The December meeting of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held in Chicago Circle Center, Chicago, Illinois, on Wed-

nesday, December 15, 1965, beginning at 10:30 a.m.

President Howard W. Clement called the meeting to order and asked the Secretary to call the roll. The following members of the Board were present: Mr. Howard W. SABBATICAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE, 1965-66

(4) I recommend that Dr. Icko Iben, Newspaper Librarian and Business Archivist on the University Library staff, be granted sabbatical leave of absence on full pay for six months beginning March 1, 1966, for study and research in European libraries. He is eligible for such leave and the delay in submission of his application is due to the fact that he has only recently been assured of a supporting grant for his project from the American Philosophical Society.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, this leave was granted.

CHANGE OF AGRICULTURAL COMMUNICATIONS MAJOR TO AGRICULTURAL COMMUNICATIONS CURRICULUM (URBANA)

(5) The faculty of the College of Agriculture, the Executive Committee of the College of Journalism and Communications, and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend that the present major in agricultural communications be removed

from the core curriculum and identified separately as an Agricultural Communications curriculum, effective as soon as the revision can be implemented.

The change arises from changes taking place in the type of positions that graduates in agricultural communications assume during their careers. Specifically demand is growing for graduates prepared to move into business-oriented positions'

The proposal assures that agricultural course work will be based upon study of related physical and biological sciences, and also seeks to broaden students' preparation for careers by increased study in the humanities and social sciences. Decreases in agriculture and physical sciences requirements are recommended but a greater share of required agriculture credit hours would be at the 200-300 level than in the past. The level of required courses in biological sciences and communications would remain the same.

In summary, the proposals specify that:

- 1. Agricultural course requirements be changed from a minimum of forty semester hours to a minimum of thirty-five hours.
- 2. In addition to Agriculture 100, Freshman Lectures, Agriculture 114, Agricultural Journalism, and Agriculture 214, Advanced Agricultural Journalism, a student must take one course from three of the four groups designated as agriculture core courses. At least fifteen of the thirty-five hours must be at the 200-300 level, including Agriculture 214.
- 3. Humanities requirement be increased from six to a minimum of nine credit hours, including one approved sequence.
- 4. Social sciences requirement be increased from a minimum of thirteen semester hours to a minimum of twenty hours, to include Economics 108, Elements of Economics, and one approved sequence.
- 5. Physical sciences requirement be changed to permit a student to select a minimum of three hours from chemistry, geology, mathematics, or physics, rather than the former requirement of Chemistry 132, Elementary Organic Chemistry. and Geology 105, Agricultural Geology.
- 6. News-Editorial option be changed to require:

- 7. This undergraduate study program be removed from the core curriculum and be identified as Agricultural Communications curriculum.
- 8. Changes be made in the Undergraduate Study catalog and the Handbook for Agriculture Students and Their Advisers as appropriate to the proposals listed

The suggested catalog statement of the proposal is appended herewith.

The Senate Coordinating Council has indicated that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, this recommendation was approved.

REVISION OF CURRICULUM IN ANIMAL SCIENCE (URBANA)

(6) The faculty of the College of Agriculture and the Urbana-Champaign Senate recommend the deletion of Veterinary Pathology and Hygiene 205 as a non-agriculture prescribed course for a major in animal science, which will reduce the number of non-agriculture prescribed course hours from the range of 36-42 hours to 33-39 hours. However, Veterinary Pathology and Hygiene 205, Animal Hygiene, may be taken as an elective. The change will become effective September

The proposal seeks to avoid duplication of information presented to the student: in livestock production and management courses, subject matter now includes attention to sanitation and disease prevention and control procedures. Better confinuity is achieved by including this information as part of over-all production and management techniques than by leaving such information to be taught in Veter-inary Pathology and Hygiene 205.

The change will make the Animal Science curriculum more flexible and will

permit greater selection of other supporting courses, depending upon the student's

The Senate Coordinating Council has indicated that no other Senate jurisdiction is involved.

