may be provided as promptly as practicable, it is desirable that action preliminary to the construction thereof be undertaken immediately;

2. That Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, be hereby authorized to file in behalf of the Applicant an application (in form required by the United States and in conformity with said Act) for an advance to be made by the United States to the

Applicant to aid in defraying the planning cost preliminary to the construction of such public works, which shall consist generally of University Buildings for instruction, research, and housing;

3. That if such advance be made the Applicant shall provide or make necessary arrangements to provide such funds, in addition to the advance, as may be required to defray the cost of such action preliminary to the construction of the public works;

4. The said representative is hereby authorized to furnish such information and take such other action as may be necessary to enable the Applicant to qualify for the advance;

5. That the officer designated in the preceding paragraph is hereby designated as the authorized representative of the Applicant for the purpose of furnishing to the United States such information, data, and documents pertaining to the application for an advance as may be required; and otherwise to act as the authorized representative of the Applicant in connection with this application;

6. That certified copies of this Resolution be included as part of the application for an advance to be submitted to the United States.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

February 16, 1950



The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, February 16, 1950, in the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2:00 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also, Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, and, during the open session, Director of Public Information J. F. Wright, Assistant to the President Wilbur Schramm, Professor R. B. Hudson.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of January 12, 1950.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 963 to 986 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

DEAN OF THE DIVISION OF COMMUNICATIONS

(1) I recommend that there be established, as of July 1, 1950, a Division of Communications to be headed by a dean.

The Division of Communications would include communications responsibilities in the following areas and units as indicated:

1. University Press — supervisory
2. School of Journalism and Communications, as reorganized — supervisory
3. Broadcasting — supervisory
4. Institute of Communications, as reorganized — supervisory
5. Visual communications, as reorganized — supervisory
6. Library School — supervisory
7. Athletic Association — supervisory in communications only
8. University of Illinois Foundation Illini Achievement Fund — supervisory
9. Alumni Association — supervisory
10. Public Information — supervisory
11. Allerton Park — supervisory

The purpose of this new administrative cluster is to increase the efficiency of the President's Office. The main administrative work of the University is carried on through structures headed, for the most part, by deans who are responsible to the Provost and the President. However, with respect to certain enterprises of great importance, such as those listed above, I have not had the benefit of guidance and assistance from the office of a dean. The plan does not involve changes in operations except that some reorganization may be desirable as indicated above.

For the position of Dean of Communications, I recommend the appointment of Dr. Wilbur Schramm, and further that he retain the appointment as Director of the University Press and as Research Professor of Journalism at a total salary of \$13,000, on a twelve months' basis, for a term of two years beginning July 1, 1950.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, the Division of Communications was established and Dr. Schramm was appointed Dean, as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF THE DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE AND DIRECTOR OF THE RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(2) Following the resignation of Dean John B. Youmans, I appointed a Committee of the Faculty of the College of Medicine to assist in the selection of his successor. The Committee went to work immediately and secured from members of the faculty and from outside sources names and personal data on a number of qualified candidates. As a result of its study the Committee reached the conclusion that one candidate on this list was so outstanding that prompt action should be taken to ascertain his availability.

Accordingly, on February 1, 1950, Vice-President A. C. Ivy and I met with the Chairman of the Committee. On February 2 the Committee met and unanimously decided upon its first choice among the candidates. Subsequently a meeting of the Executive Faculty of the College of Medicine was called and the report of the Committee on the Deanship was reviewed in detail. The result of the meeting was an unanimous approval by the Executive Faculty of the report of the Committee on the Deanship and concurrence in its final recommendation.

Finally, the Vice-President, the Provost, and I have personally conferred with the candidate and he has met with various members of the faculty, both in the Chicago Professional Colleges and at Urbana-Champaign.

Accordingly, I now recommend the appointment of Dr. Stanley W. Olson, presently Assistant Director of the Mayo Foundation, as Dean of the College of Medicine and Medical Director of the Research and Educational Hospitals, with the rank of Professor, at an annual salary of \$15,000, on Y basis, for two years from April 1, 1950.

Dr. Ivy, Provost Griffith, and President Stoddard commented.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was made as recommended.

**APPOINTMENTS OF DIRECTOR AND ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS-COOK COUNTY
SCHOOL OF NURSING**

(3) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommends the appointments of Miss E. Elizabeth Geiger, as Director of the University of Illinois-Cook County School of Nursing and Assistant Professor of Nursing Education, without salary, and Mrs. Evelyn M. Brown, as Associate Director in Charge of Nursing Education of the University of Illinois-Cook County School of Nursing and Assistant Professor of Nursing Education, without salary, effective February 1, 1950, and continuing through August 31, 1950. (Their salaries will be paid by the Cook County Hospital.)

I concur.

Dr. Ivy commented on these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appointments were made as recommended.

**EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL FOR SUIT
IN THE COURT OF CLAIMS**

(4) The Attorney General of Illinois reports that there has been filed in the Court of Claims the case of Jessie Taylor versus the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. The Attorney General suggests that the University take over the defense.

In substance, the complainant alleges negligence and malpractice by members of the staff of the Department of Operative Dentistry and claims \$2,500 damages, the maximum for which the University is liable under the Court of Claims Act. Information supplied by the College of Dentistry indicates that the allegations in the complaint are erroneous and that the University has a valid defense.

Since all of the work necessary to defending this suit must be done in Chicago, the Legal Counsel's Office recommends that the University employ special counsel and suggests Joseph H. Hinshaw of Hinshaw and Culbertson, Chicago, or Albert E. Jenner, Jr., of Poppenhusen, Johnston, Thompson, and Raymond, also of Chicago.

I concur in the recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the Office of the Legal Counsel was authorized to employ Mr. Joseph H. Hinshaw, if he is available, for this case.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE ON STATE APPROPRIATION FOR AGRICULTURAL STRUCTURES

Mr. McLaughlin, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented the following report.

The Committee on Agriculture met at the University, in Urbana, on February 4, 1950, to consider the assignment of State funds for agricultural structures, referred to the committee by the Board on January 12, 1950.

Present: Mr. Walter W. McLaughlin, Chairman, Dr. Karl A. Meyer, and Mr. Wirt Herrick, members of the committee; Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Clerk; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President; Professor W. C. Huntington, Chairman of the Building Program Committee; Mr. C. S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant Department; Mr. E. L. Stouffer, Architect; Dean H. P. Rusk and the following representatives of the College of Agriculture: Professor W. E. Carroll, Professor R. R. Hudelson, Professor G. W. Salisbury, Professor D. G. Carter, Professor L. E. Card, Professor Louis B. Howard, Professor Sleeter Bull.

After a preliminary discussion of President Stoddard's recommendations (Minutes, January 12, 1950, page 965), a tour of inspection of the buildings and other facilities was made.

Following the tour, the discussion was continued.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the Committee voted to recommend to the Board that the recommendations of the President of the University be approved, subject to the release of funds; also that a request be made of the Governor for the release of funds from any surplus available in the appropriations for the Agricultural and Veterinary Science Buildings (including the Contingency Fund), to complete the Dairy Barns according to a study made by Professor Carter and Director Havens, have priority if and when funds are available.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds met at the University, in Urbana, on February 4, 1950, to consider a communication from President Stoddard on the participation of the University in the Boneyard storm drainage project.

Present: Mr. John R. Fornof, Chairman, Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Mrs. Doris S. Holt, and Mr. Wirt Herrick, members of the committee; Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Clerk; also Professor Coleman R. Griffith, Provost; Professor W. C. Huntington, Chairman of the Building Program Committee; Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller; Mr. C. S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant Department; Mr. E. L. Stouffer, Architect; and Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President.

Letters from President Stoddard, Professor Huntington, and Director Havens were presented.

After discussion, and on motion of Dr. Meyer, the Committee voted to recommend to the Board that the University express its willingness to participate in this project and to request an appropriation from the General Assembly to cover a payment representing the benefits to the University which are determinable according to principles proposed by the University Building Program Committee. The time of payment and the priority in the general program of the University are to be determined at a later date.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS
ON CHICAGO HOUSING PROJECTS**

Mr. Livingston, for the Committee on Chicago Departments, presented the following report.

The Committee met in Chicago at 4:45 p.m. on January 24, 1950, with the following present: Dr. Meyer, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Farr, Dr. Ivy, Mr. Wheeler, and Mr. Havens.

Mr. Havens presented a proposal from Naess and Murphy, architects on the Student Residence Halls, to cover changes in the completed plans and specifications to further reduce the capital cost. Mr. Livingston moved that the increased expenditure be authorized. Dr. Meyer concurred and declared the motion passed. (Estimated \$5,000).

Mr. Farr presented a revised proposal from Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill for architectural services on the Staff Apartment Project. After a discussion of this proposal, Mr. Livingston moved that Mr. Farr be authorized to offer Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill a fee of 5 per cent, and if accepted, that the contracts be authorized. Dr. Meyer concurred and declared the motion passed. (Estimated \$54,000).

The Committee held a further meeting at Urbana on February 16, 1950. Present were: Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Livingston. A progress report of Mr. Newton C. Farr, February 14, addressed to Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Chairman, was presented. Following the Board action of July 21, 1948, the Committee made informal arrangements with Mr. Farr to advise it and University officers concerned on this project. The legal phases of the project have now been placed in the hands of Chapman and Cutler, and University officers, with the assistance of the architects duly engaged for the projects, are carrying on other details, including necessary contacts with the Equitable Life Assurance Society. In view of these circumstances, it was the conclusion of the members present that the services of Mr. Farr on this project should be brought to a close, and the Comptroller is to so advise Mr. Farr and request a statement of his services to date. The Comptroller is also to advise Mr. Farr that if his services are needed further in the project, he will be so informed.

**APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE
PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY**

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

I. PAUL T. BATEMAN, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$4,500.

2. RICHARD N. CURRENT, Associate Professor of History, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,800.

3. CARL E. DRUMHELLER, Special Research Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, beginning January 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,200.

4. CHARLES H. FLETCHER, Research Assistant Professor of Aeronautical Engineering, beginning July 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,500.

5. JAMES S. KOEHLER, Associate Professor of Physics, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$7,000.

6. CHARLES R. LOHMEYER, Associate Director for Civil Service of Nonacademic Personnel, beginning February 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$6,600.

7. SOULIMA STRAVINSKY, Associate Professor of Music, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$5,500.

8. H. S. ZIM, Associate Professor of Education, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$6,000.

President Stoddard commented on some of these appointments.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these appointments were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(1) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded to the following groups of candidates who have fulfilled the legal requirements (see Appendix, page 1034).

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

CHANGE IN NAME OF SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

(2) The Director of the School of Journalism recommends that its name be changed to School of Journalism and Communications with Divisions of Journalism, Radio, and Advertising.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this change in name was approved as recommended.

NAME OF ANIMAL SCIENCES LABORATORY

(3) The Committee on Buildings of the College of Agriculture recommends that the new building to be constructed for that College be officially named Animal Sciences Laboratory.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this name was approved as recommended.

COMMITTEE ON DETERMINATION OF WAGE RATES TO BE SPECIFIED FOR CONSTRUCTION WORK AT ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(4) The Board of Trustees has authorized the appointment of a fact-finding committee¹ to conduct investigations of wage rates in Piatt County in connection with construction work on the Allerton Trust properties and report on the same to the President of the University and to the Board of Trustees. This procedure applies to future issues which may arise. The objections filed by the Twin City Federation of Labor of Champaign and others on June 3, 1949, to the determination of wages in the locality of Monticello and Piatt County published by the University in connection with construction contracts awarded by the Board of Trustees Committee on Buildings and Grounds on May 2, 1949, have been withdrawn.

¹ This committee is to be composed of one member appointed by the Illinois State Federation of Labor, one member appointed by the President of the University, and one member selected by the other two, provided that if they do not agree upon a candidate within ten days, the Director of the State Department of Public Works and Buildings will be asked to select the third member.

The President of the Illinois State Federation of Labor reports that the Federation has appointed Mr. Robert L. Gordon of Urbana, former Director of the Illinois State Department of Labor, as the labor representative. I have appointed Mr. Donald E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, as the University's representative.

This requires no action by the Board of Trustees and is being reported as a matter of record only.

This report was received for record.

TRANSFER OF THE FORESTRY TO GENERAL UNIVERSITY PURPOSES

(5) On the basis of various discussions and proposals, I recommend that the tract of land on Lincoln and Pennsylvania Avenues, now consisting of about eight acres (originally 18.25 acres) known as "The Forestry," be transferred from the Department of Forestry to the University, for general purposes. It is proposed, for the present, to develop it as a center of outdoor recreation and a picnic area. It would become an open, cleared forest under the supervision of the School of Physical Education. It would be, at the same time, a land reserve as sites for future major construction.

In 1871 this land was assigned to the Department of Horticulture. In 1916 it was transferred to the Physical Plant Department. In 1941 it was transferred to the new Department of Forestry. At that time the Board minutes referred to the erection of a "non-climbable fence of attractive design." Thus far no one has been able to blueprint such a fence; once climbed, it would indeed lead to Elysian fields!

The Forestry has served its time as a laboratory for students. It has become a problem in supervision and maintenance. Accordingly, if the Board approves this recommendation, I shall ask the Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations to earmark sufficient funds for the immediate development of a forestry plantation on the McCullough Farm recently acquired by the University.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this transfer was made as recommended.

STATUS OF AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT FIELD AT DEKALB, ILLINOIS

(6) From the estates of the late Senator Harry G. Wright and his wife, Harriette A. Wright, of DeKalb, Illinois, the University of Illinois received 952 acres of farm lands in DeKalb County as an endowment of undergraduate scholarships.

In 1940 an agricultural experiment field at DeKalb, which had been leased by the University for many years from the Fairview Park Cemetery Association, had to be abandoned because it was needed for cemetery expansion.

In 1945 the President of the University authorized the assignment of eighty acres of one of the Wright Farms for use as an experiment field to replace the field formerly leased. This operation has become a permanent part of the Agricultural Experiment Station's program and is known as the Northern Illinois Experimental Field. Residents of DeKalb County have made grants of funds to the University from time to time, now totaling \$31,070, for improvements on this field.

I recommend that this area of the Wright Farms be transferred from the endowment to the educational program of the University until further notice.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this land was transferred as recommended.

REVISIONS IN REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO GRADUATE WORK AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(7) The University Senate recommends the following revisions in the requirements for admission to graduate work in the Departments at Urbana-Champaign effective at the beginning of the academic year 1950-1951:

1. *Admission with Full Status.* Admission to the Graduate College is granted to graduates of institutions whose requirements for the bachelor's degree are substantially equivalent to those of the University of Illinois, provided that the applicant's undergraduate grade-point average for that portion of work which represents the last 50 per cent of the hours completed to secure the bachelor's degree,

exclusive of required physical education and military training, is at least 3.50¹, provided further that the undergraduate preparation is appropriate to advanced study in the chosen major field. Certain departments may require of entering graduate students minimum grade-point averages substantially higher than the general minimum of 3.50.

2. *Admission with Advanced Standing.* Admission to the Graduate College is granted to those who hold a bachelor's degree and have completed one or more years of graduate study at an accredited institution and who desire to become candidates for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy at the University of Illinois, only upon the favorable recommendation of the department of the major field of study and of the Dean of the Graduate College. If admission is granted to such an applicant, the amount of credit to be allowed will be determined by the Dean upon the recommendation of the major department.

3. *Admission with Limited Status.* In the departments requesting this arrangement, a person whose record in undergraduate work does not meet the requirements for admission with full status may be admitted on limited status. A student originally admitted on limited status may, upon completion of not less than the equivalent of three units of work, petition the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College to be transferred to full status.

The purpose of these revisions is to clarify the standards for admission to graduate work, and they have the approval of the Dean of the Graduate College.

I concur.

The Provost commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these revisions were approved as recommended.

CURRICULUM PREPARATORY TO TEACHING IN THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

(8) The University Senate recommends adoption of the following proposed curriculum preparatory to teaching in the elementary schools leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education (see Appendix, page 1036).

State requirements for certification of elementary and kindergarten-primary teachers necessarily exerted a considerable influence on the planning of this program. Graduation requirements as recommended more than meet minimum certification requirements.

This program was planned without the usual major and minor subjects of specialization. Requirements placed upon an elementary school teacher by the nature of the job put a premium upon a broad general education and upon broad training in professional courses. The elementary school teacher commonly teaches in all content areas.

The program requires that all graduates meet the requirements for the elementary certificate. Teachers who wish to qualify for the kindergarten-primary certificate need a minimum of six hours elective to get the additional professional courses required for this certification.

Admission requirements for this curriculum are the same as those of the general admission requirements to the other four-year curricula in the College of Education.

With the exception of the starred courses, which are required, students may substitute equivalent courses for those listed with the approval of an official adviser for this curriculum.

A minimum of 124 semester hours, exclusive of required physical education and military training, are required for graduation under this curriculum.

I concur.

The Provost commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

¹ This is the numerical equivalent of a scholastic average half way between C and B in the University's grading system of A, B, C, D, E, in which A is the highest grade, D the lowest passing grade, and E indicates failure.

REVISION IN THE REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO THE CURRICULUM IN INDUSTRIAL DESIGN

(9) The University Senate recommends that one and one-half units of credit in algebra and one unit of credit in geometry be required for admission to the curriculum in Industrial Design in the College of Fine and Applied Arts. This change constitutes an adjustment within the pattern already set for certain curricula in that College.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these requirements were approved as recommended.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(10) The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends assignments of funds from the "Reserve for Nonrecurring Purposes" in the budget for 1949-1950 as follows:

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(11) The Governor has approved the following release of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

Release No. 16

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings.....\$6 444"

This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,215,000 of which \$880,000 has been budgeted for additions to the Power Plant, \$263,500 for remodeling of existing buildings. The funds now released are for structural steel for the construction of an addition to the turbine room of the Power Plant, a contract for which was awarded by the Board of Trustees on January 12, 1950.

Release No. 17

"For Permanent Improvements at Chicago Construction of Addition to Present Hospital.....\$370 966 18"

This is a partial release (the third) from an appropriation of \$7,395,000. The funds now released are for the purchase and installation of fixed equipment.

Release No. 18

"For Equipment for Buildings at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago....\$62 353 65"

This is a partial release (the second) from an appropriation of \$680,000. The funds now released are for the purchase of some of the movable equipment to be used in the hospital addition. Contracts for the purchase and installation of this equipment have already been authorized by the Board.

I recommend that the funds released be appropriated for the purposes specified.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these funds were appropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

APPROPRIATIONS BY THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(12) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association on February 1 assigned \$30,000 from its reserve funds to cover the development and operation of the two golf courses (the present nine-hole course southeast of the Stadium and the new eighteen-hole course adjoining the University Airport to be put in use this year) to cover the normal operation of these courses during the spring season. This subsidy is required because of an abnormal infestation of crab grass which must be removed, delay in the completion of the irrigation system, and additional work required in spreading sand in the traps, top dressing, etc.

This is a major adjustment in the budget of the Athletic Association and the approval of the Board of Trustees is required.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this change in the budget of the Athletic Association was approved.

CONTRACTS FOR VETERINARY SCIENCE BUILDING

(13) Funds are available in the State appropriation to the University for 1949-1951 for "Construction of Veterinary Science Unit." Bids were received on January 30 and 31, 1950, for the construction of this building.

It is recommended by the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Comptroller, the Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, and Childs and Smith, architects for this building, that contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders as follows:

I recommend that these contracts be awarded subject to the release of funds by the Governor, and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts.

I submit a complete schedule of all bids received showing the base bids, alternates, and a budget for this building.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, contracts were awarded and authority was given as recommended.

REMODELING OF HOUSE AT 601 EAST JOHN STREET, CHAMPAIGN

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts for plumbing and heating and for electrical work in the remodeling of the house at 601 East John Street, Champaign, to provide quarters for the Speech Clinic:

Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company, Champaign.....	\$2 450

The general work will be done with University labor.

A special appropriation of \$13,470 was made by the Board of Trustees for the remodeling of this building.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, contracts were awarded and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF HOT AND COLD WATER SYSTEMS IN THE NURSES HOME, CHICAGO

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant and Comptroller recommend award of a contract to Fettes, Love, and Sieben, Chicago, the lowest bidders, for the installation of hot and cold water systems in the Nurses Home of the Research and Educational Hospitals in Chicago. This installation is required to replace the pump facilities that will no longer be available when the present power plant goes out of service.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$5,128.50 in the general contract with the John Felmley Company for the construction of the Student and Staff Apartments to cover removal of existing tracks on all wardrobe sliding doors which have been found unsatisfactory and replacement with new tracks, rollers, and door guides, with overhead track installation. The latter have been tried in the building and found satisfactory.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO PLUMBING CONTRACT FOR STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,298 in the contract with E. M. Hayes, Champaign, for the plumbing work in the construction of the second unit of the Student and Staff Apartments for the water main extension to the building. Utility connections were not included in the original construction bids since the plans and specifications for this work were not available when the original contracts were awarded.

Funds are available in the appropriation for the construction of this addition to the Student and Staff Apartments.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this contract addition in the amount of \$2,298.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR EAST CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,887 in the general contract with the John Felmley Company for the construction of the East Chemistry Building to install roofing, flashing, and quarry tile for an animal runway over the third floor of the East Chemistry Building. The floor construction of this area is not entirely watertight; to provide an improved and more sanitary surface for the floors of these pens, a sheet of membrane waterproofing and quarry tile will be laid over the present concrete floor.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for this building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, authority was given as recommended.

**CHANGE IN CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF ELEVATORS AND
DUMBWAITERS IN CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITION TO
RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS**

(19) The Otis Elevator Company, contractor for the installation of elevators and dumbwaiters in the construction of the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals, has proposed the installation of additional control features for all floor elevators to provide "without attendant" operation. The specifications provide for this feature in only two of the elevators. Extending it to all four would increase the contract by \$2,760.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend approval of this change.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change order.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR REPLACEMENT OF DOORS IN THE
RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS**

(20) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,913 to the Mutual Contracting Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for replacement of doors in the Research and Educational Hospitals.

The outside doors on the first floor are so badly warped that they are not weather-tight, and require constant maintenance. The metal doors on the fifth floor are also corroded and the leaded glass panels need replacement. The annual maintenance cost of new wooden doors will be considerably less, and they will be weatherproof.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

**CHANGES IN CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS IN
CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITION TO RESEARCH AND
EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS**

(21) The Wadeford Electric Company, Chicago, contractor for the electrical installations in the construction of the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals, has proposed to furnish and install a regulated synchronous alternating current clock system, as manufactured by Edwards and Company, instead of the I.B.M. electronic system specified. This would result in a net reduction of \$4,500 in the contract.

This contractor has further proposed furnishing and installing lead covered cable instead of moisture-proof rubber insulated cable specified for all underground and underfloor 600-volt feeder cables. This would add \$2,000 to the contract.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend approval of these changes.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute the change orders.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES ON IMPROVEMENTS IN ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(22) The increased use of certain buildings has resulted in demands on the electrical distribution system which has created dangerous overloads. This situation exists in Davenport Hall, Natural History Building, Library, Auditorium, Talbot Laboratory, Harker Hall, and Altgeld Hall.

Improvement of transformer vaults in these buildings is necessary to relieve the overloads by providing increased capacity and to eliminate fire hazards. The alternative is to restrict the activities of the departments using these buildings.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the firm of Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White, Chicago, be employed to prepare plans and specifications for these improvements. Studies made by this firm in 1945 for a postwar building program reveal that such improvements are necessary. Detailed plans and specifications are now needed to secure adequate cost estimates before proceeding with the work. It is proposed that Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White be employed on the same terms as we have applied to other jobs of this kind done for the University, viz., payment by the University of the actual salaries of draftsmen, engineers, and other personnel employed, plus 100 per cent for administrative overhead and commission, plus actual travel costs, plus the cost of advertising for bids. It is estimated that the total cost of such services will not exceed \$10,000.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings," and such funds have already been released by the Governor.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract for these services.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, authority was given as recommended.

TAX STATUS OF MEDICAL CENTER STEAM COMPANY

(23) Since the Medical Center Steam Company is organized under the general corporations act of Illinois, its property is not exempt from taxation under the laws providing exemption of State properties. However, the Company will be operating a steam service primarily for the University and the stockholders will get no profit. Hence, it is desirable to establish exemption from local property taxes.

The Legal Counsel and the Comptroller recommend that the law firm of Chapman and Cutler, Chicago, be employed to study this problem.

The officers of the Medical Center Steam Company have offered to cooperate in a study of this problem and will secure the services of the tax expert of Commonwealth Edison Company.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was adopted.

LEGAL SERVICES FOR BOND ISSUE TO FINANCE CONSTRUCTION OF STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(24) The second six-story building of the Student and Staff Apartments at Green Street and Goodwin Avenue, Urbana, now under construction, will be financed in part through borrowing \$700,000. It appears that the best method of securing such funds is through a revenue bond issue of the Board of Trustees.

The Legal Counsel and the Comptroller recommend that the law firm of Chapman and Cutler, Chicago, be engaged for all necessary services in connection with the bond issue.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this recommendation was adopted.

EMPLOYMENT OF UNIVERSITY AUDITORS

(25) The Finance Committee recommends that the firm of George Rossetter and Company, Certified Public Accountants, Chicago, be retained as auditors for the year ending June 30, 1950, their services to be charged on the basis of a per diem rate and expenses, with the understanding that the aggregate charges will not exceed the following:

University of Illinois (all divisions).....	\$10 500

These maximum costs are based on the assumption that if the auditors go beyond the scope of usual examination, further compensation for such additional work will be allowed after review and approval by the Finance Committee.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was concurred in.

**REPORT FROM THE LEGAL COUNSEL AND THE COMPTROLLER ON
COURT DECREE ON WORKING FUNDS AND SECURITIES
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS VS. IRVIN L. PORTER, TREASURER**

(26) Prior to June 12, 1948, working funds were maintained in banks in Champaign and Galesburg for the more rapid and efficient transaction of University business. In 1948 Mr. Irvin L. Porter, Treasurer, raised a question as to his personal liability in case of a loss of such funds and on the date indicated above the working fund maintained in Urbana-Champaign was transferred to the First National Bank of Chicago of which he was an officer. Securities belonging to the University have been held since 1932 by the First National Bank of Chicago, under an Agency agreement, and not by the University Treasurer personally.

On July 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 12), the Board amended the by-laws and statutes of the University so as to relieve the Treasurer of responsibility for such funds or securities when not in his possession. In the same action it approved the increase of the Bursar's fund for the Urbana-Champaign Business Office to \$100,000 from a previous total of \$60,000 and authorized the deposit of this fund in the First National Bank in Champaign. The \$40,000 increase, together with a previous increase in this fund of \$41,575 made in June, 1946, was taken from general funds accumulated as a result of the collection of indirect costs in the operation of United States government research contracts. A legal opinion has been secured from the Legal Counsel of the University that such funds may be retained by the University and need not be deposited in the University Income Fund held by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois.

On July 21, 1948, the Board also authorized the Legal Counsel to prosecute any suit required to establish the validity of the Board action of such date relative to these funds and securities. At a previous conference between Mr. Porter's attorneys, the Legal Counsel, and the Comptroller, it was indicated that Mr. Porter would be agreeable to the transfer of the funds from his custody if required by court decree. It was the opinion of the attorneys that such court decree would further protect Mr. Porter from personal liability in respect to these funds. Accordingly, on July 31, 1948, a formal request was made to Mr. Porter to transfer the funds as approved by the Board of Trustees on July 21. Mr. Porter then refused to transfer such funds and action was instituted by the Legal Counsel in the Superior Court of Cook County to secure a declaratory judgment requiring such transfer.

After the suit was entered it was mutually agreed to offer the Attorney General of the State of Illinois an opportunity to become a party, in view of the possibility that interests of the State other than those of the University might be involved. After investigation it was the decision of the Attorney General that such other interests were not involved and, therefore, he did not become a party to the suit.

On January 25, 1950, after a hearing on the petition, Judge Joseph A. Graber entered a decree finding that the action of the Board on July 21, 1948, relating to

the funds and securities, was valid under the laws of the State of Illinois and ordering Irvin L. Porter to comply with the request that funds be transferred in accordance with the Board's action of July 21, 1948.

Mr. Porter has now indicated that he is ready to proceed with the transfer. Accordingly, the funds will be deposited as required by the action of July 21, 1948, with the exception of those of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, which funds with the termination of that division were returned to general funds of the University.

CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON DRUG PLANT RESEARCH STATION

(32) The Board of Trustees on January 12, 1950 (Minutes, page 970), appropriated \$65,000 for the construction of buildings (heated greenhouse with adjoining headhouse, machine shed, and pump house) at the Morton Arboretum near Chicago for the Drug Plant Experiment Station.

The Physical Plant Department recommends that Schweikher and Elting, Architects, Roselle, Illinois, be employed for the necessary architectural services at a fee of 5½ per cent of the total cost. Based on the estimated cost of the buildings (\$55,000), the fee will be approximately \$3,025.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with Schweikher and Elting for such services.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

March 14, 1950



The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at Hotel LaSalle, in Chicago, on Tuesday, March 14, 1950, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2:00 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and, during part of the day, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information, and Mr. Wilbur Schramm, Assistant to the President.

MR. KENNEY E. WILLIAMSON ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

On motion of Dr. Meyer, Mr. Fornof was made chairman for the election of the President of the Board.

Dr. Meyer nominated Mr. Kenney E. Williamson, of Peoria, for the office of President of the Board for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Williamson as President. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Williamson was declared elected President of the Board.

President Williamson took the chair and expressed his appreciation of the honor of his election.

MR. HARRISON E. CUNNINGHAM ELECTED SECRETARY

On nomination of Mr. Nickell and on motion of Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Harrison E. Cunningham, of Urbana, was elected Secretary of the Board for one year.

PROFESSOR LLOYD MOREY ELECTED COMPTROLLER

On nomination of Mr. Nickell, Professor Lloyd Morey, of Urbana, was elected Comptroller for one year.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTED

Dr. Meyer nominated Mr. Livingston, and Mr. Fornof nominated Mr. McLaughlin to serve, with the President of the Board as Chairman, as members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Livingston and Mr. McLaughlin as members of the Executive Committee. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Livingston and Mr. McLaughlin were declared elected.

