# MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

January 11, 1962



The January meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Union, Urbana, Illinois, on Thursday, January 11, 1962, beginning at 9:30 a.m.

BUSINESS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY The Board took up consideration of the following reports and recommendations from the President of the University.

#### APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY

- (1) The following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above, and involving tenure, have been approved since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees.
- 1. Mary Adams, Assistant Professor of Nursing, beginning December 11, 1961, at an annual salary of \$9,000 (DY).

2. HUZIHIRO ARAKI, Research Assistant Professor of Physics, beginning September 1, 1962, at an annual salary of \$8,100 (D).

3. Helen B. Carlson, Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry, beginning

November 1, 1961, without salary (DY).

- 4. CHESTER J. CAVALLITO, Lecturer with rank of Professor, Department of Pharmacology, College of Medicine, beginning December 1, 1961, without salary (DY).
- 5. RICHARD N. FENZL, Assistant Professor of Agricultural Engineering, beginning

April 1, 1962, at an annual salary of \$8,500 (BY).

6. Hugh S. Johnson, Assistant Professor of Animal Science, beginning December 11, 1961, at an annual salary of \$8,500 (BY).

7. Bud J. Meador, Assistant Director of the Statistical Service Unit, Provost's Office, beginning September 1, 1961, at an annual salary of \$9,000 (DY).

8. ARTHUR L. RUOFF, Visiting Associate Professor of Metallurgical Engineering, for one year from September 1, 1961, without salary (D).

### REVISIONS IN THE GENERAL CURRICULUM IN AGRICULTURE WITH MAJOR FOR TEACHERS OF VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

(2) The Urbana-Champaign Senate recommends the following revisions in the curriculum in general agriculture for students majoring in vocational agriculture: First Year

Students who pass the mathematics or algebra placement test will not be required to take a mathematics course; all others must take either Mathematics 111, 112, or 104. Only one semester of mathematics is required.

Second Year, second semester

Add Agronomy 101, Soils, four semester hours.

Three semester hours of agriculture courses from Group I required, in place of six semester hours formerly required.

Third Year, first semester

Delete Agronomy 201, Soils, five semester hours.

Increase in requirements from agriculture courses from Group I from three to six semester hours.

Three hours of agriculture electives required.

Fourth Year, second semester

Add Agricultural Economics 230, Marketing of Agriculture Products, or a 300level course in agricultural economics, three semester hours.

Decrease in agricultural electives required from six semester hours to three semester hours.

Change in electives required from six-twelve semester hours to nine semester hours. Group I. Courses in agriculture required of all students in this curriculum. Additions are in italics and deletions are in parentheses.

If Agricultural Economics 230 is substituted for Agricultural Economics 100, students must also complete a three-hour elective in agricultural economics at the 300 level.

These revisions are made to meet a change in the Illinois State Board of Vocational Education requirements.  The Senate Coordinating Council indicates that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

# REQUIREMENTS FOR DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN PHYSICS

(3) The Urbana-Champaign Senate recommends that the requirements for graduation in the curriculum in physics be increased from 124 to 126 hours, plus required military science and physical education.

# REVISION IN REQUIREMENTS FOR DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN DENTISTRY

(4) The Senate of the University of Illinois at the Medical Center recommends that Russian be added to the languages acceptable toward the degree of Bachelor of Science in Dentistry.

The Senate Coordinating Council indicates that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

# CONTRACTS FOR REMODELING ENGINEERING RESEARCH LABORATORY

(7) Space in the basement of the Engineering Research Laboratory has been assigned to the Coordinated Science Laboratory for studies involving low-temperature superconductivity. To convert this space into a useable research laboratory will cost an estimated \$39,300 for remodeling and \$7,700 for laboratory equipment.

# ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE RESIDENCE HALL

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$53,830 in the contract with Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc. for construction of the Pennsylvania Avenue Residence Hall to provide for the realignment and paving of the courtyard, including street lighting and some paving on Pennsylvania Avenue, and for removal of temporary buildings in Illini Village. These improvements were included as alternates in the original bids taken but were not accepted when the contract was awarded because it was not certain that funds would be available. The project is now approximately half completed and very few contract additions have been necessary, so that adequate funds are available.

# GIFT OF AIRPLANE

(11) The General Motors Corporation has given the University of Illinois an eight-passenger Lockheed Lodestar executive-equipped airplane for the Institute of Aviation. The gift is without restrictions. I have accepted it and report this action for record.

The Lodestar has a cruising speed of 220 miles an hour, is fully equipped for instrument flying, and will be used for instruction and for demonstrations in aerodynamics, heavy aircraft hydraulics, electronics, and navigation equipment. It will be added to the University's planes available for use in the transportation of teachers to extension courses throughout Illinois and for other personnel in flights on University business. The base of operations will be the University of Illinois Willard Airport.

