APPOINTMENT OF ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF THE EXTENSION SERVICE IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

(3) On recommendation of the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics, and with the concurrence of the Vice-President and Provost and the President of the University, the Executive Committee of the Board approved the appointment of Dr. John B. Claar, formerly Farm Representative for the Administrator of the Federal Extension Service in the United States Department of Agriculture as Associate Director of the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Eco-nomics, with the rank of Professor, for one year beginning September 1, 1960, at a salary of \$16,000 (on "Y" basis). Reappointment will be on the standard biennial tenure for administrative officers. This appointment is to replace Pro-fessor William G, Kammlade as Associate Director of the Extension Service in Agriculture of the Extension Service in the State of the Extensi Agriculture and Home Economics and State Leader of Farm Advisers, who retired September 1, 1960.

Since it was important to fill the position beginning September 1, the recommendation was submitted to the Executive Committee for approval, and was simultaneously reported to the other members of the Board.

NAMING OF RESIDENCE HALLS

(5) The President of the University has recommended to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds the following names for the three units of the new Peabody Drive Residence Halls and the Committee concurs.

Scott House -- for Franklin William Scott. An alumnus of the University of Illinois, Class of 1901, Mr. Scott also received the degrees of Master of Arts in 1903 and Doctor of Philosophy in 1912, from the University of Illinois. As an undergraduate he was in numerous extracurricular activities, especially student publications. With the exception of a year spent in graduate study at Harvard University, he was a member of the faculty of the University of Illinois as Instructor in Rhetoric and Assistant Professor and Professor of English, continuously from 1901 to 1925 when he resigned to become editor-in-chief of D. C. Heath and Co. He was Secretary of the Department of English for many years and at various times served as Chairman. He organized the first courses in journalism which were then taught in the Department of English and directed these courses from 1905 to 1918 and from 1921 to 1925. He organized and was Chairman of the Board of the Illini Publishing Company for many years. Source House a for Edward Spuder Professor Spuder was a member of

Snyder House -- for Edward Snyder. Professor Snyder was a member of the faculty from the time the University opened in 1868 until he retired in 1896. His continuing position on the faculty was Professor of German and Literature, but at various times he also served as Professor of Modern Languages, as Dean of the College of Literature, as Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and as Business Agent for the University. He was the first Commandant of the Military Department, having been commissioned as a Colonel in the Illinois National Guard, from 1870 to 1880. (He also served for three years with a New York regiment in the War Between the States.) Following his retirement, he gave the University \$12,000 to establish the first student loan fund, which, of course, is still in operation.

Weston House — for Nathan Austin Weston. Dr. Weston graduated from the University of Illinois in 1889 and was a member of the faculty for many years. He served as Instructor in the University Academy for four years, while doing graduate work at Illinois and at Cornell University. He was on the faculty as Instructor, Assistant Professor, and Professor of Economics from 1900 until his death in 1933. He was the first Dean (Acting Dean) of the College of Commerce and Business Administration, serving in this capacity from 1915 to 1919.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, these names were approved.

POLICY ON THE USE OF TELEVISION FOR INSTRUCTION

(6) Television facilities increase the capacity of the University of Illinois to serve both its resident students and the citizens of the state. In order that the use of this medium may conform to sound educational practice, the following standards have been recommended by the Urbana-Champaign Senate, with the concurrence of the other two Senates:

When the sole question is one of employing television techniques in a resident course for regularly enrolled students, the college in which the course is offered shall retain a full measure of autonomy, including control over the question of attendance.

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When television is used for other than resident students, and credit is being given:

- a. The course must be one which is offered in residence.
- b. The course must be prepared and presented by the appropriate resident department.
- e. Credits earned in such courses can not be counted as resident credits. Candidates for certain degrees may, however, in accordance with the present practice respecting extramural courses, apply up to sixty undergraduate semester hours toward the baccalaureate degree or four units toward the master's degree for credits earned in the television and other extramural programs, provided all other University requirements have been met and necessary approval is secured for courses pursued from the college or school in which the degree is to be taken.
- college or school in which the degree is to be taken. d. Admission and registration will be in accordance with appropriate University regulations.

