

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

October 20, 1965



The October meeting of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in the Illini Union (South), Urbana, Illinois, on Wednesday, October 20, 1965, beginning at 10:00 a.m.

The Secretary noted and recorded that the following members of the Board were present: Mr. Irving Dilliard, Mr. Earl M. Hughes, Mr. Theodore A. Jones, Mr. Ray Page, Mr. Harold Pogue, Mr. Timothy W. As stated in the notice calling the meeting, it was held to consider the following item of business presented by the President of the University.

APPLICATIONS FOR GRANT FUNDS UNDER TITLE I OF THE HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES ACT OF 1963

Under the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, the United States Commissioner of Education is authorized to grant funds for the construction, rehabilitation, and improvement of academic and related facilities. Recent changes in the requirements of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare for the submission of applications for grants under the Act necessitate the adoption of a formal resolution by the Board authorizing the filing of applications and designating the person to act on behalf of the University in connection therewith. Accordingly, I request the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the filing of applications for grants under the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 and designating H. O. Farber, Comptroller, as the person authorized to file the same and to act on behalf of the University thereunder.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, the following resolution was adopted.

Resolution Authorizing the Filing of Applications for Grant Funds Under Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963

WHEREAS, the U.S. Commissioner of Education is authorized under the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 to grant funds for the construction, rehabilitation, and improvement of certain academic and related facilities; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, the governing body of the University of Illinois, hereinafter called the Applicant, is cognizant of the conditions under which such grant funds are made available and approved for payment to an applicant; and

WHEREAS, it is the sense of the governing body of the Applicant that it is desirable to apply for grants under the aforementioned act;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that applications for projects are authorized and directed to be filed with the Illinois Board of Higher Education, with the understanding that if upon due consideration by said commission, applying the criteria of the State plan, said applications receive priority rating sufficiently high to receive grant funds under the aforementioned act, said applications will be forwarded to the U.S. Commissioner of Education for consideration for his approval; and be it further

Resolved, that The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois designates H. O. Farber, Comptroller, as the officer authorized to file the applications and act as the representative of this Board in connection with said applications.

There being no further business before the Executive Committee, on motion of Mrs. Watkins, the Committee adjourned.

DIRECTORSHIP OF INSTITUTE OF COMMUNICATIONS RESEARCH

- (4) The Dean of the College of Journalism and Communications recommends the appointment of Howard S. Maclay, Research Associate Professor in the Institute of Communications Research on indefinite tenure, Director of the Institute for the period October 1, 1965, through August 31, 1967, at an annual salary of \$14,500 on a twelve months' service basis.

Professor Maclay served as Acting Director during 1964-65 while Director Charles E. Osgood was on leave of absence. Director Osgood has asked to be relieved of his administrative duties so that he may devote full time to teaching and research.

The Dean of the Graduate College and the Executive Vice-President and Provost support this recommendation.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Swain, this appointment was approved.

PROGRAM IN RELIGIOUS STUDIES

- (5) The faculty of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend establishment, effective September 1, 1966, of an interdepartmental program in religious studies.

The action is based upon the view that the study of religious phenomena and of the vital contribution of religion to man's culture merits a high place in contemporary education and scholarship. The college faculty has concluded that proper and just treatment of religious studies can best be given by incorporating these studies fully into the various curricula of the University, with courses offered in full equality with other courses. Two new courses, in Old Testament History and Literature and in New Testament History and Literature, must be offered before the program can be established. With these two courses, existing course offerings are sufficient to provide more than forty hours of options for a minor.

The college faculty believes that the program should be developed beyond the minimum program here proposed. To achieve this objective will require the appointment of a program chairman who, with a committee of representatives of participating departments, will have the responsibility of formulating future plans. The appointment of two specialists in biblical history and literature will also be required.

The Senate Coordinating Council has advised that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

I recommend approval subject to further action by the Board of Higher Education.

The foregoing recommendation was submitted to the Board of Trustees on July 21, 1965. Action thereon was deferred at the request of Mr. Irving Dilliard who requested additional information in answer to certain specific questions which he raised. The information requested was subsequently sent to all members of the Board.

Mr. Hughes moved that recommendation now be approved.

Mr. Dilliard presented the following statement which he requested be included in the record of today's meeting:

Mr. President, I doubt if there is anything a Trustee of the University of Illinois should do officially with greater reluctance than oppose a projected course of study that has been developed and approved by committees and units of the Faculty and Administration and recommended for adoption to the Board of Trustees by the President of the University. All the normal argument is in favor

of unanimous approval for such a recommendation. The details of academic planning and administration are the business of the University staff. They are not and can not be the usual concern of the Board of Trustees.

It happens, however, that Item No. 5, Program in Religious Studies, now before us, presents, in my opinion, a question of Public Policy basic to a State University, supported as ours is by taxes paid by millions of people—people of many religious outlooks and diverse denominational affiliations. Because I may seem to put myself in the position of being “against religion” and perhaps even of being “against God,” I will state my reaction to this proposal with more than ordinary care. A recent experience has reminded me that there are those who only too readily jump to conclusions of their own as to what a Trustee has said.