AUTHORITY TO RECEIVE MONEY

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be, and he hereby is, authorized to receive and receipt for all moneys, and to endorse all orders, drafts, and checks due and payable to the Board of Trustees or to the University of Illinois, and especially all drafts drawn by the Treasurer of the United States payable to the Board of Trustees or to the University of Illinois.

DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are authorized to delegate the signing of their names as President and Secretary, respectively, to vouchers to be presented to the State Auditor, and to warrants drawn on the Treasurer of the University, under the following conditions.

The President of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to C. H. Pratt, to L. M. Dahlenburg, and to W. D. Green in Urbana, and to H. A. Hazleton, to G. H. Pontious, and to H. O. Albers in Chicago, to H. R. Kobes and to Mabel F. Meek in Springfield, authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor; and to C. C. DeLong, to H. F. Thornes, and to R. W. Zimmer in Urbana, and to H. A. Hazleton, to G. H. Pontious, and to H. O. Albers in Chicago, authority to sign his name to warrants on the University Treasurer covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations approved by the Board.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Maude Archdeacon and to Helen L. Smith in Urbana, and to G. R. Moon, to Ethel Engeljohn, to Helen Wyle, and to Velma M. Davis in Chicago, authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor and to warrants on the University Treasurer, covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations of the Board. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Mrs. Freda M. Hicks and to Lean C. Ryan in Springfield, authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees on vouchers against the State Auditor approved in accordance with the regulations of the Board. And be it further

RESOLVED, that the First National Bank of Chicago as a designated depository of Irvin L. Porter, Treasurer of this corporation, be and it (including its correspondent banks) is hereby requested, authorized, and directed to honor checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money drawn in this corporation's name, including those drawn to the individual order of any person or persons whose name or names appear thereon as signer or signers thereof, when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signatures of the two following: Kenney E. Williamson, President, and Harrison E. Cunningham, Secretary; and the First National Bank of Chicago (including its correspondent banks) shall be entitled to honor and to charge this corporation for all such checks, drafts, or other orders, regardless of by whom or by what means the facsimile signature or signatures thereon may have been affixed thereto, if such facsimile signature or signatures resemble the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with the First National Bank of Chicago by the Secretary or other officer of this corporation. And be it further

RESOLVED, that the Auditor of Public Accounts is hereby authorized and directed to honor vouchers bearing facsimile signatures of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois if such facsimile signatures resemble the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with the Auditor of Public Accounts by the Secretary.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF HOME ECONOMICS

(1) The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends the appointment of Dr. Janice M. Smith, who has been serving as Acting Head of the Department of Home Economics, to the position of Professor of Nutrition and Head of the Department of Home Economics on indefinite tenure, effective April 1, 1950, at a salary of \$9,000 a year on a twelve months (Y) service basis.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, seconded by Mrs. Watkins, this appointment was made as recommended.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR ADVANCED PLANNING

(2) On January 12, 1950 (Minutes, page 971), the Board of Trustees authorized the Comptroller to submit an application to the General Services Administration of the federal government for a non-interest bearing loan of funds for advanced planning for the following buildings in the order of priority:

The total of \$846,000 would provide for the cost of planning, including the preparation of detailed working drawings.

The application has been submitted, and there have been further discussions with representatives of the federal government. The total sum allotted to the state of Illinois to date is only \$1,071,000, and applications have been received for more than twice this amount. It is impossible to allocate to the University of Illinois a sum adequate to complete even the plans for the Biology Building.

A plan has been suggested by the General Services Administration wherein the University would receive funds to complete preliminary plans for the Biology Building and for further plans for the Pharmacy Building. The cost of preliminary plans would be approximately \$150,000-\$175,000 for the two buildings. To receive these funds the University must agree (a) to request the legislature for appropriations for 1951-1953 to construct the buildings and (b) if such appropriations are not received at least in sufficient amount to complete the plans, either to refund the amounts advanced by the federal government or to appropriate from its general funds sufficient funds to complete the plans.

It will be advantageous to complete now the preliminary work on the plans for these buildings so that detailed plans and construction may proceed expeditiously when an appropriation is received. The two buildings involved are in the highest priority of future buildings at the University.

This proposal has been reviewed and approved by the Chairman of the Building Program Committee, the Consulting Architect, the University Architect, and the Comptroller.

I concur and request that the Comptroller be authorized to complete necessary documents to secure the funds from the federal government for preliminary planning for the Biology Building and the Pharmacy Building, including the agreements outlined above.

The Comptroller commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this recommendation was adopted.

LICENSE OF PRODUCTS OF STREPTOMYCIN

(3) The University is the assignee of an application by Professor Herbert E. Carter of the Department of Chemistry for a patent of processes relating to the degradation products of streptomycin known as streptidine and streptamine. This discovery was the result of research work on antibiotic substances sponsored by the Abbott Laboratories, Eli Lilly and Company, Parke, Davis, and Company, and the Upjohn Company. The discovery was released by the Board of Trustees to Professor Carter on May 29, 1946, assigned by him to Parke, Davis, and Company, and subsequently reassigned by that company to Professor Carter and by him to the University. It was the sponsor's (i.e., Parke, Davis, and Company) wish that the University hold title to any patents secured in the course of research work to avoid any anti-trust suits. The sponsors agreed to pay all costs of securing a patent and, in the event of any law suits, to pay the cost of such litigation. The agreement with Parke, Davis, and Company and the other three sponsors of the research work on antibiotic substances includes a provision that the University shall grant royalty-free, non-exclusive licenses under any patent which may ultimately issue, to Parke, Davis, and Company, Eli Lilly and Company, the Upjohn Company, and the Abbott Laboratories.

In Professor Carter's judgment the patent has no apparent value. It was applied for originally before the chemistry of streptomycin had been elucidated with the idea that simpler derivatives might prove to be of some use clinically. So far no degradation products of streptomycin and no related compounds have shown antibacterial activity. It seems, therefore, very unlikely that the patent, when and if issued, would have any financial value.

Moreover, Merck and Company, Inc., and E. R. Squibb and Sons are assignees of applications for patents in the same field which has created a case of interference. It is possible that Merck and Company, Inc., can obtain the entire patent, since publication dates indicate that their researches were two or three months ahead of Professor Carter's.

It has been proposed by the counsel for Parke, Davis, and Company that this

be resolved by a settlement agreement under which Merck and Company, Inc., E. R. Squibb and Sons, Parke, Davis, and Company, Eli Lilly and Company, the Upjohn Company, and the Abbott Laboratories would each receive a royalty-free, non-exclusive license with the further provision that Merck and Company, Inc., and E. R. Squibb and Sons would each be given the right to grant three royalty-free sub-licenses.

This proposed solution is part of patent agreement among pharmaceutical manufacturers to broaden the availability to the public of the important antibiotic substances. The Dean of the Graduate College and Chairman of the University Research Board is convinced that the public interest will be well served if the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois enters into such an agreement. The Legal Counsel concurs in this opinion.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Trustees enter into the settlement agreement herein proposed.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this agreement was authorized.

EXCHANGE OF LAND WITH MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION

(4) The Medical Center Commission has suggested an exchange of the property owned by them located at 718 South Hermitage Avenue, Chicago, for property owned by the University of Illinois located at 1745 West Flournoy Street, Chicago.

The property at 1745 West Flournoy Street was purchased in 1922 and has an area of approximately 1,345 square feet. The University has sold the property north of the Union Building to the Cook County Graduate School, and as a result, owns no property contiguous to 1745 West Flournoy Street.

The property owned by the Medical Center Commission at 718 South Hermitage Avenue consists of approximately 3,100 square feet and is adjacent to property now owned by the University of Illinois.

The proposed transfer results in a unification of University property and increases the area owned by the University. Vice-President Ivy, Director Havens, and Comptroller Morey recommend that the transfer be approved.

I concur and request the Board to adopt the attached resolution (see Appendix, page 1061).

Dr. Ivy commented on this matter.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the resolution was adopted as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mrs. Holt, Dr. Meyer, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Hickman, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stevenson.

APRIL MEETING IN SPRINGFIELD

At this point, President Williamson announced that he had received an invitation from Governor Stevenson to hold the next meeting of the Board at the Executive Mansion, in Springfield, on Wednesday, April 19, 1950.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this invitation was accepted, with appreciation.

RECESS FOR LUNCHEON

At this point, the Board recessed for luncheon. Present as guests of the Board were: Mr. Herbert B. Megran, President of the University of Illinois Foundation, Mr. Fred H. This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,560,000. The Governor has previously released (Release No. 7) \$40,000 for architectural and engineering services on the Veterinary Science Building. The funds now released are for the construction of the Veterinary Science Building, contracts for which were authorized by the Board on February 16, 1950.

Release No. 21

"For Contingencies to Cover Expenditures for Purposes for which the Amount Appropriated in any Item Above Enumerated is, or becomes, Insufficient.....\$ 97 790"

This is a partial release (the third) from an appropriation of \$550,000. It will supplement the appropriation for "Construction of Utility Distribution System and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" and will be used for the remodeling of the Department of Biological Chemistry in the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building.

Release No. 22

"For Contingencies to Cover Expenditures for Purposes for which the Amount Appropriated in any Item Above Enumerated is, or becomes, Insufficient.....\$ 2 210"

This is a partial release (the fourth) from an appropriation of \$550,000. It is to supplement the appropriation for "Equipment for buildings at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago" and is to be used for movable equipment for the Department of Biological Chemistry in the College of Medicine.

Petry and Sons, Champaign, the lowest bidder, for the construction of paved terraces on either side of the front entrance to the Lincoln Avenue Residence. This is a part of the original plans for the building but was not included in previous construction contracts. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

CONTRACT FOR CLEANING AND TUCK POINTING WALLS OF CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES BUILDINGS

Iverson, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for cleaning and tuck pointing the exterior walls of the Medical, Dental, Orthopaedic, and the Illini Union Buildings of the Chicago Professional Colleges. This is necessary maintenance work to keep the buildings in good condition. Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

CONTRACTS FOR ALTERATIONS IN UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AT THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of contracts for alterations in the utilities distribution system at the Chicago Professional Colleges as follows:

E. P. Allison and Company, Chicago.....	\$5 600
For alterations in electrical supply lines to the Illinois Surgical Institute, or Orthopaedic Building, of the Research and Educational Hospitals. The work will include replacement of present lines due to overload; a new combination power and light distribution center; conversion of	

two risers from single to three phase; and installation of new circuit breaker type cutout cabinets.

B-H Electric Company, Chicago..... 6 497

For alterations in electrical supply lines to the Research Laboratory and Library Unit of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building. The work will include installation of new three-phase, four-wire service feeder line of sufficient capacity to service general light and power loads; installation of new service and distribution panel; replacement of existing three-wire riser with four-wire riser; and replacement of six panels with three-phase four-wire circuit breaker type panels. These alterations are necessary to eliminate the existing overload.

Both companies are the low bidders on these installations.

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts when funds have been released by the Governor from the State appropriation for "Construction of Utility Distribution System and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" ("Permanent Improvements at Chicago").

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, authority was given as recommended.

CHANGES IN CONTRACTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS ADDITION

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the following additions to contracts for the construction of the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals. These changes are to provide for the relocation of the Manufacturing Pharmacy. Construction of the new addition will require wrecking of space now occupied by the Manufacturing Pharmacy.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals for these changes.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these change orders.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS

(11) On February 16, 1950 (Minutes, page 997), the Board of Trustees approved an increase in the general contract for the construction of the original buildings of the Student and Staff Apartments to provide for replacement of tracks on all wardrobe sliding doors, which have been found unsatisfactory, with new tracks, rollers, and door guides of the overhead installation type. A similar change is recommended in the specifications for installations of wardrobe doors in the second six-story building now under construction.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,432 in the general work contract with Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., to provide for this change. Funds are available. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

FRANK HENDERSON SIMPSON

Mr. Fornof presented the following:

The Honorable Frank Henderson Simpson was born in Vincennes, Indiana, December 6, 1870, and died in Flora, Illinois, March 3, 1950.

Educated in the public schools of Washington, D.C., Mr. Simpson engaged in fruit growing in Illinois in 1890. He organized the F. H. Simpson Company in 1913, which became a large business in wholesale fruit marketing and distribution. He was active in banking and financial circles in Flora, Illinois, and was chairman of the Republican County Central Committee from 1922 to 1930. He was a member and past president of the International Apple Association, a member of the Presbyterian Church, and a thirty-second degree Mason.

Mr. Simpson was appointed by Governor Len Small in November, 1928, to fill a vacancy on the Board of Trustees. He served with distinction until March, 1931. He was chairman of the Committee on Engineering, and member of the committees on agriculture, buildings and grounds, finance, and physical education. His interest, his wisdom, and his integrity made him a valuable member of the Board. He was elected to serve from January to March, 1931, as President *pro tempore* of the Board during the absence from the State of President Barr. He was noted for his loyalty and his charming and friendly personality.

Mr. Simpson is survived by his widow, a daughter (Mrs. Doris S. Holt, a member of the present Board of Trustees), a granddaughter, and a great-grandson. The sympathy of the Board goes out to them in their sorrow.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this memorial was adopted and the Secretary was directed to send a copy to Mr. Simpson's family.

Mrs. Holt expressed her great appreciation of the flowers sent by the Board and of this memorial.

Center Commission to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is free and clear of all encumbrances of every kind and character, including taxes and special assessments; and the President of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute such deed from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, as grantor, to Medical Center Commission, as grantee, conveying said Parcel 6:1, as aforementioned, such act to be attested by the Recording Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois; and said Recording Secretary is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to affix the corporate seal of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to such deed, and to attest the act of the President of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois in executing the same, as aforesaid; and thereupon the President of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois shall deliver said deed last mentioned to Medical Center Commission upon receiving from it a conveyance of said Parcel 6:10, legally described above, free and clear of all encumbrances, including taxes and special assessments, as above.

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

February 16, 1950



The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, February 16, 1950, in the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2:00 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Williamson, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins.

President Stoddard was present; also, Vice-President A. C. Ivy, Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistant to the President A. J. Janata, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, and, during the open session, Director of Public Information J. F. Wright, Assistant to the President Wilbur Schramm, Professor R. B. Hudson.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of January 12, 1950.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 963 to 986 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

RECOMMENDATIONS RELATING TO PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(1) A. Dr. C. S. Marvel of the Department of Chemistry reports the discovery by himself and Dr. B. R. Bluestein, a former graduate student who worked under him last year, of the reaction of a chlorine-containing polymer with triethylphosphite to produce an organic phosphorus derivative which is slow burning. The discovery appears to have potential value in the preparation of flame resistant materials, but a considerable amount of further research and development will be necessary, and there is no assurance that the ultimate result would justify the cost of securing a patent.

On the basis of advice from members of the Department of Chemistry staff, the Chairman of the University Research Board recommends that the discovery be released to the discoverers.

B. Edward W. Ernst, Special Research Assistant in Electrical Engineering, reports the development of "An Anticipator Circuit for Reducing the Effective Thermal Time Lag," an improved form of temperature-measuring device which may be patentable. This development results from an Engineering Experiment Station research program sponsored by the Bird Electronic Corporation of Cleveland, Ohio.

The Chairman of the University Research Board recommends that the University of Illinois Foundation be requested to have a patent search made to determine the novelty of this invention, and that if it appears to be patentable, an application for a patent to be assigned to the University of Illinois Foundation be filed.

C. Associate Professor G. I. Wallace, of the Department of Bacteriology, and Mr. Walter Zygmunt, a graduate assistant in that Department, have isolated a bacterium which produces an antibiotic substance which may be of therapeutic importance. This substance seems to be effective against various disease-producing bacteria, and appears not to be toxic to animals even in rather large doses. To carry forward from this point the development of the substance as a useful thermotherapeutic agent is a long and costly process best carried out in cooperation with a pharmaceutical manufacturer. Control of possible patents by such a manufacturer is a necessary concession in securing the manufacturer's support.

The University Research Board has considered this matter and has also consulted Professors Herbert E. Carter of the Department of Chemistry and Halvor O. Halvorson of the Department of Bacteriology. It is the judgment of the Research Board that the public interest will be best served if the discovery of this antibiotic substance is released to the discoverers so that they can negotiate with pharmaceutical manufacturers for the production, study, and development, and the Research Board so recommends.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were adopted.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PRESIDENT STODDARD

(2) A request for leave of absence from May 9 to June 15, to enable him to attend a meeting of UNESCO in Florence, Italy.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this leave was granted as requested.

USE OF UNIVERSITY PREMISES FOR POLITICAL MEETINGS

(3) Following considerable campus discussion in meetings and through the press, the Student Senate on March 8, 1950, passed the following resolution:

I. Political speakers are not allowed to appear on the campus.

II. This restriction stems from a resolution passed by the Board of Trustees in 1890. "Action: On motion of Mr. Bennett it was resolved that hereafter the University buildings and grounds be not used for political purposes."

III. The Student Senate feels that such a restriction is contrary to the best interests of the student body.

- A. Hearing political campaign speeches should be part of the educational process of the college student.
- B. Other comparable universities do not impose such restrictions.
- C. If Democracy is to function the citizens should have every possible opportunity to hear and discuss political issues.

IV. It is the sense of the Student Senate that steps should be taken to make it possible for major candidates for national public offices or Governor of the State from political parties recognized by the State of Illinois to appear on the campus of the University.

V. The Student Senate respectfully requests the President of the University of Illinois to present this matter to the Board of Trustees with the recommendation that the resolution of December 9, 1890, be reconsidered. It is the desire of the Student Senate that provision be made to make it possible for major political speakers to use university grounds and facilities and to appear before the student body of this University.

VI. The Student Senate recommends that it, being representative of the student body, initiate the administration.

Also the All-University Forum Committee endorses a lifting of this sixty-year law, stating

The function of the Committee is to bring students in contact with significant personalities, problems, and trends of the day, thereby implementing the educational process. Students are a critical audience and indicate a definite preference for participants in affairs rather than mere observers who relate things at second hand. Insulating students from the political personalities and issues of the day seems both unrealistic and self-defeating.

Next fall will witness a highly significant campaign for the United States Senate. We would like to sponsor either joint or several appearances of the candidates. We are aware that the continuation of some restrictions is essential, as, for example, limitation of appearances to candidates for state and national offices, and assurance of equal opportunity for rival candidates as in the case of radio time.

Now, technically these campus groups are not thinking of the use of University buildings "for political purposes," but of the contact between student body and staff on the one hand and political candidates on the other. We could, I presume, be using the buildings for educational purposes while the speakers were expressing political thoughts.

However, we have held to a strict interpretation, not without embarrassment at times, and with a definite loss to students and staff. I know that my own college life was more interesting because of the personal appearances of Bryan, Taft, and Hoover.

I recommend, therefore, that the Board action of 1890 be rescinded and that the following action, in substance, be taken:

RESOLVED, that the University buildings and grounds and facilities in communications be available to candidates for state-wide and national offices from political parties recognized by the state of Illinois, and to other responsible political speakers, subject to the approval of the President of the University.

If the Board approves, I recommend that this change become effective immediately.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this matter was referred to the Committee on General Policy for consideration and report at the May meeting.

The Board recessed for luncheon.

OPEN SESSION

After luncheon, the Board convened in open session.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY MADE BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Secretary reported that the President has approved the following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees:

1. H. W. DOWLING, Professor of Preventive Medicine and Public Health, and Head of the Department, beginning June 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$12,000.
2. I. C. GUNSALUS, Professor of Bacteriology, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$9,500.
3. CHARLES A. HICKMAN, Professor of Economics, and Research Professor of Economics, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$8,500.
4. ROBERT M. KARK, Professor of Medicine, beginning July 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$10,000.
5. S. E. LURIA, Research Professor of Bacteriology, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$8,000.
6. CHARLES L. MAXWELL, Assistant Professor of Hygiene, and Medical Adviser for Men, beginning July 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$7,200.
7. ALVIN L. NEUMANN, Associate Professor of Animal Science, beginning July 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$6,200.
8. HORACE W. NORTON, Professor of Agricultural Statistics, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$8,000.
9. FREDERICK SARGENT, II, Assistant Professor of Physiology, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$4,500.
10. WILLIAM W. WAINWRIGHT, Professor of Radiology, and Head of the Department, beginning September 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$8,000.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appointments were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF W. ELLISON CHALMERS AS DIRECTOR OF THE INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(1) I recommend that Dr. W. Ellison Chalmers, Professor of Economics and Professor in the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations, who has been serving as Acting Director of the Institute since September 1, 1949, be appointed Director of the Institute at a total salary of \$9,500, service to be on a twelve months' or "Y" basis.

Under University Statutes a dean or director is appointed for a term of two years. Professor Chalmers' present appointment as Acting Director will expire September 1, 1950. I recommend that the change in title to Director and the new salary become effective as of May 1, 1950.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF MARK H. HINDSLEY AS DIRECTOR OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS BANDS

(2) The University of Illinois Bands have been an independent organization, the Director reporting to the President of the University. For administrative purposes the Bands should be attached to one of the major divisions of the University. I recommend that they be placed under the general supervision of the Dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts.

I recommend further that Associate Professor Mark H. Hindsley, who has been serving as Acting Director of the Bands since September 1, 1948, when Director A. A. Harding retired, be appointed Director of the University of Illinois Bands and Professor in the School of Music, effective May 1, 1950, at a total salary of \$8,500.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was made as recommended.

**APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTOR AND ASSISTANT DIRECTOR
OF THE STUDENT COUNSELING BUREAU**

(3) I recommend the following appointments to be effective May 1, 1950:

1. William M. Gilbert, now Acting Director of the Student Counseling Bureau, as Associate Professor of Psychology and Director of the Student Counseling Bureau at an annual salary of \$8,000.

2. Leo A. Hellmer, now Acting Assistant Director of the Bureau, as Associate Professor of Psychology and Assistant Director of the Student Counseling Bureau at an annual salary of \$7,000.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these appointments were made as recommended.

**APPOINTMENT OF DEAN STANLEY W. OLSON TO BOARD OF
DIRECTORS, INSTITUTION FOR TUBERCULOSIS RESEARCH**

(4) The Sixty-sixth General Assembly of Illinois established the Institution for Tuberculosis Research for the production, distribution, and application of the bacillus Calmette-Guerin (BCG), and other methods and materials for the prevention of tuberculosis and for conducting research in tuberculosis. The General Assembly has also made appropriations for expenses incidental to the operation of the Institution. Its management is vested in a five-man board—two appointed by the University and two by the Board of the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium of Chicago. The fifth member is elected by the other four.

The resignation of Dr. J. B. Youmans, former Dean of the College of Medicine, leaves a vacancy on the Board. Vice-President A. C. Ivy recommends the appointment of Dr. Stanley W. Olson, the new Dean of the College of Medicine, to fill the vacancy. The complete personnel of the Board will be:

Appointed by the University of Illinois

Dr. A. C. IVY, Vice-President

Dr. STANLEY W. OLSON, Dean of the College of Medicine

Appointed by the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium of Chicago

Dr. HERMAN N. BUNDESEN, President, Chicago Board of Health

Dr. ERNEST E. IRONS, Consulting Physician, Presbyterian Hospital, Chicago

Appointed by the Other Four

Dr. WALTER H. THEOBALD, Otolaryngologist, Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium, and member of the Medical Center Commission

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

DEPARTMENTS OF PREVENTIVE MEDICINE AND PUBLIC HEALTH

(5) The educational and research program in Preventive Medicine and Public Health in the College of Medicine is presently under one department. The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommends that it be organized into two departments, a Department of Preventive Medicine and a Department of Public Health.

He also recommends the following appointments:

1. Harry Filmore Dowling as Professor and Head of the Department of Preventive Medicine on indefinite tenure, beginning June 1, 1950, at an annual salary of \$12,000 (AY).

2. Howard J. Shaughnessy, now Professor of Bacteriology serving without salary, as Professor and Head of the Department of Public Health, the terms of his appointment to be determined later. Dr. Shaughnessy is now Director of Laboratories of the State Department of Public Health, and he will probably

want to divide his time between the University and the Department. The details of this have not been completed.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

GRADUATE CURRICULA AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(6) The University Senate recommends a reorganization of the graduate curricula in Geography and Physiology (see Appendix, page 1097).

Memoranda giving the details of the required and elective courses in these several curricula are attached hereto and copies are being given to the Secretary of the Board for record.

These new curricula have also been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these curricula were approved as recommended.

GRADUATE CURRICULA IN THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(7) The University Senate recommends that the following curricula leading to advanced degrees in the Chicago Professional Colleges be established (see Appendix, page 1098).

Memoranda giving the details of the required and elective courses in these several curricula are attached hereto and copies are being given to the Secretary of the Board for record.

These new curricula have also been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS AT CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(8) A Committee of the faculty was appointed late in 1948 to study the advisability of offering a Reserve Officers Training Corps program at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. It had previously been ascertained that the University was under no legal obligation to establish military training in any of its branches. Hence, the study of R.O.T.C. at Navy Pier assumed that it would be an elective program.

We now have a recommendation from the Committee, concurred in by the University's Military Department, that there be established at Navy Pier the first and second year basic Army R.O.T.C. program. A minimum of one hundred and a maximum of two hundred trainees is contemplated. Applicants will be screened and admitted on the basis of previous high-school or freshman college work.

The instructional personnel will be provided by the Department of the Army, supplemented by Reserve Officers on inactive status or short tours of active duty. The University will need to provide a secretary and a property custodian. Classroom and other space is available for both out-of-door and indoor foot drill. Some remodeling is necessary to provide office quarters.

The cost of providing the necessary physical facilities is estimated at \$11,000 for preparation of offices and storerooms and \$2,800 for the purchase of furniture and other equipment.

Aside from the desire of the National Military Establishment for such training in colleges and universities, many of the high schools in Chicago, from which most of the students at Navy Pier come, have junior R.O.T.C. units and their graduates who wish to work for reserve commissions are handicapped in this respect at the Pier.

I recommend that:

1. The Board of Trustees approve this program.

2. An assignment of \$13,800 be made from the Nonrecurring Reserve to provide the facilities.

3. The President of the University be authorized to make such adjustments in the operating budget as may be necessary to activate the program.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, these recommendations were adopted, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Forno, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; not voting, Governor Stevenson.

CHANGES IN GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP AWARDS

(9) The Dean of the Graduate College presents two recommendations:

Illinois College Fellowship Plan

Since 1908 each of several liberal arts colleges in Illinois has annually been invited to nominate an outstanding senior student as a candidate for a first-year fellowship in the Graduate College at the University of Illinois. Since 1935 these candidates have been on a basis of equal competition with all other applicants; provided that candidates from Illinois colleges whose qualifications are equivalent to those of applicants from institutions outside the state have been given preference in the assignment of scholarships; and provided further that nominees from Illinois colleges who fail in the competition have been awarded scholarships without stipends which carry exemption from tuition, incidental, and laboratory fees.

The Dean of the Graduate College reports that competition among fellowship candidates in general has not, until recent years, been so keen as to exclude from awards more than a few Illinois college nominees. The number of these college nominees who compete successfully with applicants from other institutions has been diminishing to such an extent that the Dean of the Graduate College feels the plan should be reviewed. The plan becomes meaningless when colleges are invited to nominate candidates only to learn that their candidates fail to win awards. However, if the University gave fellowships automatically to candidates on nomination by the colleges, the University would be unfair to other students who are more deserving of fellowship awards.

The Dean, therefore, recommends that the Illinois college nominee plan be discontinued. This does not mean that graduates of Illinois colleges will be eliminated from consideration; they may apply and compete for fellowships along with graduates from other institutions.

Stipends of Post-doctoral and Nonresident Fellowships

Since 1948 the University has been awarding special post-doctoral and nonresident fellowships carrying stipends of \$2,400 a year. This is the lower range of beginning salaries of instructors who have just received their Ph.D. degrees. The general level of stipends of post-doctoral fellowships offered by the National Research Council, the United States Public Health Service, the Atomic Energy Commission, and other agencies is in the range of \$3,000 to \$3,600 a year. This means that the University, with its present scale, is at a disadvantage in competing for the best talent.

The Dean, therefore, recommends that the maximum stipend for special post-doctoral fellowships and for nonresident fellowships be increased from \$2,400 a year to \$3,000 a year, with the understanding (a) that the conditions of award remain as originally specified by the Board of Trustees on February 21, 1948, and (b) that smaller stipends will be granted when this is desirable in view of the circumstances of any particular case.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES FEE AT THE CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(10) A Student Activities fee of \$4 a semester is charged each student at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. This is to finance student activities programs, including intercollegiate and intramural athletics. The fee covers admission to all home athletic contests.

There is a desire on the part of the students to add football to the list of activities, and general agreement on the part of the University officials concerned that the athletic program at Navy Pier should be expanded in cooperation with the Athletic Association. This will require increasing the fee from \$4 to \$6 a semester. The question of raising the fee was submitted to the students and they voted overwhelmingly in favor of it.

The faculty Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommends approval of this increase.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this increase in fees was authorized.

CONTRACTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ANIMAL SCIENCES LABORATORY

(11) Funds are available in the State appropriation to the University for 1949-1951 for "Construction of Animal Science Building." Bids were received on April 6, 1950, for the construction of this building.

It is recommended by the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Comptroller, and Naess and Murphy, architects for this building, that contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders as follows:

The recommendations for awards of heating, ventilating and air conditioning, and refrigeration contracts are based on the acceptance of the Johnson Service Company, Chicago, as the subcontractor to furnish temperature controls since theirs is the lowest quotation on this phase of the work and the Company is acceptable to the University.

I submit a complete schedule of all bids received showing the base bids, alternates, and a budget for this building.

I recommend that these contracts be awarded subject to the release of funds by the Governor, and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these contracts were awarded and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR BOILER REPAIRS IN ABBOTT POWER PLANT

(12) Routine inspection of the boilers at the Abbott Power Plant revealed that there was evidence of impending failure by rupture of lower sidewall water headers. This inspection was supplemented by inspections by the Chief Mechanical Engineer of Sargent and Lundy, Consulting Engineers, Chicago; an inspector from the Lumbermen's Mutual Casualty Company, underwriters of University boiler insurance; and Professor H. L. Walker, Head of the Department of Mining and Metallurgical Engineering. All agree on a program of temporary repairs, with permanent repairs by the replacement of the headers during the summer of 1950, to insure safe operating conditions for the 1950-1951 heating season. The Lumbermen's Mutual Casualty Company requires that the replacement of headers be carried out within six months.

