MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

February 21, 1956



The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on Tuesday, February 21, 1956, beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The following members were present: Mr. Cushman B. Bissell, Mr. Wirt Herrick, Mr. Wayne A. Johnston, Mr. Park Livingston, Mr. Timothy W. Swain, Mrs. Frances B. Watkins, and Mr. Kenney E. Williamson. Mrs. Doris S. Holt, Mr. Herbert B. Megran, Mr. Vernon L. Nickell, and Governor William G. Stratton were absent.

Also present were President David D. Henry, Provost Henning Larsen, Mr. Ralph F. Lesemann, Legal Counsel, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Relations; and Messrs. H. O. Farber, Comptroller, C. W. Weldon, Treasurer, and A. J. Janata, Secretary of the Board.

In the absence of President Megran, Mr. Johnston, as President Pro Tempore, presided.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Trustees of December 20, 1955, press proof copies of which have previously been sent to the members of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these minutes were approved as

printed on pages 885 to 912, inclusive.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS ON STUDENT-STAFF RESIDENCES

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds has given consideration to a proposal for the construction of sixty student-staff residences on an off-campus site on which bids were taken by the University and reported to the Committee on January 24, but no recommendation has yet been presented to the Board of Trustees on this project. It will be recalled that this project was to provide additional student-staff housing to replace family housing in some of the temporary buildings in Illini Village which were to be converted into dormitories for unmarried women students. This seemed at the time to be the only way of providing additional housing for unmarried women students by September, 1956.

The call for bids on the acquisition of a site and the construction of student-staff residences included an invitation to bidders to submit alternate proposals for the construction of housing for unmarried undergraduate women students to be available for occupancy in September, 1956. Northwood, Inc., of Champaign, submitted (along with the bid of the Dean Evans Company, Champaign, on the student-staff residences) a proposal to construct, and to finance this construction, seven apartment buildings on the north side of Gregory Drive in Champaign (across the street from the Parade Ground Units) which can be converted into small residence halls for unmarried women students, and to lease these buildings to the University. This proposal was accepted by the Board of Trustees on January 28, and it is now unnecessary to convert any of the temporary family housing in Illini Village into dormitories.

The bids received on the student-staff residences indicate a cost which would require a rental of \$83.50 per month for a two-bedroom house and \$91 for a three-bedroom house, utilities to be paid for by the tenants, and it would also be necessary to supplement the net income from rentals with the net income from the temporary family housing to pay off the loan in ten years. Student and staff reactions indicate an unwillingness to pay such rents for housing located at a considerable distance from the campus.

Most of the additions to the staff which will be required in September, 1956, will be in the lower salary brackets and it is doubtful that they would be in the market for such residences. The long-range housing program approved by the Board on January 28, 1956, contemplates the construction of 250 units of student-staff housing in 1957.

It has, therefore, been concluded by the University administrative officers concerned that the sixty residences project should not be under-

taken and they recommend that the bids received be rejected. The University reserved the right to do so in calling for bids.

The Committee concurs in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these recommendations were approved.

BUSINESS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Board took up consideration of the following reports and recommendations from the President of the University.

AWARD OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT CERTIFICATES

Appointment to Nonacademic Staff

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel reports the following appointment to a supervisory position of upper level responsibility.

I. DANIEL F. ASTRAHAN, Assistant Manager of Public Relations, Chicago Professional Colleges, beginning January 3, 1956, at an annual salary of \$3,900. On motion of Mr. Williamson, these appointments were confirmed.

CURRICULUM IN HISTORY OF MUSIC

(3) The University Senate recommends authorization of a new undergraduate curriculum in the history of music leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music. This curriculum, covering four years, will require 132 semester hours for graduation, including the required courses in physical education, hygiene, and, in the case of men, military training.

A complete outline of the curriculum is being filed with the Secretary of

the Board for record.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was approved.

CHANGE IN GEOMETRY REQUIREMENT FOR ADMISSION TO THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

(4) The University Senate recommends that solid geometry no longer be required for admission to the College of Engineering but retained as a recommended subject. The mathematics requirement will therefore be two years of high school algebra, one year of plane geometry, and one-half year of trigonometry.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Bissell, this recommendation was approved.

PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING DEGREES

(5) For many years the University has been conferring professional engineering degrees of Civil Engineer (C.E.), Mechanical Engineer (M.E.), Electrical Engineer (E.E.), and similar degrees in other fields of engineering. These degrees have been awarded on the basis of professional experience plus a thesis or a report on a major engineering project. No academic work in residence is required, but the candidate must be present at the commencement exercises at which the degree is conferred.

The use of this degree has been gradually disappearing in colleges of engineering. Much of the function it served has been taken over by the universal adoption in all of the states and the District of Columbia of professional licensing. The requirements with respect to professional practice are similar in the two cases. The degree has also had a variety of meanings. The Executive Committee of the College of Engineering, the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College, and the University Senate recommend that awarding of these degrees be discontinued after July 1, 1958.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was approved.

APPROPRIATION BY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(6) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has made an appropriation of \$3,400 from its reserve funds to supplement provisions in the operating budget for athletic clothing and furnishings.

This is being reported for confirmation by the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the action of the Board of Directors was confirmed.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

- (7) The Committee on Nonrecurring Appropriations recommends assignments of funds from the General Reserve as follows:

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 605 SOUTH GOODWIN AVENUE, URBANA

(8) The property at 605 South Goodwin Avenue, Urbana, has been offered to the University at a price of \$18,000, the University to pay all real estate taxes not yet due. This property is in the area of the University's long-range land acquisition program, and is one of four remaining properties in the block bounded by Goodwin, California, and Mathews Avenues and Oregon Street not owned by the University.

The property is a lot, 50 by 60 feet, and a house which is in good condition and which would make available ten rooms, two bathrooms, and attic storage space

for University use.

The Building Program Committee, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend the purchase of this property at \$18,000, plus taxes.

I concur and recommend that an appropriation of \$18,500 be made from the General Reserve Fund to cover the purchase price, plus taxes and other expenses of closing.

On motion of Mr. Bissell, the purchase of this property at the price and under the conditions stated was authorized, and the recommended appropriation of \$18,500 was made from the General Reserve Fund by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Bissell, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Swain, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Megran, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stratton.

NONDEVELOPMENT OIL AND GAS LEASE COVERING AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT FIELD IN SALINE COUNTY

(9) The University owns a fifteen-acre tract in Saline County, near Raleigh, Illinois (the legal description is: The South 15 acres of the NE ¼, NW ¼, Sec. 22, T 8 S, R 6 E, Saline County, Illinois), which is being used for agricultural experiment purposes. It has been subdivided into a series of small plots, each receiving different treatment in connection with the experiments being conducted,

and records have been maintained since these operations began in 1910.

Mr. Amos S. Wood of the Delwood Oil Company and the latter now hold oil and gas leases covering considerable acreage in this area, including a lease covering a twenty-five-acre tract situated immediately north of the University's tract and leases to tracts situated adjacent to the University's to the east, south, and southwest, but not immediately to the west thereof. He desires to drill wells for oil and gas on the land covered by those leases and to begin such operations through the drilling of a test well on a forty-acre tract lying near the University's land in the immediate future, but hesitates to do this, of course, unless he can obtain an oil and gas lease from the University to its fifteen-acre tract, which he desires to obtain upon terms and conditions similar to those pertaining to the other leases. Because of the damaging effect which operations for the drilling of wells and the production of oil and gas upon the University's land would have upon the experiments which the Agricultural Experiment Station has been and is conducting thereon, and which it is believed will prove valuable and important, the Director of the Station objects to the giving at this time of a lease to the tract which will enable such operations to be conducted on it. However, it is agreeable to the Director that the University enter into a nondevelopment lease or agreement with Mr. Wood under which the University will agree that, for a period of two years, it will not drill or permit the drilling of any oil or gas well upon the University's tract except under and pursuant to an oil and gas lease given by it to him if the results of drilling operations conducted on adjacent land prompt the University to recede from its present unwillingness to permit any drilling operations upon its land.