When I first read in the Champaign-Urbana press a year or more ago about the idea of setting up a department of religion or a formal program of religious studies in the University, a warning flag went up for me. I inquired as to what form such a plan might take and was informed that the subject was under study in the Faculty and that nothing would be ready for consideration of the Board of Trustees for some substantial time. When I arrived here for the July meeting of the Board of Trustees, I found this proposal on the agenda with a recommendation for approval. I requested that it be postponed inasmuch as I had been away on a trip and had not had an opportunity to review the proposal sufficiently to vote on it. I listed several questions that came at once to my mind and said I would like to study the Administration's answers before voting. Postponement was immediately granted. Oral comments on July 21 by the Administration were followed by a memorandum from the President's Office to all members of the Board of Trustees. This report was designed to reassure the Trustees that the proposal was in line with educational policy and practice in religious studies.

If I remember correctly, I asked at the July meeting if the proposal bore the approval of a committee of the Board of Trustees and, further, that I was informed that it had not been referred to a committee and that, consequently, it did not bear committee endorsement. So far as I know, that is still the situation.

Mr. President, I have thought a lot about this proposal since July 21. The more I think about it the deeper my doubts become. When you read for the first time the proposal before us, it seems not only harmless but probably even desirable. The basis for it is in one sentence of the description, namely, “that the study of religious phenomena and of the vital contribution of religion to man's culture merits a high place in contemporary education and scholarship.” With this statement I am in general agreement, depending on where and how it is implemented. But this generality is only the beginning. The proposal goes on to call for the creation, effective September 1, 1966, of an academic-administrative unit in religious studies with courses offered in full equality with other courses. Under the proposal it would be possible to develop an undergraduate minor from among such courses totaling at least forty hours. Further, it provides for the appointment of a permanent chairman and the employment of biblical specialists and establishment of new courses which these biblical specialists would teach. The proposal describes the new courses, together with the present interdepartmental courses, as a “minimum” program. Finally, it says with utmost clarity that “the chairman of the program and a committee of representatives from the participating departments are jointly charged with the responsibility for further development of the program.”

So, Mr. President, what is before us is not just this minimum program but what it would grow into. If we approve No. 5, we act not for today alone but for the future. Now, I do not pretend to know what this program would grow into over the next ten years. I assume that this Faculty, this Administration, and this Board of Trustees would seek to keep it in seemingly proper bounds. But, this Faculty, this Administration, and this Board of Trustees are not permanent. And anyway, we are asked to approve the program's expansion as well as its creation. At the very outset we know that an essential of the plan is that it is to grow.

Growth means new courses, new faculty appointments, new research projects, new publications. What would research in current religious studies consist of? *The New York Times* of last Sunday, October 17, gives one possible indication. It devotes several columns to the new movements in so-called contemporary religion, including the ideas of the new theologians who see Christianity in the future without present-day concepts of God. These academic teachers of religious studies say that the word “God” has become meaningless and that if there once was a

"God" he no longer speaks to modern man. Is this what we have in mind for teaching and research and publication in studies in religion as developed at the University?

Only last month I read in the Champaign-Urbana press — and here I would like to express my appreciation to the community newspapers and to commend them on the thoughtful attention they give to educational matters, problems, and issues over the country — about research in religious attitudes undertaken and reported on at one of the most distinguished of state universities. Two scholars in religious studies conducted an extensive inquiry into current religious beliefs of adherents of a range of church affiliation. These faculty men asked people such questions as whether they believed that "Jesus was the divine Son of God" and whether they held to the idea that "Jesus will actually return to earth some day." Then, they reported summaries of their polling to show the extent to which their sample of Roman Catholics, Lutherans, Presbyterians, Methodists, and so on, believed in these biblical principles. Do we have in mind that either now or ultimately the University of Illinois would put its name to such statistics as these which reportedly show that the Congregationalists were only half as devout in their beliefs as the Disciples of Christ and that the Roman Catholics were about ten per cent less positive about the divinity of Jesus than were the Southern Baptists? I ask these questions in all seriousness because this is research in the religious studies field.

If private colleges and universities, church schools, and theological seminaries wish to sponsor such research and support such views that is wholly their privilege. Let them do so, let them publish the results, and let them appeal for readership and following. In my opinion, this is not an area of inquiry for a State University, with nearly 30,000 students at its center and whose constituents, students, faculty, and supporters embrace literally hundreds of sectarian beliefs, beliefs of their own, or no beliefs at all which is also their right. Assuming that there are some who think that the State University should engage in this kind of research, I can only say that I strongly disagree. When we have ten or more urgent uses for every dollar raised for us by the taxpayers, I can see no valid reason for breaching the wall that separates church and state. But then, I would not favor the intrusion of matters of religious interpretation into state-supported education even if we had ten times as many dollars as we need.

The University's record on the whole has been excellent in this area. The History Department conducts courses that deal with religious movements as part of History. The Philosophy Department has offered courses in comparative religion and ethical values. Back in the 1920's, I took Professor Chauncey Baldwin's English Department course in scriptural poetry and prose. I am at loss to know why this eminently satisfactory approach to studies that concern aspects of religion can not be continued — why it must now be abandoned — why we are urged to set up an academic-administrative unit in religious studies.

