

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

September 22, 1965



The September meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Hotel Père Marquette, Peoria, Illinois, on Wednesday, September 22, 1965, beginning at 10:00 a.m.

President Howard W. Clement called the meeting to order and asked the Secretary to call the roll. The following members of the Board were present: Mr. Howard W. REPORTS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee presented the following reports of two meetings held since the regular meeting of the Board in July:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

August 17, 1965

On call of the Chairman, a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Center, LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on Tuesday, August 17, 1965, beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The following, constituting all members of the Committee, were present: Mr. Howard W. Clement, Chairman; Mr. Wayne A. Johnston; Mrs. Frances B. Watkins. Porter, Assistant to the President and Associate Secretary to the Board.

The Committee considered the following reports and recommendations from the President of the University.

CURRICULUM LABORATORY IN THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

(1) The Dean of the College of Education recommends establishment of a Curriculum Laboratory which will coordinate and unify the research and development activities of curriculum projects associated with University High School, including the University of Illinois Committee on School Mathematics Project, the University High School Social Studies Curriculum Project, and the Demonstration Project for Gifted Youth, and which will include the University High School in its continuing use as a laboratory for the initial trial of methods and materials of curriculum projects. Other existing curriculum projects will be invited to affiliate with the Curriculum Laboratory, and new projects will be established in it, as resources permit, to meet the need for concentrated attention to the interrelationships of subject fields in elementary and secondary education. The Curriculum Laboratory is expected to promote the more effective development of coordinated studies and to provide an arrangement which will encourage expanded opportunity for the education of graduate students in a field in which the University is pre-eminent.

The University High School, which is a department of the College of Education, has become a focal point for coordination of curriculum project activity, which fact will be recognized in the administrative organization of the Curriculum Laboratory. The University High School will continue to offer a program in which primary attention is given to the educational growth of the secondary school youth served by it. The Principal of University High School will report to the Director of the Laboratory, who, in turn, will report to the Associate Dean for Administration of the College of Education.

Administrative Appointments in the Laboratory and at University High School

The Dean of the College of Education further recommends the following appointments:

MAX BEBERMAN, presently Professor of Secondary and Continuing Education, as Professor of Secondary and Continuing Education on indefinite tenure, on two-thirds time on an academic year service basis, Director of the Curriculum Laboratory in the College of Education and at University High School on one-third time for two years beginning September 1, 1965, on a twelve months' service basis at an annual salary of \$21,750.

WILFRED L. SHOEMAKER, presently Associate Professor of Educational Psychology and Acting Principal of University High School, as Associate Professor of Educational Psychology on indefinite tenure and Principal of University High School for two years from September 1, 1965, at an annual salary of \$13,700 on a twelve months' service basis. (Dr. Shoemaker, who has been serving as Acting Principal, will succeed Dr. David M. Jackson, who is now Associate Dean for Administration of the College of Education.)

The Executive Vice-President and Provost concurs in these administrative changes and appointments. I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, these recommendations were approved.

DIRECTOR OF COORDINATED SCIENCE LABORATORY

(2) The Dean of the College of Engineering recommends the appointment of Dr. W. Dale Compton as Professor of Physics on indefinite tenure and Director of the Coordinated Science Laboratory for two years from September 1, 1965, at an annual salary of \$18,500 on a twelve months' service basis.

This appointment is to fill the vacancy created by the appointment of Dr. Daniel Alpert, the retiring Director, as Dean of the Graduate College beginning September 1. The recommendation for this appointment was made upon nomination by a search committee and after consultation with all members of the Laboratory staff with the rank of Engineer or Assistant Professor and above. The Executive Vice-President and Provost and the Acting Dean of the Graduate College also support this appointment.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this appointment was approved.

CHAIRMANSHIP OF DEPARTMENT OF ART AT CHICAGO CIRCLE

(3) The Dean of the College of Architecture and Art and the Vice-President at Chicago Circle recommend the appointment of Alfred P. Maurice, Director of the Art Center, Kalamazoo Institute of Art, Kalamazoo, Michigan, as Professor of Art on indefinite tenure, and Chairman of the Department of Art for two years from September 1, 1965, at an annual salary of \$15,000, on an academic year service basis. He will succeed Professor John E. Walley who has asked to be relieved of the administrative duties as Chairman, but who will continue on the faculty as Professor of Art.

The nomination of Professor Maurice for this appointment was initiated by a search committee and is supported by the executive committees of the Department and the College. All members of the Department of professorial rank have also been consulted. The Executive Vice-President and Provost and the Dean of the Graduate College concur.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this appointment was approved.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY

(4) The following new appointments to the faculty of the rank of Assistant Professor and above, and involving tenure, have been approved since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees.

It is further recommended that all contracts other than the general contract be assigned to the contractor for general work, making the total of his contract \$216,369; and that an agreement be entered into with Carroll Construction Company, Inc., for the assignment of these other contracts for \$3,977, which amount is included in the contract price, being the amount bid by that firm for service charge for supervising of other contracts assigned to the general contractor.

CONTRACT FOR DIVERSION OF UNDERGROUND ELECTRICAL SERVICES IN KRANNERT CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS AREA

(7) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$23,950 to Champaign Asphalt Company, Champaign, Illinois, for construction of underground duct runs and manholes for electrical services to be diverted around the area of the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts site.

Costs will be financed temporarily from the Stores and Services Trust Account and will be reimbursed when permanent financing is available.

**AGREEMENT WITH CITIES OF CHAMPAIGN AND URBANA FOR
CONSTRUCTION OF A SIDEWALK ON THE SOUTH SIDE
OF FLORIDA AVENUE**

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of agreements with the cities of Champaign and Urbana for construction by them of a sidewalk in the right-of-way on the south side of Florida Avenue between Fourth Street and Lincoln Avenue in conjunction with the paving of Florida Avenue. In taking bids on the widening and paving of Florida Avenue in this area, the cities received alternate bids for construction of the sidewalk, which, based on the quantities listed and the unit prices quoted by the lowest bidder, is estimated at \$18,500. The total cost including construction of the walk, fencing of golf course, adjustments of golf greens, and landscaping restoration is estimated at \$28,500. The University will reimburse the cities for the actual cost of the sidewalk construction.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University for 1965-67 subject to approval by the Governor.

CONTRACT FOR INTERIOR DECORATING SERVICES

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend employment of Mrs. Florence Korff, Champaign, for interior decorating consulting services from October 1, 1965, through September 30, 1966, at a fee based on the time of Mrs. Korff and her personnel while on University work, plus 50 per cent of Mrs. Korff's and her assistant's time for overhead and profit; provided that the maximum cost will not exceed \$20,000 unless approved by the University in advance.

The services will be used primarily in residence halls with miscellaneous consultations in other departments, including the Illini Union.

Funds will be available from the budgets for the projects on which the services are used.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was approved.

AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT FOR CHICAGO CIRCLE CAMPUS SITE

(10) The University's contract with the city of Chicago for acquisition of the land for Chicago Circle campus does not contain a provision authorizing the University to transfer jurisdiction of any part of the site to the Illinois Building Authority for the purposes and uses set forth in the Illinois Building Authority Act. It is anticipated that Phase II of the construction at the Chicago Circle campus will be financed by the Illinois Building Authority. Accordingly, the Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of an amendment of the University's contract with the city of Chicago for the acquisition of land for the Chicago Circle campus to provide that the University may, with the prior written approval of the Department of Urban Renewal of the city of Chicago, transfer jurisdiction of the property, or any part thereof, to the Illinois Building Authority in accordance with and for the purposes and uses set forth in the Illinois Building Authority Act.

**ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION
OF MATERIALS RESEARCH LABORATORY**

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend an increase of \$15,763.45 in the contract with Johnson, Drake, & Piper, Incorporated, Terre Haute, Indiana, for construction of the Materials Research Laboratory for additional work requested by the Department of Physics

for the cryogenics area (low temperature research), including mechanical, electrical, and pipe insulation.

Funds are available in the construction budget.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this change in contract was authorized.

PURCHASES

(12) The President submitted a report of purchases authorized by his office, on recommendation of the Director of Purchases and the Vice-President and Comptroller. He also presented a list of purchases recommended by him.

The reports of purchases authorized and purchases recommended for Board approval were presented in two categories: purchases from appropriated funds (i.e., from state appropriations to the University) and purchases from institutional funds. The latter term designates funds received by the University under contracts with the United States government, contracts with private corporations and other organizations, funds from foundation grants and grants from corporations and other donors, and University revolving funds authorized by law.