The boilers have been in operation since 1940 and have been given daily maintenance service with a thorough annual inspection and overhaul. There has been no previous indication of failure.

Sargent and Lundy and the Director of the Physical Plant recommend that

repairs be made by replacing the sidewall water headers with forged steel headers of improved design with suitable changes in the circulation system and firing technic.

In as much as the engineering data, details of design, and circulation requirements of the boilers are available only to the Springfield Boiler Company, the manufacturers of the boilers, it is not feasible to secure competition on the re-design recommended, the furnishing of materials and parts, and supervision of repairs. A firm proposal has been received for this part of the repairs from the Springfield Boiler Company in the amount of \$17,710. Bids have been received for the erection work as follows:

Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget for this repair work.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts for \$17,710 to the Springfield Boiler Company and for \$23,845 to the Henry Pratt Company for erection of the new headers.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these awards were made and authority given as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR EXTENSION OF UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of contracts for the extension of an underground electrical duct to provide electric service to the new six-story building of the Student and Staff Apartments on Green Street and Goodwin Avenue now under construction, as follows:

For furnishing and laying of the duct and providing the electrical cables—

The Square Deal Company is the lowest bidder on its division of the work. The Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., is the only bidder on the other phase of the work although bids were requested from ten firms. It is the opinion of the architects and Physical Plant Department engineers supervising this construction that in view of the small size of the job and the fact that Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., is at present the general contractor for the construction of the building, it will not be possible to secure competitive bids. The Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., bid is slightly less per foot than the cost for the same type of work under the contract for the construction of the first six-story building. The price is believed to be fair and reasonable.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board execute these contracts.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these contracts were awarded and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR HOT AND COLD WATER PUMPING FACILITIES IN ILLINOIS SURGICAL INSTITUTE

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$26,900 to the Dearborn Plumbing and Heating Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for installation of hot and cold water pumping facilities in the Illinois Surgical Institute (Orthopaedic Building) of the Research and Educational Hospitals. This work will include complete new installation of city water service from Wolcott Street to the Institute and installation of pumps and pressure tanks and hot water heater plus piping and valves.

This is part of the program of modernization and rehabilitation recommended by Holabird and Root in their report on electrical and mechanical survey of the buildings in the Chicago Professional Colleges made in 1945.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Construction of Utility Distribution System and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" (in Chicago).

I recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract subject to the release of funds by the Governor.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this contract was awarded and authority given as recommended.

**THE COURT DECISION IN THE CASE OF E. C. LEVERENZ
VS. BOARD OF TRUSTEES UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS**

(15) The Board of Trustees on November 29, 1949 (Minutes, page 945), authorized the President of the University to employ special counsel in proceedings instituted by the Leverenz Electric Company, Danville, Illinois, in the Circuit Court of Champaign County to secure an additional payment of \$8,785.33 on the contract for electrical work in the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building, and in such other proceedings as may be deemed advisable.

The contractor claimed the payment was due for extra work performed. The University and its architects denied the claim on the ground that the work was included in the original contract specifications. The dispute had previously gone through arbitration proceedings. The arbitrators reported two to one in favor of allowing the claim, but counsel for the University recommended against acceptance of these findings.

Special counsel was engaged and the case was tried. The decision of the Circuit Court, handed down on March 16, 1950, was in favor of the contractor. Counsel for the University recommended that the case be appealed. I did not approve the filing of an appeal. The brief for the University in the trial court was ably prepared and presented, and I felt that because of a technical difference in the specifications the University could not profit through further legal action.

I recommend, therefore, that

1. This claim be paid.
2. The Board authorize the payment of \$1,437.51 to the firm of Craig and Craig, Mattoon, Illinois, special counsel for the University in this case, for legal services and expenses incurred by that firm, as per bill rendered.
3. The Board authorize the payment of \$1,059.67 to the arbitrators for their services and expenses incurred in the arbitration proceedings. There were three arbitrators, one selected by each party and the third by the other two. It was agreed that each party would pay its arbitrator and one-half the fee and expenses of the third.
4. The payment of \$55.35 for court and reporting costs be authorized.
5. An appropriation of \$11,350, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made from the General Reserve Fund to cover these payments.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were adopted, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Forno, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; not voting, Governor Stevenson.

**CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF FIRE ESCAPE AT
MCKINLEY HOSPITAL**

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$5,890 to C. A. Petry and Sons, Champaign, the lowest bidder, for furnishing and erecting a spiral fire escape at the north end of McKinley Hospital in Urbana.

This is part of a fire protection improvement project which also includes enclosure of an elevator shaft in the attic, installation of fire doors between the center and south wings, and installation of a sprinkler system in the storage areas.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this award was approved and authority given as recommended.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(17) The Governor has approved the following releases of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

These are partial releases from an appropriation of \$1,215,000 of which \$880,000 has been budgeted for additions to the Power Plant, \$263,500 for remodeling of existing buildings. The Governor has previously released (Release No. 14) \$137,465 for the construction of new stairways in the Noyes Laboratory.

I recommend that the funds released be appropriated for the purposes specified.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATION OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUNDS

(19) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association is submitting to the Board of Trustees for their approval an appropriation of \$30,000 for the construction of a road and a cross connection between the wells of the airport and the golf course.

The road will provide a direct route from the golf course to the airport along the west side of the golf course and the east side of the airport. With this direct route, the airport bus can be used to transport students to the golf course without traveling extra miles. No charge to passengers is made for this service. In view of the benefit of the new road to the Institute of Aviation, no charge will be made to the Athletic Association unless extra trips in addition to the present airport schedules are required.

The road will also be made available for maintenance purposes since both wells will be located close to it.

The cross connection between the wells is desirable to provide for emergencies in the event trouble develops in either of the wells.

These arrangements are recommended by the Director of the Athletic Association, the Director of the Institute of Aviation, and the Comptroller.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this appropriation was approved.

REVISION OF BY-LAWS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(20) The Board of Directors of the University of Illinois Athletic Association has revised its by-laws, and they are submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval.

The revisions are chiefly in the area of business operations. The Comptroller has worked closely with the Athletic Association in preparing the revisions. The changes result in clarification of procedures, particularly in purchasing and contracting, and in reduction of procedures to the minimum necessary to maintain adequate internal check.

I recommend approval of the by-laws as revised.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Nickell, this revision was referred to the President and the Comptroller for clarification and presentation at the May meeting.

SALE OF BONDS TO FINANCE CONSTRUCTION OF THE SECOND SIX-STORY BUILDING OF THE STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENTS AT URBANA

(21) The Finance Committee recommends the sale of \$700,000 of revenue bonds to finance the construction of the second six-story building of the Student and Staff Apartments at Green Street and Goodwin Avenue, Urbana, to Blyth and Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder (in terms of interest rates). Four bids were received, representing nine companies.

The Blyth and Company proposal provides an effective interest rate of 2.5585 per cent. Bonds maturing from 1951 to 1961 will bear interest at the rate of $2\frac{3}{4}$ per cent; bonds maturing from 1962 to 1964 will bear interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent; and bonds maturing from 1965 to 1970 will bear interest at the rate of $2\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. Blyth and Company also offer a premium of \$181.30. This Company has proposed that principal and interest be payable at the Chicago Title and Trust Company. The Comptroller reports that Blyth and Company have met all requirements.

Proceeds from the sale of the bonds plus a State appropriation of \$338,000 will provide the \$1,038,000 required for the construction and equipment of the building.

A resolution for adoption by the Board has been prepared by Chapman and Cutler and is presented herewith for approval (see Appendix, page 1101).

TRANSFER OF LAND TO MEDICAL CENTER STEAM COMPANY

(23) On July 28, 1949 (Minutes, page 493), the Board of Trustees authorized the transfer of certain properties to the Medical Center Steam Company, including some parcels of property acquired from the Medical Center Commission for \$1,000 (Minutes, November 29, 1949, page 948).

Four additional lots owned by the Medical Center Commission are required by the Medical Center Steam Company. The Medical Center Commission proposes to transfer the additional lots to the University as a part of the \$1,000 purchase, and authority is required for transfer of the lots from the University to the Medical Center Steam Company.

I recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLVED: That when the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois shall acquire the following described real estate, or any parcels thereof, this Board does hereby authorize, empower, and direct the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Board, in the name and on behalf of this Board, to execute and deliver to Medical Center Steam Company, an Illinois corporation, a warranty deed or deeds conveying such real estate, either in whole in a single deed or in parcels from time to time, to such Steam Company, to wit:

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(25) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from March 1 to March 31, 1950 (see Appendix, page 1117).

This report was received for record.

REMODELING OF PART OF PHYSICAL PLANT SERVICE BUILDING

(26) One of the first-priority building needs recommended to the last General Assembly by the Board of Trustees was the remodeling for academic use of the old boiler room which forms part of the Physical Plant Service Building, the former power plant. This item was deleted from the list of capital appropriations finally made.

The need for this space remains acute. It is particularly acute because the addition to the Physics Laboratory, also a first-priority building item, was not included in the capital appropriation.

Because of this continuing need, the University Research Board and the Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations have continued to seek for a way to remodel for academic use the well-located north campus space available in the old boiler room. On November 19, 1948 (Minutes, page 172), the Board of Trustees authorized the expenditure of up to \$15,000 of the funds appropriated for the electronic digital computer, in connection with the preparation by Holabird and Root and Burgee of Chicago of plans for remodeling.

The first set of plans prepared by the architects involved extensive and costly changes; these were studied and modified to reduce to the functional minimum the changes in the building and the total cost of the project. Mr. Briggs, the University's architectural consultant, has gone over the final plans and has reported to the Committee on Nonrecurring Expenditures that they are satisfactory. Professor Huntington, the Chairman of the University's Building Program Committee, has also studied these plans and given his approval of them. Drawings and specifications have been prepared by the Physical Plant Department; these can be sent out at once with a call for bids, if the Board approves.

Adequate housing of two major programs of graduate instruction and research will be provided by the proposed remodeling. The first of these is a developing program in the physics of the solid state. This is headed by Professor Frederick Seitz, one of the world's leading men in this important field. The fundamental work which he and his colleagues are carrying on is of immediate significance not only to the Department of Physics, but also to every other department of the College of Engineering, since the engineering properties of solid materials are of such wide concern.

The other program which will be housed in the remodeled boiler room is that connected with the electronic digital computer. Three departments — Mathematics, Physics, and Electrical Engineering — are cooperating to carry this work forward, and the computing facilities which it will provide will be of important assistance to every department of the University engaged in work involving numbers. The borrowed space in which the computer project is now housed is already growing inadequate, and will be grossly inadequate when the computer itself is completed and placed in actual use, a few months from now. National attention has already been attracted by the rapid and healthy development of our computer program, and we wish to retain and improve our already strong position in this important field.

The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends that approval in principle be given to the project of remodeling for academic use the old boiler room in the Physical Plant Service Building, and that the Physical Plant Department be authorized to call for bids on the work involved. When these have been received and studied by the Physical Plant Department and the Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations, the matter will again be brought to the Board of Trustees for final action.

CONTRACTS FOR NATURAL HISTORY BUILDING REMODELING

(27) On February 16, 1950 (Minutes, page 995), the Board of Trustees appropriated funds for the remodeling and equipping of the fifth floor of the Natural History Building in Urbana for the Department of Physiology. Bids have been received for the ventilating and air-conditioning work and for the electrical work as follows:

CONTRACTS FOR REMODELING NOYES LABORATORY

(29) The Board of Trustees on November 29, 1949 (Minutes, page 947), appropriated the sum of \$50,000 for remodeling and equipping the third and fourth floors of Noyes Laboratory for the Bacteriology Department. Bids have been received for the remodeling work. The bids for the general work were received on a cost plus a fixed fee basis. Since this phase of the work included the installation of equipment, the amount of work required could not be known until the equipment had been definitely selected. The addition of equipment to remodeling made it difficult to obtain firm bids on the total project.

On the basis of the bids received, the total estimated cost of the project is revised to \$66,869. The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends that an additional appropriation of \$16,869 be made.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the following contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders in each case:

APPROPRIATION AND CONTRACTS FOR MICRO-ANALYTICAL LABORATORY

(30) Present facilities for micro-analysis in the Noyes Laboratory are inadequate. The room used for this purpose is in the west half of Noyes Laboratory which is subject to severe vibration from trucks on Mathews Avenue. Accurate use of the micro-balances requires freedom from vibration. In addition, the air-conditioning system has for many years caused difficulties and there have been numerous breakdowns during periods of heavy work. The service work of the micro-analytical laboratory has increased to such an extent that it has been necessary to send to commercial laboratories many of the analyses that could otherwise be done by the University.

It is proposed to remodel Rooms 151 and 154 of Noyes Laboratory and to install an air-conditioning system to maintain the rooms at 75 degrees F. temperature and at 55 degrees relative humidity.

Bids have been received for this project indicating that the work can be completed for \$19,830. The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations has reviewed this and recommends an appropriation of this amount.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of contracts to the lowest bidders in each case as follows:

FUNK FOREST NATURAL AREA

(31) On September 29, 1949 (Minutes, page 815), the Board of Trustees authorized acquisition, partly through purchase but largely through gifts, of a tract of 63.5 acres of virgin forest land in McLean County. Acquisition of this land has been consummated.

This tract is of great scientific interest to biologists. It is a fine example of the timber which nature through the centuries developed in central Illinois. As such, its preservation by the University fits into a world-wide plan of biologists to maintain for scientific study representative tracts of undisturbed timberland. It affords biologists in Illinois a unique opportunity to study prairie-grove forest.

The property is valued at \$30,000. The land, valued at \$5,000, was given by the owners — four members of the Funk family. Largely through the efforts of Mr. Eugene Funk, Jr., an alumnus of the University, other members of the Funk family gave \$15,000 toward the purchase. This sum was given through the Illini Achievement Fund. For members of the Funk family the establishment of the Funk Forest Natural Area serves as a memorial to their pioneer ancestor, Isaac Funk, who settled in central Illinois in 1823 and who acquired the original patent from the

federal government in 1833. Five thousand dollars was given by the University of Illinois Foundation. The remaining \$5,000 was appropriated by the University of Illinois Board of Trustees.

Access to the area from Route 66 will be provided by a strip of land three-quarters of a mile long and sixty feet wide to be deeded to the University as a separate gift.

Since the area is to remain in its natural state, the only major items of expense in this development will be for a woven-wire farm fence around the sixty-three-acre tract and along the right-of-way from the east, and the construction of a small suspension foot bridge.

Acquisition of this land had its beginning a year ago when Professor J. Nelson Spaeth, Head of the Department of Forestry at the University, was near this area while inspecting a maple grove owned and operated by Mrs. Hazel Funk Holmes, wife of Dr. Henry W. Holmes, Dean-Emeritus of the College of Education of Harvard University. Mrs. Holmes hoped that a large part of the original Funk timber tract might be preserved. Professor Spaeth and Mr. William H. Butterfield, Manager of the University of Illinois Foundation, carried on negotiations on behalf of the University.

I recommend that the tract be officially designated Funk Forest Natural Area of the University of Illinois and that the Board of Trustees adopt a resolution recording its appreciation of the generosity of the Funk family.

A list of donors follows (see Appendix, page 1118).

Resolution

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois records herewith its appreciation of the public-spirited generosity of the members of the Funk family whose donations of property and funds have made possible the acquisition by the University of the Funk Forest Natural Area in McLean County.

This forestry will be a living museum of natural history, a field laboratory for biological scientists and a state treasure—the last remnant of virgin prairie-grove timberland. For members of the Funk family it will be a memorial to a pioneer ancestry.

The Board directs its Secretary to send a copy of this resolution to each of the donors.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

CONTRACT FOR REMODELING OF TICE CLINIC FOR THE INSTITUTION FOR TUBERCULOSIS RESEARCH

(32) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$2,677 to the C. W. Haynes Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for remodeling of quarters in the Cook County Hospital for the Institution for Tuberculosis Research.

The Sixty-sixth General Assembly of Illinois established the Institution for Tuberculosis Research and appropriated funds for the production, distribution, and application of the bacillus Calmette-Guerin (BCG), and other methods and materials for the prevention of tuberculosis and for conducting research in tuberculosis.

Before the National Institute of Health will grant a license for the manufacture of the BCG vaccine, it is necessary that the office and manufacturing areas be separated. This remodeling will make it possible for the Institution for Tuberculosis Research to provide the sterile areas required for the manufacture of the BCG vaccine.

Funds are available in the State appropriation to the Institution for Tuberculosis Research.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this award was approved and authority was given as recommended.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

(33) A statement on the matter of the training of teachers of vocational agriculture.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the President of the Board was authorized to communicate the following statement to the State Board on Vocational Education.

On two previous occasions, in 1939 and 1947, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has taken official cognizance of proposals to establish Smith-Hughes teacher-training programs in agriculture in State institutions other than the University of Illinois. It came to the attention of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on April 19, 1950, that the State Board for Vocational Education will soon take action on the application of the Illinois State Normal University for the approval of a program of teacher training in vocational agriculture in order to qualify for federal funds. The Board of Trustees directed me to protest against such approval on the ground that it will result in unnecessary duplication of educational facilities and of public expense. It should not be overlooked that each dollar of federal funds received must be matched by a dollar of state funds.

The University of Illinois has been training teachers of vocational agriculture under the Smith-Hughes program since it was established in 1917. The University of Illinois has ample facilities to meet all demands for teachers of vocational agriculture. The priority of the University in this field, however, is a secondary consideration. The real public issue is: Does the state of Illinois need additional facilities to meet the needs of the high schools for such teachers?

The facts speak for themselves. There are at present 489 teachers of vocational agriculture under the Smith-Hughes program in the high schools of Illinois. The average tenure of service is about eight years. The largest number of replacements in any one year was fifty-four. The University of Illinois will this year graduate 102 students who will be qualified to teach vocational agriculture under the Smith-Hughes requirements.

In 1945 a Commission of the General Assembly to survey higher educational facilities in Illinois had a study made of the preparation of teachers of vocational agriculture. The Commission's report to the General Assembly included a recommendation that the State Board for Vocational Education approve no institution other than the University of Illinois for the preparation of teachers of vocational agriculture. The general pattern throughout the country is that the preparation of Smith-Hughes teachers of vocational agriculture is a function of the land-grant college. A healthy competition is assured among these numerous colleges.

If some of the Smith-Hughes graduates of the University of Illinois are going into other lines of work it is due, in part, to the surplus of teachers in the specialty of vocational agriculture. There is not now a demand, nor is there likely to be a demand, for more teachers of vocational agriculture than can be supplied by the University of Illinois. The shortage of well-prepared teachers lies elsewhere.

COOK COUNTY SCHOOL OF NURSING

(34) A request from Dr. Ivy that Grant Hospital be added to the list of affiliates with the Cook County School of Nursing.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Chicago Departments for consideration and recommendation.

CASE OF JESSIE TAYLOR VS. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(35) As authorized by the Board of Trustees on February 16, 1950 (Minutes, page 989), Mr. Joseph H. Hinshaw of the law firm of Hinshaw and Culbertson, Chicago, was employed as special counsel for the University in the complaint filed in the Court of Claims by Jessie Taylor against the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois claiming damages for alleged negligence and malpractice by the staff of the Department of Operative Dentistry.

The case came up for a hearing before the Court Commissioner in Chicago on April 4. After the Claimant had testified, Counsel for the University filed a

motion to dismiss the case. On April 18 the Court of Claims dismissed the case for "want of prosecution."

This report was received for record.

GRADUATE CURRICULA AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

Geography

This is a reorganization of the curriculum leading to the degrees of Master of Arts or Master of Science, and an extension of that program to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Geography.

Admission requirements: (1) General regulations governing admission of all graduate students; (2) at least eighteen hours of undergraduate work in geography in addition to a beginning course.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) General regulations established by the Graduate College; (2) students offering a thesis in partial fulfillment of the requirements for this degree must sustain an oral examination over the thesis and the general field of geography; (3) students who waive the thesis must sustain a written examination over the general field of geography.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies, and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Physiology

This is a reorganization of the curriculum leading to the degrees of Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Physiology. Graduate work in this area heretofore was administered by the Department of Zoology and Physiology. A curriculum leading to the master's degree in physiology had been established and in a few cases the doctor's degree had been awarded with the approval of the Graduate College although no formal program leading to such a degree has been approved.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) approximately fifteen hours of biology and twenty hours of chemistry.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) General requirements of the Graduate College; (2) at least four units of graduate work in physiology or closely related subjects; (3) at least two units representing an outside minor.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General requirements of the Graduate College with respect to residence, credit, minor work, and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

GRADUATE CURRICULA IN THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

DENTISTRY

Master of Science in Histology

This program is designed to provide graduate training for dental teachers and for investigators in the basic sciences related to dentistry.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) D.D.S. from fully accredited institution. (In special cases, a dental student who has not yet received his D.D.S. degree may be accepted for graduate work in this area providing his scholastic average is B or better.)

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science in Orthodontia

This curriculum is devised to train men for teaching and research in orthodontia.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) D.D.S. degree from fully accredited institution; (3) three quarters of organized postgraduate program in orthodontia.

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science in Oral Surgery

The purpose of this program is to train teachers and research workers in the field of oral surgery.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) D.D.S. or M.D. degree from fully accepted institution; (3) three quarters of organized postgraduate work in oral surgery.

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science in Pedodontics

The purpose of this program is to train teachers and research workers in the field of pedodontics.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) D.D.S. degree from fully accredited institution; (3) three quarters of organized postgraduate program in pedodontics.

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

MEDICINE AND PHARMACY

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Anatomy

This program is designed to train teachers for colleges of medicine and to stimulate and develop research in the basic medical sciences.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) premedical training in the fundamental basic sciences.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of

work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies, and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Bacteriology

This curriculum is intended to train students for future careers in medical research and teaching, in the fundamentals and applied technique in diagnostic work and investigators suitable for research positions in industry.

Admission requirements: General requirements governing admission of all graduate students.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examination; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Biological Chemistry

This program is designed to train teachers of the subject for colleges of medicine, dentistry, and pharmacy.

Admission requirements: General requirements governing admission of all graduate students.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science in Medicine

This program is devised to train students for a keener approach to the theory and practice of medicine by emphasis on the basic sciences, to provide experience in research method in the clinical field and to develop clinical teachers.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) an M.D. degree. (Medical students who have received the bachelor's degree will be permitted to take graduate work in medicine. In such cases the graduate degree will not be awarded before the M.D.)

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science in Obstetrics and Gynecology

This curriculum is devised to train investigators and teachers for medical colleges and to stimulate a keener scientific approach to the practice of the specialty of obstetrics and gynecology.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements of the Graduate College; (2) an M.D. degree.

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science in Ophthalmology

This curriculum is designed for the student who is interested in pursuing investigational phases relating to the eye.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) an M.D. degree; (3) one year of postgraduate work or residency in ophthalmology.

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work,

including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Pathology

This program is designed to provide advanced study of the mechanisms of pathogenesis of functional and structural expressions of disease.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) completion of undergraduate medical basic science courses, including general and special pathology in Class A medical or dental schools, or (3) completion of medical courses in microscopic anatomy, biochemistry, and physiology (Anatomy 404-405, Biological Chemistry 301, Physiology 324, 325, 326 or equivalent).

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Pharmaceutical Chemistry

This curriculum constitutes a necessary part of a program for the creative advancement of rational medication in the health sciences.

Admission requirements: (1) General regulations governing admission of all graduate students; (2) B.S. in Pharmacy from accredited institution.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Pharmacognosy

This program is designed to train teachers and research workers in the field of pharmacognosy and in colleges of pharmacy.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Pharmacology

The purpose of this program is to train teachers of pharmacology in colleges of medicine, dentistry, and pharmacy, and to stimulate research efforts in this field.

Admission requirements: General requirements governing admission of all graduate students.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation

The aim and objective of this curriculum is to train future investigators and teachers in the field of psychiatrics.

Admission requirements: (1) General regulations of the Graduate College; (2) an M.D. degree.

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Physiology

The objective of this curriculum is to train physicians in the application of basic science to the practice of medicine and to train persons seeking a career in medical research and teaching in the basic medical sciences.

Admission requirements: General requirements governing admission of all graduate students.

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

Master of Science in Radiology

The aim of this curriculum is to stimulate research in the field and to develop critical investigators and intelligent teachers in this field.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements of the Graduate College; (2) an M.D. degree. (In exceptional cases, an advanced medical student will be permitted to take graduate work in radiology in conjunction with his medical studies. In such cases the graduate degree will not be awarded before the M.D.)

Degree requirements: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Surgery

This program is designed to bring the student into contact with scientific phases of surgery by studying methods of correction of malnutrition in surgical diseases, complications in post-operative care and related other phases. The scope of this program lies in the area of the basic sciences. Surgical technique is not involved.

Admission requirements: (1) General requirements governing admission of all graduate students; (2) an M.D. degree. (A medical student with two years of training will be permitted to take graduate work in surgery. In such cases the graduate degree will not be awarded before the M.D.)

Degree requirements:

For the master's degree: (1) One full year in residence; (2) nine units of work, including four units of research; (3) an acceptable thesis, plus a comprehensive examination.

For the doctor's degree: (1) General regulations with respect to residence, credit, language proficiencies and preliminary and final examinations; (2) an acceptable thesis.

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$700,000
STUDENT-STAFF APARTMENT (SECOND UNIT)
REVENUE BONDS**

RESOLUTION authorizing and providing for the issue of \$700,000 Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) Revenue Bonds for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of constructing the second unit of Student-Staff Apartments located on Green Street in Urbana, Illinois, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), for the purpose of paying the cost of the maintenance and operation thereof, and payment of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds.

* * * *

WHEREAS pursuant to "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, equip, com-

plete, operate, control and manage student residence halls, staff housing facilities, dormitories, health and physical education buildings, or other revenue producing building or buildings, defining the duties of such Board with respect to operation and maintenance thereof, charge fees or rates for the use thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved June 30, 1945, L. 1945, p. 1753; title as amended by Act approved July 21, 1945, this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is authorized to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing, equipping or completing the construction and equipment of student-staff apartments (second unit) payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof; and

WHEREAS the Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth General Assemblies of the State of Illinois appropriated the sum of \$338,000 applicable to the construction of a second unit of student-staff apartments and responsive to said appropriations this Board of Trustees has heretofore acquired the property located on Green Street, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, and described as follows:

Situated in the State of Illinois, County of Champaign, and City of Urbana, in the west half of the Northeast Quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of the Northeast Quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (18) in Township Nineteen North (T19N), Range Nine East (R9E) of the Third Principal Meridian and being known as parts of Lots Eleven (11) and Twelve (12) of the W. M. Goodwin's Addition to the City of Urbana as recorded in Deed Book Twenty-four (24), Page Five Hundred Eighty-two (582), of the records of said County and also being sometimes referred to as Lots at the Southeast Corner of Green Street and Goodwin Avenue, Urbana, Illinois, and being more fully bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at an iron pin in the south property line of Green Street, said iron pin being two hundred eight and seventy-five hundredths (208.75) feet distant in an easterly direction from the intersection of the east property line of Goodwin Avenue and the south property line of Green Street; thence easterly along the south property line of Green Street, a distance of ninety and twenty-five hundredths (90.25) feet to an iron pin; thence in a southerly direction along a line parallel to the east property line of Goodwin Avenue, a distance of three hundred thirty-five and fifty-two hundredths (335.52) feet to an iron pin; thence in a westerly direction, a distance of one hundred and two hundredths (100.02) feet to an iron pin; thence in a northerly direction along a line parallel to the east property line of Goodwin Avenue, a distance of one hundred sixty-four and thirteen hundredths (164.13) feet to an iron pin; thence in an easterly direction and at ninety degrees (90°) to the preceding course, a distance of nine and seventy-three hundredths (9.73) feet to an iron pin; thence in a northerly direction and at ninety-degrees (90°) to the preceding course and parallel to the east property line of Goodwin Avenue, a distance of one hundred seventy and five tenths (170.5) feet to the place of beginning, containing seven hundred and thirty-one thousandths (0.731) of an acre, more or less, but subject to all legal highways.

WHEREAS in addition to said appropriations made by the Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth General Assemblies of the State of Illinois, it will be necessary for this Board of Trustees to raise the sum of \$700,000 to complete the construction thereof and fully equip said student-staff apartments (second unit); and

WHEREAS in order to produce the additional \$700,000 necessary for the completion and equipment of said student-staff apartments (second unit) located on the property hereinabove described on Green Street, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, it will be necessary that this Board of Trustees borrow money and issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$700,000 as authorized pursuant to the Act hereinabove referred to;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1. That it be and it is hereby determined by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, that it is necessary and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that it borrow the sum of \$700,000 to complete the construction of and to fully equip the student-staff apartments (second unit) located on the property described in the preambles of this resolution on Green Street, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, and in evidence thereof issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$700,000.

SECTION 2. That said bonds shall be designated "Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) Revenue Bonds," be numbered 1 to 700, inclusive, be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, be dated May 1, 1950, bonds numbered 1 to 345, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and one-fourth per cent ($2\frac{1}{4}\%$) per annum, bonds numbered 346 to 462, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent ($2\frac{1}{2}\%$) per annum, and bonds numbered 463 to 700, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of two and three-fourths per cent ($2\frac{3}{4}\%$) per annum, interest payable October 1, 1950 and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year, and to become due as follows:

provided, however, said bonds shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity, on any interest payment date at the option of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on or after April 1, 1953, and up to and including October 1, 1954, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, and

a premium of one and one-half per cent (1½%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1955, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1958, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall, with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois; and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

SECTION 3. Any of said bonds may be registered as to principal at anytime prior to maturity in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University to be kept in the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said Depositary as registrar. After such registration no transfer of such bonds shall be valid unless made on the said books by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney and similarly noted on such bonds. Upon presentation of any of such bonds registered as to principal, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, executed by the registered owner, or by a duly authorized attorney, such bond shall be transferred upon such books. The registered owner of any such bond registered as to principal shall also have the right to cause the same to be discharged from registration by transfer to bearer, in which case transferability by delivery shall be restored, and thereafter the principal of such bond when due shall be payable to the person presenting such bond. Any such bond registered as payable to bearer may be registered again in the name of the owner with the same effect as the first registration thereof. Successive registrations and transfers as aforesaid may be made from time to time as desired. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

Said bonds shall be signed by the President and two members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, sealed with the corporate seal of said University, attested by the Secretary of said Board, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signatures of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

SECTION 4. That said bonds and coupons, and form for registration, shall be in substantially the following form:

and is payable solely from the net revenue to be derived from the operation of said building, and not otherwise, and this bond and the series of which it forms a part do not constitute an indebtedness of said University or of the State of Illinois within any constitutional or statutory limitation, and neither the taxing power nor the general credit of said University or the State of Illinois is pledged to the payment of this bond or the interest thereon.

