REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee submitted the following report of its actions at a duly called meeting held on August 13, 1964.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

On call of the Chairman, a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Center, LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on Thursday, August 13, 1964, beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The Committee considered the following reports and recommendations submitted by the Executive Vice-President and Provost of the University on behalf of the President, and took the actions indicated.

ASSOCIATE DEAN OF ADMINISTRATION OF COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

(1) On recommendation of the Dean of the College of Education, and with the concurrence of the Acting Dean of the Graduate College and the Executive Vice-President and Provost, I have approved the appointment of Dr. David M. Jackson, presently Principal of University High School, as Associate Dean of the College of Education for one year from September 1, 1964, and Professor of Educational Administration and Supervision on indefinite tenure, at a salary of \$17,000 on a twelve-month service basis.

As Associate Dean, Professor Jackson will succeed to the position now held by Professor Rupert N. Evans who has been appointed Dean of the College of Education effective September 1, 1964.

Confirmation of this action is requested.

HEADSHIP OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MARKETING

(2) The Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration recommends the appointment of Dr. Daniel M. Slate, presently Associate Professor in the Bureau of Economic and Business Research and in the Graduate School of Business Administration, as Associate Professor of Marketing and of Business Administration on indefinite tenure and Head of the Department of Marketing for two years beginning September 1, 1964, at an annual salary of \$13,000 on an academic year service basis.

This appointment is recommended after consultation with all members of the Department of professorial rank. The Acting Dean of the Graduate College and the Executive Vice-President and Provost concur.

The appointment is to fill a vacancy in the headship of the Department. In 1963, Professor H. M. Huegy, who served as Head of the Department for several years, asked to be relieved of his administrative duties so that he could devote full time to teaching and research. Professor Frank H. Beach has served as Acting Head of the Department during the academic year 1963-64.

AGREEMENT WITH NORTHERN ILLINOIS WATER CORPORATION FOR EXTENSION OF WATER SERVICE ON SOUTH FARMS

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of an agreement with the Northern Illinois Water Corporation for extension of water service from its eight-inch main on the east side of First Street and the "A.T.&T." Road, east a distance of approximately 2,620 feet, on a cost basis but not to exceed \$8,679.00, to the Dynamics Testing Laboratory site.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University from the Universities Building Fund.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF VETERINARY MEDICINE RESEARCH ANNEX ADDITION

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$3,472.18 in the contract with Pathman Construction Company, Chicago, for construction of the Veterinary Medicine Research Annex Addition to provide for revisions in the monorail hoisting system in the autopsy room.

CONTRACT FOR INTERIOR DECORATING SERVICES

(11) The University has a contract, authorized by the Board of Trustees, with Mrs. Florence K. Korff for professional interior decorating services, which expired August 12, 1964.

The Director of Auxiliary Services, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend renewal of the contract until June 30, 1965, at the same annual rate and under the same conditions.

PURCHASES

(12) The Executive Vice-President and Provost submitted a report of purchases recommended by the President, with the concurrence of the Director of Purchases and the Vice-President and Comptroller.

The latter term designates funds received by the University under contracts with the United States government, contracts with private corporations and other organizations, funds from foundation grants and grants from corporations and other donors, and University revolving funds authorized by law.

ANTITRUST LITIGATION

(14) The University has purchased substantial amounts of metal library shelving manufactured or distributed by firms convicted in antitrust proceedings instituted by the United States government. Under the applicable antitrust laws, the University may be entitled to recover damages on account of such purchases. The Vice-President and Comptroller and the Legal Counsel recommend that they be authorized to take necessary and appropriate action on behalf of the University to preserve and enforce any rights of the University which may have arisen from violations of federal antitrust laws by certain library shelving manufacturers or distributors, including authority to institute and prosecute, in the name and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, such proceedings in a court of competent jurisdiction, and to employ such special legal counsel and others, as may be deemed necessary or desirable.

I concur.

COMPENSATION OF BOARD OF EXAMINERS IN ACCOUNTANCY

(2) The University Committee on Accountancy recommends that the following Regulation 5 of the University regulations for the administration of the Illinois Accountancy Law, relating to compensation, be rescinded:

"Each member of the Board of Examiners appointed under Section 2 of the Act, who conducts examinations, shall send to the University Committee on Accountancy a statement of his necessary traveling expenses. Each member of the Board shall be entitled to compensation at the rate of \$25.00 per day for such services."; and that the following be adopted:

"Each member of the Board of Examiners appointed under Section 2 of the Act shall receive compensation of \$500.00 for conducting each examination and for all other services rendered in pursuance of the duties imposed upon him by the Act."

