BUDGET FOR 1965 SUMMER SESSION AND FACULTY APPOINTMENTS AT CHICAGO CIRCLE

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CURRICULUM PREPARATORY TO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TEACHING WITH SPECIALTY IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE

(6) The College of Education, the University Council on Teacher Education, and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend authorization, effective September 1, 1965, of a curriculum designed to meet the requirements for teaching in elementary schools of French, German, Russian, and Spanish, to be administered by the Department of Elementary Education. The curriculum provides for both a general elementary school teaching certificate and an undergraduate specialty in the teaching of a foreign language.

For admission to this specialty curriculum, a freshman must meet the requirements for admission to the curriculum in elementary education, and must also have successfully completed two years of high school work in the foreign language in which he wishes to specialize. A transfer student must have a minimum cumula-

tive scholastic average of 3.5 in terms of the University's grading system to qualify for admission.

A minimum of 124 semester hours, plus any additional hours required to complete the foreign language major (not counting military training and physical education), is required for graduation.

The Senate Coordinating Council has been consulted and indicates that no

other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

Submitted herewith is a supporting memorandum, including the details of the required sequences in foreign language, a copy of which is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for supplementary record.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Page, this recommendation was approved.

CURRICULA IN ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY

(7) The College of Engineering and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend authorization of two new curricula:

For the Degree of Bachelor of Science in the Teaching of Engineering Technology

This program is a four-year curriculum designed to prepare teachers for junior colleges, technical institutes, and technical high schools in Illinois.

For admission, first-year students must meet the University's standard entrance requirements and transfer students must have a minimum cumulative average of 3.5 in terms of the University's grading system; provided that transfer students whose averages are within the range of 3.3 to 3.5 may qualify for admission upon petition and on recommendation of the Council on Teacher Education's Counseling Services.

A minimum of 136 semester hours, excluding courses in military training and physical education, will be required for graduation.

Two options are available: Mechanical Technology and Electrical Technology.

Certificate in the Teaching of Engineering Technology

This program is a thirty-two-semester hour post-baccalaureate degree curriculum designed to provide additional training and depth of subject matter for teachers

of engineering technology who are currently teaching in this area.

For admission, students must meet the following requirements: graduation from a baccalaureate degree program earned at an accredited institution of higher learning prior to September, 1967; completion of one year of college physics; completion of integral calculus; two years of pertinent industrial work experience; two years of experience teaching technical courses in the respective subject matter specialty.

Each applicant's record will be reviewed by the Committee on the Preparation of Teachers of Engineering Technology before being admitted to the program. If a student is admitted who has not had teaching experience in a junior college or technical institute, he will be required to meet Illinois teacher certification requirements before his Certificate in the Teaching of Engineering Technology is granted.

Two options are available in this certificate curriculum, Mechanical Technol-

ogy and Electrical Technology.

A minimum of thirty-two semester hours will be required for the Certificate. The Senate Coordinating Council has been consulted and indicates that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

I concur, subject to further action by the State Board of Higher Education. These curricula will become effective as soon as feasible upon final approval.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was approved.

CURRICULA IN COLLEGE OF COMMERCE AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

(8) On recommendation of the faculty of the College of Commerce and Business Administration at Urbana, the Urbana-Champaign Senate has approved a revision of all the fields of concentration in the undergraduate curricula of the College except the curriculum in commercial teaching, effective for students enrolling in September, 1965, and thereafter:

Summary of Changes

The number of degree programs is reduced from ten to six. Separate degree

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programs are eliminated in commerce and law, in management, in secretarial training, and in urban land economics. Management and urban land economics are pronosed as options in other degree programs.

The change in the content of the degree requirements in marketing will direct the student's attention to the marketing function as it integrates into the total business process and will not permit concentration on only one aspect of this important function of business.

The maximum number of hours permitted in each field of concentration is

reduced.

Revisions of thirty-eight courses are proposed.

Forty-six courses now offered by the College are recommended for deletion and eight new courses are proposed.

Recommended General Requirements

Each student will register for only one major. A student may count up to six hours of advanced R.O.T.C. credit toward graduation. The honors courses, indenendent study courses, and senior seminar courses will become uniform and will he limited to two senior research courses.

Three-fourths of the elective credit counted toward graduation must be in

sophomore and junior courses.