A complete list of the purchases authorized and the purchases recommended, with supporting information, including the quotations received, was sent to each member of the Board in advance of the meeting, and a copy is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the President's approval of purchases was confirmed and purchases he recommended were authorized.

EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS AND ENGINEERS

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend authorization of contracts for architectural and engineering services for the following building projects:

Office of Nonacademic Personnel Building—Lankton-Ziegele-Terry and Associates, Peoria, for complete architectural services, except for field supervision which will be provided by the University, at a total fee of 5¼ per cent of construction costs.

Funds are available in state capital appropriations to the University from the Universities Building Fund, subject to approval by the Governor.

Optical Telescope Building—Collins and Rice, Springfield, Illinois, at a fee based on Schedule B of minimum fees for professional services adopted by the Illinois Society of Professional Engineering.

Funds are available from Research Contract Reserves.

These recommendations have been considered and approved by the Advisory Committee on Selection of Architects and Engineers and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation, and assignment of funds for these contracts, was approved by the following vote: Aye. Mr. Clement, Mr. Johnston, Mrs. Watkins; no, none; absent, none.

APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTOR OF NONACADEMIC PERSONNEL

(14) Dr. Arlyn C. Marks, who has been serving in the dual capacity of Director of Nonacademic Personnel for the University on three-fourths time and Director of the University Civil Service System of Illinois for the Merit Board on one-fourth time, has been appointed Director of the University Civil Service System of Illinois on full time beginning September 1, 1965.

To fill this vacancy, I recommend the appointment of Oscar S. Smith, presently Director of Industrial Relations for the Atomic Energy Commission, as Director of Nonacademic Personnel beginning October 18, 1965, and continuing until August 31, 1967, at an annual salary of \$25,000 on a twelve months' service basis.

This recommendation is submitted after consultation with the appropriate officers in the central administration. Mr. Smith's commitments in his present position would make it very difficult for him to assume his responsibilities at the University at the beginning of the academic year in September, and I request authority to change the effective date of the appointment indicated in this recommendation if that becomes necessary.

HEADSHIP OF DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTANCY

(15) The Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration recommends the appointment of Dr. E. Joe DeMaris, presently Professor of Accountancy and of Industrial Administration and also currently serving as Head of the Department of Industrial Administration and as Acting Head of the Department of Business Education in the College, as Professor of Accountancy on indefinite tenure and Head of the Department of Accountancy beginning September 1, 1965, at an annual salary of \$16,800 on an academic year service basis.

Professor DeMaris will succeed Professor Cecil A. Moyer who has been serving as Head of the Department for many years, and who has asked to be relieved of this administrative assignment so that he can devote full time to teaching and research. The nomination of Professor DeMaris for the headship was submitted after consultation with all members of the Department of professorial rank.

Professor DeMaris will continue to serve as Acting Head of the Department of Business Education until a permanent head has been appointed but will relinquish the Headship of the Department of Industrial Administration. An Acting Head will be appointed for that Department.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this appointment was approved.

LITIGATION INSTITUTED BY LAURENCE E. KIRBY AND EVA L. KIRBY

(16) Laurence E. and Eva L. Kirby have filed suit against the University in the Circuit Court of Champaign County (No. 65 C 370) in which they allege that their property at 36 East Armory, Champaign, Illinois, has been damaged and the usefulness and value of the property as a residence has been impaired by steam and water vapor emitted by certain cooling towers at the Abbott Power Plant. The complaint seeks an injunction which would restrain the University from maintaining or using the cooling towers and asks damages in the sum of \$20,000.

The Legal Counsel states that in his opinion the University should resist the claim and the relief sought. The Vice-President and Comptroller, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Legal Counsel recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the Legal Counsel to take appropriate action to oppose the suit in all respects, and to employ such special legal counsel as he may deem it necessary or appropriate to assist him in connection therewith.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was approved and authority was given as requested.

RECESS AND EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Chairman announced that an executive session was being ordered for consideration of property acquisitions and that this session would be held immediately after a brief recess.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the Committee recessed.

When the Committee reconvened in executive session, with the same members, officers of the Board, and University officers present, the Committee considered the following matters of business presented, on behalf of the President of the University, by the Director of the Physical Plant.

**PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 1114 WEST NEVADA STREET,
URBANA, ILLINOIS**

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees request the University of Illinois Foundation to purchase the property at 1114 West Nevada Street, Urbana, Illinois, at a price of \$125,000, and lease it to the University at a rental rate adequate to pay the interest on a bank loan to the Foundation to finance purchase of the property until such time as funds become available for the purchase by the University.

The land is required as part of the site for a new building for the School of Music.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this recommendation was approved by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Clement, Mr. Johnston, Mrs. Watkins; no, none; absent, none.

VACATION OF CALIFORNIA AVENUE BY THE CITY OF URBANA

(18) The Committee on Buildings and Grounds of the Board of Trustees has recommended payment to the city of Urbana of \$159,620, which has been requested by the city, for the vacation of California Avenue between Goodwin Avenue and Gregory Place. Such vacation by the city would have the effect of vesting in the adjacent property owners, the University, and the University of Illinois Foundation, title to the areas vacated.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposal to the city for vacation of the California Avenue right-of-way and authorize a payment of \$159,620 to the city after the vacation ordinance is passed and the University has acquired title to all adjacent properties.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University for the 1965-67 biennium, subject to approval by the Governor.

I concur.

**PURCHASE OF CRUSE FARM FOR COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE,
AGRONOMY RESEARCH FARM**

(19) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller report that consistent with action taken by the Board at its meeting on May 19, 1965, with reference to acquisition of the Cruse Farm, further negotiations have resulted in an offer from the owner to sell the farm at a price of \$3,050 per acre. This price is within acquisition authority given by the Board at its May 19, 1965, meeting.

Based on this authority, the University of Illinois Foundation is being requested to complete the purchase arrangements for the property and lease it to the University.

This is reported to the Board for record.

There being no further business, on motion of Mrs. Watkins, the Committee adjourned.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

September 2, 1965

On call of the Chairman, a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Center, LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on Thursday, September 2, 1965, beginning at 1:00 p.m.

The following, constituting all members of the Executive Committee, were present: Mr. Howard W. Clement, Chairman; Mr. Wayne A. Johnston, and Mrs. Frances B. Watkins.

Also present were Vice-President and Comptroller Herbert O. Farber; Mr. Norman A. Parker, Vice-President, Chicago Circle Campus; Mr. Charles S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant; Mr. James J. Costello, Legal Counsel; Mr. George H. Bargh, Administrative Assistant to the President; Mr. Grover E. Shipton, Associate Director of Public Information, Chicago Circle; and Mr. Earl W. Porter, Associate Secretary.

The Committee considered the following recommendation presented by the Vice-President and Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant, and took the action indicated.

LEASES FOR THE ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY FOR PROJECTS AT CHICAGO CIRCLE CAMPUS

The Seventy-fourth General Assembly declared the following buildings and projects at the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle to be in the public interest, thereby indicating the funding of these projects could be accomplished by the Illinois Building Authority.

Construct two classroom buildings.....	\$ 1 347 500

Said declaration also provides that the cost of any specific project could exceed the amount set forth therefore so long as the aggregate amount stated therein to be financed by the Authority for the University is not exceeded.

The Illinois Building Authority Act contemplates that a transfer of jurisdiction of the property on which the projects are to be constructed will be made to the Authority, and that lease agreements between the Authority and the University will be executed providing for the construction of the above projects by the Authority and their use by the University. The annual rental under the lease agreements for the foregoing projects will not exceed \$1,956,350, and funds for the payment of such rental to the Authority during the current biennium are available from state appropriations to the University.

In accordance with established procedures, the University received bids on August 26, 1965, in Divisions II through VI of all of the foregoing projects except the Heating Plant Addition. These bids were considered to be excessive in the light of previous estimates and available funds, and were rejected on August 27, 1965, as authorized by Section 15(e) of the General Rules Concerning University Organization and Procedure. Additionally, the date for receipt and opening of bids on Division I (General Work) for the projects was postponed from September 2, 1965, until further notice.

