## MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

December 19, 1961



The December meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Executive Offices of the First National Bank of Chicago, 38 South Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois, on Tuesday, December 19, 1961, beginning at 10:30 a.m.

## AWARD OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT CERTIFICATES

On motion of Mr. Swain, these appointments were confirmed.

#### TUITION WAIVERS

(3) The Executive Vice-President and Provost recommends the authorization of up to thirty-five tuition waivers each semester to be assigned to new or continuing undergraduate students who satisfy the Dean of Admissions and Records that they are now qualified, and will, at the end of the current semester or current school year, be candidates for regular scholarships or grants-in-aid. The waivers are to be awarded by the Dean of Admissions and Records to avoid injustice or inequity, or in hardship situations, to students who might be forced to remain out of the University if this assistance should not be provided. Such waivers would be for one semester or one year and no student would be eligible for more than two semesters waiver of tuition.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, this recommendation was approved.

## STUDENT LOAN FUNDS

(4) For a number of years applications for student loans at both the Urbana campus and the Chicago campuses of the University have exceeded funds available for this purpose, and it has been necessary to reduce most applications and in some cases to fail to make the loan because of insufficient funds. This is in spite of \$250,000 which has been received each year from the federal government under the National Defense Education Act. Attempts have been made to find

new sources of funds to be used for this purpose.

At the Urbana and Chicago campuses, student organization funds are combined into single accounts for proper administration. The Code on Undergraduate Student Affairs and Regulations Governing the Chicago Organizations Fund allow the Executive Boards of these funds to invest cash balances of the funds over and above the working balances required. At the present time \$105,000 is so invested in Urbana and \$68,000 in Chicago. It has been found that a substantial portion of these investments are semipermanent in character since student organization funds balances remain large at all times,

The Dean of Students at the Urbana campus and the Business Manager at the Chicago Professional Colleges have suggested that a portion of the funds thus invested be made available for loans to students. In order to accomplish this, the Code on Student Affairs at the Urbana campus has been revised to permit the investment of such unused balances in student loans. This change has been approved in meetings of the individual organizations participating in the funds and by the Executive Board of the fund. It has also been approved by the Committee on Student Affairs. Meetings soon will be held at the Chicago campus for the purpose of obtaining approval of a change in the Regulations identical to the change in the Code on Student Affairs permitting investment in student loans.

Under the proposal approved balances available would be transferred to the University, which would act as the agent of the Student Organizations Fund and the Chicago Organizations Fund and loaned to students under the same policies as our other loan funds of the University. Interest received on such loans would be turned back to the Student Organizations Fund and the Chicago Organizations Fund, and, if at any time the Executive Board of either body requests that the principal amounts be returned, this would be done as notes are liquidated or other-

wise converted into cash by the University.

Inasmuch as such an arrangement would result in some loss of income to the Student Organizations Fund and the Chicago Organizations Fund because interest does not commence to accrue on loans until after the student leaves school, it is being recommended that the charge ordinarily made by the University against the funds for bookkeeping services be discontinued with the result that the Organizations Funds should suffer little or no loss on account of this change. If there are losses by failure to collect loans thus made, the Organizations Funds will accept them, since the University is acting only as the agent of the funds in making these loans. It should be pointed out that under the General Rules Concerning University Organization and Procedure, Section 11(i), student organizations funds must be kept apart from University funds, and no liability may be created on the part of the Board of Trustees.

Approval of the acceptance and administration of these funds for loan purposes to be administered in accordance with the established policies of the University and discontinuance of the charge for bookkeeping services heretofore assessed against the Student Organizations Fund at the Urbana campus is recommended by the Vice-President and Comptroller and by the Dean of Students. Appropriate documents setting forth the arrangements between the Student Organizations Fund and the University will be prepared and executed. These arrangements have been approved by the Legal Counsel.

Inasmuch as meetings on the Chicago campus have not as yet been held, approval in principle is also requested for identical arrangements between the

Chicago Organizations Fund and the University.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was approved, and authority was given as requested.