The revision is recommended so that the courses required in the various fields of concentration will be integrated with the new general education and business core requirements. Furthermore, the revision is needed so that the College programs will reflect the current emphasis on liberal education for business students, and to provide a broad knowledge of the chief functions of modern business organizations, and some basic training in the use of professional tools of accounting, mathematics, statistics, and economic analysis. The revised degree programs will give recognition to the increasing importance of regional economic growth and international business as well as the use of computers in business decision making.

Submitted herewith is a supporting memorandum, a copy of which is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

The Senate Coordinating Council has indicated that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the changes recommended were approved.

CURRICULA OF THE DEPARTMENT OF RECREATION AND MUNICIPAL PARK ADMINISTRATION

(9) The College of Physical Education and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend a complete revision of the curricula offered by the Department of Recreation and Municipal Park Administration. The revisions are the result of lengthy studies by the faculty and are "a translation of the Department's long-range policy which charts the future course of undergraduate preparation in this field. The curricula, as proposed, are based on the heavily increasing need for professional personnel as well as the need to provide each student with an adequate education for personal growth and sound citizenship.

The major change in the curricular reorganization is the addition of options in Therapeutic Recreation and Outdoor Recreation to the current option in Municipal Park Administration. The revisions do not include any new teaching programs, but reorganization of existing courses and programs. Furthermore, the

proposed changes:

Do not involve a new degree.

Do not require increase in staff or budget.

Increase the number of semester hours required for graduation from 130 to 132. Increase the general education requirements, including a minimum of sixty-six hours, twelve hours more than was previously required. The proposed program includes a minimum of twenty-three hours of courses in the humanities.

Broaden the selection of required courses in the biological sciences, social sciences,

and in the humanities.

Provide for needed preparation of students to engage in scientific research at the graduate level.

The elements of the curricular revisions are based upon the views of teachers. students, practitioners, and the public. In the judgment of the faculty of the College, the widening scope and the increasing volume of recreative behavior constitute both the nature and the justification of the changes proposed.

The Senate Coordinating Council has been consulted and indicates that no

other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

A complete catalog of the revisions is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, the changes recommended were approved.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS IN COLLEGE OF JOURNALISM AND COMMUNICATIONS

(10) The College of Journalism and Communications and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend changes in the graduation requirements for the news-editorial curriculum of the College leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Communications, the details of which are set forth in the supporting statement submitted herewith, a copy of which is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

The changes are designed to broaden and strengthen the undergraduate pro-

fessional educational program.

Each student during the third and fourth years will be required to take twenty semester hours of advanced social studies and enough required elective courses within the College to meet the minimum requirement of thirty semester hours per year and the total requirement of 124 hours for graduation.

These changes are to be become effective for students enrolling after Septem-

ber 1, 1965.

The Senate Coordinating Council has been consulted and indicates that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the changes recommended were approved.

MAJOR AND MINOR IN SPANISH

(11) The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend a revision in the programs for majors and minors in Spanish to provide for the deletion of an existing option with regard to two courses in linguistics and two in social sciences, and the addition of linguistics to acceptable minors. For a major, twenty semester hours in Spanish will be required, excluding certain specified elementary courses, and including at least eight hours of advanced courses. For minors, twenty semester hours will be required in not more than two of the following options, with at least eight hours in each if two are chosen: education, English (excluding first-year rhetoric), French, German, Greek, history, Italian, Latin, Latin-American studies, library science, linguistics, medieval civilization studies, philosophy, Portuguese, and Russian.

While the changes are minor, they affect graduation requirements, and should

therefore have the Board's approval.

The Senate Coordinating Council has indicated that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the changes recommended were approved.

PREMEDICAL PROGRAM

(12) The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend that the present premedical curriculum offered by the College be discontinued. In lieu thereof, students preparing for the study of medicine will select majors and other courses which will fulfill requirements for admission to medical schools.

The Senate Coordinating Council has been consulted and indicates that no

other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was approved. At this point, Mr. Page asked to be excused from the meeting because of an out-of-town speaking engagement tonight.