Mention of the 1920's reminds me of an aspect of this subject that I can not in good conscious pass over. The 1920's was the period when the student religious foundation movement began here in the University of Illinois community, since to spread all over the country. The Methodists, under now Bishop James Chamberlain Baker, led the way with the creation of the Wesley Foundation. The Roman Catholics and the Jews soon followed that pioneering example. Today there are Hillel, Newman, Wesley, and other denominational foundations and centers adjacent to countless student populations literally everywhere. Only this week a new Hillel Foundation, which in effect was founded here, was opened at American University in Washington, D.C. So far as I know, this community has made no greater, more pervasive contribution to life in America today.

Do the religious men and women who direct these foundations in Champaign-Urbana favor this proposed University program? I can not answer the question because I have not talked with them any more than I have canvassed the Faculty. But I am sure of this: the proposal puts them in an awkward position whether they say "yes" or "no." For many years, the University has given up to ten hours credit for courses in religion taught at these foundations. One idea as to what would happen to this joint program of the foundations and the University was printed under the by-line of Diana Henry earlier this month. Noting that attendance in the foundation courses has shown a decrease this fall, she gave two reasons. First, because of the "college cracking down on electives." Second,

because of an "increased interest in the University developing an independent program in religion which should be ready in 1966." If a proposed program of study not yet approved by the Board of Trustees and not meant to be effective for a year can already be seriously described as responsible in part for a decrease, however slight, in enrollment in the foundation courses, what will be the effect next year and the year after that and the year after that? When I read between the lines, I detect dissatisfaction in some quarters with foundation courses for which the University gives credit. If that is so, then that matter should be faced for what it is and credit withdrawn from courses that are found not to measure up to University standards. Surely there is a better way to cure that problem, if such a problem exists, than by pushing the entire University toward the bramble patch of state-church controversy.

Mr. President, I have spent a good part of my life in intense concern for the human rights of the individual citizen. Times without number I have opposed moves that would breach the historic wall that keeps church and state separate in our country. I have been proud of the fact that out of Illinois and this community came one of the strongest Supreme Court decisions in the protection of freedom of choice in religious matters—and especially that it was the wife of a member of this University's faculty who, against overwhelming odds, had the conviction, the courage, and the determination to see her cause—and mine—through to success. How can it be other than turning the clock back to set the stage for new disputes and new controversies in this always explosive area?

I credit with good intentions all who have recommended this proposal. However, I am convinced that they are taking the short-term view when the short-term view is not enough. In my opinion, the least that should be said about this proposal is that it is unnecessary and misguided. As one who has tried to be plain and direct in communication, I find it hard not to say that this proposal is unjustified and unsound. The late Justice Cardozo, in his classic of legal science, "The Nature of the Judicial Process," tells how a judge may take a first step at the edge of some trackless forest of new law. The Judge is called on to make only one small step, and it seems safe enough at the time. Then a succeeding Judge takes the next step which readily follows on the first. Precedents are now established and third and fourth and still other steps appear to be wholly proper extensions of the earlier steps into the unknown. But after a time, later Judges become less sure. What has seemed like the right way is confused. The forest closes in and the latest traveler is hard beset. It is too late to turn back, yet it is impossible to see ahead. The impasse results from the mistake of that first step at the forest edge. It seemed so safe when it was taken, but now the Judges know that its direction has been wrong all along. I suspect that there are times when troubles that overtake the educational process also have their origin in first steps that seem safe but actually go wrong at the very outset.

James Madison, our fourth President, to whom we so largely owe our Constitution and its Bill of Rights, said that the time to mend breaks in the wall that separates church and state is before the cracks occur. I could not agree more. As I see it, now is such a time. When we vote on No. 5, Program in Religious Studies, we stand at the edge of a forest. I said I have not canvassed local opinion, but I have consulted three distinguished alumni of the University whose names would be known well and favorably to most of you. As it happens one lives on one coast, one on the other coast, and one here in Illinois. All were amazed that such a proposal would come before the Board of Trustees. One said he was "shocked," and I assure you that he has seen enough of the world that he is not easily disturbed. All three said if they were on the Board of Trustees they would vote "No." And so, Mr. President, regretfully but without hesitation, I will vote against approving this recommendation of the Faculty and the Administration. If it is approved today, I will hope, as one citizen of Illinois, for its rejection by the Board of Higher Education. Mr. President, because I would like my position clearly understood, I ask, if you please, that this statement be filed with my vote and the text be included in the official minutes of this meeting. I dislike to add to the documents that the Secretary of the Board of Trustees must process, but he, in his unfailing geniality and kindness, will smile and understand. Thank you very much.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, this matter was tabled until the next meeting of the Board.

CONTRACT FOR AIR CONDITIONING RADIOLOGY ROOMS IN THE ILLINOIS NEUROPSYCHIATRIC INSTITUTE

(7) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$15,494 to the National Korecta Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the air conditioning of Radiology Rooms 260-264, 281, 283, and 284 in the Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute.

