MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

March 14, 1961



The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of illinois was held in the Illini Union Building, Urbana, Illinois, on Tuesday, March 14, 1961, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

The following members of the Board were present: Mr. Howard W. Clement, Mr. Irving Dilliard, Mr. Richard A. Harewood, Mr. Earl M. Hughes, Mr. Wayne A. Johnston, Mr. Harold Pogue, Mr. Timothy W. Swain, Mrs. Frances B. Watkins, Mr. Kenney E. Williamson. Governor Otto Kerner and Mr. George T. Wilkins were absent. Mr. Wirt Herrick, former Trustee, attended the meeting as a guest of the Board.

Also present were President David D. Henry, Professor Norman A. Parker, Vice-President for the Chicago Undergraduate Division, Dr. Joseph S. Begando, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Executive Dean C. C. Caveny of the Chicago Undergraduate Division, Director C. S. Havens of the Physical Plant, Mr. Ralph F. Lesemann, Legal Counsel, Mr. C. E. Flynn, Assistant to the President and Director of Public Information; and the officers of the Board, Mr. H. O. Farber, Comptroller, and Mr. A. J. Janata, Secretary.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Trustees on September 21 and October 19, 1960, press proof copies of which have previously been sent to the Board.

On motion of Mr. Swain, these minutes were approved as printed on pages 89 to 191, inclusive.

MR. IRVING DILLIARD

Mrs. Watkins, speaking on behalf of the other Trustees, welcomed Mr. Irving Dilliard as a new member of the Board.

ELECTION OF TEMPORARY CHAIRMAN

Mr. Johnston proposed the re-election of the present officers of the Board of Trustees, and nominated Mr. Timothy W. Swain as President, *Pro Tempore*, of the meeting. Mr. Swain was so elected by acclamation and took the chair.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Mr. Swain called for nominations for the offices of President, Secretary, and Comptroller of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Johnston nominated Mr. Kenney E. Williamson for the office of President of the Board.

Mr. Clement nominated Mr. A. J. Janata for the office of Secretary of the Board,

Mr. Harewood nominated Mr. H. O. Farber for the office of Comptroller of the Board.

There being no other nominations, on motion of Mr. Harewood the nominations were closed and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot for the election of the above named officers to serve until the next annual meeting in March, 1962, or until their respective successors shall have been duly elected and qualified. The ballot was so cast, and Mr. Kenney E. Williamson, Mr. A. J. Janata, and Mr. H. O. Farber were declared elected President, Secretary, and Comptroller of the Board, respectively.

Mr. Williamson took the chair and expressed his appreciation of the confidence of the Board in re-electing him as its President.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Mr. Pogue nominated Mrs. Frances B. Watkins and Mr. Wayne A. Johnston to serve as members of the Executive Committee, with the President of the Board as Chairman, for one year, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.

On motion of Mr. Harewood, the nominations were closed and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for the election of Mrs. Watkins and Mr. Johnston as members of the Executive Committee. The ballot was cast and they were declared elected.

TREASURER OF THE BOARD

Mr. Hughes nominated Mr. C. W. Weldon as Treasurer of the Board On motion of Mr. Johnston, the nominations were closed and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for the election of Mr. Weldon as Treasurer of the Board of Trustees to serve until the second Tuesday in March, 1963 (March 12, 1963), or until his successor shall have been elected and qualified, in accordance with the statutory provision of a biennial term for Treasurer.

On motion of Mr. Clement, the Board recorded its appreciation of the services of its officers during the past several years.

TREASURER'S BOND

 O_n motion of Mr. Swain, the amount of the Treasurer's bond was fixed at \$6,000.000.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the Finance Committee was instructed to see that the Treasurer presents a satisfactory bond in the amount specified, and to report the same to the Board for approval.

AUTHORITY TO RECEIVE MONEYS

Mr. Swain offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

CHAIRMANSHIP OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ARCHITECTURE

(2) Professor Alan K. Laing, who has been serving as Chairman of the Depart-ment of Architecture since 1954, has asked to be relieved of this administrative assignment at the end of the current academic year, so that he may devote full time to teaching and his own research, and I have approved his request. He will, of course, remain in the Department as Professor of Architecture on full time.

The Dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts recommends the appointment of Professor Granville S. Keith, a member of the Department, as Professor of Architecture on indefinite tenure and as Chairman of the Department for two years, beginning September 1, 1961, the salary of this position to be determined when the budget for 1961-62 is submitted to the Board for approval.

The nomination of Professor Keith has been made after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Department and of the College and has the endorsement of the Vice-President and Provost and of the Dean of the Graduate College.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this appointment was approved.