RECOMMENDATION FROM COMMITTEE ON COPYRIGHTS AND RECORDINGS

(13) The Committee on Copyrights and Recordings has reviewed a case involving the proposed publication of a monograph entitled "Personality Factors in Objective Test Devices" whose authors are Professor Raymond B. Cattell of the Department of Psychology (Urbana-Champaign) and two associates, Dr. John D. Handleby and Dr. Kurt Pawlik.

The National Institute of Mental Health made a grant (MH-01733-08) to the University of Illinois, in behalf of Professor Cattell, supplementing an earlier

grant, for the publication of this monograph.

The Committee on Copyrights and Recordings recommends that this material be released to Professor Cattell and his associates for copyright and publication as appropriate, subject to two conditions: (a) that the University of Illinois has the right to use any of this material in any project which might develop later and to reproduce it, in part or whole, in any form without the payment of a fee; (b) that the National Institute of Mental Health and other federal agencies have rights to whatever royalties and use of this material might have been stipulated in the terms of the grant made to the University of Illinois for the support of the study in question and for the publication of the monograph.

The Executive Vice-President and Provost and the Vice-President and Comptroller endorse these recommendations of the Committee on Copyrights and Re-

cordings.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this recommendation was approved.

SALE OF HOUSING REVENUE BONDS

(14) With the approval of the Finance Committee, the Vice-President and Comptroller plans to offer \$9,500,000 Housing Revenue Bonds of 1965 Series A for sale on March 8, 1965, to finance construction of the Florida Avenue Residence Halls. Since the purchasers must be notified of the award within twenty-four hours after the receipt of bids, he recommends that the Executive Committee of the Board be authorized to award the bonds to the successful bidder.

The Vice-President and Comptroller further recommends that the University's pending application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency for a loan of \$4,050,000 be withdrawn. The current market indicates that an interest rate of less than 334 per cent will be bid on the bonds, in which case the Housing and Home Finance Agency would not take any of the bonds. In the event that the lowest bid is for more than 334 per cent, the Executive Committee may exercise the option of rejecting all bids.

The Vice-President and Comptroller also recommends that the firm of Chap-

man & Cutler, Chicago, be employed as bond counsel for this issue.

I concur.

ARGONNE NATIONAL LABORATORY PROGRAM

(15) The University of Illinois has been invited to become a sponsoring institution of a new nonprofit corporation now being formed to serve as a governing board for the program at the Argonne National Laboratory. The invitation is being extended by the Presidents of the Midwestern Universities Research Association and the Associated Midwest Universities (the University of Illinois is a member of both organizations) and by the President of the University of Chicago (which operates the Argonne National Laboratory).

Criteria for Selection of Sponsoring Institutions

 Geographical location in the "midwest area" defined as Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and Pennsylvania west of the Appalachians.

Existence of strong graduate programs which have produced a significant number of Ph.D. degree awards in the areas of biology, chemistry, mathematics.

physics, and engineering.

3. Desire to use the facilities of Argonne in its programs of research and graduate education and commitment to provide a level of local university staffing which will permit active senior staff participants in Argonne Laboratory programs to spend extended periods in residence at the Laboratory.

 Willingness to contribute \$10,000 for initial working capital of the corporation, and to pledge a further sum to guarantee the financial integrity of the corpora-

tion, all funds contributed and pledged not to exceed \$25,000.

 Willingness to nominate and contribute as needed the services of a senior professor in a relevant discipline and/or a university officer to serve on the Board of the corporation.

Proposed Organization of Board

- 1. Twelve Regional Directors, two from each of six regions comprising the area. The sponsoring institutions within each region to nominate a panel including both scientists or engineers and university officers; from these names the Board will elect two directors, one a scientist and one a university officer; the remaining panel members will act as alternates and will be kept informed of Board activities and actions.
- Six Directors-at-Large, one nominated by the University of Chicago, three nominated by Associated Midwest Universities, and two representative of the midwest technological industry.

3. This would provide a Board of eighteen Directors.

After consultation with the appropriate administrative officials and with members of the staff who have responsibilities for programs of research utilizing the facilities of the Argonne National Laboratory, I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the participation of the University in the new corporation in accordance with the terms and plan of organization presented above; that an assignment of \$10,000 be made from Contract Research Reserve funds for the University's share of the initial working capital; and that the Board agree to provide an additional contribution of \$15,000 if that becomes necessary.

