

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

April 20, 1960



The April meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on Wednesday, April 20, 1960, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

The following members of the Board were present: Mr. Howard W. Clement, Mr. Richard A. Harewood, Mr. Wirt Herrick, Mr. Earl M. Hughes, Mr. Wayne A. Johnston, Mr. Harold Pogue, Mr. Timothy W. Swain, Mrs. Frances B. Watkins, Mr. George T. Wilkins, Mr. Kenney E. Williamson. Governor William G. Stratton was absent.

Also present were President David D. Henry, Associate Provost and Dean of Administration Royden Dangerfield, Executive Dean C. C. Caveny of the Chicago Undergraduate Division, Director C. S. Havens of the Physical Plant, Mr. Ralph F. Lesemann, Legal Counsel, Mr. C. E. Flynn, Director of Public Information, Professor Rubin G. Cohn of the College of Law; and the officers of the Board, Mr. H. O. Farber, Comptroller, Mr. C. W. Weldon, Treasurer, and Mr. A. J. Janata, Secretary.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Meetings of the Board's Committees on General Policy and Buildings and Grounds were held in the forenoon beginning at 10:00 a.m.

CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION SITE ACQUISITION

At the request of Mr. Johnston, Chairman of the Committee on General Policy, President Henry, Director Havens, and Professor Cohn reported on developments, since the March meeting of the Board of Trustees, in negotiations with officials of the Chicago Park District and the city of Chicago for the acquisition by the University of Garfield Park land as a site for the Chicago Undergraduate Division.

Thanks to the cooperation of the Chicago Park District and the city of Chicago, the Commissioners of the Chicago Park District on April 11, 1960, took official action which provides a basis for determination of the legal questions involved in conveyance of Garfield Park land to the University. Professor Cohn reported that a decision by the Supreme Court of Illinois as to the legality of such conveyance can be anticipated in the fall of 1960.

Director Havens stated that Garfield Park offers the only opportunity to complete the planning and construction of a Chicago campus at an early date, and recommended that the University continue to work for a general commitment from the Chicago Park District and the city of Chicago that Garfield Park land will be made available subject to a favorable determination of the legal questions.

The Board of Trustees at its meeting on March 16, 1960, authorized the Executive Committee to act for the Board in considering formal acceptance of an option to purchase Garfield Park land should such an option be offered and action by the Board of Trustees required prior to the April meeting. Specifically the Committee was authorized to accept an option if the action of the Chicago Park District established an appraisal price based on a fair cash value of the property.

At the conclusion of these presentations, Mr. Johnston offered the following as an official statement of the University's position:

"The Board of Commissioners of the Chicago Park District adopted an ordinance offering the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois an option to purchase Garfield Park land as a site for the Chicago Undergraduate Division. Subsequently, a court order was sought and secured by taxpayers restraining the Commissioners from offering and the Board of Trustees from accepting this option.

"Had this restraining order not been issued, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois would have taken action to exercise the option offered."

This statement was adopted without dissent.

During the discussion of this motion, Mr. Harewood suggested that in addition to continuing negotiations for the acquisition of Garfield Park, University officials also continue exploring the other possible sites.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the Board voted to express its appreciation to the Commissioners of the Chicago Park District and to the Mayor of Chicago for their cooperation in the negotiations for the acquisition of Garfield Park.

CONTRACTS FOR LANDSCAPING

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees has authorized the awards of contracts for landscaping areas as follows:

The award in each case was to the lowest bidder. Funds are available in the

construction accounts for these buildings which are financed by revenue bond issues.

The Orchard Place Apartments are south of Florida Avenue between Orchard Street extended and Race Street on which 120 family housing units were constructed last year. The Snack Bar and Post Office Building is in the area of the Gregory Drive Residence Halls for men and will also serve the new Peabody Drive Residence Halls now under construction.

It was imperative that the landscaping work be authorized promptly while the nursery stock supplied and transplanted by the contractors was dormant as transplanting it later in the spring would lessen chances of survival. Bids taken earlier (March 1) were not satisfactory, were rejected, and new bids were received on March 21 which accounts for the delay in the recommendation for awards on the contracts.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this action of the Executive Committee was confirmed.