When television is used for other than resident students, and credit is not being given, admission and registration will be in accordance with appropriate University regulations, such as those of the Division of University Extension for extramural classes.

This policy is to be effective September 1, 1960, but shall be reviewed annually by the Educational Policy Committee of the Urbana-Champaign Senate.

I recommend approval of this policy.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this recommendation was approved.

DISCONTINUANCE OF MOUNT MORRIS EXPERIMENT FIELD

(7) The Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station recommends that the Mount Morris Experiment Field be discontinued. This field of approximately twenty acres has been in use since 1910, and the Department of Agronomy feels that it has secured all the information it can from the field. The soil is similar to a nearby field in Lee County, which will be continued. Also, a new 100-acre research center has been established in the northern part of the state at the former, and the time, effort, and money now expended at Mount Morris can more profitably be used at the new research center.

The legal description of the field is as follows:

Part of the North 3/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 35, in Township 24 North, Range 9 East of the 4th P.M., described as follows: Commencing at a point on the North line of said Section, 121/2 chains West of the Northeast corner of the Northwest 1/4 of said Section and running thence West on the Section line 15 chains, thence South 133/3 chains, thence East parallel to the Section line 15 chains, thence North 131/3 chains to the place of beginning, containing 20 acres, more or less in Ogle County, Illinois.

The land was given to the University and the deed conveying the property contains the following statement:

It is hereby agreed and understood that this land is deeded to the University to be used as a state experimental station. And it is further understood and agreed if the use of this tract of land for the purpose stated should be discontinued for the term of two years the University of Illinois shall deed the North half of said land to the Village of Mount Morris, Illinois, and the South half of said tract to Mount Morris College Co. This deed is accepted upon these conditions and terms.

The village of Mount Morris, Illinois, has requested that the University deed the north half of the field to it and has indicated that it will accept a quit claim deed to the property.

Mount Morris College is no longer in existence, and the Legal Counsel has not yet been able to determine whether "Mt. Morris College Co." or any successor to it has any rights in the property. A recommendation concerning the disposition of the south half of the field will be submitted at a later date.

The Vice-President and Comptroller and the Legal Counsel join in these recommendations and in the adoption of the following resolution, and I concur.

Resolution

Be it, and it hereby is, resolved by this Board of Trustees of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, with its principal office in the City of Urbana, County of Champaign, and State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and Secretary of this Board of Trustees be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name of and in behalf of this Corporation and under its Corporate Seal a Quit-Claim Deed and such other documents in connection therewith as said Comptroller and Secretary may deem necessary or desirable in order to convey and quit claim to Village of Mount Morris, a municipal corporation of the County of Ogle in the State of Illinois, title to the North one-half of the following. described real estate:

A part of the North Half of the Northwest Quarter (NW 1/4) of Section Thirty-five (35) in Township Twenty-four (24) North, Range Nine (9) Thirty-five (35) in Township Twenty-four (24) North, Kange Nine (9) East of the Fourth Principal Meridian, described as follows: Commencing at a point on the North line of said Section, twelve and one-half (12½) chains West of the Northeast corner of the Northwest Quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$) of said Section and running thence West on the Section line fifteen (15) chains, thence South thirteen and one-third (13 $\frac{1}{3}$) chains, thence East parallel to the Section line fifteen (15) chains, thence North thirteen and one-third (13 $\frac{1}{3}$) chains to place of beginning, situated in the County of Ogle, in the State of Illinois State of Illinois.

Copies of his report were distributed at the meeting, and a copy was filed with the Secretary for record.

EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTURAL AND ENGINEERING FIRMS

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend employment of the following architectural and engineering firms on new building projects for which state appropriations are being requested for 1961-63 and subsequent biennia for the services and at the fees stated:

College of Commerce and Business Administration Building-Jameson and Harrison, Peoria

Complete architectural services at a fee of 6 per cent of the construction contracts.