The work will include furnishing and installing the necessary equipment and ducts to provide air conditioning for areas in the north wing of the building. This air conditioning is necessary because most of the work done in radiography is done in darkened rooms with windows closed and blinds down.

Nonrecurring funds have been assigned for this improvement.

CONTRACT FOR LABORATORY FURNITURE FOR FIRST UNIT DENTISTRY-MEDICINE-PHARMACY BUILDING

(8) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend award of a contract for \$5,600.60 to The Kewaunee Mfg. Co., Evanston, Illinois, the lowest bidder, for furnishing and setting in place laboratory furniture in Room 405, first unit Dentistry-Medicine-Pharmacy Building.

The work will include furnishing and setting in place certain laboratory furniture and moving and remodeling other furniture. This laboratory furniture will be connected to utilities by Physical Plant trades. The work is a part of the remodeling required to upgrade the Department of Pharmacology laboratory.

Funds have been budgeted for this work.

CONTRACTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF UNIVERSITY PROJECTS BY THE ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

(9) The Illinois Building Authority has asked the University to make specific requests for awards of contracts on bids to be received by the Authority on University projects. Action thereon by the Board or its Executive Committee may be necessary at times other than the regularly scheduled meetings of the Board.

The Director of the Physical Plant, the Vice-President and Comptroller, and the Legal Counsel state that the Authority may also require the University to adopt specific resolutions transferring jurisdiction of land to and leasing facilities from the Illinois Building Authority prior to Authority entering into construction contracts. Accordingly, they recommend that, pursuant to Article IV, Section 3, of the By-Laws, the Board of Trustees authorize the Executive Committee of the Board to take action at any time when the Board is not in session on transfers of jurisdiction to and leases from the Illinois Building Authority.

I concur.

ASSIGNMENT OF ENGINEERING CONTRACTS TO THE ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

(10) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize negotiations and completion of assignments to the Illinois Building Authority of the following engineering contracts previously approved by the Board for rerouting utilities around the Undergraduate Library site (which Undergraduate Library project has been declared by the Seventy-fourth General Assembly to be in the public interest and eligible for financing by the Illinois Building Authority), the terms of such assignments to be consistent with the provisions of the Illinois Building Authority Act, as amended:

Rerouting Electrical Utilities — Sargent & Lundy, Chicago

Rerouting Water Mains, Storm and Sanitary Sewers — Wilson & Anderson, Champaign

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, this recommendation was approved.

ENROLLMENT ESTIMATES FOR THE UNIVERSITY'S THREE EXISTING CAMPUSES — 1965-1975

(11) It has become necessary to develop new enrollment projections for the University's three campuses, partly in order to bring previous planning into closer conformity to the enrollment distribution by level as suggested in the Master Plan of the State Board of Higher Education and also to supply data for a recent request from the staff of the State Board, in connection with a survey of the enrollments and building plans of all colleges and universities in Illinois, extending to the year 1974-75.

The Executive Vice-President and Provost has directed the studies required for the development of the University's estimates for the State Board's survey — involving primarily the Bureau of Institutional Research, the Central Office on the Use of Space, and the Physical Plant Department. The attached report presents a summary of the recommended enrollment projections, which are submitted for adoption as provisional guidelines for use primarily in the planning of future buildings and related facilities.

The enrollment estimates presented in the report have been reviewed by the Academic Advisory Council (which includes the deans and directors of all instructional units). The University Council — including deans, directors, elected faculty members, and general administrative officers — has also been consulted.

I recommend approval of these enrollment projections for planning purposes, with the understanding that they are tentative in nature and subject to modification in the light of future developments, including one or more of the following: (a) internal reappraisal of the validity of the estimates of capacity for the several campuses in the period 1965-74; (b) the availability of facilities and other resources; (c) relevant developments in higher education in the state as a whole.

Executive Vice-President and Provost Lanier then presented and discussed in detail the following report of his studies of enrollment estimates for the period 1965-75.

Following this presentation, on motion of Mrs. Watkins, this report was received and the enrollment projections were approved for planning purposes.

Enrollment Estimates for the Three Campuses of the University of Illinois — 1965-75

Previous planning studies for the three campuses of the University of Illinois have carried projections only to 1970, and the studies were mainly designed before 1960. Several considerations have made it desirable to revise these plans and to extend them at least to 1975. The most important has been the Master Plan developed by the State Board of Higher Education, under which the University is expected to shift its emphasis towards advanced undergraduate and graduate-professional studies—to complement the growth of the state's system of junior colleges. Also, as a further step in its state-wide planning, the Board of Higher Education recently asked all institutions of higher education in Illinois to submit estimates of their enrollments and building plans for the period 1965-75.

This report presents the enrollment projections that have been developed for the University's three campuses for the ten-year period (1965-75)—partly in response to the State Board's request and partly to guide the University's planning for the biennium 1967-69 and the years immediately following. Estimates of the additional space needed to accommodate the projected enrollments will not be presented in this report, since they are now under review by the respective departments and are subject to revision.