INCREASE IN CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF SWINE BREEDING RESEARCH FACILITIES

The Executive Committee authorized an increase of \$12,000 in a contract with Oran L. Shoemaker and Company, Champaign, for the construction of two "tilt-up" slab buildings for the Agricultural Experiment Station's swine breeding research project for which the University received a grant of \$200,000 from the Moorman Manufacturing Company of Quincy. These facilities are being constructed under a standing contract authorized by the Board as the experiments proceed and according to the requirements of the research project. The object of the research is the development of lines of disease-free swine.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this action of the Executive Committee was confirmed.

BUSINESS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY
The Board took up consideration of the following reports and recommendations from the President of the University.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE 1960 SUMMER SESSION STAFF

(1) I submit recommendations for appointments to the faculty for the 1960 Summer Session. Appointments in the Summer Session budget provide for an eight-week term at Urbana-Champaign, June 20 through August 13, and at the Chicago Undergraduate Division, June 20 through August 13; and two six-week terms, June 20 through July 30, and August 1 through September 9, in the College of Pharmacy.

The salaries of members of the University faculty recommended for appointment to the Summer Session staff are computed on the basis of the authorized formula of two-ninths of the salary of the academic year for the eight-week Summer Session and proportionate amounts for other periods or for part-time service.

The budget totals \$788,971 plus a reserve of \$17,724 for Urbana-Champaign; \$13,305 for the Chicago Professional Colleges; and \$111,228 plus a reserve of \$3,772 for the Chicago Undergraduate Division.

I recommend that the appointments to the Summer Session staff be approved as submitted, and that the President of the University be authorized to accept resignations and make such changes in adjustments and additional appointments as are necessary in accordance with the needs of the University within the estimated income.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, these appointments and the Summer Session budget were approved, and the President was given authority as recommended. This action was taken by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Clement, Mr. Harewood, Mr. Herrick, Mr. Hughes, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Pogue, Mr. Swain, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Stratton.

HEADSHIP OF DEPARTMENT OF ANTHROPOLOGY

(2) The Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recommends the appointment of Dr. Joseph B. Casagrande, presently on the staff of the Social Science Research Council, New York City, as Professor of Anthropology on indefinite tenure and Head of the Department of Anthropology, beginning September 1, 1960, at an annual salary of \$15,000 on "A" basis.

APPOINTMENT OF ASSOCIATE DEAN OF THE GRADUATE COLLEGE

SABBATICAL LEAVES OF ABSENCE, 1960-61

(5) I recommend that the following members of the staff be given sabbatical leaves of absence during the academic year 1960-61 in accordance with the provisions of the University of Illinois Statutes and on the terms and for the period indicated. This is supplemental to the list of applications recommended to the Board of Trustees at the meeting on March 16, 1960.

College of Engineering

M. K. FAHNESTOCK, Research Professor of Mechanical Engineering (Engineering Experiment Station) and Chairman of the Physical Environment Unit in the Graduate College, second semester (six months from February 1, 1961), full pay; for visits to various laboratories doing research on atmospheric environment and to study their programs pertaining to relationships of atmospheric environment, people, agricultural animals and plants, and controlled environment for products and processes. The composite information to be secured will be used in further development of facilities and programs in the University's physical environment laboratories in which interdisciplinary research programs serving engineering, agriculture, physiology, psychology, and physical fitness are conducted.

REINHOLD F. LARSON, Professor of Mechanical Engineering, second semester, full pay; for studies with nuclear engineering and chemical engineering groups at Massachusetts Institute of Technology; and studies of the programs of reactor techniques at Argonne and Oak Ridge National Laboratories and laboratories in foreign countries.

College of Fine and Applied Arts

VICTOR A. HYDE, Professor of Community Planning, first semester, full pay; for observation of programs and studies of policies in the field of government planning in European countries.

KING KELLOGG, Associate Professor of Music, first semester, full pay; to study vocal literature in Europe as a basis for preparation of a guide for teaching of vocal literature.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these leaves were granted, as recommended.

REQUEST OF ASSISTANT PROFESSOR LEO F. KOCH

(6) On recommendation of the Executive Committee of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Assistant Professor Leo F. Koch of the Division of General Studies was relieved of all University duties as of April 7, 1960, and has been informed that his appointment will be terminated at the end of the current academic year, 1959-60. A copy of my letter on this subject to Dean Lyle H. Lanier was sent to each member of the Board.