Under said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and other laws supplementary thereto, and the said resolution adopted pursuant thereto, the net revenue derived from the operation of said building shall be deposited with the Chicago Title and Trust Company, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, under a Deposit Agreement entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the said Company, and used only for the purpose of paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of and interest on the bonds of said University that are issued under authority of said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and the resolution of the Board of Trustees hereinabove referred to, and which are

payable by their terms only from the net revenue of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) located on Green Street, in the City of Urbana, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Illinois, and the applicable resolutions of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, have been done and have happened and have been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law and that provision has been made for depositing the net revenue derived from the operation of said building with the said Chicago Title and Trust Company, to be applied in the manner as hereinabove set forth.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$700,000, all of like date and of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 700, inclusive, and said bonds are subject to redemption as a whole, or in part, in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after April 1, 1953, and up to and including October 1, 1954, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, and a premium of one and one-half per cent (1½%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1955, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1958, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1959, or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption; such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond shall pass by delivery unless it is registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University kept at the office of the Depositary hereinabove mentioned, such registration to be noted on the back hereof. After such registration no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on such books by the registered holder in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing and similarly noted hereon, but this bond may be transferred in like manner to bearer, and thereupon transferability by delivery shall be restored and it may again from time to time be registered or transferred to bearer as before. Such registration, however, shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons hereto appertaining, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer hereof.

This bond and all other bonds of this issue shall have all of the qualities of negotiable instruments, and during such time as this bond is payable to bearer, the same and each of the coupons hereto appertaining may be negotiated by delivery by any person having possession thereof, howsoever such possession may have been acquired, and any holder who shall have taken this bond while so payable to bearer or any of said coupons from any person for value and without notice shall thereby acquire absolute title to this bond or to such coupons as the case may be, free of any defenses enforceable against any prior holder and free from all equities and claims of ownership of any such prior holder, and the said University and any paying agent may deem and treat the bearer of this bond, or, if registered, the person in whose name it is registered and the bearer of any interest coupons appertaining hereto as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes.

Said University of Illinois hereby covenants with the holder of this bond that it will keep and perform all the covenants and agreements in the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of said University of Illinois, authorizing the issue of this bond and the series of which it forms a part and as provided in the Deposit Agreement hereinabove referred to, and hereby irrevocably obligates itself to deposit the net revenue derived from the operation of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) with the said Depositary, to administer the said net revenue as provided for in and by said Deposit Agreement, and to establish from time to time charges and fees for the use of said buildings and to maintain and collect charges and fees sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing of said buildings, and pay the principal of and interest upon all revenue bonds which by their terms are payable from such revenues until all of such bonds have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest.

That upon the issuance of any revenue bonds herein provided for there be and there is hereby established a fiscal year for the operation of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) located on Green Street, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, and said fiscal year shall commence the first day of July of each year and end the last day of the next succeeding June and all revenues derived from the operation thereof shall be set aside as collected in a separate account and fund, a part

The University covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), and that it will furnish to the Depository, on or before October 1, 1951, for that period from May 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951, and on or before October 1 in each year thereafter, so long as any bonds remain outstanding, a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses and the net revenues of the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) for the twelve months' period ended on the next preceding June 30th. The Depository shall have no duty to request any such information nor any duty relative to the statements from time to time furnished by the University, except to preserve the same for the inspection of the holders of the bonds during usual business hours.

SECTION 2. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds hereinabove referred to that all of the revenues, income, receipts, profits, charges, fees, rents and returns derived from the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) and the operation thereof shall be collected by the University and, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), shall be paid over to the Depository semi-annually not later than July 31 for the previous six months' period ending June 30th each year, and January 31 for the previous six months' period ending December 31 of each year; provided, however, there shall be deposited on September 1, 1950 the net revenues for the period from May 1, 1950 to September 1, 1950, which amount, together with sufficient funds derived from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds will be such that the sum so deposited will not be less than the interest requirements due on said bonds October 1, 1950, plus Depository's fees, and the University hereby covenants and agrees so to do. All funds received by the Depository under the terms of this agreement, after deducting fees and expenses of such Depository, shall be held by the Depository in a special trust account to be known

as the sinking fund and shall be disbursed or applied by the Depositary as hereinafter provided.

At least five days before each semi-annual interest payment date the Depositary shall, if the sinking fund moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose, set aside an amount equal to the interest becoming due on the next ensuing interest payment date on all of the said bonds then outstanding, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of such interest, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of such interest on the next ensuing interest payment date upon surrender of the interest coupons becoming due on the said interest date and appertaining to the outstanding bonds.

At least five days before the express date of maturity of the bonds, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund, if such moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose after making provision for payment of the interest becoming due on the outstanding bonds on such maturity date, an amount equal to the principal of the bonds then maturing, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of the principal of the said maturing bonds, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of the principal of the said bonds upon surrender of the said bonds.

If, upon the fortieth day before any interest payment date, the Depositary has cash in the sinking fund after setting aside an amount sufficient to pay interest becoming due on all outstanding bonds on the next two ensuing interest payment dates and to pay the principal and premium, if any, of any bonds theretofore called for redemption and not yet redeemed and the principal of all bonds becoming due on the next two ensuing principal payment dates, such cash shall be applied by the Depositary to the redemption on the next ensuing interest payment date of outstanding bonds, which by their terms are redeemable, in an amount sufficient to exhaust as nearly as may be such cash, after deducting therefrom and paying all costs and expenses of such redemption.

The said bonds are each in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and are numbered from 1 to 700, inclusive. All bonds redeemed through the operation of the sinking fund, together with the appertaining interest coupons, shall be cancelled by the Depositary and delivered to the Treasurer of the University. The Depositary shall keep a record of the numbers of all bonds so redeemed.

Notice of redemption through the operation of the sinking fund shall be published by the Depositary, either in the name of the University or in the name of the Depositary, as the Depositary may determine, once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption. Such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois. Such notice shall with substantial accuracy:

(a) Designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois;

(b) If the bonds to be redeemed are less than all of those outstanding, designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and

(c) State that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of the principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of the bonds so called for redemption will cease.

Upon publication of notice of redemption of any bonds through the operation of the sinking fund, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund an amount sufficient to pay and redeem the said bonds and such funds be and are hereby appropriated irrevocably for that purpose, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply such funds to the payment and redemption of the said bonds on or after the specified redemption date upon surrender of the said bonds, together with all unmatured interest coupons thereto appertaining.

SECTION 3. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds, hereinabove referred to, that it will, so long as any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, keep in the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois, books for the registration and transfer as to principal of bonds of the said issue, and the said Depositary is hereby appointed the agent of the Uni-

versity, with the title of Registrar, for the purpose of registering and transferring the said bonds as to principal only.

As to each bond registered, as to principal only, the person or entity in whose name the same is for the time being registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, except for the purpose of receiving payment of the outstanding coupons, if any, appertaining thereto, and so long as the same shall be so registered payment of or on account of the principal thereof shall be made by the Depositary, as paying agent, only to the registered owner thereof. The bearer of any of the said bonds which shall not be registered as to principal and the bearer of any coupon appertaining to any such bond, whether or not such bond shall be registered as to principal, shall for all purposes be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner of such bond or coupon as the case may be for the purpose of receiving payment thereof and for all other purposes, and the Depositary, as paying agent, shall be fully protected in making payment of any such bond or coupon to the bearer thereof.

SECTION 4. The Depositary has executed this agreement and agrees to carry out the terms and provisions hereof on its part, but only upon and subject to the following express terms and conditions:

(a) The Depositary shall not be responsible for any recitals herein or in the said bonds or for the validity of this agreement or of the said bonds, nor for the performance of any of the agreements herein contained on the part of the University.

(b) The Depositary shall not be accountable for any of the proceeds of the bonds or of the revenues of the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), nor for any other funds of the University, except such funds as may be deposited hereunder. The Depositary shall not be required to allow interest on any funds at any time deposited hereunder. The Depositary may become the owner of bonds of the said issue with the same rights which it would have if not Depositary.

(c) The Depositary shall not be liable for any action taken or omitted to be taken by it in good faith and in the exercise of reasonable care and believed by it to be within the discretion or power conferred upon it by this agreement, nor shall the Depositary be responsible for the consequences of any error of judgment, and the Depositary shall not be answerable except for its own acts, neglect and default, nor for any loss unless the same shall happen through the negligence or want of good faith of the Depositary.

(d) The Depositary shall be entitled to advice of counsel concerning all matters arising under this agreement and its duties hereunder, and may in all cases pay such reasonable compensation as it shall deem proper to such counsel and all such outlays and expenditures shall be repaid to the Depositary out of the sinking fund money.

(e) The Depositary shall not be required to give any bond or surety in respect of the exercise of the duties and powers conferred hereby or otherwise in respect of the premises.

(f) The Depositary shall have a first lien hereunder upon the sinking fund moneys for reasonable compensation, expenses, advances and counsel fees incurred in and about the exercise and performance of its powers and duties hereunder, and the cost and expense of defending against any liability in the premises of any character whatsoever. The compensation of the Depositary shall not be limited to or by any provision of law in regard to the compensation of a trustee of an express trust.

(g) The Depositary at the time acting hereunder may at any time resign by giving not less than sixty (60) days' written notice to the University specifying the date when such resignation takes effect.

SECTION 5. The University covenants that in case the Depositary at the time acting hereunder shall resign or be dissolved or shall be in the course of dissolution or liquidation or otherwise become incapable of acting hereunder, the University will forthwith appoint a successor Depositary which shall be a trust company or bank in good standing located in the State of Illinois and having a capital and surplus of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000), if there be such a trust company or bank willing, qualified and able to accept the appointment upon reasonable or customary terms.

Every successor Depositary appointed hereunder shall execute, acknowledge and deliver to its predecessor and also to the University an instrument in writing accepting such appointment hereunder, and thereupon such successor Depositary, without any further act, deed or conveyance, shall become fully vested with all of the estates, rights, powers, duties and obligations of its predecessor, and every predecessor Depositary shall deliver all moneys and securities, together with a record of the amount and the numbers of the outstanding bonds, to its successor; provided, however, that before such delivery is required or made, all fees, advances and expenses of the retiring Depositary shall be paid in full.

Any corporation into which the Depositary or any successor to it may be merged or converted or with which it or any successor to it may be consolidated, or any corporation resulting from any merger, conversion or consolidation to which the Depositary, or any successor to it shall be a party, shall be the successor Depositary under this agreement without the execution or filing of any paper on the part of either of the parties hereto.

SECTION 6. Nothing in this agreement expressed or implied is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person, firm or corporation, other than the parties hereto and the holders of the said bonds and the coupons thereto appertaining, any right, remedy or claim, legal or equitable, under or by reason of this agreement or any covenant, condition or stipulation hereof.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF said University of Illinois, acting by and through its Board of Trustees, has caused this agreement to be signed in its name by the President of the Board of Trustees and the Treasurer thereof and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by the Secretary thereof, and said Chicago Title and Trust Company has caused this agreement to be signed in its corporate name by one of its Vice Presidents and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by one of its Assistant Secretaries, all as of the day and year first above written.

SECTION 7. Said University hereby covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), and that it will furnish to the Depositary and to the original purchasers of said bonds on or before October 1 in each year so long as any bonds remain outstanding a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses, and the net revenues of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) for the twelve months' period ending on the next preceding June 30.

SECTION 8. The University covenants that while any of the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding it will establish charges and fees for the use of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) and all of the facilities thereof adjusted so as to provide revenues at all times sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, insuring and repairing the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), to pay the interest from time to time becoming due on the said bonds from time to time outstanding, and to provide for the payment of the principal of such bonds at maturity.

SECTION 9. It is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any revenue bonds issued hereunder are outstanding no additional revenue bonds shall be issued which, by their terms, are payable from the revenues of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) located on Green Street, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, unless and until all revenue bonds issued pursuant to the terms of this resolution have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest, or until provision shall have been made for such payment in full.

SECTION 10. Said University of Illinois hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, or any of them, that it will punctually perform all duties with reference to said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois, including the making and collecting of sufficient charges and fees for the use of said properties and all of the facilities thereof, and segregating the revenue thereof and the application of the income and revenue thereof, as provided by this resolution; and it hereby covenants and agrees not to sell, lease, loan, mortgage or in any manner dispose of said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit), including any and all extensions and improvements that may be made thereto, until all of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall have been paid in full, both principal and interest, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment thereof in full, and the said University further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously operate said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) and maintain and keep in full force and effect at all times adequate insurance for the protection of said properties, including multi-risk insurance, covering loss or damage to said properties and use and occupancy insurance covering loss of use of said properties. The cost of maintaining all insurance shall be deemed to be an operating charge and shall be paid only from revenues.

Any proceeds derived by said University from any multi-risk insurance shall be applied to the payment of the said University's reasonable and necessary costs in reconstruction, repair or rehabilitation of the said properties and any proceeds derived from any use and occupancy insurance shall be applied in the same manner and to the same effect as gross operating revenues.

SECTION 11. The provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between the University of Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after the issuance of the bonds no changes, additions, alterations or amendments of any kind shall be made to this resolution in any manner, until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder, and interest thereon, shall be paid in full, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment of all bonds hereby authorized and interest thereon in full.

SECTION 12. Any holder of a bond or bonds, or any of the coupons of any bond or bonds, issued under the provisions of this resolution, may either in law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceeding, enforce or compel the performance of all duties required by this resolution or the acts under which the bonds hereby authorized are issued, including the fixing, maintaining and collecting of such charges and fees for the use of such properties and all facilities thereof as will be sufficient for all the purposes provided by this resolution, and the application of income and revenue therefrom.

SECTION 13. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.

SECTION 14. That Trustees Park Livingston and Frances B. Watkins be and they are hereby designated and directed to execute the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) Revenue Bonds, together with the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and the said President, Secretary and Treasurer of this Board of Trustees, be and they are each of them hereby authorized and directed to execute all instruments, papers, documents and agreements necessary or convenient to accomplish the issue and delivery of the said Student-Staff Apartments (Second Unit) Revenue Bonds to the purchaser thereof.

SECTION 15. That said revenue bonds shall be executed as provided herein as soon after this resolution becomes effective as may be, be deposited with the Treasurer of said University, and be by him delivered to Blyth & Co., Inc., the purchasers thereof, upon receipt of the purchase price, the contract for the sale thereto heretofore entered into be and the same is hereby in all respects ratified and approved. Any

accrued interest or premium derived from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in the sinking fund hereinabove provided and applied toward payment of interest or principal of said bonds as thereby required, and there shall also be deposited in said sinking fund out of the proceeds of the sale of said bonds a sum which together with the net revenues for the period ending September 1, 1950, will be sufficient to pay interest and Depositary fees due October 1, 1950.

SECTION 16. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

May 19-20, 1950



The May meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Union Building, at the University, in Urbana, on Friday, May 19, and Saturday, May 20, 1950, according to the following schedule:

Friday, May 19, 8:00 p.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

Saturday, May 20, 9:30 a.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened in executive session on Friday evening, the following members and officers were present: President Williamson, Mr. Forno, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins; Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board during the evening.

Provost Griffith was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and Dean C. C. Caveny of the Chicago Undergraduate Division.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PROVOST GRIFFITH

The Board considered the following matters presented by the Provost acting for the President of the University.

RATES OF PAY FOR BUILDING TRADES

(1) The Board of Trustees has authorized the appointment of a fact-finding committee to make an investigation of wage rates in Piatt County to be paid for construction work at Robert Allerton Park and report on the same to the President of the University and to the Board of Trustees. This Committee is composed of one member appointed by the Illinois State Federation of Labor, one member appointed by the President of the University, and a third member selected by the first two; provided that if they do not agree upon a candidate within ten days the Director of the State Department of Public Works and Buildings shall be asked to appoint the third member.

The personnel of this Committee is Mr. Robert L. Gordon, Urbana, former Director of the State Department of Labor, Mr. Donald E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, and Mr. Winfield Meyer, Deputy Director of the State Department of Public Welfare.

At a hearing held recently, Mr. Meyer of this Committee brought to the attention of Director Dickason a memorandum of agreement entered into between the State Department of Labor and the international representatives of several building trade unions specifying how rates of pay for building tradesmen in the employ of the state of Illinois shall be determined. On June 28, 1949, the Governor authorized the Director of the State Department of Labor to distribute this agreement to the Code Departments and the elected state officials. This agreement has never been brought to the attention of the University of Illinois officially and, in fact, was not known to University officials until it was shown to the Director of Nonacademic Personnel informally by the Deputy Director of the Department of Public Welfare.

This matter was discussed at length.

The Provost recommended that no action be taken to change the agreement now in effect, but that the fact-finding committee continue its investigation on the basis of the existing agreement.

No action was taken.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR DEAN LOUIS N. RIDENOUR

(2) Dean Louis N. Ridenour of the Graduate College has requested leave of absence without pay for the period July 1, 1950, to September 1, 1951, to accept an assignment as Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Air Force, for Development. The Secretary has formally requested the University to make Dean Ridenour's services available.

The President recommends that Dean Ridenour be granted leave of absence for the period indicated, one month (July) to be with pay to cover normal vacation allowance and the balance of the leave from August 1, 1950, to September 1, 1951, to be without pay.

Dean Ridenour expects to keep in close touch with the University and to make visits to the campus periodically during the period of his leave of absence to consult with his staff and other administrative officers regarding University matters.

I recommend that the President be authorized to make the necessary provisions for the administration of the Graduate College during Dean Ridenour's absence.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this leave was granted as recommended.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 1005 WEST NEVADA STREET, URBANA

(3) It is necessary to provide additional space and more adequate quarters for the Psychological Clinic, now housed at 404 South Mathews Avenue, Urbana. This building must eventually be vacated because it is on a part of the site of the proposed Biology Building.

The University has an opportunity to purchase the property at 1005 West Nevada Street, Urbana, which has been offered at a price of \$58,500. Action in the

near future is necessary to secure it at that figure. The house on the property is large and has been well maintained. Remodeling and extension of utilities to make it usable by the Psychological Clinic is estimated to cost \$15,000. A specific recommendation on that will be submitted later if the Board approves the purchase of this property.

In addition to the immediate use which can be made of this property, it is in an area of contemplated campus development. The south end of the property joins the campus; the University also owns the adjoining properties at 1003 and 1001 West Nevada to the east.

The Board of Trustees has authorized negotiations (Minutes, January 12, 1950, page 964) for acquisition of properties of this kind in Urbana-Champaign.

The Provost, the Comptroller, and the Director of the Physical Plant recommend the purchase of this property.

I concur and request that the officers of the Board of Trustees be authorized to conclude the necessary contracts, subject to the release of funds by the Governor from the State appropriation for land acquisition.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, this purchase was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Stevenson.

At this point, Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board.

USE OF UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS FOR POLITICAL MEETINGS

(4) A report of replies to a questionnaire sent to presidents of the universities in the Association of American Universities, on their practice with respect to political meetings in university buildings (see Minutes, April 19, 1950, page 1068).

The Secretary presented in this connection a summary of replies to a questionnaire sent out by him on request of Mr. Wirt Herrick, Chairman of the Committee on General Policy, to whom the matter had been referred.

After discussion, action was deferred to the June meeting. The Secretary was requested to send full information to all the members of the Board.

COMMITTEE ON CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS

Mrs. Watkins presented the following report of a meeting of the Committee on Chicago Departments held in Chicago April 21, 1950.

Present: Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Chairman, Mrs. Frances B. Watkins, and Mr. Park Livingston, members of the Committee; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Mr. C. S. Havens, Mr. C. H. Bowman, Mr. H. A. Hazleton, Mr. H. W. Pearce, and Mr. Amos Watts.

Mr. Morey presented a report on the offer, conveyance, and lease prepared by the Medical Center Commission for use in connection with the Chicago housing projects. He reported that the documents were a complete revision of those originally prepared by Chapman and Cutler and did not conform to the actions of the Board of Trustees on April 21, 1949, which action resulted from principles arrived at in a conference between representatives of the University, the Medical Center Commission, and the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States on March 29, 1949.

Mr. Morey indicated that the most important points of difference were as follows:

- A. No provision for University approval of the letting of all contracts.
- B. No provision for supervision of construction by the University.
- C. The rental to be paid by the University to the Medical Center Commission is not limited to the amount necessary to amortize the loan.

After thorough discussion, Mr. Livingston moved that plans and specifications not be delivered to the Medical Center Commission until complete agreement had

been reached between the University and the Medical Center Commission on the details of the offer, conveyance, and lease and that Mr. Amos Watts of Chapman and Cutler be authorized and directed to confer with representatives of the Medical Center Commission in an effort to reach agreement on an offer, conveyance, and lease in accord with the principles approved by the Board of Trustees on April 21, 1949, as represented in the original documents prepared by Chapman and Cutler and amended by the University.

The motion was seconded by Mrs. Watkins and unanimously approved by the Committee.

Under the Civil Service Law and Rules, written charges as grounds for request for discharge have been filed against Thomas R. Allen, Storekeeper in the Department of Chemistry on Navy Pier, by his supervisor, Dr. Carl R. Meloy, Chairman of the Division of Physical Sciences. These charges are supported by Dr. H. W. Bailey, Associate Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the Pier.

Under the established procedure, Mr. Allen was suspended on May 4, 1950, pending the hearing of these charges.

The charges are as follows:

1. Habitual tardiness
2. Failure to follow written instructions
3. Breaking of department rules
4. Failure to establish adequate inventory records
5. Working personal project during working hours
6. Lack of supervisory aptitude
7. Failure to take proper precautions for security and care of University property
8. Lack of proper attitude and cooperation toward other staff members
9. Attempt to falsify records for absence

The Board considered the following matters presented by the Provost acting for the President of the University.

**CONTRACTS FOR REMODELING OF PHYSICAL PLANT
SERVICE BUILDING**

(1) As authorized by the Board of Trustees on April 19, 1950 (Minutes, page 1080), bids have been received for the remodeling of the Physical Plant Service Building. A complete report of bids is presented.

The Dean of the Graduate College, the Chairman of the Building Program Committee, the University Architect, and the Comptroller recommend an award of a contract for the general work to the John Felmley Company, Urbana, Illinois, on the basis of their lowest base bid of \$241,000, adjusted for the following alternates which they recommend be accepted:

General work—John Felmley Company.....	\$241 000	
1. Omit finishing of concrete ceilings— deduct.....	\$ 4 500	
2. Omit general fireproofing of structural steel—deduct.....	10 000

For the electrical work, alternate bids were taken on substituting incandescent for fluorescent lighting. It is recommended that the electrical contract be awarded to R. A. Bland Electric Company, Champaign, Illinois, which, on the basis of the alternate bid, is the lowest bidder, at a net figure of \$36,665.

For the mechanical work, it is recommended that awards be made to the lowest bidders as follows:

A budget of the project is submitted showing it can be completed for \$320,000, as estimated on April 19. (The sum of \$9,000 has been expended for plans and specifications as authorized by the Board on November 19, 1948.)

The sum of \$207,500 is available in the State appropriation for capital purposes, subject to release by the Governor. The remainder, or \$112,500, will require an appropriation from the General Reserve.

I recommend that (1) these contracts be awarded and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute them; (2) a supplementary appropriation of \$112,500 be made from General Reserve for this project.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE 1950 SUMMER SESSION STAFF

(3) I submit the budget for the 1950 Summer Session. It provides for an eight-week session at Urbana-Champaign and the Chicago Undergraduate Division (see Appendix, page 1138).

Salaries of all members of the faculty who are recommended for appointments to the Summer Session staff are computed on the basis of two-ninths of the salary of the academic year for two months of summer service. This is in accordance with the terms of employment of the academic, administrative, research, and extension staffs authorized by the Board of Trustees on January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 952). No additional compensation is paid to staff members whose regular appointments require services on a full-year basis.

The budget totals \$538,494 for Urbana-Champaign, \$91,186 for the Chicago Undergraduate Division, and \$20,000 to be assigned by the Dean of the Summer Session in terms of enrollment demands.

I recommend that:

1. The appointments to the Summer Session staff and the allocation for unassigned salaries be approved as submitted.

2. The President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments, including additional appointments and acceptance of resignations, as are necessary in accordance with the needs of the University.

There is also submitted a separate list of appointments of persons who are being appointed for the Summer Session only and are not on the permanent faculty although some of them have served in previous summer sessions.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(4) The Governor has approved the following releases of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

Release No. 25

"For Equipment for Buildings Enumerated Above (i.e., in the appropriation Act) at Urbana-Champaign" \$ 190 000
This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$365,000. The funds now released are for movable equipment for the Animal Sciences Laboratory.

Release No. 26

"For Permanent Improvements at Chicago Construction of Utility Distribution System and Remodeling of Existing Buildings" 26 900
This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$190,000. The funds now released are for installation of new water services in the Illinois Surgical Institute.

Release No. 27

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Construction of Animal Science Laboratory" 2 097 500
This is the major release from an appropriation of \$2,160,000. The Governor has previously released (Release No. 11) \$62,500 for architectural and engineering services for this project. The funds now released are for the construction of the Animal Sciences Laboratory.

I recommend that the funds released be appropriated for the purposes specified.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these funds were appropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Forno, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Stevenson.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(5) The Committee on Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

I concur.

These proposed improvements have been carefully studied by the Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations. Its reports giving details of the reasons for these improvements are submitted herewith.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Stevenson.

APPROPRIATION AND CONTRACT FOR REPOWERING PHYSICS LABORATORY

(6) The repowering and relighting of the Physics Laboratory have been an urgent need for many years. Detailed plans were made during the biennium of 1947-1949 and an appropriation was made by the Board on November 19, 1948 (Minutes, page 174), for the first phase of this project. It provided for the installation of primary power including a 500 kva transformer.

Bids have been received for the second phase of the project which provides for the modernization of the power facilities and electrical distribution equipment and wiring.

Bids were also requested for the alterations and general work required as a part of the electrical modernization. No bids were received, but the Physical Plant Department will be able to do this work. It is estimated that \$17,000 will be required for the general work, incidental engineering expense, field services, and direct University costs to complete this part of the project.

Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White, Inc., Architects and Engineers, Chicago, who completed the plans for this project, are willing to undertake the additional engineering work on the same terms as in previous agreements: the actual salaries paid to engineers, draftsmen, and others engaged in the work, the cost of blueprints, plus 100 per cent, plus travel expense, if any. They also offer the services of a field engineer on the basis of actual salary paid plus 10 per cent, plus travel and living expense while in Urbana.

The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations has reviewed this project and recommends an appropriation of \$120,325.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$103,325 to Anderson Electric Company and employment of Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White, Inc., for the additional engineering work including services of a field engineer, at an estimated cost of \$8,000.

I concur and recommend (1) an appropriation of \$120,325 for the second phase of the project to repower and relight the Physics Laboratory, and (2) that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute contracts with the Anderson Electric Company and Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White, Inc., in accordance with the terms described above.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appropriation was made and authority was given as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACTS FOR FIRE PROTECTION IMPROVEMENTS NATURAL HISTORY BUILDING

(7) As a part of the fire protection improvements on the Urbana campus, bids have been received for the construction of a stair tower at the north center entrance of the Natural History Building, the enclosure of light wells, removal of the east open stairs in the north wing, and conversion of such areas for other use.

A serious fire hazard exists in this building. The north section is of mill construction and is particularly vulnerable. The stair wells serving five floor levels are not enclosed and open light wells exist at the third and fourth floor levels, all of which would be serious hazards in the event of fire. The fifth floor is served by only one means of egress, and that is of non-fireproof construction.

The State appropriations for 1949-1951 for building and other capital improvements at the University include an item "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings, \$1,258,000," of which \$880,000 has been budgeted for the additions to the power and heating plant and \$420,000 for remodeling of existing buildings. The improvements in the Natural History Building, with an estimated total cost of \$62,500, have a high priority among remodeling projects.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$57,495, subject to the release of funds by the Governor, to C. A. Petry and Sons, Champaign, Illinois, the lowest bidder.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract subject to the release of funds by the Governor.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT IN ABBOTT POWER PLANT

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$64,306 to A. S. Schulman Electric Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for furnishing and installing electrical equipment as part of the addition to the Abbott Power Plant. The contract work will include connection of the electrical service on all equipment to be installed by other contractors, such as the turbine; the unloading, erection, and connection of equipment purchased and delivered to the site; installation of the main cable and all other inside plant wiring, control circuits within the plant, and complete grounding system for all equipment.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings."

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract, subject to the release of funds by the Governor.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT WITH CITY OF URBANA FOR DISPOSAL OF UNIVERSITY GARBAGE

(9) The University uses the city dump of Urbana for disposal of its garbage, delivery to that place being made by the University. Local facilities are in need of improvement. In 1948, after a discussion between officials of the cities of Champaign and Urbana and representatives of the University, the engineering firm of Greeley and Hansen was engaged for a study of the problem, with the understanding that the University would pay one-fifth of the total expense (Minutes, November 19, 1948). Their report recommends that the "land-fill" method be followed as the most economical for the community and the University.