AMENDMENT TO LEASE WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS FOUNDATION FOR THE PROPERTY AT 129 NORTH RACE STREET, URBANA

(22) The University is sub-leasing the property at 129 North Race Street, Urbana, from the University of Illinois Foundation, at a rental rate of \$851 per month, for use by the Department of Psychology.

The entire building has been remodeled by the owner to meet the require-ments of the Department of Psychology and he has amortized the cost of the remodeling by a higher rental rate than the property would normally rent for.

Additional remodeling and equipment has been requested by the Department to increase the utilization of the basement, for greater control of temperature and humidity for research projects, and additional experiment rooms. The owner of the property has submitted a proposal to remodel this space and to amortize the cost by further increasing the rent by \$65.50 per month for the remaining life of the lease, i.e., August 31, 1971.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that: the Foundation be requested to amend the lease by increasing the rental rate for the life of the lease by \$65.50; the sublease from the Founda-tion to the University be increased by \$65.50 per month as of October 1, 1964; and that funds be assigned from Indirect Costs to the Physical Plant operating budget for the annual rental of \$786.00.

SALE OF LOTS IN GARY, INDIANA

(23) Since 1952 the University has been the owner of two vacant lots in the

city of Gary, Indiana, which it acquired by the Last Will and Testament of Anna J. Voodry, deceased. Under the terms of the will the lots are held as a part of the "Anna J. Voodry Free Educational Fund," which provides scholarships known as the "Earl C. and Lawrence L. Voodry Scholarships." The School City of Gary, the public schools system of Gary, Indiana, has determined that the acquisition of the lots by it for school purposes is necessary and has offered to purchase the same from the University at the price of \$650, which is the full appraised price as determined by the City's appraisal team. In the event the City's offer is not accepted, it will institute condemnation proceedings under its power of eminent domain. The price offered is deemed reasonable by the University.

The Vice-President and Comptroller recommends the sale of the property to the School City of Gary at the offered price of \$650, with customary adjustments and prorations upon closing.

WHEREAS, the School City of Gary, The Public School System of Gary, Indiana, a public educational body organized and existing under the laws of the State of Indiana, hereinafter termed "purchaser," has offered to purchase the herinafter described property upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth;

(B.) This Corporation to furnish Purchaser a quit-claim deed, a certified copy of the Court order and the deed vesting title in the University, and pay for the required Federal Revenue stamps;

(C.) Possession to be delivered to Purchaser at the time final payment is made;

(D.) The title to be conveyed to be subject to special assessments becoming a lien after the date of the deed, building restrictions and easements of record. (E.) Such other terms and conditions as said Comptroller and Secretary may deem necessary or desirable.

Be It Further Resolved that upon compliance with the terms of said agreement by purchaser, and in accordance with the terms thereof, said Comptroller and Secretary be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge, and deliver, in the name and in behalf of this Corporation, and under its Corporate Seal, a quit-claim deed and such other documents in connection therewith as said Comptroller and Secretary may deem necessary or desirable to convey to Purchaser title to the following described property, viz:

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ILLINOIS STREET RESIDENCE HALLS

(25) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,204.80 in the contract with Art-O-Lite Company, Inc., Galesburg, for revisions in the fire alarm system in the Illinois Street Residence Halls to segregate each building into a separate alarm system.

Funds are available in the construction budget.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF PLANT SCIENCES BUILDING (TURNER HALL)

(26) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$3,643.27 in the contract with W. E. O'Neil Construction Company, Chicago, for painting insulated ducts and piping in the meter room, transformer vault, mechanical equipment room, elevator shaft, pent house, mechanical equipment room of the Greenhouse, and the electrical vault in the Plant Sciences Building (Turner Hall) to prevent deterioration.

Funds are available in the construction budget.

Newberg Construction Co., Chicago, for a revision of electrical service in the Metals Casting Laboratory of the Engineering and Sciences Laboratory to provide for the installation of an Inducto Therm Corporation furnace.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF CHICAGO CIRCLE CAMPUS

(28) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$3,792.78 in the contract with Gust K. Newberg Construction Co., Chicago, for additional electrical service, direct current, to each student laboratory station in Room A-2091 of the Engineering and Sciences Laboratory.