Electrical Engineering Building addition -- Graham, Anderson, Probet, and White, Inc., Chicago

Complete architectural services at a fee of 6 per cent of the construction contracts.

Medical Sciences Building addition -

Shaw, Metz, and Associates, Chicago Richardson, Severns, Scheeler, and Associates, Champaign, Associate Architects

The development phase, preliminary work and definitive drawings, will be the responsibility of Richardson, Severns, Scheeler, and Associates, who will coordinate their work with that of Shaw, Metz, and Associates. The pro-duction and construction phases, working drawings, and supervision will be the responsibility of Shaw, Metz, and Associates. Total fees will be on the basis of 6 per cent of construction contracts. Research and Educational Hospitals addition — Fugard, Burt, Wilkinson, and Orth Chicago

Orth, Chicago

Complete services at a fee of 6 per cent of the construction contracts. This will be a fourteen-story addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals connected with the present Hospitals addition and with the proposed Medical Sciences addition. The project will include remodeling and rehabilitation of areas in the present Research and Educational Hospitals. Since this second addition is not in the 1961-63 building program, the architectural work during the balance of the 1959-60 biennium will be limited to certain minor studies necessary to permit work on the adjoining Medical Sciences addition to house the basic science departments of the College of Medicine with its hospital oriented departments.

Residence Halls for Graduate Students (Third Phase, SG-3)

Mielke and Smith, Chicago

Richardson, Severns, Scheeler, and Associates, Champaign, Associate Architects

At a fee not to exceed 6 per cent of the construction contracts less payments made to date to Richardson, Severns, Scheeler, and Associates for preliminary work.

Residence Halls for Graduate Men (Fourth Phase, SM-4) - Mittelbusher and Tourtelot, Chicago

For continuing architectural services beyond the design stage; this firm to be employed under a contract with Richardson, Severns, Scheeler, and Associates at a total fee not to exceed 6 per cent of the cost of construction contracts less payments made to date for preliminary work.

Physical Plant Department Service Building - A. Epstein & Sons, Chicago

Complete services at a fee of 6 per cent of the construction contracts. In each case the standard professional fees are subject to adjustment downward for such factors as payments made for any preliminary work or for duplication of buildings as in the case of residence halls.

The foregoing recommendations are presented with my concurrence and that of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds which has also considered them.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were approved; Mr. Herrick voted "no."

APPROPRIATION FOR EXTENSION OF STEAM TUNNEL

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an assignment of \$40,000 from General Indirect Costs funds to construct an extension of the Goodwin Avenue steam tunnel from the south side to the north side of Green Street. This steam tunnel will have to be extended further to the proposed site of the Materials Research Laboratory north of the "Bone-yard" and east of Goodwin Avenue. The first part of the construction should be done before Green Street is repaved next spring; otherwise, it would be necessary to tear up new pavement.

This work will also require an increase, estimated at \$3,100, in a contract with Sargent and Lundy for engineering services in designing utilities extensions authorized by the Board, February 19, 1959.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change in the contract with Sargent and Lundy.

FEDERAL GRANT AND MATCHING FUNDS FOR BIOACOUSTICS LABORATORY

(11) On April 17, 1958, the Board approved acceptance of a federal grant of \$139,173 from the National Institutes of Health for the construction of a bioacoustics laboratory and appropriated from the General Reserve the matching funds required by law. The University has now received a supplemental grant of \$74,425 to complete this project.

The Vice-President and Provost and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that this supplemental grant be accepted and that an appropriation of \$74,425 be made from the General Reserve for the required matching funds.

The Board of Education is willing to lease the warehouse to the University at a rental of \$6,000 a year with provision in the lease that the rental paid shall apply on the purchase price of the property if it is eventually purchased by the University or the Medical Center Commission. In the meantime, while negotiations as to the purchase price and terms are being conducted, and until funds for the purchase are available, it would be an advantage to the University to have the use of the building for general storage and certain Physical Plant shop operations.