REVISIONS IN PROFESSIONAL CURRICULUM OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR MEN (URBANA)

The courses to be dropped represent subject matter which is either considered to be less vital for the physical education concentration or can be covered by other means in the curriculum revision. The courses to be added are designed to strengthen the general education requirement and to increase the depth of concentration in the physical education major requirement. Inclusion of the Standard Special Certificate option will provide direct preparation for those who may wish to teach physical education at the elementary level. Strengthening of the requirement for the minor is consistent with the upgrading of requirements in teacher education minors generally.

These revisions will become effective for freshmen entering in September, 1966.

DISCONTINUANCE OF MASTER OF SCIENCE IN THE EDUCATION OF THE DEAF AND OF MASTER OF SCIENCE IN THE EDUCATION OF MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CHILDREN (URBANA)

(8) Reported for record is the discontinuance of two degree programs: Master of Science in the Education of the Deaf and Master of Science in the Education of Mentally Handicapped Children.

These two programs are no longer used because other degrees, the Master of Arts or Master of Science in Education, without specific designation, are preferred. No change in program or decrease in number of persons prepared will be involved.

The change has the approval of the College of Education, the University Committee on the Preparation of Teachers of Exceptional Children, and the Urbana-Champaign Senate.

On motion of Mr. Jones, this report was accepted for record.

CONTRACT FOR NEW EXHAUST STACK FOR FIRST UNIT OF DENTISTRY-MEDICINE-PHARMACY BUILDING

(9) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend the award of a contract for \$11,376 to the Mueller Construction Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, for the installation of a new exhaust stack for an incinerator in Room 519 of the First Unit of the Dentistry-Medicine-Pharmacy

Building at the Medical Center.

The work will consist of removing an existing interior stack and installing a new and larger stack in the same location. The old stack was used to connect the exhaust from a new incinerator recently installed, but it was found that the stack is too small for operation of the incinerator at full capacity.

Funds are available in the state capital appropriations to the University for

1965-67 and in the Physical Plant operating budget.

REQUEST TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT FOR REFRIGERATION UNIT FOR CHILLED WATER CHICAGO CIRCLE — PHASE II

(10) On November 5, 1965, the Illinois Building Authority received bids for the furnishing and erecting of a 3,500 ton refrigeration unit for the Chicago Circle, Phase II Utilities Center Addition. The lowest bidder is T. F. Hanley Corp., 1503 South Michigan Avenue, Chicago, with a bid of \$174,000 for furnishing of a Carrier Corporation refrigeration unit and the erection thereof at the construction site. The lowest bidder is qualified and has performed satisfactorily under contract with the University in the past.

The project is a part of the Phase II construction which the Executive Committee on September 2, 1965, requested the Illinois Building Authority to provide. The Authority will finance the construction and lease the facilities to the University for rental payments appropriated by the Illinois General Assembly. The University will transfer jurisdiction of the land on which the project will be constructed

to the Authority.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the Board request the Illinois Building Authority to award a contract for the described work to the lowest bidder, and to provide this facility for the University.

Michigan Ave., Chicago, Illinois, a contract for Refrigeration Unit for Chilled Water and Erection of Refrigeration Unit for Chilled Water, at Chicago Circle, Utilities Center, for the fixed price of \$174,000, and to proceed with the procurement and erection of said facility.

REQUEST TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT FOR UTILITIES CENTER COOLING TOWER CHICAGO CIRCLE — PHASE II

(11) On November 12, 1965, the Illinois Building Authority received bids on construction of a cooling tower for the Chicago Circle, Phase II Utilities Center

Addition. The only acceptable bidder is Fluor Products Company, Inc., 79 West Monroe Street, Chicago, Illinois, with a bid of \$46,624 for the furnishing of the cooling tower and the erection thereof at the construction site. This bidder has

performed satisfactorily under contract with the University in the past.