Funds are available in the construction budget.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF CHICAGO CIRCLE CAMPUS

(29) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$18,878.53 with Gust K. Newberg Construction Co., Chicago, for changes in site work prior to the activation of the facilities now under construction and in anticipation of construction in Phase II at the Chicago Circle Campus.

The increased work will provide a chain-link fence around each of the project sites in Phase II, additional sidewalks, temporary gates for construction access to each of the areas, and a temporary road in the vicinity of the Library.

The latter will provide access for fire protection since the permanent road will be temporarily blocked by construction.

Funds are available in the construction budget for this work.

ADDITIONAL SOIL TEST BORINGS AND SOIL ANALYSIS FOR PHASE II CONSTRUCTION AT CHICAGO CIRCLE CAMPUS

(30) The Board of Trustees, at its February 21, 1962, meeting, authorized the execution of a contract with Soil Testing Services, Inc., Chicago, for soil test borings and soil analysis for the buildings now under construction at Chicago Circle.

Architectural contracts have since been awarded by the Illinois Building Authority, on recommendations of the Board of Trustees, for ten buildings to be constructed in Phase II and for which additional soil testing and analysis will be required. Thirty borings will be required for the ten buildings of which ten will go to bed rock. Soil Testing Services, Inc., Chicago, have agreed to perform the additional work for Phase II on the basis of the same unit costs as are specified in their existing contract with the University for Phase I. It is anticipated that the total cost of the additional work will be approxi-

It is anticipated that the total cost of the additional work will be approximately \$13,000 for which funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University from the Universities Building Fund. The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the employment of Soil Testing Services, Inc., for this work.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this recommendation was approved.

PUBLIC USE OF UNIVERSITY-OWNED PARKING FACILITIES AT CHICAGO CIRCLE

(31) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the general public be allowed to use University-owned parking facilities at Chicago Circle as follows:

The parking lot at the northeast corner of Roosevelt Road and Morgan Street to be available for use until February 1, 1965, upon the payment by the users of the proper fee to enter and exit through the coin-operated gates, and beginning February 1, 1965, the general public be permitted to use this lot on Saturdays and Sundays only, on the same basis of compensation.

The lot north of Grenshaw Street between Halsted Street and Dan Ryan Expressway to be available upon payment of the meter charges established by the University and in accordance with the same schedule as outlined above.

The lots south of Grenshaw Street between Halsted Street and Dan Ryan Expressway to be available upon payment of the meter charges established by the University and in accordance with the same schedule as outlined above.

The proposal to open these parking lots to the public was suggested by the Halsted-Roosevelt-Maxwell Business Men's Association, Inc., on behalf of all members of the Association and clergy and congregations of the various churches in the area. The Association has agreed to indemnify the University against any loss sustained by it due to opening these parking lots to the public, and to fund such indemnity with not less than \$300,000 of insurance. The University will have the right to make reasonable rules and regulations covering the use of these lots and may terminate the public use in the event it is determined by the University that such use is interfering with the University's operations or construction.

This proposal has been submitted to and approved by the Department of Urban Renewal of the City of Chicago and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds of the Board.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were approved.

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AGREEMENT WITH COMMONWEALTH EDISON COMPANY

(32) Construction of the proposed Union Building and Residence Hall at the Medical Center will require the closing of Winchester Avenue and alleys between Polk Street and Taylor Street and the removal of most of Commonwealth Edison Company's poles, cables, transformers, and associated equipment from the area.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller therefore recommend authorization of an agreement with Commonwealth Edison Company, Chicago, for removal of overhead electrical facilities in the area bounded by Polk Street, Wolcott Avenue, Taylor Street, and Damen Avenue, with the exception of those serving Board of Education Warehouse at a cost of \$6,097.

Funds are available to pay the cost of this agreement.

EASEMENT TO NORTHERN ILLINOIS WATER CORPORATION

(33) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize its Secretary and the Comptroller to grant a right-of-way easement to the Northern Illinois Water Corporation over the north 726.04 feet of the south 1,326.04 feet of the west 33 feet of the southwest one-fourth of Section 30, Township 19 North, Range 9 East of the Third Prime Meridian, upon terms, conditions, and form, approved by the Legal Counsel.