The State Board did not request estimates for the colleges at the Medical Center, but enrollment projections will be shown for that campus. Estimates of their space needs to 1974-75, however, have not been completed.

Procedure

On August 3, 1965, shortly after the State Board's questionnaire was received, the Executive Vice-President and Provost sent a memorandum concerning the studies to be undertaken to members of the Academic Advisory Council (consisting of central administrative officers and the deans and directors of instructional units). Tentative enrollment ceilings were proposed for the year 1974-75, with the statement that they would be used primarily as boundary conditions for developing the estimates requested on short notice by the Board of Higher Education. The enrollment ceilings chosen were as follows: Chicago Circle, 25,500; Urbana-Champaign, 32,500; Medical Center, 4,447. These figures were selected partly in the light of previous planning assumptions and recommendations, and partly to reflect the effects of greater emphasis on upper-division and graduate-professional studies. The latter factor was especially important in the case of the Chicago Circle estimates, since prior planning there had been limited to undergraduate programs.

The deans and directors were invited to submit comments on the proposed enrollment ceilings for this period, and to call attention to the special needs of their units. It was indicated that a meeting of the Academic Advisory Council would be held on September 16 to discuss the proposed projections.

Meantime, the Bureau of Institutional Research prepared detailed enrollment estimates for each year during the ten-year period, including breakdowns by four educational levels: freshman-sophomore, junior-senior, first-year graduate and professional, and advanced graduate. For the Chicago Circle and the Urbana-Champaign campuses, the figures reflected a progressive shift in the distribution of enrollment towards more advanced levels. (The enrollment figures were then used by the Central Office on the Use of Space for developing estimates of the kinds and amounts of space needed to accommodate the additional students; and from the space estimates, the Physical Plant Department developed tentative estimates of cost. But, as noted above, these figures are not included in the present report.)

Following the meeting of the Academic Advisory Council, a report on the projections was presented to the University Council. This body consists of all general administrative officers, deans and directors, and selected faculty members. No suggestions were made at the meeting for changes in the assumptions or in the enrollment estimates.

Enrollment Ceilings for the Period

The enrollment estimates for the ten-year period, together with a breakdown for the three campuses, are shown in Table I. In addition, actual enrollment figures (head counts) are shown for 1963-64 and 1964-65.

For purposes of comparison, enrollment projections for the entire state of Illinois are also shown in column 1. As indicated in the footnote to the table, the state-wide estimates were prepared by the Bureau of Institutional Research at the request of Executive Director Browne of the Illinois Board of Higher Education. These figures represent revisions of those presented in the report of Master Plan Committee A.

The figures in column 2 show that enrollment at the University is predicted to increase during the period from a total of 34,634 in 1964-65 to 62,447 in 1974-75. But the University's enrollment would not keep pace with the overall growth in higher-education enrollments in Illinois, as shown by the percentages in column 3. In 1964-65, the University had 13 per cent of the state's total enrollment at its three campuses, whereas for 1974-75, the estimated total would be 11 per cent. In order to maintain its comparative position of 1964-65, some 11,000 additional students would have to be accommodated in 1974-75 beyond the total projected. It should be noted, however, that the 1974-75 total would represent a higher proportion of upper-division and graduate-professional students than that for 1964-65.

Enrollment Distribution by Educational Level

The nature and magnitude of the proposed shift of emphasis towards more advanced study are indicated by the figures in Table II. The several columns in this table present estimates for the four educational levels mentioned above (as well as subtotals for undergraduate and for graduate-professional enrollment). Totals for all four levels are shown in the last column.

In the case of the Chicago Circle campus, a major change from previous planning is the proposed introduction of graduate study—scheduled for 1967-68. As column 6 shows, by 1969-70 a total of 1,000 graduate students is predicted, and the number would increase to 3,500 by 1974-75. These estimates are based on recommendations made by Vice-President Parker and Dean Terrell, after a careful review of departmental proposals. The Campus Planning Committee at Chicago Circle has concurred in the ceiling figures of 3,500 graduate students and 22,000 undergraduates projected for 1974-75.

For the Urbana-Champaign campus, a marked shift towards upper-division and graduate-professional enrollments is shown for the ten-year period. As a result, by 1974-75 that campus would have virtually equal numbers of freshman-sophomore and graduate-professional students, with a markedly higher number at the junior-senior level. This balanced type of distribution conforms exactly to the pattern recommended in 1958 by the University Study Committee on Future Programs. The ratios between the freshman-sophomore, junior-senior, and graduate-professional (totals) are represented by the numbers 2:3:2. (In terms of percentages, the figures would be 29:42:29.)

General Comment

It is important to emphasize that the enrollment projections proposed in this report are provisional in nature and are subject to revision in the light of future developments. Obviously, for example, such enrollment increases could not be accommodated unless the facilities and other essential resources were provided as needed.

Another requisite is an increase in junior-college enrollment sufficient to supply the transfer students anticipated at junior-senior level in the enrollment distributions proposed. To the extent that the state-wide system of junior colleges failed to produce these transfer students, the pattern of enrollment distribution would have to be modified. What the effect of such a deficiency would be on the projected enrollment totals is difficult to estimate, since it would depend partly on the overall educational situation in the state at the time.