#### USE OF UNIVERSITY FACILITIES BY CANDIDATES FOR PUBLIC OFFICE

(5) Two years ago the Board of Trustees approved the following resolution which had been passed by the Urbana-Champaign Senate and recommended by the President of the University:

That the Urbana-Champaign Senate of the University of Illinois favors the use, on a trial basis, of University buildings, grounds, and facilities by candidates for nomination or election to statewide or national offices for the academic years 1959-60 and 1960-61 subject, at the end of this period, to review, revision, or repeal by the Board of Trustees.

This authorization is applicable to another campus of the University only with the concurrence of its Senate.

The Board of Trustees also authorized the President to promulgate appropriate rules and regulations consistent with those governing the appearance of other speakers on the campus and consistent with the educational objectives of the University.

This practice has worked out satisfactorily and I recommend that it be

continued.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, this recommendation was approved, but by a divided vote, a show of hands indicating a vote of seven for and two opposed.

## EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS

(6) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of contracts for outside architectural services for the following assignments and on the terms indicated:

Addition to the Administration Building - John Sweetnam, associated with the firm of Spangler, Beall, Salogga, and Bradley, Decatur, on the basis of a fee of 51/4 per cent of construction contracts, less an allowance of \$1,000 for previously completed studies.

Addition to University Press Building — Simon and Rettberg, Champaign, on the basis of the standard fee of 6 per cent of the construction costs.

Remodeling in Armory - Clark, Daily, and Dietz, Urbana, at a fee of 6 per cent

of construction costs.

Addition to Digital Computer Laboratory — A. Epstein and Sons, Inc., Chicago, on the basis of a fee of 51/4 per cent of total construction contracts, the firm's supervisory services to be limited to office supervision, checking of drawings, approval of materials, and periodic visits to the project.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations from the Universities Building Fund for the first three projects and in an assignment from Indirect Costs for the Digital Computer Laboratory Addition.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds has previously considered these

recommendations and supports them.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, these recommendations were approved, and authority was given to execute the contracts on the terms indicated.

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT ON SELECTED TOPICS OF CURRENT INTEREST

(18) President Henry presented a report on a number of subjects of significant current events and items of interest. Copies of the complete report were distributed at the meeting, and a copy was filed with the Secretary for record.

At this point, Mr. Harewood joined the meeting.

## RECENT ENROLLMENT TRENDS AND REVISED PROJECTIONS

(19) Executive Vice-President and Provost Lanier presented a report on recent enrollment trends and revised projections, covering the period from the first semester of 1959-60 through the first semester of 1965-66. An outline of his presentation was distributed at the meeting, and a copy has been filed with the Secretary for record.

# FACULTY CONFERENCE ON THE ROLE OF THE UNIVERSITY IN INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

(20) On December 2, 1961, the President of the University convened a special faculty conference in which one hundred members of the faculty representing all three campuses of the University participated in an all day and evening discussion of the role of the University in international affairs to assess the University's present activities in this area, and to consider means of meeting its future responsibilities.

The conference was planned and organized by a Steering Committee: Richard Butwell, Associate Professor of Political Science, Chairman; J. B. Casagrande, Professor and Head of the Department of Anthropology; H. G. Halcrow, Professor and Head of the Department of Agricultural Economics; P. P. Klassen, Professor of Sociology, Chicago Undergraduate Division; J. W. Peltason, Professor of Political Science and Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences; and Jack Stillinger, Associate Professor of English. The following topics were discussed: (1) Area Study Programs; (2) Non-Western Courses in the Undergraduate Curriculum; (3) Overseas Programs; (4) Training for Overseas Service.

Study materials were supplied to all of the participants in advance. In the evening, the conference was addressed by Professor George E. Taylor, Director of the Russian and Far Eastern Institute, University of Washington (Seattle). At the conclusion of the conference, the following report and recommendations were adopted:

## Report of President's Special Faculty Conference. December 2. 1961

The President's Special Faculty Conference on International Affairs examined a wide range of institutional and individual responsibilities inherent in the role of a great university in the second half of the twentieth century. A major assumption underlying much of the discussion was the belief that consideration and appropriate use of a comparative cross-cultural approach is essential to professional competence in most areas of teaching, research, and service.