A recent study of the operations for the past year indicates that the proportion of operating costs which should be assumed by the University is approximately 30 per cent. The city of Urbana has requested that the University agree to assume this proportion of the cost until further notice, effective July 1, 1949, payments to be made quarterly, with the understanding that either party on reasonable notice may request in any given fiscal period that checks be made of deliveries to the dump in order to determine more accurately the University's proportion of such deliveries, and that the proportionate share paid by the University would be subject to adjustment in succeeding fiscal periods based on such a check. For the purpose of the agreement, "costs" shall be interpreted to mean land rental, wages and expenses in the operation of the dump, equipment purchases, and replacement costs. The Physical Plant Department has included funds in its budget for the current fiscal year sufficient to meet these expenses. It is estimated that for the year 1949-1950, the University's share on the above basis will not be in excess of \$4,200.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the University enter into such a contract for the biennium ending June 30, 1951, and to continue for succeeding periods until otherwise modified, subject to constitutional and statutory restrictions limiting commitments to each successive biennial period.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board

be authorized to execute such a contract when prepared and approved by the Office of the Legal Counsel.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR NEW ROOF ON TRANSPORTATION BUILDING

(10) The roof on the Transportation Building, which was constructed in 1913 and has been in service for thirty-seven years, consists of slate shingle laid on horizontal wood shingle strips. The roof has deteriorated to such extent that further repair is impractical and complete replacement is necessary to prevent damage to the building and contents. The replacement job has been deferred because of shortages of material, labor, and of funds in previous years.

Bids have been secured on the furnishing and installing of a new slate roof including copper valleys, ridge roll, and flashing above the cornice line.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$9,176 to Henry Reuter and Sons, Kankakee, the lowest bidder, for this phase of the work.

In addition to this contract, there will be the general work of removing existing slate, installation of new wood sheeting, removal and replacement of wood cornice framing, removal and replacement of the copper cornice, and installation of new gutters and flashing.

The Physical Plant Department has proposed to do this at an estimated cost of \$31,400.

Funds are available for this project.

I recommend that this improvement, and award of the contract, be authorized.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR HEATING SYSTEM ON FIFTH FLOOR OF NATURAL HISTORY BUILDING

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract of \$4,300 to J. L. Robinson, Urbana, the lowest bidder, for heating system changes on the fifth floor of the Natural History Building. Funds were appropriated by the Board of Trustees on February 16, 1950 (Minutes, page 995), for remodeling and equipping of this area for the Department of Physiology.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

ANNUAL COMPILATION OF FACULTY PUBLICATIONS

(12) The Graduate College has been publishing annually a compilation of faculty publications pursuant to an action taken by the Board of Trustees on December 28, 1908.

In the opinion of the Dean of the Graduate College and of the University Research Board of which he is Chairman, this annual compilation is no longer of sufficient importance and value to justify the publication costs.

I concur in his recommendation that this practice be discontinued.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this publication was discontinued as recommended.

REVISION OF BY-LAWS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(13) The Board of Directors of the University of Illinois Athletic Association has revised its by-laws, and they are submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval (see Appendix, page 1154).

The revisions are chiefly in the area of business operations. The Comptroller has worked closely with the Athletic Association in preparing the revisions. The changes result in clarification of procedures, particularly in purchasing and contracting, and in reduction of procedures to the minimum necessary to maintain adequate internal check.

I recommend approval of the revised by-laws.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the revised by-laws of the Athletic Association were approved as recommended.

ADJUSTMENT OF FEES IN THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(14) On May 27, 1941, the Board of Trustees (Minutes, page 297) adopted a resolution establishing a student fee for the use of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building in Chicago to provide for the operation and maintenance of the building and for the debt service on the revenue bonds issued to finance the construction of the second unit. The effect of this action was to maintain the fee schedule at about the same total but to segregate a part of the total for the purposes indicated.

The debt obligation has been paid and the trust terminated, so that the segregation of a part of the total fee for the use of the building should be discontinued.

An annual appropriation of \$62,000 for the operation and maintenance of this building has been made from this fee income during the period the bonds have been outstanding. This provision must be continued, and the funds will come from general appropriations to the University. There is a possibility that the remaining portion of the segregated amount may be needed to help finance a housing program at the Chicago Professional Campus. In any event, it is now required that the total fee structure be readjusted to eliminate the special fee but without a reduction in the total fees charged at the Chicago Professional Colleges.

There are submitted schedules of the present fees and the proposed fees (see Appendix, pages 1158 and 1159). The Committee on Fees and Scholarships has reviewed this proposal and recommends its adoption.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, this recommendation was adopted.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(15) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed, and of changes and adjustments made during the month of April, 1950 (see Appendix, page 1158).

This report was received for record.

PURCHASES

(16) A report of (A) emergency purchases authorized and (B) purchases recommended (see Appendix, page 1160).

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed, and the purchases recommended were authorized.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(17) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of March 31, 1950.

This report was received for record.

CHANGES IN PROVISIONS FOR DEATH BENEFITS AND DISABILITY AND RETIRING ALLOWANCES

(18) On December 13, 1924, the Board of Trustees established in the University of Illinois Statutes provisions for retiring allowances and death benefits for faculty and other employees. This plan was replaced by the present "University Retirement System of Illinois" established by an Act of the General Assembly in 1941.

On August 5, 1941, the Board of Trustees adopted a resolution terminating the application of the old system of retiring allowances and death benefits to those members of the staff who thereafter came under the new University Retirement System and provided a revised plan for those continued under the old system and for new employees not eligible to participate in the new system.

The old plan was set up on the basis of paying a part of each employee's salary for current services in cash and part in the form of retiring allowances and death benefits representing deferred payments.

The schedule of retiring allowances and death benefits provided by the resolution of the Board of Trustees of August 5, 1941, for employees not participating in the University Retirement System is no longer completely effective, since it is limited to employees on permanent and continuous employment. Changes in the University Retirement System made by the General Assembly provide that all

permanent and continuous employees must participate in this system except those participating in other tax-supported retirement systems. Prior to such amendments permanent and continuous employees less than thirty years of age, and others not automatically included, had the option of participating.

Provisions for disability and death benefits for employees not covered by the University Retirement System are desirable. These are mostly members of the faculty of the rank of assistant and others on limited tenure, and nonacademic employees with fewer than six months of service.

Present disability benefits payable by the University are adequate for staff members on such limited service. It is proposed that a death benefit be paid to the heirs or beneficiaries of such staff members in the sum of \$500, after six months of employment.

A committee on the University Retirement System, representative of the faculty and various employee groups, has recommended that the resolution of the Board of Trustees of August 5, 1941, be revised to read as follows, so that its provisions will be consistent with present retirement legislation and will make available the benefits specified to employees not eligible to participate in the University Retirement System of Illinois:

Be it further resolved, that

1. From and after September 1, 1941, all employees of the University who are not certified as Participating Employees under "An Act to provide for the creation, maintenance, and administration of a Retirement System for the benefit of the staff members and employees of the University of Illinois and of certain other state educational and scientific agencies," approved July 21, 1941, as amended, shall be employed under contracts which shall provide among other things that compensation for their services shall be paid to them by the University as follows, to wit:

A. Such part thereof in cash as the Board shall from time to time fix and determine, to be paid to them for such time only as they shall satisfactorily perform the services of their respective employments.

B. A part thereof in the value of a death benefit to be provided or secured by the Board of Trustees for them, or their respective heirs, legal representatives, assigns, or designated beneficiaries, in the amount of \$500, after six months of employment.

Provided, however, that in the event compensation for a death is payable under the State Workmen's Compensation Act, or a death benefit, in excess of contributions paid by the employee, is payable to him by any tax supported retirement system of the State of Illinois, or by the Federal Civil Service Retirement System, the death benefit payable hereunder shall be reduced by the amount of such other compensation or death benefit.

2. Rights to benefits of present employees, originally employed prior to May 20, 1950, as provided for under the resolution of the Board of Trustees of August 5, 1941, shall not be affected by this resolution.

3. All rights and claims of any employee in or to death and disability benefits are forfeited, and shall cease, with the termination of service of such employee for the University, whether such termination is voluntary or otherwise. The requirements of the University Retirement Act as to the age of retirement shall apply to employees covered by this resolution.

4. The term "employee" as used herein shall include all members of the educational, administrative, secretarial, clerical, mechanical, and labor staffs, who are not participants in the University Retirement System, but shall exclude all student employees of the University who are paid an hourly wage.

5. The Board of Trustees reserves the right to alter, modify, or annul all or any part of the provisions for compensation of employees as provided herein, at the end of any academic year, without liability, and all claims and rights of employees hereunder shall be subject to such modifications, alterations, or termination; nevertheless, all subject to the provisions and limitations of the State statute referred to in Section II of this resolution.

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this recommendation was adopted.

ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES FOR REMODELING OF RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(19) The State appropriations to the University for 1949-1951 include \$7,395,000 for "Construction of Addition to present Hospital." Contracts awarded by the Board of Trustees for the construction of a hospital addition indicate that it can

be completed for less than the amount appropriated, leaving an estimated balance of \$1,114,492.

The construction budget includes \$568,980 for remodeling in the present Research and Educational Hospitals required as a result of the construction of the new addition, leaving an unallotted balance of \$545,512. There is also an allocation of \$176,875 in the "Contingencies" appropriation for buildings in Chicago available for remodeling making a total of \$722,387 for this purpose.

Two proposals have been made for the possible use of these balances:

1. Remodeling work in the existing Research and Educational Hospital buildings, in addition to the work contemplated in the item of \$568,980. This would provide for some of the modernization of the existing hospital buildings originally scheduled for the 1951-1953 biennium.

2. Reduce the indebtedness on the Medical Center Steam Company plant which would result in a saving in the operating budget of the University. When this project was being discussed with the State Director of Finance, he suggested that consideration be given to such use of any unexpended funds.

It is not certain that the funds available can be used for either of these two purposes. The matter will have to be discussed with the Auditor of Public Accounts and the State Director of Finance, and the decision will rest largely on the interpretation of the appropriation acts by these officials. Approval of the Governor would then be necessary. Preliminary discussions with the Assistant to the Legal Counsel indicate that there is more likelihood of obtaining the funds for reducing the Steam Plant indebtedness than for remodeling and modernization of present buildings. There is also a question of how much remodeling and modernization work can be completed during the current biennium before the appropriations lapse.

This matter has been studied by the Provost, the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, the Comptroller, and the Director of the Physical Plant. They recommend that a complete study of all needed remodeling be made, classified as to stages and categories of work. They further recommend that Holabird and Root and Burgee, architects for the hospital addition, be employed to prepare plans for this remodeling estimated to cost \$1,550,000. Payment to the architects will be 7 per cent of the cost of the work less a credit of 1 per cent for preliminary work done by the University, or a net fee of 6 per cent for this phase of the work. The total estimated cost of such services is \$70,000 for plan preparation plus an additional \$23,000 to be paid when and if the remodeling work is done. I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this recommendation was adopted.

REPORT OF APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL FUNDS FOR ADVANCE PLANNING

(20) Public Law 352 enacted by the Eighty-first Congress provides additional funds to be loaned by the federal government to states and their political subdivisions to complete the plan preparation of public works. The Board of Trustees at its meeting on January 12, 1950, authorized an application for funds to prepare the plans and specifications of five buildings at an estimated total cost of \$846,000 as follows:

The University was advised that funds were not available to approve the entire request, and the Board of Trustees on March 14, 1950, authorized an adjustment in the request for federal funds, limiting the application to preliminary plans for the Biology and Pharmacy buildings.

The University has been advised that the Bureau of Community Facilities Service of the General Services Administration has approved allocations of federal funds of \$75,000 for advance planning for the construction and equipping of the Biology Building and of \$152,000 for the advance planning for the construction and equipping of a Pharmacy Building.

This report was received for record.

REPORT OF GIFTS AND GRANTS RECEIVED BY THE UNIVERSITY

BY-LAWS OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I. NAME

SECTION 1. This organization shall be known and incorporated as The Athletic Association of the University of Illinois.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

SECTION 1. The purpose of this organization shall be to carry on athletic sports and promote athletic interests among the students of the University of Illinois.

ARTICLE III. DEFINITION OF TERMS

SECTION 1. The following words and terms, as used in these by-laws, shall have the meaning set forth below, unless a different meaning is clearly required by the context:

- (a) "Association": The Athletic Association of the University of Illinois.
- (b) "Board": The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois.
- (c) "Director": The Director of Inter-Collegiate and Intramural Athletics.
- (d) "Trustees": The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

(e) "Business Manager": The Business Manager of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois.

(f) "Business Office": The Business Office of the University of Illinois.

(g) "Treasurer": The Treasurer of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois.

(h) "Comptroller": The Comptroller of the University of Illinois.

SECTION 2. The members of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois shall consist of the Board of Directors of said Association.

ARTICLE IV. GOVERNMENT

SECTION 1. The government of the Association shall be vested in the Board as created and existing pursuant to the conditions provided in the Articles of Incorporation issued by the State of Illinois, under date of February 21, 1890, and as amended January 13, 1920, and amended March 11, 1922. In carrying out its duties the said Board shall conform to any requirements or regulations imposed by the Trustees.

ARTICLE V. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. The Board shall consist of seven members to be elected annually by the Trustees at their annual March meeting upon recommendation of the President of the University, four from members of the faculty of the University of Illinois, and three from members of the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois.

SECTION 2. Any vacancy occurring in the Board shall be temporarily filled by the President of the University until the Trustees at their next meeting shall elect the successor who shall serve the remainder of the term during which the vacancy occurs.

SECTION 3. The Board shall organize at their first meeting in April and elect from their own membership the following officers: a President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary, whose duties shall be the usual ones pertaining to such offices, and who shall hold office until their successors are duly elected and qualified. The Board shall also elect a Treasurer and another person as Business Manager whose duties shall be as hereinafter stated. These officers shall also be the corresponding officers of the Association. The Board shall appoint a Director of Intercollegiate Athletics who may serve as Director of the School of Physical Education.

SECTION 4. The Board may appoint such committees as it may consider necessary for conducting the affairs of the Board.

SECTION 5. Suitable and adequate bonds of suretyship shall be given by the Treasurer and by the Business Manager and such officers as deemed advisable by the Board, covering the faithful performance of their duties, these bonds to be approved by the Board and filed with the Trustees.

SECTION 6. The Board, subject to the conditions hereinafter provided and to any rules or regulations which the Trustees may adopt concerning the same, shall handle and control all property belonging to the Association or placed in its custody by the Trustees, to collect, handle, and disburse all funds of the Association, and perform such other duties as are necessary in governing the Association or are assigned to it by the Trustees.

ARTICLE VI. FINANCIAL PROCEDURE

SECTION 1. Budget. The Director of Intercollegiate Athletics shall prepare in a form provided by the Trustees an annual budget of the Association showing proposed expenditures and anticipated income. This budget shall indicate the names, positions, tenure, and salaries of all coaches, trainers, and other regular employees. This budget, when approved by the Board shall be transmitted to the President of the University, for submission to the Trustees, with his recommendation, for consideration and approval by the Trustees, and upon such approval it shall constitute the basis for the expenditures of the Association for the succeeding year.

SECTION 2. Deposit of Funds. The Board shall designate one or more depositories in which funds of the Association shall be deposited to the credit of the Treasurer, to be disbursed in the manner hereinafter provided. Such money shall be collected and accounted for in a manner approved by the Business Office.

SECTION 3. Tickets. The purchase and sale of tickets shall be conducted by the Association in accordance with the procedure approved by the Board and the Trustees. All tickets for any contest remaining unsold shall be preserved by the

Association until the audit of ticket sales for that event is completed. The audit of ticket sales shall be made by the Business Office.

SECTION 4. Purchases. All requisitions for materials, supplies, and equipment required by the Association shall be in accordance with the budget or other action of the Board and the Trustees. Such requisitions shall be approved by the Director and Purchase Orders therefor shall be issued by the Business Manager. Purchases in the amount of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars or more shall be approved by the Board or the Executive Committee unless such items have been authorized in the budget, but all such purchases shall be approved by the Business Office before Purchase Orders are written. All purchases shall be on the basis of competitive quotations wherever practicable, quality, suitability, and services considered. Purchases in the amount of less than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars shall be made by the Business Manager after approval of the requisition by the Director.

SECTION 5. Payment of Money. All financial obligations shall be evidenced by vouchers prepared by the Association and shall be approved by the Director or by such other person or persons as the Board may indicate. All obligations shall be paid by check, signed by a member designated by the Association, and countersigned by an officer or representative of the Trustees of the University to be designated by the Trustees.

SECTION 6. Working Fund. The Business Manager may be allotted a working fund of not more than \$10,000, the amount of which shall be determined by the Board. Its purpose shall be the payment of petty and emergency items for which it shall be reimbursed from time to time by regular voucher and check for the Association.

SECTION 7. Accounts. The accounts of the Association shall be kept by the Business Manager in a form approved by the Business Office. Financial reports shall be transmitted by the Association to the Trustees at such times and in such form as the Comptroller may prescribe. A financial statement of the Association shall be published annually.

SECTION 8. The Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Association shall begin July 1st and end on June 30th, following.

SECTION 9. The Board shall determine the price and condition of the sale of coupon books and other tickets of admission to athletic games. Regulations concerning coupon books shall be printed therein. The Board shall also make all regulations governing the issuing of complimentary tickets.

SECTION 10. Contracts. All contracts entered into by the Association shall be handled as follows:

(a) Contracts for athletic games shall be executed and approved by the Director (unless otherwise directed by the Board), subject to the approval of schedules by the Senate Committee on Athletics.

(b) Broadcasting and television contracts shall be approved and executed by the Director, subject to concurrence as to policy by the Director of University Broadcasting.

(c) Contracts for concessions, exhibitions, and entertainment shall be approved and executed by the Director, subject to approval by the Comptroller.

(d) Contracts for capital additions, replacements, and alterations shall be in accordance with the budget or other action of the Board and the Trustees. Requisitions therefor shall be approved by the Director, and Purchase Orders therefor shall be issued by the Business Manager. Such contracts involving an expenditure of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars or more shall be approved by the Board or the Executive Committee unless such items have been authorized in the budget, but all such contracts shall be approved by the Comptroller of the University before Purchase Orders are written. All such contracts shall be awarded on the basis of competitive quotations wherever practicable and a report thereof shall be made to the Board by the Business Manager. Such contracts involving an expenditure of less than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars shall be made by the Business Manager after approval of the requisition by the Director.

(e) Contracts for transportation, ushers, personal and professional services (other than staff service), and other contracts involving less than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars shall be approved and executed by the Business Manager, provided such contracts are covered by the budget.

SECTION 11. Audits. The accounts of the Association shall be audited at least once each year by a certified public accountant approved by the Trustees, and the report of every such audit shall be transmitted to the Board and to the Trustees.

ARTICLE VII. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The regular meeting of the Board shall be held during the month of April in each scholastic year, at a date to be determined by the President of the Board. Four (4) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECTION 2. Special meetings may be called by the President or a majority of the Board.

ARTICLE VIII. SELECTION OF THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Athletic Council shall consist of three members of the faculty, to be appointed by the President of the University; three alumni to be elected by the Athletic Council, two of whom shall not be connected with the University; the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics; the President of the Tribe of Illini, and the seven undergraduate student managers of the following sports: (1) football, (2) baseball, (3) track, (4) intramural athletics, (5) basketball, (6) wrestling, and (7) gymnastics, circus, and football pageantry.

SECTION 2. The term of office of each faculty and alumni representative shall be three years, so arranged that the term of office of one of each group shall expire annually.

SECTION 3. The undergraduate student managers shall be elected by the Athletic Council on the Wednesday following the annual Interscholastic meet, in accordance with rules fixed and published by the Athletic Council.

SECTION 4. The captains and coaches of the Intercollegiate Athletic teams of the University shall be associate members of the Council, without the right to vote, and shall be entitled to attend meetings of the Council and to discuss matters relative to their respective interests.

ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS OF THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Athletic Council shall choose a President, Vice-President, and a Secretary from among its undergraduate members, and they shall have the duties usual to such offices.

ARTICLE X. MEETINGS OF THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The first regular meeting of the year shall be called by the Director not later than the second Wednesday after registration. At this meeting the Council shall be organized by the election of officers.

SECTION 2. The second regular meeting of the year shall be called by the President on the Wednesday following the annual Interscholastic meet. (See Art. VI, Sec. 7 and Art. V, Sec. 2e.)

SECTION 3. Special meetings may be called at any time by the President of the Council at the request of two members of the Council.

SECTION 4. Eight members of the Council shall constitute a quorum. At least two of these shall be faculty representatives or alumni. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted. The Council shall be governed by Roberts' Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XI. DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The duties and powers of the Athletic Council shall be:

- (a) To make rules and regulations governing the election of student managers.
- (b) To make rules and regulations governing the granting of University letters and other awards.
- (c) To approve the election of captains of the athletic teams.
- (d) To make recommendation to the Board regarding all general questions of athletic policy.
- (e) To nominate a candidate for the Conference medal "for proficiency in athletics and in scholastic work."
- (f) To conduct such other business of athletic import as may arise which does not concern major policies of the Board.

ARTICLE XII. VACANCIES IN THE ATHLETIC COUNCIL

SECTION 1. Any vacancies occurring in the alumni or undergraduate membership of the Athletic Council may be filled at any regular meeting of the Council.

SECTION 2. Any vacancies occurring in the faculty membership of the Council shall be filled by the President of the University, the appointee to serve for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XIII

SECTION 1. The by-laws of the Association may be amended by the Board at any regular meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose. Any proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to each member of the Board by mailing a copy thereof to each such member not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting at which such proposed amendment shall be considered. Any such amendment shall, after adoption by the Board, be submitted to the Trustees for its consideration before the same shall take effect.

ARTICLE XIV

SECTION 1. The appointment of the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics and whether he shall also serve as Director of the School of Physical Education, the vouchers evidencing financial obligations, the form of keeping accounts, and of the annual statement to be published by the Association, and the designation of the certified public accountant to make the annual audit of the books of the Association, shall be subject to approval by the Trustees.

PROPOSED FEES FOR PART-TIME STUDENTS IN THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

Residents of Illinois registered for partial programs of two hundred clock hours or less in a quarter in the colleges of Dentistry and Medicine pay tuition fees at the rate of \$2.50 for twenty-five clock hours or fraction thereof. Non-Illinois students registered for partial programs pay double this rate. Students taking more than two hundred clock hours in a quarter pay the full tuition fees.

In the College of Pharmacy, students registered for twelve credit hours or less pay tuition fees at the rate of \$2 a credit hour if residents of Illinois, or \$4 a credit hour if non-residents. For thirteen credit hours or more, the full tuition fees are charged.

Part-time students in the colleges of Medicine and Dentistry pay a laboratory fee based on the portion of the total program being taken. Students taking up 25 per cent of the total program pay one-fourth of the regular laboratory fee; from 25 to 50 per cent of the program, one-half of the regular fee; from 50 to 75 per cent, three-fourths of the regular fee; and over 75 per cent, the full laboratory fee.

In the College of Pharmacy, students taking twelve quarter hours or less pay \$3 per quarter hour credit in courses involving laboratory work. In no case will a student be assessed a greater laboratory fee than is paid by the full time student.

All part-time students pay the full Union Building service charge.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE WITH HONORS IN THE LIBRARY SCHOOL

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these requirements were established as recommended.

GRADUATE CURRICULA IN THE COLLEGE OF LAW

(6) The University Senate recommends the establishment of the following graduate programs in the College of Law.

Curriculum Leading to the Degree of Master of Laws (LL.M.)

I. Requirements for Admission:

1. The applicant must have received the first professional degree in law from a law school which has graduation requirements substantially the same as the University of Illinois College of Law.

2. The applicant must present evidence of ability to do satisfactory work at the graduate level. Normally no student will be admitted as a candidate for this degree unless he has a weighted grade average of 3.5 in all law-school work undertaken.

II. Requirements for the Degree:

1. One academic year in residence in the College of Law.

2. A course program approved by the Graduate Committee of the College of Law.

(a) The course program shall consist of eight units of work including at least two units of research.

(b) A grade average of 3.5.

3. A satisfactory thesis.

Curriculum Leading to the Degree of Doctor of the Science of Law (J.S.D.)

I. Requirements for Admission:

1. The applicant must have received the first professional degree in law from a law school which has graduation requirements substantially the same as the University of Illinois College of Law.

2. The applicant must present evidence of ability to do satisfactory work at the graduate level. Normally no student will be admitted as a candidate for this degree unless he has a weighted grade average of 4.0 in all law-school work undertaken.

3. The applicant must also present evidence that he has the capacity for independent research. Ordinarily this requirement may be met by the submission of satisfactory legal writing done while the applicant was a candidate for the LL.B. degree, or subsequent to the receipt of the degree.

II. Requirements for the Degree:

1. One academic year in residence in the College of Law.

2. A course program approved by the Graduate Committee of the College of Law.

(a) The course program shall consist of eight units of work including at least four units of research.

(b) A grade average of 4.0.

3. A satisfactory thesis, which shall be submitted not less than one year nor more than five years after the completion of the residence requirements.

4. A final oral examination.

If these programs are approved, the College of Law and the University Senate recommend that the present degree of Doctor of Law (J.D.) be discontinued. As presently administered this is not a graduate degree and it should be discontinued to avoid confusion with the degree of J.S.D.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted.

CHANGES IN ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING CURRICULUM

(7) The University Senate recommends the following changes in the undergraduate curriculum in Electrical Engineering.

Power Engineering Option: Discontinue Mechanical Engineering 182, Shop, and Mechanical Engineering 204, Mechanical Engineering Laboratory. Add Economics 108, Elements of Economics, and Economics 248, Personnel Administration. Add Electrical Engineering 347, Industrial Electronics, and Electrical Engineering 378, Power Transmission; these areas are not included in the present curriculum.

Communication Engineering Option: Discontinue Mechanical Engineering 182, Shop. Add Economics 108, Elements of Economics, and Economics 248, Personnel Administration.

Illumination Engineering Option: Discontinue Mechanical Engineering, Shop. Add Economics 108, Elements of Economics.

Changes in the Electrical Engineering courses are mostly rearrangement, renumbering, and new descriptions for existing course material.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Hickman, these changes were approved as recommended.

REVISION OF CURRICULUM IN PHARMACY

(8) The University Senate recommends a complete revision of the four-year undergraduate curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy. The changes were recommended by the faculty of the College of Pharmacy and follow the lines of recommendations of the National Curriculum Committee appointed by Dr. Edward C. Elliott (formerly President of Purdue University) who has been Director of the Pharmaceutical Survey of the American Association for Pharmaceutical Education.

Because of the development of new therapeutic agents, it is desirable to modernize several of the courses in the basic sciences. The other changes represent the addition of courses in the social sciences and business administration which it is felt are desirable in the development of the pharmacist as a citizen. The faculty of the Chicago Undergraduate Division at Navy Pier will help develop these courses.

All students will be required to complete the basic course of 189 credit hours and will be permitted to choose the remainder of the 202 credit hours required for graduation from electives (see Appendix, page 1250).

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this curriculum was approved as revised.

UNDERGRADUATE AND GRADUATE PROGRAMS IN FOOD TECHNOLOGY

(9) The University Senate recommends establishment of the following undergraduate and graduate programs in food technology (see Appendix, page 1252).

The Graduate program has also been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these programs were approved as recommended.

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN EDUCATION

(10) The University Senate recommends the establishment of the following program leading to the degree of Master of Education and to the Advanced Certificate in Education (see Appendix, page 1254).

These proposals have also been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College.

I concur.

The Provost commented on this program.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this program was approved as recommended.

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN STATISTICS

(11) The University Senate recommends the establishment of a graduate program in statistics leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. During the past fifty years there has been a tremendous growth of statistical ideas and methods, and progress is continuing at a rapid rate. Gains made both in the theory and practice of statistics have been of the utmost importance in many fields. With these developments has come the need for training people who can make contributions to both the theory and practice of statistical inference from quantitative data. The proposed doctoral program in statistics is intended to recognize these needs and to serve as a means of preparing people to fill them.

It is contemplated that those who wish to concentrate on research in the theory of statistics will continue to take a doctorate in mathematics with emphasis on analysis, statistics being a second major or a strong minor. Similarly, those who wish to concentrate on statistical research in another field—such as agronomy, economics, or psychology—will continue to take a doctorate in that field with a major or minor in statistics as required by the department in question.

The doctorate in statistics here outlined is intended for students who wish to concentrate on research in statistical methods. It provides those having a major interest in statistical theory with training for practice in one or more fields of application. It offers those having major interest in a subject matter the necessary background in statistical theory (see Appendix, page 1255).

This proposal has also been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College.

I concur.

Dean Ridenour commented on this program.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this program was approved as recommended.

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN BUSINESS

(12) The University Senate recommends the establishment of a graduate program leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Business. The purpose of this program is to prepare graduate students for positions in teaching and research in institutions of higher education; and for consulting and administrative work in both private business and public service (see Appendix, page 1256).

This program has also been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College.

I concur.

Dean Bowen and Dean Ridenour commented on this program.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this program was adopted as recommended.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS AND OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

(13) The Governor has approved the following releases of funds from appropriations made to the University of Illinois for 1949-1951 for buildings and other capital improvements:

Release No. 28

"For Permanent Improvements at Chicago Construction of Utility Distribution System and Remodeling of Existing Buildings"..... \$ 16 187
This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$190,000. The funds now released are for completion of the installation of new electrical feeders to the Illinois Surgical Institute and other areas including the Research Laboratories and Library units of the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building in Chicago.

Release No. 29

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign For Land—acquisition of land for the extension of the campus"..... 190 000
This is the total release of an appropriation of \$190,000.

Release No. 30

"For Permanent Improvements at Urbana-Champaign Additions to Power and Heating Plant and Remodeling of Existing Buildings"..
 This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$1,215,000. The funds now released are for (1) furnishing and installing electrical equipment as part of the addition to the Power Plant (\$64,400), (2) fire protection improvements in the Natural History Building (\$62,500), and (3) remodeling of Physical Plant Service Building (\$207,500). 334 000

Release No. 31

"For Contingencies to Cover Expenditures for Purposes for which the Amount Appropriated in any Item Above Enumerated is, or becomes Insufficient"..... 23 000
 This is a partial release from an appropriation of \$550,000. The funds now released are for the acquisition and installation of chemistry building equipment, supplementing Releases Nos. 1 and 2 of August 3, 1949.