The Vice-President and Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant recommend the adoption of the following resolution authorizing the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute and deliver the necessary leases and other documents between the University and the Illinois Building Authority to accomplish the aforesaid purposes with respect to the above projects. By reason of the experience on the bids received on August 26, 1965, and subsequently rejected by the University, the resolution also includes a request that the Illinois Building Authority take new bids for the above-described projects.

The President of the University concurs.

Resolution

WHEREAS the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois created by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, is empowered to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, complete, remodel, maintain and equip any and all buildings and other facilities as the General Assembly by law declares to be in the public interest; and

WHEREAS in accordance with the Illinois Building Authority Act the 74th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has declared the following University of Illinois projects at the Chicago Circle Campus to be in the public interest:

WHEREAS The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, will be requested by the Illinois Building Authority to enter into leases, transfer jurisdiction of real estate and take other actions to carry out and complete the above projects in accordance with the Illinois Building Authority Act;

Now, therefore, be it and it is hereby resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, acting through its Executive Committee, as follows:

Section 1. That the Illinois Building Authority be and it hereby is requested to take bids for and provide the foregoing projects and facilities at the Chicago Circle Campus and to lease the same to the University of Illinois as provided in the Illinois Building Authority Act.

Section 2. That the Comptroller and Secretary of this Board of Trustees be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and on behalf of this corporation such instruments of lease, contract, and other documents as are necessary or appropriate in order to provide for the carrying out of the foregoing projects and facilities by the Illinois Building Authority, the annual rentals under such leases not to exceed \$1,956,350 in the aggregate.

MODIFICATION OF POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(4) On July 21, 1965, the Board of Trustees approved in principle changes in the University's "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees" effective July 1, 1965 in order to incorporate the substance of amendments made by the Merit Board of the University Civil Service System of Illinois on June 16, 1965, in its "Policy Relating to Employee Benefits." Under the column headed "Proposed Wording" in the accompanying text of the revisions are restatements of Sections VII, VIII, and IX of the University's "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees" which revises those Sections to incorporate the July 21, 1965, Board action. I now recommend adoption of the same by the Board of Trustees.

Revisions of Sections VII, VIII, and IX of Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees

Note: The present statement of the "Policy and Rules" appears on the left in the pages below; the proposed statement appears on the right. Material to be deleted is indicated in the present statement by brackets. Material to be added is indicated in the proposed statement by italics.

Present Wording

VII. VACATIONS

1. Vacations are granted only to permanent and continuous employees who complete not less than six [consecutive] months of service.

Proposed Wording

VII. VACATIONS

1. Vacations are granted only to permanent and continuous employees who complete not less than six months of *continuous* service.

Present Wording

A. During the first year of service a proportionate part of the annual vacation will be granted based on the months of service of the employee completed to the date of vacation, subject to completion of not less than six [consecutive] months of service. In each succeeding year the employee will receive the annual vacation as set forth below. In the year in which the employee leaves the service of the University for any reason, including death, a proportionate part of annual vacation will again be granted.

B. Annual vacations may be taken during a one-year period extending from three months prior to the end of a full year of service to nine months after the end of a full year of service. Vacations shall not be cumulative but may be deferred at the request of the department or the employee with the concurrence of the department. Such deferred vacations shall be taken within the next succeeding twelve-month period. Extra-pay in lieu of vacation will not be allowed. An employee's preference as to time of vacation will be considered but the University reserves the right to assign vacation periods. Holidays recognized by the University are not counted as a part of a vacation.

C. A part-time continuous employee will receive the annual vacation provided for his class[ification] at his usual pay. (For example, a person employed half-time in a position in which two weeks is the annual vacation allowance will be granted two weeks vacation at a salary based upon half-time.)

2. The University recognizes vacation plans, as follows:

A. For all employees in their first year of service:

1. No vacation shall be available for employees with less than six months of service, but at the end of six months of employment, one half of the first year's vacation as listed in B-1 and 2 shall be considered as earned and available, and the fractional amount of the first year's vacation shall be available thereafter in proportion to the fraction of the year worked.

B. For all employees in the second and succeeding years of service:

Proposed Wording

A. During the first year of service a proportionate part of the annual vacation will be granted based on the months of service of the employee completed to the date of vacation, subject to completion of not less than six months of *continuous* service. In each succeeding year the employee will receive the annual vacation as set forth below. In the year in which the employee leaves the service of the University for any reason, including death, a proportionate part of annual vacation will again be granted.

B. Annual vacations may be taken during a one-year period extending from three months prior to the end of a full year of service to nine months after the end of a full year of service. Vacations shall not be cumulative but may be deferred at the request of the department or the employee with the concurrence of the department. Such deferred vacations shall be taken within the next succeeding twelve-month period. Extra pay in lieu of vacation will not be allowed *unless the request is approved by the President of the University*. An employee's preference as to time of vacation will be considered but the University reserves the right to assign vacation periods. Holidays recognized by the University are not counted as a part of a vacation.

C. A part-time continuous employee will receive the annual vacation provided for his class at his usual pay. (For example, a person employed half-time in a position in which two weeks is the annual vacation allowance will be granted two weeks vacation at a salary based upon half-time.)

2. The University recognizes vacation plans, as follows:

A. For all employees in their first year of service:

1. No vacation shall be available for employees with less than six months of service, but at the end of six months of employment, one half of the first year's vacation as listed in B-1 and 2 shall be considered as earned and available, and the fractional amount of the first year's vacation shall be available thereafter in proportion to the fraction of the year worked.

B. For all employees in the second and succeeding years of service:

Present Wording

1. For all employees having an established basic work week with additional compensation for overtime beyond that work week:

- a. For those employees with less than ten years of service: Vacation shall be two work weeks in each year in service.
- b. For those employees with ten or more years of service: Vacation shall be three work weeks in each year of service.

2. When an employee whose vacation rights have been converted to a July 1 anniversary date completes ten [full] years of [employment as determined by the date of original employment], he should at that time have credited to him additional vacation based upon the months or fractions thereof remaining before the succeeding July.

3. For all employees in administrative and professional classifications of upper level responsibility as approved by the Merit Board, for whom no fixed or rigid daily and weekly schedule is provided, and the discharge of whose duties usually requires a certain amount of flexibility in such schedule, and for whom no provision is made for the payment of overtime worked except when such overtime is in an excessive amount, one month in each year of service.

VIII. DISABILITY BENEFITS

1. Disability arising out of and in the course of employment:

A. Employees who suffer disability arising out of and in the course of their employment will receive compensation as determined by the University Committee on Accident Compensation [for Employees] in accordance with the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act.

B. Such employees may elect to use portions of allowances for disability provided under sub-section 2 hereof

Proposed Wording

1. For all employees having an established basic work week with additional compensation for overtime beyond that work week:

- a. For those employees with less than ten years (120 months) of continuous service: Vacation shall be two work weeks in each year of service.
- b. For those employees with ten or more but less than twenty years (240 months) of continuous service: Vacation shall be three work weeks in each year of service.
- c. For those employees with twenty or more years of continuous service: Vacation shall be four work weeks in each year of service.

2. When an employee whose vacation rights have been converted to a July 1 anniversary date completes ten or twenty years of continuous service, he should at that time have credited to him additional vacation based upon the months or fractions thereof remaining before the succeeding July.

3. For all employees in administrative and professional classifications of upper level responsibility as approved by the Merit Board, for whom no fixed or rigid daily and weekly schedule is provided, and the discharge of whose duties usually requires a certain amount of flexibility in such schedule, and for whom no provision is made for the payment of overtime worked, except when such overtime is in an excessive amount, one month in each year of service.

VIII. DISABILITY BENEFITS

1. Disability arising out of and in the course of employment:

A. Employees who suffer disability arising out of and in the course of their employment will receive compensation as determined by the University Committee on Accident Compensation in accordance with the provisions of the Workman's Compensation Act.

B. Such employees may elect to use portions of allowances for disability provided under sub-section 2 hereof

to supplement payments made under the Workmen's Compensation Act, provided that in no case during a period of disability shall total payments exceed the full compensation paid the individual at the time the disability occurred.

C. An employee entitled to disability benefits under the University Retirement System of Illinois may receive from that System only the difference between the benefits available from the Retirement System and the amount paid in accordance with the Workmen's Compensation Act for loss of time.

2. Disability from any cause not arising out of and in the course of employment:

A. Each employee shall accumulate disability leave with full pay at the rate of one working day for each month of service. Amount of leave accumulated at the time when any disability begins shall be available in full and additional leave shall continue to be earned while an employee is using that already accumulated. There shall be no limit in the amount which may be accumulated.