On April 11 Professor Koch delivered to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees a letter requesting the Board to review the action taken with respect to his status. Under University of Illinois Statutes he is entitled to a hearing by the Board of Trustees. He has also requested a hearing by the Committee on Academic Freedom of the Urbana Senate.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, seconded by Mr. Harewood, the request for a hearing by the Board of Trustees was granted, and the President of the Board was authorized to set the time and place of the hearing to be conducted under procedures recommended by the Legal Counsel of the University.

CHANGES IN DEPARTMENTAL NAMES

(7) On recommendation of the heads of the departments and other University officers concerned, the following changes in departmental names have been approved: Department of Mechanical Engineering changed to Department of Mechanical and Industrial Engineering, and the Aeromedical and Physical Environment Laboratory changed to Aeromedical Laboratory.

Confirmation of these changes is requested.

On motion of Mr. Swain, these changes were confirmed.

COUNTY SCHOLARSHIPS

(8) Under state law, there is awarded annually to each county of the state one scholarship which entitles the holder to exemption from payment of tuition fees at the University of Illinois for a period of four years. The award is made on the basis of a competitive examination given by the County Superintendent of Schools on the last Saturday of March. The University prescribes the rules under which the examinations are given and the Office of Admissions and Records works with the county superintendents in setting up these examinations. The highest ranking candidate in each county wins the scholarship.

The law does not take into account variations in population and provides for only one scholarship in each county. To equalize the distribution of these awards, the Board of Trustees has created additional University scholarships in a number of counties, providing the same benefits as the county scholarships. These latter University scholarships are awarded to candidates ranking immediately below the top candidates in the county scholarship examinations.

The law also provides that "No student who has taken normal school, college, university, or other training in advance of the completion of a four-year high school course shall be eligible to the examination." This disqualifies students who during their high school senior year have earned college credit under the advanced placement program or by attending classes at the University of Illinois, either in Urbana or at the Chicago Undergraduate Division, or at some accredited junior or senior college. Hence outstanding students are deprived of an opportunity to earn a county tuition scholarship.

The Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships has recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the award of a University scholarship in any county where the highest-ranking candidate in the competitive examination may technically be ineligible because of having had college credit while still a senior in high school. If this is approved the University can still take care of the highest-ranking students without depriving the high school senior without college credit of his legal rights in the college scholarship examination. The number of these cases will not be large as the awards will be limited to those counties with

populations not large enough to qualify for additional University scholarships awarded in addition to the winners of County Scholarships.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Harewood, this recommendation was approved.

**INCREASED RETIREMENT ANNUITIES FOR STAFF
WHO RETIRED PRIOR TO SEPTEMBER 1, 1959**

(9) I recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, a Committee of the Emeriti representing members of the University of Illinois faculty who retired prior to September 1, 1959, will request the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois to consider a plan to provide increased retirement benefits for those who retired prior to establishment of the University Retirement System of Illinois in 1941 and for those who retired after September 1, 1941, but prior to September 1, 1959; and

WHEREAS, the amendments of the Act creating the University Retirement System of Illinois adopted in 1959 which provide more equitable annuities and other benefits available to employees of state institutions of higher education did not provide for any adjustments in the retirement allowances of the Emeriti of 1958 and former years; and

WHEREAS, those who retired prior to September 1, 1941, and whose annuities are paid by the University as deferred compensation for service rendered prior to retirement, are receiving annuities far below the annuities available under the University Retirement System of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the annuities of those retired after September 1, 1941, but prior to September 1, 1959, are not proportional to the contributions required of participants, do not take into account the unrecorded equity toward retirement allowances earned by service prior to 1941, and do not provide adequate benefits for a surviving wife or dependent children; and

WHEREAS, many of these Emeriti, after spending virtually their entire careers in the service of the state universities of Illinois are dependent largely upon their retirement annuities, and are in serious financial need; and

WHEREAS, the University Council and the Urbana Senate Committee on Retirement Insurance and Hospitalization have been consulted and are in sympathy with this request; and

WHEREAS, the Committee is also requesting the endorsement of its plan by the Teachers College Board and the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University; now therefore be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that it endorses in principle the request of the Committee of the Emeriti that the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois consider a plan and support in the 1961 session of the General Assembly of Illinois the necessary legislation to provide the much needed improvements in retirement benefits for those who retired from the service of the state universities prior to September 1, 1959.

On motion of Mr. Harewood, the foregoing resolution was adopted.