Attached is a report from the Physical Plant Department on this project including schedules of all bids received.

The cost of this construction is within the presently estimated total cost of \$480,000 for this project, of which \$80,000 will be provided from state capital appropriations. The balance of \$400,000 will be temporarily financed from Illini Union reserves and housing operation surpluses and ultimately will be charged to the cost of construction of the Illini Union addition, and the advances of funds will be repaid from the proceeds of the bond issue to finance the Illini Union addition. Completion of construction of the utilities diversion and extension will control the start of the Illini Union addition, and to save time during the period of good construction weather, it was desirable to have these contracts authorized as soon as possible.

Confirmation of this action is requested, and I also recommend that the Board authorize the assignments of funds indicated above.

"EXCESS FACILITIES" AGREEMENT WITH COMMONWEALTH EDISON COMPANY

(21) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of an "excess facilities" agreement with the Commonwealth Edison Company, Chicago, at a cost of \$18,316, for electrical work being done at the Chicago Professional Colleges.

Contractors have started construction on a vault for 12,000-volt electrical service for the Dentistry-Medicine-Pharmacy Buildings and a portion of the Research and Educational Hospitals to replace the present overloaded and obsolete 4,000-volt vault now serving these buildings. A part of the work involved in this project is the bringing in of 12,000-volt electrical service from Edison Company's Hermitage Avenue substation. In addition, the Commonwealth Edison Company will furnish and set their transformers in the University vault and will do all bus and cable work in the Edison side of the vault. The Company will also be responsible for the installation of the 12,000-volt cables and conduit on University property in connection with providing the 12,000-volt service to the new vault. The work to be done by the Edison Company is termed "excess facilities,"

The work to be done by the Edison Company is termed "excess facilities," and allows for reduction in the monthly billing for electrical services. This method of installation of Edison services for the Chicago Professional Colleges is in accordance with the "Report on Electrical Distribution System, Chicago Professional Campus" dated May 3, 1950, and follows the plan authorized by the Board of Trustees on July 25, 1950.

Provision for this work has been included in the construction budget for the 12,000-volt vault.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Herrick, this recommendation was approved.

AMENDMENT OF CONTRACT FOR STEAM SERVICE TO CHICAGO FOUNDLINGS HOME

(22) The Medical Center Steam Company supplies steam to the Chicago Foundlings Home in the Medical Center District under a contract approved by the Board of Trustees on July 29, 1959.

The contract now calls for the maximum steam demand of 4,000 pounds an hour. Experience during the 1959-60 heating season indicates that the maximum amount of steam required by the Foundlings Home is not likely to exceed 2,000 pounds an hour and the latter has requested that the contract be amended accordingly. It is to the University's advantage to have steam contracts such as this based on a realistic maximum demand, and is also advantageous to the consumer, since payments made are based upon calculations involving the maximum demand.

The Director of the Physical Plant, the Vice-President and Comptroller, and the Acting Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommend amendment of the contract to reduce the maximum steam demand from 4,000 pounds an hour to 2,000 pounds an hour.

I concur.

FORD FOUNDATION GRANT FOR DEVELOPMENT OF A TRAINING PROGRAM FOR SERVICE TO ILLINOIS COMMUNITIES

(23) The Ford Foundation has approved a grant of \$125,000 to the University of Illinois for a project to help define the University's role in meeting urban problems and to develop a training program for service to Illinois' rapidly urban-izing communities. Under the project, three specific activities will be undertaken: (1) examination of uew ways in which the University might serve the state's urban areas; (2) training of a small corps of "urban generalists" competent in a variety of fields that touch on urban life; and (3) direct University assistance to several selected Illinois communities, each of which will have a staff member assigned to the study of its problems. The staff for this project will be chosen from a variety of disciplines and will represent the University's principal research institution and a staff for this project will be chosen from a variety of disciplines and will represent the University's principal research institutes and divisions.