[B. Disability leave may be used when it is necessary for an employee to be absent from work because of an emergency illness in his immediate household or family.]

[C.] If an employee elects to receive disability benefits under the University Retirement System of Illinois before he has exhausted his disability leave, he will receive no payments from the University of Illinois during the period that disability benefits are received from said Retirement System.

3. Other disability benefits:

A. Persons under University Retirement System:

1. Disability benefits from the System are payable to any participant for mental or physical disability arising from any cause other than pregnancy or childbirth as a result of which the individual is unable to perform the duties of his position. Benefits begin sixty days after the beginning of the disability, provided an application has been filed and salary is suspended. Benefits amount to 50 per cent of the earnings at the time disability occurred [subject to a

to supplement payments made under the Workmen's Compensation Act, provided that in no case during a period of disability shall total payments exceed the full compensation paid the individual at the time the disability occurred.

C. An employee entitled to disability benefits under the State Universities Retirement System may receive from that System only the difference between the benefits available from the Retirement System and the amount paid in accordance with the Workmen's Compensation Act for loss of time.

2. Disability from any cause not arising out of and in the course of employment:

A. Each Employee shall accumulate disability leave with full pay at the rate of one working day for each month of service. Amount of leave accumulated at the time when any disability begins shall be available in full and additional leave shall continue to be earned while an employee is using that already accumulated. There shall be no limit in the amount which may be accumulated.

B. If an employee elects to receive disability benefits under the State Universities Retirement System before he has exhausted his disability leave, he will receive no payments from the University of Illinois during the period that disability benefits are received from said Retirement System.

3. Other disability benefits:

A. Persons under State Universities Retirement System:

1. Disability benefits from the System are payable to any participant for mental or physical disability arising from any cause other than pregnancy or childbirth as a result of which the individual is unable to perform the duties of his position. Benefits begin sixty days after the beginning of the disability, provided an application has been filed and salary is suspended. Benefits amount to 50 per cent of the basic compensation at the time disability occurred and

maximum of \$4,500,] and continue during disability until the total paid is 50 per cent of the total earnings during service credited in the Retirement System. No disability benefits are payable by the System [during the first five years as a participating employee if the disability is a result of a mental or physical condition which existed when the first medical examination was given for permanent and continuous employment.]

4. The University reserves the right to require acceptable evidence of disability before allowing any disability benefits whatsoever.

IX. LEAVES OF ABSENCE

Proposed Wording

continue during disability until the total paid is 50 per cent of the total earnings during service credited in the Retirement System or until September 1 following the participant's sixty-eighth birthday. No disability benefits are payable by the System for any disability which begins prior to the completion of two years of service unless the disability is caused by an accident.

4. The University reserves the right to require acceptable evidence of disability before allowing any disability benefits whatsoever.

IX. LEAVES OF ABSENCE

1. Funeral leave:

A. Approval, with pay, will be granted for a leave of up to three days for the funeral of a member of the immediate family or household, and for one day for the funeral of a relative outside the immediate family or household.

B. Leaves, for purposes noted in 1, above, but beyond these amounts, may be approved under special circumstances.

2. Personal leave:

A. Personal leave is granted only to permanent and continuous employees.

B. For all employees with continuous service, personal leave with full pay shall be granted as follows:

1. In each of the first three years of service, two days of personal leave; provided, however, that if employment is terminated for any reason before the completion of six months of service, no personal leave shall be considered earned, and the University may recover its costs for any personal leave already taken by such employee, either by withholding from any salary or wages due such employee or in any other manner.

2. In each of the fourth, fifth, and sixth years of service, three days of personal leave.

3. In each of the seventh, eighth, and ninth years of service, four days of personal leave.

4. In the tenth year of service and thereafter, five days of personal leave in each year of service.

C. Personal leave will be granted to

1. Leaves of absence without pay for reasons other than disability [as covered in section VIII,] may be granted by the University through the Director of Nonacademic Personnel when in his judgment the recommendations are rea-

Proposed Wording

the extent that credits for personal leave are available and can be used by an employee at any time and for any reason, subject to approval by the employing department in advance of the date of such personal leave, except in those situations where the need for such leave is occasioned by factors beyond the control of the employee arising too suddenly to permit the securing of advance approval and the department is willing to waive this requirement. In determining whether the department will give such approval, it will take into account staffing requirements to insure necessary continuity of operations.

D. When an employee whose personal leave rights have been converted to a July 1 anniversary date completes three, six or nine years of continuous service, he should at that time have credited to him additional personal leave based on the months or fractions thereof remaining before the succeeding July. Calculations of the amounts of personal leave earned on a pro rata basis shall be in units of one-half day, one-quarter of a day or more being considered a half day, and less than one-quarter of a day being disregarded.

E. Such personal leave shall be used in the year in which it becomes available and shall not be cumulative nor available beyond six months following the year in which it is earned. Such personal leave may be used during the eighteen-month period prescribed, but failure of the employee to complete a full year of service shall result in adjustment of terminal compensation if he has used more personal leave than he has earned on a pro rata basis on date of termination.

F. Any holidays other than those approved in Section VI, HOLIDAYS, or gift days other than those related to Christmas Day, which might be granted by the President or the Board of Trustees will automatically reduce the number of personal leave days available.

3. Other leaves:

A. Leaves of absence without pay for reasons other than disability, funeral, or personal leave, as set forth above, may be granted by the University through the Director of Nonacademic Personnel when in his

sonable and have the approval of the supervisor of the employee.

[2.] Leaves of absence with pay on account of death or illness of relatives may be granted by the Director of Non-academic Personnel to the extent considered reasonable and necessary in each case, taking into consideration length of service, condition of work in the department, previous leave granted the employee, and recommendation of department head. Such leaves when granted shall be charged against the employee's annual disability leave in accordance with section VIII 2-A, unless otherwise approved by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel.]

[3.] Leaves of absence for jury or witness service shall be granted when employees are called for such service. Pay for such leaves will be computed as the difference between the amount paid for the service and the regular full-time salary or wage of the person on such leave.

[4.] Leaves of absence with full pay will be granted to all permanent and continuous employees who are officers or enlisted men in the Illinois National Guard, the Illinois Naval Militia, or the reserve components of the Armed Forces for limited service in field training, cruises, and kindred recurring obligations. The length of such leave shall not exceed the standards established by federal and state agencies for training activities needed to qualify for regular standing in the above branches of the Armed Forces. Such leave will normally be limited to a maximum of fifteen calendar days in each year.

[5.] Leaves of absence without pay for service in the armed forces of the United States shall be granted when an employee enlists in or is inducted into such service. Such an employee will be restored to his former position, or, at the discretion of the University, to one of similar requirements and compensation, if: his discharge is under conditions other than dishonorable; he requests re-employment within ninety days after his discharge; he is qualified to perform the duties of his position. If, as result of service in the armed forces, he is not physically or mentally qualified to perform the duties of any such position, the University will offer him employment in a position which his physi-

judgment the recommendations are reasonable and have the approval of the supervisor of the employee.

B. Leaves of absence for jury or witness service shall be granted when employees are called for such service. Pay for such leaves will be computed as the difference between the amount paid for the service and the regular full-time salary or wage of the person on such leave.

C. Leaves of absence with full pay will be granted to all permanent and continuous employees who are officers or enlisted men in the Illinois National Guard, the Illinois Naval Militia, or the reserve components of the Armed Forces for limited service in field training, cruises, and kindred recurring obligations. The length of such leave shall not exceed the standards established by federal and state agencies for training activities needed to qualify for regular standing in the above branches of the Armed Forces. Such leave will normally be limited to a maximum of fifteen calendar days in each year.

D. Leaves of absence without pay for service in the armed forces of the United States shall be granted when an employee enlists in or is inducted into such service. Such an employee will be restored to his former position, or, at the discretion of the University, to one of similar requirements and compensation, if: his discharge is under conditions other than dishonorable; he requests re-employment within ninety days after his discharge; he is qualified to perform the duties of his position. If, as a result of service in the armed forces, he is not physically or mentally qualified to perform the duties of any such position, the University

cal and mental condition permits him to perform, at the rate of compensation provided for that position.