I recommend that the funds released be appropriated for the purposes specified.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these funds were appropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Stevenson.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(14) The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

These proposed improvements have been carefully studied by the Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations. Its reports giving details of the reasons for these improvements are submitted herewith.

REMODELING IN THE ARMORY FOR ARMED SERVICES

(15) Since the Department of Naval Science has been in the Armory there has been insufficient office and classroom space. At present the administrative staff, accounting and supply section, and instructors are restricted to three offices (Rooms 239, 240, 241), and storeroom (Room 237) for books, uniforms, stationery, and office supplies.

Five instructors are now in one office. This arrangement is not conducive to efficient working conditions. Instructors are required to perform the greater part of their classroom preparation at home. A noisy and crowded office discourages students from discussing naval or scholastic problems with their instructors.

To relieve this crowded situation, the Physical Plant Department has pre-

pared a remodeling plan which will provide four new offices (three for Military Science and one for Naval Science) and one additional classroom, will improve security (for storeroom space), will eliminate corridor noise outside of three classrooms, and will provide better quarters for the carpenter shop used for construction of training aids. The estimated cost of this remodeling is \$12,000.

The Provost and Comptroller have reviewed the plans for this project and recommend approval. A special appropriation will be required.

I concur and recommend an appropriation of \$12,000 for this project.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Stevenson.

FENCING FOR NEW AGRICULTURAL FARMS

(16) Improved fencing is required on farms recently acquired for agricultural purposes and on one of the outlying experiment farms: McCullough Farm, 160 acres; Sullivan Farm, 80 acres; Newton Agricultural Experiment Farm, 50 acres.

Present fencing is either inadequate or does not exist around areas where new plantings will be made or where land will be rehabilitated or used for grazing.

A committee of the College of Agriculture studied the needs and submitted a detailed report recommending amounts and types of materials to be used. The Dean of the College of Agriculture has requested an appropriation of \$6,600 for this purpose. The Provost and the Comptroller have reviewed the report and concur in the recommendation.

I concur and recommend a special appropriation be made from the General Reserve Fund.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Stevenson.

CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF HOUSE ON NORTHERN ILLINOIS EXPERIMENTAL FIELD

(17) An area of eighty acres on one of the Wright Farms in DeKalb County was assigned for use as an agricultural experimental field to replace a field formerly leased by the University, and is now known as the Northern Illinois Agricultural Experimental Field of the Agricultural Experiment Station. Donors have made grants of funds to the University for improvements of the field. The main service building and drives have been completed and electric power has been brought into the field. There remains in the trust fund for these improvements a balance of approximately \$14,000.

Bids have been taken on the construction of a dwelling for the resident technical man in charge of the field. The Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$11,700 to Watts and Merriman of Shabbona, Illinois, the lowest bidder, for the construction of this house. The contract does not include the septic tank, water heater, lighting fixtures, and certain other accessories which will be installed by others. The estimated cost of these additional installations is approximately \$1,000.

The lowest bidder is a small and comparatively new company. The bid is not clearly defined as to some items. In case it is found the bid is inadequate according to specifications, or if this company is unable to submit a satisfactory performance bond, the Director and the Comptroller recommend that the contract be awarded to the next lower bidder, Guldbeck and Ekstrom, DeKalb, whose bid is \$12,375.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the award of this contract was authorized, under the terms and conditions stated.

CONTRACT FOR REMODELING AND EQUIPMENT FOR DEPARTMENT OF PATHOLOGY, COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$5,197 to C. W. Haynes Company, Chicago, Illinois, the lowest bidder, for remodeling of rooms 467, 467-A, and 466-B, and the installation of plumbing, ventilating, and departmental equipment in the Medical and Dental College Laboratories Building.

Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was given as recommended.

STEAM SERVICE TO DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH

(19) The Sixty-Fifth and Sixty-Sixth General Assemblies of Illinois appropriated funds to the Department of Public Health for the construction of a Tuberculosis Hospital in Cook County. This appropriation act includes a provision "that if arrangements are made for the construction of a central heating plant, to serve the said hospital building and other buildings in the Medical Center at a saving in heating costs to the State, the sum of \$280,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, of the said sum of \$4,850,000, may be deducted from the construction cost of said hospital and used as part of the cost of constructing the said central heating plant."

The central heating plant to be constructed by the Medical Center Steam Company qualifies under this provision for the allotment of \$280,000. Since the University has contracted to take the entire output of the Medical Center Steam Company and has the right to furnish steam to other institutions, the Department of Public Health applied the \$280,000 of its appropriation toward the cost of the construction of the Medical Center Steam Company plant. The Medical Center Steam Company acknowledged receipt of the \$280,000 by executing a note for \$280,000, payable to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. This is a non-interest bearing note, maturing on December 31, 1981, but payable at the option of the Medical Center Steam Company in whole or in part at any time prior to date of maturity. Steam will be furnished to the Tuberculosis Hospital at a rate based on cost of production.

This is submitted for record.

This report was received for record.

TRANSPORT SERVICE AT UNIVERSITY AIRPORT

(20) Parks Air Lines of East St. Louis, Illinois, has offered, subject to all necessary approvals of authorities, to initiate regular air transport service to and from the University of Illinois Airport, beginning on or about June 18, 1950.

On recommendation of the Director of the Institute of Aviation, and with the approval of the Provost, the following temporary arrangement has been approved by the Comptroller and the Legal Counsel's office.

1. University to provide landing area and parking ramp at \$75 a month for each scheduled landing; extra sections at \$2.50 a landing; present landing fees of \$.50 per capacity seat or \$2 per capacity ton to apply to charter trips.

2. Supplies and services to be furnished at University current prices.

3. General services (local ticket sales, battery cart service, line service, baggage handling, telephone and teletype, weather observations, waiting room, public address system, public protection, and fire protection) to be supplied for \$600 a month.

4. Payments to be monthly in advance.

This temporary arrangement is to become effective with the start of scheduled service and to continue for not more than six months, unless previously superseded by a formal agreement. Either party may terminate the arrangement on fifteen days' notice.

I recommend approval of this temporary arrangement and request authorization, if service is inaugurated and proves satisfactory, to negotiate a formal agreement to be submitted to the Board for approval.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this arrangement was approved and authority was given as recommended.

GRANTS IN AID FROM AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY

(21) From time to time the American Cancer Society makes grants in aid of research to the University and to members of its staff. The patent policy of the American Cancer Society includes the following provisions which are in disagreement with the University's patent policy.

"It is the policy of the American Cancer Society to allow investigators complete freedom to publish the results of their research in any scientific or medical journals selected by them as the best media for the most effective dissemination of the work. Because of this policy and the fundamental nature of the research projects which are being investigated, the problem of obtaining United States and foreign patents will seldom be presented.

"However, in the event that the question of patenting should arise, the principal investigator or grantee-institution concerned should inform the Executive Vice-President of the American Cancer Society concerning the matter, so that negotiations by the Society may be effected.

"Where a patent application is made, the policy of the American Cancer Society will apply, requiring the assignment of all patents to the Society; and the inventor shall receive a non-exclusive, irrevocable, royalty-free, and assignable license."

The Bursar of the University has corresponded with officials in the American Cancer Society in an effort to reconcile this disagreement. He reports that the Society is reluctant to make any change in a policy which it applies uniformly to a research program consisting of many individual contracts throughout the country.

In view of this, and since the intent of the Society's patent policy is identical with the University's, namely protection of public interest, I recommend that the Board authorize waiving the patent provisions of the University Statutes in so far as they apply to work done on a grant in aid from the American Cancer Society and authorize acceptance of the Society's policy, as stated above, in such cases.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed, and the purchases recommended were authorized.

**APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR LYLE H. LANIER AS
HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY**

(27) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Professor Lyle H. Lanier, now Professor and Head of the Department of Psychology at New York University, as Professor and Head of the Department of Psychology to succeed Professor Herbert Woodrow who has been granted sabbatical leave of absence for the first semester of 1950-1951 and who will retire from active service on September 1, 1951. In the meantime, Professor Woodrow has requested that he be relieved of his duties as Head of the Department.

It is desirable to have Professor Lanier's appointment begin September 1, 1950, but this is conditional on when he can be released from his present position. In any event, he is prepared to come to the University of Illinois not later than February 1, 1951.

I recommend (a) that the Board approve this appointment now, and (b) that the Executive Committee of the Board be authorized to fix the terms upon recommendation of the President of the University.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was authorized as recommended.

STREET LIGHTING IMPROVEMENT IN CHAMPAIGN

(28) The Campus Business Men's Association has been promoting the installation of a new street lighting system in the area adjacent to the University Campus on the Champaign side. The majority of the property owners have signed the petition for this improvement. The Association requests that the University participate by assuming its proportionate share of the costs as related to frontage of University property.

This proposal has been studied by the Comptroller, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Chairman of the Building Program Committee. They have advised that the program will provide desirable improved illumination and is in the interest of vehicular and pedestrian safety. The project has been modified to conform to suggestions made by the University and the plan of construction is satisfactory. The University's share of the estimated cost of the improvement on the Champaign side is \$26,325.

An effort was also made to develop a similarly needed improvement on the Urbana side. City authorities and property owners affected proposed a plan which University officials do not believe would provide adequate illumination for vehicular and pedestrian traffic. An effort has been made to secure a change in the Urbana program but present indications are that it will not go forward.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the payment of the University's share of the new street lighting system on the Champaign side and that it record its agreement to participate in a comparable improvement on the Urbana side should municipal officials and property owners decide on a program of acceptable standard.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this recommendation was adopted.

CONTRACT FOR AGRONOMY GREENHOUSE PARTITION

(29) There has been submitted, separately, a recommendation that an appropriation of \$2,500 be made for remodeling of the Agronomy Greenhouse. This will include the construction of glass partitions.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract to Lord and Burnham, Des Plaines, Illinois, for \$1,311 for materials (steel posts and framing and glass) to be used in erecting the partitions. This company specializes in greenhouse construction. It provided the materials for the original greenhouse and the materials it will supply will fit the original design.

It is difficult to secure competitive bids on such materials because other firms usually are not interested in quoting on structural parts for greenhouses of other builders' designs and especially in the case of a small job.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF FLOOR DRAIN AND TROUGH,
ROOM 563, DENTAL BUILDING, CHICAGO**

(30) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$1,552 to the Mutual Contracting Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of a waterproof, lead-lined drainage trough for a new battery of animal cages.

Funds are available in a special appropriation for the Animal Hospitals made by the Board of Trustees, February 16, 1950.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

**CONTRACT FOR REMODELING SPACE AT NAVY PIER TO PROVIDE
QUARTERS FOR THE R.O.T.C. PROGRAM**

(31) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$10,575 to Mueller Construction Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for remodeling space at Navy Pier to provide facilities for the Reserve Officers Training Corps program at the Undergraduate Division.

Funds are available in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees for this purpose.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR PHOTOENGRAVING

(32) During 1949-1950, the University has had a contract for photoengraving from G. R. Grubb and Company, Champaign, only local engraver. This contract was authorized by the Board of Trustees on June 25, 1949 (Minutes, page 482), on the basis of competitive bids, the bid of 3¼¢ per unit by G. R. Grubb and Company being twenty per cent lower than the next higher bid.

The contract expires June 30, 1950, and G. R. Grubb and Company has offered to continue the contract for another year at the same price with provision for price adjustment if there is an increase in their wage contract during the period.

The price is low under current conditions as evidenced by the competitive bids received last year. No request has been received from any other engraver for this work. There is saving in time and money in having photoengraving work done locally, as frequent contact by University artists and printers with the engravers is necessary. G. R. Grubb and Company can supply the quality of engraving required in University work.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller recommend that the present contract with G. R. Grubb and Company be continued for 1950-1951 with provision for an adjustment in rates in the event of a wage rate increase. Estimated total expenditures are \$20,000.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to renew this contract on the modified basis.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this contract was continued and authority was given as recommended.

**FUNDS FOR PRELIMINARY PLANS FOR STUDENT AND
STAFF HOUSING**

(33) On January 12, 1950 (Minutes, page 970), the Board appropriated \$10,000 for preliminary work on plans and specifications for the proposed Biology Building. Meanwhile federal funds for complete advance planning of this build-

ing have become available and all but \$106 remains unexpended in the University appropriation.

The University has received the report of Survey of Student Housing by Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, authorized by the Board on July 28, 1949. This report constitutes the basis for preliminary planning for student and staff housing. The Building Program Committee has recommended that the unused balance in the Biology Building appropriation (\$9,894) be reassigned for this purpose.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Hickman, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Stevenson.

APPROPRIATIONS BY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(34) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association submits for approval the following appropriations from the contingency fund of the Athletic Association:

1. An appropriation for the expenses of the golf team to the N.C.A.A. meet at Albuquerque, New Mexico, \$1,100.

2. An appropriation for the Athletic Association's share of expenses of the Spring Coaches Clinic, \$1,063.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appropriations were approved.

MEETING OF THE CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS COMMITTEE JUNE 15, 1950

Present: Dr. Karl Meyer, Mr. Park Livingston, and Mrs. Frances Watkins, members of the Committee; also Mr. Hilding Anderson, Mr. David H. Brill, and Dr. Walter Theobald, representing the Medical Center Commission; and Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges.

The Committee met at Hotel LaSalle on June 15, 1950, to consider the proposed offer, conveyance, and lease between the University of Illinois and Medical Center Commission in connection with the proposed housing project on the Chicago campus.

The proposed documents were discussed in view of Dr. Ivy's recent letter to the Medical Center Commission.

Dr. Theobald stated that the members of the Commission present had the power to act for the Commission.

After discussion, two changes were agreed on and incorporated in the proposed documents.

The Chicago Committee of the Board of Trustees recommends that the documents prepared by Chapman and Cutler, and executed by the Medical Center Commission, be approved by the Board of Trustees (see Appendix, page 1261).

UNDERGRADUATE AND GRADUATE PROGRAMS IN FOOD TECHNOLOGY

Undergraduate Program

This program leads to the degree of Bachelor of Science. It is designed for students who wish to prepare for employment as food production, quality control, research, or technical sales workers in governmental agencies, educational institutions, and in such food processing industries as canning, freezing, fermenting, milling and baking, vegetable oil processing, and confection manufacturing. Students will be urged to engage in at least one summer of employment in selected food processing industries and will be required to go on a senior inspection trip of three days' duration. (Estimated cost of inspection trip is \$35.)

Graduate Program

This program is designed to stimulate basic and applied research in the preservation and manufacture of foods, and to train scientific personnel to conduct the research, control, and production activities of the food industry. It will be administered by members of the graduate faculty in the Department of Food Technology.

I. Admission Requirements:

1. General requirements governing admission of graduate students with full status. No students on limited status will be admitted to graduate study in this department.

2. A degree of Bachelor of Science in Food Technology or in a major field of chemistry, bacteriology, chemical engineering, horticulture, or other recognized field of biological, physical, agricultural, or engineering science in which a *minimum* of the undergraduate credits are as follows: one year of college physics (8 hours); one year of calculus (6 hours); one year of college biology (6 hours); bacteriology, 5 hours; analytical chemistry, 5 hours; organic chemistry, 5 hours; physical chemistry, 4 hours; food technology or equivalent, 20 hours. Deficiencies in any of the above requirements may be made up during the first year of graduate study, but no graduate credit will be given.

IV. Degree Requirements for the Degree of Master of Science:

1. Fulfillment of the general requirements with respect to residence and credit.

2. Proficiency in reading scientific literature in one foreign language selected from German, French, or Spanish to the satisfaction of the Department of Food Technology.

3. At least one minor consisting of not less than one unit in a physical, biological, agricultural, or engineering science.

4. An acceptable thesis.

5. A final examination covering the field of general food technology and of the areas of specialization and selected minor will be required. It will be primarily an oral examination but at the option of the department may include a written section.

V. Degree Requirements for the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy:

1. A comprehensive written qualifying examination covering both major and minor fields of study must be passed before the department will admit a student to the oral preliminary examination.

2. Fulfillment of the general regulations with respect to residence, credit, minors, language proficiencies, preliminary and final examinations.

3. An acceptable thesis.

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN EDUCATION

The admission and degree requirements for the Master of Arts, Master of Science, Doctor of Philosophy, and Doctor of Education will remain substantially the same. If the new Ed.M. program here recommended is approved, it is further recommended that the present curriculum for that degree be discontinued as of September, 1950, except that students who have been admitted to the Graduate College prior to September 1, 1950, and have declared their candidacy for the Ed.M., as presently defined, by September 30, 1950, will be permitted to qualify for that degree under the present regulations. All others can become candidates only for the degrees and certificates proposed.

These two programs will be administered by the College of Education within the general administrative framework of the Graduate College.

I. Admission Requirements:

A. For the Master of Education: (1) a grade-point average of at least 3.5 for that portion of work which represents the last fifty per cent of the hours completed to secure the bachelor's degree; (2) sixteen semester hours in education with a grade-point average of 3.5 for all education courses.

B. For the Advanced Certificate in Education: (1) a master's degree from an accredited institution; (2) two years of professional employment in education.

II. Required Courses:

It is understood that the list of required courses is flexible to the extent that students who have had equivalent work will be permitted to substitute other established courses, and that new courses may be added or substituted with the approval of the Executive Faculty.

A. For the Master of Education: Education 311, Psychology of Learning for Teachers; Education 312, Mental Hygiene and the School; two of the following: Education 304, Social Foundations of Education; Education 301, Philosophy of Education; Education 302, History of American Education; Education 303, Comparative Education.

B. For the Advanced Certificate in Education: in addition to the courses listed above, Education 390, Elements of Educational Statistics; Education 413, Social Psychology and Problems of Education; and either Education 411, Psychology of Adolescence for Teachers, or Education 412, Advanced Child Development for Students of Education.

III. Degree Requirements:

A. For the Master of Education: eight units of work of which at least four must be earned in residence.

B. For the Advanced Certificate in Education: eight units of work beyond the master's degree, all of which must be taken on the Urbana campus and four of which must be taken in residence, i.e., the equivalent of one semester's or two summer sessions' work in residence.

It is the judgment of the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College and of the Senate Committee on Educational Policy that when a teacher in service, or one who has been in service, first enters upon the program leading to one of the advanced professional degrees, the student's adviser should determine whether the student has been or is teaching a subject for which he is not qualified in terms of the Limited Certificate requirements. If this is the case, then the student's program should be drawn up in such a way that it includes the work necessary to meet the minor requirements of the Limited Certificate in the subject which the student has been teaching without having met those requirements. With the approval of the adviser, courses in the subject-matter field involved which carry two-hundred numbers may be approved for advanced professional credit, though no such course may be counted as part of the work required for the Master of Arts, Master of Science, Doctor of Education, or Doctor of Philosophy degrees.

This is intended to secure the result that the upgrading procedure for teachers in service be used not only to improve their competence in the art of teaching, but also their grasp of the subject taught, in those cases where the latter is clearly inadequate.

Statement to be included in revised version of Programs in Education for Students Continuing Beyond the Fourth Year:

1. Secondary school teachers who, at the time of first registration, do not hold a valid certificate from the state in which they are employed for every subject which they are teaching will be required to take sufficient courses in the respective subject-matter fields to meet the requirements for a valid certificate. With the prior approval of an adviser, courses in subject-matter fields which carry two-hundred numbers may be approved for advanced professional credit.
2. In general, candidates for the degree of Master of Education are expected to take at least two units of work outside of the field of education. This expectation is especially applicable to students in secondary education. Candidates for this degree may take courses bearing two-hundred numbers for advanced professional credit.
3. Advanced professional credit for courses bearing two-hundred numbers is allowed under the following conditions:
 - a. That the courses be approved in advance by an adviser.
 - b. That credit be computed at the rate of one quarter unit for each semester hour of credit.
 - c. That the total credit for such courses shall not be in excess of two units.
 - d. That no credit for such courses may be counted as meeting the requirements for the degrees of Master of Arts, Master of Science, Doctor of Education, and Doctor of Philosophy.

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN STATISTICS

This program will be administered by the Department of Mathematics with a small interdepartmental advisory committee appointed by the Dean of the Graduate College. In the administration of the degree the following conditions are to be satisfied.

Upon entering graduate work in statistics the student is to choose the area of application in which he expects to take the courses required for IIC below. The work of the student will be supervised by two advisers, one in statistical theory and one in that area of application, one of whom shall be in charge of his thesis.

The student will also be asked to decide whether he expects to write his thesis in statistical theory or in the area of application. If he expects to write his thesis in the area of application, then the departments administering that area will determine the details of the program required under IIC and IID below. For example, in the field of economic statistics, the work elected under IIC and IID below would have to satisfy the requirements of a well-rounded coverage of empirical economics with a background of economic theory. Economic statistics as a major interest would accordingly require a minimum of four units in economic theory and history and six units in economic statistics, selected to complement the training in statistical theory and to maximize the benefit of the research experience provided by the dissertation.

If he expects to write his thesis in theoretical statistics, the Mathematics Department will determine the details of the program required under IID below.

If the thesis will be in several departments, these will jointly determine the details of the program under IIC and IID within the spirit of the above conditions.

The doctoral committee for each student will consist of one person for mathematics, one person for theoretical statistics, one person for the area of application, and two persons selected on the basis of the course work and area in which the thesis is written. This committee will be responsible for both the preliminary and final examinations for the doctorate. Its chairman will be from the area in which the thesis is written.

The requirements for admission include college and scholastic record sufficient to gain admission to the University of Illinois Graduate College and the completion of a thorough course in the calculus.

The requirements for the degree, in addition to language and other standard requirements, are:

I. Thesis. To show capacity for important original contributions to one or more of the following:

- (A) The development of new statistical ideas and methods.

- (B) Research improving the applications of statistical methods.
- (C) New applications of statistical methods in some field of application.

II. Minimum Course Work.

(A) Mathematics. Mathematics 315, 347, 348 or similar courses of approximately equivalent content.

(B) Theoretical Statistics. Mathematics 363 and eight additional units of which at least four are 400 courses, from a list of courses prepared by the Department of Mathematics, and including all courses jointly listed by the Department of Mathematics and areas of application of statistics.

(C) Area of Application. Four units of which at least two must be 400 courses, and none of which may emphasize training in statistical methods as such. These courses must be taken in some single field of application of statistical methods.

(D) Optional. At least six units of which at least four are 400 courses. These courses may not be taken in more than two departments.

Note 1. So long as a student fulfills the standard requirements for graduate degrees in the University of Illinois, he can complete some of these course requirements as an undergraduate, or by outside reading, or by any other means approved by the Department of Mathematics.

Note 2. It is expected that at least one year will be required for the completion of the thesis after the above course requirements have been fulfilled. Thus a student entering graduate work without having any of the above units would need a minimum of three and one-half to four years to complete the degree, while a student entering with six of these units completed would need a minimum of about three years.

Note 3. A.M. Requirements: The student will need to offer Mathematics 315, 347, 348, 363 or their equivalents, one other unit of 300 courses, and two units of 400 courses in theoretical statistics, two units of courses under IIC and two units of courses under IID. Usually a year and a half will be needed to complete these requirements, unless some of the courses are completed in accordance with Note 1 above.

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN BUSINESS

In developing this program for the Doctor of Philosophy in Business, the goal is to serve the public by contributing to the continuing development of more responsible and better informed business administrators. The University has the facilities to train men as administrators through instruction and to advance knowledge in the field of business administration through research. It is important to aid men in acquiring the knowledge, the technical competence, the resourcefulness, the vision, the insight into the nature of the administrative process, and the instinctive acceptance of responsibility that characterizes successful administrators.

The Department of Business Organization and Operation also desires to offer this major program so that it might have a part in the further development of men to do the work of scholars in this particular field. Such men to be trained properly for this work should have a wide knowledge of the applied fields as well as a close acquaintance with basic economics.

The specific objectives of the program are: (a) to apply the techniques and the disciplines of the social sciences to the analysis of data in the area of business administration; (b) to seek and point out the economic relationships which permeate all business operations; (c) to interpret the meaning which attaches to human relations related to business activities; (d) to prepare students for teaching, research, and administrative positions.

The proposed Doctor of Philosophy degree requires examination in five fields of which two are in the Department of Business Organization and Operation, two in the Department of Economics, and one which may be either in the Department of Economics or the Division of Accountancy, depending on the background and interests of the individual student. In addition, candidates may offer one field outside of the Department of Business Organization and the Department of Economics.

Courses in areas outside of the two departments offering the joint degree which are cross-titled to courses in either of the two departments are not considered as additional fields when offered by candidates for this degree.

The general administration of the degree will be through an interdepartmental committee. The Committee shall consist of not more than nine members appointed for annual terms. The five members from Commerce will be from the following areas: Accountancy, Economics, Finance, Management, and Marketing.

Four members from non-commerce departments shall be selected from the following departments or areas: Communications, Geography, History, Labor and Industrial Relations, Law, Mechanical Engineering, Philosophy, Psychology, Political Science, and Sociology.

The committee shall select its own chairman from the members of the committee from Commerce.

1. The committee should be nominated by the graduate faculties of the departments of Business Organization and Operation and Economics, and appointed by the Dean of the Graduate College.

2. A majority of the members of the committee should be full-time members of the graduate faculty of Business Organization and Operation and Economics.

3. The committee would function as a policy group and a board of review rather than as an administrative body responsible for day-to-day execution of the program. They would consider procedures for assignment of advisers, guidance of students in selecting courses of study, examination of candidates, and selection of thesis topics. They would consider available courses and recommend changes therein or new courses to be added. Periodically, they would review the program as a whole and its administration, and suggest changes. They would, however, delegate the actual day-to-day administration to one or more individual staff members who might or might not be members of the committee.

4. The Committee would be available also as a panel of technical consultants to assist students and their advisers in the carrying out of specific thesis projects.

I. Admission Requirements:

Candidates for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Business should have a broad training in business subjects, such as is represented by graduation from an accredited college or school of business. Students who have not graduated from a college of commerce, school of business administration, or an institution offering an equivalent program, must present a minimum of thirty hours in commerce subjects, including at least one course in each of the following: accountancy, economics, management, and marketing. Students lacking adequate preparation for admission may, with the consent of the adviser or committee in charge, be admitted but must remove any deficiencies during the first year of residence by taking prescribed courses without graduate credit.

II. Degree Requirements:

1. A minimum of twenty-four units of graduate work conforming to the grade standards of the Graduate College.

2. Up to eight units of research resulting in an acceptable doctoral dissertation in the field of business (see list of suggested topics following).

3. Demonstrated ability to read French and German. The Committee administering the program may recommend appropriate substitutions to the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College in individual cases.

4. A minimum of two units in the field of Economic Theory.

5. A minimum of two units in the field of Management.

6. A minimum of two units in the field of Marketing.

7. A minimum of four units in any two of the following fields: Economic Statistics and Forecasting, Public Finance, Private Finance, Labor, Foreign Trade and International Economics, Economic History, Government Regulation and Regulated Enterprises, Accountancy.

8. The presentation of four units in any of the following fields: Economic Theory, Marketing,¹ Public Finance, Labor, Economic History, Accountancy, Management, Economic Statistics and Forecasting, Private Finance, Foreign Trade and International Economics, Governmental Regulation and Regulated Enterprises.

¹ The Committee may require certain courses and may allow considerable flexibility in the choice and combination of courses in the various fields. For example, a candidate particularly interested in Marketing may, with the permission of the Committee, consider certain courses in the fields of Consumer Economics, Foreign Trade, Transportation, or graduate courses in Marketing Farm Products as "Marketing."

9. The presentation of an acceptable master's thesis or of work in substitution therefor as permitted or required by the Committee.

10. The candidate may substitute two units in a related field outside of the Department of Business Organization and Operation and the Department of Economics for any one of the fields detailed in sub-paragraph 8, above.

AGREEMENTS WITH MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION

OUTLINE OF CONDITIONS OF PROPOSED AGREEMENTS BETWEEN MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION AND UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF A STUDENT RESIDENCE HALL AND STAFF APARTMENT BUILDING FOR THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

(Recommended by a Committee of the Medical Center Commission and the Committee on Chicago Departments of the University Board of Trustees June 15, 1950.)

1. The University will convey to the Commission the site for the residence hall (immediately west of the main Medical-Dental-Pharmacy Building). The Commission will provide the site for the apartment building (four blocks east of main building) including certain present buildings to be incorporated with the staff apartment project.

2. The Commission is to procure all the necessary temporary and permanent financing for the proposed project on conditions mutually acceptable to the two parties. (Equitable Life Assurance Society has offered to lend the Medical Center Commission the total amount required for construction and equipment of the projects up to \$2,700,000, with an informal tentative maximum of \$3,000,000, at 4 per cent to be fully amortized in twenty-five years, with a commitment fee of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1 per cent, subject to a mutually satisfactory agreement between the Commission and the University.)

3. The Commission agrees to construct and equip the residence hall and the apartment building from funds thus secured, buildings to be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications provided by architects previously appointed by the University.

4. Bids are to be solicited by public advertisement, opened in the presence of University representatives, and contracts for all construction, equipment, and remodeling are to be let on written approval of the University. Payments for work

are to be made on written approval of the University and Commission, but not in excess of the amount of the loan.

5. When improvements are completed, the Commission will lease all premises to the University for the period of the loan.

6. The University is to pay all operating expenses including insurance and a rental of an amount sufficient to cover debt service each year until the loan is fully paid. (Estimated debt service on a maximum loan of \$3,000,000 is \$195,000; estimated income is \$146,000; balance to be met from General University Income \$49,000 a year. On the basis of architect's estimate, \$3,600,000 cost of these improvements, debt service would be \$234,000 a year and difference \$88,000.)

7. When all debt obligations are fully paid, the Commission will convey all premises to the University (offer of financing of Equitable loan would be non-callable for five years, thereafter at premiums ranging from $\frac{1}{2}$ to 3%).

NOTE: The foregoing conditions are in conformity to the conditions agreed on by representatives of the Commission and the University March 29, 1949, approved by the Board April 21, 1949, and reaffirmed by the Board May 19, 1950, except that construction is to be supervised by the architects, who, although they were chosen by the University, will become agents of the Commission, instead of being "University architects" as previously provided.