The grant has been accepted with an appropriate expression of appreciation on behalf of the Board of Trustees and other University officials and is being reported for official record.

There has been established in the Office of the Provost the Office of Community Development to administer the program of urban development to be financed by this grant. Professor L. B. Wetmore, Head of the Department of City Planning and Landscape Architecture, will serve as Acting Director of the Office of Community Development for the academic year 1960-61.³ The principal task of this office during the year will be the selection of a permanent director, planning the program to be conducted during the biennium of 1961-63, and developing recommendations for the organizational relationships between the Office of Community Development and other University agencies.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(27) The Comptroller presented his quarterly report to the Board as of June 30, 1960.

This report was received for record and a copy has been filed with the Secretary of the Board.

EASEMENT ON HARTSBURG EXPERIMENT STATION

(28) The Superintendent of Highways of Logan County has requested an easement of right-of-way for highway purposes over land owned by the University and used as an Agricultural Experiment Station near Hartsburg. This is necessary in order to widen an existing road.

The Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that this easement be granted and that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolution

Be It, And It Hereby Is Resolved, by this Board of Trustees of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and Sccretary of this Board of Trustees be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and in behalf of this corporation, and under its corporate seal, a grant, in the form approved by the Legal Counsel of this corporation, to the County of Logan in the State of Illinois, of an easement of right-of-way for public highway purposes in a tract of land situated in said county, title to which is held by this public corporation, described as follows, viz:

A part of the South half of the Southwest quarter of the Southwest quarter of Section 22, Township 21 North, Range 3 West of the Third Principal Meridian, described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a stone marking the Southwest corner of said Section 22, running thence North along the West line of said Section 22 for a distance of 50.0 feet, thence East 31.6 feet to the East Right of Way line of an Orvil Road District Road, commonly known as the "Experiment Station Road," thence South 45° East 21.2 feet, thence East 1,283.3 feet, thence South 35.0 feet, thence West 1,329.9 feet along the South line of said Section 22 to the Point of Beginning. Excepting that portion already in use for highway purposes, said tract containing 0.19 acres, more or less.

The grant of an easement of right-of-way for public highway purposes in said tract of land hereby authorized shall provide that in the event said tract of land ceases to he used for public highway purposes the easement granted the County of Logan therein and thereby shall cease and determine and said tract or strip of land shall revert to this public corporation free and clear of said easement, and shall also be made upon, and contain, the following terms and conditions:

1. The County of Logan shall pay to this public corporation for said grant the sum of \$60.00 simultaneously with the delivery of said grant to said County.

2. The County of Logan shall, at its own sole expense, remove the presently existing fence marking the present boundary of the roadway now situated adverse to said strip of land which will be widered as a result of this grant and will replace and restore said fence at a new location heretofore agreed upon in as good condition as is said presently existing fence.

3. The entrance to property retained by this public corporation and situated adjacent to said hereinabove described tract shall be moved, by the County of Logan and at its expense, from its present location to a point about one hundred twenty-five feet east thereof and in line with the existing driveway which leads to the existing barn located on said retained property of this public corporation.

COMMUNICATION FROM MEMBERS OF THE FACULTY

(29) At its meeting on July 26, 1960, the Board took note of a communication, in the form of an open letter, dated July 15, 1960, to the Board of Trustees from a number of members of the University faculty concerning the University's action in the case of Dr. Leo F. Koch which was sent to members of the Board of Trustees and was released by some of its signers for publication on July 17. The Board referred this communication to the Committee on General Policy for study and report. Mr. Johnston, for the Committee on General Policy, submitted a report of his Committee on this matter and moved its adoption.

The report was adopted and filed with the Secretary for record.

Mr. Johnston also submitted the following summary of the report for inclusion in today's minutes and as the reply of the Board of Trustees to the open letter.