The facility is a part of the Phase II construction which the Executive Committee on September 2, 1965, requested the Illinois Building Authority to provide. The Authority will finance the construction and lease the facilities to the University. Funds for rental payments are available in state appropriations to the University for 1965-67 by the Illinois General Assembly. The University will transfer jurisdiction of the land on which the tower will be constructed to the Authority. The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller

recommend that the Board request the Illinois Building Authority to award a contract for this construction to the only acceptable bidder and proceed to provide

this facility for the University.

I concur and recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

Be It, and It Hereby Is, Further Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and Secretary of this public corporation be, and they hereby are, authorized to make, execute, acknowledge and deliver in the name and in behalf of this corporation, such instruments of transfer, conveyance, lease, contract, and other documents as are necessary or appropriate in order to provide for the carrying out of the foregoing project and facility by the Illinois Building Authority.

MOUNT MORRIS EXPERIMENT FIELD

(12) The Mount Morris Experiment Field of approximately twenty acres in Ogle County, acquired by the University from Frank and Grace Coffman in 1910, was discontinued as an experimental field in 1959, having served its purpose after almost half a century of use. The warranty deed conveying the property to the University provides that if the use of the land as an experimental field or station should be discontinued, the University shall deed the north half to the Village of Mount Morris, Illinois, and the south half to Mt. Morris College Co.

The Board of Trustees on September 21, 1960, authorized conveyance of the north half of the field to the Village of Mount Morris, but conveyance of the other half could not be accomplished because Mount Morris College, following serious financial difficulties, had entered into a trust agreement with certain named trustees and was dissolved as an educational corporation in 1934 pursuant to arrangements made by those Trustees with Kable Printing Company, Manchester College in

Indiana, and the Church of the Brethren.

Since 1960 the University Legal Counsel's Office has been negotiating with these agencies to determine and establish legal ownership of the property. As a result of these negotiations, it is now proposed that: (a) the Church of the Brethren and Manchester College shall provide the University with quit-claim deeds or disclaimers manifesting no further interest in the property; and (b) the surviving Trustees of Mount Morris College shall provide the University with a statement of affidavit regarding their relationship as trustees of the property and with Kable Brothers Company (Kable Printing Company); whereupon the University will quit-claim the south half (ten acres) of Mount Morris Experiment Field, without further consideration, to the surviving Trustees of Mount Morris College.

The Legal Counsel and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend approval of this proposal and adoption of a resolution to implement the property transfer.

I concur.

Resolution Authorizing Transfer of Mount Morris Experiment Field

Whereas, the hereinafter described property was conveyed to the University of Illinois by Frank Coffman and Grace Coffman, his wife, by deed dated January 27, 1910, with the proviso that the property was "to be used as a State experimental Station" and with the further proviso that "if the use of this tract of land for the purpose stated be discontinued for the term of two years the University of Illinois shall deed . . . the South half of said tract to Mt. Morris College Co.,"; and

Whereas, the property was accepted under these conditions and the said University of Illinois has discontinued to use the tract "as a State experimental Station" for longer than two years; and

Whereas, certain Trustees named under a Trust Indenture dated May 5, 1932, executed by Mount Morris College, the successor of Mt. Morris College Co., namely, I. D. Leatherman and E. R. Henricks, have filed with the said University of Illinois a Statement asserting that the right contained in the 1910 deed of Frank Coffman and Grace Coffman has passed to them as Trustees pursuant to the aforesaid Trust Indenture; and

Whereas, the said University of Illinois is desirous of fulfilling its obligations under the aforementioned 1910 deed and it appearing that a transfer of "the South half of said tract" to these Trustees, I. D. Leatherman and E. R. Henricks, as Trustees under the aforementioned Trust Indenture, will fulfill this obligation;

Now Therefore, Be It, and It Hereby Is Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, with its principal office in the City of Urbana, in the County of Champaign, and in the State of Illinois, that the Comptroller and Secretary of this Corporation be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name of and in behalf of this Corporation, and under its Corporate Seal, a Quit-Claim Deed and such other documents in connection therewith as said Comptroller and Secretary may deem necessary or desirable in order to convey and Quit Claim to I. EMPLOYMENT OF ARCHITECTS

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend the employment of Smith, Seaton, Olach, Architects, Urbana, for complete architectural services, except supervision during construction, for an addition to the Nuclear Reactor Laboratory at a fee of 51/4 per cent of construction costs.