OFFER OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS TO THE MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION RESPECTING THE CONSTRUCTION BY THE MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION OF CERTAIN STAFF HOUSING FACILITIES AND STUDENT RESIDENCE HALL TO BE LEASED TO THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

TO THE MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

An emergency exists at the Professional Colleges of the University of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as the "University") with respect to housing for members of the staff of and students attending the Professional Colleges, and the University is in urgent need of additional housing facilities for said purposes.

The University now owns the following described property:

PARCEL A

Lots One (1) to Ten (10) inclusive and Fifty-nine (59) and Sixty (60) and Lots Ninety-five (95) and Ninety-six (96) of Potter Palmer's Subdivision of Lot Eleven (11) and that part of Lot Twelve (12) lying South of the center line of Polk Street, except Winchester Avenue, in Codewise's Subdivision of the West Half ($W\frac{1}{2}$) of the Southeast Quarter ($SE\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Thirty-nine (39) North, Range Fourteen (14) East of the Third Principal Meridian, except the West one and thirty-seven hundredths (1.37) chains,

and the Medical Center Commission (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission") now owns the following described property:

PARCEL B

Lots One (1) to Twenty-four (24) inclusive in Sturges et al Resubdivision of Block Nine (9) in Assessor's Division of the East Half ($E\frac{1}{2}$) of the Southeast Quarter ($SE\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Thirty-nine (39) North, Range Fourteen (14) East of the Third Principal Meridian.

In order to procure the necessary staff and student housing for said Professional Colleges, and in consideration of the Commission making arrangements for temporary and permanent financing of and the construction and equipment of the necessary buildings for that purpose on the above-described parcels, and, as may hereafter be agreed upon by the University and the Commission, for the remodeling and repairing of such of the existing buildings as are retained on Parcel B hereinabove mentioned, the University hereby offers to convey to the Commission the tract of land now owned by it and hereinabove described as Parcel A by deed in substantially the form attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A".

The Commission, in consideration of the conveyance to it and by acceptance of this offer, shall agree to arrange for temporary and permanent financing on terms mutually acceptable to the Commission and to the University for the con-

struction of a student residence hall on said Parcel A, a suitable building for staff housing on said Parcel B, including the repairing and remodeling of the existing buildings (retained as aforesaid) on Parcel B, and all equipment and furniture necessary therefor, and to construct and equip said buildings and remodel and repair retained existing buildings on Parcel B for the purposes aforesaid, all to be done in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit "B" hereto attached.

Upon advice in writing addressed to the President of the Board of Trustees of the University by the Commission that it has procured temporary and permanent financing, to be mutually agreed upon, for the matters above mentioned, the Commission will simultaneously with the delivery by the University of its aforementioned deed execute and deliver a lease in substantially the form attached hereto and marked Exhibit "B" to the University. It is understood that the blank amount of rent to be paid as provided in Section 3 of said lease, shall be such amount and on semi-annual dates as may be mutually agreed upon at the time said lease is executed.

Upon acceptance of this offer, the University for and on behalf of the Medical Center Commission, will prepare and submit to the Commission all necessary plans, specifications and estimates of cost necessary for the construction of said buildings, it being understood and agreed that the expenditures by the Medical Center Commission for the construction, repair, remodeling and equipment of said buildings, including all extras, shall not exceed the amount of the permanent financing therefor, and that the University is to be reimbursed by the Commission from the proceeds of the permanent financing of the construction, repair and equipment of the aforesaid buildings for all funds advanced by it for that purpose, but only after all other costs and expenses of such construction, equipment and repair have been fully paid, and that there are sufficient funds therefore from such permanent financing at that time to reimburse the University for such funds advanced.

Upon receipt by the Medical Center Commission of the plans, specifications and estimates of cost necessary for the construction of said buildings, the Commission agrees that it will advertise for bids for the construction of said buildings by giving at least three weeks' notice thereof, and that bids will be opened publicly in the presence of representatives of the University of Illinois and that the bids received will be turned over to representatives of the University of Illinois for analysis and will award all contracts responsive to the written recommendations of the University of Illinois.

THIS INDENTURE made this day of, 1950, by and between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a body politic and corporate of the State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as the "University"), party of the first part, and Medical Center Commission, a body politic and corporate of the State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission"), party of the second part,

WHEREAS the University is the owner of the premises hereinafter described, now vacant and unimproved, and the Commission is the owner of certain property, now improved with certain buildings thereon (hereinafter referred to as the "other property"); and

WHEREAS the University is in need of housing facilities for the staff and student body of its Professional Colleges; and

WHEREAS the Commission has agreed to construct buildings necessary for the above purposes on the premises hereinafter described and upon the other property now owned by the Commission and to procure temporary and permanent financing for said construction, and the Commission further agrees, upon the execution and delivery of this deed, to execute and deliver a lease covering the premises hereinafter described and the other property and all buildings now or hereafter located thereon:

NOW, THEREFORE, the University, in consideration of the agreements of the Commission and Ten Dollars in hand paid, hereby conveys and quitclaims to the Commission the following described property in the County of Cook and State of Illinois, to wit:

Lots One (1) to Ten (10) inclusive, Fifty-nine (59), Sixty (60), Ninety-five (95) and Ninety-six (96), and all interest now owned or hereafter acquired in and to the alleys adjoining any of said Lots, of Potter Palmer's Subdivision of Lot Eleven (11) and that part of Lot Twelve (12) lying South of the Center line of Polk Street, except Winchester Avenue, in Codewise's Subdivision of the West Half (W½) of the Southeast Quarter (SE¼) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Thirty-nine (39) North, Range Fourteen (14) East of the Third Principal Meridian, except the West one and thirty-seven hundredths (1.37) chains.

It is understood and agreed that this conveyance is made upon the express condition that the construction of the aforementioned buildings is to be commenced on or before June 1, 1953, and in the event the Commission shall fail to commence the construction as aforementioned, then this conveyance shall be null and void, and the estate hereby conveyed shall immediately revert to and be revested in the University, and the University shall forthwith have the right to re-enter and repossess the premises hereby conveyed.

WITNESSETH:

SECTION 1. The Lessor, in consideration of the rents herein reserved and of the covenants and agreements herein contained on the part of the Lessee to be kept, observed and performed, has demised and leased and does by these presents demise and lease unto the Lessee the following described real estate in the County of Cook and State of Illinois, to wit:

Parcel A

Lots One (1) to Ten (10) inclusive and Fifty-nine (59) and Sixty (60) and Lots Ninety-five (95) and Ninety-six (96) of Potter Palmer's Subdivision of Lot Eleven (11) and that part of Lot Twelve (12) lying South of the center line of Polk Street, except Winchester Avenue, in Codewise's Subdivision of the West Half ($W\frac{1}{2}$) of the Southeast Quarter ($SE\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Thirty-nine (39) North, Range Fourteen (14) East of the Third Principal Meridian, except the West one and thirty-seven hundredths (1.37) chains,

which premises are at present vacant and unimproved and on which is to be erected a Student Residence Hall (hereinafter referred to as the "Residence Hall"); and

Parcel B

Lots One (1) to Twenty-four (24) inclusive in Sturges et al Resubdivision of Block Nine (9) in Assessor's Division of the East Half ($E\frac{1}{2}$) of the Southeast Quarter ($SE\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Thirty-nine (39) North, Range Fourteen (14) East of the Third Principal Meridian,

which premises are at present vacant and unimproved and on which is to be erected is to be erected a ten story Staff Apartment Building (hereinafter referred to as the "Apartment Building").

The Lessor further agrees, as soon as may be after the date hereof, to procure ordinances necessary for and at its own cost and expense to complete the vacation of the east and west alley south of and adjoining Lots 1 to 10 inclusive and north of and adjoining Lots 59 and 96 and also that part of the north and south alley lying between Lots 59, 60, 95 and 96, all referred to in Parcel A, and that part of the north and south alley lying west of and adjoining Lots 1 to 12 inclusive and east of and adjoining Lots 13 to 24 inclusive, all referred to in Parcel B; as and when the alleys aforementioned have been vacated, it is agreed by the parties hereto that the same shall be and constitute a part of the premises hereby demised and leased, which are defined as Parcels A and B and all buildings thereon with all equipment and furnishings therein, and are hereinafter referred to as the "demised premises".

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the demised premises above described and all buildings and improvements now thereon or hereafter placed or erected thereon, together with all the rights, privileges, easements and appurtenances thereunto attaching and belonging, unto the Lessee for and during the term and upon the provisions hereinafter specified.

SECTION 2. This lease shall be effective for a primary term beginning on the day of, 1950, and ending on the 30th day of June, 1951,

and the Lessor hereby gives and grants to the Lessee the right and option of renewing this lease for successive two year periods until the year 1974 and thereafter for a one year period until the day of, 1975. It is further agreed that unless the Lessee notifies the Lessor at least sixty days prior to the expiration date of the primary term or of any two year period thereafter while this lease, by its terms or by successive extensions thereof shall be in effect, of its intention not to renew the same, this lease shall be automatically renewed for the next succeeding two year or one year period, as the case may be.

SECTION 3. The Lessee, in consideration of the leasing aforesaid and in further consideration of the Lessor's covenants and agreements herein contained, hereby covenants and agrees to pay to the Lessor as rent for said demised premises (a) the sum of \$100 in advance for the period beginning on the date of the execution hereof and ending on the day of the date on which the construction of said Residence Hall and Apartment Building as hereinafter provided shall be completed, but not later than June 30, 1954, and (b) after completion or from and after said date, whichever is earlier, further agrees to pay as rent during the balance of the two year period then in effect and during each two year period subsequent thereto in which this lease shall be in effect by virtue of renewals thereof, effected as aforementioned, the sum of \$....., payable in semi-annual installments of \$..... each on the 10th day of and in each year.

It is agreed that the semi-annual rent is to be assigned or pledged as security for the obligations of the Lessor incurred by it in accordance with the provisions of Section 5 hereof, and such assignment or pledge shall only be effective upon delivery of an executed counterpart thereof to the Lessee, and thereafter all payments of said rentals shall be made to said assignee or the pledgee at such place as it may, in writing, direct.

SECTION 4. The Lessor, in consideration of the rents herein reserved and of the covenants and agreements herein mentioned to be kept and performed by the Lessee, does hereby transfer, assign and set over to the Lessee all of its right, title and interest in and to each of the respective existing leases, whether oral or written, demising and leasing any part or portion of the present buildings on the premises described in Parcel B, together with all rent due and payable under said leases on the day of, 1950, and all rents under said leases which shall become due and payable thereafter. It is further agreed that the Lessee shall have the sole right to manage and operate the demised premises and be entitled to sublet any or all of the demised premises and to collect all rentals and receive and retain under its control all income derived or accruing from the use of any part of the demised premises, and the Lessee agrees to pay all expenses of operation of said demised premises and the expenses of heat, light, power, water, janitor services and maintenance of the demised premises and all other expenses incident to the operation thereof; provided, however, that all rents so collected during the period of remodeling shall be by the Lessee used and applied, so far as the same may extend and be remaining after payment of expenses as in this Section provided, toward the cost of remodeling, reconditioning and improving the buildings to be retained now standing on Parcel B.

SECTION 5. The Lessor agrees to construct and erect and fully equip upon Parcel A the aforesaid Residence Hall and upon Parcel B the aforesaid Apartment Building, and further agrees, upon terms and conditions satisfactory to Lessee, to procure and provide, by and through its own obligations and at its own expense, all financing and funds necessary to complete the construction and erection of said buildings, to furnish said buildings, pay all architects' fees, including all advances made by the Lessee for that purpose, and any additional cost of remodeling the buildings to be retained now standing on Parcel B. It is further understood and agreed that said Residence Hall shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by Messrs. Naess & Murphy and that said Apartment Building shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by Messrs. Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, and that all such plans and specifications and the letting of all contracts for the construction, equipment and remodeling of said buildings and purchase of equipment and all payments for any and all such work to

contractors and of architects' fees shall be subject to the prior written approval of the Lessee, and further that such construction and work shall at all times be under the supervision and direction of said architects.

SECTION 6. The Lessee hereby covenants and agrees that it will, while this lease shall be in effect, carry and maintain at its cost and expense fire insurance with extended coverage upon the aforesaid buildings and equipment in such amounts and companies as may be deemed satisfactory to it, which policies shall provide that losses, if any, will be payable to the Lessor and the Lessee as their respective interests may appear, and in the event the rent payable hereunder is assigned or pledged, to carry and maintain such insurance in the amount as may be required by, which in the event of loss or damage shall be applied in accordance with, the provisions of the indenture or agreement securing said assignment or pledge.

SECTION 7. The Lessee hereby covenants and agrees to and with the Lessor that it will not use or permit any person to use the demised premises or any buildings at any time situated upon the premises or any part of such buildings for any use or purpose in violation of the applicable laws of the United States, the State of Illinois, the ordinances or other regulations of the City of Chicago, Illinois, or of other lawful authorities, and while this lease shall be in effect said demised premises and every part thereof and all buildings at any time situated thereon shall be kept by Lessee in a clean and wholesome condition and generally that all applicable health and police regulations shall in all respects and at all times be fully complied with by the Lessee, and also that improvements at any time situated upon the demised premises and all the sidewalks and areas in front and along the side of the same, as well as in the rear thereof, shall be made and kept, at the Lessee's own expense, safe, secure and conformable to the applicable requirements of the City of Chicago, Illinois, and all other public authorities, and the Lessor kept harmless and indemnified at all times against any loss, damage, cost or expense, for which the Lessor or the Lessee may be legally liable, by reason of a failure so to do in any respect, or by reason of any accident, loss or damage resulting to any person or property by reason of any use which may be made, or condition of said premises, or of any improvements at any time situated thereon, or by reason of or growing out of any act or thing done or omitted to be done upon the said premises, or in any building at any time situated thereon.

SECTION 8. The Lessee covenants and agrees at its own expense to maintain and repair all buildings now or hereafter located on the demised premises, and further agrees that it will not make any changes in the construction of the buildings now or hereafter located on the demised premises which will adversely affect the income therefrom without the approval of the Lessor.

SECTION 9. If at any time while this lease is in effect the Lessee shall fail to extend or renew this lease, or for a period of two months fail to make the rental payments herein provided, or shall make default in any of the covenants and agreements herein contained and two months shall elapse after such default without the same being remedied, the Lessor shall have the right, on written notice to the Lessee, to declare the said term ended and the said demised premises or any part thereof, either with or without process of law, to re-enter and the said Lessee and every other person occupying, in or upon the same to expel, remove and put out, using such force as may be necessary in so doing and the said premises again to repossess and enjoy as in its first and former estate.

SECTION 10. It is understood and agreed that this lease is subject to and accepted by the Lessee upon the condition that in the event of non-use of the demised premises, or any part thereof, for the purpose described in "An Act in relation to the establishment of a Medical Center District in the City of Chicago and for the control and management thereof", approved June 4, 1941, as amended, or of the disuse of the demised premises, or any part thereof, for a period of one year, all right, title and interest of the Lessee hereunder shall cease and determine and the demised premises revert to the Lessor, its successors or assigns, as provided by said Act as amended.

SECTION 11. If the Lessee shall maintain this lease in full force and effect until all of the Lessor's indebtedness referred to in Section 5 hereof is fully paid,

released and discharged, the Lessee may, as a matter of right and agreement, request of and the Lessor, upon such request, agrees to make, execute and deliver a good and sufficient deed conveying the demised premises to the Lessee. It is further understood and agreed that the Lessee shall have the right, in order to secure the aforementioned conveyance of the demised premises, to exercise any right of Lessor to prepay and discharge the said indebtedness, and upon such payment and discharge, notwithstanding the provisions of this Section, the Lessee shall be entitled to demand and receive the aforementioned deed of conveyance of the demised premises.

SECTION 12. It is understood that, if the Lessee shall fail to maintain this lease in effect on its present terms as long as any of the Lessor's indebtedness referred to in Section 5 hereof shall be outstanding, the Lessee shall forfeit all right, title and interest in and to the demised premises and shall forfeit all claims for moneys expended in maintenance, improvements, repairs, insurance, and any and all other moneys, of every kind and nature, expended by it in the operation and improvement of the demised premises and all rights to acquire the demised premises as hereinbefore provided.

SECTION 13. This lease may be simultaneously executed in any number of counterparts, each of which when so executed and delivered shall be an original, but such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same instrument.

REPORT ON CASE OF PROFESSOR R. H. BLODGETT

REPORT OF FACT-FINDING COMMITTEE

June 12, 1950

DEAR PROVOST GRIFFITH:

On May 18 you wrote, asking us to serve as a "fact-finding group on the question of possible violation of academic freedom in the Department of Economics." You wrote that you did not wish to prejudice the case by assuming that there was a violation of academic freedom, which might be the implication if you presented the question to the Senate Committee on Academic Freedom. You concluded by stating, "What I really need is assistance in the determination of prior fact, viz., has anything occurred with respect to Professor Blodgett either directly or indirectly, which requires that a question about academic freedom be raised?"

From the outset, the members of the Committee have assumed that this was an assignment of major significance to the University and to all individuals concerned with the question. In consequence the Committee has worked very hard. Whatever else you may conclude about our report, I am sure you will grant that we have gone about this task seriously and with industry. We have, of course, interviewed Professor Blodgett, Dean Bowen, and Professor Hagen. In all, we have heard twenty individuals and, in doing this, we have sought out, so far as we could determine them, all varying points of view. This has not been a one-sided examination.

Each individual who appeared before us gave the Committee his full cooperation. While some said they had no objection to their names being used in our report in relation to this testimony, the members of your Committee are deeply sensitive to the fact that they are the repositories of confidences that must not be violated. We wish to record the fact, also, that while wide divergences in opinion and judgment were expressed, the testimony on the essential facts brought out before the Committee was amazingly uniform. All the statements made were sincere and frank. After hearing the successive statements of those who testified and after observing their demeanor and their efforts to be fair in all they said, the Committee is puzzled over the fact that individuals apparently so candid and reasonable could have so much difficulty in getting along with each other. But here we are ahead of our report.

The commission to the Committee, according to your letter of May 18, had to do with the question of academic freedom. The Committee finds it undesirable, if not impossible, to report on that question alone. The issue of academic freedom is inextricably woven into a wider texture. We could give an answer to the academic freedom question but if we dealt with that alone, it would be an answer out of con-

text. It would not convey an understanding of the problem involved. From the very first, each successive person who was heard by us talked about a human-relations controversy. The facts disclosed by all the persons were essentially the same but, with few exceptions, they were not focused on academic freedom. Some who testified found it difficult even to identify an issue on that subject. We sincerely believe we can perform our services more acceptably if we describe and discuss the question assigned to us in a broader setting. In doing this, we shall devote attention primarily to the Department of Economics, but we shall also, on occasion, extend our remarks to the College of Commerce and Business Administration.

Background

Twenty years ago such men as Weston, Robinson, and Bogart dominated the situation in Economics. Professor Scovill was then, as he still is, active in Business Organization and Operation and in Accounting. C. M. Thompson was the Dean. In 1933, Professor Weston died, and Professor Robinson retired. Then followed what has been described as the "limping period." In 1937 new blood was introduced when several men, including Professor Blodgett, joined the staff. Then came World War II and its repercussions on higher education. A number of the staff went into the armed services, and a substantial number accepted positions in the various departments of government. Before the war, the largest number of staff members in the Department of Economics (counting assistants) was thirty-five. The Department for years had been understaffed. After the war the situation was well-nigh desperate as a depleted staff labored to meet the impact of mounting student enrollments. Professor Scovill was performing valiantly as Acting Dean of the College, but when other divisions of the University were planning and acting with all the manpower they could bring to bear on the problem of postwar enrollments, the College of Commerce and Business Administration was almost literally marking time, looking for a dean. In 1947 Howard R. Bowen was appointed to the position. The task that confronted him and his colleagues was a critical one.

When Dean Bowen arrived on the campus, he found that decisions on various policies and actions relating to the affairs of the College, including advancements for members of the staff, had been held in abeyance until his arrival. He was faced, therefore, not only with matters for decision on the ongoing problems of the College but with a backlog of unsolved issues. The immediate task ahead was to build up a depleted staff and to build it well. He chose, because he believed the situation there more critical than elsewhere, to give his attention first to the Department of Economics. It is not within the assignment of this Committee to determine whether it is wiser, assuming resources are available, to build a staff rapidly or through slower evolutionary steps. Dean Bowen felt it to be his assignment to proceed expeditiously with staff additions to build up a depleted staff, not only in number, but in distinction and potential distinction in teaching and scholarship. There was agreement among those who appeared before our Committee on these objectives. There was recognition that the Department of Economics was badly understaffed and there was unanimity that the goal should be the organization of a balanced and distinguished staff; that the goal should be a distinguished department.

Developments under Bowen

Dean Bowen is a man of high intelligence, high standards, and personal charm. He is industrious and energetic. On becoming Dean of the College, he proceeded forthwith to execute his assignment as he conceived it. Staff additions were made and curricular changes were initiated. No one who testified questioned the desirability of curricular changes. In fact, changes in the curriculum had been initiated by the staff in economics before Dean Bowen came. Some of these curricular changes involved the reorganization of the courses of the older members of the staff. The new staff members had to be fitted into the program with assignments in teaching and research. The older members, of course, were aware that they had been carrying overloads, but to agree to an objective becomes a matter of different complexion when the issue touches the instructor's own courses. As the newer men were fitted into the program of the department and changes were made in the courses of the older men, there often was inadequate consultation with the men whose courses were involved. This created resentment and apprehension.

The newer men, also, developed sensitivities. They had a right to expect teaching and research assignments. It was disagreeable for them to have to fight their way to these assignments. There was evidence of inequalities in rank and salary, and evidence of tactless remarks by the Dean and Professor Hagen, the present Chairman of the Department. Feelings were hurt. The older staff members developed the conviction that they had no standing with the administration; that they had no one in the administration to whom they could go with their questions and problems for friendly consultation; that the Dean and Professor Hagen placed a low estimate on their worth. There were innuendoes and some direct statements that the teaching and scholarship of the older men were outmoded, and, on the other hand, that the newer men were picked on the basis of their adherence to one school of economic thought. Charges were made that the older men were failing to use their skills and tools that were generally accepted in the discipline, and countercharges were made that these accusations were unfounded and that the newer members of the staff were indoctrinating with a special brand of economic policy.

Eventually a cleavage developed between the older and newer staff members. The Committee notes the fact that the division is not so definite as that, and that there are moderates who were anxious to work out a program of amicable teamwork. In the main, though, the cleft is between the new and the old. This cleavage resulted in practices involving caucusing when votes were taken in the Department and in its Executive Committee. There was some evidence of this procedure in the events leading up to the election of the present Chairman of the Department. There was clear evidence of it when the issue relative to Professor Blodgett's leaving the University came before the staff of the Department. The Committee wishes to record its condemnation of such practices. They are unworthy of university people and are incompatible with the best traditions of a society of scholars.

We have mentioned the fact that charges were made that there had been a lack of consultation with staff members when the courses of these individuals were under consideration for change. There were further charges with supporting evidence that the statutes of the University and the established procedures of the Department were, at times, ignored in the determination of curricular changes and in establishing policies. The Department of Economics is now organized under a chairman as distinguished from an organization under a head. The charge is that Professor Hagen, the Chairman, did on at least one occasion of some importance (as evidenced by ensuing events) ignore his Executive Committee. Charges were also made that Dean Bowen has taken actions without going through established channels. The general atmosphere is one of apprehension and distrust. It centers in the Department of Economics but extends to the staff of the whole College.

The Issue of Academic Freedom

Charges have been made by some individuals that academic freedom has been infringed in the College, and more particularly in the Department of Economics. Since these charges, for the most part, focus on the case of Professor Ralph H. Blodgett, we shall devote our attention primarily to it.

Professor Blodgett came to the University as an Assistant Professor in 1937. He was promoted to Associate Professor in 1941, and to Professor in 1945. Through the years of his service here, he had been given a growing number of responsibilities. These responsibilities in 1947 included the following: He taught at the undergraduate level a course for non-commerce students on the principles of economics; two courses on the subject of comparative economic systems, one at the undergraduate and the other at the graduate level; and a year (two-semester) course in economic theory at the graduate level. In addition, he was the adviser for graduate students in economics. His writings have been substantial. He was co-author (Gemmell and Blodgett) of *Principles of Economics*, and author of *Principles of Economics* (a text of his own), and *Comparative Economic Systems*. He has written some articles, but his original contributions to the periodical literature in economics have not been extensive. His textbooks have had substantial adoptions in other universities. He is a good teacher.

Those who charge violation of academic freedom agree that the Blodgett case is not the usual one in which that subject is involved. Professor Blodgett was not

discharged. They contend, as the Committee understands them, that Professor Blodgett was relieved, step by step, of his responsibilities in the Department until what remained was but a semblance; that statements were made by the Chairman of the Department disparaging his scholarship; that the Dean and the Chairman of the Department charged him unjustly with not employing in his teaching and writings recognized skills in the field of economics; that efforts were made by the Chairman to discriminate against him in salary advancement; that these actions were taken because Blodgett did not stress a particular brand of economics acceptable to Dean Bowen and Professor Hagen and that the cumulative effect of all these constituted a compelling force to make him leave the University in order to maintain his self-respect. Facts were presented to the Committee in support of these charges, on the strength of which the contention was made that there had been a violation of academic freedom.

The Department offers two basic courses on the principles of economics—one for commerce students (now Economics 102-103) and the other for non-commerce students (now Economics 108). Professor Blodgett, as we have indicated, taught the latter course, but his texts, at one time, had been used in both. The evidence is that Professor Hunter (now deceased), when he was the Head of the Department, had changed the text in the course for the commerce students. Later, under Dean Bowen, the course (Economics 108) for non-commerce students was transferred from Blodgett to another instructor, who does not use the Blodgett text. Professor Blodgett had taught two courses on comparative economic systems. In the one for undergraduate students, the Blodgett text, *Comparative Economic Systems*, was used. This course was transferred to another instructor, who does not use the Blodgett text. Professor Blodgett was given and accepted the responsibility for teaching another course (Economics 109) intended for non-commerce students who wish to take additional work in that field. He taught that course during 1949-1950, using his own text, but he had only fourteen students in it. There was some evidence that the plans for the curriculum involved giving greater emphasis to this course and that as a consequence it probably would have a considerable increase in enrollment next year.

Mention was made above that Professor Blodgett had been the adviser for graduate students in economics. He was relieved of that responsibility by Dean Bowen. More recently a move was projected by Professor Hagen, Chairman of the Department, to limit Blodgett's graduate course in economic theory from a year to a one-semester course. This proposal had not been approved by the Executive Committee of the Department when Blodgett decided to leave the University to accept an offer from the University of Florida. We shall mention the move to restrict the economic theory course in relation to another incident.

To what extent these various actions were discussed with Professor Blodgett before the steps just outlined were taken is not clear. There is evidence that he was consulted as to some. As to one move the evidence was that he was told about it by the then-Acting Head of the Department (Professor Brown) in the morning and action on it was announced in the afternoon of the same day.

Last spring when salary adjustments for 1950-1951 for members of the staff were under consideration by the Executive Committee of the Department, Professor Hagen, Chairman of the Department, opposed any increase for Blodgett. Hagen was supported by one or two members of the Committee. The majority, however, voted to recommend an increase of \$250. This recommendation was transmitted by Hagen to Dean Bowen, who raised the amount to \$300 to make Blodgett's salary the same as that of another staff member. Professor Blodgett received \$7500 last year (1949-1950). In March, when he had received an overture from Florida, he told Professor Hagen about it and inquired what he might expect here by way of increase for next year. Professor Hagen stated that he did not feel free to disclose this information without consulting Dean Bowen. Professor Blodgett did not have a complete offer at that time. He had a statement that Florida wished to invite him to come there at a salary of \$8,000, but this was contingent on the approval of the Florida budget. Professor Hagen told Blodgett that he could not recommend \$8,000 for him, since that would bring his salary out of line with others. During this conversation, Hagen told Blodgett that he

expected to recommend a reduction in time for Blodgett's graduate course in economic theory. Professor Hagen testified he told Blodgett that he was looked upon as a good teacher and that he hoped he would remain at Illinois. A day or two afterwards, Hagen, having obtained Dean Bowen's consent, told Blodgett that the increase recommended for him next year was \$250 (later increased to \$300).

Professor Hagen did not take the question of the Florida negotiations with Blodgett to the Executive Committee of the Department. Blodgett, to be sure, did not have a complete offer from Florida when he talked to Hagen, but, in view of the near finality of the Florida approach, Hagen probably should have done that. It should be observed that a chairman of a department (as distinguished from a head) under the statutes of the University has no clear powers, by virtue of his chairmanship, to decide departmental questions of policy. He is Chairman of the Executive Committee, but in settling matters of policy, he is but one of the Executive Committee which settles them. Whatever the proper judgment on this question may be, the fact is that Hagen was criticized by various individuals for not having taken this question forthwith to the Executive Committee, and this is cited as one of the instances in which an administrative officer failed to act through proper channels.

On May 4, Blodgett informed Hagen that he had received a definite offer from Florida and that he had accepted it. News of Blodgett's action became known almost immediately. In a setting already charged with apprehension and distrust, Blodgett's leaving was fuel for the flame. Some staff members went to Hagen at once to persuade him to act to keep Blodgett here. It was reported to us that Hagen resisted this move. We were told that Hagen on that occasion said that Blodgett is incompetent. Hagen was requested by staff members to call a meeting of the staff of the Department. He is reported to have resisted that move also but, on hearing that a petition for a staff meeting was being circulated, he called a meeting. At the meeting he explained the use of the word "incompetent." He spoke particularly of Blodgett's graduate course and said that, while he did not look upon Blodgett as best-fitted to present the essential materials in that required course, he did not mean to imply that Blodgett was incompetent in a general sense. A motion was presented to the group, aimed to seek ways to keep Blodgett here; it had a note of censure in it for Hagen. The vote was 22 to 22. Another vote was called for. Professor Hagen said if this vote carried, he would look upon it as a vote of censure of himself. He also said that, regardless of the outcome of this vote, he would take the Blodgett question back to the Executive Committee. The second vote on this motion lost by a few votes. Hagen gave up the chair at this meeting and voted on the motions. Blodgett did not attend the meeting. Shortly after this meeting, the Provost declared the Blodgett negotiations closed.