I concur and recommend adoption of the following resolution.

Be It, and It Hereby Is Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and the Secretary of this public corporation be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and on behalf of this Corporation such instruments of conveyance, contract, or other document or documents as to them may seem necessary or desirable in order to grant to Northern Illinois WATER CORPORATION, an Illinois corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Grantee," its successors and assigns, the right and easement to construct, re-construct, operate, maintain, repair, alter, replace, move and remove a water line, which is not less than eight inches (8") in diameter and other equipment appurtenant thereto, under, through and across the land hereinafter described and the right of ingress to and egress therefrom; the rights and easement granted to be limited to the extent that this public corporation has the present right and capacity to grant the same. Grantee shall agree to repair any damage caused to property of this Corporation by the construction, reconstruction, operation, maintenance, repairing, alteration, moving and removing of said water line and to indemnify this Corporation and its representatives from liability in con-nection with Grantee's activities. The right-of-way easement shall remain in full force and effect from the date granted and for so long thereafter as said water transportation line is continued in service and has not been abandoned and discontinued. Upon termination of the easement Grantee shall peaceably surrender possession of said premises to this Corporation and full and complete title then shall remain in this Corporation free and clear of said easement and without necessity of re-entry or demand. The right-of-way easement shall be over the following-described property:

Situated in the State of Illinois, the County of Champaign, and consisting of the West Thirty-three (33) feet of the North Seven Hundred and Twenty-Six and Four Hundredths Feet (726.04) of the South One Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-Six and Four Hundredths Feet (1326.04) of the Southwest Quarter (SW 1/4) of Section Thirty (30), Township Nineteen (19) North, Range Nine (9) East of the Third Principal Meridian.

DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES

(34) At its annual meeting on March 18, 1964, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois adopted a resolution authorizing its President and Secretary to delegate the signing of their names to vouchers to be presented to the Auditor of Public Accounts and to warrants drawn on the Treasurer of the University under the conditions specified in the resolution. The Secretary requests that this resolution be amended to include authorization of Anthony J. Diekema, Assistant Dean of Admissions and Records at the Medical Center, to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the Auditor of Public Accounts and to warrants on the University Treasurer, covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this amendment was authorized.

MIDWEST UNIVERSITIES CONSORTIUM FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

(38) For the record I report that Dr. Royden Dangerfield has been appointed Executive Director of the Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities, Incorporated. The Consortium has been organized by the University of Illinois, Indiana University, Michigan State University, and the University of Wisconsin to assist the four universities in carrying on overseas activities and to strengthen international programs on each of the four campuses. To enable the Consortium to carry on its activities, the Ford Foundation has made a grant of \$3,500,000 for a five-year period.

Under a contract with the University of Illinois, effective September 1, 1964, the headquarters of the Consortium will be in Room 377 Administration Build-

ing, University of Illinois, Urbana. Dr. Dangerfield will serve as a half-time officer of the Corporation, and will continue to serve on a half-time basis as Associate Provost, in charge of the Summer Session, and Director of International Programs at the University of Illinois. His other duties as Associate Provost and Dean of Administration are being assigned to other staff members.

Since last spring Dr. Dangerfield has been serving as President of the Consortium. Other officers are:

HOSPITAL-MEDICAL-SURGICAL FEE

(40) The Hospital-Medical-Surgical Fee for the summer session at Urbana-Champaign and the Chicago Undergraduate Division is one-half the fee for a full semester. The coverage terminates at the end of the summer session. Students who wish year-round coverage between the end of the summer session and the beginning of the fall term can purchase it by paying an additional five dollars. Some students who attend summer sessions are under the erroneous impression that coverage is continuous and are disappointed when claims are denied.

The Vice-President and Comptroller recommends that, effective in the summer session of 1965, a full semester's fee (\$10 at Urbana-Champaign and \$9 at the Chicago Undergraduate Division) be charged and that the coverage extend until the beginning of the fall semester.

Students who do not desire coverage for the period between the close of

the summer session and the beginning of the first semester may secure a refund of one-half of the fee upon written request.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this change in fee was authorized.

KRANNERT CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS

(41) Although public announcement was made on July 24, 1964, and the members of the Board of Trustees have now been fully informed regarding the matter, I am reporting for the official record the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Herman C. Krannert of Indianapolis to the University of Illinois Foundation to create a Center for the Performing Arts on the University's Urbana-Champaign campus. Committees of the Board have been consulted as the discussions developed.