Finally, it should be recognized that an *a priori* judgment as to what enrollment ceiling would be optimal for a given campus at some future date is necessarily an uncertain and somewhat arbitrary one. Unquestionably, there is a limit beyond which the size of a student body in a given type of institution could not go without serious detriment to its educational program. But that limit probably

varies rather widely with the nature of the interrelationships that prevail among the component functions and with the overall adequacy of the resources available. The enrollment projections suggested in this report, therefore, should be viewed primarily as planning assumptions rather than as rigidly prescribed targets. The validity of these assumptions will be tested pragmatically as additional students are admitted for programs where faculty and facilities seem to be adequate.

**EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS FOR CONTINUED MASTER
CAMPUS PLAN STUDIES CHICAGO CIRCLE**

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend the employment of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, Chicago, for the continuation of studies on the campus master plan for the Chicago Circle Campus. The objective of these studies will be to provide for 25,500 students, including 3,500 graduate and professional students. The present plan assumes only undergraduate work for an enrollment of 20,000 students by 1970, with construction to be completed in three biennia. Planning at this time for the additional students will necessitate revisions in the master plan for the campus and incorporation of these revisions in the planning for Phase III construction which must be started promptly in order to make the facilities available for an enrollment of 20,000 by 1970.

The scope of the studies will include revision of the present site plan and preliminary building-plan studies to incorporate the additional graduate, professional, and research functions within the present land area, new cost estimates, time schedules and other related planning studies.

The fee for the proposed work is the same as that included in the 1959 contract with Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, for the 1970 master plan, namely, the cost of technical personnel plus 150 per cent to cover overhead and profit.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University from the Universities Building Fund subject to release by the Governor.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, this recommendation was approved.

**REQUEST TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT
FOR HIGH TEMPERATURE HOT WATER GENERATOR
AT CHICAGO CIRCLE**

(13) The Illinois Building Authority has received bids for Hot Water Generator Unit No. 3 for the Chicago Circle Phase II Utilities Center Addition. The lowest bid is \$126,775 from International Boiler Works Company, East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania, for the generating unit and the water pumps, and the erection thereof at the construction site. One other bid of \$176,424 was received from Babcock & Wilcox Company, 105 South LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois. The lower bidder is deemed fully qualified and has performed satisfactorily under contract with the University in the past.

The project is a part of the Phase II construction which the Board, acting through its Executive Committee on September 2, 1965, requested the Illinois Building Authority to provide. The Authority will finance the construction and lease the facilities to the University for rental payments appropriated by the General Assembly. The University will transfer jurisdiction of the land on which the project will be constructed to the Authority.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board request the Illinois Building Authority to award a contract for the described work to the lower bidder, and proceed to procure this facility for the use of the University.

I concur and recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

Resolution

Be It, and It Hereby Is, Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, that Illinois Building Authority be, and it hereby is, requested to award to International Boiler Works Company, East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania, a contract for the High Temperature Hot Water Generator Unit No. 3 at Chicago Circle Utilities Center Addition, including the generating unit and the water pumps, and the erection thereof, for the fixed price of \$126,775, and to proceed with the procurement and erection of said facility.

Be It, and It Hereby Is, Further Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of The State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and Secretary of this public corporation be, and they hereby are, authorized

to make, execute, acknowledge and deliver, in the name and in behalf of this corporation, such instruments of transfer, conveyance, lease, contract, and other documents as are necessary or appropriate in order to provide for the carrying out of the foregoing project and facility by the Illinois Building Authority.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the foregoing resolution was adopted by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Dilliard, Mr. Hughes, Mr. Jones, Mr. Page, Mr. Pogue, Mr. Swain, Mrs. Watkins, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Clement, Mr. Johnston, Governor Kerner.

UNIVERSITIES RESEARCH ASSOCIATION, INC.

(14) The University of Illinois has now received a formal invitation to accept membership in the Universities Research Association, Inc., an organization sponsored by the National Academy of Sciences. The incorporation follows two organization meetings of presidents or their deputies of the participating universities. From the beginning, it was indicated to the National Academy of Sciences and others concerned that the University of Illinois would be interested in becoming a member of the new Association. Thirty-four universities, including the University of Illinois, have been invited to participate.

The underlying purpose has been to bring into being a national agency which could serve as a contracting agent for the operation and management of a proposed high-energy proton accelerator should Congress approve its construction. The corporation will offer its services to the United States Government. The effort has been to place upon a national scale the successful multiple-university management of the Brookhaven Laboratory in Long Island.

The Articles of Incorporation were filed in June and Bylaws have been adopted by an interim board of trustees. The University of Illinois has participated in all of the deliberations and in the formulation of the Bylaws which are acceptable. The corporation will function under the authority of a Council of Presidents in which each member institution will be represented. Operations will be managed by a Board of Trustees with six trustees-at-large to represent public interest and fifteen distinguished scientists and senior university administrators elected by the Council from nominees recommended by member institutions. The universities will form fifteen regional groups for the purpose of making these nominations.