Do these facts show a violation of academic freedom? There are those who contend with sincerity that they do. Our view is that they disclose not a violation of academic freedom but rather a failure in human relations and a failure in administration. On administration and human relations, we shall have more to say later.

We are sensitive to the fact that the actions taken on Professor Blodgett might, if the motivations for them were different than we conceive them to have been, show an infringement of academic freedom. As we see it, the question turns on motivation and emphasis. We find that the concern of Dean Bowen and Professor Hagen was to project the best possible program of instruction for students in economics. If we are right as to their objectives, their actions did not infringe academic freedom. We must assume that it is the responsibility of administrative officers who head educational divisions of the University to press for sound educational programs. Any other position on this question would be incompatible with ends of a university. If the officer is inept in the way he goes about accomplishing these ends, we have an administrative problem, but not one involving academic freedom. Even if he is mistaken on the contents of a sound educational program, so long as his actions are directed toward what he believes are sound educational ends, there is no violation of academic freedom. Here again, the problem is an administrative one. If, on the other hand, the motivation is the indoctrination of students with a particular point of view, as distinguished from good educational

policy, and if the administrator insists that that view be taught or insists that educational materials be withheld from students, then academic freedom is violated. The facts bearing on the situation in the Department of Economics do not support this conclusion.

What, then, are the critical facts in the Blodgett case? When Dean Bowen came to the University, Professor Blodgett occupied a strategic position in the Department of Economics. He was teaching a basic course to non-commerce students on the principles of economics, a year course on the theory of economics, required of all graduate students in economics and he was the adviser for graduate students in economics. In addition, he was teaching two courses, one for undergraduate students and the other for graduate students, on comparative economic systems. This, it would seem clear, was an overload of work, but the matter of overload was not, in the opinion of the Committee, the primary motivation for changes in Blodgett's program. Dean Bowen relieved him of his responsibilities for advising graduate students, and he was relieved of the teaching of the economic principles course and the undergraduate course in comparative economic systems. There also was a move by the Chairman of the Department to restrict his course in economic theory. What was the issue back of these actions? There was no objection to what Blodgett taught. There was agreement that what he taught should be taught and that he taught it well. The criticism by the Dean and the Chairman of the Department centered on the scope of his courses. The criticism was that he did not include in his teaching some of the important skills or analyses of economic data; that, while in charge of basic courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, he failed to equip his students with some of the essential skills employed in the discipline to arrive at economic facts. These, the Committee believes, are questions of educational policy, and not of academic freedom. There was no issue relative to ideologies. The question was: Did Blodgett or did he not give consideration to these skills in his courses? The Dean and the Chairman of the Department insisted that he did not. Some of the persons who came before the Committee said that he did and, indeed, insisted that he covered them adequately.

It is true that Professor Blodgett was relieved of the teaching of some courses and that he was relieved of the responsibility for advising graduate students. The Committee stresses the fact that no instructor has a vested interest in a course, nor in a position of responsibility for advising students. Educational interests are primary. When issues arise as to who should teach a course or who should advise students, a delicate administrative problem calling for high administrative skill may be involved, but the line of action is clear: If educational ends are best served through making changes in personnel, it is the responsibility of the administration to make them. We find that the actions taken by Dean Bowen and Professor Hagen in relieving Professor Blodgett of the teaching of some courses and of advising graduate students were administrative measures, and as such were aimed at improving the educational program of the Department.

There were, of course, other factors in the Blodgett case. There were charges that he was not informed relative to pending changes in his assignments, or at least not adequately consulted about them; that critical and tactless remarks were made about him; and that questions of policy were not taken through proper channels. These factors, we believe, all must be appraised in the light of their propriety as administrative actions. We conclude that the issue in the Blodgett case did not involve a question of academic freedom.

Problem in Human Relations

We have implied that the basic issue in the Department of Economics and extending into the broader context of the College of Commerce and Business Administration is one of administration. It is to be observed, however, that the situation in the Department of Economics when Dean Bowen became administrative head of the College was a critical one. He had the assignment of building up a depleted staff, depleted not only in number but in distinction. As steps were taken to execute this assignment, it was to be expected that some friction, some uneasiness and some apprehension as to their place in this changing context on

the part of staff members would arise. The Committee wishes to record its appreciation of the difficulties involved in this task. Notwithstanding, it finds that the situation now existent in the Department presents a failure in human relations. The responsibility for this failure must be shared by many individuals, but the burden of it falls on the administrative officers and particularly on Dean Bowen and Professor Hagen. The problem is one of personnel.

An Appraisal

We are sensitive to the fact that we have already gone beyond the scope of our assignment. Nevertheless, it would be unfortunate if we ended our report here, for we have perceived something which we believe merits emphasis and which holds genuine promise. We interviewed twenty individuals. They are reasonable people, frank, honest, and intelligent. These observations hold both for the older and the newer staff members. Dean Bowen and his colleagues have assembled in the Department of Economics a group of younger staff members of fine potentialities. Some have already made a place for themselves as scholars. This is not a radical group, and any impressions that it is must be allayed. As to the older men, they have achievements to their credit in teaching, scholarship, and research. It is perhaps unfortunate that the descriptive word "older" is used in relation to these individuals. Several in this classification are comparatively young men. There is full agreement in both the younger and older groups on objectives. All wish to make the Department a distinguished one—a department in which each will share in mutual pride with the others. All realize that, if they are to achieve this goal, they must learn to work together, and this, indeed, is what they want to do.

There is perhaps a misapprehension as to the schools of thought typified in these groups. There is a tendency to label the older group "conservative" and the young one "liberal." At times the word "radical" has crept in. A danger ever lurks in the use of labels. Perhaps on the whole the younger group includes more liberals than the older, but if this be true, it would not be a strange phenomenon. The fact is that there are liberal and conservative individuals in the older group, and liberals and conservatives in the younger one. As a whole, young and old, the group is predominantly conservative.

There is a divergence of views among them, but that is wholesome. Diversity in views is of the essence in a society of scholars. The ideal department in a university is one made up of strong men who approach the problems of their discipline from different angles, who are firm in their convictions, but who respect each other's views. Mutual respect and teamwork are essential. It is this atmosphere of trust and respect that now is lacking in the Department of Economics, and in a measure in the College. Except for that, this division of the University has the seeds of greatness. The staff members are well aware of the problems. In our opinion, they are anxious to bring about a happier situation. The point must be stressed, however, that if a propitious atmosphere is to become a reality, each individual involved must contribute his full share toward bringing it about, but while each must contribute to that end, the weight of the responsibility for consummating this result must fall on those who also bear the onus for the breakdown in relations: The weight of the responsibility for creating wholesome relations must fall on the Dean of the College and the Chairman of the Department. In this program Dean Bowen occupies a strategic position, and as a consequence the burden of establishing a framework of mutual trust and respect—a framework in which scholars with differing points of view can work with confidence and a feeling of security—must fall on his shoulders.

A REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ON CONDITIONS IN
THE DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS AND THE COLLEGE
OF COMMERCE AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

The public announcement by Professor Ralph H. Blodgett on May 8, 1950, that he had accepted a position at the University of Florida precipitated newspaper charges on the question of academic freedom. Since no charges had been submitted through channels—to the Dean, the Provost or the President's Office—the Senate Committee on Academic Freedom (representing the faculty) had no item of business before it. There was no action requested by the American Association of University Professors.

Nevertheless, the Provost, feeling that the public would be confused by repeated statements out of context, decided to appoint a fact-finding committee to report on the question of a possible violation of academic freedom in the Department of Economics. He was supported in this move by Dean Howard R. Bowen, Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration, who wrote (May 17th):

"Because there have been innuendoes and thinly-veiled suggestions which have cast discredit upon the Department, the College, and the University, I believe it important that such allegations be further investigated and the truth established beyond any doubt. If anything is found to be wrong, it should be corrected at once.

"I urge you, therefore, to appoint an *ad hoc* committee consisting of faculty members from various departments of the University to investigate academic freedom in the Department of Economics or any other matters pertaining to the Blodgett case, and to report to the President."

Professor F. G. Wilson, Chairman-elect of the Committee on Academic Freedom, expressed the view that the plan followed by the Provost was a good procedure.

On May 18th, this *ad hoc* group accepted the assignment. It consisted of the following members: Dean Albert J. Harno, College of Law, Chairman (on the faculty since 1921); Professor F. Wheeler Loomis, Head of the Department of Physics (on the faculty since 1929); Director Fredrick S. Siebert, School of Journalism and Communications (on the faculty since 1926). I shall identify this group as the *Fact-finding Committee on Academic Freedom in the Department of Economics* (or, the *Fact-finding Committee*).

The Fact-finding Committee went to work immediately.

On May 31st, by telephone from Florence, Italy, I issued the following statement:

"I have been fully informed by letter and telephone of the last two weeks' developments on the Illinois campus.

"The fact-gathering committee composed of Professors Harno, Loomis, and Siebert, which is investigating the situation, has my complete confidence as does also the Provost of the University. I shall give immediate attention to the committee's report when I return to Urbana the middle of June, and if there is any suggestion of infringement on the honorable and traditional rights of a teacher or on the right of students to hear a diversity of viewpoints, I shall want to consult the Senate Committee on Academic Freedom and to take whatever other action seems necessary. We have the machinery to handle problems like these, and that machinery will be used. In the midst of argument and uncertainty we must not lose sight of the goal which we all have in mind—a great university dedicated to the needs of all of the people of a great state."

The Fact-finding Committee submitted its report on June 12th. It is signed by all three members. Its work having been done—and done well, in my opinion—I have discharged the Committee, expressing thanks for its devoted and painstaking service to the University.

Its report is before us.

Let us consider, first of all, the assignment. For the reasons given above, it

was asked to inquire into a "possible violation of academic freedom in the Department of Economics."

Now *academic freedom* is not a simple, black-or-white concept. It is not a packaged commodity. It has proved troublesome since the time of Socrates. The best statement on it is the well-known "1940 Statement of Principles" of the American Association of University Professors. I quote it exactly, omitting the further statement on academic tenure which is not germane to the present controversy:

"The purpose of this statement is to promote public understanding and support of academic freedom and tenure and agreement upon procedures to assure them in colleges and universities. Institutions of higher education are conducted for the common good and not to further the interest of either the individual teacher (The word 'teacher' as used in this document is understood to include the investigator who is attached to an academic institution without teaching duties.) or the institution as a whole. The common good depends upon the free search for truth and its free exposition.

"Academic freedom is essential to these purposes and applies to both teaching and research. Freedom in research is fundamental to the advancement of truth. Academic freedom in its teaching aspect is fundamental for the protection of the rights of the teacher in teaching and of the student to freedom in learning. It carries with it duties correlative with rights.

"Tenure is a means to certain ends; specifically: (1) Freedom of teaching and research and of extra-mural activities, and (2) a sufficient degree of economic security to make the profession attractive to men and women of ability. Freedom and economic security, hence tenure, are indispensable to the success of an institution in fulfilling its obligations to its students and to society.

Academic Freedom

"(a) The teacher is entitled to full freedom in research and in the publication of the results, subject to the adequate performance of his other academic duties; but research for pecuniary return should be based upon an understanding with the authorities of the institution.

"(b) The teacher is entitled to freedom in the classroom in discussing his subject, but he should be careful not to introduce into his teaching controversial matter which has no relation to his subject. Limitations of academic freedom because of religious or other aims of the institution should be clearly stated in writing at the time of the appointment.

"(c) The college or university teacher is a citizen, a member of a learned profession, and an officer of an educational institution. When he speaks or writes as a citizen, he should be free from institutional censorship or discipline, but his special position in the community imposes special obligations. As a man of learning and an educational officer, he should remember that the public may judge his profession and his institution by his utterances. Hence he should at all times be accurate, should exercise appropriate restraint, should show respect for the opinions of others, and should make every effort to indicate that he is not an institutional spokesman."

The Committee examined this question with care — and it went further, as it says, beyond its assignment, in a wholesome endeavor to probe into sources of frustration or misunderstanding in the Department and the College. It need not have done this; a less courageous group would have shunned the task! Nevertheless, I am grateful for this, for a better hearing body could not be found. To have ended their conversations with a simple determination of the prior question of academic freedom, would have been legalistically correct but otherwise unrewarding. Although the public had been led wrongly to identify the problem, a problem existed.

I shall now take up the conclusions of the Fact-finding Committee and then review them in some detail.

The basic question was, *Has there been a violation of academic freedom?* The Report gives the answer:

"The facts disclosed by all the persons were essentially the same but, with few exceptions, they were not focused on academic freedom. Some who testified found it difficult even to identify an issue on that subject."

After reviewing salient points concerning Professor Blodgett and actions related to his decision to leave Illinois, the Committee reverts to the original question:

"Do these facts show a violation of academic freedom? There are those who contend with sincerity that they do. Our view is that they disclose not a violation of academic freedom but rather a failure in human relations and a failure in administration. . . .

"We are sensitive to the fact that the actions taken on Professor Blodgett might, if the motivations for them were different than we conceive them to have been, show an infringement of academic freedom. As we see it, the question turns on motivation and emphasis. We find that the concern of Dean Bowen and Professor Hagen was to project the best possible program of instruction for students in economics. If we are right as to their objectives, their actions did not infringe academic freedom. We must assume that it is the responsibility of administrative officers who head educational divisions of the University to press for sound educational programs. Any other position on this question would be incompatible with ends of a university. If the officer is inept in the way he goes about accomplishing these ends, we have an administrative problem, but not one involving academic freedom. Even if he is mistaken on the contents of a sound educational program, so long as his actions are directed toward what he believes are sound educational ends, there is no violation of academic freedom. Here again, the problem is an administrative one. If, on the other hand, the motivation is the indoctrination of students with a particular point of view, as distinguished from good educational policy, and if the administrator insists that that view be taught or insists that educational materials be withheld from students, then academic freedom is violated. The facts bearing on the situation in the Department of Economics do not support this conclusion."

I concur in the judgment of the Fact-finding Committee with respect to a violation of academic freedom: *there has been none*. Following the AAUP definition, it can be said that:

(1) Professor Blodgett has had "full freedom in research and in the publication of the results." (That he has done little in the field of research has been a free choice on his part.)

(2) He has had "freedom in the classroom in discussing his subject."

(3) He has spoken and written as a citizen, "free from institutional censorship or discipline."

(4) In turn, he has not, to my knowledge, abused the privilege of academic freedom by "introducing into his teaching controversial matter which has no relation to his subject"; his utterances have been exemplary.

It can not be emphasized too strongly that the question of academic freedom as defined above is crucial — invested at every point with intellectual progress and with the public interest. In most faculties, as in ours, machinery exists for protecting these essential rights; national organizations are properly alert to this question. It was the loss of this right to work freely and speak freely that ruined the universities under Mussolini and Hitler — and it will ruin them under Stalin. In all free societies it is a right jealously guarded by professor and administrator alike.

As I have indicated, the Report of the Committee could have ended at this point. Lacking a complaint from an aggrieved person, lacking data to support the charges, I should not have reason to bring matters, however serious, before the Senate Committee on Academic Freedom. Therefore, as far as the issue of academic freedom is concerned, there is no business before us.

II

A second question, also invested with the public interest, is harder to define and harder to judge. It has to do with indoctrination, particularly of indoctrination with ideas foreign to our democratic principles. At the level of communism, the problem takes shape, but I find nowhere in the Report of the Committee, or in any responsible public reference, a suggestion of such infiltration. The Department of Economics is not "red"; it is not "radical." To quote the Report:

"Dean Bowen and his colleagues have assembled in the Department of Economics a group of younger staff members of fine potentialities. Some have already

made a place for themselves as scholars. This is not a radical group, and any impressions that it is must be allayed. As to the older men, they have achievements to their credit in teaching, scholarship, and research. . . .

"There is perhaps a misapprehension as to the schools of thought typified in these groups. There is a tendency to label the older group 'conservative' and the younger one 'liberal.' At times the word 'radical' has crept in. A danger ever lurks in the use of labels. Perhaps on the whole the younger group includes more liberals than the older, but if this be true, it would not be a strange phenomenon. The fact is that there are liberal and conservative individuals in the older group, and liberals and conservatives in the younger one. As a whole, young and old, the group is predominantly conservative."

As far as the principal persons in the controversy are concerned, they all appear to be defenders of capitalism. They are not blind to its faults; they want to strengthen it against error and to protect it from the blandishments of untried social systems.

Thus Hagen in his technical writings is deeply concerned with the ways in which a capitalistic system may protect itself against the recurrent dangers of economic depression and the high cost of living (*American Economic Review*, Vol. 38, Part 2, 1948, pp. 428-429):

"But improving federal machinery is only one step. For the President and the members of Congress are not after all the men who determine public action. The basic need is the spread of understanding of these rather technical matters among the public and a wider group of its leaders and specifically among the members of those social groups, and their leaders, whose conflicts of interest must be compromised if we are to achieve successful economic action in a democratic society. Professor Hart has thoughtful suggestions to offer concerning that problem. That spread of understanding is occurring; whether or not it will occur in adequate measure is in part the responsibility of the economic profession.

"There are prophets who affirm that we will not take the necessary steps for economic stability until we have plunged into another major depression. If so, the necessary steps may be accompanied by—or replaced by—irrelevant social changes based on misconceptions of the problem, and on widely felt emotional urges to fix the blame for one's misery, to absolve oneself of a feeling of incompetence and failure, and to gain a feeling of security. How good or ill will be the resulting changes in our social system will then be in part in the laps of the gods."

Blodgett's *Principles of Economics* (Farrar & Rinehart, 1941, pp. 609-610), closes with this paragraph:

"From this point it would seem a short step to reach the conclusion that we should trade in our old capitalistic system for a new socialistic model and thus be rid of our ancient difficulties in connection with business cycles. But this is a conclusion we must examine carefully. Granted that a socialistic economic system may be able to eliminate the business cycle, it has other features which many of us would not like at all. Under socialism, freedom of enterprise for the individual would be eliminated, too, and all of us would work for the government. We could own, for the most part, only consumable goods. Wages would be our only type of money income and differences in wages would be small between occupations and industries. There would be no chance to start our careers as poor boys and end them as rich men. The beneficial and stimulating effects of competition, as well as its wastes, would be lost. With all individuals receiving relatively similar amounts of wages, it might be most difficult under socialism to induce the workers to try to develop greater efficiency or to qualify for the more responsible and exacting managerial positions in industry. It is conceivable that in the operation of a planned economy there may be many more problems and obstacles more damaging than business cycles. Regardless of the political, social, or religious aspects of socialism, it is clear that not everything would be as rosy as promised under that system. Most of us may decide that we prefer to keep, with all its faults, our capitalistic system in which, as a novelist once said, the Law, in its majestic equality, forbids the rich as well as the poor to sleep under bridges, to beg in the streets, and to steal bread."

Bowen states in *Toward Social Economy* (Rinehart & Company, Inc., 1948, p. 326):

"For example, capitalism provides highly effective motivation for individuals. It spurs them on to great personal effort in providing the goods needed by society. Also, it encourages experimentation, innovation, new ideas, and new ways of doing things. Moreover, it provides a fascinating and varied 'game' in the form of a competitive race for fame, fortune, and economic power which anyone with the wit, the courage, and the stamina can enter. Finally, capitalism is one type of economic system which has *demonstrated* that it is compatible with free political institutions. That any other system is compatible with or conducive to political freedom is a theory and not a demonstrated fact."

Perhaps the other two would join us laymen in subscribing to Bowen's final paragraph (*Ibid.*, p. 330):

"To solve our problems intelligently will require more scientific social knowledge than we now have. One can be reasonably hopeful that social scientists will be able to provide this knowledge — especially in view of the great strides in this area of study within the past generation. But in addition to knowledge, statesmanship on the part of our political leaders will be required, and also — not less important — our people must understand the issues and must learn to view these issues in terms of the broad social interest. The technical findings of social scientists are of little consequence unless there is also receptivity to the findings among the people. The great tasks of our age are to develop social science and to bring about a widespread diffusion of knowledge and understanding about social matters to the end that we may develop a free society of plenty and justice."

III

This leaves us with a third basic question, to which the Committee devoted a substantial part of its report: Since there is apparently frustration in the Department of Economics, and perhaps in other areas of the College of Commerce and Business Administration, what are the true difficulties?

I shall take up certain general considerations first and then refer explicitly to the case of Professor Blodgett. The Fact-finding Committee states that in 1947 when Dr. Howard R. Bowen was appointed Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration:

"The task that confronted him and his colleagues was a critical one . . . decisions on various policies and actions relating to the affairs of the College, including advancements for members of the staff, had been held in abeyance until his arrival. He was faced, therefore, not only with matters for decision on the ongoing problems of the College but with a backlog of unsolved issues. The immediate task ahead was to build up a depleted staff and to build it well."

There has not been any divided feeling about the goal in the Department of Economics, namely, that it should become a distinguished department. The Fact-finding Committee does not go into substantive issues on this; it gives its attention largely to procedures, personnel, and administrative efficiency. I should like to say something about the merits of the question.

It is natural that the Department of Economics should, from the first, receive special attention from a new dean, for economics is a fundamental subject, not only in commerce but also in the social sciences. The Department of Economics apparently had not kept pace with other departments in the College and the University. There was in the Department a large number of young assistants. Little research was in progress. There were many decisions to be made involving staff, salaries, promotions, curricula, and joint relationships between departments. It was inevitable that some decisions would cause dissatisfaction in various staff ranks.

Dean Bowen is aware of the fears that exist in the College, and especially of the fear on the part of older staff members that they might be overlooked. Nevertheless, he points out that almost every member of the staff who was here in 1947 has been recommended for salary increases for each of three succeeding years. In terms of percentage, the salary increases for this "older" group have been larger than for new persons added to the staff. Of the fourteen members of the faculty now receiving a salary of \$8,000 or more, nine were on the staff before Dean Bowen arrived. There is no evidence to indicate that the older group is at a disadvantage in salary, rank, or rate of promotion. It is true, however, that the

Dean, the Chairman of the Department of Economics, the Director of the Business Management Service, the Director of the Bureau of Economic and Business Research, and the head of the Division of Secretarial Training have been brought in from the outside. All these appointments were carefully reviewed at the time they were made. In my opinion, the decisions were sound.

It is necessary to relate recommendations and decisions of this type to conditions that exist in the College. It is easy to misunderstand references to "inbred" conditions that obtain in certain areas of the College. The Department of Business Organization and Operation furnishes the outstanding example. The table below shows the percentage of staff members of the rank of assistant professor or above who have had their terminal degrees from the University of Illinois:

All divisions	81%

The bringing in of men from the outside in some of these areas can scarcely be regarded as an attempt to replace the old by the new; rather, what we have had is a near monopoly enjoyed by Illinois professors and their students. Dean Bowen's statement to me in regard to this is reassuring:

"However, we should not be dogmatic or inflexible on the subject of inbreeding. I believe that we should get the best possible man for each vacancy that arises. If the best man is now on the staff or if he holds degrees from Illinois, he should not be discriminated against merely because of his Illinois connections. If anything, this should be an argument in his favor in the sense that we would prefer a member of the family and a person we know to an outsider."

In any case, I have found no evidence that political views have had anything to do with appointments or promotions in the Department of Economics or elsewhere in the College. In times of hot and cold wars, in which the Government of the United States is deeply involved, it is inevitable that some of the best men would come to us after a season of Government service. Such men would have worked for the Government as a patriotic contribution, regardless of what political party was in power. The economic and financial problems of the United States dominate the whole Western World. The technical assistance on these problems rendered by many of our staff members is to their credit. These men are as independent in their thinking, writing, and theorizing as are men in the field of chemistry, engineering, or agriculture. Nowhere have I found evidence of devotion to a particular dogma, theory, or person without reference to the merits of the case.

In view of Dean Bowen's special competence in economics and finance and of his intention to build up this basic area, it has sometimes been said that he is not paying sufficient attention to the professional aspects of education for business. I believe there is little substance to such complaints. We have a new curriculum in secretarial training; there is a proposal by Dean Bowen that finance be made a separate division of the Department of Economics in order to give better professional education for financial occupations; there are proposals for new professional curricula in statistics, insurance, advertising, and merchandising and there is a steady attention to improvements in the programs in accountancy, marketing, management, and industrial administration.

IV

Finally, what are the special troubles that center in the case of Professor Blodgett?

There is no need to repeat here the detailed notes presented in the Report of the Fact-finding Committee. The question is not one of academic freedom; it is not, at root, a matter of conflicting ideologies. We come rather to a discussion (a) of the quality of certain administrative judgments and (b) of the propriety of certain procedures. All these must be judged on their merits and in the light of the statement, unanimously accepted, "that the goal should be a distinguished department."

With respect to the case of Professor Blodgett, it is clear:

(1) That his academic freedom has not been impaired. (See the first part of my report.)

(2) That differences in ideology between him and administrative officers, if they exist, are not involved. (See the second part of my report.)

(3) That his responsibility for graduate teaching and research supervision had been reduced. (In view of the growth of the Department and of Professor Blodgett's major interest in textbooks and general economics, I would approve this change.)

(4) That his salary has not been adversely affected by recent events. (This is shown by the following facts:

Professor Blodgett's Florida offer apparently was slightly higher, but not significantly so in view of dislocation expenses and a possible loss in retirement funds.)

(5) That Professor Hagen probably erred in not sharing with the Executive Committee of the Department Professor Blodgett's first indication of an interest in going to the University of Florida.

The word, "probably," is used advisedly here, as no doubt it was in the Report of the Fact-finding Committee. Normally there would be another opportunity for discussion when the Florida offer was clarified. When, as the Report states, "on May 4, Blodgett informed Hagen that he had received a definite offer from Florida and that he had accepted it," there was, in fact, no need to go further. At that time, Professor Blodgett had entered into a contract with the University of Florida, as was his privilege. Hence the subsequent staff meeting, while of interest, was not of consequence in the matter of retaining Professor Blodgett. Professor Blodgett was already under contract to serve elsewhere. (That is precisely what is meant by "accepting an offer.") The motion in the staff meeting, therefore, must have been somewhat involved, for it included the taking of steps to keep Professor Blodgett and a "note of censure" for Professor Hagen. It lost by a vote of 25-19.

(6) That clarification is needed with respect to the duties of the chairman of a department. (The University Statutes say:

"(d) In each department organized with a chairman, there shall be an executive committee composed of men of the rank of assistant professor or above, elected annually by the voting members of the department. The chairman of the department shall be *ex-officio* a member and the chairman of this committee. The chairman and the executive committee shall be responsible for the preparation of the budget and for such matters as may be delegated to them by the voting faculty of the department. In a department which has a voting faculty of five members or fewer the executive committee shall consist of all persons of the rank of assistant professor or above.

"(e) In each department organized with a chairman, that officer shall be responsible for the formulation and execution of departmental policies and the execution of university and college policies in so far as they affect the department; he shall have power to act independently in such matters as are delegated to him by the executive committee; he shall report on the teaching and research of the department; he shall have general oversight of the work of students in the department; he shall collaborate with the executive committee in the preparation of the budget and be responsible for the expenditure of departmental funds for the purposes approved by the executive committee; he shall have general charge of departmental property; and he shall call and preside over all meetings of the department and of the executive committee. The chairman together with the executive committee shall be responsible for the organization of the work of the department, and for the quality and efficient progress of that work.

"(f) In the administration of his office the chairman shall recognize the individual responsibility of other members of the department for the discharge of the duties committed to them by their appointments, and shall allow proper scope to the ability and initiative of all members of the department.")

This means that the Chairman has genuine responsibilities, but their extent, like the powers of the executive committee, will vary with the actions of the voting faculty. In any case, I feel that Professor Hagen will need to study this matter, as will Dean Bowen, as an indicated move toward wholesome relations among all concerned.

I am unable to take seriously the implications concerning a choice of textbooks. Very likely I am revealing a prejudice in this regard. It occurs to me that no professor should insist upon having his textbooks adopted by other professors, or in any course in the department. I find no evidence that Professor Blodgett himself raised this question. A professor who writes a textbook is vulnerable with respect to any requirement that it be used in his classes or in the classes of his colleagues. Such decisions are, of course, best made by other persons.

V

It should be repeated that the real test of progress in the Department and the College will come from external sources. What is their position in the academic world with respect to instruction, research, and public service? Many persons have remarked upon the high quality of the instruction in economics. The research studies constitute a steady stream; they are impressive. Also, advanced students in economics are turning toward the University of Illinois. From Dr. Louis N. Ridenour, Dean of the Graduate College, I have secured the following data:

As Dean Ridenour says, "Graduating seniors usually follow the advice of their professors in deciding where to send their applications for graduate fellowships. The best institutions, and the best departments within those institutions, get the largest number of applicants."

The chief public service is in the education of young people at all levels from the first year of college to the doctorate. In addition, as noted above, various branches of the College of Commerce and Business Administration, as never before, are entering vigorously into programs that give immediate assistance to business and industry in Illinois.

In summary, I agree in principle with the final words of the Fact-finding Committee—Dean Bowen occupies the strategic position in amalgamating the diverse forces and points of view in the College, within a "framework of mutual trust and respect." To my way of thinking, the word, *mutual*, is important. It calls for a new attempt at understanding on the part of staff members who may have been disaffected, and for renewed attempts on the part of the Dean. Moreover, it calls for a further effort on the part of the Provost and myself to evaluate decisions and procedures in order that progress may be achieved in an atmosphere conducive to personal growth for everyone.

There is no growth without struggle and a certain amount of pain. The University of Illinois is a healthy, growing institution. It is young in years and still younger in its realization of the vast potentials of wealth and human resources given to the great State of which it is a part.

The University has a place of residence—indeed, several places. It tries to be a good neighbor in the local community, but it is not a local enterprise. Every farm, village, town, and city in Illinois has a stake in the University. As a community of teachers, researchers, and public workers, the University reaches out to meet standards unrelated to political boundaries. The study of atomic energy, for example, tends to ignore geography and to point our efforts to the future. For the University of Illinois, as I envisage it, backed by the Board of Trustees and leaders in the various branches of the State government, these standards must be of the highest. Our concern is with the talent and the promise of youth and we can do no less.

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