[6.] Leaves of absence for other approved work may be granted on request by the President of the University and extended at his discretion. A person receiving such a leave will have the right to return to his former position at the termination of his leave provided he is in a satisfactory physical and mental condition to resume the duties of the position, and provided the position has been continued during his absence. If the position has been discontinued the person on leave will be eligible to appointment to any position in his classification which becomes vacant at or subsequent to his return.

EASEMENTS TO ILLINOIS POWER COMPANY

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend granting easements across the following lands to the Illinois Power Company for gas main and other installations.

A strip of land 40 feet wide by approximately 80 rods on the east side of First Street starting at the AT&T Road and running north. The Company will pay \$160 for this easement which will serve the new Swine Farm and private properties along First Street.

A strip of land 30 feet wide starting at the intersection of the AT&T Road and south Race Street and running north to Windsor Road thence west to Lincoln Avenue. The Company will pay \$1,440 for this easement which is part of the long-range program of expansion of the gas distribution system for the Champaign-Urbana area.

A strip of land Forty (40) feet in width over, across and through that part of the Southeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of Section 18, Township 14 North, Range 3 West of the Fourth Principal Meridian described as follows: Beginning on the Northerly right-of-way line of State Route 17, which extends East and West along the South side of said Quarter Quarter Section, at a point 2 chains and 5 links North of the Southeast corner thereof, thence North 9 chains and 89 links along the East line of said Section 18; thence West 19 chains and 22 links; thence South 10 chains and 89 links to the said Northerly right-of-way line; thence Easterly and along said Northerly right-of-way line 19 chains and 31 links to the point of beginning; the center line of said 40-foot strip being described as follows: Beginning on the West line of the above described tract of land at a point 1 foot North of the said Northerly right-of-way line; thence extending Southeasterly a distance of approximately 270 feet to a point of exit on the Southerly right-of-way line of said State Route 17;

Subject To: the rights of the public in and to the right-of-way of State Route 17.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, this resolution was adopted.

ASSIGNMENT OF ARCHITECTURAL AND ENGINEERING CONTRACTS TO THE ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board authorize negotiation and completion of assignments to the Illinois Building Authority of the following engineering and architectural contracts previously approved by the Board for projects which have since been declared by the Seventy-fourth General Assembly to be in the public interest and eligible for financing by the Illinois Building Authority, the terms of such assignments to be consistent with the provisions of the Illinois Building Authority Act, as amended:

ASSIGNMENT OF CONTRACT FOR LECTURE ROOM SEATING

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend approval of an assignment from Chicago Seating Company, Downers Grove, to Ideal Seating Company, Grand Rapids, Michigan, of all rights and duties under the contract awarded by the Board of Trustees on April 23, 1965, to Chicago Seating Company, for furnishing and installing new seats in Lecture Rooms 221 and 423 of the first unit of the Dentistry-Medicine-Pharmacy Building at the Medical Center. The amount of the contract to be assigned is \$18,480.

Bankruptcy proceedings are pending against the Chicago Seating Company, and their seating manufacturer, Ideal Seating Company, has agreed to accept the assignment of the contract for seating to it stating that it will meet all of the contract requirements. The assignment has been agreed to by the Trustees in Bankruptcy for the Chicago Seating Company and a Court Order has been issued approving such assignment.

The installation of resilient flooring and new seating will be delayed until June of 1966, since the Lecture Rooms are in heavy use during the school year. Both the Gateway Floor Corporation (the contractor for resilient flooring) and the Ideal Seating Company have agreed to the revised period for installation without any increase in the contract price.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this assignment was authorized.

EMPLOYMENT OF ENGINEERS FOR REROUTING UTILITIES FROM UNDERGRADUATE LIBRARY SITE

(11) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend employment of the following firms for engineering services, including design and preparation of bid documents, for the rerouting of existing electric utilities, water mains, storm and sanitary sewers to clear the site for the proposed Undergraduate Library.

Rerouting of Electric Utility — Sargent & Lundy, Chicago

The fee to be based on engineering and drafting services at actual salary and wages, travel expenses and miscellaneous expenses at actual cost and 50 per cent of the stenographic and clerical services and in addition a fixed fee charge of 2 per cent of the mutually agreed estimate of the cost of the project to completion, exclusive of charges included above and the University's engineering, supervisory, and overhead costs. If a resident field engineer is requested the service will be billed at actual salary plus 15 per cent, plus traveling and field expenses.

Rerouting Water Mains, Storm and Sanitary Sewers — Wilson & Anderson, Champaign

The fee will be based on "Schedule A" of the minimum fees adopted by the Illinois Society of Professional Engineers.

Costs will be financed temporarily from the Stores and Services Trust Account and will be reimbursed when permanent financing is available.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was approved.

REQUEST FOR TERMINATION OF ADVANCE OF FEDERAL FUNDS FOR PREPARATION OF PLANS FOR NURSES' HOME AND SCHOOL BUILDING

(12) Pursuant to authority granted by the Board of Trustees on December 28, 1946, the Comptroller requested an advance of \$60,300 from the Bureau of Community Facilities of the Federal Works Agency for the preparation of plans and specifications for the construction of a nurses' home and school building located at the Medical Center campus.

An agreement was executed on March 20, 1947, with the Bureau of Community Facilities for an amount of \$56,000. This agreement stipulated that the funds advanced would be repayable to the federal government whenever the University would undertake construction of the project for which the funds were advanced.

Plans were completed by the architectural firm of Perkins & Will on March 15, 1949, at a total cost of \$54,871.25. The difference of \$1,128.75 was returned to the Bureau of Community Facilities in 1953.

The University of Illinois requested but did not receive funds from the General Assembly to construct this project in the 1947-49, 1949-51, and 1951-53 bienniums. Because funds were not provided for the construction of this project, the plans, specifications, and program contemplated in 1946 have become totally obsolete.

Congress in 1964 amended the Housing Act to provide for the termination of liabilities for the repayment of advances where there is no reasonable likelihood that the public works planned would be constructed.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller

recommend that the Board adopt the following resolution which requests the termination of the liability for repayment of the advance as well as the termination of the agreement under which this advance was made by the federal government.

I concur.

Resolution of Governing Body of Applicant

WHEREAS, the United States of America has heretofore made an advance, pursuant to an agreement dated March 20, 1947, to The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois in the amount of \$54,871.25 for the purpose of plan preparation of the public work described in the agreement as a "building to house nurses including single and double rooms and necessary appurtenant facilities," and,

WHEREAS, by the use of the Federal advance The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois caused to be prepared plans and specifications for the public work described in the aforesaid agreement, and

WHEREAS, no construction has been undertaken of the project or any portion thereof described in the aforesaid agreement dated as of the 20th day of March, 1947, and

WHEREAS, there is no reasonable likelihood, of the planned project or any portion thereof being undertaken because of the obsolescence of plans and specifications as well as basic changes in techniques, principles, and methods of teaching nursing.

Now therefore, be it resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that as there is no reasonable likelihood of the project or any portion thereof as planned with the Federal advance ever being placed under construction for the reasons set forth above, the Housing and Home Finance Administrator be requested to make a determination that the agreement dated on the 20th day of March, 1947, be terminated and that The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be relieved of all liability thereunder.

This Resolution is adopted pursuant to the authority provided by an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois approved February 28, 1867, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Organization and Maintenance of the University of Illinois", as amended.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the foregoing resolution was adopted.

CONTRACT WITH GREAT PLAINS INSTRUCTIONAL TELEVISION LIBRARY TO DISTRIBUTE THE VIDEOTAPES OF INSTRUCTION FOR GIFTED CHILDREN

(13) The University's Office of Instructional Resources is completing a research and development contract with the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the preparation and testing of three videotaped series of twelve lessons each in astronomy, mathematics, and geography for fifth- and sixth-grade gifted children.

The Great Plains Instructional Television Library, Lincoln, Nebraska, wishes to distribute these tapes nationally to educational television stations for use in the schools. The Great Plains Instructional Television Library is an organization established by grants from the United States Office of Education at the University of Nebraska for evaluating, publicizing, and distributing instructional television programs. It is a nonprofit organization operated under policies established by a public board composed of educators.

Programs are reproduced and rented by the Library to educational stations at varying prices depending upon the number of children served. Under the proposed contract with the Library, the University of Illinois would receive \$15 for each use of each individual lesson, the standard reimbursement established by the Library's Directors.

The Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction approves of this arrangement provided that the contract permits free distribution within Illinois, which it does. The instructors concerned have given their release.