# FEDERAL GRANT FOR MEDICAL SCIENCES ADDITION BUILDING

(15) The Division of Research Grants of the National Institutes of Health has informed the University that upon recommendation of the National Advisory Council on Health Research Facilities, the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service has approved an application from the University of Illinois for a Public Health Service grant not to exceed \$1,346,115 for a Medical Sciences Addition Building. The application for this grant was previously authorized by the Board of Trustees.

The grant will enable the University to proceed with plans for the construction of a Medical Sciences Addition Building, estimated to cost in excess of \$5,000,000, the balance to come from state funds.

# REQUEST OF BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE URBANA COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

(16) The President of the Board of Trustees has received the following communication from the President of the Board of Education of the Urbana Community Schools:

DEAR MR. WILLIAMSON:

At its meeting on December 18, 1961, the Board of Education of the Urbana Community Schools discussed payments made in lieu of taxes by the University of Illinois. Members of the Board expressed appreciation for the fact that the University of Illinois Board of Trustees did adopt several years ago the policy of making payments in lieu of taxes for certain properties not on the local property tax rolls. Local governmental capability to serve our increasing population is improved by such payments.

Our impression is that the rate of payment made in lieu of taxes has not been revised recently to reflect any increase that may have been experienced in property

values generally.

I have been instructed by a resolution of the Board of Education of the Urbana Community Schools made on December 18, 1961, to ask you to bring the question of the possibility of increasing the rate of payment to the attention of the University of Illinois Board of Trustees for consideration.

Please be sure that any consideration given to the subject will be very much appreciated.

#### TREE-PLANTING PROGRAM

(17) At the request of President Henry, Director C. S. Havens of the Physical Plant Department and Mr. Robert S. Chamberlin, Director of the Division of Campus Development in the Physical Plant Department, presented a report, illustrated with maps, pictures, and slides, of a landscape redevelopment plan for the Urbana-Champaign campus to replace the trees lost due to diseases during the past ten years. To activate this program, they proposed a long-range master plan for tree planting, including recommendations on selections of species. The total cost of executing the master plan, excluding landscape work in the immediate area of, and related to, new buildings is estimated at approximately \$400,000. The program proposed for the biennium of 1961-63 is estimated to cost approximately \$80,000 and the funds for this are available in current state capital appropriations. This

is the rate of expenditure estimated to complete the program in the ten-year period. Following the presentation, it was recommended that (1) the master plan for tree planting and the proposed selection and distribution of species as presented be approved, subject to change or approval by the President of the University; and (2) that the tree-planting program proposed for 1961-63 be authorized, subject to the approval of contracts by the Board of Trustees.

President Henry stated that he concurs in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, these recommendations were approved.

### EXECUTIVE SESSION

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the executive session was ordered for consideration of the following item of business.

#### INSTITUTE FOR DEFENSE ANALYSES

(1) The University of Illinois has been advised informally that it will be considered for membership in the Institute for Defense Analyses, a nonprofit Delaware corporation created in 1956 for the purpose of promoting the public welfare and the advancement of scientific learning by making analyses, evaluations, and reports regarding matters of national security for the United States of America. Through its membership of educational institutions, the Institute represents a reservoir of technological talent in the nation's scientific community available to assist the federal government in its application of the scientific method to the solution of broad problems of military policy and strategy. The Institute operates principally under government contracts, but a few research projects are carried on which originate internally. Membership does not entail any financial contribution, although educational institutions who are members are expected to make personnel available from time to time for work on specific projects.

The founding members of the Institute for Defense Analyses were the California Institute of Technology, Case Institute of Technology, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Stanford University, and Tulane University. These have since been joined by the University of Chicago, Columbia University, University of Michigan, and Pennsylvania State University. Membership in the Institute for

Defense Analyses would permit the University of Illinois to assume a more important role in connection with national security. In addition, the University would benefit through the mutual interchange of ideas and by improvement of communications and relationships with the federal government.

I recommend that the University make application for membership in the Institute of Defense Analyses and that the following resolution be adopted (it being suggested that public announcement be withheld until the Institute acts

favorably on any such application):

### Resolution

Be It Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the President of the University be, and he hereby is, authorized on behalf of the University:

(1) To accept membership in the Institute for Defense Analyses, a nonprofit

organization created under the laws of Delaware;

(2) To serve, or to appoint others to serve from time to time, as a representative of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois at all meetings of members of said Institute for Defense Analyses; and

(3) To take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate in connection with or incidental to membership in said Institute for Defense

Analyses.

Dean Frederick T. Wall of the Graduate College was at the meeting for the presentation of this recommendation and made a supplementary supporting statement. At the conclusion of the presentation, and following discussion of the proposal, on motion of Mr. Swain, the foregoing resolution was adopted without a dissenting vote.

# ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD

The President of the Board reported that due to calendar conflicts some of the Trustees would be unable to attend the annual meeting on March 13, 1962, the date set according to the By-Laws, or March 15, the date to which the annual meeting had been changed by vote of the Board.

After discussion of possible alternate dates, on motion of Mr. Swain, the Board voted to hold its 1962 annual meeting in Urbana, on Saturday, March 17, the hour and place to be determined by the President and the Secretary of the Board.