BUDGETS FOR 1961 SUMMER BESSIONS AND FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

(3) Submitted herewith are the budgets and appointments to the faculty for the 1961 summer sessions. This year there will be two summer sessions and two budgets. The Board of Trustees has authorized the offering of a twelve-week term, to assess the potential demands for extended summer programs, in addition to the traditional eight-week summer session.

The eight-week summer session at Urbana-Champaign will begin June 19 and end August 12; at the Chicago Undergraduate Division this session will begin June 23 and conclude August 18. The twelve-week summer term at Urbana-Champaign will extend from June 24 to September 9, and at the Chicago Undergraduate Division from June 23 to September 8. In the College of Pharmacy, there will be two six-week terms, June 19 to July 29, and July 31 to September 9.

The eight-week summer session budget totals \$858,776 plus a reserve of \$60,173 for Urbana-Champaign; \$11,357 for the Chicago Professional Colleges; and \$100,899 plus a reserve of \$14,101 for the Chicago Undergraduate Division. The twelve-week summer term budget totals \$112,222 plus a reserve of \$22,778 for the Urbana-Champaign campus; and \$40,711 plus a reserve of \$4,289 for the Chicago Undergraduate Division.

Salaries of members of the University faculty recommended for summer session appointments are computed on the basis of the standard formulae: twoninths of the salary of the academic year for eight weeks of service, and threeninths of the salary of the academic year for twelve weeks of service, with proportionate amounts for shorter periods or for part-time service. The appointments being recommended include a number of visiting lecturers from other colleges and universities at the salaries indicated.

I recommend that the appointments to the summer session staff be approved as submitted, and that the President of the University be authorized to accept resignations and make such changes and adjustments and additional appointments as are necessary in accordance with the needs of the University within the allocations of funds indicated.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, these appointments and the summer session budget were approved, and the President was given authority as recommended. This action was taken by the following vote: Aye. AMENDMENT OF UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS FOR ADMINISTRATION OF ACCOUNTANCY LAW

(6) Under the Illinois Accountancy Law regulating the practice of public accounting, the University has the responsibility of determining by examination and otherwise the qualifications of applicants for the certificate of Certified Public Accountant, and of issuing such certificates. The University is empowered to adopt regulations for the administration of the examinations, said regulations being subject to approval by the Board of Trustees.

regulations being subject to approval by the Board of Trustees. The Committee on Accountancy' recommends that the provision in Section 16 which relates to "The Study of Accounting and Related Subjects" and proof of preliminary education required for admission to the Illinois Certified Public Accountant examinations be amended to read:

Official credentials indicating the successful completion of the required number of semester hours of residence or correspondence study in the subjects specified in the Act in institutions acceptable to the University. Credentials for study in residence or correspondence schools which specialize in business training are acceptable up to thirty semester hours in the subjects of accounting, auditing, economics, business law, and finance, provided satisfactory proof is presented that at least 50 per cent of their courses in accounting are taught by certified public accountants. Credit for study in accounting, auditing, economics, business law, and finance in excess of thirty semester hours and credit for study in other or additional subjects will be allowed: (1) if such study has been completed at regularly accredited institutions of higher learning, or (2) if such study has been completed in residence or correspondence schools which specialize in business training provided satisfactory proof is presented that at least 50 per cent of their courses in accounting are taught by certified public accountants and, provided further, that the semester hours of study in these subjects is equivalent to comparable courses offered by accredited institutions of higher learning. Accredited institutions of higher learning are those approved by a recognized regional accrediting agency such as the North Central Association or by an accrediting agency affiliated with the National Commission on Accrediting.

(The present portion of Section 16 which is being amended reads:

("Official credentials indicating the successful completion of the required number of semester hours of residence or correspondence study in the specified subjects in institutions acceptable to the University. Credentials of schools which specialize in business training are acceptable provided

¹ The University's responsibilities, under the law, are administered by a Committee on Accountancy, appointed by the Board of Trustees on recommendation of the President of the University, and a Board of Examinators in Accountancy, three in number, which gives the examinations. satisfactory proof is presented that at least 50 per cent of their courses in accounting are taught by certified public accountants.")