This arrangement appears to be in the interest of the educational community and of the University to make available educational materials which have been reviewed and found worthy of national distribution.

The Executive Vice-President and Provost, the Vice-President and Comptroller, and the Legal Counsel recommend that the contract be approved.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this contract was authorized.

AMERICAN UNIVERSITY PUBLISHERS GROUP

(14) The Director of the University Press and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that authority be granted for the incorporation by the University of a private limited liability company in the United Kingdom with nominal capital of 100 pounds; that special counsel be employed to set up such corporation; and that authority be granted for this company to participate with the companies formed by the presses of other institutions of higher education for the purpose of carrying on their business activities in the United Kingdom and Europe.

Each member press will commit itself to share in the operating expenses of an office in Britain, estimated at \$3,500 to \$4,000 annually. Funds for such a contribution are available to the University of Illinois Press from operating income.

A supporting statement prepared by the Director of the University Press is submitted herewith and will be filed with the Secretary of the Board for record. I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was approved, and authority was given as requested.

STATE LEGISLATION AFFECTING THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, 1965

(15) A list of the Acts of the Seventy-fourth General Assembly of Illinois passed in its regular session of 1965, approved by the Governor, which affects the University of Illinois, including appropriations to the University, was submitted, and a copy of the same was filed by the Secretary of the Board.

LEASES WITH THE ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY FOR PROJECTS AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN AND AT THE MEDICAL CENTER

(23) The Seventy-fourth General Assembly declared certain buildings and projects at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and at the Medical Center to be in the public interest, thereby indicating the funding of these projects could be accomplished by the Illinois Building Authority.

Said declaration also provides that the cost of any specific project could exceed the amount set forth therefor so long as the aggregate amount stated therein to be financed by the Authority for the University is not exceeded.

The Illinois Building Authority Act contemplates that a transfer of jurisdiction of the property on which the projects are to be constructed will be made to the Authority, and that lease agreements between the Authority and the University will be executed providing for the construction of specified projects by the Authority and their use by the University. Funds for the payment of rental to the Authority during the current biennium are available from state appropriations to the University.

The Vice-President and Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant

recommend adoption of the following resolution authorizing the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute and deliver the necessary leases and other documents between the University and the Illinois Building Authority to accomplish the aforesaid purposes with respect to the above projects.

The President of the University concurs.

Resolution

WHEREAS the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois created by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, is empowered to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, complete, remodel, maintain and equip any and all buildings and other facilities as the General Assembly by law declares to be in the public interest; and

WHEREAS in accordance with the Illinois Building Authority Act the 74th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has declared the following University of Illinois projects at the Champaign-Urbana Campus and the Medical Center Campus to be in the public interest:

WHEREAS The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, will be requested by the Illinois Building Authority to enter into leases, transfer jurisdiction of real estate and take other actions to carry out and complete the above projects in accordance with the Illinois Building Authority Act;

Now, Therefore, be it and it is hereby resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as follows:

Section 1. That the Illinois Building Authority be and it hereby is requested to provide the foregoing projects and facilities at the Champaign-Urbana Campus and the Medical Center Campus and to lease the same to the University of Illinois as provided in the Illinois Building Authority Act.

Section 2. That the Comptroller and Secretary of this Board of Trustees be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and on behalf of this corporation such instruments of transfer, conveyance, lease, contract, and other documents as are necessary or appropriate in order to provide for the carrying out of the foregoing projects and facilities by the Illinois Building Authority.

REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

FUTURE BOARD MEETINGS

President Clement announced that the regular meetings of the Board during the remainder of the calendar year are scheduled for: October 20, 1965, at Urbana; November 18, 1965, in Chicago (the Board having voted to change the date of this meeting from the third Wednesday, November 17); December 15, 1965, in Chicago.

ILLINOIS BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION

President Clement reported on the meeting of the Board of Higher Education on September 7, 1965. The Seventy-fourth General Assembly of Illinois amended the act creating the Illinois Board of Higher Education, changing its composition by adding the Chairman of the newly created Illinois Junior College Board and reducing the representation of the other three governing boards to the president or chairman of each. The law provides that the chairman of any board holding membership on the Board of Higher Education may designate an alternate to attend any meeting of the Board and such alternate shall have all rights and privileges of regular membership while acting for such chairman.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, the Board voted to designate Mr. Johnston as the representative of the President of the Board to serve in the latter's absence; Mr. Johnston voted "No."

MEDICAL COLLEGE APTITUDE TEST

Mr. Jones requested and was granted the opportunity of making a brief statement on the Medical College Aptitude Test, about which he had raised a question when a recommendation from the Medical Center Senate for changes in the requirements for admission to the College of Medicine was under consideration on July 21, 1965. Mr. Jones was not present at the meeting, but his question was presented in a letter to the Secretary. Subsequently, he received a report on this matter, copies of which were sent to the other Trustees. Mr. Jones asked that the appropriate agencies of the University study the testing program to determine if it can be improved to insure adequate consideration of applicants for admission from disadvantaged families.

SMOKING AND HEALTH

Mr. Dilliard requested and was granted the opportunity of presenting a statement on the subject of smoking and health and discussed some of the findings of the United States Public Health Service and the American College Health Association and other public health agencies on the effects of smoking, and with particular reference to cigarettes. At the end of his presentation, he offered the following motion:

"In view of the widespread medical evidence that associates cigarette smoking with lung cancer and other diseases, and in view of the official anti-smoking positions taken by many medical and public health bodies and agencies, including the United States Public Health Service and the American College Health Association, I move that the Board of Trustees refer to an appropriate committee of the Board the matter of University's ownership, rental, and operation of cigarette vending machines and request it to study this matter in consultation with the University administration with a view to subsequent further consideration by the Board."

This motion was adopted.

President Clement referred this matter to the Committee on General Policy.

ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNING BOARDS

Mrs. Watkins reminded the Trustees the annual meeting of the Associ-

ation of Governing Boards would be held at Indiana State University, at Terre Haute, on October 13-15. She is planning to attend and urged other Trustees to do so.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

COMMITTEE ON CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS

Mrs. Watkins, for the Committee on Chicago Departments, reported on a conference which the Committee held on August 16, 1965, with representatives of the American Association of University Professors Chapter at the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle concerning a request from that group for a modification in the parking regulations for the Chicago Circle Campus to eliminate the parking charge for faculty and staff. Following the conference, the Committee consulted with other members of the Board of Trustees and then reviewed the matter.

The Committee recommended that there be no change in the parking regulations until experience in use of the parking facilities indicates that the matter should be reconsidered.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, this recommendation was adopted without dissent.

Mr. Clement commented on the procedural aspects of this item of business. It was noted that the A.A.U.P. request had not been presented through official channels as required by University Statutes.

AMENDMENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS STATUTES RELATING TO TENURE OF ACADEMIC STAFF AND ACADEMIC FREEDOM

The Secretary requested authority to include in the minutes of today's meeting the complete text of the revised Section 38 "Tenure of Academic Staff," Section 39 "Academic Freedom," and that part of Section 6, "University Senates" which was amended collaterally with the other two sections to change the name of the Committee on Academic Freedom to "Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure" at each campus and to add a provision for the election of a "Faculty Advisory Committee" which is a necessary adjunct to Section 38 "Academic Freedom."

On motion of Mr. Johnston, authority was granted.

The text of the amendments appear as an Appendix to these minutes beginning on page 825.

RECESS AND EXECUTIVE SESSION

President Clement announced that an executive session has been requested and was being ordered for consideration of reports and recommendations relating to property acquisitions.

On motion of Mr. Swain, the Board recessed.

When the Board reconvened in executive session, the same members of the Board, officers of the Board, and officers of the University were present as recorded at the beginning of these minutes.

The following matters of business were presented by the President of the University.

SALE OF MINONK EXPERIMENTAL FIELD

(24) Research on the Minonk Experimental Field near Minonk, Woodford County, Illinois, has been discontinued because all the information that can be acquired has been secured from this particular field. This fifteen-acre field was deeded to the University in 1909 by Bela M. and Sara B. Stoddard and the deed provided that if the University should discontinue the use of the land for agricultural experimentation for more than two years the title and ownership would revert to the grantor, his heirs or assigns. Since the University has held this field for over forty years, the reverter clause in the deed is no longer operative and the University has full title and ownership.