Each member institution shall be equally liable for dues and assessments, as the same shall be fixed from time to time by the Board of Trustees, up to a cumulative maximum of \$100,000 for each member. While this financial commitment on the part of the University seems large, it will be spread over a period of years and will represent only a fraction of the professional returns to the University of Illinois which membership should bring.

I now formally recommend that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois authorize membership of the University in the Universities Research Association, Inc., by adoption of the following resolution.

Resolution

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois desires to participate in the work of Universities Research Association, Inc., as set forth in its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws; and

WHEREAS, Universities Research Association, Inc., has extended to the University of Illinois its invitation to become an initial member;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois hereby accepts such invitation to become an initial member of Universities Research Association, Inc., and that the Secretary of the Board be authorized to deliver acceptance of membership of the University of Illinois to Universities Research Association, Inc.

A copy of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws is submitted herewith, and the original is being filed with the Secretary of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Swain, the resolution accepting membership of

the University of Illinois in the Universities Research Association, Inc., was adopted.

EASEMENT TO NORTHERN ILLINOIS WATER CORPORATION

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend granting an easement to the Northern Illinois Water Corporation for water service to the Firemanship Training Facilities being constructed by the Illinois Building Authority west of the Mental Health Center on South First Street Road, Champaign. The area is a strip of land 15 feet by 40 feet in the proposed right-of-way of Windsor Road Extension.

I concur and recommend adoption of the following resolution.

Resolution Authorizing Easement to Northern Illinois Water Corporation for Water Main for South Campus

Be It, and It Hereby Is Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public Corporation of the State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and the Secretary of this Corporation be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and on behalf of this Corporation such instruments of conveyance, contract or other document or documents as to them may seem necessary or desirable in order to grant to Northern Illinois Water Corporation, an Illinois Corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Grantee", its successors and assigns, the right and easement to construct, reconstruct, operate, maintain, repair, alter, replace, move and remove an eight inch (8") water main and other equipment appurtenant thereto, under through and across the land hereinafter described and the right of ingress to and egress therefrom. Grantee shall agree to repair any damage caused to property of this Corporation by the construction, reconstruction, operation, maintenance, renewal, or removal of said water main, and to indemnify the University and its representatives from liability in connection with its activities; the term of said easement to be for such period as the easement may be used for the above-described purposes, but upon the discontinuation of use of or abandonment of said water main, said easement to thereupon cease and determine without necessity or re-entry or demand; the rights and easement granted to be limited to the extent that this public Corporation has the present right and capacity to grant the same. The right-of-way easement shall be over the following-described property:

Situated in the State of Illinois, the County of Champaign, and being a part of the Southwest One Quarter (SW ¼) of the Southeast One Quarter (SE ¼) of Section 24, Township 19 North, Range 8 East of the Third Principal Meridian, and more fully bounded and described as follows:

A strip of land 15.0 feet in width, the centerline of which is described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the South Line of said Section 24, said point being 425.0 feet West of the Southeast corner of the Southwest One Quarter (SW ¼) of the Southeast One Quarter (SE ¼) of said Section 24; thence Northerly along a line making an angle of 90° 00' with the said South Line a distance of 40.0 feet.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, this resolution was adopted.

NAMING OF NEW GRADUATE RESIDENCE HALL

(16) The Housing Division and the Graduate College have suggested that the new Graduate Residence Hall (SG-3) now being completed on Chalmers and Fifth Streets, Champaign, be named Stuart Pratt Sherman Hall for the late Professor Sherman who was a member of the faculty from 1907 to 1924. He was Chairman of the Department of English from 1914 until he left the University.

During his seventeen years at the University of Illinois, he became distinguished as a great teacher of literature and by his writings became one of America's foremost men of letters during the first quarter of this century. In brilliance and in inspiration as a teacher, he was probably at his best in courses dealing with the writings of Matthew Arnold about whom he wrote one of his books.

He was born in Anita, Iowa, October 1, 1881, and was educated in New England. He graduated from Williams College, A.B. in 1903; and from Harvard University, M.A. in 1904 and Ph.D. in 1906. He taught at Northwestern University for one year before the late Dean of Men, Thomas Arkle Clark, who was also Professor of Rhetoric at that time, persuaded the youthful Sherman to come to the University of Illinois as an Associate in English. Four years later he became a full professor and in 1914 was appointed Chairman of the Department of English. He left the University of Illinois in 1924 to become Literary Editor of the *New York Herald Tribune*. Two years later he met an untimely death while vacationing in Dunewood, Michigan.

I recommend that this new building be named Stuart Pratt Sherman Hall. The Consultative Committee of the University Council and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds of the Board support this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Pogue, this recommendation was approved.

BEQUEST OF KATHERINE HILSON BLAKE

(17) The University has received from the United California Bank of Oakland, California, executor of the estate of Katherine Hilson Blake, late of that city, the sum of \$6,140.73 and, in addition, is entitled to receive one-fourteenth of the estate residue represented by an undivided interest in three shares Ortiz Convalescent Home, Inc., stock and in a tax reserve of \$2,800.