CONTRACT FOR CENTRALIZED CONTROLS FOR BURRILL HALL. MORRILL HALL. AND MORRILL HALL ADDITION

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$79,175 to Barber Colman Co., Rockford, the lowest bidder, for furnishing and installing a control center in the basement of Burrill Hall to monitor and control approximately eighty air conditioning air supply and exhaust systems, approximately forty controlled environment rooms, and miscellaneous chilling and plumbing equipment in three buildings—Burrill Hall, Morrill Hall, and the addition to Morrill Hall. This improvement will be the first phase of a proposed over-all campus program of centralized controls for mechanical equipment.

The contract price is a base bid of \$87,375 plus additive alternates of \$2,850 for sound-proofing the enclosure for the building control panel and \$3,950 for additional control equipment at the control central panel, less a deductive alternate

of \$15,000 for omission of a five-year service contract.

It is further recommended, with the concurrence of the Committee on Non-recurring Appropriations, that \$100,000 be assigned from the General Reserve for this contract, the engineering design and other incidental work.

I concur.

CONTRACT FOR NEW MALL BETWEEN SOUTH DAMEN AVENUE AND SOUTH WOLCOTT STREET, CHICAGO

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$19,569 to Bigane Oil Company, an Illinois corporation with an office at 3596 Archer Avenue, Chicago, through Bigane Paving Company, for construction of a new mall between South Damen Avenue and South Wolcott Street, Chicago.

The work will include construction of a paved vehicular thoroughfare, with curbs and gutters, between South Wolcott Street and South Damen Avenue, and sidewalks along the south side. This thoroughfare has long been known as "The Mall" and basically conforms to the campus development plan prepared by Richardson, Severns, Scheeler & Associates, approved by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds of the Board on October 24, 1960.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University for

1963-65.

I concur.

CONTRACT FOR REPAIR AND REMODELING OF LAUNDRY CHUTE, RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS ADDITION

(18) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$3,194 to the Zack Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the repair and remodeling of the laundry chute in the Research and Educational Hospitals Addition.

Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget.

I concur.

CONTRACT FOR AIR CONDITIONING DIET KITCHEN AND LABORATORY, RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS ADDITION

(19) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$5,662 to National Korectaire Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for air conditioning the Metabolic Diet Kitchen and Laboratory (Rooms 823 and 824) in the Research and Educational Hospitals Addition.

The air conditioning is to provide the environment required by the functions performed in this area by the Clinical Research Center of the Department of Medicine. The work will consist of adding a chill water coil, filters, dampers, piping, insulated duct work, and temperature controls to the existing ventilation supply system servicing these rooms.

Funds are available in a United States Public Health Service Grant and the

Clinical Research Center Revolving account.

AGREEMENT WITH COMMONWEALTH EDISON COMPANY FOR REVISIONS IN ELECTRICAL FACILITIES AT CHICAGO CIRCLE

(20) The proposed addition to the Science and Engineering Laboratories at Chicago Circle will require construction over the former right-of-way of vacated Arthington Avenue in which there are existing utility services in easements reserved to utility companies and to the City. Protection of the utilities during construction of the building, and the construction of a walk-through tunnel in the basement area to provide Commonwealth Edison Company access to its ducts, will be required. Similar facilities were provided during construction of the Lecture Center in Phase I.

Before construction is started by the University, it will be necessary for Commonwealth Edison Company to alter its duct system as may be required to permit work by the University, to replace the existing 12 KVA oil core cable with one of longer length, and to construct new manholes. Commonwealth estimates that this work will cost approximately \$134,000 after salvage credits, and that a minimum of six months will be required to obtain the cable and to complete the work. Therefore, authorization of Commonwealth Edison Company to proceed with the adjustments is urgently needed. The work will accommodate the University's planning and will not benefit the Company.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend the execution of an agreement with the Commonwealth Edison Company to reimburse it for the costs incurred, as determined in accordance with procedures on file with the Illinois Commerce Commission, and for performing and completing the adjustments of their facilities, such costs not to exceed \$134,000, with the understanding that work will be scheduled by the Company for completion

by September 1, 1965.

Funds are available in the construction budget.

AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF URBANA FOR LONG-RANGE PLANNING IN THE URBANA CAMPUS AREA

(21) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of an agreement with the city of Urbana for the employment of Schellie Associates, Indianapolis, Indiana, for long-range planning studies for the redevelopment of the area east of the Urbana-Champaign campus

The University will share in the cost of this plan with the city of Urbana and other local governmental agencies which will benefit. The University's share will

not exceed \$4,500.

The plan will provide for an orderly redevelopment of an area undergoing rapid change due to University expansion and will also provide coordination of City and University planning.

It is further recommended that \$4,500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be assigned from the University's General Reserve for this purpose.

I concur.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR MATERIALS RESEARCH LABORATORY, PHASE II

(22) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$3,313.35 in the contract with Johnson, Drake & Piper, Incorporated, for construction of Phase II of the Materials Research Laboratory

to include construction of helium tank supports in the pump room which will enable the Department to install and operate a recovery and repurification system to recover gaseous helium from research equipment in the building. The recovery and repurification system has been developed since the building was designed and will result in substantial operational savings.

Funds are available in the construction budget.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this change in contract was authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ILLINOIS STREET RESIDENCE HALLS

(23) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$6,238.92 in the contract with Art-O-Lite Co., Inc., Galesburg, for the electrical work on the construction of the Illinois Street Residence Halls to include installation of a television antenna distribution system, a public address system, and a sound system similar to such installations in the Pennsylvania Avenue Residence Halls. These system will permit inter-communications for student announcements, office use, and entertainment purposes, background music in the dining room, snack bar, lounges, and recreation rooms, and improved educational and recreational television reception in the lounges and recreation

Funds are available in the construction budget for this work.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, this change in contract was authorized.

EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS

(24) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend employment of the firms of Richardson, Severns, Scheeler & Associates, Champaign, and L. L. Smith & Associates, Chicago, for complete architectural services on the next unit of Graduate Student Residence Halls (SG4), which will be an addition to the hall now under construction at the northwest corner of Fifth and Chalmers Streets, Champaign, at a total fee not to exceed 6 per cent of the construction contracts.

Funds will be provided temporarily from the Stores and Services Trust Account and the account will be reimbursed from the proceeds of the sale of revenue

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds has been consulted and supports this recommendation.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this recommendation was approved.

DESIGNATION OF CHICAGO CIRCLE AND THE MEDICAL CENTER AS ONE CAMPUS FOR NONACADEMIC EMPLOYMENT

(25) For the purpose of implementing the University Civil Service System of Illinois statute, the University of Illinois at the Medical Center and the Chicago Undergraduate Division have been considered as separate campuses and consequently as separate places of employment.

Now that the operations at the Chicago Undergraduate Division are being moved to Chicago Circle, the geographical proximity of the two campuses and the earlier determination that at least one major department, the Physical Plant, is to be administered as a single operating unit create problems in many areas of Civil Service operations, such as recruitment, examinations, maintenance of eligible registers, position classification, labor relations, and wage and salary administration problems which might be avoided if the two campuses could be considered as a single place of employment.

The advantages and disadvantages of having one place of employment have been carefully studied by University administrative officers and have been discussed with members of the Nonacademic Employee Advisory Committees on both Chicago campuses. From the points of view of both the University and its employees, the advantages of one place of employment appear to outweigh by far any disad-

vantages that might be created.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel recommends that, for the purpose of implementing the statutes creating the University Civil Service System of Illinois, the operations of the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle and at the Medical Center be recognized by the Board of Trustees of the University as one campus to be known as the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle and the Medical Center effective immediately.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this recommendation was referred to the Committee on Nonacademic Personnel.

BEQUEST OF MISS ALICE J. COOK

(26) The University has received \$8,424.38 from the estate of Alice J. Cook, deceased. Miss Cook provided in her will that this bequest was made to the Univer. sity "for use by it in connection with its activities conducted at the Research and Educational Hospitals."

The Medical Director of the Hospitals, the Vice-President in charge of the Medical Center, and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the fund to be set up temporarily as an endowment fund, with income used for the Hospitals, but that the Medical Director of the Hospitals, with the approval of the Vice-President in charge of the Medical Center, be authorized to use the principal as well as the income.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this recommendation was approved.

PURCHASES

(27) The President submitted a report of purchases authorized by his office, on recommendation of the Director of Purchases and the Vice-President and Comp-

troller. He also presented a list of purchases recommended by him.