CENTER FOR ZOONOSSES RESEARCH

(10) The Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine has proposed the establishment of a Center for Zoonoses Research at the University of Illinois according to the plan of organization set forth below. A special committee appointed by the Vice-President and Provost to study this proposal has recommended approval. The Vice-President and Provost and the Dean of the Graduate College concur.

Research on the zoonoses is highly desirable and worthy of effort on the part of the University. The zoonoses are being increasingly recognized as of major importance to human and animal health and welfare. Establishment of the Center would focus more attention on the zoonoses, encourage more research upon them, and promote needed interdisciplinary cooperation and coordination in this area. In addition, it would attract substantial amounts of outside support. The idea of our establishing the Center—the second one in the

world and the only one in the United States — has received enthusiastic praise and offers of cooperation from national and international leaders in the field.

Organization of the Center for Zoonoses Research

The organization and function of the Center are to be as follows:

- (a) The Center for Zoonoses Research is responsible for carrying out research on the zoonoses — diseases common to animals and man — and related diseases, parasites, and disease agents, including studies of their epizootiology, epidemiology, pathology, etiology, control and host-parasite relationships. In developing and carrying on such programs, use shall be made of the Center staff as well as of the staffs of other University departments and divisions. Cooperative work will also be carried out with other public and private research and service agencies.
- (b) The administrative head of the Center shall be a Director appointed biennially by the Board of Trustees on the recommendation of the President. An Associate Director shall be appointed in the same manner.
- (c) The staff of the Center for Zoonoses Research shall be composed of three types of members: (1) Senior Members; these may or may not hold joint appointments in other departments or divisions of the University; (2) Associate Members; these may or may not hold joint appointments in other departments or divisions of the University; (3) Consulting Members; these shall be members of the staffs of institutions or organizations other than the University of Illinois.
- (d) The Executive Committee of the Center shall be composed of all Senior Members. The Director shall be an *ex officio* member and the chairman of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall advise the Director on the administration of his office, including the formulation of plans and the preparation of the budget.

The Director of the Center for Zoonoses Research shall be the Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, who also serves as administrative head of the Department of Veterinary Medical Science in the Graduate College and of the Department of Veterinary Research in the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The first Senior Members of the Center shall be appointed on nomination by the Director from among present faculty members of the University. These will then constitute the Executive Committee. Scientists not at present associated with the University may be appointed also. Senior Members shall be appointed on indefinite tenure.

Associate Members will be appointed for one- or two-year periods and will not be reappointed for more than three consecutive terms. They will be appointed on nomination by the Director and Executive Committee with approval of the President and the Board of Trustees of the University. Associate Members may be appointed from among present members of the faculty, from persons not now on the faculty, and from scientists from other institutions and areas who will want to work at the Center.

Senior Members and Associate Members may receive all or part of their salaries from the Center's budget. If they hold joint appointments in other departments or divisions, the proportions of their time devoted to research, teaching, advising, etc., will be determined by mutual agreement with the departments or divisions concerned. Part or all of the salary of Associate Members, including summer salary, may come from research grants such as those from the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, or private foundations.

Research may be conducted either on campus or in the field.

Appointments of Consulting Members will permit utilization of the counsel of outstanding scientists from other institutions, agencies, and organizations, state, national, and international. It is contemplated that Consulting Members will be appointed for terms of one to two years on nomination by the Director and Executive Committee. They may be reappointed as many times as proves mutually desirable.

It is recommended that the Center be activated September 1, 1960.

The proposed budget contemplates an initial recurring University appropriation of \$12,000 a year. A solid commitment of funds for the future is obviously not feasible but the present recommendation is made in the expectation that the University will continue to grow in size and in service to the state and nation. However, even if expansion of the Center does not turn out to be as rapid as anticipated, it will still be able to make creditable contributions in research.

The Committee recommended that the Center limit itself initially to a coordinated study of leptospirosis, Q fever, para-influenza, and other respiratory virus and rickettsial diseases, all of which form an ecologically related group of diseases common to man, livestock, and wildlife; to a study of the relationship of climatic and meteorological factors to the transmission of the agents of these and other diseases; and to a study of the passage back and forth between man and his pets of these and other diseases.

The Committee further recommended that, upon activation of the Center, one new senior academic staff member be appointed; that several present academic staff members totaling two full-time equivalents be appointed to the staff of the Center; that the appropriate portions of their salaries be allocated to the Center; and that the junior academic staff members and the salaries of nonacademic supporting staff members be drawn from grant funds. It recommends further that one new senior academic staff member be added to the Center each biennium during the decade after its activation.