The bequest to the University is for scholarships, as may be determined by it.

On motion of Mr. Dilliard, this bequest was accepted for the purpose indicated.

PURCHASES

(18) The President submitted a report of purchases authorized by his office, on recommendation of the Director of Purchases and the Vice-President and Comptroller. He also presented a list of purchases recommended by him.

The reports of purchases authorized and purchases recommended for Board approval are presented in two categories: purchases from appropriated funds (i.e., from state appropriations to the University) and purchases from institutional funds. The latter term designates funds received by the University under contracts with the United States government, contracts with private corporations and other organizations, funds from foundation grants and grants from corporations and other donors, and University revolving funds authorized by law.

**ACTING DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS
AND SCIENCES AT CHICAGO CIRCLE**

(22) The Vice-President of the University at Chicago Circle recommends the appointment of Dr. Stanley L. Jones as Acting Dean of the College of Liberal Arts

and Sciences at Chicago Circle beginning October 1, 1965, and continuing until August 31, 1966, or until such prior time as a permanent dean has been appointed. It is also recommended that a combined contract be awarded to Reliable Plumbing & Heating Company, Champaign, in the amount of \$792,357, being the amounts bid by that Company on plumbing work, on heating, piping, and refrigeration work, and on ventilating and sheetmetal work.

It is also recommended that all contracts other than the general contract be assigned to the contractor for general work, making the total of his contract \$1,887,933.58; and it is further recommended that an agreement be entered into

with J D P Associates, Inc., Terre Haute, Indiana, for the assignment of these other contracts for \$25,551.58, which amount is included in the contract price being the amount bid by that Company for service charge for supervision of other contracts assigned to the general contractor. All contract awards are subject to approval by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The University has received a grant of \$1,125,000 from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to assist in the construction of this project. The remaining funds are available from the University's share of Indirect Costs for research contracts subject to assignment by the Board.

It is therefore recommended that the Board authorize the assignment of \$1,039,000 from University Contract Research Reserves for the construction of this building.

Submitted herewith is a report from the Physical Plant Department, including a schedule of the bids received, a copy of which is being filed with the Secretary of the Board for record.

REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

FUTURE BOARD MEETINGS

MEMORIAL TO LLOYD MOREY

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois records with deep sorrow the sudden and untimely passing on September 29, 1965, of Lloyd Morey, President of the University and Professor of Accountancy, *Emeritus*.

Student, alumnus, teacher, administrator, and finally chief executive, Lloyd Morey devoted and dedicated "the heart of his life" to the University. As a student clerk in the business office under the University's first Comptroller, as the fourth Comptroller for thirty-seven years, as President for two years before retirement in 1955, Dr. Morey was respected for his ability, integrity, and steadfastness.

This competence was directed not only in the interest of the University but in other state areas and to national institutions as well. He pioneered in the development of many improvements in University business practices and became noted as a specialist in education finance. He was largely instrumental in setting up the State Universities Retirement System for the institutions of higher education and allied agencies of the State of Illinois, working tirelessly for many years to help draft legislation to establish the system. He also contributed to the basic planning of legislation which created the Universities Civil Service System of Illinois. The Illini Union is another tribute to his statesmanship in developing the financing of the project more than a quarter of a century ago. No matter the task set to him, he accomplished it with skill and vigor.

The Board of Trustees pays tribute to the memory of a leader who helped make the University a finer and a greater institution, and extends heartfelt sympathy to his family.

This memorial was adopted by a rising vote.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNING BOARDS

Mrs. Watkins presented a report on the annual meeting of the Association of Governing Boards held at Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, on October 13-15, which she attended as a member of the Board of Trustees.

A copy of her report was filed with the Secretary and copies were subsequently sent to all members of the Board.

On motion of Mrs. Watkins, the Board recessed.

He informed the Secretary that he had examined the recommendations relating to the business for consideration in executive session and that he desired to be recorded as voting "Aye" on them.

ACQUISITION OF PROPERTIES

(24) The University of Illinois Foundation has signed contracts to acquire a number of properties which are a part of the site for the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts. The Vice-President and Comptroller recommends that the University acquire the following properties from the Foundation at the prices indicated, plus interest charges on a bank loan to finance the initial acquisition of the properties in Urbana, Illinois:

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 607 EAST DANIEL STREET, CHAMPAIGN, ILLINOIS

(25) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board of Trustees request the University of Illinois Foundation to purchase the property at 607 East Daniel Street, Champaign, Illinois, at a price of \$195,000, including furniture and equipment, payable over three years, and lease the property to the University at a rental adequate to pay the interest on a bank loan to the Foundation to finance the purchase until the University has funds for its acquisition.

It is also recommended that the purchase of the contents of the building (furniture and equipment for sixty-three women students) by the University from the Foundation be authorized at a total cost of \$10,000, for which funds are available in the Housing Division Operation Budget.

The property is a lot 60 feet by 173.25 feet (10,395 square feet), improved with a three-story and basement frame residence now housing sixty-three women students. It is adjacent to the site of the proposed Psychology Building and is required for future expansion of that building.

I concur.