Summary of Report of General Policy Committee to Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois Concerning Open Letter to the Board from Certain Members of the University Faculty Pertaining to Action Taken in Leo F. Koch Matter

Prior to the July 26, 1960, meeting of the Board of Trustees, an open letter from certain members of the University's faculty to the Board was mailed to each Board member and President Henry, and was released to the press by some of its signers. Although those who did this failed to comply with the procedure established and prescribed by the University Statutes governing the transmission of communications from University staff members to the Board, the latter, at President Henry's request, decided to give due consideration to the letter and referred it to the General Policy Committee for its study, report, and recommendations.

Since then the Committee has carefully studied the letter and has reviewed the procedures followed, the report of the University Senate Committee on Academic Freedom, the resolution adopted on June 6 by the Urbana-Champaign University Senate, and the *Findings and Conclusions* reached by the Board at the conclusion of the hearing given Professor Leo F. Koch. The conclusions of the Committee, which it recommends be adopted by the Board, are fully set forth and documented in the Committee's report of which the following constitutes a brief summary:

1. In its deliberations and actions in the Koch case, as well as in all other matters, the Board of Trustees has been, and will continue to be guided by what, in its considered judgment, will promote the progress and welfare of the University in all its relationships and is in the best interests of its faculty, its students and the public which it serves.

2. In its Findings and Conclusions in the Koch case the Board repeatedly and clearly stated that its action in approving President Henry's recommendation that Professor Koch's contract with the University be terminated was based upon Professor Koch's breach of his academic and professional responsibility inherent in his University employment and recognized and declared in the University Statutes and in the Joint Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure adopted by the Association of American Colleges and the American Association of University Professors. The Board's unanimous finding that Professor Koch's actions constituted a breach of that responsibility was in accord with the unanimous finding of the Executive Committee of the faculty of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and that of the Committee on Academic Freedom of the Urbana-Champaign University Senate.

Professor Koch's actions constituted a breach of that responsibility was in accord with the unanimous finding of the Executive Committee of the faculty of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and that of the Committee on Academic Freedom of the Urbana-Champaign University Senate. 3. President Henry had no authority to and did not terminate Professor Koch's University contract. He suspended and preferred charges against Professor Koch and recommended the termination of the latter's contract to the Board as he is authorized and obligated by the provisions of the University Statutes to do when, in his judgment, such action is necessary and justified. His action was taken upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the faculty, including the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

faculty, including the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. 4. The public release, prior to the hearing before the Board, of the charges and President Henry's intention to recommend to the Board that Professor Koch's contract be terminated was proper in this instance because of the publicity which Professor Koch's letter to the Editor of *The Daily Illini* had received and the resulting advisability that the disapproval by the University administration of Professor Koch's actions be made known to the public. It did not operate to deprive Professor Koch of a fair hearing before and conscientious consideration of his case by the Board.

5. The members of the Board of Trustees were fully conscious of the vital

interest of the faculty of the University, as well as that of the University's students and the citizens of Illinois, in proper consideration being given and appropriate action being taken by the Board in the proceeding involving Professor Koch. The resolution adopted by the Urbana-Champaign University Senate and the report and recommendations of its Committee on Academic Freedom to the President were accorded careful consideration and due weight by the Board in reaching its decision. The members of the Board were under the duty and responsibility to all concerned to and did take the action which, in their own considered judgment, was proper and in the best interests of the University.

6. The procedures followed in the Koch case were substantially in accord with the provisions of the present University Statutes which were adopted by this Board in 1957 after they were drafted by a Committee composed largely of faculty members and had been approved by the University Senate. If these provisions are now not considered to be proper and adequate, the Board of Trustees is willing to consider suggested changes in them. The University Statutes specify the channels to be used and procedures to be followed in submitting suggested revisions to the Board for its consideration. 7. The members of the Board subscribe fully to the commonly accepted prin-

7. The members of the Board subscribe fully to the commonly accepted principles of academic freedom and desire and intend to maintain them unimpaired at the University. They recognize the right of *responsible* expression of their views by faculty members even though the views expressed are unpopular or even untenable. In determining whether a public expression of such views is a *responsible* one, they have been and will be guided by the criteria appearing in the University Statutes and the above mentioned 1940 Joint Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure. In the opinion of the Board, Professor Koch's expression of his views, judged by those criteria, was not a responsible one.