The initial work will include site studies and the preparation of preliminary drawings for construction grant application documents to be submitted to the federal government.

Funds are available to the Physical Plant Department from an assignment of funds from Contract Research Reserves for work through application drawings. If the application is approved, additional funds necessary will be provided from the Stores and Services Account until permanent financing can be arranged.

The Advisory Committee on the Selection of Architects and Engineers and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds have reviewed the recommendation and

MEDICAL CENTER ILLINI UNION AND STUDENT RESIDENCE HALL

(19) The need for a new Illini Union Building and a new Student Residence Hall at the Medical Center campus has been obvious for several years. In 1962, with the assistance of the University of Illinois Foundation, a study to determine the feasibility of raising a portion of the funds necessary for the project through gifts from private sources was undertaken. The necessity for a gift program was occasioned by the fact the income from fees and rentals would not alone be sufficient to finance the project.

The fund-raising feasibility study, presented in December, 1962, encouraged the initiation of a fund-raising effort in support of the project. Subsequently, G. A. Brakeley & Company, Inc., was retained through the University of Illinois Foundation as a consultant, and in the early months of 1963 the preliminary planning for a fund effort was undertaken. Formation of an Illini Union Fund Committee composed of distinguished citizens was completed during the summer months of 1963. Membership of the Committee was as follows:

The physical planning for the project resulted in a proposal that, if funds were available, three separate but related buildings should be constructed. These were a new Illini Union Building, a new Student Residence Hall, and a Recreation Center. However, detailed architectural planning was undertaken on only two of the buildings pending results of the fund-raising program. The two buildings given the highest priority were the new Illini Union Building and the

new Student Residence Hall. As the fund effort continued, it was determined that the project should consist of the two buildings only, and the fund effort was focused on that goal. However, the concept of improved recreational facilities at the Medical Center campus is still valid, and it is proposed that planning continue with the hope that a subsequent project can be undertaken.

The new Illini Union will provide improved cafeteria services, a bookstore and supply center, recreation areas, faculty dining room and lounge, a music lounge, an art lounge, a general student lounge, conference and meeting rooms a theater-banquet area, eight bowling lanes, offices for student organizations and Illini Union staff. The new Student Residence Hall is designed for women students and will provide accommodations for 177 persons. In addition, the lower level of the building will provide for six guest rooms for visitors to the Medical Center campus.

In September of 1964 it was determined that the fund-raising effort could be concluded, except for a limited number of proposals pending before prospective contributors. In December of 1964 the Board of Trustees awarded contracts for construction of the new Illini Union Building and Student Residence Hall. Construction began in January, 1965, and completion is expected prior to the opening of the fall quarter in September, 1966. The construction budget for the project totals \$4,065,000 with \$3,600,000 to come from the sale of revenue bonds and \$465,000 to come from gifts or from operating surplus. As of November 1, 1965, the fund-raising effort had resulted in cash and pledges totaling \$461,003.94. and there were yet pending responses from several prospective donors. Of this total, cash in the amount of \$310,276.25 has been received, and a balance of \$150,727.69 is yet to be received from those who have made pledges.

The fund-raising effort to date has resulted in 1,912 pledges or payments from individuals, foundations, and corporations. The largest amount was \$50,000 and the smallest amount was twenty-five cents. Early in the fund-raising effort a Founders Honor Honor Roll was announced to include those who would contribute \$300 or more. As of November 1, 1965, 446 contributors have qualified for

listing on the Founders Honor Roll.