Mr. Krannert is Chairman of the Board of Inland Container Corporation with headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana. He is an alumnus of the University's College of Engineering, Class of 1912, and a member of the Foundation. Mrs. Krannert is a graduate of Brenau College where she majored in music, and has a special interest in literature and the arts.

The total cost of the project, to be known as the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts, is estimated at \$14,325,000. Of this amount, gifts will provide approximately \$10,000,000. The contributions are from various donors, but the major gift will be that of Mr. and Mrs. Krannert.

The financing of the Center will require \$4,325,000 in other funds, of which \$630,000 already is available in University appropriations. The remainder will be requested from the state as a part of the capital funds required for 1965-67. This money will be used for the purchase of land and for construction of classrooms, rehearsal rooms, workshops, and parking space, which will be below ground level.

The Krannert Center for the Performing Arts will provide an entirely new educational and cultural facility for the Urbana-Champaign campus. It will be located east of the old main quadrangle, between Goodwin Avenue and Gregory Place from Illinois to Oregon Streets. It will occupy two square blocks and will be approached from the center of the campus by an open vista.

A number of performing groups at the University of Illinois have become nationally or internationally known for their work—the Opera Workshop, the University Theatre, the University Bands, the University Symphony Orchestra, the University Choir, the Dance Group. However, much of the performance by these groups and the teaching back of it has heretofore been greatly limited because of inadequate facilities. With nearly 1,700 students enrolled in courses in music, theatre, band, and the dance, much of the work to be done in the new facility in these fields is now widely scattered over the campus. In music alone the work is carried on in ten different areas, several being converted residences. Aside from the Band Building, there has been no construction for music facilities since Smith Memorial Hall was completed in 1919.

The Center will consist of four theatres, each one a separate building with a special character of its own, connected by carefully planned functional areas, and related by architectural design. The architect, Max Abramovitz, is an alumnus of the University, class of 1929, and a former member of the staff of the Department of Architecture. His firm, Harrison and Abramovitz of New York, has designed nationally known buildings, including the new Lincoln Center Philharmonic Hall and the United Nations Building in New York, the Interfaith Center and Rose Art Museum at Brandeis University, the Law School and Amsterdam Plaza at Columbia University, and the Assembly Hall at the University of Illinois.

The four units of the complex will be a music auditorium to seat 2,200, a music theatre to seat 1,000, a drama theatre to seat 700, and an experimental theatre to seat 250. In addition, an outdoor theatre is made possible by the arrangement of the buildings. This facility will seat about 1,000. The music auditorium will be used for many programs produced by faculty and students as well as for concerts by outside talent.

The main entrance to the auditorium will be at ground level, from the east, with another entrance from the terrace level and still another at an upper level.

It may be approached from the west by a dramatic flight of steps, some of which will be used as seats for the outdoor theatre.

The composition of the Center will be related to the landscape surrounding it and to the general feeling of that campus area.

The entire Center will be on a man-made rise of ground which will give it dominance over the surrounding area. Underneath it will be two floors which will include practice rooms, rehearsal areas, offices, dressing rooms, workshops, and space for parking for approximately 800 cars. The parking area will have natural lighting from a specially designed clerestory (window-above-roof to permit entrance of light) and will have natural ventilation. It can be approached from several sides of the complex.

Each theatre will be visible from all sides — the music auditorium will be approached from both the east and west sides of the Center. The theatres will have connecting corridors or walkways wide enough for benches and lounge spaces so that these areas will be in constant use by students and faculty. Walls of the connecting galleries will be designed for the display of material related to the performing arts. Programs from the various theatres may be piped to other units of the Center so that at times a maximum number of people may enjoy them.

In the lower levels of the Center, workshops, design rooms, laboratories, and practice rooms will be in constant use as a part of the teaching programs in music, drama, the dance, opera, and other fields. The garage area is so designed that, by remodeling later on, part of it could be converted into classrooms. Mr. and Mrs. Krannert were the principal contributors to the Krannert Art

Mr. and Mrs. Krannert were the principal contributors to the Krannert Art Museum on the University of Illinois campus in Champaign-Urbana. It houses several famous art collections and has been visited by thousands of people from all over the country since it was completed late in 1960. Mrs. Krannert presented the University with the painting, "Christ After The Flagellation," by Murillo, and both Mr. and Mrs. Krannert commissioned the sculptor Mirko to produce the statue "Initiation" which is located on a pedestal in front of the Art Museum. Their most recent gift to the Museum is an important thirteenth-century French stained glass window.