Negotiations with the legal representative for the heirs of the original grantors has resulted in an offer of \$6,000 for this fifteen-acre tract. In view of the facts that the original grantors had reserved mineral rights in the tract and that the heirs of the original grantors are now willing to purchase this property from the University, it has been recommended that this property be conveyed by quit-claim deed to E. H. Wilson and Jane Stoddard Wilson. All University officers concerned recommend that this conveyance be made and I concur.

To implement this transfer, the following resolution should be adopted:

Resolution Authorizing Sale of Minonk Experimental Field

WHEREAS, E. H. WILSON and JANE STODDARD WILSON have offered to purchase the hereinafter described property from The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois;

Be It, and It Hereby Is Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and

Secretary of this Corporation be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and in behalf of this Corporation, and under its Corporate Seal, a quit-claim deed and such other document or documents as to them may seem necessary or desirable in order to convey to E. H. Wilson and Jane Stoddard Wilson, as tenants in common, title to the real property hereinafter described, viz:

The owners of these properties have been advised that a recommendation would be made to purchase their property at prices based on appraisals, but these prices are not acceptable to them.

This property is adjacent to the Illinois Street Residence Halls and is required for future expansion. It consists of a lot 75 feet by 220.56 feet and is improved with a two-story frame dwelling. The rear of the lot is used for a twenty-car rental parking lot.

This property is required for future expansion.

The property consists of a lot 50 feet by 90 feet and is improved with a two and one-half-story and basement frame rooming house.

The owner has been advised that a recommendation would be submitted to the Board of Trustees for the purchase of this property for \$44,000, based on University appraisals, which is not acceptable to her, and her price remains substantially in excess of University appraisals received. Accordingly, the Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend acquisition of the property through condemnation proceedings; and they further request authorization of settlement of the condemnation suit if settlement can be agreed upon at a price which is within the appraisals received by the University.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University for 1965-67, subject to release by the Governor.

said University of Illinois, and to enable said University of Illinois to discharge its duty to the people of said State and for public use; that funds are available to the University for the purchase of said land for said educational purposes; that this Board of Trustees has negotiated with the owners of said land through their duly authorized representatives for the purchase of said land at a price which this Board of Trustees considers fair and reasonable and which it finds constitutes the present market value of said land but that said owners have refused to sell and convey said land to said The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for such price and continue to refuse to sell and convey the same to it except for a consideration and price which this Board of Trustees deems unreasonable and excessive and is, therefore, unwilling and has refused to pay; and

Be It, and It Hereby Is Further Resolved, Found, and Declared by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the compensation to be paid by it for said land cannot be agreed upon between this Board of Trustees and the owners of said property and they and it are unable to agree upon the purchase price to be paid to said owners for the sale and conveyance of said land by said owners thereof to said The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois; and

Therefore, Be It, and It Hereby Is Further Resolved, Found, and Declared by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that because of said need of the University of Illinois for said land for the purposes hereinabove set forth and because the compensation to be paid to the owners thereof for such land cannot be agreed upon between them and this Board of Trustees, it is necessary for The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to take said land and acquire title thereto through the exercise by it of the right of eminent domain conferred upon it by law and to have the compensation to be paid by it to the owners thereof and any and all other persons who may have any right, title or interest in and to said land determined in the manner provided by law for the exercise of said right and power of eminent domain; and

Condemnation proceedings had previously been instituted, but through negotiations the owners agreed to sell for \$60,000, which is within appraisals.

Subsequent to this action of the Board, a Judgment Order of the Circuit Court was entered which provides for the vesting of title to the property in the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois upon payment of the Court's award of \$60,000 as being a fair consideration for the property. It is therefore necessary that the Board convey title to the property to the University of Illinois Foundation and adoption of the following resolution is recommended to implement this change.

APPENDIX
AMENDMENT OF SECTIONS 6, 38, AND 39 OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS STATUTES

(Approved by the Board of Trustees June 16, 1965)

UNIVERSITY SENATES

Note: Paragraphs (a) to (k), inclusive, of Section 6 relate to the membership, organization, legislative functions, and authority of the Senates, and remain unchanged. Since those paragraphs are not pertinent to Sections 38 and 39, they are not repeated here.

Sec. 6. (1) Each Senate shall establish rules of procedure in accordance with which it shall elect annually by ballot from its membership a Committee on Committees. Upon nomination made by this Committee after consultation with the President, in the case of the Urbana-Champaign Senate, or with the Vice President in Charge, in the case of each Chicago campus Senate, each Senate shall elect committees on educational policy, academic freedom and tenure, University calendar, the library, student discipline, student affairs, and such other standing committees as it may from time to time authorize. The Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure at each campus shall be elected by the respective Senate upon nomination made in the manner hereinbefore described in this paragraph and shall consist of at least five members of the faculty other than deans or directors, with no more than two members from any one college, school, institute, division, or other administrative unit. The chairmen of the Senate committees on educational policy, academic freedom and tenure, library, and of such other committees as the three Senates may designate, shall be members of the corresponding committees of the other Senates.

*(m) The academic staff (i.e., those having the rank of instructor or higher rank) at each campus shall also elect a Faculty Advisory Committee of nine members of such academic staff, three of whom shall be elected each year for three-year terms. No more than two members, or in the case of the Medical Center no more than three, from any one college, school, institute, division, or other administrative unit of the University, shall serve on the Committee at the same time. The Committee shall each year elect its own chairman at its first meeting held after the annual election of members. The Committee shall adopt its rules of procedure, copies whereof shall be sent to all members of the academic staff and to the President. The Committee shall make such annual reports to the President, the Senate, and the faculty as it deems appropriate.

The functions of the Committee shall be to provide for the orderly voicing of suggestions for the good of the University, for affording added recourse for the consideration of grievances, and for furnishing a channel for direct and concerted communication with administrative officers of the University, its colleges, schools, institutes, divisions, and other administrative units on matters of interest or concern to the academic staff or any member of it.

In performing its functions, the Committee, upon the request of the Presi-

dent, or any member of the academic staff, or upon its own initiative, shall make such investigations and hold such consultations as it may deem to be in the best interest of the University. A member of the academic staff shall be entitled to a conference with the Committee or with any member of it on any matter properly within the purview of the Committee.

Those who at the date this section of the University Statutes becomes effective are already members of an established Faculty Advisory Committee shall be the first members of the Committee as established under this section of the University Statutes, with terms coterminous with those for which they were elected.

Any person of the rank of instructor or higher rank may be nominated as a Committee member by a petition signed by three members of the academic staff and filed with the Clerk or Secretary of the Senate prior to April 1 of each year. The Clerk of the Senate shall conduct the election by University mail as soon as possible thereafter. All members of the academic staff of the rank of instructor or higher rank may vote, and the three nominees receiving the highest number of votes, who are then eligible for membership on the Committee under the foregoing provisions, shall be declared elected.

(n) Any action of any Senate involving matters of University-wide policy, or proposals to amend the University Statutes, shall be submitted by the Senate Coordinating Council to the other Senates for consideration and recommendation.

TENURE OF ACADEMIC STAFF

Sec. 38. (a) Unless otherwise provided in these Statutes (and in the absence of some special written agreement approved by the President of the University with the consent of the appointee), the tenure for the various members of the academic staff shall be as stated herein, except that first appointments or temporary appointments may be made for shorter periods.

(1) An appointment as professor or associate professor shall be for an indefinite term.

(2) An appointment as assistant professor, or to the administrative staff, shall be for a period not longer than two years from September 1 of the first year of the legislative biennium.

(3) Appointments to lower ranks shall be for not more than one year.

(b) The appointment of any person for a definite term does not carry any guarantee or implication that the Board of Trustees will renew the appointment at its termination, even though the appointee may have discharged his duties satisfactorily. Any appointment, if accepted, must be accepted with this stipulation.

(c) Tenure may be terminated by (1) honorable retirement; (2) acceptance of resignation; (3) dismissal for due cause.

(d) Due cause for dismissal shall be deemed to exist only if (1) a faculty member has been grossly neglectful of or grossly inefficient in the performance of his University duties and functions; or (2) with all due regard for the freedoms and protections provided for in Section 39 of these Statutes, a faculty member's performance of his University duties and functions or his extramural conduct is found to demonstrate clearly and convincingly that he can no longer be relied upon to perform his University duties and functions in a manner consonant with professional standards of competence and re-

sponsibility; or (3) a faculty member has, during his employment by the University, illegally advocated overthrow of our constitutional form of government by force or violence.