Koch's expression of his views, judged by those criteria, was not a responsible one. 8. The Board believes that the action taken in the Koch case was proper and in the best interests of the University and that the cause of academic freedom is strengthened by insisting upon exercise of the academic responsibility which necessarily accompanies it.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the foregoing summary of the Committee's report was also adopted; and the Secretary was instructed to send copies of this summary and of the full report to all the signers of the open letter, with an appropriate letter of transmittal informing them that these constitute the Board's reply to the open letter.

COURT DECISION ON GARFIELD PARK LAND ACQUISITION

(30) Mr. Johnston, for the Committee on General Policy, called attention to the recent decision in the Circuit Court of Cook County, in the case of The People of the State of Illinois, Plaintiff, vs. Chicago Park District, a body corporate and politic, and The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation, Defendants, No. 60C 5203, with respect to the acquisition by the University of land in Garfield Park for the Chicago Undergraduate Division. This decision holds that the Act of the General Assembly of Illinois approved July 22, 1959, authorizing the Chicago Park District to convey park lands to the University is unlawful, invalid, and unconstitutional.

The Committee on General Policy has considered this decision and recommends that it be appealed without prejudice to any alternate sites which may be proposed by the city of Chicago and its City Planning Department. A conference of the Board with Mayor Richard J. Daley on this matter is scheduled for September 27, 1960.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this recommendation was approved.

HEARING OF REPRESENTATIVES OF GARFIELD PARK COMMUNITY At this point, Mr. Edward Rosewell, President of the Garfield Park Improvement Association, Mr. Gordon L. Mattson, Chairman of United Property Group, and Mrs. Ruth Lesei, representing the Bradley-Honore Association, who had requested a hearing by the Board of Trustees, appeared before the Board. Mr. Mattson spoke for the group and the organizations they represent and also for a number of other

organizations, churches, private enterprises on the west side of Chicago, including the Garfield Park Chamber of Commerce, the East Garfield Park Improvement Association, and Home Owners Enterprises. He urged the Board to reaffirm its decision in the selection of Garfield Park as a site for the Chicago Undergraduate Division and offered the support of the organizations and individual citizens in the Garfield Park community. A copy of his presentation has been filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

At the conclusion of the hearing, Mr. Mattson and his associates presented petitions signed by approximately 18,000 citizens of Chicago in support of the selection of Garfield Park for the relocation of the Chicago Undergraduate Division, urging that the Board appeal the recent adverse court decision and offering their support should a referendum become necessary to make Garfield Park available to the University for educational purposes. These petitions were turned over to the Secretary of the Board and a copy has been filed by him as a part of the record of today's meeting.

MEMORIAL TO ARTHUR CUTTS WILLARD

Mr. Pogue offered the following:

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois records with deep sorrow the death on September 11, 1960, of Dr. Arthur Cutts Willard, Presidem

Emeritus of the University. Dr. Willard was born in Washington, D.C., on August 12, 1878, and received his undergraduate and professional education at the National College of Pharmacy and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. With the exception

Pharmacy and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. With the exception of a few years of teaching at the California School of Mechanical Arts in San Francisco and at George Washington University, and service as an engineer on the staff of the War Department just before coming to the University of Illinois, his life's work was at this University. He was married to Sarah Lamborn of Washington, D.C., November 26, 1907, who survives. Dr. Willard came to the University of Illinois as Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering in 1913, progressing rapidly to full professorial rank in 1917. He was Head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering from 1920 to 1934, and Acting Dean of the College of Engineering and Director of the Engineering Experiment Station from 1933 to 1934, when he became the Univer-sity's ninth President. He retired September 1, 1946, after thirty-three years of continuous service at the University of Illinois. He had otherwise served the University on numerous important faculty committees dealing with educational and administrative problems. So when he was elected President of the University of Illinois, the Board of Trustees could proudly announce that in the election of Professor Arthur Cutts Willard, the Board had chosen from the faculty a man who through twenty-one years of loyal

Board had chosen from the faculty a man who through twenty-one years of loyal and distinguished service to the University as a teacher, scientist, and admin-istrator had the respect of students, alumni, colleagues on the faculty and else-where in his profession, and of the industries of the State and the Nation.