CHANGE IN OFFICE OF LEGAL COUNSEL

(13) Mr. Ralph F. Lesemann, who has been Legal Counsel for the University of Illinois since July, 1951, has asked to be relieved of this administrative assignment because of his health. He is also Professor of Law on indefinite tenure be has no teaching assignments. He plans to leave the community to make his hore again in Belleville, Illinois, where he lived while practicing law in East St. Louis prior to joining the University staff. He is willing, however, to serve the University in a part-time capacity.

sity in a part-time capacity. The University administration must, of course, respect the decision of grounds of health. At the same time we should like to take advantage of Mr. Lesemann's willingness to continue his services to the University. Accordingly, I recommend a change in Mr. Lesemann's status from that of Legal Counsel on full time to Special Counsel on 45 per cent time for such assignments of legal work as can be carried on by him at his headquarters in Belleville. In general, these assignments will consist of continuation of his services as counsel in existing, unfinished litigation, additional legal services in future court proceedings upon assignment, and special research problems which will draw upon his background and experience. Under this arrangement, assignments of work to Mr. Lesemann will be made by his successor as head of the Legal Counsel's Office and will be subject to appraisal by the head of that office. I also recommend an allowance of \$1,800 for the year for part-time secretarial services. This arrangement is recommended for the year beginning September 1, 1961.

This arrangement is recommended for the year beginning September 1, 1901, and its continuation would be subject to mutual agreement and upon recommendation of the University Counsel.

EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL

(14) Suit has been filed in the Superior Court of Cook County by Leo F. Koch seeking judgment against the University in the sum of \$5,900, representing the salary which he would have received during the academic year 1960-61, plus interest and court costs, and also seeking a Writ of Certiorari and also asking the Court to set aside the action of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois in terminating his appointment at the University on August 31, 1960. It is recommended that the Board authorize the employment of Mr. Albert E. Jenner, Jr., as special counsel for the University to assist in the defense of this suit.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this recommendation was approved.

CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION SITE

(15) The action of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on February 16, 1961, accepting the offer of the Harrison-Halsted Streets site for the new Chicago Undergraduate Division campus authorized the President of the University to develop a memorandum of understanding between the University of Illinois, the eity of Chicago, and the Chicago Land Clearance Commission, such memorandum to be presented to the Board for approval at a subsequent meeting.

President Henry stated that since the last meeting of the Board of Trustees, discussions have been held with representatives of the city of Chicago and the Chicago Land Clearance Commission concerning various phases of planning such as the priority for the delivery of various land parcels within the site, traffic questions, and the procedures to be followed in developing a contract for acquisition of the land by the University.

Ultimately, a contract will be executed by the Board of Trustees, but such contract will not be ready for Board action for several months. However, this does not mean that planning by the University will stop in the interim. In fact, the continuation of the University's studies on site planning is essential in order that sufficient information may be available to provide a firm basis for the contract terms with the city of Chicago and the Chicago Land Clearance Commission.

PRELIMINARY STUDIES OF MEDICAL SCIENCES ADDITION

Director C. S. Havens and Mr. Ambrose Richardson, Consulting Architect, reported on preliminary studies of an addition to the Medical Sciences Building, illustrating their presentation with drawings and building models.

This was presented for the information of the Board, and no action was requested or taken.

STUDY OF STUDENT ECONOMICS

(16) During the second semester of 1959-60, a study of student economics was conducted under the direction of a committee appointed by the Vice-President and Provost. A sample of 933 undergraduate students out of the total enrollment participated. The sample included students in all four undergraduate classes, in the professional colleges, and in the Graduate College, with categories for each grouping for married men, single men, and single women. The purposes of the

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study were (a) to determine the cost to students of attendance at the University, including expenditures for all items; (b) to determine the income and sources of funds of such students, including the sources and value of the assets; and (c) to determine the debts of students, including the amounts and the purposes for which the debts were incurred.

The data compiled have provided the University with facts upon which to base policy decision regarding the effects of increases in tuition charges, the need for increased student financial aid, the need for part-time employment for students, and related measures.

Professor William A. Neiswanger of the Department of Economics, a member of the Committee, and Mr. Harl E. Ryder, Jr. and Mr. Jerry H. Currnutt, graduate students who worked with him on the project, were present at today's meeting and made a preliminary report of the study, the results of which will be published.

At the conclusion of this presentation, Professor Neiswanger answered questions.

On motion of Mr. Dilliard, the Board recorded its appreciation of the services of the members of the staff and students who participated in this study.

ILLINOIS BUDGETARY COMMISSION HEARINGS

(17) President Henry reported that the Illinois Budgetary Commission held hearings in Springfield, on Monday, March 13, 1961, on the University of Illinois operating budget for 1961-63, and also on the capital budgets and building programs of all six state universities.