Since, in order to enable Mr. Wood or his assignees to meet certain drilling commitments with respect to adjacent land which he now has under lease, it will probably be necessary to enter into the nondevelopment lease or agreement with him before the March meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Comptroller recommend that the Executive Committee of the Board be authorized to approve the entry by the University into such a nondevelopment lease or agreement with Mr. Wood as may be nego-

tiated by University officers, and upon such terms and conditions as may be recommended to that Committee by the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, the Comptroller, and the President of the University, if approved by the Executive Committee, and to authorize the Comptroller and the Secretary to execute and deliver, on behalf of the University, any such nondevelopment lease or agreement covering said land which is so recommended and approved.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, the Executive Committee was authorized to act for the Board of Trustees in this matter, as recommended above, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Bissell, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Swain, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Megran, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stratton.

EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL IN CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDING INSTITUTED BY FORMER CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEE

(10) On August 17, 1955, a discharge proceeding was instituted against Casimir J. Palacz, a clerk in the Department of Administration of the Research and Educational Hospitals. The principal grounds for discharging him are an alleged refusal upon his part to work as scheduled and alleged insolence upon his part towards his supervisors and others upon several occasions. After employing counsel, he duly requested a hearing upon the charges, and a hearing was held before a hearing board, appointed by the Merit Board of the University Civil Service System of Illinois, on September 29. The members of the hearing board were Dr. Percival Bailey and Dr. Isaac Schour. After the hearing, the hearing board made findings of fact sustaining most of the charges against Mr. Palacz and recommended that he be discharged from the employ of the University. The findings and recommendations of the hearing board were subsequently reviewed and approved by the Merit Board.

Pursuant to the provisions of the "Administrative Review Act" Mr. Palacz has taken steps to have the decision of the hearing board and the Merit Board reviewed in and by the Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois. Summons in the proceeding instituted by him in that court to obtain that judicial review has been served upon the Merit Board and its Director.

In a court proceeding of this nature the Merit Board merely files the record in the discharge proceeding with the court and leaves it wholly to the employer to defend the Merit Board's action and decision. Consequently, it will be necessary for the Legal Counsel to appear in the court proceeding on behalf of the University and to seek to uphold the decision of the hearing board and of the Merit Board. The Legal Counsel, through one of his assistants, has appeared for and represented the University in this entire proceeding to date. However, since it is now pending in the Cook County Circuit Court, and past experience has demonstrated that, because of the procedures followed in the courts of Cook County, it is extremely difficult for the Legal Counsel to properly represent the University in suits or other proceedings in those courts without the assistance of counsel practising in Chicago, it is highly desirable, if not necessary, that special counsel be employed to assist the Legal Counsel in representing the University in this proceeding.

In view of their familiarity with University procedures pertaining to discharge of its employees and the legal questions involved therein and the excellent service rendered by them to the University and the Legal Counsel in other matters, the Legal Counsel recommends that he be authorized to employ Mr. Albert E. Jenner, Jr. and Mr. Prentice H. Marshall of the law firm of Johnston, Thompson, Raymond, Mayer, and Jenner of Chicago to assist him in representing the University in this proceeding upon the basis of their usual and customary charges for their services which he regards as reasonable and proper.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, employment of special counsel in this proceeding, as recommended above, was authorized.

Mr. Livingston suggested that consideration be given to the employment of a full time member of the Legal Counsel's staff for University services in Chicago. On motion of Mr. Livingston, this was referred to the President of the University and to the Committee on General Policy for consideration.

ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON MEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS

(II) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller request authorization of a contract with the firm of Berger-Kelley & Associates, Champaign, as architects for the next residence hall units for unmarried undergraduate men to be constructed immediately west of the original unit of the Men's Residence Halls at the northeast corner of the former drill field. This is one of the projects scheduled for 1957-58 in the University's program for housing students as approved by the Board of Trustees on January 28, 1956, and will consist of four buildings: three duplicate buildings, housing 444 students each, at an estimated cost of \$1,250,000 each, and one food service building, to serve 1,332, at an estimated cost of \$500,000. The first unit, to house 444 students, is scheduled for completion in September, 1957, and the others in September, 1958. The dining room in the present adjacent building will serve temporarily until the new food service building is completed.