Members of the Faculty Committee which advised the University administration on the programs to be advanced by the Center for the Performing Arts are: A. S. Weller, Dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts, Chairman; D. A. Branigan, Director of the School of Music; Margaret Erlanger, Associate Professor of Physical Education for Women; L. A. Hiller, Jr., Associate Professor of Music; Mark Hindsley, Director of the University of Illinois Bands; P. S. Pettinga, Professor of Music; J. W. Scott, Professor of Speech; R. N. Sullivan, Dean of the College of Law; A. R. Williams, Professor of Architecture; and L. E. Zirner, Professor of Music.

Mr. and Mrs. Krannert made the formal offer of their gift in a letter agreement dated July 14, 1964, which I have accepted on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this report was received for official record, and the President's action accepting the gift on behalf of the Board was approved.

President Clement then presented the following resolution for the Board's consideration.

Resolution

Since the announcement on July 24 of the magnificent gift of Mr. and Mrs. Herman C. Krannert, making possible the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts, a host of expressions of gratitude have come from the people of Illinois and from many more throughout the nation. All concerned within the State and the University, as well as all who treasure the fine arts, have rejoiced in this superb expression of support for the creative spirit. As President Henry has stated truly, "this is one of the most significant undertakings in the history of the University."

The gift is the more welcome, and the more appreciated, coming as it does in a time when national need is naturally drawn to technology and science and when the sources of support for the humanities and the fine arts are more limited.

Moreover, the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts now will permit the University to match the distinction of personnel in its departments of music, drama, dance, and related arts with a commensurate distinction in the physical facilities provided. Their work will thereby be greatly enhanced and their effectiveness and achievement increased.

The gift of Mr. and Mrs. Krannert opens great new opportunities. It seems certain that the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts will become noted among American institutions of higher education.

This splendid gift, an outstanding example of alumni giving, will be an inspiration to all who feel, as does Mr. Krannert, a deep sense of obligation to and affection for their Alma Mater.

To Mr. and Mrs. Krannert, the Trustees of the University extend this resolution of deepest appreciation, and in so doing salute an alumnus whose loyalty is so strong and sure and a couple whose devotion to the enrichment of our culture has brought them the appreciation and respect of all who honor the University and value its service.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this resolution was adopted.

MEMORIAL TO ROBERT C. ZUPPKE

(42) The choice of a suitable memorial on the Urbana-Champaign campus to the late Robert C. Zuppke has been under consideration since his death on December 22, 1957.

Mr. Zuppke served as head football coach at the University of Illinois from 1913 through 1941. A man of diverse accomplishments, he was known and loved by thousands of alumni and brought a great deal of fame and recognition to the University and to intercollegiate football. The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has made a unanimous

The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has made a unanimous recommendation that the football field in Memorial Stadium be named in honor of Mr. Zuppke.

The Board of Directors has asked the President to place this recommendation before the Board of Trustees for action. Prior to this meeting, I placed this request before the Board's Committee on Athletics of which Mr. Harold Pogue is chairman and I suggest that his report be received at this time.

Report of the Committee on Athletics, University of Illinois Board of Trustees, September 16, 1964, Urbana, Illinois.

Robert C. Zuppke will always be an institution at the University of Illinois. More, his is a never-to-be-forgotten figure in the history of American football.

From the momentous day in $191\overline{3}$ when he stepped from a high school to the Big Ten, Robert C. Zuppke showed the great intellectual curiosity, the intense concentration, the imagination and sustained drive which made him a great football coach. Too, he possessed philosophic attributes and artistic interests which made him one of the most interesting personalities in the world of sport.

Under Zuppke the University of Illinois achieved national recognition. His teams won or shared seven Big Ten championships and were rated among the best in the nation in 1914, 1919, 1923, and 1927.

Robert C. Zuppke was a great coach, but he was more than that to the University he loved and to the people with whom he came in contact in fortyfour years of association with the University. He reached thousands of youngsters through his teaching in the pioneer Illinois school for coaches, his summer courses in football for high school coaches, and through his painting, numerous writings in books, magazines, and newspapers, and thousands of speeches.