(e) Proceedings seeking the dismissal before the expiration of his term of appointment of an appointee to the academic staff who is on definite tenure or of an appointee to the academic staff who is on indefinite tenure shall comply with the procedures described in the following provisions of this section:

(1) *Charges.* When it shall appear to the President that cause for the dismissal of an appointee may exist, he shall consult with the Faculty Advisory Committee. The President, after such consultation, shall determine whether dismissal proceedings should be instituted. Charges looking to dismissal shall be preferred by statement in writing by the President or on his authority and shall be filed with the Clerk or Secretary of the Senate within thirty days after the consultation with the Faculty Advisory Committee. The statement shall be sufficiently specific reasonably to inform the appointee of the nature of the charges and enable him to present his defense to them.

(2) *Service.* The Clerk or Secretary of the Senate shall cause a copy of the statement of the charges and a copy of Sections 38 and 39 of the Statutes to be delivered to the appointee personally or mailed to him at his last known post office address by registered mail within five days after they have been filed with the Clerk or Secretary of the Senate.

(3) *Request for Hearing.* Within fifteen days after such service of a copy of the statement of charges, the appointee may file with the Clerk or Secretary of the Senate a request for a hearing before the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure of the appropriate campus; and within ten days after filing such request the appointee shall file with the Clerk or Secretary of the Senate a detailed written answer to the statement of grounds for dismissal. The Clerk or Secretary of the Senate shall promptly transmit the statement of charges, the answer thereto, and the request for a hearing to the chairman of the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure, and copies of the answer and request for a hearing to the President.

(4) *Notice of Hearing.* Notice of the time and place of the hearing before the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure, which hearing shall be not less than twenty days after the filing of the appointee's request, shall be delivered on the same date to the appointee and the President, either personally or by registered mail. The date of the hearing shall be not less than fifteen days from the date of such delivery or of such mailing of the notice of hearing.

(5) *Hearing.* At the time and place fixed, the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure shall hold a closed hearing on the charges. No member of that Committee shall sit in a case that involves a member of his department, school, institute, or division, whichever represents the smallest administrative unit. Three members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of the hearing, and the chairman of the Committee may appoint another member of the Committee to preside over the hearing. If vacancies occur, the Committee on Committees shall appoint as many members as are necessary to constitute a quorum. Except as hereinbefore or hereinafter provided, the hearing shall be conducted according to such rules as the Committee may from time to time establish. The Committee shall not be bound by technical rules of evidence, but all findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the Committee shall be supported by, and be in accord with, substantial evidence. The ap-

pointee shall be entitled to be present at all sessions of the Committee when evidence is being received and to have with him an adviser of his own choice who may act as counsel. Likewise, the President or some person designated by him, together with counsel if the President desires counsel, shall be entitled to be present at all sessions of the Committee when evidence is being received. Each party shall have the right within reasonable limits to question witnesses and, when all the evidence has been received, to make an argument in support of its position, either in person or by counsel. A full stenographic transcript shall be made of the hearing unless both parties agree to the making of a record in a briefer form.

(6) *Findings, Conclusions, and Recommendations.* Following the conclusion of the hearing, the Committee shall promptly make its explicit findings of fact on each charge, its conclusions, and its recommendations. Reasonable opportunity shall be given to each party to file a written statement setting forth objections to these findings, conclusions, and recommendations and setting forth the grounds for such objections. A copy of one party's objections shall be given to the other party. The originals of the findings, conclusions, and recommendations, and of the hearing, shall be forwarded to the President and copies shall be promptly transmitted to the appointee.

If ultimately the appointee requests a hearing before the Board of Trustees, the originals or copies of statement of charges filed by the President or on his authority with the Clerk or Secretary of the Senate, the request for a hearing, the answer to the statement of charges, the notice of the time and place of hearing, the transcript or briefer record of the hearing, any exhibits received in evidence, the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the Committee, and any objections to such findings, conclusions, and recommendations, shall constitute the record before the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure to be submitted to the Board. The record shall be available to the Board of Trustees, to counsel for the appointee, and to counsel for the University, but shall not be available to other persons prior to the hearing before the Board. If the Committee recommends that charges be dropped and the President concurs, the case shall be considered closed.

(7) *Hearing by Board of Trustees.* Within thirty days after transmittal of the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure, or, if the appointee filed no request for a hearing before that Committee, within fifteen days after the expiration of the period specified in paragraph (3) for the filing of such a request, the President may cause the charges to be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees along with the findings, conclusions, and recommendations, if any, of the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure and the record of the hearing before the Committee, if one was held. Notice of such filing of charges shall be delivered to the appointee personally or shall be mailed to him by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by registered mail within five days after such filing. Within ten days after such delivery or mailing of notice of the filing of the charges with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, the appointee may file with the Secretary of the Board a written request for a hearing before the Board of Trustees. Notice of the time and place of the hearing, which hearing shall be not less than twenty days after the date of the filing of the appointee's request, shall be delivered to the appointee personally or mailed to him by registered mail. The date of the hearing shall be not less than fifteen days from the date of such delivery or mailing of the notice of hearing to the appointee. The ap-

pointee shall have the right to appear at the hearing, with counsel, if he desires, to reply to the charges and to present evidence in his behalf. Counsel for the University shall represent the University administration at the hearing and shall have the right to present evidence in support of the charges. The Board shall not be bound by technical rules of evidence in hearing and deciding the case.

The Board will give due consideration to the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure, and the remainder of the record relevant to the charges before said Committee, and in all cases where a report was made by the Committee will invite a member of the Committee designated by its chairman to attend the hearing before the Board and afford him an opportunity to make a statement.

If the Board concludes that the appointee should be dismissed or asked to resign, the effective date of such dismissal or resignation shall not be less than one year from the date of the Board's decision unless the Board, in its discretion, determines that an earlier effective date is justified by the gravity of the appointee's conduct in question.

(8) *Reassignment of Duties.* Under exceptional circumstances, and when such action is clearly necessary and justified, the President may direct that a faculty member be relieved of some or all of his University duties and functions and reassigned to others, without prejudice and without loss of compensation, pending the final decision of his case, subject to the following provisions: a) the President may reassign duties before the filing of any charges only after giving notice to the chairman or, in the absence of the chairman from the University, to some member of the Faculty Advisory Committee, that he believes that cause for dismissal may exist; b) if the President reassigns duties after so giving notice to the chairman or some member of the Faculty Advisory Committee, such reassignment shall terminate within thirty days after that Committee has made its recommendations to the President unless the President initiates dismissal proceedings by the filing of charges for dismissal within that thirty-day period; and c) if the President initiates dismissal proceedings by filing charges for dismissal, he may reassign duties, or extend a previous reassignment of duties until the termination of those proceedings, or until the effective date of dismissal if the proceedings should result in dismissal.

(9) *Publicity.* So far as possible public statements about a case under consideration should be avoided until completion of the proceedings.

ACADEMIC FREEDOM

Sec. 39 (a) It is the policy of the University to maintain and encourage full freedom, within the law, of inquiry, discourse, teaching, research, and publication and to protect any member of the academic staff against influences, from within or without the University, which would restrict him in the exercise of these freedoms in his area of scholarly interest. The right to the protection of the University shall not, however, include any right to the services of the University's Legal Counsel or his assistants in any governmental or judicial proceedings in which the academic freedom of the staff member may be in issue.

(b) In his role as a citizen, the faculty member may exercise the same freedoms as other citizens, without institutional censorship or discipline. He should be mindful, however, that accuracy, forthrightness, and dignity befit

his association with the University and his position as a man of learning, and that the public may judge his profession and the University by his conduct and utterances.

(c) If, in the President's judgment, a faculty member should fail to heed the admonitions of Section 39(b) on an occasion when he is exercising his freedom of expression as a citizen, the President may publicly disassociate the Board of Trustees and the University administration from, and express their disapproval of, such objectionable expressions.

(d) A staff member who believes that he does not enjoy the academic freedom which it is the policy of the University to maintain and encourage, shall be entitled to a hearing, on his written request, before the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure of the appropriate University Senate. Such hearing shall be conducted in accordance with established rules of procedure. The Committee shall make findings of facts and recommendations to the President and at its discretion may make an appropriate report to the Senate. The several committees may from time to time establish their own rules of procedure.