I concur in the foregoing recommendations provided that (a) the extent to which the plan of organization, research program, and other contemplated services of the Center are implemented shall be subject to budgetary considerations and (b) establishment of the Center does not imply a priority commitment on University resources, but support of the Center will be considered in relation to other needs for operating funds and physical facilities.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, these recommendations were approved.

**ANNEXATION OF LAND TO THE URBANA-CHAMPAIGN
SANITARY DISTRICT**

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize annexation of the following described areas of University property to the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District:

The area bounded by Florida Avenue, Lincoln Avenue, St. Mary's Road, and the Illinois Central Railroad, except the south 264 feet between First Street and the railroad;

That portion of the north half of Section 20 which is not already in the District (east of Lincoln Avenue, extending $\frac{1}{4}$ mile south of St. Mary's Road).

The area to be annexed includes the site of the Assembly Hall and the proposed new forestry tract to replace Illini Grove. This annexation is necessary to provide for the treatment of sewage from these sources. A plat of the area, including the legal description, is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record as a part of this recommendation.

I recommend that the Secretary and the Comptroller be authorized to execute the petition and any other documents necessary to effect the annexation, subject to approval of the Legal Counsel.

On motion of Mr. Swain, these recommendations were approved.

PARKING METERS AND BICYCLE ROADWAY ON WRIGHT STREET

(13) City of Champaign officials have requested permission to install and maintain parking meters on University property on the east side of Wright Street between Armory and Springfield. University officials have considered this, and as an alternative, request authority to propose to the City that it reserve a roadway approximately eight feet wide, west of the present east curb line on Wright Street, and the construction of islands to form the west boundary of the bicycle roadway, between Armory Avenue and Green Street, and the installation of parking meters on these islands instead of on University property; provided that the meters in the two blocks between Green and Springfield Avenue would be on University property on the east side of Wright Street.

This alternate proposal contemplates that the City would grant permission to the University to construct and maintain these islands, and that the City will adopt and enforce an ordinance prohibiting use of the eight-foot strip of pavement between the east curb of Wright Street and the islands by vehicles other than those which are not motor driven and will keep such ordinance in effect, and will enforce it, as long as the arrangement continues in effect. While this would eliminate one line of motor traffic between Armory Avenue and Green Street, it would provide an exclusive, and safer, bicycle lane on a street on which traffic is very heavy during University class hours, and would enable the City to install its parking meters.

Specifically, the Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize:

1. A formal proposal to the city of Champaign that it grant permission to the University to construct and maintain, at University expense, islands in Wright Street between Armory Avenue and Green Street, approximately three feet wide, the east edge of which will be approximately eight feet west of the present east curb of Wright Street to provide the boundary for a bicycle roadway and space for City parking meters (instead of along the east curb of Wright Street) to be installed and maintained by the City; in return, the City will adopt and enforce an ordinance prohibiting the use of the eight-foot strip by any vehicle other than bicycles which are not motor driven.
2. The lease to the city of Champaign of an area approximately three feet wide lying immediately east of the present east curb line of Wright Street between Green Street and Springfield Avenue at a rental of \$1.00 per year for a period ending June 30, 1963, provided that the lease will be automatically renewable for successive biennial periods beginning July 1, 1963, unless said lease is cancelled at any time during any such renewal period by at least thirty days' notice in writing given by either party to the other, or some modification in the lease is required by either party and agreed to by both.

3. The execution by the officers of the Board of an agreement or agreements and such other documents as may be necessary, subject to the approval of said documents by the University's Legal Counsel, to implement this exchange of facilities; said agreement or agreements to be for an initial period which will expire June 30, 1963, but which will provide for automatic renewals for successive biennial periods beginning July 1, 1963, unless said lease is cancelled at any time during such renewal time by at least thirty days notice by either party to the other, or some changes in the agreement are requested by either party and agreed to by both parties.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Harewood, these recommendations were approved.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ASSEMBLY HALL

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant and Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$8,492 in the contract with Felmley-Dickerson Company for the construction of the Assembly Hall for additional materials and labor to modify the original design of the glazed exterior wall section around the concourse to provide sufficient elasticity to permit structural movements resulting from changes in temperature and natural expansion and contraction of the materials involved. Lack of sufficient elasticity would result in possible cracks, warpage, or damage to the exterior glazed wall. This work, estimated to cost \$15,246, will be offset to the extent of \$6,754 for revisions in the shape and over-all length of the catwalk above the playing floor, and by reduction of the concrete slab seating area from 4 inches to 3 inches.