His was the moving force behind the construction of Memorial Stadium at the University of Illinois, a gift of the University's alumni as a memorial to those graduates and former students who gave their lives for their country in World War I.

I therefore submit the following resolution and recommend its adoption by the Board of Trustees upon the unanimous recommendation of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association and the unanimous concurrence of the Athletic Committee of the Board of Trustees. Resolved, that the football field in Memorial Stadium hereinafter be named Robert C. Zuppke Field in Memorial Stadium;

That a suitable memorial so identifying Robert C. Zuppke Field be placed in Memorial Stadium and that appropriate dedicatory services be held at the time such memorial is unveiled;

That the Director of the Physical Plant consult with professional counsel as to an appropriate memorial, and

That the President of the University be requested to appoint an advisory committee to consult with the Director of the Physical Plant in this matter. This Committee should have representation from the Athletic Association Board of Directors, the "I" Men's Association, and the Athletic Committee of the Board of Trustees.

On behalf of the Athletic Committee of the Board of Trustees, I move that the foregoing resolution be adopted.

Commission on the Humanities

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY PATENT COMMITTEE

(43) The University Patent Committee submits, with the concurrence of the Chairman of the University Research Board, a series of recommendations relating to inventions.

1. Vacuum seals — Ralph S. Carson, Research Associate in Electrical Engineering, and Charles D. Hendricks, Professor of Electrical Engineering, inventors; developed under Grant No. NSF-G-19776. A vacuum system often uses a bell jar placed on a brass or steel plate. The bell jar is generally evacuated through a hole in the plate which leads directly to the vacuum pump. In order to obtain some flexibility in the system for experimental purposes, it is desirable to have several holes in the plate at various locations to be used with feedthroughs for electrical connections, and other equipment. The plugs for the unused holes and the fittings for the feedthroughs must necessarily form vacuum-tight seals with the plate. The fittings to be described allow such seals to be made by means of O-rings and without relying on a wax or varnish.

The invention was referred to the University of Illinois Foundation for study, which has indicated that the realization of income is improbable. Accordingly, it is recommended that the rights in the invention be released to the inventors with due recognition of the rights of the United States government and with the stipulation that, if the inventors do not wish to apply for a patent, all rights be released to the National Science Foundation, if that agency so requests.

2. Extended surface thermionic converter — Shao L. Soo, Professor of Mechanical Engineering, and S. G. Quintella, Graduate Student in Mechanical Engineering, inventors. Such a system permits a large current to be drawn from the cathode and the current increases with the temperature and area for the same work function of the electrode surfaces. The output is thus increased manyfold with little or no sacrifice in the efficiency of operation. After full consideration by the Patent Committee, it was the consensus that

After full consideration by the Patent Committee, it was the consensus that the rights of the invention should not be retained by the University but should be released to the inventors, since it appears very unlikely that there could be any commercial value to the invention. Accordingly, the release of the rights in the invention to the inventors is recommended.

3. Photo current suppression ionization gauge — Wilfred C. Schuemann, Electronics Technician in the Coordinated Science Laboratory, inventor; developed under Contract No. DA-36-039-SC-85122. This invention was released to the University of Illinois Foundation for further development and patent application in the meeting of the Board of Trustees on November 9, 1962. The Executive Director of the Foundation reported that a contract with a corporation had been signed for the licensing of the patent applied for on this device.

Accordingly, a distribution of income must be established, and the Committee recommends that 15 per cent of any net income from any licensing or royalties received on this invention be paid to the inventor after the recovery of out-of-pocket expenses incurred by the Foundation in developing the invention and obtaining the patent.

4. Electromagnetic radiation detector using the pyroelectric effect — William H. Steier, formerly Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, inventor; developed under Contract No. AF 30(602)-2456. The purpose of this device is to provide a fast sensitive detector of electromagnetic radiation. The device is

especially applicable for detection of radiation in the frequency range from 300 to 3000 kmc (the submillimeter region).

After study, the University of Illinois Foundation has advised that it has no interest in the invention and recommends release to the inventor; however, the inventor also advises that he has no interest in the invention. Accordingly, it is recommended that the rights in the invention be released to the United States Air Force, the sponsoring agency.