The Conference participants adopted recommendations dealing with some ways of implementing the University's responsibilities in the light of the basic assumption noted above. These recommendations can convey neither the feeling of need and urgency nor the sense of opportunity and challenge revealed in the discussion. A persistent undercurrent of feeling voiced at the Conference was that such recommendations are not peripheral to the life of the University, but rather represent a shift in the center of gravity of the total intellectual perspective.

The recommendations should be interpreted in the context of the basic assump-

tion, and in the light of the following needs and expectations:

(a) The need to find efficient and economic ways of closing gaps which still exist in the University's programs and activities relevant to major world areas and problems.

(b) The necessity of strengthening programs and practices basic to cross-

cultural orientation, teaching, and research in all disciplines.

(c) The expectation that increasing confrontation with other major cultures will lead to improved understanding of Western culture and provide opportunities to re-examine traditional concepts.

## Recommendations

1. Current University activities in international affairs should be greatly expanded.

2. The University should introduce instruction in non-Western languages.
3. The Conference notes with approval the development of the Center for Russian Language and Area Studies and the Center for Latin American Studies and recommends further strengthening of their programs of teaching and research.

4. The development of both area studies and international studies concerned with problems of global significance should be encouraged. In both cases the

approach should be comparative and interdisciplinary.

5. The President is urged to clarify administrative responsibility for the development and coordination of additional area study programs, including both teaching

- and research, and for the recommendation of priorities.

  6. The University of Illinois should develop minimal programs for important areas but should not attempt to develop programs in depth for all areas. Consideration should be given to the possibility of the Committee on Institutional Cooperation's recommending that particular universities assume responsibility for different
- 7. Deans and executive officers of departments are urged to initiate review of the interests and requirements of their disciplines for courses with an international or foreign area emphasis, to assess faculty resources and needs, and to initiate action through normal channels to meet recognized needs.

8. It is highly desirable to introduce more non-Western subject matter whether by revision of current courses or by the addition of new courses. Additional

faculty may be required for the latter.

9. The University should consider methods of improving staff competence in the international aspects of the various disciplines, including leaves with pay.

10. The University should encourage and seek financial support for a program of international faculty and student exchange.

[While the above report was approved by the participants at the President's Special Faculty Conference on International Affairs, it should not be assumed that any particular recommendation was approved by all participants.]

### BEQUEST OF ELLA GRACE BROWN BURDICK

(21) The will of Ella Grace Brown Burdick, a resident of Highland Park, Illinois, who died on November 17, 1960, includes a bequest:

"To University of Illinois, an Illinois corporation, the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00), to be invested and the income therefrom to be used for the support, maintenance, and upkeep of the Dr. Alfred S. Burdick Memorial Room in the Y.M.C.A. Building and for Y.M.C.A. activities in said building."

The University Y.M.C.A. Building in Champaign has a room so designated, but is owned and operated by the Young Men's Christian Association of the University of Illinois, a corporation separate from the University. It appears that the intention of the Testatrix can best be carried out by the University renouncing this bequest and permitting its distribution to the Board of Trustees of the Young Men's Christian Association of the University of Illinois. A petition for approval of such distribution has been filed by the Northern Trust Company and Theodore Sheldon, Executors of the estate of Ella Grace Brown Burdick, deceased, in the Probate Court of Lake County.

The Vice-President and Comptroller and the Legal Counsel recommend that the Board of Trustees renounce this bequest to the University of Illinois, and authorize the Legal Counsel to execute on its behalf such papers, documents, and pleadings as may be necessary to accomplish this purpose and to permit this bequest to be distributed to the Board of Trustees of the Young Men's Christian Association of the University of Illinois, or to such other person or corporation as the

Court may designate.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this recommendation was approved.