The University of Illinois at the Medical Center is in a section of the city where the normal facilities of residential life are inadequate or missing. Thus, the campus is confronted in a unique degree with the need to be relatively self-sufficient. The facilities provided under this project will do much to improve the morale of the academic community at the Medical Center campus.

This report, prepared by the Vice-President for the Medical Center, is sub-

mitted as a matter of information and for the record.

The foregoing report was read to the Board by Mrs. Watkins, as Chairman of the Committee on Chicago Departments, and on her motion it was accepted for record.

APPRECIATION TO THE MEDICAL CENTER ILLINI UNION **FUND COMMITTEE**

President Clement asked Mr. Don R. Grimes, who attended the meeting as a guest of the Board, to come forward and receive the following citation on behalf of the Medical Center Illini Union Fund Committee.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is happy to take this cocasion to express publicly its appreciation of the leadership and service of the Committee and of its Chairman, Mr. Don R. Grimes of Chicago, President of the Independent Grocers' Alliance. Mr. Grimes has provided distinguished leadership, and has involved himself deeply in the task at hand, often at the sacrifice of time taken from his own affairs.

It is impossible to identify each of the many other individuals involved in the fund effort. Therefore, in this public recognition of the Illini Union Fund Committee and its Chairman, the Board would extend this expression of appreci-

ation and gratitude to all who supported the project.

Mr. Grimes thanked the Board on behalf of the Committee for this expression.

REPORT OF GIFTS AND FUNDS RECEIVED FROM OUTSIDE SOURCES

(20) Following is a report of gifts, grants, and contract funds received by the University during the fiscal year July 1, 1964, through June 30, 1965. This report includes funds from private donors and funds received from governmental agencies and covers all payments received during the fiscal year. A period of several months may elapse between the time an offer is received and accepted and final payment is made, which will account for the listing here of some gifts of funds, such as for scholarships and fellowships, for the academic year 1964-65, and others for 1965-66.

A number of these grants and gifts were previously reported to the Board when the offers were received, and likewise the Comptroller's monthly reports have included numerous research contracts for which funds had not been received at the time of reporting. These funds are being included here in order to present a complete report of all funds received from outside sources during the fiscal period 1964-65.

The contracts have all been properly executed by the Secretary and the Comptroller of the Board. All gifts and grants reported have been accepted and duly acknowledged by the President or other appropriate University officer with an expression of appreciation on behalf of the University and the Board of

Trustees.

TRAINING, RESEARCH, AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM FOR PRESCHOOL DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN

(22) The Executive Vice-President and Provost, the Vice-President and Comptroller, and the Dean of the College of Education recommend the establishment of a Training, Research, and Development Program for Preschool Disadvantaged Children.

The purposes of the program will be to train professional personnel, to develop educational programs and evaluation procedures, and to undertake relevant research. Although specific objectives can be expected to change in the course of experience and continued evaluation, the initial objectives of the program are:

To concentrate the talents and energies of an interdisciplinary research and development staff on (a) studies and innovations of different curricula for culturally disadvantaged children, aged one to five, (b) the development of evaluative instruments such as a cognitive maturity test for young disadvantaged children, (c) sociological investigations of competence development dealing with lower-class Negro families, kinship patterns, and lower-class community organization, (d) research on critical ages for intellectual stimulation and IQ changes, and (e) short-term field demonstrations to disseminate information.

To train supervisors and head teachers at the post-baccalaureate level. These individuals will be sufficiently prepared to provide in-service training to others in operational programs and to head schools and classes dealing with the culturally disadvantaged in other communities. It is anticipated that after the first year an undergraduate program will be developed and plans will be undertaken to institute a doctoral program.