The Commission endorsed a proposal for emergency legislation to allocate funds from the proceeds of the University's Bond Issue for construction at the state universities, with particular reference to providing funds for buildings and other capital improvements for which appropriations had been made for the biennium of 1959-61 but which have not been released.

This report was received for record.

CONFERENCE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Mrs. Watkins reported on the annual Conference on Higher Education sponsored by the National Education Association, held in Chicago last week, which she attended as one of the representatives of the University of Illinois.

LEO F. KOCH CASE

Mr. Dilliard informed the Board that he has received a number of letters from various parts of the country regarding the action of the University in terminating the appointment of former Assistant Professor Leo F. Koch. Mr. Dilliard stated that in replying to these letters he informed the writers he was not in the position to discuss the case because he was not a member of the Board of Trustees when the action was taken.

ASSIGNMENT OF FUNDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ENTOMOLOGY BUILDING

At its meeting on January 18, 1961, the Board authorized contracts for the construction of the Entomology Building. It was reported that negotiations were under way to secure an additional federal grant of

\$170,000 to match University funds of a like amount, which additional funds are necessary to underwrite the contracts for the construction of the building.

The recommendation to the Board did not state the specific source of University funds for the matching grant, and the Secretary requests authority to amend the minutes of the January 18 meeting to show that this assignment will be made from indirect costs available and accumulated from government research contracts.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this amendment was authorized.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Board reconvened in executive session at 2:15 p.m. The same members of the Board, officers of the Board, and officers of the University were present as recorded at the beginning of these minutes.

The Board resumed consideration of reports and recommendations from the President of the University.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE UNIVERSITY PATENT COMMITTEE

(1) The University Patent Committee submits, with the concurrence of the Chairman of the University Research Board and the President of the University, a recommendation relating to an invention described as: polymers with fused ring recurring units—Carl S. Marvel, Research Professor of Organic Chemistry, and Robert Z. Greenley, Research Assistant in Chemistry, inventors. It has been discovered that cyclic dienes may be polymerized by a reaction involving transannular polymerization to yield polymers which contain fused ring recurring units.

This is a new kind of high molecular weight material which has never been polymerized before and has applicability for use in development of plastics, rubber, and synthetic fibers.

The Committee recommends that the invention be released to the University of Illinois Foundation for development with the stipulation that the rights of the United States Air Force, sponsoring agency of the research which led to this invention, be recognized.

On motion of Mr. Clement, this recommendation was approved.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING OR INTENT CONCERNING A SITE FOR THE CHICAGO BRANCH OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

(2) At the request of President David D. Henry, Director C. S. Havens reponder on the present status of negotiations with the city of Chicago and the Chicago Land Clearance Commission for the acquisition of the Harrison-Halsted Strees area for the Chicago Undergraduate Division. He presented preliminary drafts of a proposed letter to the Executive Director of the Chicago Land Clearance Commission, and Memorandum of Understanding or Intent Concerning a Site for the Chicago Branch of the University of Illinois which is being developed as an interim document preliminary to the drafting of a contract. He stated that it is necessary to advise the city of Chicago of the University's (i.e., the Board of Trustecs of the University of Illinois) views on the terms under negotiation so that the city on its part may proceed with certain necessary steps including the passage of an ordinance which is scheduled for consideration by the City Counci on March 22, 1961.

Legal Counsel Lesemann supplemented the report by Mr. Havens by discusing the legal aspects of the interim document and the contract to be developed in the light of continuing negotiations.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the Board approved the preliminary drafts of the documents as presented, and authorized the appropriate University officials to prepare final drafts and to submit them to the Mayor of Chicago and to the Chicago Land Clearance Commission.

TEMPORARY FOOD SERVICE FACILITIES FOR ORCHARD DOWNS HOUSING

A meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds had been scheduled for today for consultation on temporary food service facilties for the Orchard Downs housing. Since time did not permit a Committee meeting, the President requested the Board to receive a report on this matter from Mr. Vernon L. Kretschmer, Director et Auxiliary Services.

Mr. Kretschmer presented a proposal for the construction of a temporary food service facility in the area of the Orchard Downs Apartments to provide food service for unmarried students who will be housed in these apartments until additional residence halls can be constructed to accommodate them. Funds will be advanced from Housing Division surplus and reserve accounts to finance this facility and will be repaid from the net revenue of food service operations.

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When the food service building is no longer needed for this purpose, it can be converted into a Housing Division maintenance shop and equipment warehouse. A written report of Mr. Kretschmer's presen-tation was filed with the Secretary of the Board for record. On motion of Mr. Swain, the Housing Division was authorized to

proceed with the development of plans as outlined.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the Board adjourned.