The reports of purchases authorized and purchases recommended for Board approval were presented in two categories: purchases from appropriated funds (i.e., from state appropriation to the University) and purchases from institutional funds. The latter term designates funds received by the University under contracts with the United States government, contracts with private corporations and other organizations, funds from foundation grants and grants from corporations and other donors, and University revolving funds authorized by law.

President Henry presented a report on selected topics of current interest, copies of which were distributed at the meeting, and a copy was filed with the Secretary of the Board.

NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION GRANT FOR CIVIL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(31) The National Science Foundation has made a grant of \$1,500,000 to the University for support of the "construction of a new Civil Engineering Building" with the understanding that non-federal matching funds will be supplied by the University. The University's capital budget and building program for 1965-67 includes a provision which if approved by the General Assembly of Illinois will provide the matching funds.

I have accepted the grant under the conditions indicated and report it for record.

N.A.A.C.P. RESOLUTION

Mr. Jones inquired about recent newspaper accounts concerning the announcement by the University of Illinois Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People that it would advise Negro high school athletes not to enroll at the University of Illinois because of reported discriminatory practices by members of the coaching and Department of Physical Education staffs. President Henry and Executive Vice-President and Provost Lanier reported on an investigation of such allegations made in the spring of 1964 and the actions taken. Mr. Lanier stated that no cases of discrimination have been reported to his office since that time. Copies of a statement issued by a group of Negro athletes in rebuttal are attached to these minutes and a copy is being filed with the Secretary of the Board.

The Foundation properties to be exchanged for the University-owned property were purchased at a cost of \$95,000.

Particulars of the agreement include the Episcopal Chapel of St. John the Divine receiving immediate possession to the south portion of the lot and paying their share of the total price at that time. The other two agencies will not receive possession until June 30, 1967, and will make the payment to the University of Illinois Foundation at that time.

The rental payment to the Foundation will cover the interest charged by the First National Bank of Chicago on a loan to the Foundation for the financing of

Be It Further Resolved that upon compliance with the terms of said agreement by Foundation, and in accordance with the terms thereof, said Comptroller and Secretary be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed, to execute, acknowledge, and deliver, in the name, and in behalf of, this corporation, and under its Corporate Seal, a Warranty Deed and such other documents in connection therewith as said Comptroller and Secretary may deem necessary or desirable in order to convey to Foundation title to the following described property, viz:

Commencing at a point Ten (10) Rods North and Sixty-six (66) Feet West of the Southeast corner of the Northwest Quarter (NW ½) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Nineteen North, (T-19-N), Range Nine East (R-9-E) of the Third Principal Meridian, running thence West One Hundred Seventyfour and One-half (174½) Feet, thence North Ninety (90) Feet, thence East One Hundred Seventy-four and One-half (174½) Feet, thence South Ninety (90) Feet to the place of beginning, situated in the City of Champaign, in the County of Champaign, and State of Illinois.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 1109 WEST OREGON STREET, URBANA. ILLINOIS

(4) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois request the University of Illinois Foundation to purchase the property at 1109 West Oregon Street, Urbana, Illinois, at a price of \$34,000, and lease the property to the University of Illinois at a rental rate adequate to pay the interest charged by the First National Bank of Chicago on a loan to the Foundation. This property is adjacent to the site for the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts and is required for future expansion.

The property consists of a lot 65 feet by 157 feet and is improved with a two-story and basement frame dwelling and a two-car garage.

AUTHORIZATION FOR EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO ACT ON REAL ESTATE MATTERS

(5) The University has filed seventeen condemnation proceedings on parcels of real estate in Urbana, Illinois, needed for the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts. The Board has heretofore authorized settlements of the various proceedings

at prices within the University appraisals.

The Director of the Physical Plant, the Vice-President and Comptroller, and the Legal Counsel state that the necessity for additional authority to effect settlement of some of the condemnation suits may become urgent and not capable of postponement to the next regular meeting of the Board. They recommend that, pursuant to Article 4, Section 3, of the By-Laws, the Board of Trustees authorize the Executive Committee of the Board to take action at any time prior to the next meeting of the Board of Trustees on any matters relating to the settlement of the pending condemnation proceedings.