The program will be administered as a unit of the Institute for Research on Exceptional Children. The development and operation of training programs will be the responsibility of the Division of Early Childhood Education of the Elementary Education Department, and the Division of Child Development and Family Relationships of the Department of Home Economics. Research and development

will be the responsibility of the Institute for Research on Exceptional Children which is an interdisciplinary research unit with close working relationship with the Departments of Psychology, Speech and Theatre, Sociology, and Special Education and with the state agencies for mental health, family services, and the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Application has been made for federal funds in support of the program. The United States Office of Education is prepared to execute a contract with the University whereby it will receive \$272,988, and additional support of approximately a like amount is expected from another federal agency. Such support in both cases

would be on an annual basis.

It is requested that the Board of Trustees (a) authorize the establishment of the Training, Research, and Development Program for Preschool Disadvantaged Children, subject to receipt of funds as indicated; (b) confirm the application for federal funds; and (c) authorize the execution of the necessary contracts with the federal agencies concerned.

I recommend approval, subject to further action by the Board of Higher

Education.

RECESS AND EXECUTIVE SESSION

An executive session, having been requested, was ordered for consideration of property acquisitions.

On motion of Mr. Hughes, the Board recessed.

When the Board reconvened in executive session, the same members, officers of the Board, and officers of the University were present as recorded at the beginning of these minutes.

The Board considered the following reports and recommendations

from the President of the University.

ACQUISITION OF LAND ADJOINING UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AIRPORT

(23) The Board of Trustees has previously authorized (meeting of May 19, 1965) condemnation of certain real estate and avigation easement rights as required by the Federal Aviation Agency for a clear zone approach and approach lighting system for instrument runways at the University of Illinois-Willard Airport. It has now Leen determined that the University's acquisition of title to all of the real estate in question, not just avigation easements over some portions of the property, is necessary and desirable for the current operations of the Airport and its future expansion. The University has conducted negotiations with the owners for the purchase of all of the property and the owners have failed to accept the University's offer to purchase at a price the University considers fair and reasonable and representing the present market value of the land.

Accordingly, the Director of the Institute of Aviation and the Vice-President and Comptroller recommend that the property be condemned through exercise of the power of eminent domain and request the adoption of a resolution, which will he deemed to supersede the action of the Board of Trustees on this matter at its

May 19, 1965, meeting.

Resolution Authorizing Condemnation of Property Adjacent to Southeast End of Runway 31, University of Illinois-Willard Airport

Be It, and It Is Hereby Resolved, Found and Declared by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a body corporate and politic and a public corporation of the State of Illinois, that the following-described property situated in the County of Champaign, in the State of Illinois, to-wit:

PARCEL No. 1

A parcel of land situated in the State of Illinois, the County of Champaign and being a part of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 11, Township 18 North, Range 8 East of the Third Principal Meridian and being more fully bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the Northeast Corner of the said Southwest Quarter (SW 14) thence Southerly along the East line of said Southwest 14 a distance of 1270.40 feet to a corner, said corner being marked with an iron pin monument; thence Northwesterly a distance of 1799.47 feet to a corner in the North line of said Southwest 1/4, said corner being marked with an iron pin monument; thence easterly along the said North line a distance of 1239.02 feet to the point of beginning; said parcel containing 18.06 acres, more or less;

PARCEL No. 2

A parcel of land situated in the State of Illinois, the County of Champaign and being a part of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 11, Township 18 North, Range 8 East of the Third Principal Meridian and being more fully bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the Southwest corner of the said Northeast 1/4; thence Northerly along the West line of said Northeast 1/4 a distance of 1268.47 feet to a corner, said corner being marked with an iron pin monument; thence Southeasterly a distance of 1794.56 feet to a corner on the South line of said Northeast 1/4, said corner being marked with an iron pin monument; thence Westerly along the said South line a distance of 1238.57 feet to the point of beginning; said parcel containing 18.03 acres, more or less:

PARCEL No. 3

A parcel of land situated in the State of Illinois, the County of Champaign and being a part of the Southeast 1/4 of Section 11 Township 18 North, Range 8 East of the Third Principal Meridian and being more fully bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of the said Southeast 1/4; thence Easterly along the North line of said Southeast 1/4 a distance of 1632.35 feet to a corner, said corner being marked with an iron pin monument; thence Southerly along a line parallel to the West line of said Southeast 1/4 a distance of 1641.91 feet to a corner, said corner being marked with an iron pipe monument; thence Westerly along a line parallel to the North Line of said Southeast 1/4 a distance of 1632.60 feet to a corner, said corner being marked with an iron pipe monument; thence Northerly along the West line of said Southeast 1/4 a distance of 1642.08 feet to the point of beginning; said parcel containing 61.51 acres, more or less;

is needed by the University of Illinois, an educational institution established and supported by the State of Illinois for use as a clear zone approach area and Airport Lighting System area for the University of Illinois-Willard Airport and for other educational purposes conducted and to be conducted by said University of Illinois and for the further expansion of the educational facilities of said University of Illinois and to enable said University of Illinois to discharge its duty to the people of said State and for public use, that funds are available to the University for the purchase of said land for said educational purposes; that this Board of Trustees has negotiated with the owners of said land through their duly authorized representatives for the purchase of said land at a price which this Board of Trustees considers fair and reasonable and which it finds constitutes the present market value of said land, but that said owners have refused to sell and convey said land, or any portion thereof, to said The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, for such price and continue to refuse to sell and convey the same to it except for a consideration and price which this Board of Trustees deems unreasonable and excessive and is, therefore, unwilling and has refused to pay; and

Be It, and It Is Hereby Further Resolved, Found and Declared by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the compensation to be paid by it for said land cannot be agreed upon between this Board of Trustees and the owners of said property and they and it are unable to agree upon the purchase price to be paid to said property owners for the sale and conveyance of said land by said owners thereof to said The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois; and

Therefore, Be It, and It Is Hereby Further Resolved, Found and Declared by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that because of said need of the University of Illinois for said land for the purposes hereinabove set forth and because the compensation to be paid to the owners thereof for such land cannot be agreed upon between them and this Board of Trustees, it is necessary for The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to take said land and acquire title thereto through the exercise by it of the right of eminent domain conferred upon it by law and to have the compensation to be paid by it to the owners thereof and any and all other persons who may have any right, title or interest in and to said land determined in the manner provided by law for the exercise of said right and power of eminent domain; and

Be It, and It Is Hereby Further Resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that the necessary and appropriate action be taken for the acquisition of said title to said property by said The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and to have the compensation to be paid therefor determined by the institution and prosecution to completion of a proceeding in eminent domain in a court of competent jurisdiction and that the Legal Counsel of the University be, and he is hereby, authorized to proceed accordingly, to institute and prosecute an eminent domain proceeding in the name and on behalf of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for the acquisition of said land and the determination of the compensation to be paid by it therefor, and to employ such special legal counsel, appraisers, and others as he may deem necessary or desirable to assist him in the institution and prosecution of said proceeding.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 908 SOUTH FIFTH STREET. CHAMPAIGN

(24) The Board has authorized purchase of the property at 908 South Fifth Street,

Champaign, at a price of \$46,500, payable from Housing Division funds.

The Housing Division wishes to include parking for the occupants of Stuart P. Sherman Hall as a part of the next housing bond issue. The Vice-President and Comptroller has requested the University of Illinois Foundation to acquire this property at a price of \$46,500 and to lease the property to the University at a rental rate adequate to pay the interest on a bank loan to the Foundation to finance the purchase until the University has funds from the bond issue for its acquisition, since bond issue proceeds may not be used to reimburse the Housing Division for funds advanced by it for land acquisition; hence acquisition through the Foundation is desirable.

I recommend approval of this change in acquisition of the property and leasing of the same from the Foundation on the terms indicated. The Foundation has approved the purchase subject to confirmation by the Board of Trustees.