The design studies were prepared by Professor Ambrose M. Richardson of the Department of Architecture and will be used by Berger-Kelley & Associates who have offered to provide the remaining architectural services required under the usual arrangement of a percentage of the total cost of construction. In this case credit given for Professor Richardson's work will reduce the usual rate of 6 per cent of the cost of construction to 5.25 per cent for all professional services on the two original buildings (first housing unit and food service building) for which drawings and specifications are prepared by Berger-Kelley & Associates and to 3.08 per cent of the construction cost of the two repeated buildings, including complete supervisory services for all four. (For the whole project the over-all fee, with total supervisory services, is estimated to be 3.57 per cent.) In view of the present and anticipated loads on the University Architect's Office, the Director of the Physical Plant recommends that Berger-Kelley & Associates be employed for the complete architectural services, including supervision of construction.

The estimated cost of the total project is \$4,250,000 of which approximately three-quarters will be for construction and the remainder for furnishings and other expenses. Based on this estimate, the total fee to be paid Berger-Kelley & Associates under the proposed contract would be approximately \$114,000, but would be determined by the actual cost of construction. Any payments required under the contract prior to the availability of funds through a bond issue would be advanced from reserves available to the Housing Division, and authorization of such advances is recommended.

This firm has been in business for more than forty years and has designed many school buildings, as well as other types of construction. It consists of the senior Messrs. Berger and Kelley and a son of each, all of whom are graduates of the University of Illinois Department of Architecture, plus an adequate staff of designers and draftsmen.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this contract was awarded, and the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board were authorized to execute the same.

ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON RESIDENCE HALL FOR GRADUATE MEN STUDENTS

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller request authorization of a contract with Lundeen and Hilfinger, Bloomington, Illinois, for architectural and engineering services for a residence hall for unmarried men graduate and law students to be constructed adjacent to and west of the new Law Building.

This is one of the projects scheduled for 1957 in the University's program for housing students as approved by the Board of Trustees on January 28, 1956, and the first unit will house and provide food service for a minimum of 250

graduate and law students.

The preliminary design work on this building has been done by Professor Ambrose M. Richardson of the Department of Architecture for which Lundeen and Hilfinger offer a credit of three-fourths of I per cent of the construction cost. They also offer a credit of one-half of I per cent of that cost for partial supervision of construction by the University. The Director of the Physical Plant recommends that the contract be drawn to permit the University to take this credit if feasible. This would make the fee 4.75 per cent instead of the customary 6 per cent. The total fee would be determined by the actual cost of construction and is estimated to be \$35,625.

Funds for these services will come from the bond issue for this project, and until they are available, it is recommended that payments required under the proposed contract with Lundeen and Hilfinger be advanced from Housing Division

reserves accumulated from housing operations.

The principals in the firm of Lundeen and Hilfinger are graduates of the Department of Architecture of the University of Illinois. They have been operating in Bloomington for more than twenty-five years and have done work for Illinois Wesleyan University, Illinois State Normal University, and other institutions of higher education.

I concur in the above recommendations and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract based on 4.75 per cent of the construction price with the option of increasing this to 5.25 per cent, if the University does not elect to perform any of the supervisory services.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was awarded, and the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board were authorized to execute the same.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT WITH CONSULTING ENGINEERING SERVICE

(13) The University has a contract with E. C. Manthei, operating under the firm name of Consulting Engineering Service, Champaign, for engineering work as may be required in designing and preparing working drawings, blueprints, and specifications for various construction and remodeling projects. This is a stand-by contract for supplementing the services of the University Architect's Office.

The services of this firm are needed for planning improvements in the attic of the Ceramics Building to convert this space into quarters for the Department of Mining and Metallurgical Engineering. The estimated cost of these services is \$3,000 which will include some architectural work to be done under a subcontract subject to the University's approval.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend, and I concur, that an addition to the contract with Consulting Engineering Service be

authorized, the same to be executed by the Comptroller.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the Comptroller was authorized to execute this change in the contract.

CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES ON DAVENPORT HALL REMODELING AND ALTGELD HALL REMODELING

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller request authorization of a contract with James G. Clark, Consulting Engineer, Urbana, for engineering services on the remodeling of the central wing of Davenport Hall and remodeling in Altgeld Hall. The services will include inspections, measurements, and drawings; preliminary studies and estimates; design calculations; and construction plans and specifications. A fee of 5 per cent of the construction cost, or approximately \$13,000, is proposed.