### SETTLEMENT WITH CONTINENTAL BUILDERS, INC.

(22) In March, 1949, Continental Builders, Inc., an Illinois corporation, having submitted the lowest bid for the general work in connection with the construction of the Florida Avenue-Race Street Faculty Housing Project, was awarded the contract for that work.

Under the provisions of that contract, Continental Builders, Inc. was required to furnish a performance bond, in an amount and with suretics satisfactory to the University, within thirty days after the opening of the sealed bids. When that bond was not promptly furnished and it became evident that Continental Builders, Inc. was experiencing difficulty in securing and furnishing it, the Board of Trustees, at its April, 1949, meeting, took action directing that, if the bond would not be furnished before the expiration of the thirty-day period, the award of the contract to Continental Builders, Inc. would be set aside and new bids would be taken for the contract for the general work upon the project.

On the last day for furnishing the bond, the University was notified that

On the last day for turnishing the bond, the University was notified that United Pacific Insurance Company had agreed to execute it as surety. However, that company did not then have the rating required by the University in the last publication of Bests Guide. For this reason, the University notified Continental Builders that it would not accept a bond executed by that surety company as surety and, when no other performance bond was tendered the following day, the award of the contract to Continental Builders, Inc. was set aside and its bid deposit

in the sum of \$10,792.95 was forfeited and retained by the University.

Claiming that the University's above mentioned actions were unreasonable, wrongful, and unlawful, and that it is entitled to a refund of its bid deposit plus interest thereon and to recover from the University other damages it alleges it sustained by reason of the foregoing, Continental Builders, Inc. instituted suit against the University in the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, in April, 1954. In that suit, it prays judgment against the University in the sum of \$70,000 and the costs of suit.

Since the suit was instituted it has developed that, although United Pacific Insurance Company did not have in the 1948 issue of Bests Guide, which was the last published issue of that publication in April, 1949, the policyholders and financial ratings required by University regulations with respect to surety companies executing bonds running to the University, it actually had the required ratings with Bests at the time it offered to execute Continental Builders, Inc.'s performance bond and those ratings for it were shown in the 1949 issue of the Guide which was issued about two months later. Had University officials known this at the time the bond was tendered, it would have been accepted, and Con-

tinental Builders, Inc. would have been permitted to proceed with the performance of the contract.

The suit, unless settled, will be placed on the trial calendar, and will have to be tried in January. As a result of negotiations which have been conducted, and pre-trial hearings which have been held, during the past three weeks, the University has received an offer from Continental Builders, Inc. to accept \$6,500 in full settlement and satisfaction of all of the claims sued upon in the suit and

asserted by it against the University.

In view of the moral obligation arising out of the fact that, unknown to the University, the surety on the last performance bond tendered by Continental Builders, Inc. possessed the required ratings at that time, and the expense and builders, Inc. possessed the required ratings at that time, and the expense and inconvenience of trying the suit, special counsel for the University (Mr. George Jirgal of Chapman and Cutler and Ralph F. Lesemann), the Legal Counsel, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that this offer of settlement be accepted, and that said sum be paid Continental Builders, Inc. in return for a full and complete release against the University, approved by special counsel handling this matter for the University, and the dismissal, with prejudice to Continental Builders, Inc. and at the latter's costs of the pending suit costs, of the pending suit.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, this settlement was authorized, recommended.

## PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 1001 WEST GREEN STREET, URBANA

(1) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend purchase of the property at 1001 West Green Street, Urbana, at a price of \$42,000. This property is a lot 63.6 feet frontage by 220.56 feet deep with a two-story and basement frame residence presently used as a two-apartment house.

The property is in the area approved as the site for the Illinois Street Residence Halls and will be required prior to July, 1962. It is now on the market and should be acquired promptly rather than risk its possible acquisition by others for apartment development with the consequent delays as well as an increase in price which may be encountered if the purchase is deferred.

The asking price of \$42,000 is within the range of appraisals approved by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds. If purchase is authorized now, possession will be delivered not later than February 28, 1962, and taxes will be prorated. Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University for

1961-63 for land acquisition from the Universities Building Fund and have been released.