Funds are available in the construction account for the Assembly Hall.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute the contract change.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this change in the contract was authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR SNACK BAR AND SERVICE BUILDING

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$6,303 in the contract with the A. F. Krall Construction Company for the construction of the Snack Bar and Service Building for the Gregory Drive and Peabody Drive Residence Halls to include construction of an information and sales counter in the lobby. This will include shelf space for newspapers, magazines, toilet articles, and other items, formerly available in the Parade Grounds Canteen which is being replaced by the new building.

Funds are available in the construction account for the Snack Bar and Service Building.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute the change order.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this change in the contract was authorized.

APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS

(16) The firm of Ernst and Ernst, Certified Public Accountants, was retained by the Board of Trustees for the audit of the University's accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, with the understanding that the firm would be employed for three years subject to annual review. The firm was also employed for the year ended 1959.

The services of Ernst and Ernst have been very satisfactory. The firm proposes to complete the audit for the year ending June 30, 1960, at the prevailing hourly rates for college and university audits, plus cash expenses, plus expenses for travel and subsistence of the staff assigned to the audit, with the understanding that the aggregate charges will not exceed the following amounts, which are the same maximums used for the audit for the past two years:

Under the present state law the Auditor-General of Illinois is responsible for auditing, or causing to be audited, the records of the University. The Auditor-General, Mr. Frank H. Whitney, has followed the practice of earlier years in which the Auditor-General is consulted concerning the employment of the auditing firm, and the firm employed by the University submits copies of its reports directly to him, as well as to the Board of Trustees. Any additional work which the Auditor-General may require is at the expense of his office. The firm of Ernst and Ernst is acceptable to the Auditor-General.

The Finance Committee recommends the employment of Ernst and Ernst for the audit of University accounts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1960.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this recommendation was approved.

(17) The Director of Purchases has proposed and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommends the following purchases. Unless otherwise specified, the purchase in each case is recommended on the basis of lowest bid.

PURCHASE OF FURNITURE FOR STUDENT RESIDENCE HALLS

(18) The Board of Trustees on March 16, 1960, authorized the purchase of student room furniture (chairs, desks, and beds) for the Peabody Avenue Residence Halls and the Residence Hall on Green Street for Single Graduate Students, now under construction, from Faucett-Umphrey Corporation, Bloomfield, Indiana, the lowest bidder and manufacturer, and a contract for \$189,448.10 was subsequently executed by the Corporation and the University.

The Corporation, having failed to furnish an Owner's Protective Bond as specified in the contract within the required ten-day period, and after an extension of time was granted, the Director of Purchases and the Vice-President and Comptroller therefore recommend that the Board exercise its option to declare the contract with Faucett-Umphrey Corporation null and void and to retain the Corporation's bid deposit of \$7,500 as liquidated damages for failure to comply with contract requirements; and that the Board authorize the Director of Purchases to send written notice of this action to Faucett-Umphrey Corporation.

It is also recommended that a contract for \$195,494.74 for the purchase of this furniture be awarded to Sligh Lowry Furniture Company, Holland, Michigan, the second lowest bidder, on the total of the items to be purchased. This Company is prepared to execute a contract and to comply with all requirements.

I concur.

**APPOINTMENT OF VICE-PRESIDENT AND PROVOST
OF THE UNIVERSITY**

(21) I recommend the appointment of Dr. Lyle H. Lanier, now Professor of Psychology and Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, as Professor of Psychology on indefinite tenure and Vice-President and Provost of the University for a period beginning July 1, 1960, and continuing through August 31, 1961. The salary for this position will be determined when the budget for 1960-61 is submitted to the Board for approval.

The nomination of Dean Lanier has the unanimous and enthusiastic support of a consultative committee appointed to advise the President of the University on this matter. The Committee consulted many members of the faculty from whom it received suggestions as well as from other sources. The University is fortunate to have someone on its staff immediately available to succeed Vice-President and Provost Gordon N. Ray who has the respect and confidence of the faculty and the administrative staff, who is a proven administrator as a former department head and dean, and who has a background of distinguished academic achievement as teacher and scholar.