5. Hybrid preamplifier employing a nuvistor and transistors – J. C. Hafele, Research Associate in Physics, inventor; developed under Contract No. Nonr-1834(05). The high input impedance and generally rugged nature of a vacuum tube make its use at the input desirable, while transistors are capable of delivering relatively large currents with rapid response, so that their use at the output is highly desirable. Thus, the advantages of both were incorporated into the preamplifier design of this invention.

The Head of the Department of Physics feels, and the Committee agrees, that there is little possibility of commercial value in the invention. Accordingly, it is recommended that the rights in the invention be released to the United States Navy, the sponsoring agency.

After consideration by the Patent Committee and study by the University of Illinois Foundation, it is agreed that there may be possibilities of profit in the following inventions; and accordingly, it is recommended that the rights in these inventions be released to the Foundation for further development and possible patent application:

6. Memory system utilizing two-electrode electro-chemical cells as binary memory elements — Bruce E. Briley, Research Assistant in the Digital Computer Laboratory, inventor; under Contract No. AT(11-1)-415. The invention consists of a random-access memory system utilizing electro-chemical cells as binary memory elements (the name "chemory" was coined for such a memory). The cells used are two-terminal devices.

Under federal law, the Atomic Energy Commission determines the disposition of any inventions developed under this or other grants financed by that agency. The Commission has advised, however, that it will not file a patent application on this invention because of publication of the information and since there apparently is no immediate use for the system. The Head of the Digital Computer Laboratory, however, feels that there may be elements of value in the system; and accordingly, the Patent Committee feels that further study should be made of the system.

7. Method of fabricating spherical and prolate spheroidal reflectors — James E. Degenford, Research Assistant in Electrical Engineering, and Murray D. Sirkis, Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering; developed under Contract No. AF-30(602)-3046. A quick and inexpensive method of forming spherical and prolate spheroidal reflectors of large radius of curvature for use at millimeter and submillimeter wavelengths has been developed. For possible commercial application, it should be possible to use a thicker membrane and use hydraulic or air pressure to form the membrane, making a more permanent reflector.

8. Photodiode as a sensitive temperature probe — Robert C. Dimick, Assistant in Mechanical Engineering, and George J. Trezek, Research Assistant in Mechanical Engineering, inventors; developed under SQUID Contract No. Nonr-3623(S-6). This probe has been developed based on the high temperature coefficient of the reverse current in a reverse-biased Sylvania IN77B photodiode. Because of its inherent extraordinary sensitivity, this probe design would be useful for other purposes where temperature deviations of a very small magnitude must be measured with a minimum disturbance to the surroundings due to the power dissipated in the probe itself.

9. Log-periodic folded slot, dipole, or monopole array — John W. Greiser, Research Assistant in Electrical Engineering, inventor; developed under Contract No. Nobsr-85243. The duality between the folded slot array and the folded dipole array was the first to be noticed; a second symmetry property of this design is the image symmetry of the folded dipole array and folded monopole array. In effect, this allows the engineer to design three different antennas at one time.

10. Modulation of light-Paul Handler, Associate Professor of Electrical

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Engineering and of Physics, and Andrea Frova, Research Associate in Electrical Engineering, inventors; developed under Contract No. ARPA-131. Light emerging from a material can be completely extinguished by application of an electric field to the material. Although the principle is well known, this is the first time that a p-n junction of a semiconductor has been used to obtain the effect. The magnitude of the effect is much larger than ever obtained before by any means.

11. System of providing ingredients to ruminant animals — Melvin R. Karr, Assistant in Animal Science, and U. S. Garrigus, Professor of Animal Science, inventors; developed under a grant from the Nitrogen Products Division of the W. R. Grace and Company. A combination of hormones and/or hormone-like substances orally or systematically administered with feed ingredients including nonprotein nitrogen compounds is unique in that the ruminant animal can utilize the nonprotein nitrogen so administered for growth and production at a rate nearly equivalent to, or superior to, that of significantly higher cost traditional protein supplements. The use of hormones and/or hormone-like substances, or the use of nonprotein nitrogen substances, or the use of other feed ingredients in ruminant rations in-and-of-themselves are not unique, however, the combination of a hormone or hormone-like substance with nonprotein nitrogen and with a feed ingredient which gives equivalent performance in ruminants to that obtained with standard protein supplements is unique.