Funds are available for the Altgeld Hall project in a special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees on January 28 and for the work on Davenport Hall in the state appropriations for 1955-57 for buildings and other permanent

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this contract was awarded, and the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board were authorized to execute the same.

CONTRACT FOR AIR CONDITIONING OF ILLINI UNION BOOKSTORE

(15) The Director of the Illini Union, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$10,850 to F. R. Inskip & Co., Champaign, the lowest bidder, for the installation of air conditioning in the Illini Union Bookstore.

The total budget for this project, including insurance, architectural engineering services, and contingencies, is \$13,000. Funds are available in the net income

of the Bookstore.

able at the Board meeting)

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this contract was awarded, and the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board were authorized to execute the same.

CONTRACT FOR NEW GUTTER WORK ON ARCHITECTURE BUILDING

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$6,950 to Petry Roofing & Sheet Metal Company, Champaign, the lowest bidder, for replacing the gutters, plus the necessary auxiliary work, on the Architecture Building.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department's budget.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this contract was awarded, and the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board were authorized to execute the same.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(19) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board of Trustees as of December 31, 1955.

This report was received for record and a copy has been filed with the Secretary of the Board.

LEASE OF HOUSING FOR UNDERGRADUATE WOMEN

(20) The Board of Trustees has authorized the leasing, through a sublease from the University of Illinois Foundation, the principal lessee, of seven apartment buildings from Northwood, Inc., Champaign. The plan as approved by the Board provides for the construction by Northwood, Inc., of two of these buildings between First and Second Streets and five between Third and Arbor Streets, all on Gregory Drive in Champaign.

Northwood, Inc. requests a revision of the plan so that six buildings will be located between Arbor and Third Streets on Gregory Drive and one building on the northeast corner of Gregory Drive and Second Street. The University's Housing Division approves this change as the buildings will be located closer to food service facilities.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the acceptance of the revision. Except for the change in site, the plan as approved by the Board on January 28, 1956, is the same.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this revision was approved.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

President Henry stated that he had recommendations to present relating to land acquisitions and the conferring of honorary degrees.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, an executive session was ordered for the consideration of these matters of business.

CONFERRING OF HONORARY DEGREES

(21) The University Senate recommends that the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) be conferred on the Honorable Earl Warren, Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, and the Honorable Walter Charles Lindley, Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, on April 14, 1956, at one of the ceremonies dedicating the new College of Law Building at the University of Illinois.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Swain, these recommendations were approved and the conferring of the degrees was authorized.

PURCHASE OF FARM LANDS

(22) A farm in two tracts immediately south of University farm lands in Cham-(22) A farm in two tracts immediately south of University farm lands in Champaign County, one hundred sixty acres (N.E. Quarter, Section 31, T. 19 N., R. 9 E.) and eighty acres (west half of the S.E. Quarter, Section 30, T. 19 N., R. 9 E.), owned by the George Grein estate, will soon be sold at a public sale to settle the estate. Neither tract is contiguous to University land. The eighty-acre tract is separated from University land to the north by a forty-acre tract (S.W. Quarter of the N.E. Quarter of Section 30, T. 19 N., R. 9 E.) and to the east by an eighty-acre tract (E. half of the S.E. Quarter, Section 30, T. 19 N., R. 9 E.), both owned by Mr. Henry Grein both owned by Mr. Henry Grein.

As the University campus expands, it will be necessary to take over for other purposes some of the present Agricultural Experiment Station farm lands south of the campus, and these will have to be replaced by other farm land acquisitions. It would be an advantage to acquire the Grein farm now for this long-range program. The possibility of a trade of farm lands with Mr. Henry Grein in this acquisition program should also be considered since his farm adjoins present University holdings. These possibilities and ways and means of financing this land acquisition program are being carefully studied.

In the meantime, since the public sale may be held before the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, I recommend that the Board authorize its Executive Committee, acting on recommendations from the Committee on Agriculture, to acquire through negotiation or public sale either the land now owned by the George Grein estate or the land owned by Henry Grein, or both, or any part or parts of either or both.

Mr. Swain moved that the Executive Committee be given the authority recommended. This motion was adopted by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Bissell, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Livingston, Mr. Swain, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Megran, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Stratton.