Many Illini will remember him with gratitude as a great teacher and for his high professional standards which have influenced their careers. He also will he remembered by countless others for his contributions as a scientist to the endneering profession and for his services to industry and government. Outstanding among his achievements was the research he directed at the University of Illino¹⁵ which produced the basic data for engineering the ventilating system of the Holland Tunnel connecting New York and New Jersey, a system subsequently also used elsewhere in the United States and abroad.

He came into the Presidency of the University at one of the most difficult periods in its history when institutional financial resources were greatly reduced and the immediate task was one of rebuilding and restoring confidence in the future. He brought the University from those years of the economic depression through a period of increasing prosperity and growth, and through the trying years of World War II, into a new era. A complete listing of his achievements is unnecessary but significant examples should be noted. During his administration, the Chicago Professional Colleges were reorganized under the administration of an Executive Dean, now a Vice-President. The College of Veterinary Medicine, the Division of Special Services for War Veterans, the Small Homes Council, the Student Counseling Bureau, the Council on Teacher Education, and the Institute of Aviation were established. The University of Illinois Foundation was organized during his Presidency and he established the original Citizens Committee. The University's physical plant and campus development during his administration include such major projects as: the Illini Union Building, the first group of the Men's Residence Halls, Gregory Hall which replaced the old University Hall, the Abbott Power Plant without which expansion of the campus to its present state would have been impossible, additions to the Library, McKinley Hospital; and in Chicago the second unit of the Dentistry-Medicine-Pharmacy Building, the first of the University's buildings to be financed through a bond issue, and remodeling of the College of Pharmacy Building into the present Chicago Undergraduate Division was done during the last year of his administration as President. Dr. Willard gave the University distinguished leadership for twelve years, a

Dr. Willard gave the University distinguished leadership for twelve years, a leadership which had an impact on its growth and achievements following his retirement. The spirit of his administration was a reflection of his personal character: integrity, a fine sense of duty to students and staff, loyalty to the institution, industry, and courage. He was exemplary in his personal habits, modest, friendly, but withal had a wholesome dignity which inspired respect and affection.

friendly, but withal had a wholesome dignity which inspired respect and affection. With this tribute the Board also records its deep appreciation of Dr. Willard's life and of his many years of devoted service to the University of Illinois, and expresses its sympathy to the members of his family.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At this point, on motion of Mr. Pogue, an executive session was ordered for consideration of the following matters of business.

PURCHASE OF LAND

(1) The Director of the Physical Plant and Vice-President and Comptroller recommend the acquisition, through purchase by the University of Illinois Foundation, of the East Half of the Northeast Quarter of Section Thirty, Town-ship Nineteen, Champaign County, containing eighty acres, presently owned by Mrs. Ruth Newton, Urbana. Mrs. Newton proposes to exchange the land with Mr. Boyd Harper, Champaign, for other land which she desires to acquire, and Mr. Harper will cell the eighty acres to the University of Illinois Foundation Mr. Harper will sell the eighty-acre tract to the University of Illinois Foundation at a price of \$1,750 an acre, or \$140,000. This land is completely surrounded by University property, and the University

has been attempting to acquire it for a number of years for the College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The First National Bank of Chicago has agreed to loan the money to the Foundation for the acquisition of this property under the same conditions as other recent purchases.

I concur and recommend that the University of Illinois Foundation be requested to purchase this property and to lease it to the University at a rental of \$3,310 a year, subject to adjustment in accordance with any change in the interest rate charged by the Bank on the loan to the Foundation, until such time as funds become available for the purchase of the property by the University.
